## 24th MAU completes joint exercise in Italy

**TEULADA, Italy**—Hard-camouflaged Marines, modern and the demanding challenges of various warfare training forged a sense of combat might here, June 18-22, 1986, during the Italian/U.S. combined exercise, Tridente-86.

Field training on the southern tip of Sardinia was the second exercise for Leathernecks and the 24th Marine Amphibious Unit designated Landing Force U.S. 1st/Task Force 62, May 22.

Primary ground participants from the exercise included the MAU, the 1st Battalion of the U.S. Marine Corps' Air-Ground Task Forces, and a reinforced infantry battalion of the Italian Army's Marco Tactical Group.

Execution of the four-day training session began the morning of June 11 with a coordinated surface and helicopter amphibious assault launched from the island. The major participant, the five-ship amphibious assault group comprising Amphibious Squadron 24, Task Force 61, augmented by Italian amphibious and escort ships.

Air mobility and close-in air support were provided during the one-day tactical phase of training was carried out by the MAU's Air Combat Element, Marine Medium Helicopter Squadron-264 (Reinforced).

The area was a vital asset of the MAU, even in the short duration of this phase of training and the size of the rugged training area, more than 70 square kilometers.

In addition, the MAU had fixed-wing aircraft which were flight-ferried across the Atlantic for Tridente and related training. These 2d Marine Air-Ground Task Force units were detachments from the MAU and VMGR-252, both from the 2d Marine Air Station at Cherry Point. The aircraft were AV-8B attack jets and C-119 transport/refueling aircraft.

Once the objectives of the amphibious assault had been taken (primarily the beaches and a simulated airfield), the tactical phase ended and attention shifted to three days of cross-training with the MAU's Ground Combat Element, Battalion Landing Team 2/2, working beside their Italian counterparts from SMTG.

Nothing inspires more enthusiasm among Marines in the field than the combat skills training which enables Leathernecks to put rounds on target: live-fire.

For the next three days and nights the reinforced BLT 2/2 did that at an amazing

pace, firing virtually every type of weapon in the MAU's arsenal.

The area was well suited for such work with a well-defined impact area, an entire peninsula connected to the island by a tiny strip of land, for which the training area is named.

Weaponry employed included everything from the Corps' main battle tank, M60A1 and 155mm towed howitzer, to individual Marines' service rifles, the M16A2.

As with all the MAU's training, MAU Service Support Group-24 followed

ashore to provide munitions and other supplies sustaining the ground and air forces.

A mortarman of 81's Plt., Weapons Co. (2/2) gave a common response which summarized the training of the Marines, when asked what he thought of the training during Tridente.

"This (live-firing) is what I came into the Marine Corps to do during peacetime, and would do it every day if I could," said Lance Corporal Edward E. Neal. "There is nothing more worthwhile, and there is no substitute for this kind of hands-on training with the real thing, live rounds."

## Happy Birthday, Navy Corps

Did you ever notice how the only time most people think of Navy corpsmen is in a loud voice of desperation? Face it, there's nothing like a sucking chest wound to turn an interservice rivalry into a blood brotherhood.

Last week marked the 88th anniversary of the U.S. Navy Hospital Corps' official entry into the ranks of the Navy Medical Department. The event went unnoticed by a lot of people, except for, possibly, the folks in that particular organization and a group of Marines and sailors gathered outside the headquarters building of the 6th Marine Regiment.

The group included most of the corpsmen in the regiment, three rifle platoons and staff and officers from within the 6th Marines. Also on hand were the 2d Marine Division Band, two reporters from the Joint Public Affairs Office, and a birthday cake.

The band played, the birthday messages were read, the cake was cut, and the troops stood at attention.

That would have been pretty much the end of the story, except for something read from one of the messages concerning the fact that the call "*Corpsman UP!*" had never gone unanswered. That simple statement sent a battalion of thoughts running for cover in the mind of at least one Marine in attendance—thoughts of the kind of stuff corpsmen are made of.

It was in Okinawa in 1978; 2d Battalion, 5th Marine Regiment, was on a 52 mile hike—one mile for every hostage being held in Iran. They were doing it in 24 hours. The routine was to walk for 50 minutes and take a 10 minute break, walk for 50, take 10. During those 10 minute breaks, Marines dropped their packs, stretched from under the burden of their weapons, and sat for a few precious moments.

For corpsmen, "take 10" meant "expect five, get two." There were feet to check, cramps to massage, blisters to tend, and very little rest for 24 hours. If one of

the corpsmen was unable to continue, it meant more work for the others. No doubt about who had the heaviest burden on that march.

They build monuments to corpsmen . . . and with good reason. Navy corpsmen have won 20 Medals of Honor since 1900. They've won hundreds of Navy Crosses; thousands of Purple Hearts. Monuments are built to their dedication to preserving human life. There's one outside the Naval Regional Medical Center at Camp Pendleton, Calif. It's a statue of three corpsmen, under fire, going after a wounded Marine in the open. The monument is a testimony to a vision burned into one Marine's brain during the harsh reality of the battle for Iwo Jima during World War II. He worked on the monument in his garage, alone, almost 40 years after the battle, in an effort to exorcise the painful memory of the most selfless act he'd ever witnessed.

There's also a testimony, of sorts, wrapped up in a monument here at Camp Lejeune. It sits behind the headquarters of the 2d Marine Division, framed by trees and the calm waters of the New River. It serves as a permanent reminder to the nightmare on the morning of October 23, 1983, in Beirut, Lebanon. Among the too-many names of a few good Marines are too-many names of a few good sailors. "Wither thou goest, I will go," said Ruth in the Old Testament. "Wither thou lodgest, I will lodge."

I guess the point of all this is a simple matter of dedication; dedication to a purpose and a mission, dedication to preserve the highest of human values, life itself. A dedication best summed up in the words etched onto a plaque seen hanging over an unknown corpsman's desk in a faceless dispensary somewhere in the Fleet Marine Force a few years ago: "A Corpsman is a long haired, Marine hatin', needle jabbin' Sailor who would crawl through the very Gates of Hell to get to a wounded Marine."

Thanks, guys. And Happy Birthday.

# It's never too late to continue education

At 17 years of age he dropped out of the 10th grade three times to support his family. He held several jobs from working as a bagger in a supermarket to cutting grass.

At 17, he joined the Marine Corps. Going on to earn his General Equivalency Diploma, he got hooked on reading.

"As I became an avid reader it sparked my interest in continuing my education. I wanted to go to college," said Gunnery Sergeant Michael Cline, 2d Combat Engineer Battalion, 2d Marine Division.

"Because my GED score wasn't high enough, I found I had two choices. Either I take a second GED test and try to improve my original score or go back to high school and earn a diploma," Cline said.

He chose the latter.

"I had always felt an emptiness in not having a diploma. My superiors motivated me to meet the goals I had set for myself," he said. "I wanted them to be proud of me, so I started taking night classes at the local high school."

For Cline, it was a slow process. With many Marine Corps commitments, including deployments and transfers, it took him nine years to meet his goal.

"I also did a tour on the drill field. I put in a lot of 18 and 19 hour days. During those three years I completed my high school credits and received my diploma,"

Cline said.

"When I finally received that paper I jumped up and down like a man. I ran around showing it to everyone. In the end, I found out I was proud of myself and it didn't matter what other people thought of me," he said.

"To this day, when I go to a new place I'm not there to win a popularity contest. You have to draw the line somewhere more concerned about doing my job to the best of my ability," he said.

Although Cline has met one major goal, he still aspires to meet others. Continually taking courses, Cline hopes to earn a degree.

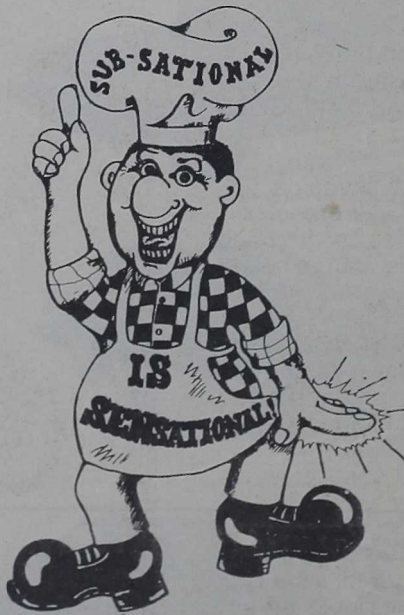
"The courses I've taken over the years have made me a better Marine and a better classroom teacher. My classroom teaching capabilities are more effective," he said.

Another goal of Cline's is to become a warrant officer.

What keeps him busy until he can get his word on his application?

"Any extra time I have during my deployment is spent on MCI courses. I take one course a time. By the time I've completed my next two are in," he said. Cline has completed 19 MCI courses.

If the Marine Corps leadership motto, 'know thyself and seek improvement,' were modeled on an individual, Cline would be a likeable candidate.

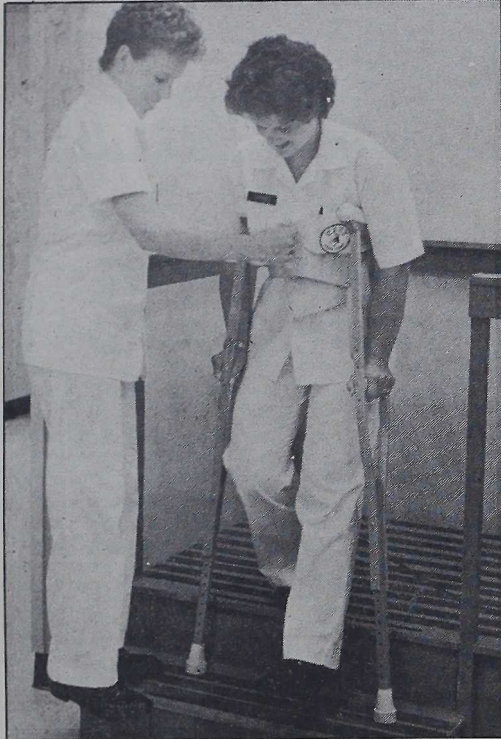

# Therapists put patients back on the road

There was little time to celebrate National Physical Therapy Week, June 2-8, at the Naval Hospital. It was business as usual for the two physical therapists, four physical therapy technicians and two general corpsmen who staff the Physical Therapy Department.

"We treat between 110 and 130 patients a day," said Lieutenant Commander Robert W. Breton, physical therapist. "We take care of active-duty, retired personnel and dependents of this area and Cherry Point.

"It is our goal to rehabilitate patients to help them maintain strength and regain full motion, so they achieve independence to function normally," Breton said.

"Marines' duties are physically demanding and they tend to push themselves to the limit," said Petty Officer Second Class Dan Booker, physical therapy technician and leading petty officer. "Younger Marines tend to have more traumatic incidents, bad sprains, broken bones, and dislocations. Older Marines tend to have more degenerative type problems involving stiffness and loss of motion."

"Many of our patients are seen for lower extremity injuries due to running, sports activities, and field injuries," Breton said.

No matter what reason a person is seen at the hospital, the Physical Therapy Department is usually involved in assisting in the recovery process.

A referral to the physical therapist can follow virtually any serious illness or injury. Physical therapy is needed to improve circulation, restore motion, relieve pain, prevent injury, strengthen muscles, improve function, assist in correcting deformities and promote healing. It is used after operations to rehabilitate affected muscles and to keep muscles strong. After child-

birth, physical therapy is used to overcome some of muscle, bone, and joint type of defects. A jury, physical therapy restores useful functions with fractures, sprains, burns, lost spinal cord and other injuries. After illness, physical therapy is used to overcome pain and disability muscle and nerve dysfunction, arthritis, cerebral pulmonary disease, stroke, cancer, etc.

Physical therapy is also used in preventive care. "We offer a 'Back School' that provides information on spinal and back injuries," Breton said. "When I first came to this area, of the first patients we saw, about 25 percent were young wives who used improper lifting and carrying techniques. These women tend to carry their babies hip and the diaper bag and purse on the shoulder, causing the same types of problems Marines have from improperly carrying their own and their field gear.

"All patients who are referred for back injury attend back school," Breton said. Basic anatomy, biomechanics, correct lifting and carrying techniques, preventive measures and maintenance of the topics discussed at the back school.

"Attitude plays a vital role in recovery," Breton. "Enthusiastic support provided by the invaluable in ensuring a positive attitude which aids in the recovery of the injured member.

"It takes a special type of person to be a physical therapy technician," said Breton. "Because physical therapy is so diverse, the technician must be look at each patient as an individual, and as a therapist in determining the best physical therapy program for the situation. The technician becomes involved with the injured, his attitude, and personal assist in maximizing total recovery."

## X-ray technicians ensure best treatment

The wire-filled room is dark. Strange equipment looms ominously above.

On a table in the center of the room an injured Marine lies; a large "X" is projected upon his chest. He is instructed not to breathe and not to move as the equipment hums steadily above him. A high-pitched beep is heard . . . it's over.

A scene from Dr. Frankenstein's laboratory? Is this Marine about to become part of a diabolical scientific experiment?

No, this Marine is safe. The preceding scenario is actually helping to ensure the Marine's health and proper medical care. The X-rays he has received will help doctors effectively treat his injury or illness.

"We X-ray more than 70 patients a day at Building 15 Clinic," said Seaman Eddie L. Idlette, X-ray technician. "I process over 200 X-rays every day. We are always busy because a lot of injuries require X-rays for proper diagnosis."

Although the majority of injuries Idlette deals with are broken bones, X-rays have other applications as well.

"I take X-rays of broken bones, but also of sinuses and lungs. If a person has a sinus disorder or pneumonia, the doctor can confirm or reject this diagnosis by studying an X-ray," said the 2d Medical Battalion corpsman.

Another use of X-rays is to pinpoint internal bleeding. A special dye containing barium is administered to the patient and then he is X-rayed. The X-ray will pick-up the barium particles and produce a clear internal picture of the injured area.

Other types of internal injuries can be diagnosed using X-rays, including broken eye sockets. This X-ray allows the doctor to look inside the body for damage.

"One interesting X-ray I am able to do

is called an 'orbit'. An orbit is required if a person has had a serious head injury that involves a crushed or broken eye socket. This X-ray allows the doctor to view the area behind and around the eyeball. With an orbit, the doctor can check for loose pieces of bone fragments in the socket," said the 26-year-old.

Although a variety of injuries pass beneath Idlette's X-ray machine, he sees a pattern in the injuries involving Marines.

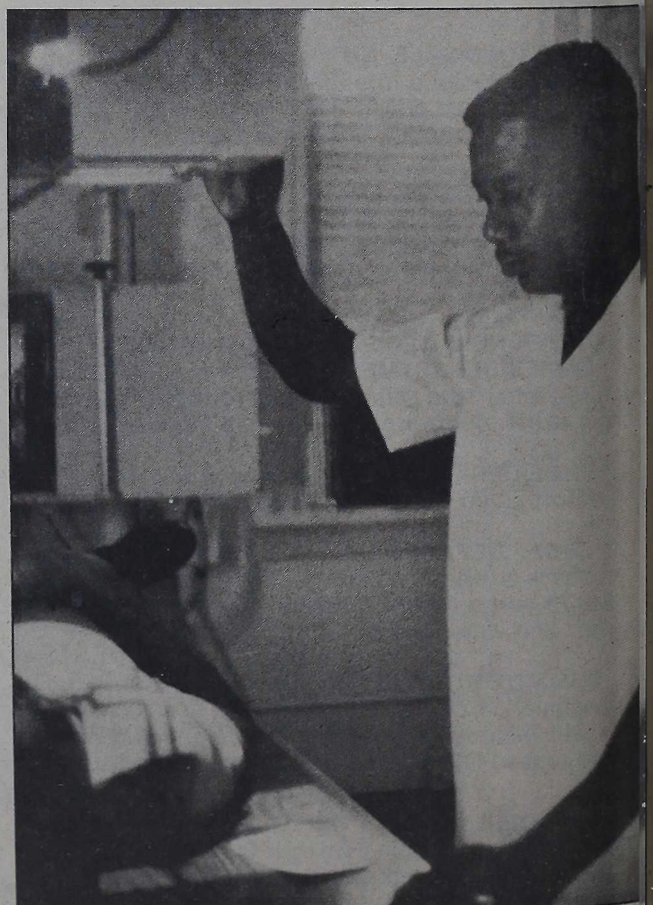
"Many of the Marines come in with knee and ankle injuries from running," said the Americus, Ga., native. "They step into holes or off curbs and injure the joints in their legs. Hand and finger injuries are also common because Marines do a lot of manual work and work involving machinery. The more activities a person is involved in, the higher the potential for injury."

In order to qualify as an X-ray technician, Idlette attended 52 weeks of school at the naval hospital in Oakland, Calif.

"The X-ray training was very good. I enjoyed it although it was quite tough," explained Idlette. "I am also qualified to put plaster casts on broken bones and place people into traction, though I spend most of my time taking X-rays."

"Sometimes it is difficult to take X-rays of people who have really bad breaks, because I know it hurts them to move into some of the positions to get the proper view of the break. But the X-rays help them to receive better treatment, and I try to emphasize that and tell them not to focus on the pain," Idlette said.

X-rays enable doctors to make better and more accurate diagnoses, and Idlette thinks he's helping people to recover from injuries faster by helping their doctor to give them the best possible treatment.

# Jungle operations

**FORT SHERMAN, Panama**—With all the jungle training 2d Battalion, 8th Marines received in Panama May 23 to June 13 you wouldn't think they had time to just hang around.

Well, the Marines of Surveillance and Target Acquisition Platoon, Headquarters and Service Company did. From helicopters, that is.

During training at the Jungle Operations and Training Command these 2d Marine Division leathernecks had the opportunity to try one of the Army's versions of vertical insertion/extraction in a jungle environment.

The Army's Jungle Operations Extraction System is a field expedient way of getting Marines and soldiers in or out of the field with available assets.

Not all units in the Marine Corps are inserted/extracted from the field in this manner. Those that are usually have a sling rope and a snap link which is all that is needed for this system.

"All you have to do is make a rappel seat with your sling rope, hook up your snap link and you're ready to go," said Sergeant Gary J. Grella, a team leader with STA Platoon.

A sling rope is 12-feet long and is tied around the waist and up under the legs for support. A snap link, which is a ring that is hooked to the front of the seat, is used to hook up to a rappel rope that is dropped from the helicopter. A second rope is also

dropped from the helicopter and hooked around the shoulders and can be adjusted for stability.

"With a combat load on your back the weight pulls you back to the horizontal position. The upper rope is adjustable and if you don't adjust it right that's where you end up . . . on your back," said Corporal Tom J. Muldowney, a team leader with STA Platoon.

The JOES system can carry four men abreast whereas the Marine Corps' SPIE Rig system can carry as many as 14 Marines.

"The problem with the JOES system is that all four men are side by side and make for a bigger target for the enemy," said Corporal Hugh W. Dibble, 22, from Niceville, Fla. and a team leader with STA Platoon. "The one good thing about the JOES system is that if your line snaps you are hooked to someone else which is a good safety feature, but I feel more comfortable with the SPIE Rig system."

The SPIE Rig system carries personnel in a stacked position, thus making a smaller target for the enemy.

"You may be a bigger target with the JOES system but you never know when the Army will come in and extract you . . . they don't have our system, but all you need is a sling and rappel rope," said Grella. "It's also fast."

Being fast is a good way of making sure these Marines don't just hang around all the time.

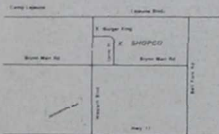

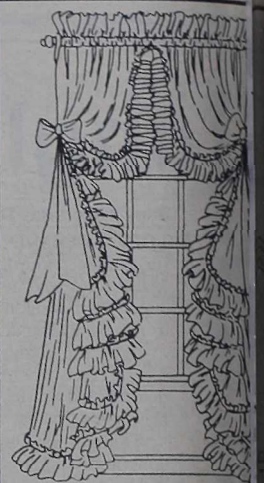

# Harrier's practice Lyman Rd. landings

Marine pilots doing short takeoffs in AV-8B Harrier jets on the deck of an aircraft carrier is exciting, but typical, as flight operations go.

But Harrier pilots practicing short takeoffs and landings on a 300-foot

stretch of Camp Lejeune's Lyman Road makes that operation anything but typical, not only to spectators, but to pilots as well.

According to Captain D. A. Hansen of Marine Attack Squadron-231 from Marine Corps Air Station Cherry Point, N.C., this is an important part of the

pilots' flight training.

"It's called Forward Based Operations," he said. "It's a Marine Corps concept that allows us (pilots) to provide a real-time combat capability to support ground combat units."

In combat the Harrier's role is to pro-

vide close air support for the infantry. Closer these aircraft can operate to a combat unit, the more support they are able to provide.

"We can operate from almost any location," said Hansen. "We don't necessarily need a runway or any other facilities. All we need is an area to park, reload (bombs) and gas."

As part of their combat readiness training syllabus, the pilots have to do four landings on this two-lane highway. At a speed of about 45 knots (nautical miles per hour), the pilots set up the plane for a Rolling Vertical Landing.

"The plane handles very well," said Hansen, "but you still have to be precise, very accurate."

This is the first time VMA-231 has been able to fly here, although VMA-231 has flown here before with the Harrier.

"This training is for the moving target situation. Because we don't require a lot of space, we can operate from anywhere, and it makes it difficult for an enemy to track us down," he said. "The Harrier works very well."

The squadron tries to provide training for the pilots about twice a month and so far 16 of the squadron's 25 pilots have qualified.

"This kind of flying is exciting, although all our training is really ground-based," said Hansen. But, this requires a lot of precision and it makes us all better pilots.

"If a pilot can handle this," Hansen said, "I think they can just about handle any other flying situation they come across."

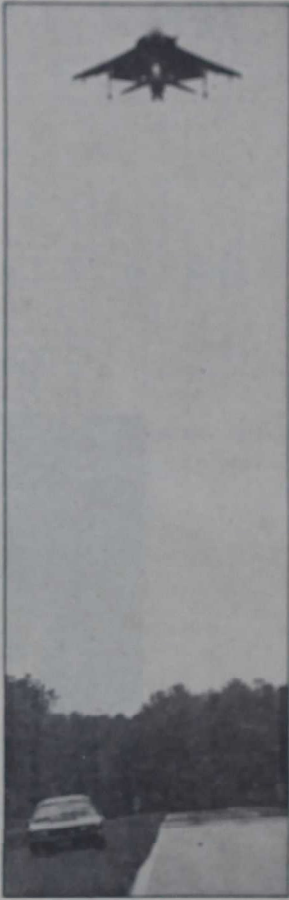

# USO outreach program matches needs with help

The wife of a young Marine lance corporal sits alone in her trailer. The fan blows hot, sticky air—there isn't enough money to run the air conditioner. Her two small children are crying, there aren't enough groceries and payday isn't for 10 more days. Her husband is on a ship and she's lonely. And she doesn't know where to turn for help.

She only needs to look as far as the USO.

Starr Hudson is the director of the USO's Outreach Program, which she says is "a referral program linking the military and civilian communities."

"What I try to do is find these wives who are isolated and don't know where to find assistance," she said. "I visit a lot of the trailer parks and apartment complexes and just knock on doors."

Hudson said the problem of many military wives left alone in the area is relatively new.

"A generation ago, when the husbands deployed, the wives went home to their families. Now, a large number of them stay in the area. They're stuck at home with little money. I try to direct them to agencies that can help them. I refer them to Navy Relief for budgeting problems, the Red Cross for emergencies, and I also direct them to civilian agencies such as Social Services."

Hudson works about 30 hours a week in the Outreach Program, and volunteers several days a week at the Red Cross.

"Between my two jobs, I see a lot of people who need help. Many women are afraid to ask for help because they think it makes them disloyal to their

husbands," she said. "I try to make them see that isn't true. I'm even willing to go pick someone up who doesn't have transportation and direct them to help."

Although she has no formal training in social work, her interest in helping others came from previous Social Services jobs and her experience in "just living."

"I am not qualified to counsel people, only to listen if they need a friend. I do know who is qualified to help them, so I can send them in the right direction," she said.

The most common problem she sees is people not able to manage money.

"Many young couples grew up with a lot of things, and they now want those things too," she said. "They don't realize it took their parents 20 years to obtain all those things. They can get credit so easily here, but they don't realize money only stretches so far. Some of them will have a nice car and stereo, and after they pay their monthly charge bills, don't have money left for groceries."

Hudson has also started a weekly wives meeting where women can get together with others in similar situations. "We meet each Thursday at the USO from 1 to 3 p.m.," she said. "It's a place where we can talk, make new friends and meet others who understand," she said. "I also have scheduled a counselor to talk once a month about how to deal with stress. What I want these women to know is that they're in a unique situation, but they're not alone. There are a lot of people who care."

### Special Services saves by fixing, not replacing

In its daily job of providing Marines here with entertainment, Base Special Services has spent many dollars on furniture.

Pool and foosball tables are placed in barracks, chairs are needed poolside and babies sleep on mattresses at the child care centers. When these items become worn or broken it's expensive to replace them. Instead, they are repaired.

The job of repairing various Special Service's furniture goes to the Furniture Repair Shop.

"Besides fixing the pool tables and foosball tables," said "Red" Richardson, shop supervisor, "we also make curtains, maintain camping gear such as trailer and boat seats and fix miscellaneous furniture in the Hostess House and child care centers."

"Another thing we do that most people aren't aware of, is build PVC plastic pipe furniture from scratch. This furniture is used around pools and other recreational areas," said Tony Kerns, furniture repairman.

With three employees including the supervisor, Richardson and his shop spends most of their time installing or fixing pool and foosball tables.

"On pool tables we can replace the fabric and fix the rails and other components," said Richardson. "The fabric is replaced by gluing or stapling. Foosball tables require us to replace the rods and men that get bent or broken during use. We can also replace other minor components on these tables."

Getting the tables from the barracks to the workshop can be time consuming for the Furniture Repair Shop. Richardson, since he only has three people, often asks the companies to bring the broken items to him. Occasionally, he has to go get the table himself.

"Units with pool and foosball tables haven't been reporting minor damages to us because they think the repair bill will come from their special services party fund," said Richardson. "A little rip is easy to fix, but if they wait until it becomes



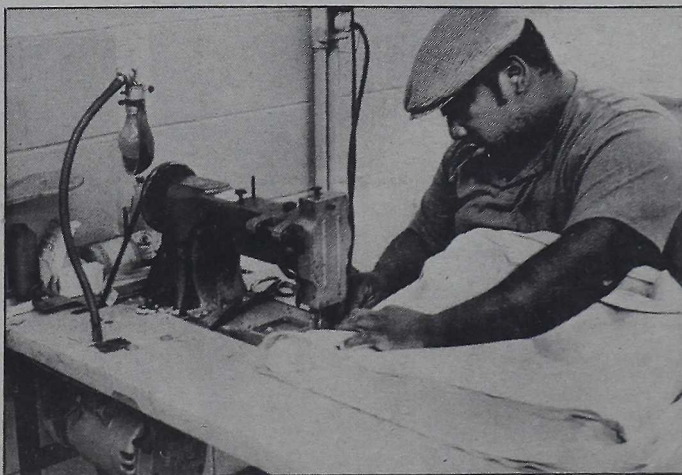

a big tear it will cost much more to repair. The money to fix special services furniture comes from the base budget, so units should bring their items in and have minor repairs fixed as soon as possible."

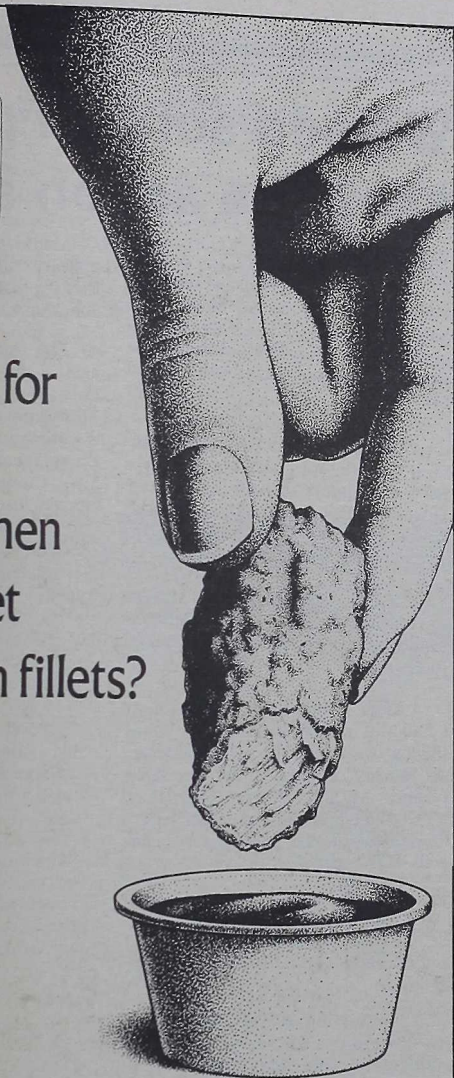
Repairing furniture instead of replacing it saves money. Just how much money this shop saves the base is hard to determine in exact dollars and cents.

"I don't know exactly how much money we save the base," said Kerns, "but it's a good bit. Fixing a pool table out in town costs \$200. Our fixing it on base costs \$65. If you multiply that by 250 pool tables on base, you can get a good idea of the money we save the base."

Saving money on furniture can leave money for other entertainment projects. And keeping Marines entertained is what Special Services is all about.

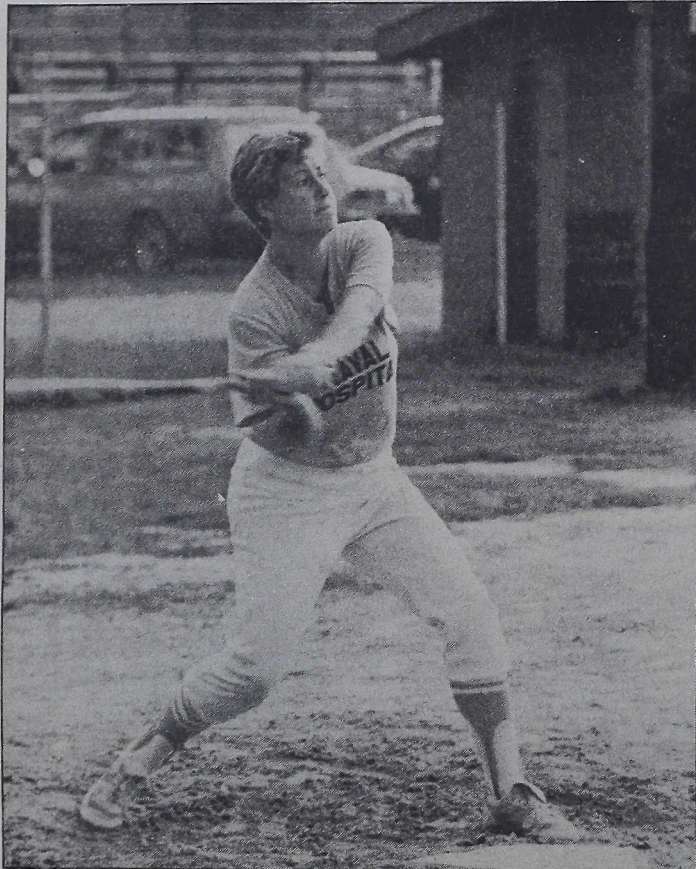

The all-stars' bats became formidable against their next opponent Air Force Base. Flawless defense added to the outstanding performance as they stumped Pope 7-4.

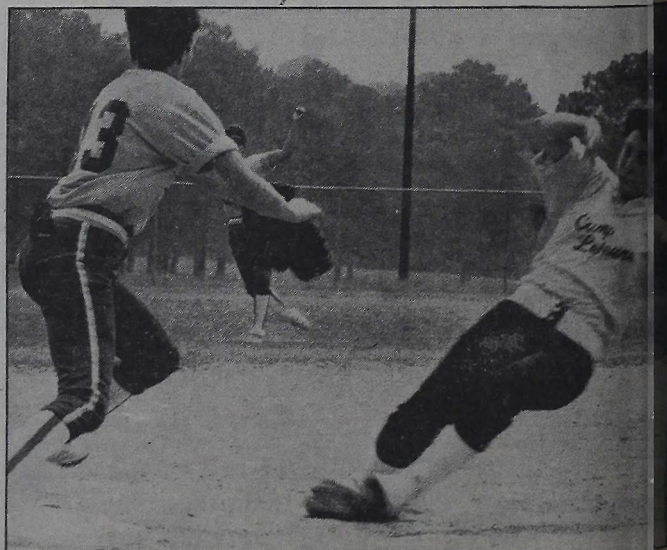
The games against New River and Cherry Point Air Station were rescheduled because of rain. Cherry Point will be hosting the next tournament Saturday.

"I coached these same players all season and their talent speaks for itself. They are the Division, FMFLant and Regional champs for 1986!" Johnson exclaimed.

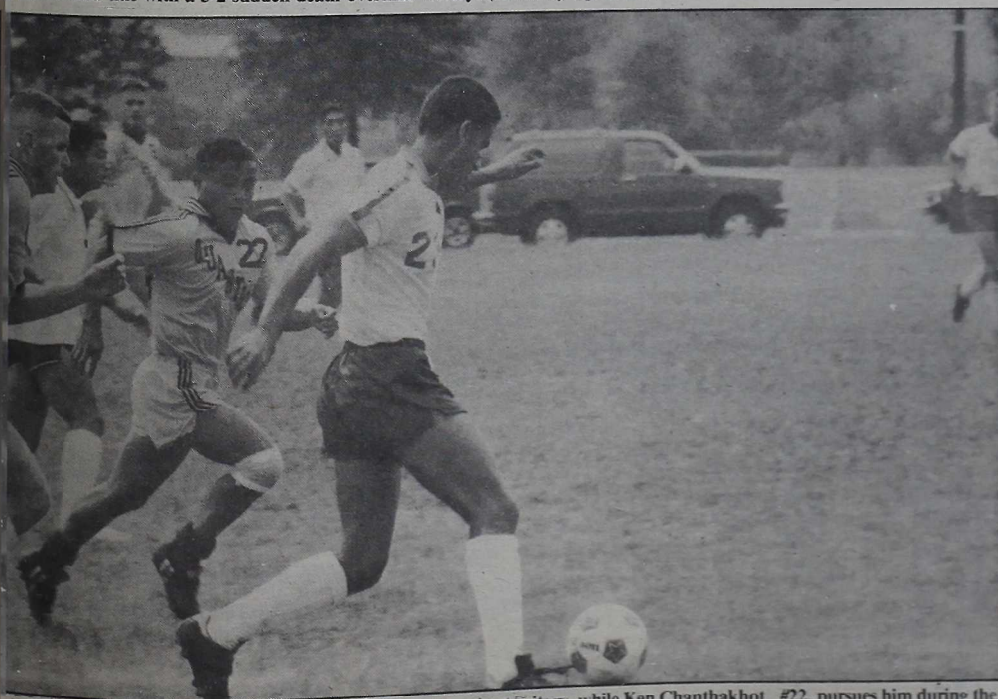

East Coast Regional Softball will be held July 2 at Camp Lejeune.

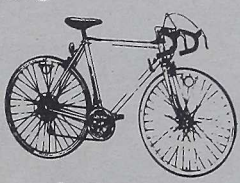
