## Cassity picked for second star

Brigadier General J. Edward Cassity, commander of the 2d Force Service Support Group here, was selected for promotion to major general, the Pentagon announced Jan. 31.

Cassity, who is commanded the 2d FSSG at Camp Lejeune since July 2, 1985, was one of six Marine Corps brigadier generals chosen for promotion to two-star rank.

"I am obviously pleased to have been selected for promotion to major general," said Cassity in hearing of the announcement. There is certainly some self-satisfaction when something good like this happens to you.

"However," he continued, "it causes me to reflect on all the support I have had through the years. This is particularly true of the superb organization I am privileged to command at this time."

Cassity credits the Marines and sailors of the 2d Force Service Support Group as being instrumental in the accomplishment of his personal success.

"The motivation and professional competence of the Marines and sailors of the 2d Force Service Support Group makes me proud every day," he said. "It serves as a reminder to me of just how fortunate I am and have been throughout my career to serve with the best."

Cassity has been serving as a Marine officer since his commissioning as a second lieutenant in January 1957. He has served in a variety of posts in the logistics field since beginning his career.

Brigadier Generals John R. Bailey, Carl E. Mundy, Jr., Ernest T. Cook, Jr., John P. Conahan and Richard A. Gustafson also were selected for promotion.

Shoppers at the Main Exchange here can now use their Visa or Master Card to make purchases.

The exchange began accepting the credit cards Jan. 29. These are the only cards to be accepted by the exchange.

Currently only the Main Exchange is accepting the cards, but the practice will expand to include Cash Sales, Automotive Repair and the Air Station Exchange.

"The use of credit cards gives the consumer a lot more flexibility in making purchases," said Lieutenant Colonel D. Robinson Jr., exchange officer. "The cards add an extra dimension to the quality of life of Marines, sailors and their family members because they give them instant possession of a product they otherwise may have to put on layaway or do without."

"I like the idea of being able to use my credit card in the exchange," said Corporal John K. Rasey, Headquarters Company, Headquarters Battalion, 2d Marine Division. "It's more convenient than writing a check."

A credit limit will be established by the financial institution of the card held. Sears Financial Institute, which handles Marine Corps credit, is modifying its computers to tie into the terminals at the exchange.

The new system, once installed, will be able to approve or disapprove credit purchase in three seconds.

## Marines in earrings?!

Like many of us, I enjoy a relaxing moment at one of the entertainment establishments here in Jacksonville. On this particular evening I observed a young Marine standing by the hatch proudly displaying his favorite earrings in his left ear. That's correct! Earrings, as in two, in the same lobe.

Now, being a firm believer that earrings should be reserved for the female gender and my neighbor's Cabbage Patch doll, I felt it was my duty as a Marine, regardless of rank, to enlighten this individual of the Base order prohibiting such actions. I identified myself, asked to see his ID card and was informed he had left his in his car. With his attitude, and my frustration mounting (believe me, the hairs on my back were standing at attention), I figured I should use some other avenue of approach. I excused myself from the lounge and asked the door monitor for assistance. She directed me to security where I was met by two Marine SNCOs who were working part-time for the establishment. Somehow I foolishly thought we, the Corps, had an understanding with the civilian community and they would actually assist us in discharging our duties. Discharge they did. They said "sorry, our jurisdiction is only limited to downtown Court Street."

Maybe things have changed. For one reason or the other, I just can't believe that no one sees this flagrant display of improper attire before it reaches off-base. And what about the moonlighting SNCOs who support the establishment's decisions. Where is their loyalty? (Apparently in their off-duty paychecks.)

Perhaps I could invite unit commanders to be my guests and we could visually identify these "Marines" and "take names" together. Maybe the first sergeants and their company gunnys would like to come. I'll even pay the cover charge. They say Sunday night is "Punk Night."

## PMO response

The frustration and helplessness experienced by Warrant Officer Rhoden while attempting to relax in a local "entertainment establishment" is understandable considering the circumstances. However, all best intentions are sometimes flawed by failing to foresee the consequences of one's actions.

WO Rhoden assumed the individual standing in the lounge was a Marine, a logical conclusion in many cases. However, the law does not allow for this presumption or conclusion and Military Police are prohibited from asking for identification in areas in which we lack authority or jurisdiction.

The Military Police Town Patrol (courtesy patrol) was formed to assist Marines and sailors who have violated state and city ordinances within the Court Street area of Jacksonville. It is critical to understand the Town Patrol responds only to requests from local police and under no circumstances initiates an apprehension or corrective action until the civilian police have positively identified the individual as a Marine or sailor.

The town patrol assist Marines and sailors who have violated minor offenses with the understanding the offender will be returned to his command. The close working relationship enjoyed with local police has prevented an unknown number of Marines and sailors from spending the night in jail, not to mention the legal and monetary ramifications associated with a court appearance.

Warrant Officer Rhoden, your frustration is shared by many, including many of my military policemen. Improper attire violations are visibly apparent on any weekend in local shopping centers. However, I would suggest the possibility of recording the state vehicle registration, if appropriate, and allowing the military police to contact the individual and his command.

Military Police are keenly aware of the uniform regulations pertaining to appropriate civilian attire and there is hardly a week that goes by that a number of Marines and sailors are stopped by military police and issued offense reports for wearing earrings.

Please be assured the military police will continue efforts enforcing violations of the uniform regulations as well as acts violating military law.

## Fund raisers for memorial to start soon

Community leaders are heading to Jacksonville for a 1986 effort to complete Jacksonville's Beirut Memorial project with an ambitious schedule of activities designed to accomplish that goal.

Abe Rosen, chairman of the newly formed Beirut Memorial Project Committee, said the 16-member citizen task force is dedicated to completing the original project "without cutting back, without cutting corners."

Conceived immediately following the tragic bombing of Marine headquarters in the war-torn Lebanese capital, the project consisted of several phases.

The first—the planting of growing pear trees along Lejeune in Jacksonville was completed on schedule.

Phase two—a memorial park with a statue to be located adjacent to the Camp Johnson gate—has not yet been completed.

"Presently, we have approximately \$105,000 in the Beirut Memorial bank account," said Rosen. "The anticipated total cost of the Beirut Memorial is roughly \$190,000. Between the formation of the committee at the request of the city council in January and April 15, 1986, we were to have completed the fund raising effort."

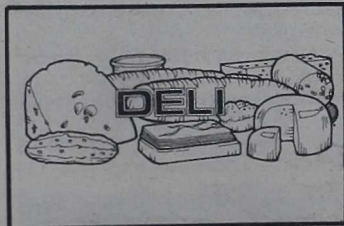
All 16 committee members were personally soliciting contributions from businessmen and residents of Onslow County. Special events designed to raise funds are planned for the coming spring.

For instance, a golf tournament, 10-kilometer run and other activities will be announced as the weather warms.

"The project is extremely important to all of us in Jacksonville," Rosen said. "We feel those men who gave their lives were a part of us, a part of our community, and we will complete the project as a fitting tribute to them as members of our community."

## Mess Hall 508 reopens, offering fast food line, deli

After nearly two months of remodeling, Mess Hall 508, located on 'N' Street, reopened on Jan. 22, offering Marines a fast food line.

The line offers hamburgers, hotdogs, ribs, chicken fillet and fish sandwiches. In addition to fast food, the mess hall offers an added attraction—a deli.

From the deli, Marines can order

sandwiches made with ham, salami, bologna, roast beef, corn beef, turkey and three types of cheese. In addition, the mess hall now features a 64-item salad bar and an ice cream parlor with 12 flavors.

"We have been busy since we opened," said Chief Warrant Officer-3 Lloyd V. Lee, division food services operation officer. "We have an average of 800 Marines eating here at each meal and expect that number to

rise to 1,500 in the near future."

The mess hall is open to all Marines aboard the base. Marines have a choice of eating meals inside the mess hall or ordering it to go.

Breakfast is served from 5 a.m. to 7 a.m. Lunch is from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. and dinner follows from 3 p.m. to 6 p.m. The mess hall works on a five-day week, Monday through Friday, and is closed on weekends and holidays.

## EOD recovers Civil War ordnance

Marines from the Explosive ordnance disposal unit recently helped recover a piece of vintage Civil War ordnance found in the Cape Fear River.

The EOD team is still in the process of positively identifying the ordnance. Weighing between 150-200 pounds, the oblong-shaped artillery round was found by a dredge company in Cape Fear earlier this week. The ordnance was sucked up and caught in the dredge machinery called an impeller.

"The hardest part of this job was dislodging it," said Sergeant Dennis G. Fikejs, EOD technician. Fikejs was part of a two-man team responding to a Coast Guard call alerting the team of possible live ordnance.

The EOD answers similar calls from civilian authorities several times a

month. "We find approximately one a year," said Leslie Bright, Underwater Archeologist, North Carolina Department of Cultural Resources. "Shrimpers seem to find the most," he added.

After the ordnance was recovered, it was transported to the EOD unit for further evaluation.

The two-foot long, rust-covered ordnance is in a secured storage area, until it can be positively identified and rendered safe.

"We're always learning in our unit. We research everything as much as we can," said Fikejs. "I wish I could run over to the Naval EOD Technology Center and research this ordnance," he added. The Naval EOD School and Technology Center is in Indian Head, Maryland.

"As far as we've determined, the ordnance probably contains black powder and is possibly water-logged," said Fikejs.

EOD suspects the ordnance is a Reed-Parrot projectile, named after the designers of that particular style for that period in time.

But Bright suspects differently. "The nose of the ordnance is larger than the Reed-Parrot design," he said.

The EOD unit expressed some doubt as to how long it would take to positively identify the ordnance. Until such time that it is positively identified the old ordnance is under tight security.

The North Carolina Department of Cultural Resources has expressed interest in obtaining the ordnance for display in one of several area museums.

You've spent several years as an enlisted Marine or sailor. You enjoy the challenges of your job, but think you'd like to tackle an even greater challenge—becoming an officer.

Perhaps you are eligible for an appointment to the U.S. Naval Academy or the U.S. Naval Academy Preparatory School.

Each year, the Secretary of the Navy is authorized to appoint 85 enlisted Marines and sailors to seats at the Naval Academy. But the competition for those appointments is stiff.

An appointment to the academy offers the opportunity to earn a Bachelor of Science degree and a commission in the regular Marine Corps or Navy. The appointee is then obligated to spend five years on active duty after commissioning.

While attending the academy, students wear the rank of midshipman. They also receive one-half a second

lieutenant's or ensign's pay, approximately \$6,800 a year.

To be appointed a midshipman, you must:

- ✓ be a U.S. citizen,
- ✓ be at least 17 years old, but not past your 22d birthday on July 1 of the academy reporting year,
- ✓ show academic achievement by graduating in the top 40 percent of your high school class and receive recommendations from high school authorities,
- ✓ be in excellent physical condition,
- ✓ be unmarried with no dependents,
- ✓ be of high moral character,
- ✓ be motivated toward a career as an officer in the Naval service, and
- ✓ have spent one year enlisted in the service prior to July 1 of the academy entering year.

Each applicant has to be recommended by his or her commanding of-

ficer.

Although many enlisted Marines and sailors can be selected to go directly to the academy, many enter the academy after first attending the military preparatory school.

The U.S. Naval Academy Preparatory School in Newport, R.I., is designed to prepare academy for the physical and academic rigors of the academy. The prep school offers a nine-month curriculum of academics, athletics, and military-related training. Marines and sailors attend the prep school receive the full pay and allowances of their present rank. However, upon completing the prep school program, the candidates are not automatically admitted to the academy.

Marines and sailors interested in applying for an academy or prep school appointment should see Marine Corps Order 1530.11E, available at the Education Center, Bldg. 63.

A single FPCA is valid for all elections in the

calendar year. Party affiliation must be stated in order to vote in this primary election.

## Leathernecks' lives depend on 'dead time training'

There is no such thing as dead time in the training cycle of a front-line combat unit preparing for deployment. Lives depend on thorough training.

When Gunnery Sergeant Charles Klenowski recently took his 30 Dragon platoon Marines to Camp Lejeune's G-3 range for a live-fire training opportunity, half his men had just joined Weapons Company, 1st Battalion, 6th

Marine Regiment. Since the unit is scheduled to deploy soon, wasted training time is something the platoon sergeant's new Marines cannot afford. "Some of my section leaders have plenty of experience," Klenowski said.

"Tonight we have seven Dragon rounds to fire, and it's an opportunity to train people on the AN/TAS infrared night tracker. The experienced Dragon gunners will work one-on-one with the new Marines to make better use of the experience that is available."

Corporal Roger Vandall, a team leader, wasted no time in holding classes, though his classroom consisted of a cleared spot under skinny trees and drizzling rain.

The night tracker system for Dragon gunners is a 26-pound operation resembling a pop art version of standard binoculars. Using an infrared system, it allows gunners to locate targets out to 1,000 meters and hit enemy armor when least expected in the dark of night.

"The key to the whole thing is the cooler cartridge," Vandall explained while waiting for the sky to darken to night for live-fire segment of their trip to the field.

"The cooler cartridge keeps the whole thing operating by running a fan system inside the tracker. Without it, the system overheats and you can use it for long. Fresh batteries and a fresh cooler cartridge will keep you in business."

Two gun teams, each consisting of a Dragon gunner and his assistant, practiced installing batteries and a cartridge on the night tracker, then ran pre-operation checks on the system to make sure they knew how it functioned. Many had not handled it before.

Limited supplies of cooler cartridges and batteries for the night sight, however, prevented the Dragon platoon Marines from practicing with the high-tech system when the sun went down.

The short life span of the batteries and cooler cartridges in cold weather often makes training with them impractical and expensive. The system functions best in warm weather where battery components can maintain an electrical charge.

Instead, 81mm mortar crews a few miles away fired illumination rounds to light targets on the G-3 range for the Dragon gunners. High winds made it a difficult task during the night, and only three of seven rounds could be fired in darkness.

With clear skies, a biting wind and chilling temperatures the following morning, four gun teams settled into the sand on G-3's firing line and selected targets downrange.

Using the night tracker for two shots, inexperienced gunners scored direct hits on targets 400 meters and 300 meters away. Rusting hulks of crapped heavy machinery rocked under the blast of the Dragon's armor-piercing bite. The last two shots were red with the day tracking system, and gain massive destruction was immediate.

According to Staff Sergeant Alvin eBlanc, a section leader in the platoon, every moment is valuable to his Marines.

"There's a lot to learn when you're in an outfit on the move," he said, and the fact the move entails leaving Camp Lejeune means using every mo-

ment constructively. Every mistake at Camp Lejeune is a learning experience in a place where Marines can afford mistakes. That isn't true once you're deployed."

Live-fire training on safe ranges

here, and the outdoor classroom sessions crammed between "hot" range schedules, helps each Marine in the Weapons Company and Dragon platoon team know his place, function and importance in accomplishing the

mission.

During the visit, the association members toured a static display of modern weapons at the 2d Tank Battalion tank yard. On display were some of the latest additions to the Corps' arsenal. Two examples were the 9mm Beretta pistol and the M60E3 machinegun, which is replacing the heavier version used during the Vietnam War.

The modern weapons on static display gained the respect of the WWII vets, but that seemed insignificant compared with the respect the vets earned from the younger Marines as they told of experiences against the Japanese.

One of the Association members, Joseph Seborowski from Baltimore, Md. said he came to Camp Lejeune in 1942 when it was still called Tent City.

"Back then we got \$21 a month," Seborowski said. "Now I make twice that in one day. Back then we didn't have the modern technology to produce equipment as Marines do today. All the armor we had was a khaki shirt. Marines haven't changed, though, when it comes to patriotism."

Hruska shared his opinion of today's Marines.

"I feel the Corps will always be the best. I also feel the Corps is better today than it ever has been, both in people and equipment. It's good to see Marines of the present with the technology to handle the future."

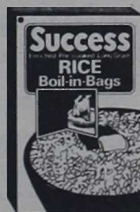

### Rifle coaches instruct Marines in art of better marksmanship

The skill of hitting a target accurately at 500 yards with a rifle isn't something you are born with . . . it's something you are taught.

And like any other skill, it loses its edge if not practiced.

Refreshing a Marine's mind and developing proper techniques essential to accurate shooting is the daily responsibility of the rifle range coach.

Coaches, like Marine riflemen, are not born with the skill to coach—they also are taught.

The Rifle Range Coaches School here places great emphasis on the basic training of Marines. If the coach doesn't learn to do his job well, neither will the rifleman.

The coaches school is a compact seven-day program taught at the Camp Lejeune rifle range. The school teaching process includes the students actually firing and qualifying with the weapons they will be required to coach with in the future.

"The coaches school reminded me of snap-in week when I was a shooter," said Lance Corporal Kathryn Fogarty of Headquarters Company, Headquarters Battalion, 2d Marine Division. "Coaching students go through snap-in classes and later we fire the weapons for qualification. However, throughout the course emphasis is placed on correct shooting and coaching techniques. The idea behind the training is if you can't do it, you can't teach it."

The future coaches are also taught such fundamental classes as basic marksmanship, coaching techniques, zeroing the M16A2 rifle and the .45 caliber pistol, proper sight pictures, trigger control and shooting positions. The basics are covered in detail. A class on stance, position and grip is given so

coaches can teach shooters to fire better scores with the .45.

The classes don't stop there. Additional technical classes covered breath control, mechanical training, stoppages and malfunctions, effects of weather, safety, cleaning and care of small arms, are also covered in depth.

The coaches realize everything they learn must be taught to students. That is why the school trains the coaches in a certain way—the same way the coaches are supposed to teach the shooter. Getting back to the basics and teaching the way you were taught is the name of the game at the coaches school.

A recently-graduated coaches class listened to Brigadier General Joseph B. Knotts, commanding general, Marine Corps Base, as he spoke in the rifle range gym and emphasized the importance of their new jobs.

"For those of you graduating, you are to be congratulated. You are needed in the Marine Corps because of the emphasis on getting back to basics regarding marksmanship," the general said. "I can never recall seeing a tank, airplane or artillery piece take a hill. It always took a Marine and his rifle in combination with the others to take a hill. A Marine with a rifle is worthless if he can't hit his mark. That's where you coaches come in."

The point BGen. Knotts made on getting back to basics in marksmanship was emphasized by the Commandant of the Marine Corps, General Paul X. Kelley, in White Letter 17-85. In the letter, the commandant said, "the ultimate goal is simple . . . Marines must be able to hit their targets."

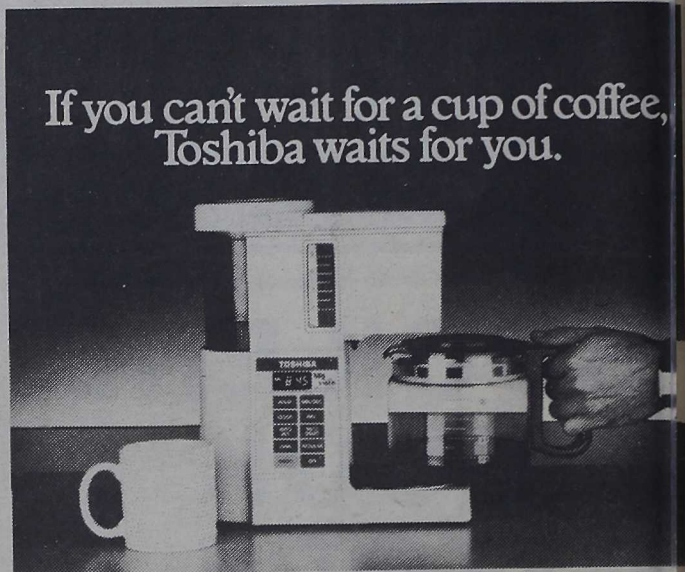
For the Rifle Range Coaches School here, this goal has become their marching orders and final objective. Bull's-eye!

## Leathernecks practice loading up, moving out

Driving a vehicle aboard an aircraft might seem a relatively simple procedure, but Headquarters Battalion, 2d Marine Division Leathernecks recently discovered that the 'abc's' of the road, don't necessarily apply here.

As part of a static loading exercise (LOADEX) conducted Jan. 25-26 at Marine Corps Air Station, Cherry Point, division staff and headquarters battalion elements loaded and unloaded various tactical equipment aboard an Air Force C-5A Galaxy.

Master Sergeant M. P. Friedland, head loadmaster with 3d MAS. "We had tires spinning and drivers panicking."

For Lance Corporal Maurice Starfield, Service Company, HqBn., the most difficult part of the training was securing the loads to aircraft. Instead of just chaining the vehicle down, as he had expected, Alexander discovered there are many ways to perform this task, but only one which works properly.

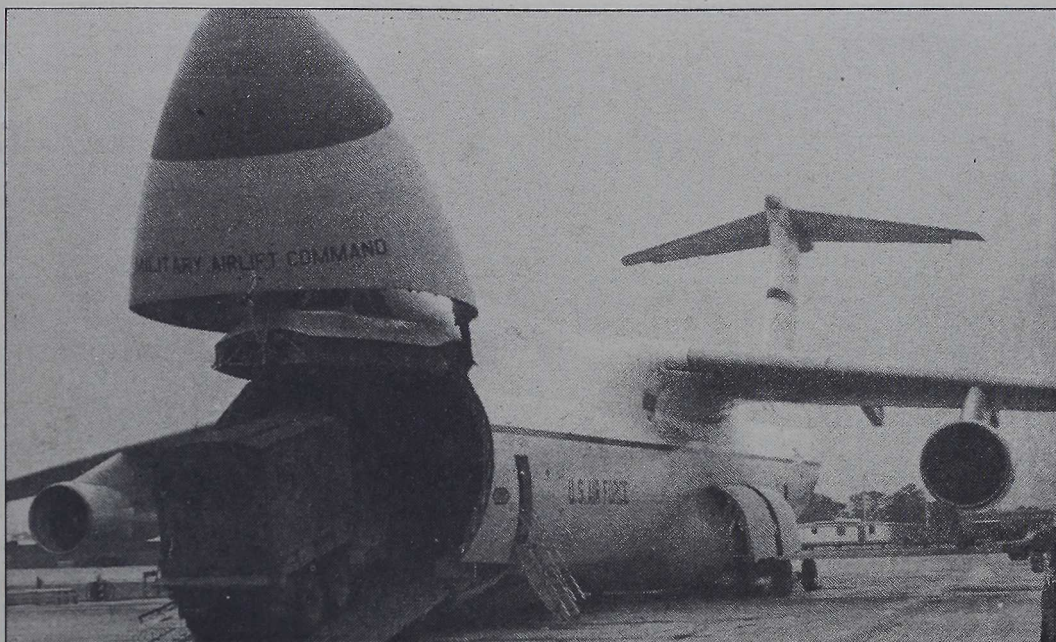
"If you chain them down wrong, an unsecured vehicle can cause a whole lot of problems inside a plane," he said, "especially if it's in the air."

Although division Marines have participated in loading exercises of this kind numerous times, headquarters battalion Leathernecks, according to Lieutenant Colonel W. E. Rollings, officer-in-charge of the exercise, rarely have an opportunity to participate.

"Many division Marines deploy, but we in the headquarters elements seldom do," Rollings said. "Therefore, we don't get the chance to train like this. The weather may not be as nice as we'd like, but you wouldn't be able to tell it by the way these Marines are having at it."

The loadmasters praised headquarters battalion Marines on their abilities to take instruction, follow instructions, and accomplish everything required.

## Marines learn formula for confidence, motivation at Squad Leaders Course

It sounds like a formula.

At Division Schools Squad Leaders Course, leadership begets confidence. Confidence results in motivation.

"Leaders who know their jobs are confident because confident men are motivated," said Lieutenant Colonel David F. Bice, director of Division Schools.

The goal of the Squad Leaders Course is to provide experience and knowledge to leaders of infantrymen in combat, Bice said. To meet that goal, the course relies on its instructors.

Staff Sergeant J. A. Mason, an instructor, sums it up best: "It is not enough for a Marine to get from point A to B. We teach our Marines not only how to get from A to B, but how to move on from B to C."

Instructors take the students from A to B by humping the Leathernecks out to a tactical landing zone. They are then taken from B to C by participating in a training exercise as soon as they get there.

"We simulate a wartime environment by making our Leathernecks

work after they're tired. That is when real leadership is called upon," Bice said.

"What it takes to develop leadership traits is to put them under stress to begin with, then get down to the business at hand. That is the common thread in each class we teach. We take them beyond themselves and into the welfare of their own men through responsibility, self-reliance, mental and physical toughness."

Instructors, made up primarily of sergeants, serve as examples of what a squad leader should be.

"It's leadership through example at its best," Bice said.

"The tactical knowledge our instructors have is unbelievable. You name it, they know it," said Lance Corporal Douglas H. Eckendork, a student in the course.

"First we have classroom training, then we have practical applications. It is then your capabilities are tested and your body is taxed," he said.

But when the course is completed, the students know they've been given the best training available. The rest is up to them.

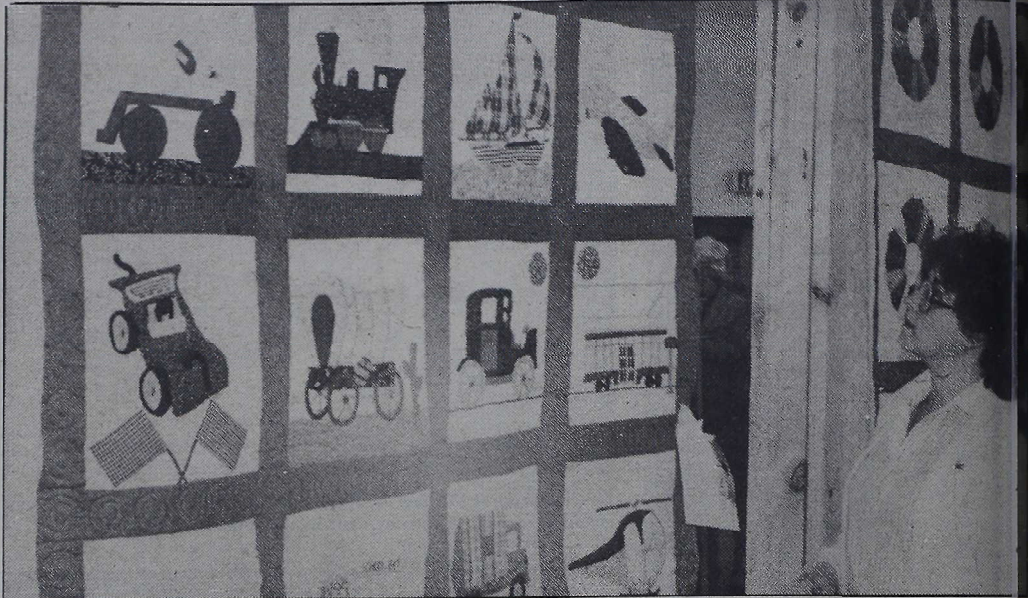
The two-day show featured a display of antique quilts and more than 80 pieces of quiltwork made or owned by quilters from all over eastern North Carolina.

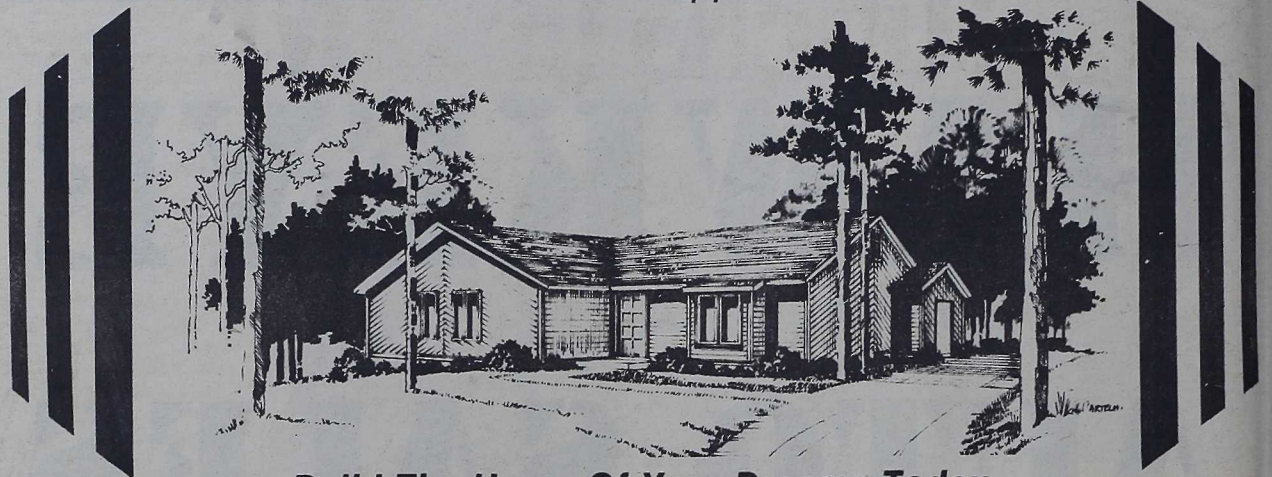

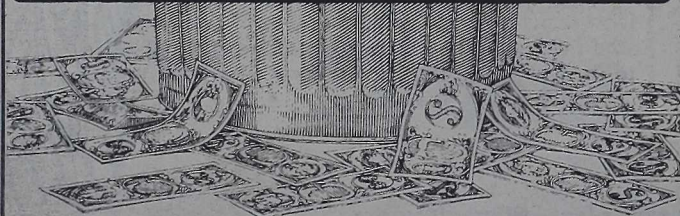

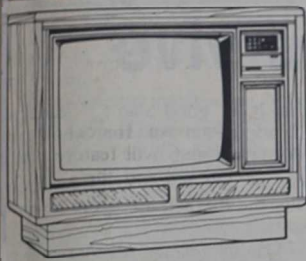

## Marine Boxers: Only the strong survive

Six Camp Lejeune boxers who were on the All-Marine boxing team last year are training for the team again this year.

All-Marine boxing matches will be

held at the Goettge Memorial Field House Feb. 17-21. At that time the six Camp Lejeune boxers will put their months of training on the line in hopes of another seat on the team.

The life of a fighter who pursues

the title of All-Marine spends countless hours training to obtain his goal.

The boxers start off their day with a three to five mile run. In the afternoon they meet in the gym for two hours of calisthenics and sparing. "We're

already in good shape," said Lance Corporal Paul Johnson, who won All-Marine and inner-service title year at 139 pounds. "Ring training helps me sharpen up before we get fights."

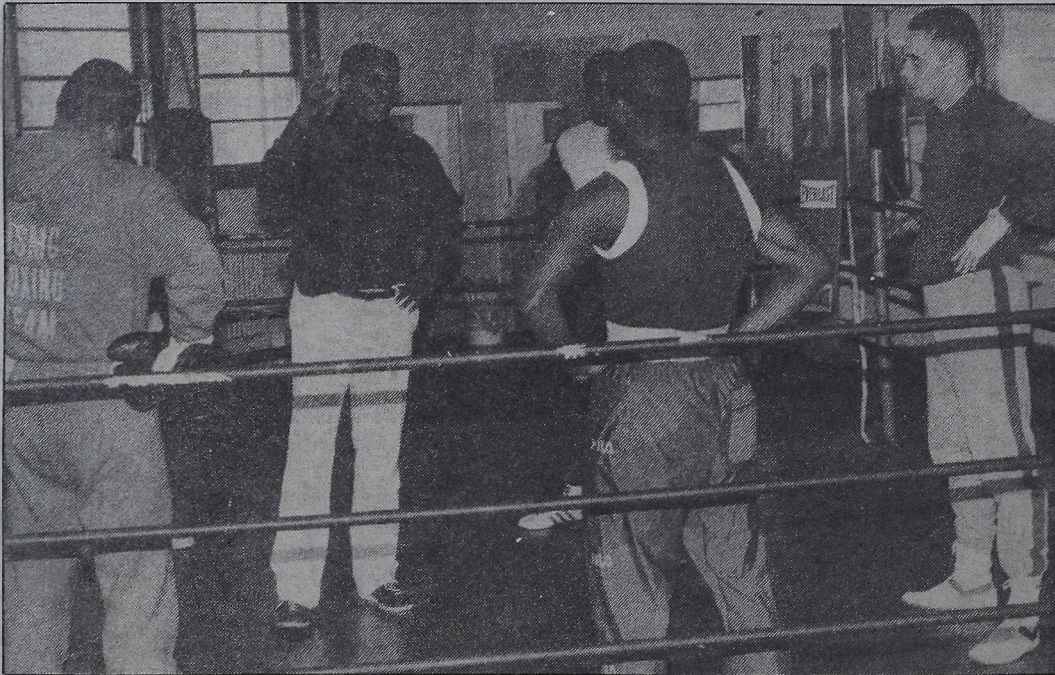
The six former All-Marine boxers know their foes are out there. "I know them running and keeping in shape," said Johnson, the 22-year-old boxer from Oakland, Calif. "It reminds me that I have to work hard all the time."

There are also three Marines from Camp Pendleton practicing with Lejeune boxers. Like most people who enjoy what they are doing, they are hoping for orders to stay with the team should they make it.

Lance Corporal Terry King, 21, is one of them. Fighting at 147 pounds, King was a silver medalist last year at the All-Marine matches. He lost to number two rated amateur in the country.

"When I work out I have to remind myself how bad I want to win," said King, who started his boxing in his hometown of Nashville, Tenn. "It's a great way to relieve my tension and I can go home feeling good along with keeping in shape."

Up until last week the boxers have been training themselves, but they received a boost of inspiration from J. C. Davis who came in to help them improve. Davis has trained professionals such as Ken Norton and Leon Spinks and he can help train some more winners.

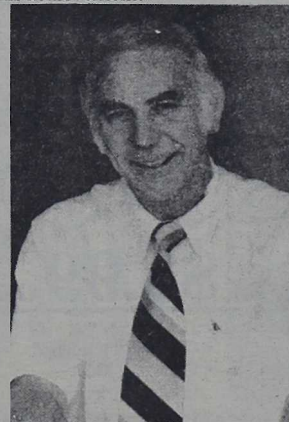

He added eight more, giving him 21 on the night, but six of his second half points came from the line.

Brown battled fiercely under boards with Price and Mason, but yanked twice in the second half favor of George Thigpen. Thigpen brought Henderson Hall within 10 points at the 13:30 mark, but Cherry Point rallied eight unanswered points and rebuilt their lead to 69-58.

Cherry Point's Christopher Beasly plagued the Henderson hall team scoring 28 on the evening, and Mason exploded for 18 second half points giving him 20.

Clemmie Johnson and Clark Franklin picked up some of the slack the second half for Henderson scoring 20 and 19 respectively, but was not enough as they dropped out of the game of the tournament so far.

Henderson Hall downed 2d FSS MCAS Beaufort and Marine Corps Base, Camp Lejeune while Cherry Point has rolled over Quantico, Parris Island and 2d Marine Division in the tournament.

Cherry Point has now guaranteed themselves a spot in the final versus Henderson Hall awaits to play the winner between MCAS New River and Marine Division. These games have been decided after press time.

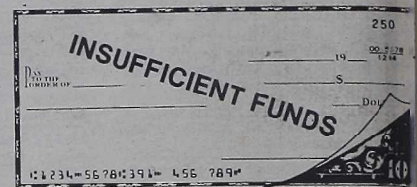
