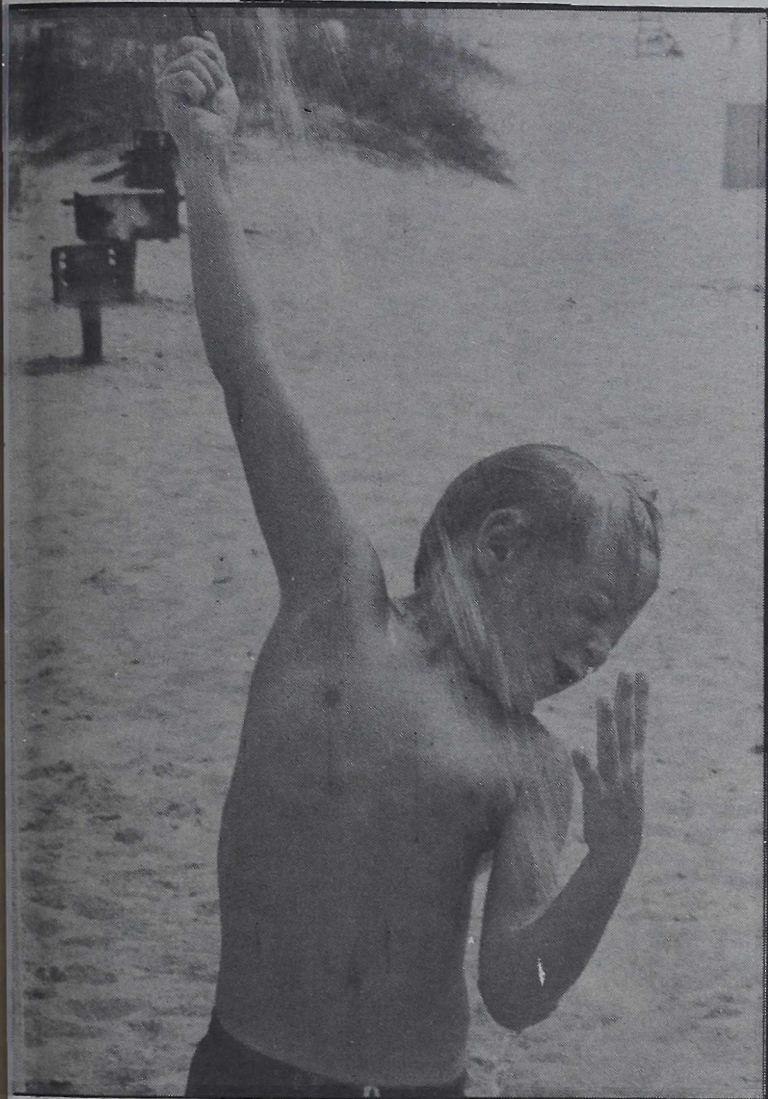

### Heat causes health problems

During the summer months many problems can develop in relation to the environment. This article will cover heat stress, a product of temperature and humidity. Most heat injuries result from a lack of knowledge about heat casualties.

The first type of heat-related illness is known as heat cramps and is characterized by the sudden onset of severe muscle cramps brought about by the loss of salt and fluid in the body. Victims are easily treated by getting them out of the heat, giving plenty of fluids and allowing frequent rest periods.

The second stage of heat stress is heat exhaustion and is also caused by loss of fluids and salts due to excess sweating and poor fluid intake. These victims are frequently dizzy, tired, nauseated with or without vomiting and may have a severe headache. If left untreated, these victims usually develop a rapid heart and breathing rate, low blood pressure, and an elevated temperature. Rapid fluid replacement is necessary. This is a serious condition and requires medical attention.

The final stage is heat stroke and can lead to coma or death if not treated promptly and effectively. This is an emergency situation, requiring immediate treatment. Quite often these victims are confused, irritable, combative, or hallucinating. They may pass out and remain unconscious. They may show signs of seizures. These victims must have help

quickly or they could suffer irreversible damage, if not death.

Some prevention measures which can be done parallel the base guidelines for the Wet Bulb, Globe, Thermometer (WBGT) scale used aboard Camp Lejeune. First and foremost, if you must be outside, drink lots of fluids and take frequent rest breaks to allow the body to cool off. Wear light-colored, loose-fitting, and lightweight clothing as well as a wide-brimmed hat. Heat injuries usually affect the very young, the very old, and the very active.

Common sense dictates how much activity should be done. Colored flags are flown to indicate the safe level of activity permitted. At the green level, all activity is permitted. During yellow flag days, only those who have been regularly exercising during the current levels of heat and humidity for 10 days or more should be permitted to be physically active. Only those who have been physically active for at least 30 days should be active during red flag days. On days during which the black flag is flying, no physical exertion outdoors is recommended.

No matter which flag is up during the summer, the best time to exercise is in the early morning hours and late evening. Summer heat can kill, but common sense and reasonable care can decrease the severity of any heat stress.

## Carolina heatwave strikes Camp Lejeune

The heat is on. As temperatures hover in the high 90s, troops aboard Camp Lejeune sweat out. As the effects of the weather take their toll, from in-garrison training to PT, no one escapes mother nature. The most logical way to cope with the heat is to seek shelter—air conditioned

shelter. But Marines in the field, on the range and serving as drivers know this isn't always possible.

Water seems to be the greatest relief as Marines drink it, douse themselves with it and swim in it.

"If you drive a five-ton (truck) you'll sweat. After I get finished with a run, I feel as though I just did two PFT's," said Private First Class Dannie J. Jones,

Reserve Support Unit, Marine Corps Base.

While Marines continue to march to completion of their missions, some modifications have been made to accommodate the inflated temperatures.

Troops are rescheduling PT hours to include early mornings and evenings. Others get their "daily seven" at the pool and in fitness centers.

Still others take the old adage, "If you can't beat them, join them." They go to the beach during off-duty hours. An ocean breeze and cool salt water offer temporary relief from the black flag conditions.

As the sweltering heat continues with no relief foreseen in the near future, Marines continue to march. Only the rhythm's changed.

## Camp Johnson hosts traveling SNCO team

The Staff Noncommissioned Officer Academy at Camp Johnson hosted the Resident Instruction Team from Quantico, Va.

The Resident Instruction Team is a traveling school that offers SNCOs the professional education needed to accept greater responsibilities and make a greater contribution to the Marine Corps.

"Completion of the RIT is two-fold. Students must have passed or be presently enrolled in the SNCOA non-resident program offered by the Marine Corps Institute. The RIT instructs on subjects that don't lend themselves to the non-resident program such as close order drill, techniques of military instruction, counseling, discussion leading and physical training management. Additionally, the RIT course provides instruction in selected areas from the SNCOA program of instruction not presently contained in the SNCO non-resident course," said Captain Robert F. Kluba, the officer-in-charge of the team.

The three-week course was established to make formal military education available to a larger group of qualified SNCOs or SNCO selectees. Graduates of the school will be given the same record entry and fitness reports as would

a graduate of the six-week Resident Staff Noncommissioned Officer Academy at Camp Lejeune, Quantico or El Toro.

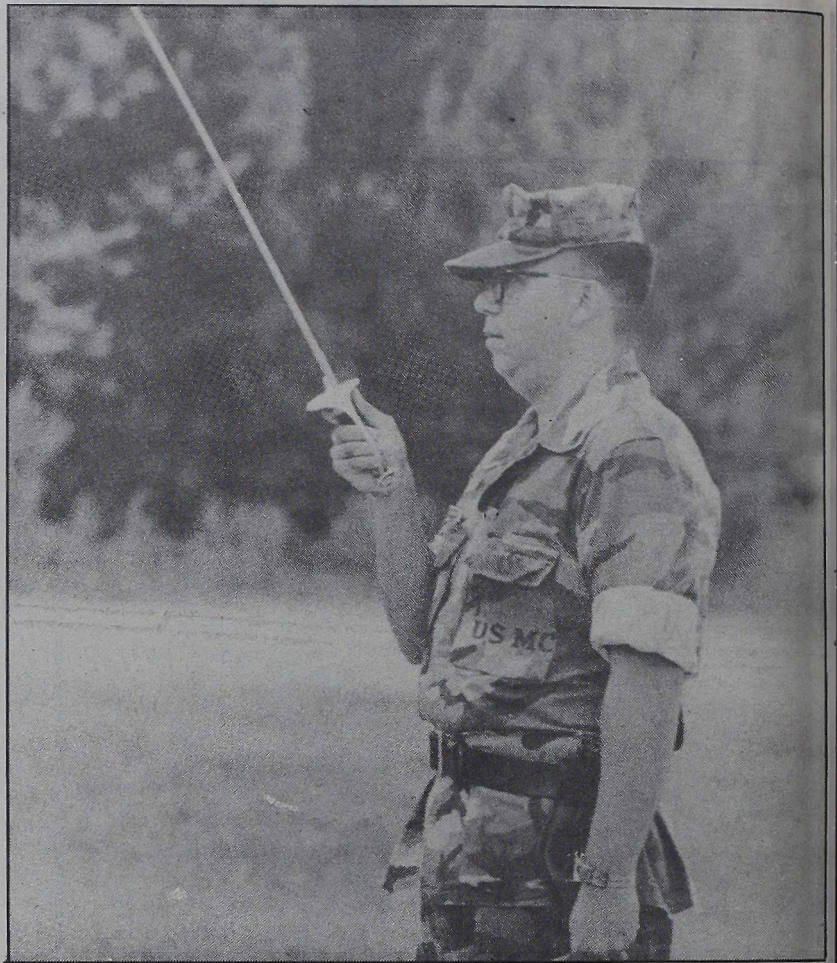
"It's a good school," said Staff Sergeant James H. Bobinski, a student at the academy. "The training is fast and rigorous. Students are always on the go. It's a learning experience that I haven't had since boot camp. The instructors are fair, professional and knowledgeable, and I strongly encourage any SNCO or SNCO selectee to attend."

"These students are highly motivated about the course," said Gunnery Sergeant Robert T. White, RIT instructor. "It's intense training, but the Marines attending the school are the type that can handle it. These students go out and make things happen instead of waiting in ambush."

"I teach two kinds of knowledge. By knowledge I mean you know the answer by heart and the knowledge that enables you to find the answer. You must have both kinds to be an effective leader."

"Upon graduation from this course these Marines will have it, from classroom participation and from practical application," White said.

The RIT session began on July 7 and graduated on July 25.

## Corpsmen train to reduce patients' waiting time

You know the deal. You finally break down and go to sick call after putting it off for a couple of days. It started out to be a cold, then the flu and who knows what else. Everyone told you to go, so you did.

When you finally get back to your shop, you can't help but feel the word MALINGERER being carved in your

forehead as you walk in the hatch. Of course no one says it, but even you feel like some where during the past few hours, something could have been done to speed things up.

Corpsmen from the 2d Force Service Support Group are working hard to increase their sick call patient screening skills and shorten their patients' waiting time by attending the Clinical Screeners Course.

The 70-hour course is taught by 18 dif-

ferent instructors who are specialists in various areas including physical examinations, suturing, interavenous therapy, radiographic and laboratory interpretation, pharmacology, emergency medicine and many others.

"I specifically designed the course to increase the capabilities and expertise of the corpsmen to provide quality care to the Marines in the field, afloat and in garrison," said Lieutenant John F. Brown, French Creek Clinic, Headquarters and Service Battalion, 2d FSSG. "I have been on several floats and have had to train many corpsmen in areas that I feel they should have been taught before being sent to sea. This course will help corpsmen in the daily routine sick call and also keep them ready if they were to get called to combat 24 hours from now."

Students who attend the course must be familiar with basics of being a corpsman. They must have already been through Field Medical School and have at least one year experience in a hospital setting, according to Brown.

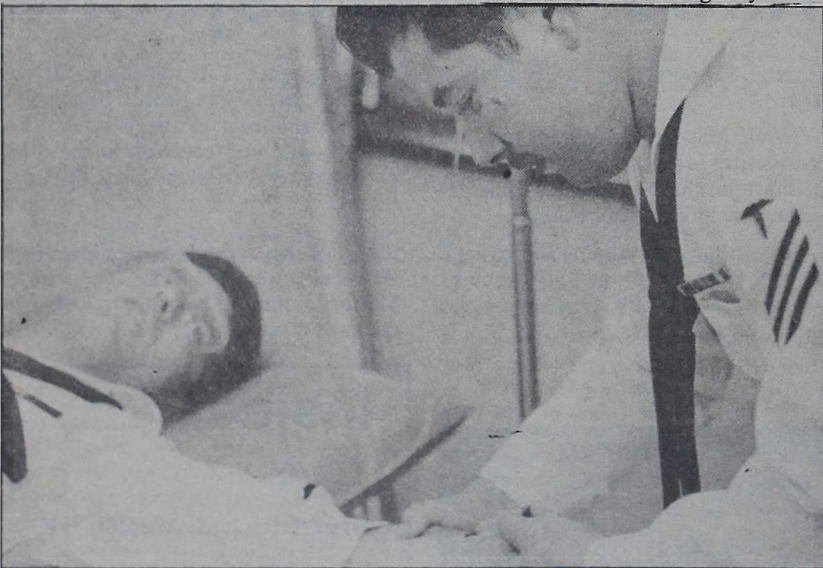
"This is a great refresher course for the corpsman who have moved up in ranks and have gone to mainly administrative positions. It's also good because of the intense physician-corpsman relationship that is instilled throughout this course. Just like anything else, if a corps-

man has a good understanding of how a doctor works, and what he expects, the professional relationship will provide better results."

The physician-corpsman relationship is just one part of the curriculum that is stressed. Students spend 50 percent of the time learning trauma treatment and 50 percent in sick call treatment. Ten hours are spent learning laboratory techniques and six hours are spent at the hospital during evening hours in the emergency room as part of their 30 hours practical application.

"This is only the second course we've had. We'll continue to evaluate it and make necessary changes," Brown said. "We can already see the increase in excellence of our students who must remain here for at least one year after course completion. We have seen an overall seven point increase in score averages in sick call knowledge testing for those who attended."

"I have learned more by taking this six-week course than throughout my on-the-job training in sick call," said Hospitalman David A. Costelli, French Creek Clinic sick call. "I am much more aware of the importance of the physician-corpsman relationship and I know that I can give patients more thorough care in a shorter amount of time."

Four Carolina Telephone Scholarships were presented to high school graduates recently. The recipients of the \$1,000 scholarships were:

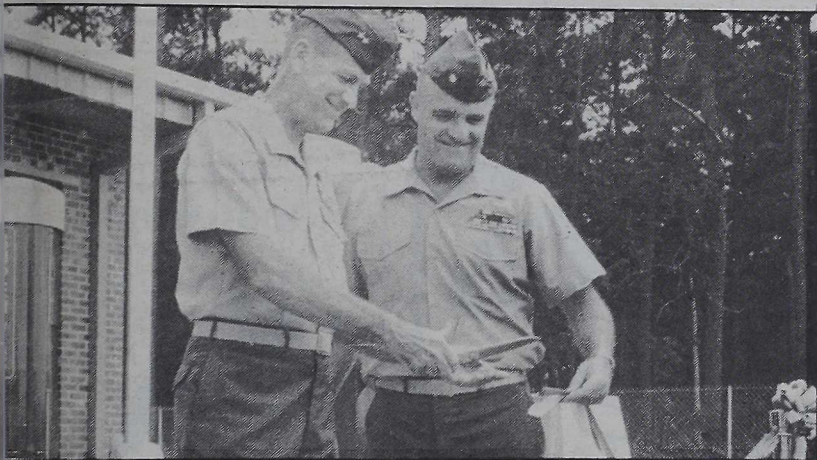
Maria A. Taplin, wife of First Lieutenant Rodney H. Taplin, 1st Battalion, 2d Marines, 2d Marine Division.

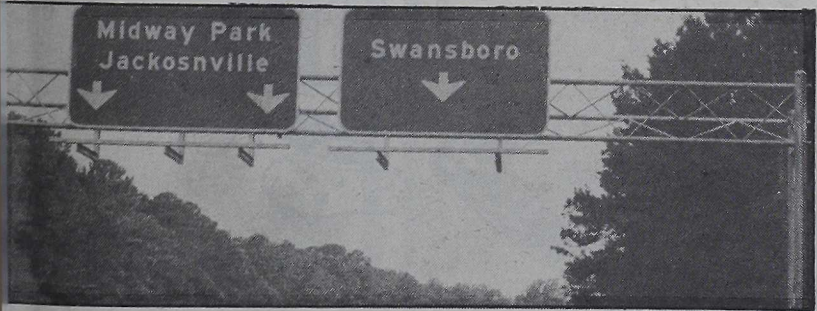

### Agency helps provide for the hearing impaired

Many military wives go through stressful times when their husbands are deployed. The children and house need to be taken care of, and bills need to be paid.

These tasks can be difficult for anyone, but they are even more difficult if the wife is deaf.

But a program in Jacksonville helps serve the needs of hearing-impaired military family members. The program serves the needs of everyone from mild hearing-impaired to the profoundly deaf.

"We are here to address the needs of hearing-impaired people, especially beyond job needs," said Lynn Bacon, consultant for the North Carolina Council for the Hearing Impaired. "We want to help with other needs, such as setting up appointments for doctor visits, getting driver's licenses and just basic communication needs."

The council also provides interpreter services for the deaf.

"You can imagine how difficult it would be for a deaf person to go in to a hospital clinic and try to describe what was wrong," Bacon said. "Deaf people have a language all their own, and sometimes it is very difficult to interpret."

Bacon said the hearing-impaired children of military families have many services available to them, but military wives sometimes get lost in the process.

"There is a hearing-impaired class taught at Brewster Junior High School for all deaf children," she said. "There are also many summer programs available to these children."

"But what is available for the wives? I worked with one wife who lived here two years, and never knew another deaf per-

son in the area. That friendship is very important. We protect the privacy of the people we work with, but we'll bring them together if they request it."

Deaf military family members also face other unique difficulties.

"There are no alerting devices in base housing," Bacon said. "The deaf cannot hear the phone or doorbell unless they have flashing lights connected to them. Those devices are very expensive. Also, they couldn't hear a smoke detector. We can assist people in finding these devices, and also locate the closed-captioned devices for television sets."

The council also serves many civilian employees aboard Camp Lejeune.

"Camp Lejeune is a great equal-opportunity employer," Bacon said. "They have made it a priority to hire handi-



Dear Fellow Members of the Force—civilians, sailors and Marines,

The combat readiness of the individual sailor and Marine and his unit is the key to our success. All we do—rifle qualification, professional educational, physical fitness training, participation in realistic exercises and the hours spent on the flight line and in maintenance shops—should be geared to preparing ourselves for the challenges each of us may face on the modern battlefield.

Each of you is encouraged to look for areas in which we can realize savings of our scarce time and to communicate our ideas up the chain of command. Working together toward the goal, we can enhance our ability to do whatever must be done as we prepare to meet the challenges that lie ahead. Keep charging!

### Don't trash your money; recycle glass containers

If you are throwing away old glass bottles and jars, you are throwing away money.

The Coastal Recycling Center in Jacksonville will pay cash for your glass.

"The Clean County Committee of Onslow County decided to start this program to decrease landfill space the county needed," said Patricia Engle, energy conservation officer for Camp Lejeune. "The landfills in the county were filling up rapidly, and the county decided to find ways to recycle. They had already recycled cans and paper, and started the glass recycling program on July 15."

The recycling center is located at 126 West Railroad St. in Jacksonville. It is just off Court Street, three blocks east of the Onslow County Courthouse. It is open from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. Monday through Friday. The center will pay one cent for each eight-ounce container or two cents per pound of glass. They will accept clear, green or brown glass, but ask that the glass be separated by color.

"We have heard that people who take all their old glass to the recycling center are making a lot of money," Engle said. "We just want to make sure the military community knows this service is available."

Bacon added that anyone at Camp Lejeune who has abilities communicating with the deaf is needed by the council.

"One of the best interpreters we have was once a Marine at Camp Lejeune," she said. "He had deaf parents, so had learned sign language at an early age. If there is anyone at Camp Lejeune who knows sign language, we would definitely like to know. We could especially use men, because most of our interpreters are women, and sometimes men feel more comfortable with a male interpreter."

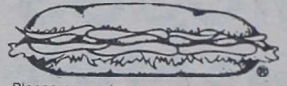

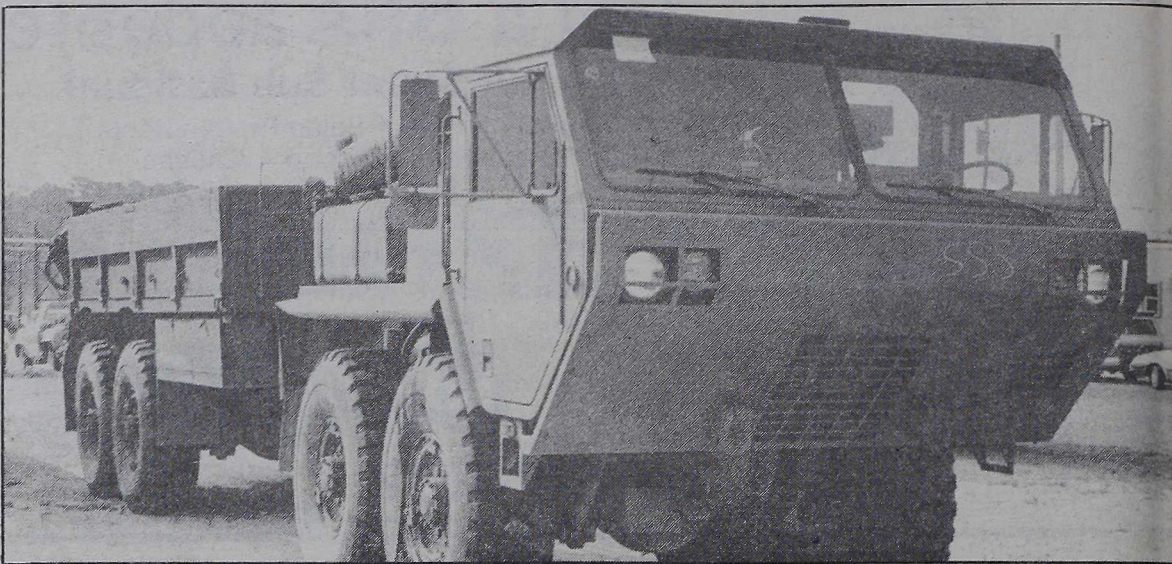

# MCSSS teaches students about 'Dragon Wagons'

Marine Corps Service Support Schools graduated its first two classes of Logistics Vehicle Systems-trained Marines recently.

The LVS course at Camp Johnson is the only one of its kind in the Marine Corps. The LVS itself is a new piece of equipment and new equipment requires new training.

"The LVS or dragon wagon is showing up in the FMF and there were no Marines with proper training to operate it. This course was created out of necessity. Headquarters Marine Corps tasked MCSSS with establishing a school to train Marines to operate and maintain the

LVS," said Gunnery Sergeant Elijah W. Truitt, noncommissioned officer in charge of the LVS course.

The LVS is a specialized vehicle with many capabilities, depending on the job it's tasked with. The MK48 cab assembly can be paired with any of four different trailer modules. Each trailer module enables the vehicle to perform distinct tasks.

"Everything from transporting troops to towing tanks, the LVS can handle it. On top of that, the LVS simply cannot get stuck," said Sergeant Kenneth W. Lee, an instructor at the LVS School. "We took it out back and ran it through some tough terrain that would have put standard vehi-

cles out of operation. But the 22-and-a-half-ton LVS wasn't even slowed."

Students as well as instructors are impressed with the capabilities of the LVS. After the students complete Organizational Automotive Mechanics Course, the unique features of the LVS require an additional two weeks and three days of intense training.

"Although the students have basic mechanics skill, they don't have the expertise to operate the LVS," said Lee. "One LVS module has a crane which can be used to load the vehicle, eliminating the need for a forklift. The wrecker module can tow another LVS or pull a tank out of the mud. An LVS operator can perform many tasks by himself."

During the LVS training, the students are taught basic operating procedures, troubleshooting and preventive maintenance.

"We transform students who have only seen the LVS into professional LVS operators," said Lee. "It is a new school and a good one. Before our pilot course, Marines had never been formally instructed on the LVS. We can now see LVS-trained Marines out into the field with confidence that they can perform their mission."

The two 25-Marine LVS classes which recently graduated are already in the field doing their job. Beginning Oct. 1st, classes of LVS-trained Marines will graduate from MCSSS each year.

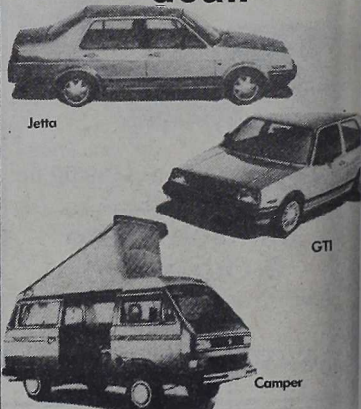

# 3/6 Marines field-test experimental gear

Members of 3d Battalion, 6th Marines trained recently at Fort Greely, Alaska, performing a 30-day test of new field equipment for the Marine Corps.

Civilian engineers looked on as 42 Marines from Weapons, Headquarters and Service, Lima, India and Kilo Companies tested five items of gear: a back pack, a load bearing vest, lightweight cammies, a poncho and a sleeping bag.

The new pack, called an Integrated Individual Fighting System, or IIFS,

performs the same functions as an all-purpose - lightweight - individual - carrying-equipment (ALICE) pack, but is larger and is strapped to the body in a more convenient manner.

"I like the new pack," said Lance Corporal David S. Hammer, a rifleman from Lima Company, 3/6. "It is more comfortable and seems to distribute the weight more evenly. I also like it because of the increased carrying capacity. There is twice as much room as in my ALICE pack."

The load bearing vest will replace the existing ammunition pouch and "H" harness combination.

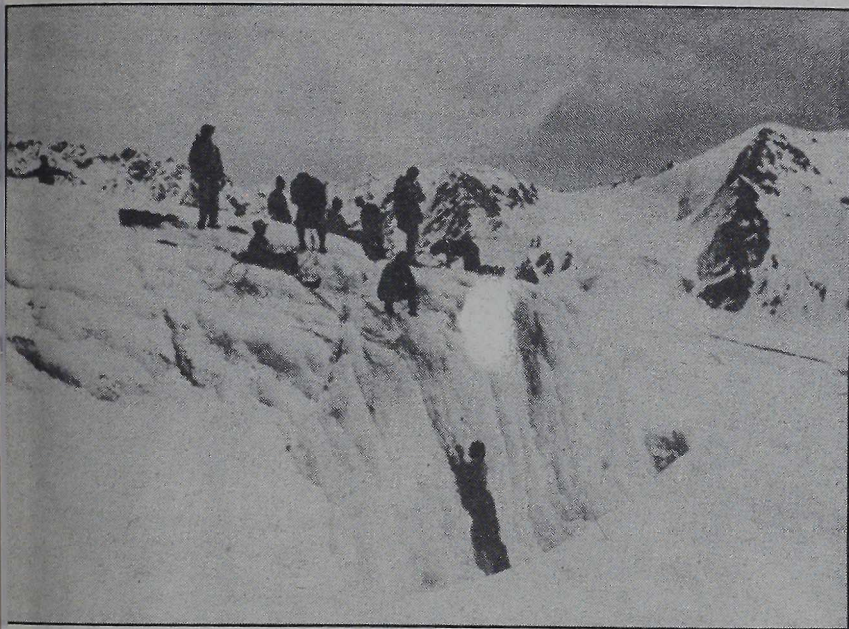
"The load bearing vest is a good idea, but it is a little difficult removing magazines," said Private First Class Dennis L. Glenn, a rifleman with Kilo Company, 3/6. "I think it's just a matter of getting used to."

"In my opinion the sleeping bag is a lot better than the existing one," said Second Lieutenant S. D. Aiken, the officer-in-charge of the platoon. "As far as the

cammies and the poncho we tested are concerned, the present gear is more durable."

After the 30-day test period the Marines trained on glaciers, performed raft operations and climbed rocks.

"I enjoyed the glacier training," said Corporal R. L. Baker, a squad leader from Kilo Company, 3/6. "I learned a great deal. We learned self-arrest which is the procedure to follow if you fall through a glacier. It was exciting because we were first-hand examples of a Marines' ability to perform in any climate in the world."

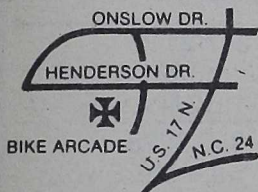

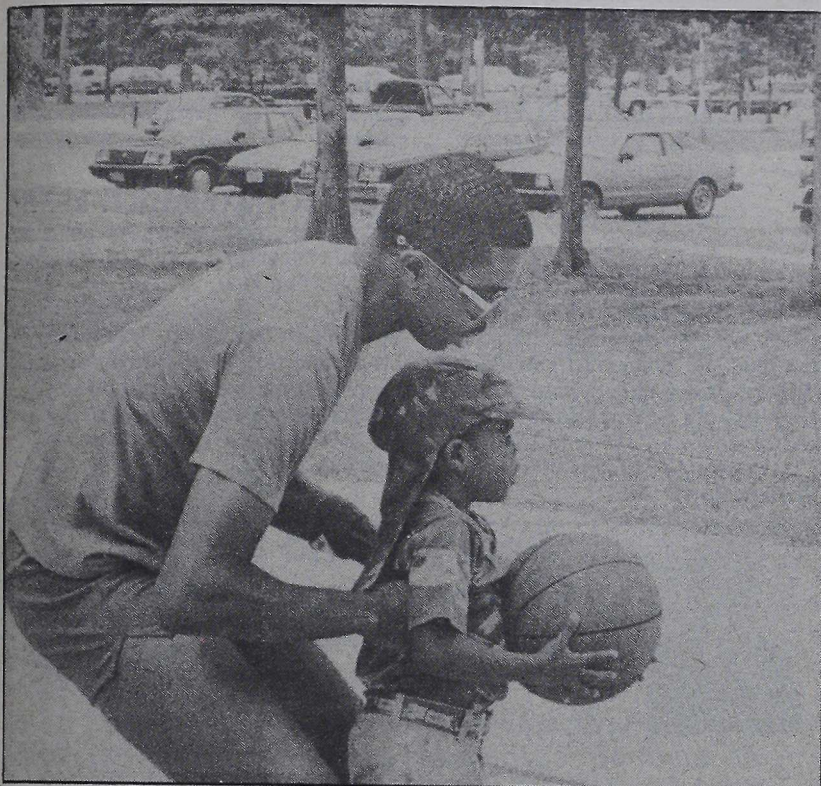

## 2d LSB Marine 'adopts' personnel chief's son

"I can out-shoot you in basketball any day of the week," said the six-foot-three Marine, easily lifting the ball from the hands of his opponent and going up for the jump shot.

"Maybe so, but I'll pick up corporal before you will," the opponent said.

Typical bantering between fellow Marines, right? Not quite so in this case. The opponent is four-year-old Christopher Johnson, honorary Lance Corporal at 2d Landing Support Battalion's S-1 shop, where his mother, Sergeant Iris Johnson, is personnel chief. His tall opponent is 2d LSB mail orderly Lance Corporal Waymon Jones Jr., Christopher's "big brother."

"I checked in to Camp Lejeune at the end of April, just in time for the Inspector General's preparation," said Johnson. "That meant working several week-ends and late nights which adds up to a lot of extra babysitting fees. I made a comment that I really needed a big brother for my son, and LCpl. Jones offered his help right away."

It didn't take much time before the tall, lean Marine and the frisky determined lad were playing basketball, watching television, reading stories and spending time together doing whatever Christopher decided would be the most fun that day.

"Right now, I'm teaching Christopher how to ride a bike, and he's doing really well at it. It's hard to believe he's only four. I'm the first big brother he's had so I'm constantly trying to set a good example for him to follow," Jones said.

Jones not only sets an example for the quick-witted four-year-old, he has changed a few opinions of his fellow Marines.

"I caught a lot of slack from the other Marines in the barracks when they first found out I was spending time with a kid instead of partying with them every weekend," Jones said. "But now they don't say too much because they know that I'm doing something more worth while."

"Everyone in this shop has helped me out," Johnson said. "I guess it's because they know that I'll do the same for them. As I see it, it's all part of the mission. Troop welfare goes hand in hand with getting the mission accomplished and Marines like LCpl. Jones really demonstrate that."

Military children grow up surrounded by military ideas and values, according to Johnson. They learn the same respect for the Marine Corps just from observing their military parents.

"I don't think a civilian big brother could be as good for Christopher as a Marine like LCpl. Jones is, simply because Chris loves the Marine Corps as much as I do," Johnson said.

"I would encourage everyone to get involved in something like the 'big brother' program, or whatever helps the welfare of their shop," Johnson said. "On the outside it may not look like such a big deal. But, to those children in single parent families or whose fathers are deployed, it's a tremendous help."

"Plus, the benefits go both ways," Johnson said. "This experience with children will help Marines like LCpl. Jones later on when he becomes a father and also when he's a staff noncommissioned officer-in-charge of a section dealing with his troops and their families."

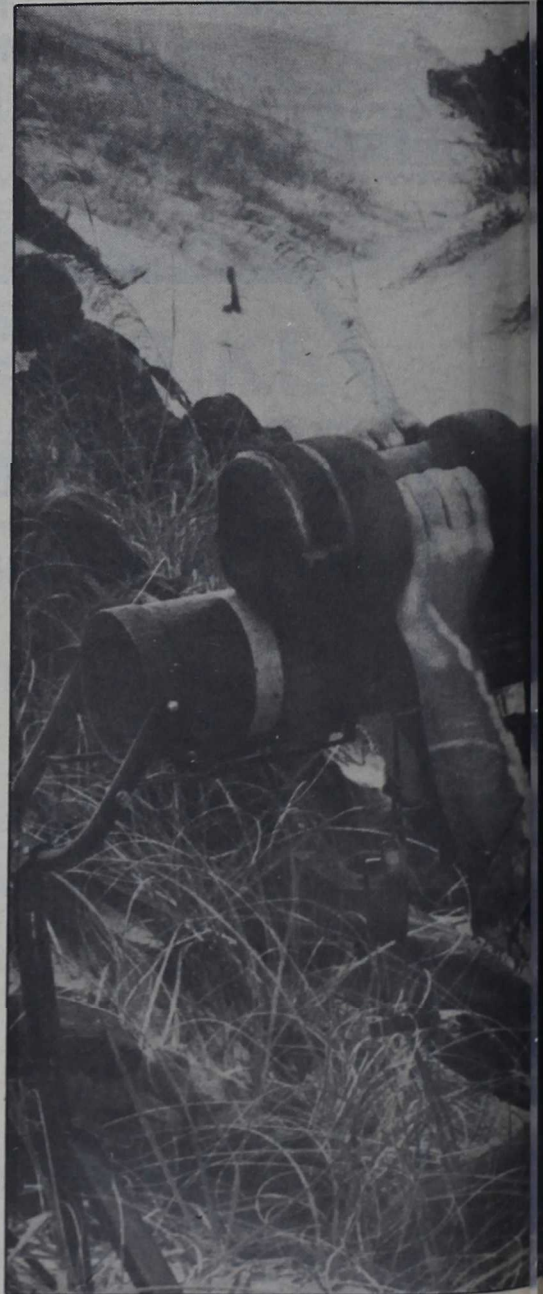

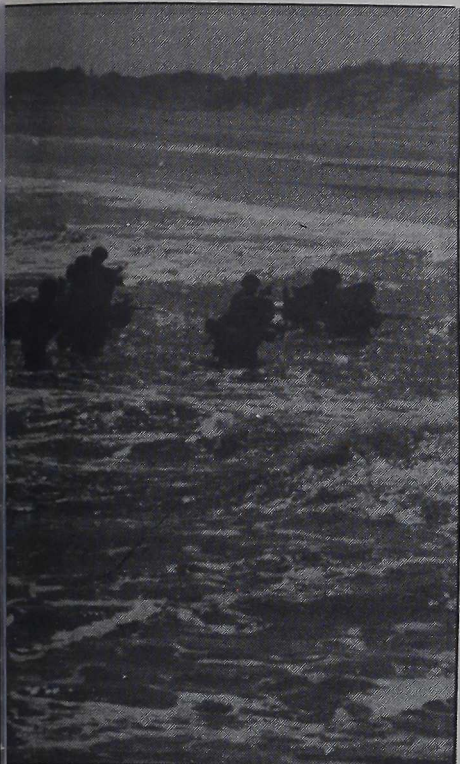

# Telephone repair keeps him hopping

## Former Marine likes to hear those bells ringing in his ears

The sweat rolled down the young Marine's forehead. He heaved the cardboard carton full of broken, worn telephones up on the desk and leaned on the doorway of the tiny workshop. The forms of chipped black paint with twisted cords and worn headsets lay silent.

"This one won't do anything and this one just goes BBZZZZ and KERR-PLUNK," he said. "I'm not sure about some of the others, but here they are. I'll be back in a little while with more."

"No problem, I'll take care of it," said the quiet, silver-haired man. Sunlight filtered through the only dusty window as he carefully picked up a wounded phone.

Removing it, the middle-aged telephone repairman tipped his glasses back to take a concerned look at the mass of wires, connectors and resistors staring back at him.

"Employment was hard to find at that time and you had to wait a minimum of 6 months after discharge before reenlisting," explained Hess as he fidgeted with the touch tone dial of another telephone.

A little more than a year after his discharge, Hess became Private First Class Hess and headed for Camp Lejeune. He had attended Lejeune's field telephone school after boot camp a few years before. Now, he was headed for something new and the place where he would return time and time again throughout his military career and for at least 20 more years as the only telephone repairman at base telephone.

"Mr. Hess is our only telephone repairman," said Master Gunnery Sergeant Edward Lydolph, base wire chief. "There are 17,000 commercial phones on this base, Johnson, Geiger and New River Air Station. Mr. Hess checks them all before they are installed and repairs them when they are brought back in. He is the only

With a precisely deliberate flick, the adjustment was made. Plugging the cord into the test jack, he dialed the number and waited . . . BBRRRIIN-NGGG. He calmly unplugged the cord, wrapped it carefully around the casing and placed it on the repaired shelf.

Another moment of quiet satisfaction for Sheldon Hess.

If you would have asked Hess in 1943 what he was going to do for the next 43 years, he probably wouldn't have said working for the Marine Corps.

Hess was drafted in Nov. 1943 from his hometown of Benton, Pa. He was one of the five lucky picks for the Marine Corps that day. He climbed aboard the train to Parris Island, as a small, dark-haired, ruddy-faced youth of 18.

For the next 21 years, Hess served the Marine Corps as a basic wireman and telephone repairman with many units and at many bases.

"I've got a lot of memories, just like everyone else," Hess said. "I served with the 8th Marines during the invasion of Tinian in '44 and Okinawa in '45. I remember the devastation and rubble of the city of Nagasaki when we rode through on a Japanese bus driven by a Japanese driver six weeks after it was bombed. I was on a ship when President Roosevelt died. Of course, during the war, we never really knew where we were or the significance of it all. It was just the thing to do and we did our job."

Hess was released from active duty soon after the war. He achieved the rank of corporal with the pay grade of E-3 and was making \$66 per month.

one authorized on this base to say if a phone is repairable or needs to be disposed of."

Mr. Hess is always there to answer questions when a new installer checks in from school. The new installer is automatically sent to Mr. Hess for 30 days of hands-on training with the commercial telephones here.

"The young Marines all joke about graduating from 'Hess Tech'," said Lydolph. "But they all appreciate his whole hearted effort to get them started in the right direction."

"He is the corporate knowledge on this base," Lydolph continued. "If anyone needs to know anything about a phone, he has the answer. I've never met a more honest, reliable and conscientious person. He puts his whole heart in everything he does, whether it's repairing a phone or helping out a friend. The entire 20 years he's been here, he's devoted his 'on' time to work and his 'off' time to his family or his favorite hobby, scouting."

"I never thought about scouting until my son decided to join 13 years ago," Hess said. "I figured since I had to take him to the meetings anyway, I may as well get involved. Now my son has grown, and joined the Navy, serving as a Data Systems technician aboard ship at Norfolk, and I'm still in boy scouting."

He's now the scouting coordinator and treasurer for Troop 791 in the White Oak River District.

"I used to go on all the camping trips and participate in everything with my son, David," said Hess. "I now tell the new troop masters who have their sons as

Hess has not only received the sustained superior performance award at work, he has been awarded several honors as a boy scout troop master. Among those are the District Award of Merit, the Green Band Award and the

outstanding Marines and scouts but I know in a small way I contribute to his knowledge. It's really rewarding when years later when they see you they remember me."

## Find your missing bicycles at PMO's Lost and Found

Bikes are normally held for 120 days before they are auctioned. To give people a chance to claim the bikes, the time period has been extended until Aug. 7, when all unclaimed bikes will be sent to the auction.

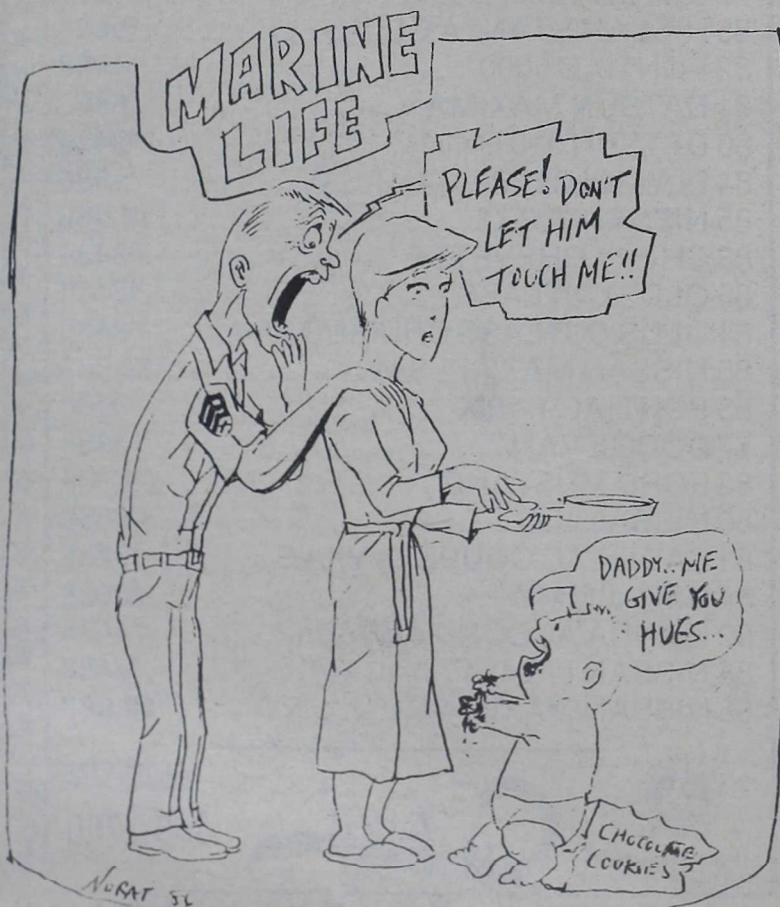
Bikes in all styles and colors have been recovered and are waiting to be claimed.

"PMO is trying to make people aware that we have a wide variety of unclaimed bikes. There is even a moped. When crime victims report a stolen bike, they normally leave it at that. They write the bike off as history instead of checking back to see if it was turned in. It's important to check
