New year begins for Lejeune students

Seven dependents' schools at Camp Lejeune welcomed about 3,900 school-aged children Sept. 2 for the first day of the 1986-87 school year.

Military police crossing guards manned several crosswalks near the schools and cautioned Camp Lejeune motorists to be especially watchful in housing areas because of increased foot traffic near roadways.

Late registration is open for students at each school's administration office. Birth certificates and immunization records are required for registration in any of the 13 grades.

While students attending Camp Lejeune Dependents' Schools (CLDS) won't notice any changes from the outside, what is presented inside promises a sound education for kindergartners through high school seniors. All CLDS teachers will have completed a 30-hour Effective Teacher Training Program, designed to help teachers improve their teaching skills, according to personnel director, Dr. Wesley Guthrie.

The schools, Lejeune High School, Brewster Junior High School, Berkeley Manor Elementary School, Stone Street Elementary School, Tarawa Terrace I Primary School, Tarawa Terrace II Middle School and Delalio Elementary School, are open to military dependents whose parent/sponsor live in base housing or have a promise of living in base housing within the next 90 days.

Youngsters who will be 5 years old by Oct. 15 are eligible to begin kindergarten in a CLDS school.

The schools offer varied programs, ranging from those for the handicapped to specialized course offerings for the academically gifted. Whether a child has a visual, hearing or speech impairment, a learning disability, is mentally handicapped or is orthopedically impaired, the CLDS has a program to fit his/her needs, said CLDS psychologist Jeanne Darling.

Regular classroom teachers at the elementary school level will, on the average, instruct about 26 students. At the high school level that ratio decreases to about 19 students for every teacher.

"The student-teacher ratios are hard to judge when special learning programs (such as for the handicapped or learning impaired) are included in the figures and because enrollment figures are not yet complete. The district is required by law to limit the number of students in some specialized classes," said Dr. Duane Linker, associate superintendent.

Also working behind the scenes, but toward an improved education for military dependents here, is the school district's comparison of its curriculum with the North Carolina Competency Based Curriculum.

"This comparison isn't going to change our curriculum," said Laurie Tisdale, the district's language arts, social studies and fine arts coordinator. "We're just taking a look at what the state of North Carolina requires of its schools, and what we're finding is that our curriculum surpasses its requirements in many areas."

Out of the administration building and the classrooms, students can enjoy wholesome, healthy lunches at each school's cafeteria. Elementary school students can expect to pay 90 cents per lunch, 40 cents for reduced-lunch prices and some students may be eligible for the free school lunch program. Lejeune High's lunches cost 95 cents and 40 cents for the reduced price lunch. Adults eating in the cafeteria will pay \$1.40.

If the afternoon's palate calls for something a bit lighter, Brewster Junior High and LHS students have an alternative salad bar available at the same lunch price.

Parents are encouraged to participate in the child's education by either volunteering time at the school or by attending the local Parent-Teacher Organization meetings (four times yearly).

Patients are prime concern at Naval Hospital

Making the best medical care available to as many patients as possible is a high priority for Navy Captain Robert A. Margulies, Commanding Officer of the Naval Hospital.

"We don't wish to turn anyone away," Margulies said. "I have very strong feelings about that."

"I come to this hospital command from an operational background," he said. "I believe that our hospitals exist to serve the operating forces. Part of that service includes the psychological benefit of knowing that a family left behind (while a Marine or sailor is deployed) is cared for; and the psychological benefit of knowing that, when their active duty career is over, care will be there."

Margulies, a native of Bayonne, N.J., assumed command of the hospital in June. He has served in the Navy Medical Corps since 1968. He came to Camp Lejeune from Beaufort, S.C., where he served as Executive Officer of the Naval Hospital.

Margulies said allowing patients access to "the front office" is an important priority. During regular working hours the clinic and Command Patient Contact Representatives are available for help.

After normal working hours, the Officer of the Day is the Patient Contact Representative.

In addition, the hospital will hold monthly public seminars open to all eligible beneficiaries.

The first seminar will be held Sept. 11 at 1:30 p.m. in the Base Theater. Other seminars are set for Oct. 9 and Nov. 13. The hospital's Health Care Consumers' Advisory Council will also meet monthly, instead of quarterly. "Three months is too long a time between meetings of this nature," Margulies said. "That allows too many problems to fester. People need the opportunity to ask questions and get answers."

Margulies said one of the hospital's major problems has been too few doctors carrying too heavy a load.

"Our circumstances have changed and the population has changed," he said. "The number of retirees has increased from about 300,000 to 1.5 million in the last 25 years. We can't care for five times as many people in a given category without increased resources. It's just that simple."

"The shortage is a long-term problem," he continued. "Most of the projected growth in the medical depart-

ment has been eliminated by the Gramm-Rudman budget cuts. We don't see any short-term relief."

One solution to the hospital overload has been the plan for a NAVCARE clinic, scheduled to open in Jacksonville later this year. Until then, the hospital will continue to do everything it can to care for all patients, Margulies said.

"We still have responsibility for young families who can't afford CHAMPUS supplemental insurance and for older folks who can't get it because of pre-existing conditions," he said. "They are the ones who are badly hurt by our inability to provide the total care they desire and deserve."

"We don't have the answers to all the problems, but I repeat and emphasize that there is a great deal of medical care available here," he said. "We will make it available to everyone we can."

Margulies urged anyone who has become disillusioned over long waits or doctor shortages to try to be understanding.

"Our staff is badly overworked," he said. "We're trying to do something about that, but it's hard to do anything without reducing care. Sometimes the doctors and corpsmen are tired, and maybe they're not

as nice as they ordinarily are. When we learn about such an incident, we will use it as a teaching tool for the people involved.

"If someone has had a bad experience, I don't want them to quit trying," he said. "But they shouldn't come in here angry. They should come in understanding we're here to try to help. We are the closest thing to their family doctor. We don't want them to cut themselves off from their health care system."

HEALTHWATCH Lawnmower Safety

Did you know that the tip of a rotary lawn mower blade can move up to speeds of 200 miles per hour? At these speeds it not only can easily cut your grass, but also shear through fingers and toes and throw rocks with enough force to knock out windows and put out an eye. The Consumer Product Safety Commission reports that about 57,000 people are treated in hospital emergency rooms annually for mower-related injuries, many of which are due to simple carelessness. Most of the injuries occur when the safety features and precautions designed to be utilized when mowing have been disabled or bypassed. Most of these tips will only take a few moments of time, but will save valuable fingers and toes as well as the people around you.

Before mowing:

Wear close-fitting clothes which are not as likely to flap in the breeze and some sturdy, non-slip shoes. If you have safety-toe shoes and long pants, wear them.

Walk over your lawn carefully looking for loose objects such as stones, toys, wire, or any other objects which might be thrown through the lawn mower chute.

Adjust the cutting height on the mower before starting it.

If you have a grass-catcher for the mower, go ahead and use it. If not,

make sure the deflector shield is in place. Never remove the rear safety shield at the base of the lawn mower housing.

Use extra care when using an electric mower; don't cut grass when it's wet and be sure to use a good, grounded three-prong cord.

While mowing:

Start the mower near where you're going to cut grass. Do not try to run a mower over gravel, stones, or sidewalk edges.

Always push the lawnmower; never try to pull it. If your foot slips it is likely to slide into the path of the blade.

Push mowers across the slope of the lawn. Ride a mower up or down the slope.

Keep fingers and toes away from the blade housing and the discharge chute.

If you have to walk away from the mower for any reason, shut it off.

Other reminders:

Before working on the mower, disconnect the spark plug or the power cord.

Gasoline creates a highly explosive vapor. Treat it with the respect it deserves. Pour gasoline outdoors in well-ventilated areas and store it in approved safety containers away from sparks, flames, and other ignition sources.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Recently, my husband and I attended the Morris Day Concert at the Field House. One of the base marquee advertised that the concert would commence at 8 p.m., at a cost of \$10 per ticket. I purchased my tickets, in advance, through the Base Special Services office and was informed that the doors would open at 7 p.m. for seating.

We arrived at approximately 6:45 p.m. and ended up standing in line for two hours. We were informed by Special Services representatives that the concert would commence at 8 p.m. as advertised. A large number of people, to include myself, requested a refund and were refused by the ticket agent.

During the two hour wait, people were refused access to the building to use the head facilities. This left the patron with the choice of either losing their place in line or "suffer."

There are three double door entrances to the building; when the doors opened at 9 p.m. only one side of the double door entrance was utilized. I was pushed towards the door by angry and agitated patrons. This could have resulted in serious personal injury and was a definite safety hazard.

The tickets advertised alcohol beverages were permitted. However, once inside the door, alcohol was immediately confiscated by Special Service representatives.

Once seated, instead of the concert commencing, we were "entertained" for the next hour by music played on a stereo. If I wanted to listen to the stereo, I would have stayed home and saved \$20.

The concert finally started at 10 p.m. and ended at 11 p.m. I will admit the concert was good. However, we were so

angry and frustrated from the long wait and rude treatment that it was difficult to relax and enjoy the concert.

Additionally, my babysitter was highly upset and worried because we were two hours late picking up our son. Not to mention the added two hours it cost me for the babysitter.

I have talked to a number of people who have attended concerts on base and my experience is not an isolated incident. I strongly feel that Special Services should apologize or justify to the public:

- * Why they would not refund our money.
- * Why the concert started two hours late.
- * Why only one entrance was used.
- * Why alcoholic beverages were confiscated at the door.
- * Why we were not permitted to use the head facilities when they forced us to wait outside for two hours.

I am requesting that the *Globe* contact Special Services and publish an article justifying the totally unprofessional manner in which this concert was managed. Without some form of justification I strongly believe that the ticket sales for any future concerts will be greatly hampered.

Special Services wishes to apologize to our patrons for any inconveniences caused by the manner in which the Morris Day concert was conducted. The delay in starting the concert was caused by problems between the production company and the entertainer. We acknowledge the event was less than satisfactory. This was an exception to the way we normally operate. We are committed to providing quality service and appreciate your continued support.

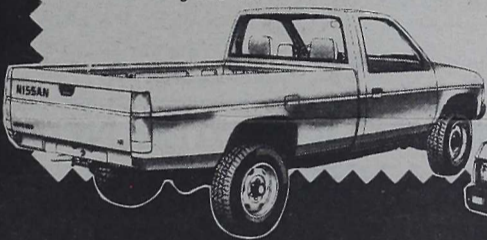

Engineers blow bridges, make routes for Marines

Sylvester Stallone has done it. Chuck Norris has done it. Even the late, great John Wayne has done it.

They've all had their share of blowing up bridges in the movies, and the explosive impact of demolishing a bridge has always captured the viewer's eye.

Marines from Charlie Company, 2d Combat Engineers, 2d Marine Division take their bridge demolition seriously, though—the explosives are real.

"An engineer recon is more technically oriented as the information they need does not deal so much with the enemy," said First Lieutenant Robert E. Joyce, G-4 range officer, 2d Combat Engineers. "We want to find out the widths of roads and see how much traffic the road has, and find out about things that may not pertain to the average grunt."

Besides blowing up designated bridges, combat engineers also must find other alternative routes for crossing a river or gap. The engineers must maneuver to their objective in the same way as a regular infantry unit moves.

With a small security team leading the way the engineers recon the bridge. Once these measurements are taken and an actual scale picture of the bridge is drawn. This is all done to analyze the amount of explosives needed.

The explosives are not prepared at the bridge. The advance party returns to the bunker to make the final calculations for the C-4 charges and sticks of dynamite.

"Each squad packs out a basic load of explosives, just like each grunt carries his share of ammunition," said Joyce. "When a combat engineer squad goes out on an operation, each squad will get one-third the allotment. Each man will pack C-4. One may will carry caps and one may will carry explosives."

The engineers return again to the bridge and place the dynamite and charges at the prescribed areas. Once everyone is behind the bunker, it is a few seconds before the blast. The entire process, starting from the recon to the actual explosion, takes approximately one to three hours depending on the size of the bridge.

"Safety is always a factor on the range with the engineers," said Joyce. "We need to respect explosives because careless mistakes result in tragic deaths."

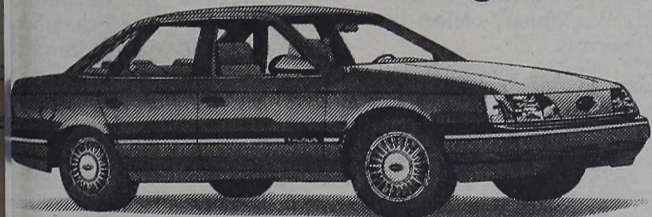

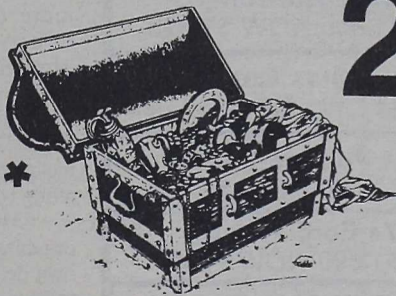

**Longshoremen learn
basic infantry skills**

Reserve Marines from Charleston, S.C. and Savannah, Ga., completed their annual two-week training here recently. More than one-third of "C" Company and 2d Beach and Port Company, 4th Landing Support Battalion, 4th Force Service Support Group attended the training.

"Our main priority is to qualify some of the Marines who have recently joined our companies in the longshoreman military occupational specialty," said Captain Louis W. Walter, officer-in-charge of the reservists.

The 77 reserve Marines received much more than training in their primary military occupational specialty though. The training syllabus they followed, set up for them by Camp Lejeune Marines from "B" Company, 2d Landing Support Battalion, 2d Force Service Support Group, included a variety of basic infantry skills along with primary MOS training.

"Although we are not a front-line organization, we are responsible for our own defense," Walter said. "It's essential to keep our Marines proficient in basic infantry skills."

Some of the classes and hands-on training included M-60 and M-2 .50 cal. machine gun classes, rear area defenses and camouflaged netting classes as well as classes on mine field clearing and barbed-wire entanglements.

"I've learned a lot about the M-60 and .50 cal. machine guns. I had never worked with either of those guns before," said Lance Corporal Winston G. Ammons, "C" Co., 4th LSB, Charleston. "If we're ever sent into a hot zone, it's good to

know how to shoot and keep the weapons running."

"I've learned more about clearing mine fields here," said Corporal John Fisher, also from Charleston's Company. "When I was stationed at Golf Company, 2/4, here, we were taught to probe for mines with our bayonets. I learned here that the Soviets use magnetic mines which would be set off by a bayonet."

Some of these "lucky" Marines went through the tear gas chamber. All of the 4th LSB Marines learned about their own jobs.

With support from helicopter unit Marine Corps Air Station, New River these reservists worked on their proficiency with Helicopter Support Team operations. For some of these Marines it was their first time to work with helicopters.

The HST exercises were done primarily at night, which gave reservists the valuable opportunity to work with helicopters under less-than-perfect conditions.

These Marines also worked on learning the techniques for marking a beach to direct traffic coming ashore, beach reconnaissance.

"We got into the finer aspects of the job, but the main thing I learned here was that I could easily have to fill the gaps of Marines' positions in time of war," said Lance Corporal Samuel Singleton, "C" Co., 4th LSB. "The Marines here explained to us the importance of teamwork in combat. Learning how to fire and maintain different weapons really helped me to be better overall as a Marine."

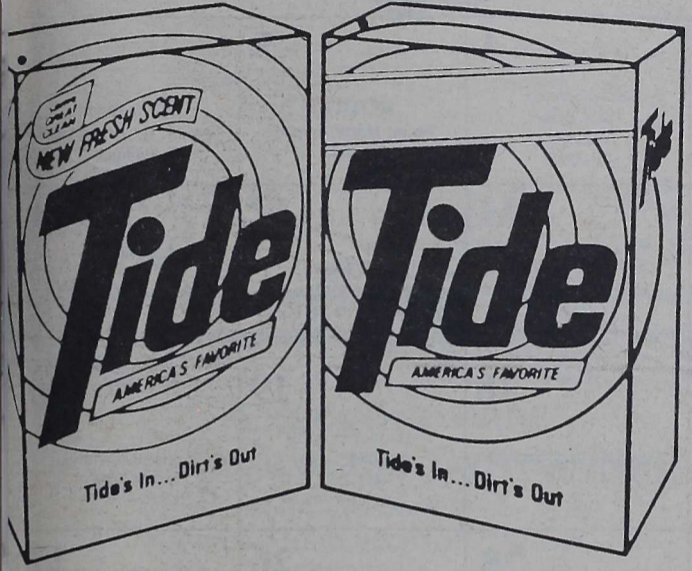

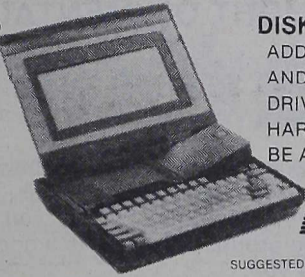

Veteran barber hangs up shears

Clipper cuts more than three million heads of military hair in career

When you step into his workspace, you won't see any notable works of art or other glamorous paraphernalia. After all, it's only a barber shop.

He greets everyone who comes into his one-chair shop so matter-of-factly that it seems as if he was expecting them. He says he likes it that way; he wants his customers to be relaxed when they sit in his place. Something between his manners and his quality hair cutting has kept his customers, including every Commandant of the Marine Corps since World War II, coming back.

For Mike, the barber shop on the left back corner of the quarterdeck of Bldg. 2 is his place. Leave your formalities at the door—he's Mike the Barber once inside.

He was born Michael S. Koncir, Oct. 2, 1921, in Allentown, Pa., the fourth of five sons. But for the past 40 years he's been affectionately known as Mike the Barber to anyone at Camp Lejeune.

"I guess barbering is just in my blood," he said. "My daddy barbered for 25 years."

His penchant for barbering started early. Even before he went to barber school in 1946, he was giving orange-crate haircuts to Camp Lejeune's Force Troops.

Mike served in the Corps during World War II. He said his family split up when his mother died Sept. 14, 1941—less than three months before the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor. One month later he was in boot camp at Parris Island, S.C.

"I went from Parris Island to the Philadelphia Navy Yard in 1941," he said. There he began his training as a "quartermaster," or supply man as we refer to them today.

In March 1942, he left Philadelphia for Quantico's Marine Corps Supply School. Six months later he was transferred to the Quartermaster School, Marine Barracks New River, N.C.

"I reported to Colonel Brewster who was the first commanding general here," he recalled.

After finishing quartermaster school in December, he reported to the Bldg. 1 purchasing office. He was invited to the home of Willie N. Henderson, one of his fellow Marines, for dinner on New Year's Day, 1943.

"I met my wife, Willie's daughter, there," he said. A twinkle came into his eye as he recalled their courtship. "By April we decided to get married. When I asked for permission to marry her, I was told I couldn't get married until I made sergeant."

Rules are rules, so Bertha H. Henderson and Mike had to wait until he made sergeant in October before they could become Mr. and Mrs. Koncir, Nov. 20, 1943.

"Father George Shay married us in the Francis Xavier, Catholic Chapel," Mike said. "It was the first wedding to be held there."

"She worked in the disbursing office in Bldg. 1, and I worked in the purchasing office. I used to joke that I did the buying and she did the paying."

Marrying a Marine has never been easy. Mrs. Koncir found that out Jan. 4, 1944, when Mike became part of the 5th Marine Division and headed for the Pacific.

He helped supply Marines fighting at Iwo Jima and elsewhere in the Pacific, he said. But, when his unit was sent to Japan to aid in the post-war occupation there, Mike returned to Camp Lejeune. He was discharged because of ulcers at the old Naval Hospital here on May 11, 1946.

His barbering started before he was discharged.

"Our old mess sergeant at Bldg. 12 used to stack orange crates into barber chairs and a buddy of mine and I used to give 50-cent haircuts to the Force Troops here," he reminisced. "We'd each cut 10 heads and take our money and go on liberty to Kinston."

After his discharge he got his master barber's license and came to work at the Naval Hospital. He began by cutting hair for the patients and staff. When Brigadier General L. F. Chapman, Force Troops Commanding General, took a liking to Mike's "shear" talents, Mike's fate was sealed.

In 1958, Mike received PCS orders from the Naval Hospital barber shop to the barber shop in Bldg. 2.

He's been there ever since. "I could go on for a week talking about stories and incidents that portray each general I've barbered for," he said with a sheepish grin, "but most of those stories you couldn't print."

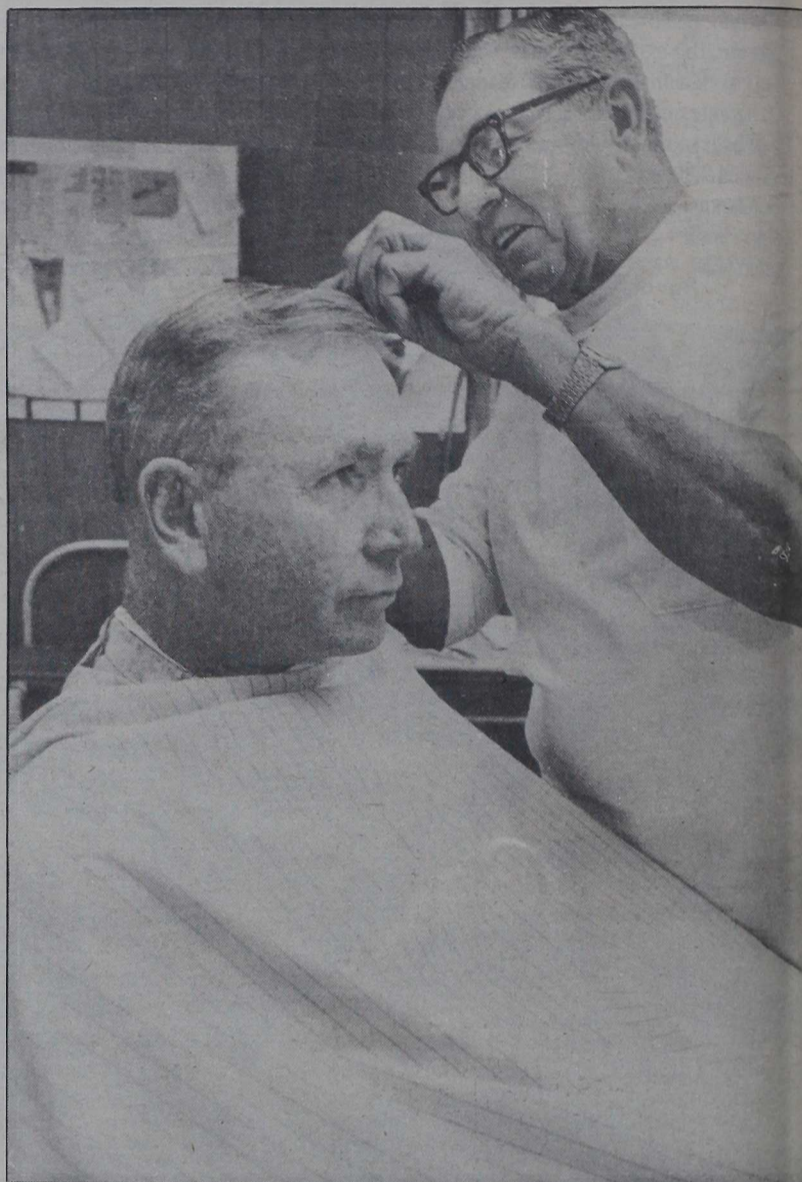
He has gained a little weight since he left the Corps as a staff sergeant, and his hair has turned about three quarters gray. But he bobs and weaves around the scalp of his every client like a professional boxer.

His memory is sharp as a tack, and his sense of humor is bestowed on every patron he's barbered. At 64, he works with the fervor of a man half his age. And after 40 years of cutting hair, his pride comes through with every snip of the scissors.

As his last customer sat in his chair, Mike brought out a tactical map of Camp Lejeune and showed his old friend the "Ponderosa of Bear Creek," as he refers to his home in Hubert, N.C. He showed this man his favorite fishing hole and invited him to "come down anytime."

"I just might do that," his patron said.

"Mike and I go back 35 years," said General P. X. Kelley as he looked up and spoke to another friend of Mike's. The general, Marine Corps Commandant since 1982, explained that Mike started cutting his hair when Gen. Kelley was Capt. Kelley.

When asked if Mike was a good barber, the general replied: "I'm here aren't I?" Then he looked at Mike and said, "there is none better than Mike."

The man who has cut the heads of General Lewis B. "Chesty" Puller, and almost every other general since General A. A. Vandegrift was commandant isn't particularly ostentatious.

He has lists of all of the generals who have commanded here at Camp Lejeune tacked to his walls so he "can keep track." Elsewhere he has two hurricane tracking charts marked with every major hurricane in the last 30 years right below a giant Marine Corps emblem. There are mirrors on almost every other available inch of wall space.

"I've loved this job," he said. "I wake up every morning ready for another day's work."

He claims that he's given more than three million haircuts in his time, yet he has never wanted to quit. In fact, he's

never taken more than two weeks vacation at a time.

"I have a standing invitation from Major General Cassity to keep on working," he said. "I'm going to go fishing for a couple of months, then I'll decide if I'm really ready for retirement."

His last official act as Mike the Barber, though, was to be honored at the Friday morning flag raising ceremony in front of the 2d Marine Division Headquarters. "The weather has been pretty good in eastern North Carolina until today," said Major General Dennis J. Murphy, commanding general, 2d Marine Division, commenting on the light drizzle shortly before Mike's retirement ceremony. "It seems as though the angels were shedding tears as Mike leaves us today."

At the ceremony letters from General Kelley, Lieutenant General Al Gray, commanding general of Fleet Marine Force Atlantic, and MajGen. Murphy were read in honor of Mike the Barber. But the best quotation came from a 1978 feature article in the Raleigh News and Observer which Mike dusted off as he cleaned his barber shop for the last time.

"The day Mike whips the cloth off that last customer, gives it a snap, puts on the Jeris and then drapes the cloth on the seat and does not say 'next?' will be the end of an era."

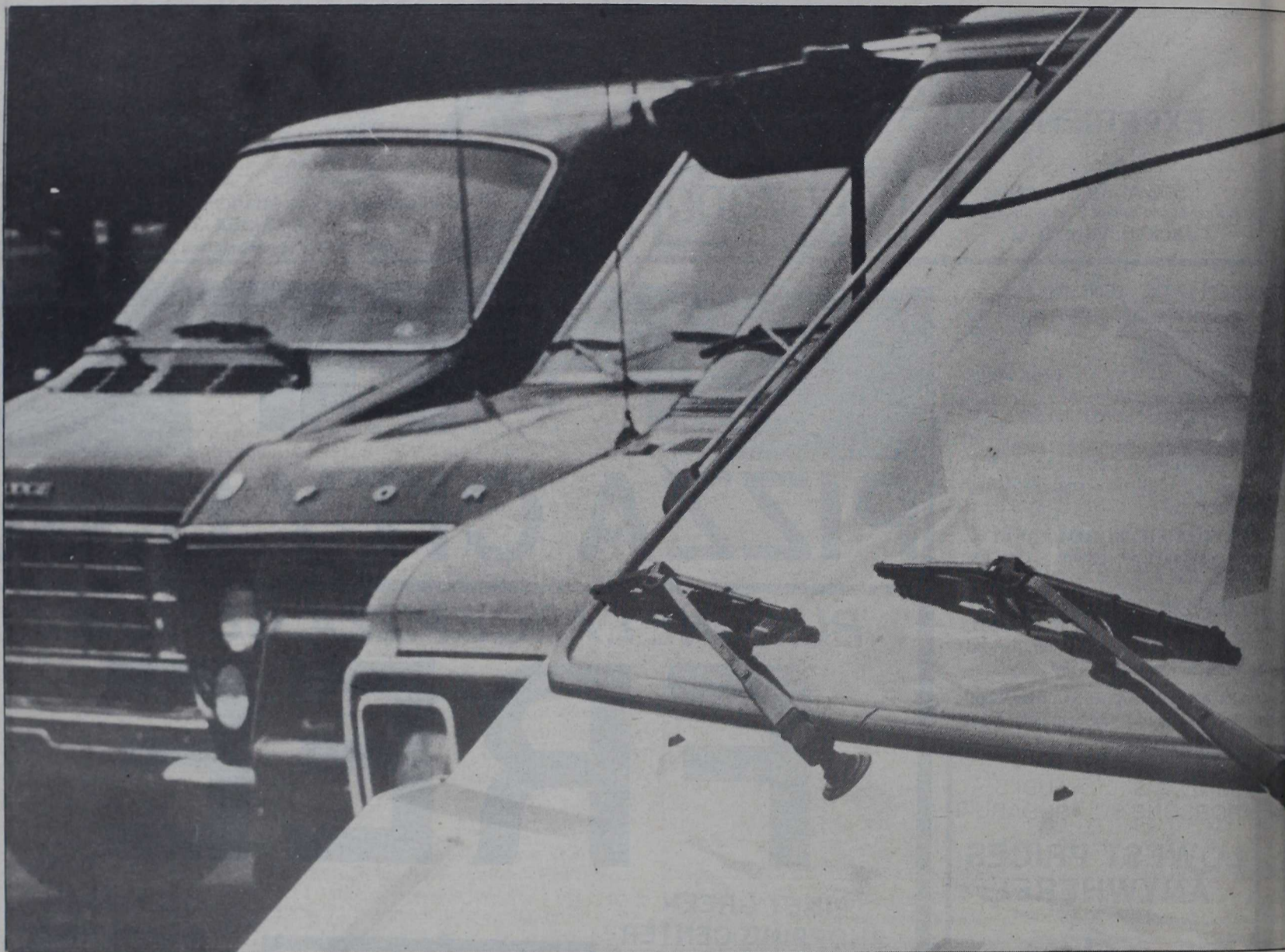

'The Swoop is On...'

"I heard about it when I was checking in here," said Lance Corporal Steven V. Nickell, Headquarters Battery, 1st Battalion, 10th Marine Regiment. "I've been swooping from here since."

The place is called Swoop Circle. Located on Main Service Road, 300 meters southeast of the traffic circle, Swoop Circle is almost as well known as Bldg. 1, the exchange or the credit union at Camp Lejeune.

"I've been here for 12 years on and off, and it's been here as long as I can remember," said one Marine sitting behind the steering wheel of a van.

"This is cheaper than other forms of transportation and more convenient. I can

get a ride right to my front door," said Sergeant Mack M. Nelson, Headquarters Battalion, 2d Marine Division. "I've never had trouble with a ride."

Drivers walk around their car or van letting passers-by know where they are going. Or they place signs on their vehicle. State license plates also help riders find a car headed in the right direction.

Some of the old hats at swooping offered advice to those who might decide to go home via Swoop Circle.

"I once saw a guy who picked up some riders and half an hour later the riders were back looking for another ride. The driver never made it past the front gate," said Staff Sergeant Joe Shavers, Headquarters Battalion, Marine Corps Base.

"Most of the drivers who pick up riders have cars that are in good shape, but once in a while somebody will try to pick up some riders in a car that isn't going far."

Inspecting your driver's vehicle is a must before heading out on the highway. It is also a good idea to make the terms of agreement clear before taking off.

Many drivers leave from Swoop Circle every time the base has a three or four-day weekend. Each driver makes his own policy as far as dropping off and picking up riders. Usually though, a driver will leave from Swoop Circle as soon as his vehicle is full and deliver his occupants to the bus station in the city they are going to. The driver then specifies a time which he will pick everyone up. Most of the drivers say they won't wait very long at their

pickup spot when they are returning.

It's wise to talk to some of the driver's other occupants before getting into his vehicle. The majority of the drivers who frequent Swoop Circle are reliable, and have driven others home before.

Most of the drivers are going north to New York or south to Florida. But there are some heading west, and according to one driver, come holiday time, you can go almost anywhere from the Circle.

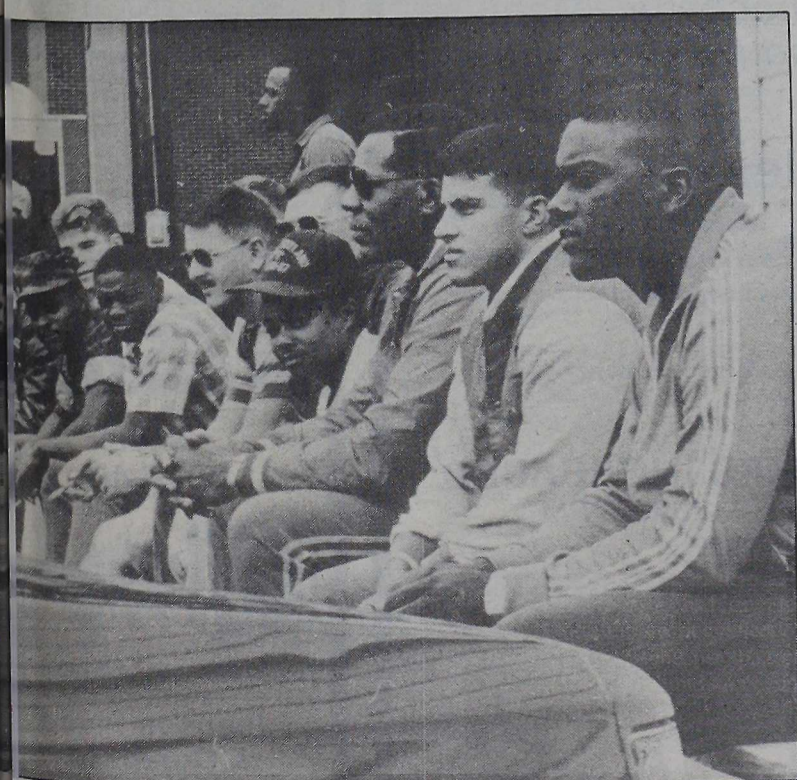

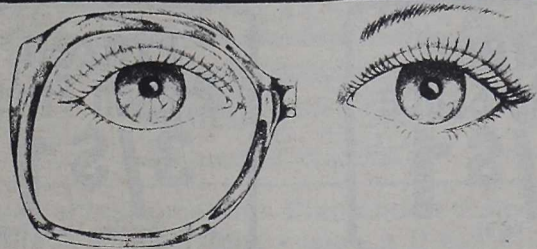

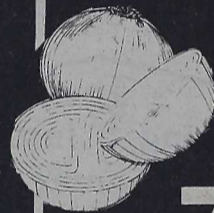

Lejeune's Wimmer: A golfing natural

Some might call him a natural, while others could say that he's a product of dedicated practice. . . . But no one can say that he's just lucky.

Steve Wimmer of Support Company, Support Battalion, Marine Corps Base, has been playing golf for 25 years and he's always had a knack for it.

"I started playing seriously at about age 12. By the time I was 14 I had a handicap of three," said Wimmer.

While many players work for years in their adult life for a handicap like this, Wimmer claims his whole family was good at golf.

"My father had a seven, mom had a five and my older brother had a one. . . . We were quite a foursome," he recalls.

Wimmer got his first taste of golf when he was 11 years old. His father was a semi-pro baseball player in Cincinnati and took his son along as his junior caddy.

Wimmer took to the greens as if they were his second home.

Now a master sergeant, Wimmer spends approximately 20 hours a week on the Lejeune Gold Course.

Wimmer claims the Gold Course as his home course and regularly shoots at least a 72 on it. He attributes a great deal of success with golf to playing with pro and novice players alike.

"I didn't always win, but I did learn quite a bit from both levels of players," he said.

Wimmer's practice and dedication has taken him to some pretty impressive competition where he has proven his worth.

After finishing second in this year's East Coast Regional Competition, Wimmer slipped to fourth in the All-Marine tourney.

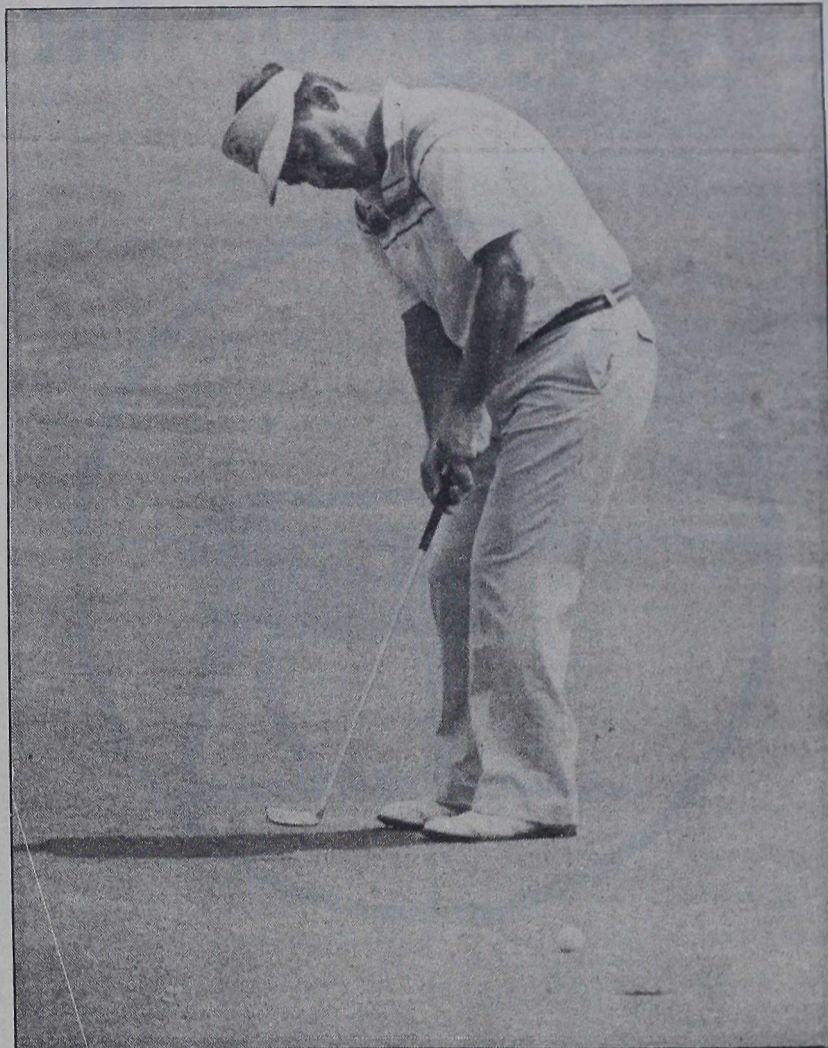
That downward trend came to a halt when Wimmer reported to Andrews Air Force Base, Washington, D.C. for the Interservice Tournament.

The veteran player came out strong at the start and swept the tourney, taking top honors with a 284, four under par. Wimmer won the tourney by four strokes over his nearest competitor.

After taking the prestigious Interservice Tourney, Wimmer was asked by the Canadian Army Golf team to play in a tournament in September.

Golf obviously has to remain a high priority for Wimmer but he hasn't lost sight of the support given by his wife and children.

"My wife considers herself a 'golf widow.' I usually play four to five days a week, leaving for the course right after supper. She enjoys when I play well and understands when I'm not exactly the friendliest guy in the world," said Wimmer.

Looking for Mr. Big Deer.....

Anyone who has spent time in the woods at Camp Lejeune or noticed the deer feeding on the roadsides in the evening couldn't help but notice their unusually small size. That raises some questions with the avid hunter—primarily, "Where do the big deer hide?"

It's not at all strange to spend hours in the woods and never see a deer that would weigh in at more than 100 pounds.

But there are big deer out there and it takes a dedicated sportsman to find them. The hunter who stays in the relatively open woods will rarely see one. Although the average deer brain is about the size of a racquetball, big deer are smart. Or at least their instincts are great enough for them to seldom make a public appearance.

To find these big deer you have to find where they live. In many cases, that's the thickest, toughest underbrush to be found. The kind of stuff only a bulldozer could penetrate. Naturally, you can't hunt that stuff. The alternative is a tree stand set up on the edge of it near a well-used runway.

Other popular deer hangouts, and one that Camp Lejeune has more than enough of are swamps. Unlike the thick underbrush, with proper caution, the swamps can be hunted. A good pair of hip waders go a long way to help negotiate the swamps. However, the thing to keep in mind is that the base has a number of swamps that can literally swallow an unwary hunter. Before tackling one, be sure of the footing.

The setback is that it's extremely difficult to still-hunt a swamp. There's something about the loud, sucking sound made when you pull a boot out of six-inch deep muck that alerts deer to your presence as well as if you were to yell "Hey you with the fuzzy white tail... I'm here."

Because of the extremely soft ground in swampy areas, large trees cannot root which eliminates the possibility of using a tree stand. About the only way to hunt these areas—and it takes patience—is to resign yourself to making noise on the way in, find yourself a good spot, and try to sit the deer out. You won't see as many deer doing this as you would in other areas but your odds of finding a big one are definitely improved.

Fishing is also improving with the cooler weather. Salt water anglers still have the fall run of king mackerel to look forward to as well as some good bluefishing. For the saltwater angler who's willing to travel, the big channel bass will be running during the October and November time frame at the Outer Banks.

And finally, I got a call from Harold Farlow last week who was a bit dismayed that I referred to mudfish (bowfin) as useless food fish. It seems that mudfish are a delicacy in the Sportsman's Paradise of Louisiana. He said there are special ways to prepare them for consumption. I'm more of a fillet 'em' and throw 'em in the frying pan man myself so I'd look to somebody who knew how to do it before I tried to eat a mudfish.

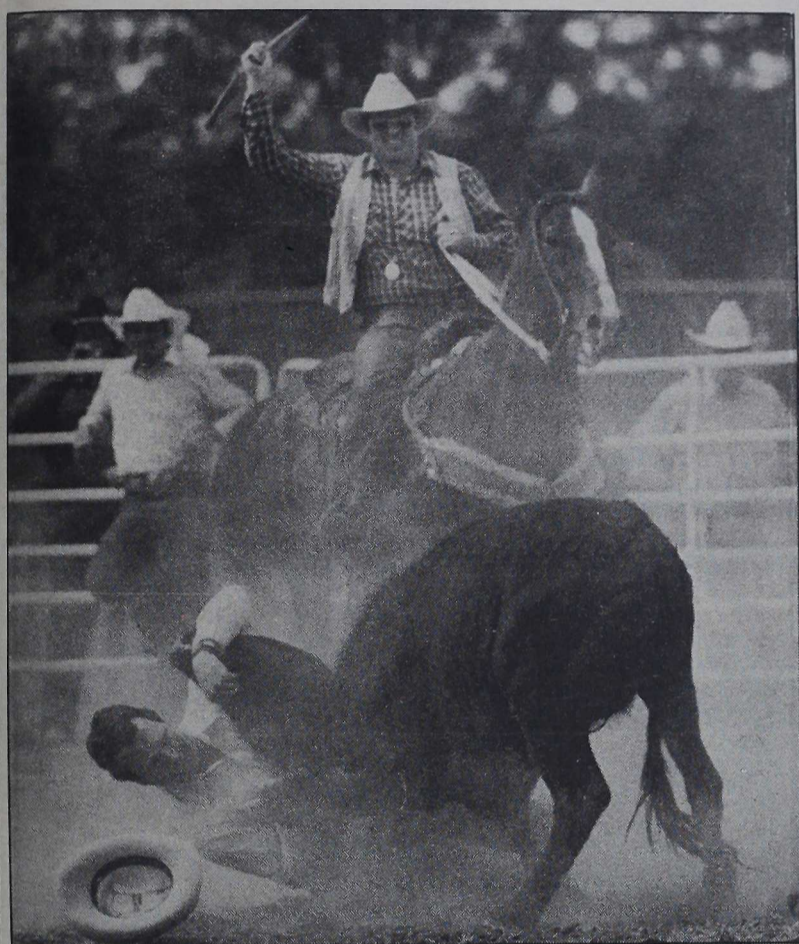

The second half opened with the Venezuelans pressing. "Every time they came down the field my heart kept pounding harder and harder, but I wasn't going to give them anything," said Albert.

The physical play of UNITAS kept their foes in check, and began to wear down the more experienced Venezuelan team.

Their hard work paid off with only 4:15 remaining, when Bradon Sucietto split the defense and nailed a low shot past the diving Venezuelan keeper.

The victory was their first in two attempts. The UNITAS soccer team dropped their initial game to the Roosevelt Roads USO in Puerto Rico after an overtime shoot out.

With this big win under their belt, the UNITAS soccer team knows they can play with and beat the Latin Americans at their own game.
