LAVs down enemy combatants

Using one company as an aggressor force, the 2d Light Armored Vehicle Battalion staff made maximum use of its logistical chain of command and control elements to defeat the Soviet-styled imperators in a battalion exercise Dec. 1-4 at Camp Lejeune.

According to the battalion's training officer, 1st Lieutenant Dale Armstrong, the exercise was, "The first chance we've had to exercise as a battalion in nearly a year. The companies have trained independently during the year, not leaving the battalion staff the opportunity to exercise itself."

While no live ammunition was used during the four-day training period, friendly and aggressor forces alike used pop-up flares to indicate battles.

"It's usually whoever gets the first shot off who will win a battle with these things," said Corporal Edward LeMos, a vehicle commander from Chico, Calif., who was an aggressor with Bravo Company. "The LAV doesn't really have enough armor to fight a prolonged battle. Our biggest asset is our speed."

With a cruising speed of more than 60 miles-per-hour, the LAVs speed makes them ideal for use as a Marine Corps reconnaissance and security vehicle forward of the edge of the battle area, according to Armstrong. The unit's exercise Dec. 1-4 geared its companies into a cat-

and-mouse contest with friendly forces extending as far as possible into aggressor territory and reporting to higher headquarters where the enemy was located.

"Our main role as an LAV battalion gets confused by some people," said Armstrong. "We're not here to replace the grunts; and all Marines aren't going to be riding in LAVs in the near future. Our mission is to provide the ground combat element with security and reconnaissance.

We're mobile. We're fast. We're eyes and ears."

While 2d LAVBn. doesn't have all its vehicles yet, Armstrong said the unit is making do with what it does have. "We made a logistics variant into a medevac vehicle and used it during the exercise," he said. "We also used two L (logistics) variants to simulate a command and control vehicle."

The unit has received the LAV 25, its

main battle vehicle, and the logistics-configured variants. Due to arrive during FY-87 are the mortar, recovery, command and control, and TOW variants. An air defense variant is expected during 1989, according to Armstrong.

"To fully accomplish a mission, we need to have all the variants to secure an area to operate in," added the training officer. "This exercise, while it exercised the battalion staff, gave the individual Marines in the companies a feel for the tactical movement of vehicles and companies in the field."

Christmas trees may look harmless but they can lead to tragedy

Christmas trees. Their scent perfumes the house, and getting together with loved ones to decorate their obliging boughs is the stuff of seasonal memories. But the lovely trees could bring your holiday to a tragic end if you fail to heed a few safety rules.

If you buy a real tree, try to get the freshest one possible. A dry tree will ignite and burn faster than a fresh one.

A fresh tree will have a strong pine or spruce scent and a deep green color. Needles should not fall off the tree at a touch, and a truly fresh one has sticky sap at the base.

Safety experts suggest buying a tree early and getting it in a stable, water-holding stand as soon as possible. Before putting the tree in water, cut about two inches off the trunk—at an angle if your stand will permit. An angle cut allows maximum water absorption.

Rewater the tree daily. Place the tree away from fireplaces and heat sources, and make sure it does not block a home's traffic pattern or doorway.

Provide substantial support for the tree, whether real or artificial. If you're buying an artificial tree, look for a label stating it's been

tested for flammability. Read the safety instructions that come with the artificial tree. Metallic trees bear a warning to use colored spotlights rather than string lights, for example.

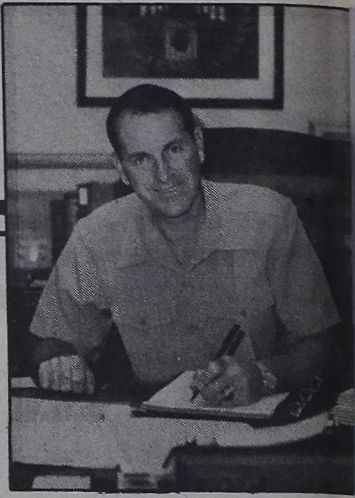
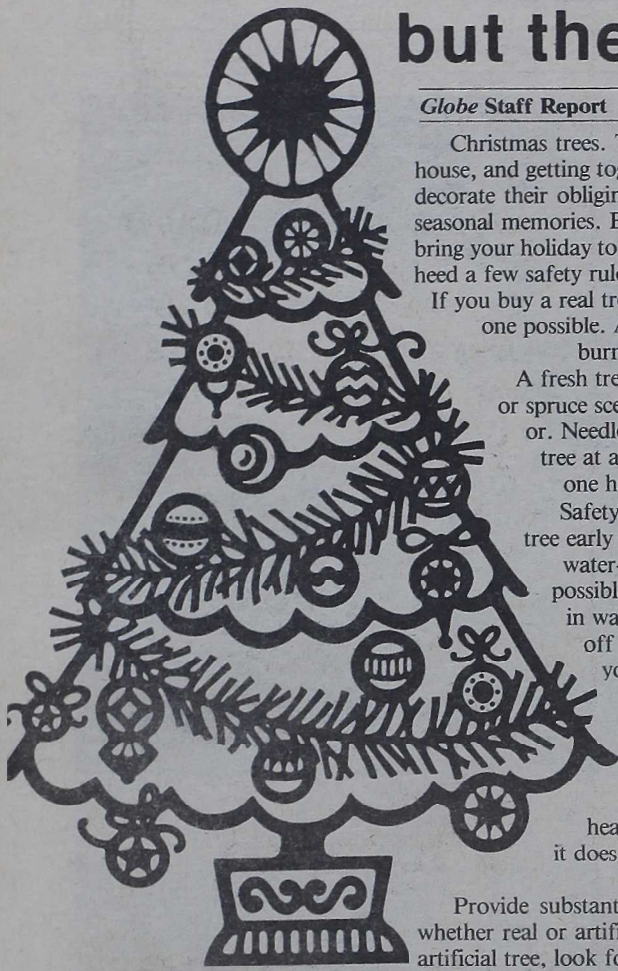
Make sure light sets have been certified safe by Underwriters Laboratory (UL) or Factory Mutual (FM). Check last year's strings for broken bulbs before plugging them in. If using lights outdoors, make sure they're designated safe for outdoor use.

If you're using an extension cord, make sure it does not present a tripping hazard.

Don't permit smoking near the tree or wrappings.

Unplug lights before going to bed or leaving home.

Supervise young children when they're near the tree. Teach them to care for it safely.



CG'S CORNER

As I drove home from work a few weeks ago I stopped to get gas and some milk from a convenience store. As I walked through the door a Marine in full camouflage uniform came past me. I was so surprised at seeing him out in town wearing his cammies that I didn't say anything.

A few days later, as I was flying out of the Jacksonville airport, I saw another Marine, this one wearing his boots, cammie trousers and sports shirt. I have also seen numerous hunters on base using the standard camouflage uniform mixed with civilian clothes.

When I went through boot camp I was taught that the camouflage uniform is not suitable for leave or liberty. Is there a Base Order on proper uniforms?

Yes, there is a Base Order on uniform regulations—Base Order 1020.8R—which addresses the proper wearing of the utility uniform.

The cammie uniform is not a liberty uniform. It is authorized for wear off base only when traveling to and from work in cars, on bicycles or motorcycles and in buses.

You can also wear the cammie uniform when walking from the bus stop to your off-base quarters, when performing emergency vehicle maintenance, in conjunction with emergency medical care, stops at daycare centers and drive-through windows at banks, cleaners and fast food restaurants.

You should not be in the cammie uniform at the new NAVCARE Clinic except in the case of an emergency when you do not have time to change into the appropriate uniform. Then the cammie uniform is only appropriate in the clinic itself and the adjoining parking lot.

Any other stop off base in the camouflage utility uniform is prohibited.

In addition, no parts of the uniform may be worn with civilian attire. This includes cammie trousers or jackets that have become ripped or torn. Even if they are no longer serviceable and cannot be worn on duty the cammie trousers, blouse, and all other parts of that uniform are still considered part of an official uniform and are not suited for leave and liberty usage by active duty service members.

When hunting on base, you should wear the full utility uniform to and from the authorized hunting area. While in the area, replace the utility cover with the orange hat and wear the required orange vest.

All questions should include full name and unit and should be mailed or brought to the Joint Public Affairs Office.

Home -- a haven for accidents

Many of us are aware that most accidents that are not traffic-related occur in the home or yard. There are many ways to make a mistake in the proper use or handling of certain items. These accidents or injuries can range from the annoying to the fatal. Prevention is the key to a brighter, safer future. Below are listed a few helpful hints to make your home safer for you and your family.

First, and probably easiest to do, is to tack or tape down all those loose throw rugs. If your arms are full of packages or a squirming child, you really don't need to have your footing slip underneath you, dumping you and whatever you're carrying to the floor. This is especially true if you have hardwood or linoleum floors which have been kept well-waxed.

Pick up all those extra toys and other clutter which manage to find their way to the floor. The bottom line is if it doesn't belong on the floor, put it away; it's a safety hazard.

Get all those toxic chemicals (you know the ones; the cleaners and

disinfectants, the rubbing alcohol, and the pills) away from the reach of inquisitive children, either behind a locked door or into a higher cabinet. It never fails; the one thing you leave down where the children might have access is the item they'll pick to try to eat or drink or share with their friends.

The hospital has seen quite a few cases of children eating their mothers' whole month's supply of birth control pills, trying out the newest detergent, tasting the fabric softener or rubbing alcohol, or sharing the whole bottle of Flinstones vitamins. Most of these poisonings are not fatal, but could be if not treated promptly. Most of the things children put in their mouths either look or taste like candy to them, and many just don't know any better. It's up to us to help keep them safe.

Electrical cords and plugs should be checked periodically to ensure that they are not damaged. Damaged wiring is a potential shock and fire hazard. Electrical cords should never be run across walkways (including under rugs) or through doorways (where they can be pinched). Damaged cords and plugs should be taken out of use immediately

upon detection and remain out of use until properly repaired. An extension cord can cause reverse polarity and therefore should not be used as a permanent power source. It is best to relocate furnishings and appliances to eliminate the need for extension cords and to prevent damage to other power cords. And, remember, read the product information for safe use before plugging in any electrical appliance for the first time.

The majority of the accidents around the kitchen involve burns or scalds. When using the stove keep the pot handles turned away from the front of the unit so that a child's hand cannot grab the hot handle and spill the contents of the pan on himself. Care must also be taken with the microwave ovens now so popular. Several area children have been burned by spilling hot liquids all over themselves while trying to take items from the oven. The containers are usually not hot, but anything in them is.

Eliminating potential safety hazards in your home today can help to ensure happiness in your home tomorrow . . . and, perhaps, for a lifetime.

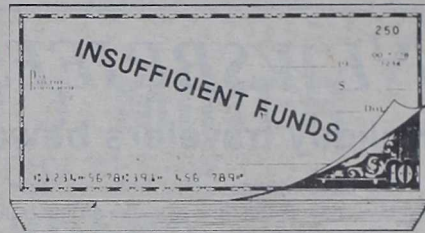

- FIRST BAD CHECK:** (IF NOT REDEEMED WITHIN 7 DAYS)
RESULTS: 6 MONTHS SUSPENSION OF PRIVILEGES COMMENCING THE DATE YOU REDEEM THE BAD CHECK.
 A 1 YEAR PROBATIONARY PERIOD WILL COMMENCE THE DATE YOUR SUSPENSION TERMINATES.
- SECOND BAD CHECK:** (Occurs during your probationary period)

Section 14-100 Obtaining Property by False Pretense (Felony)

If there is an indication of the intent to defraud, you could be charged with the felony offense. The maximum possible penalty for each separate check if charged as a felony is:
 "Imprisonment for 10 years, a fine in an amount set by the judge and restitution to the victim for the amount of the check."

OTHER PENALTIES

SERVICE RECORD BOOK/FITNESS REPORT ENTRY:

Writing bad checks could result in you receiving a derogatory page 11 entry. Additionally, remarks could be reflected in the Marine's fitness report.

PUNISHMENT UNDER THE UNIFORM CODE OF MILITARY JUSTICE (UCMJ).

This offense could be referred to nonjudicial punishment or to a court-martial. The maximum possible punishment under the UCMJ for each separate check is:

Check of a value of \$100 or less: Bad-conduct discharge, confinement for six months, forfeiture of all pay and allowances, and reduction to E-1.

Check of a value of more than \$100: Dishonorable discharge, confinement for five years, forfeiture of all pay and allowances, and reduction to E-1.

PUNISHMENT FOR WORTHLESS CHECK OFFENSES UNDER NORTH CAROLINA LAW.

This is a misdemeanor offense. The maximum possible punishment for EACH separate check is:

Checks of a value of \$50 or less: Imprisonment for 30 days or a fine of \$50, plus restitution to the victim for the amount of the check.

Checks of a value in excess of \$50: Imprisonment for six months, a fine of \$500 and restitution to the victim for the amount of the check.

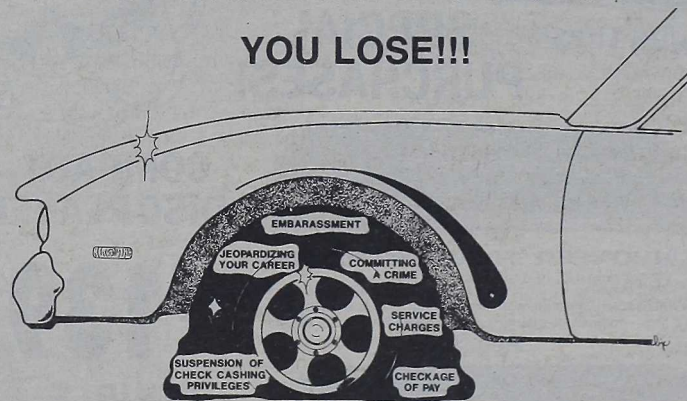
Checks drawn on a fictitious account: Imprisonment for two years, a fine of \$1,000 and restitution to the victim for the amount of the check.

T-shirt exchange halted

Military Clothing Sales stores and other retail outlets will no longer accept exchanges of green undershirts because of fading or discoloring, according to a recent Headquarters, Marine Corps, message.

The shirts, worn with the camouflage utility uniform, were being accepted for exchange during 1985 while Defense Personnel Support Center (DPSC) personnel inspected materials and procedures used by

manufacturers. The shirts were found to meet all longevity requirements. The fading or discoloration alone will not make an undershirt unserviceable, according to ALMAR 291-86.

Improper laundering and use of oxidizing agents have been tabbed as the biggest causes of fading/discoloration. The message said that, while there is no way to prevent eventual fading, there are ways to prevent premature discoloration or fading.

Future DPSC system green undershirts will include a sewn label which lists recommended laundering procedures. Among those are not allowing the green undershirts to come in contact with oxidizing agents, not using bleach or detergents with bleaching agents, using permanent press cycle for laundering or hand wash in either cold or warm water and tumble dry using the permanent press cycle or drip dry on a rust-proof hanger (out of the sun's direct light).

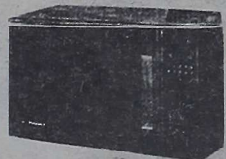

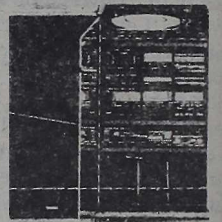

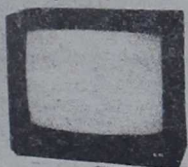

MAGTF exercises show off Corps' strength, abilities

Short of a major conflict, where can representatives of all major offensive elements and support organizations within the II Marine Amphibious Force be seen at one time?

The answer: A Marine Air Ground Task Force exercise.

Because of its location and facilities, Landing Zone Bluebird aboard Camp Lejeune allows guests to easily view a full-scale MAGTF operation. About six such operations are conducted each year.

MAGTF's are Marine combat organizations. They are combined arms forces consisting of ground, air and combat service support forces, all under the direction of a single commander. Taking maximum advantage of the combat potential inherent in a closely integrated air-ground team, MAGTF's can deploy by sea lift, airlift or both.

The largest and most powerful MAGTF is the Marine Amphibious Force. Active Marine Corps forces are organized into three MAFs, two in the Pacific Command and one in the Atlantic Command. II MAF, the Atlantic Command, has a nucleus headquartered at Camp Lejeune.

A MAF is normally built around a division, an aircraft wing and a force service support group. It is capable of numerous amphibious and subsequent operations ashore.

The MAGTF exercise demonstrates the combat capabilities of the MAF.

"Individual riflemen, AAVs, LAVs, tanks, howitzers and aircraft, including the AV8-B Harrier jet . . . they can all be seen at a MAGTF exercise," said Major P. R. Ottinger, assistant plans officer, 2d Marine Division. "The MAGTF exercise demonstrates all elements of II MAF combat power.

A MAGTF exercise was staged for the North NATO Defense College's visit to Lejeune," Ottinger said. "It provided them with the opportunity to get a better understanding of the Marine Corps' combat capabilities, in one place and at the same time.

"Most guests who have seen the exercise are surprised that the Marine Corps has such a variety of equipment and capabilities. The relationship between the air-ground element is particularly close and unique in the Marine Corps. This was certainly evident during this MAGTF exercise," Ottinger said.

Lyman road landings leave no room for errors

Practicing touch-and-go maneuvers on a road at Camp Lejeune may not sound too exciting. But for a Bronco pilot, road operations such as the recent one at Lyman Road, are the ultimate thrill in flying.

"Road ops may not sound exciting, but until you've tried to land a plane between trees 100-feet high on a road that has only four feet of clearance on either side of the wheels, you don't know what exciting is," said Captain R. Broschart, the aviation maintenance officer for Marine Observation Squadron (VMO)-1, home-based at

Marine Corps Air Station, New River. "When you're trying to stop in a matter of 1,000 feet, that's when the palms of your hands start to sweat. It's the ultimate in precision flying."

Broschart said road ops demand complete concentration. For example, when the OV-10 is landing on a road that is surrounded by trees the wind can cause the aircraft to "stagger." This is a crucial point in flight, because the plane is beginning its descent in the short take-off and landing (STOL) configuration.

"We're flying a few knots greater than our STOL speed, which means there's only enough airspeed to keep the aircraft flying," Broschart said. "All our numbers have to be exact. We have a center line, a spot to hit and there's absolutely no room for error. The slightest miscalculation could mean disaster."

"On the average runway, which is usually about 150 feet wide and 5,000 feet long, there's a certain amount of leeway for landing," he said. "However, when you're landing on a road, there's only about one foot of clearance from the wings to the edge of the road. The length of the road is another factor, since you only have 1,000 feet in which to land. If you don't hit your mark (the center line) or if you run out of road, you could end up in the trees."

Running out of room on Lyman Road might have been dangerous for the pilots, but if the road ops were taking place during an actual combat situation, an unsuccessful take-off or landing could mean the failure of an important mission involving an entire unit.

"The OV-10 is the first one up and the last one back on the deck," said Captain W. G. Labutta, VMO-1's quality assurance officer. "We have to be able to respond in a moment's notice to meet the needs of the Marines on the ground. The Lyman Road ops were a classic example of the OV-10's ability to interface with the ground units and provide a quick response. Whether we're conducting operations from a road, an expeditionary air field or off a ship, our motto is 'We deliver,' and that's exactly what we're trained to do."

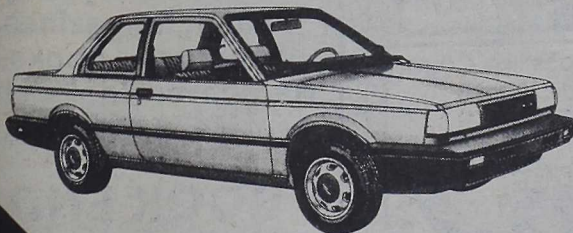



A few of the Proud

Servicemembers test for Connecticut police academy

The Marine Corps is not the only organization looking for a "few good men."

The Connecticut State Police spoke to a separation group of approximately 40 Marines, Dec. 11 at the Base Theater in Meriden, Conn., of individuals who are a cut above the rest.

"We're not here to take Marines away from the Corps, but to recruit Marines who have decided not to reenlist. This helps the Connecticut State Police Department as well as the Corps," said recruiter Lieutenant John Dewey.

According to Dewey, the department is involved in its biggest recruiting pro-

gram ever.

"Due to an authorization by Governor William A. O'Neil, we need to increase our ranks by 20 percent which means an addition of 380 troopers," he said. "Our program included running advertisements in the Army, Navy and Air Force Times, as well as 20 major base newspapers such as the *Globe*."

Dewey said the greatest response came from Marines at Camp Lejeune and Yuma, Ariz. As a result, invitations were sent to applicants in the Carolinas and Georgia to take the first of a five-phase test at Camp Lejeune. The same test will be given again January 10 in Connecticut, but the people who took it here today sav-

ed themselves a lot of travel time, Dewey said.

Dewey, a former Marine reservist and now an Army reservist, noted the advantages a Marine has because of military experience.

"Marines are already subjected to the regimentation, obedience to orders and rigorous training which makes them better prepared for stressful situations that come with being a policeman." He also pointed out that since Marines have had extensive weapons and hand-to-hand combat training they will be able to spend more time on the academics at the academy.

"There are quite a few prior military in the department now, but the former

Marines are more vocal than the others. Even our current commanding officer, Colonel Lester J. Forst, is a former Marine," Dewey said.

Although military experience is an advantage for applicants, candidates must meet the stringent requirements set as guidelines by the Connecticut State Police.

Candidates first take the written exam which was given here. The questions are used to assess the ability to observe and remember details, analyze facts and make logical decisions.

Phase two is a physical assessment, similar to the Marine Corps' physical fitness test. "Ours should be no problem for any Marine," said Dewey.

Applicants are then interviewed by a panel of State Police Officers in order to measure judgement, motivation, ability to deal with the public and oral communication. Writing samples are also required and evaluated for written communication ability.

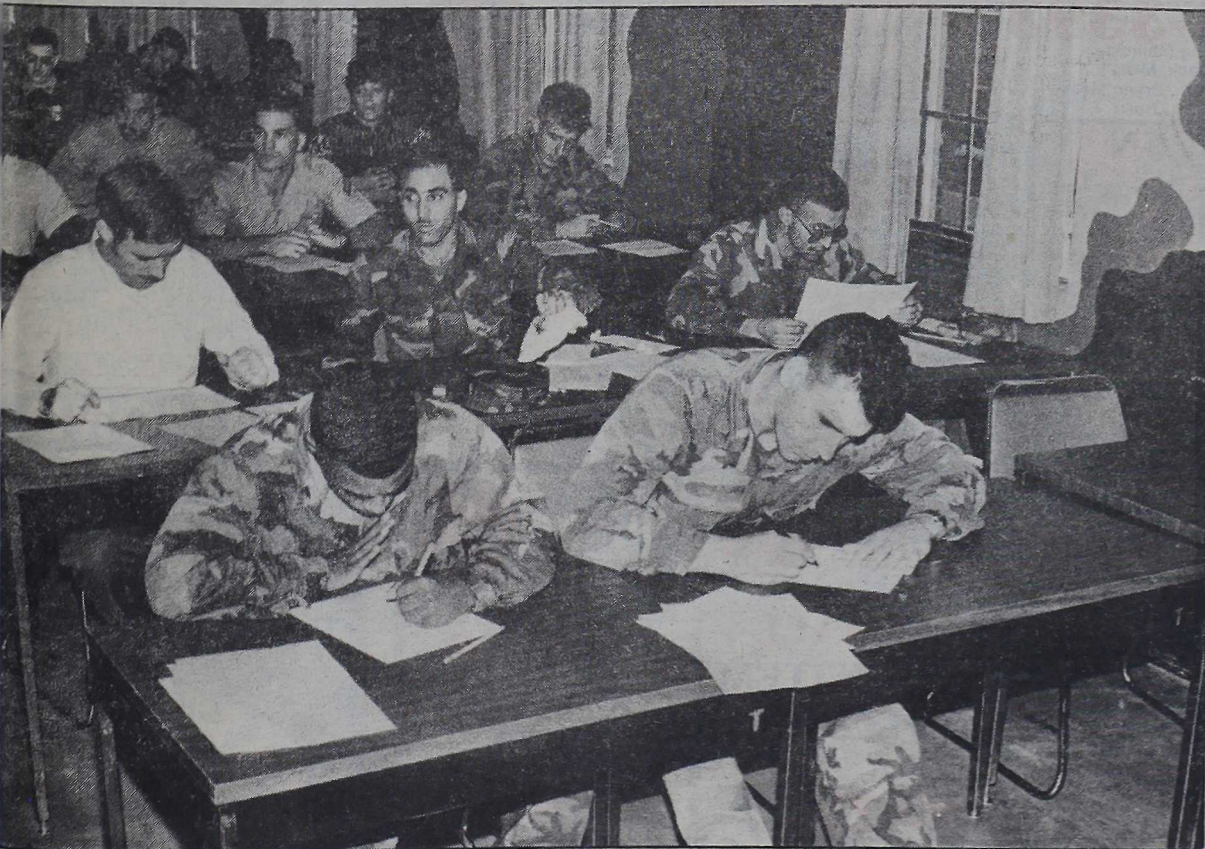
"The fourth phase consists of a thorough background investigation, and a polygraph examination. Here we determine work records and a person's moral character," said Dewey.

The final phase before entering the academy is the medical exam. All candidates must meet the minimum acceptable standards to include eyes, ears, blood, heart and other tests.

"If you are selected as a State Police Trooper Trainee, you will enter the physically and mentally demanding six-month-long State Police Academy in Meriden, Conn. After graduation from the program, Trooper Trainees are assigned to one of the 12 State Police troops throughout the state for a probationary period and on-the-job training," Dewey told the separation group.

"Because of the great response and cooperation we had here at Camp Lejeune, our goal is to try and come back to speak at every separation briefing," said Dewey.

According to Karen Duffey Wallace, head monitor of the Department of Administrative Services with the Connecticut State Police, approximately 110 applicants were present to take part in the first phase testing.

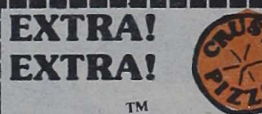

'Dragon wagon' impressive during CAO-87

The Marines' new Logistics Vehicle System broke new ground and gained approval for its performance during its first use in a field exercise, the 6th Marine Amphibious Brigade's Combined Arms Operation-87.

Known as the "dragon wagon," the LVS is used for hauling supplies and equipment. Basically a logistics vehicle, it's designed to replace the five and 10-ton tractor trailers, forklifts and wreckers in the field environment. And it's earning the

acceptance of the Marines who'll use it in combat.

"I'm impressed with it," said 2nd Lieutenant Steven Squires, LVS officer for Brigade Service Support Group-6. "This is the first time it's been used in an exercise and it's doing well. It replaces almost everything we have now."

According to Squires, instead of two or three vehicles for one job, one LVS can do it all.

"It has its own crane so it doesn't need

to wait on a forklift to unload it. A two-man crew can do it all alone," he said.

Putting it through its paces during a routine supply delivery, one of the drivers proved the vehicle was as maneuverable as any small four-wheeler.

"That's what's great about this thing," said Lance Corporal Joseph Lane, BSSG-6 LVS operator. "It'll go almost anywhere. A tractor-trailer would've been stuck already trying to get in and out of places I've had to deliver to."

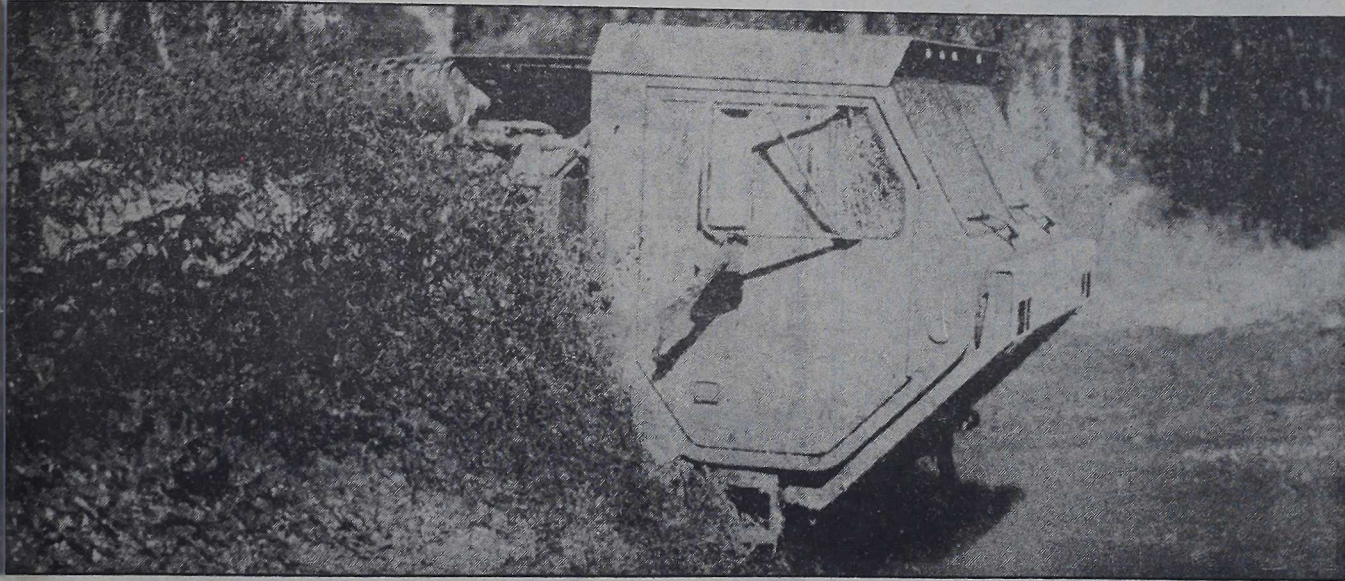
With a 32-degree turning radius, the

LVS is better turning corners in tight spaces than a lot of small cars.

"It can't jackknife because the whole truck turns, not just the front wheels," said Lane. "If it gets stuck, all eight wheels can eventually work themselves free to pull the vehicle out."

That's because each wheel is independently driven. If one is stuck, all others continue to pull.

"The real test is combat," said Squires. "It'll make it much easier to get supplies to the battle zone, and without logistics, you can't win a war."

"I never got hurt on any of my jumps," said Horzempa. "I did break my leg once, but that was during mountain leaders school, not parachuting."

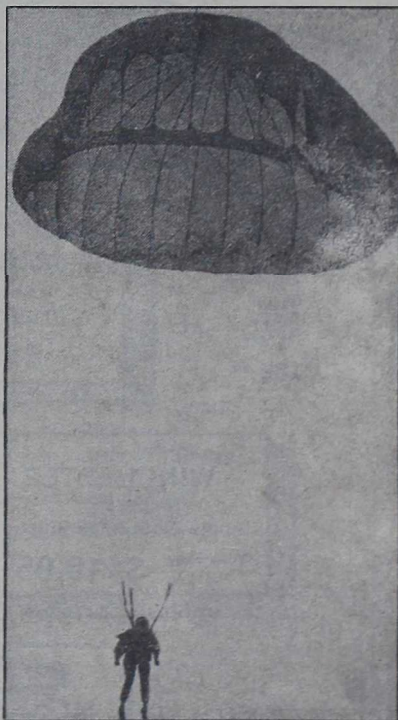
Of Horzempa's 100 jumps, approximately 80 of them have been made while stationed with ANGLICO.

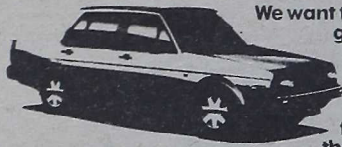
within ANGLICO in the field and prepare them for jump school."

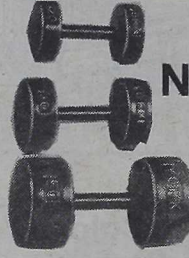

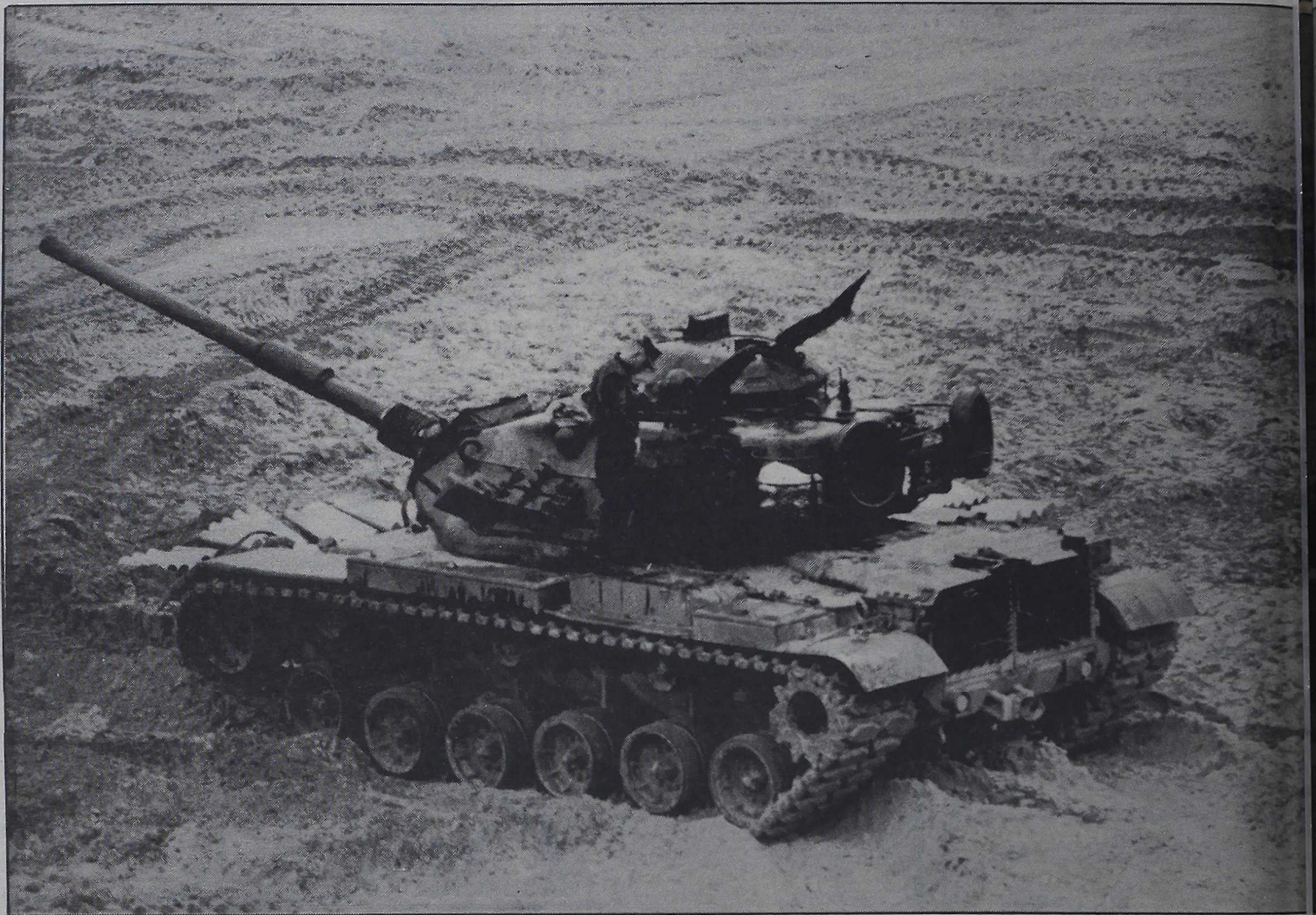

Engage targets!

The words came over the radio from the tower and the tank began to charge through the mud. A target popped up downrange, the gunner took aim and put steel on target with the 105mm main cannon.

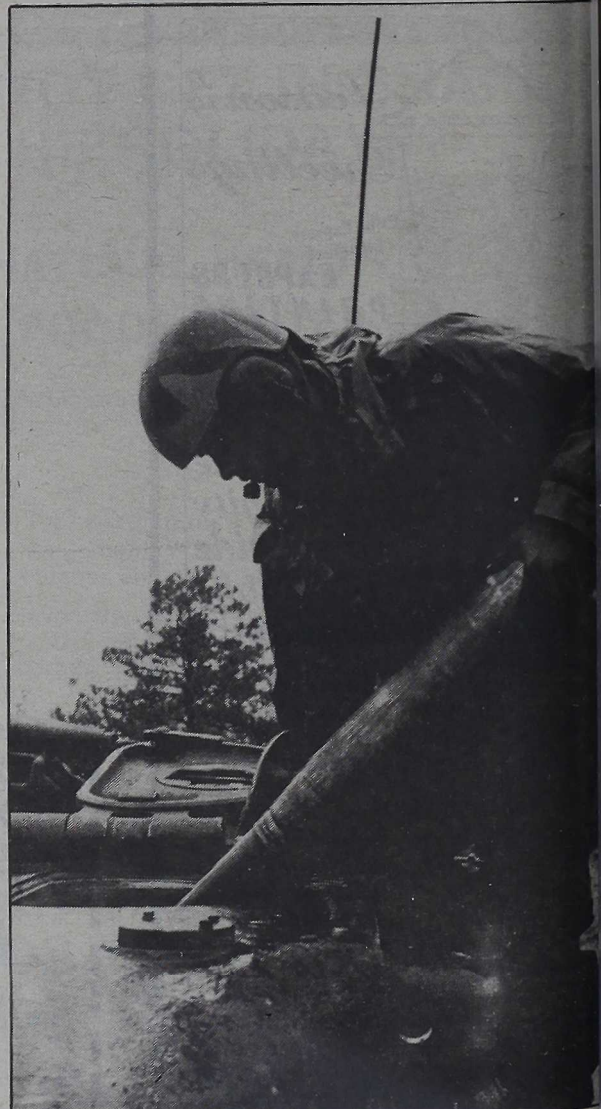
This was the scene at the G-6 Tank Gunnery Range when Delta Tracks Company, 2d Tank Battalion, 2d Marine Division participated in Tank Gunnery Table 7 Alpha training recently.

"The tank goes through the course, and when they see the target they have to decide what weapon to use and engage ASAP," said First Lieutenant W. B. Porter, Delta Tracks Executive Officer. "The M60-E2 7.62mm machine gun should be used to engage the enemy troop targets and the 105mm main cannon

should be used on the Soviet vehicles and tanks. The purpose of this training is to put steel on target in one round in a matter of seconds."

The tankers went through the course in preparation for upcoming Combined Arms Exercise 3-87.

"We've been out here in the field for a week going through the course and participating in this training," said Lance Corporal Jesus M. Curbelo, tank driver. "We're learning how to fire buttoned up, which means with the hatches closed. When the tank is buttoned up, it's a lot more difficult to fire and drive. You have limited visibility through three little periscopes. We're also brushing up on working as a team on our fire commands. We will be going on CAX soon, and are gearing up for that. This is a very good course to fire on."

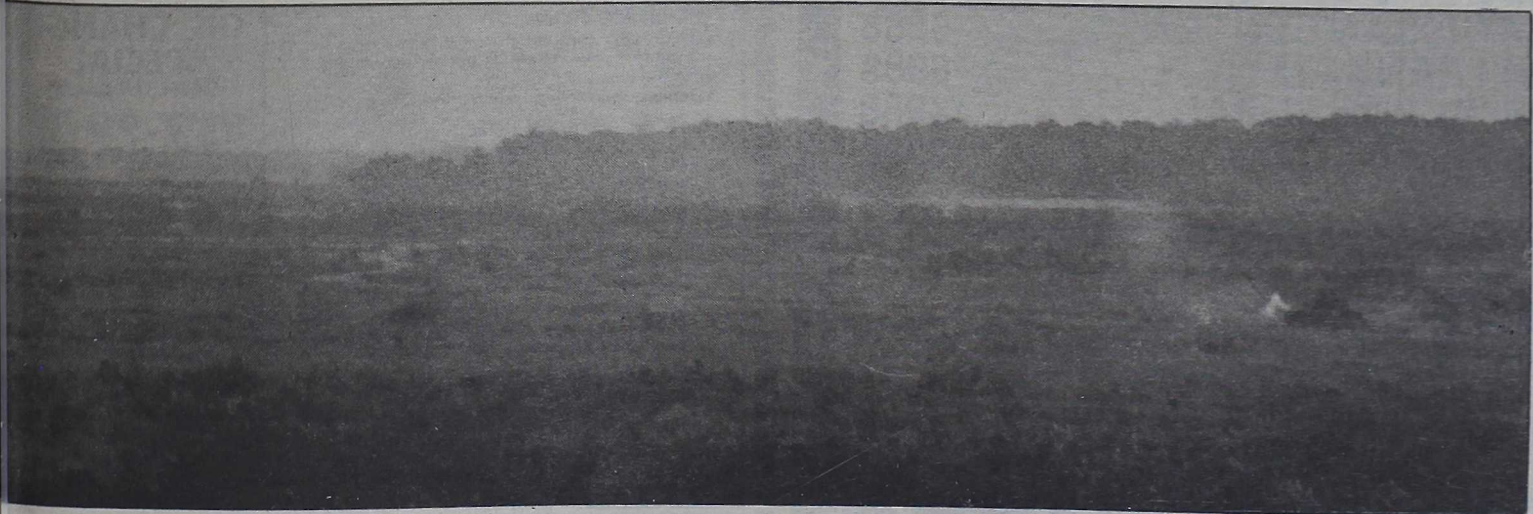


Lance Corporal Jesus M. Curbelo, tank driver, hands a 105mm round down to another tanker inside the tank. (Photo by Vaughan)

Unsung heroes tell story as defensive men prevail

Many times the defensive story in a football game goes untold. The defense is the unsung hero in a battle of the trenches. Without them the game's final score could be as high as a basketball game.

"The defense is a separate aspect of the game. They are responsible for the opposing offense's progress. These men present the untold story of football," said Lejeune All-Star Linebacker, Alan Harris, 3rd Battalion, 2d Marines, 2d Marine Division.

To understand the defense and their roles, one needs to first understand the different positions and the responsibilities of each.

TACKLE—(All-Star average size: 6'2", 220 pounds.)

"The responsibility of a tackle is to plug up the play and control the inside by stopping the run and pushing the play to the outside," said All-Star tackle Bernard Baldwin, 8th Motor Transport Battalion, Force Service Support Group.

DEFENSIVE END—(All-Star average size: 6'4", 230 pounds.)

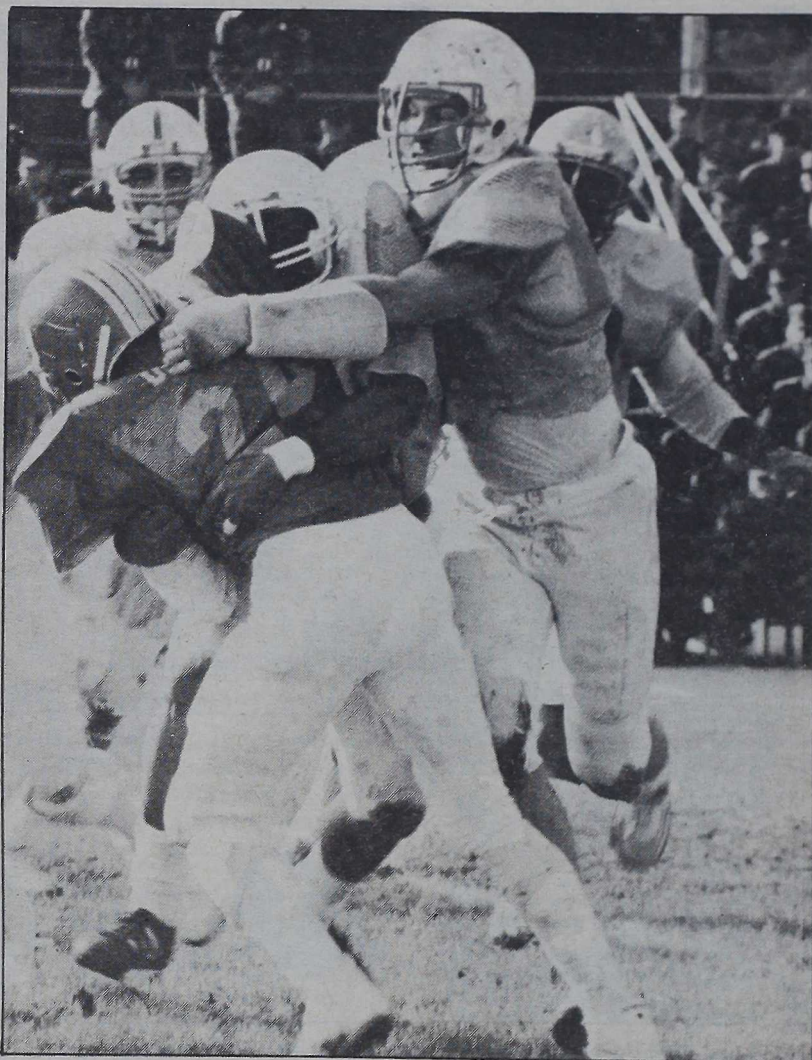
"The main role of an end is to contain the receivers and prevent the option play and sweeps. At the same time, pressure must always be kept on the quarterback. If the quarterback gets too much time in the pocket, he'll kill you in the air," said All-Star end Marvin McCann, 3rd Battalion, 10th Marines, 2d MarDiv.

LINEBACKER—(All-Star average size: 6', 200 pounds.)

"The outside linebacker defends against the wide runs and sweeps. On the pass, he covers the outside flanks or flats. On the other hand, the inside linebacker protects against the inside runs and then drops back to the center to cover the pass," said Lejeune All-Star linebacker, Patrick Hanes, 2d Supply Battalion, 2d FSSG.

DEFENSIVE BACK—(All-Star average size: 6'3", 210 pounds.)

"A defensive back plays deeper than the deepest and wider than the widest,"

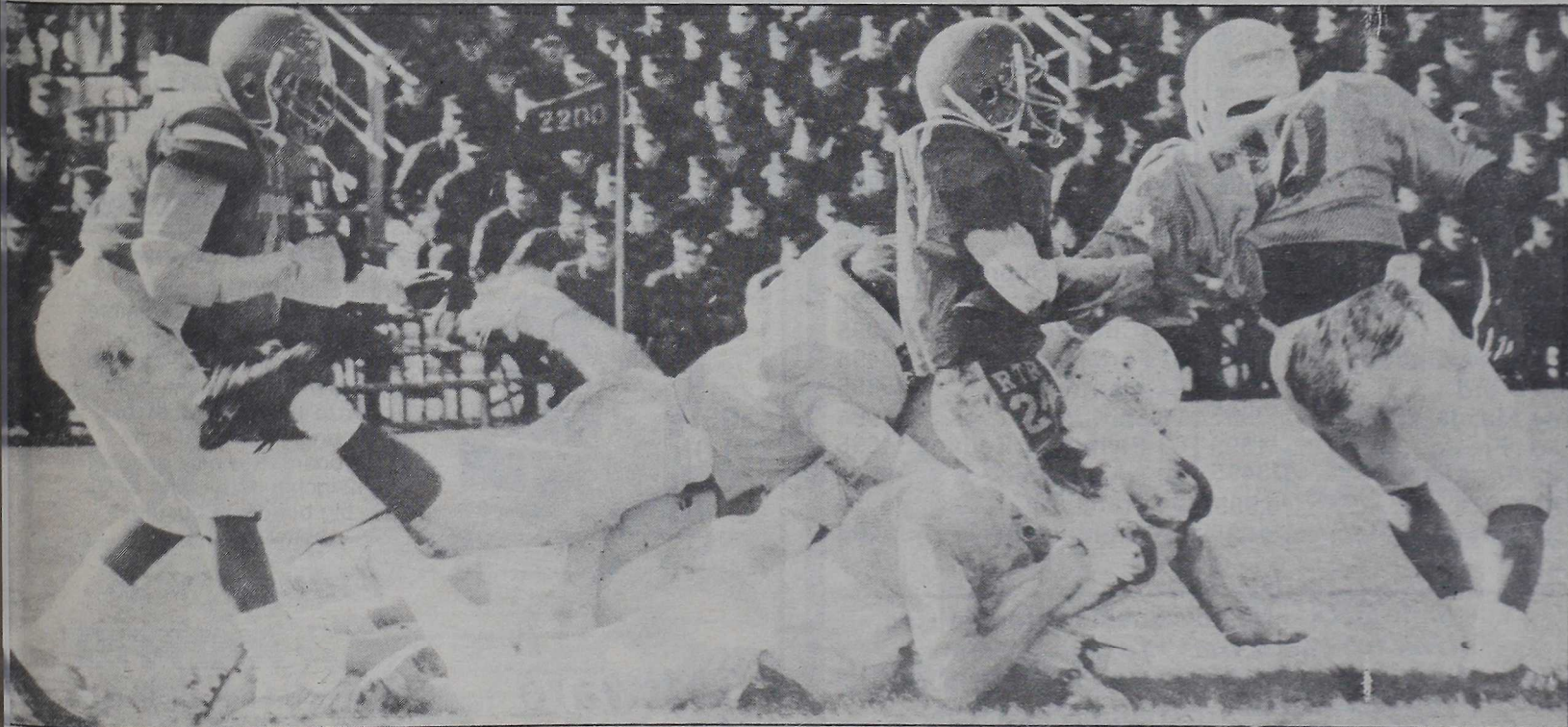
said All-Star Michael Richardson, 8th Communications Battalion, 2d FSSG. "When the play starts, the back is looking at the quarterback. He then checks the wide receivers and continues to fall back into his zone coverage."

Every position and responsibility is necessary to run an effective defense. The offense would never get the ball to score without the intense display of battling

strength found only in the trenches of the unsung heroes—the defense.

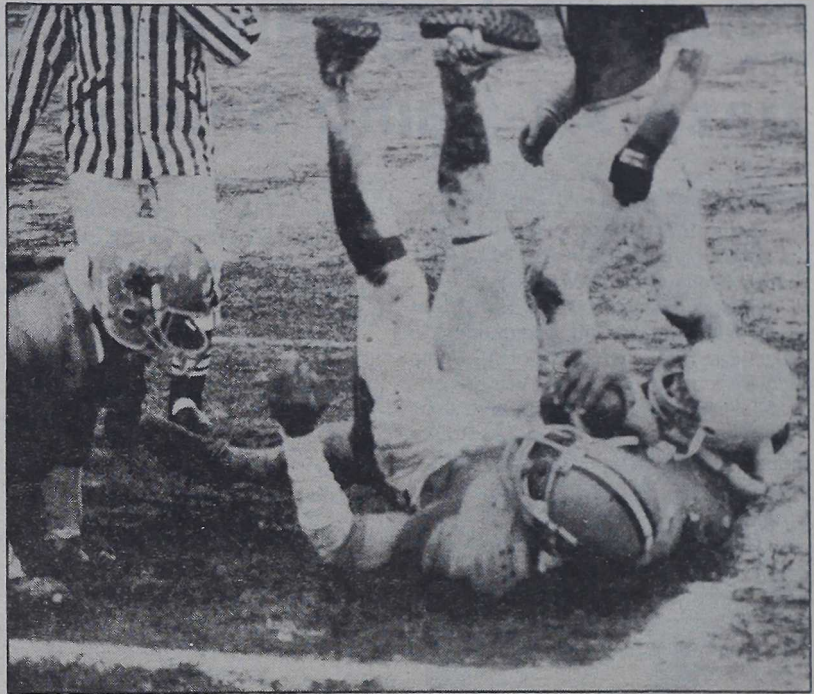

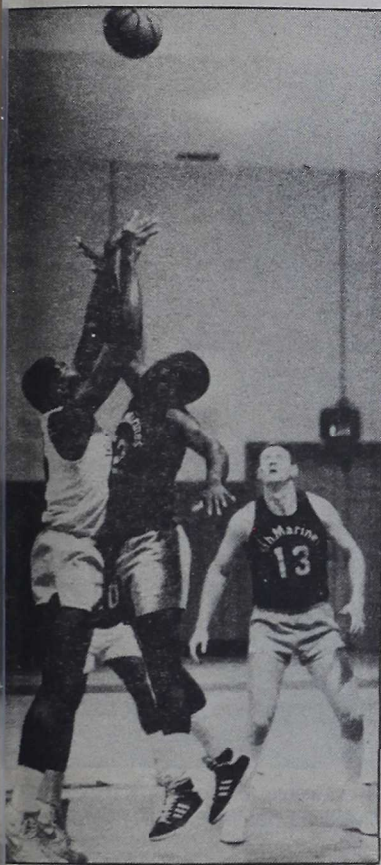

Surfer conquers Nature's wave

Camp Lejeune may not seem like the ideal spot for surfing, but according to five-time All-Service Surfing champion, Kelley Rhode, Regional Automated Services Center, Marine Corps Base, the smaller waves require a more experienced surfer.

"The surfers here at Camp Lejeune are much better than many of the Hawaiian surfers. It is more difficult to ride the smaller waves," said 35-year-old Rhode.

He began surfing along the shore of Oahu, Hawaii back in the mid-60s when he moved to the islands with his father, retired Air force Colonel Storm E. Rhode.

"I was the youngest son of a seven-child family. Adapting to new surroundings meant learning how to surf," said Rhode.

Rhode's philosophy focuses on the idea of controlling Mother Nature by capturing the waves.

"It's a beautiful experience when you can actually feel the curve and power of the wave; capture it and control it. It's an inseparable marriage of technique and awesome force," said Rhode.

Recent Rhode victories include a first place finish in the Longboard and Masters Division in the 1985 Hawaii Military Championships. At Camp Lejeune he captured first in the 1986 Beach Bash Longboard Competition. This year in the Central North Carolina Contest in Atlantic Beach, he placed third overall and first in the Longboard. He also took the Masters Championship in Myrtle Beach Dec. 14.

"When you catch a good wave, it's a

feeling like climbing Mount Everest. It's just fantastic," said Rhode.

Rhode has surfed on such renowned teams as the Town and Country Surf Shop Corporation in Pearl City, Hawaii; Surf City Surf Shop in Myrtle Beach, S.C.; Makaha Surf Team in Makaha Beach, Hawaii; and the Honolulu Longboard Surfing Association team.

When Rhode is not surfing he enjoys scuba diving and sky diving. He was featured as a Marine scuba diver on the Marine poster below.

"Surfing is an art. It becomes a part of you and you become a part of it. You have to understand that before you start to challenge Mother Nature and her surf," Rhode said.
