

September is Suicide Prevention
Month, and it reminds us how
important caring for your mental
health should be. The Applied Suicide
Intervention Skills Team (ASIST)
aboard the Nimitz-class aircraft carrier
USS George Washington (CVN 73)
is here to make Sailors aware of the
resources that are available to them.

"For Sailors living on the ship, it is easy to focus hard on your work and not give yourself the rest and relaxation to get into the next day or week," said Intelligence Specialist Seaman Cole Militano, a member of ASIST aboard George Washington. "ASIST makes an effort outside of normal work life, collaterals, and personal gain to make it clear that you are not just a number."

ASIST is a growing team with members from all walks of life with at least one thing in common, their desire to help shipmates cope with depression and suicide. Members complete e-learning courses, attend monthly trainings, and conduct meet and greets as part of ASIST training.

Sailors can find help through their chain of command, scheduling appointments with the chaplain, or talking with an ASIST member.



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"Mental health is important because there are those who are struggling and too prideful, stubborn, or afraid to seek help," said Militano. "I've lost friends to suicide growing up. You have to stay strong and find people to talk to."

ASIST is here to break the boundary and end the stigma that getting help is weak. ASIST members are friends who support you and let you know that you are not alone.

"I despise the phrase 'I understand,' no one on the planet can ever say they understand," said Militano. "I take the role as the 'punching bag' with pride. I will absorb all your pain and suffering so you don't have to endure it alone."

Having a positive mindset and encouraging your shipmates to get help can also make your work environment more productive and enjoyable overall.

"Our goal is to get back out to sea, but before that you have to prepare yourself first," said Interior Communications Electrician 2nd Class Deanna Dalziel, a member of ASIST. "The ship is replaceable but you're not."


ASIST is open to any new members who want to learn and lend a helping hand to a shipmate.

"I've been a part of ASIST for about a year now, but the reason I wanted to become part of the team is because I've known people who've had suicidal thoughts," said Dalziel. "I didn't know how to approach that, and by joining ASIST, I've learned ways to provide resources and know how help them."

The ASIST program is here for everyone who needs help, as well as those who want to help others.

"I know for a fact the ASIST team and myself will be there for any shipmate, always, and at any time," said Militano.

A New Look Navy Updates Uniform Standards

NAVADMIN 183/21, released on Aug. 31, 2021, presents a variety of new and updated regulations regarding uniform appearance and personal upkeep.

The new regulations allow Sailors more options for personal expression, especially in regards to hair styles and accessory options.

Hair styles for men were updated, allowing bald, flat top, faded, and high and tight styles. Squared and rounded gradual tapers in the back of the head and sideburns are also allowed, although sideburns are not allowed in bald hair styles and cannot exceed the hairline.

"The new hair styles just help us maintain our personality," said Culinary Specialist 2nd Class Benjamin Hampton, assigned to supply department aboard the Nimitz-class aircraft carrier USS George Washington (CVN 73). "With more options, I honestly think Sailors will be happier and will work harder."

For women, very short hair styles are allowed, including those that show the scalp. Females can have one hard part that may be cut, shaved, clipped, or naturally placed into the scalp.

"This is sweet, I've been wanting to change up my hair for a while now," said Culinary Specialist Seaman Areanna Santiago, assigned to supply department aboard George Washington. "Now, I'm able to go get my hair cut the exact way I've wanted to do for a while, but wasn't able to due to the regulations."

Another big change for men is that now they are allowed to wear earrings on and off base while in civilian attire. Earrings are still not allowed while in uniform for male service members.

"I don't wear earrings in general, but I know a lot of my friends do," said Hampton. "This is great for them because now they can really be themselves while in civilian attire."

The NAVADMIN also brought great news to those Sailors with medical and/or religious-waived beards. Those Sailors can now shape and groom their beards.







The NAVADMIN allows for "edging" of the beard which is "defined as the light clipping or trimming of the beard to give a shaped appearance."

The Navy also recognizes that some Sailors are receiving medical treatment that may make wearing traditional covers uncomfortable. To alleviate this, head coverings made of fabric or cloth are now authorized for those medically-approved Sailors, so long as they are black, tan, navy blue, or white in color.

And for the fitness buffs and techies serving out in the fleet, smartwatches and fitness trackers are now officially allowed to be worn with all Navy uniforms, including dress uniforms.

One of the final changes that the new NAVADMIN addresses is sun and prescription eyeglass options. Frames must be solid silver, gray, black, navy blue, brown, or gold. Transparent and translucent frames are also authorized, along with sunglasses with green frames and small sports logos.

"I wear glasses all the time, and the solid black glasses just aren't my style," said Santiago. "I've had my eye on this nice pair of clear glasses, and now I can wear them at work! I will definitely be getting them."






The Walking IIII Bank

As early as the Korean War, on-scene whole blood transfusions have been used to save American lives during combat. Blood must be kept at the perfect temperature in the right kind of vessel in order to remain viable. On the battlefield or the high seas, that kind of stability is almost impossible to produce. That's why the armed forces found another solution: the Walking Blood Bank.

"There's a very strict control process for storing blood," said Lt. Cmdr. Danilo Mendoza, the ship's nurse aboard the Nimitz-class aircraft carrier USS George Washington (CVN 73), "And we have no capability to store fresh blood products on board the ship. Even if we did, the blood products themselves only blood, it has to be typelast approximately 30 days from when we receive them."

A Walking **Blood** Bank is a list of donors, which is more practical for a ship underway than keeping an actual blood bank onboard.

"In the event of a mass casualty event, we'd need a lot of blood very quickly," said Mendoza. "So we'd call over the [I Main Circuit] for all members of a certain blood

type to report to medical, and transfusion. then screen those who make it to us on the spot."

Any Sailor can apply to be a part of the Walking #1000 Bank. The sign-up process is simple and easy.

"Everyone is eligible for the Walking Blood Bank," said Mendoza. "It's a quick signup form available in medical, and that's it. The form goes over basic questions about bloodborne illnesses and lifestyle factors that could disqualify you, but they're all questions you've already answered during your sea duty of need. screening."

Although everyone is eligible, blood type matters quite a bit when it comes to transfusions.

"When it comes to whole specific. Whole blood consists of your platelets, plasma, and red blood cells," said Hospital Corpsman 1st Class Steven Salgado, an advanced laboratory technician assigned to George Washington's medical department

During an emergency or mass casualty, whole blood is the only option the ship has. Medical cannot ask for a specific part of the blood

"In a typical, non-operational situation where they do a blood transfusion, they'll only ask for the part of the blood they need," said Salgado. "Here on the ship, if we were underway and suffered a mass casualty event, we'd need to do a whole blood transfusion, because we wouldn't have time to separate and repackage the blood products. That's why it has to be type-specific."

Signing up for the Walking Blood Bank is a way for Sailors to help other Sailors in a time

"What everyone should understand is that it could be you," said Salgado. "You could be that medical emergency, you could be bleeding out. When the time comes, wouldn't you want someone to help you?"

Sailors who are interested in joining this life-saving team can sign up in the George Washington medical complex.

Walking Blood Bank

This is an opportunity to help a shipmate in the event of a traumatic medical casualty.



Ask medical department for a walking blood bank screening form.

Fill out all highlighted portions of the form.

Return the form to be placed on George Washington's walking blood bank roster.

Upon activation of the WBB during a casualty, report to medical and standby for blood donation.

MQ-25 CONDUCTS FIRST AIR-TO-AIR REFUELING WITH F-35C

The Navy's Unmanned Carrier Aviation (PMA-268) program completed its first aerial refueling of an F-35C Lightning II aircraft by the Boeing-owned MQ-25 test asset, known as T1, as part of the Navy's broader initiative to field unmanned systems that transform and enhance the fleet's capability, capacity and lethality.

This event marked the third refueling flight for the T1 test aircraft. During the three-hour flight, a Navy F-35C pilot from Air Test Wing and Evaluation Squadron Two Three (VX-23) approached T1, performed formation evaluations, wake surveys, drogue tracking and plugged with the MQ-25 test asset at 225 knots calibrated airspeed (KCAS) and altitude of 10,000 feet. From the ground control station, an air vehicle operator then initiated the fuel transfer from T1's aerial refueling store to the F-35C.

Once operational, MQ-25 will refuel every receiver-capable carrier-based aircraft. Each unique aircraft platform will have a different aerodynamic interaction in the wake of MQ-25. Conducting refueling test missions with various aircraft allows the program to analyze data and determine if any adjustments to guidance and control are required.

Earlier this summer, the program completed unmanned refueling missions with an F/A-18 Super Hornet and E-2D Advanced Hawkeye. Each aircraft platform

is aerodynamically unique so how they respond in the wake of a tanker is different. Flying different aircraft behind the MQ-25 lets us assess how they will interact, Reed said.

Following this flight, T1 will enter into a

modification period to integrate the deck handling system in preparation for a shipboard demonstration this winter. To date, T1 has conducted 36 flights, providing the program with valuable information on aerodynamics, propulsion, guidance and control in advance of the MQ-25 engineering and manufacturing development aircraft deliveries.

The MQ-25 will be the first operational carrier-based unmanned aircraft and will provide critical aerial refueling and intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance capabilities to support the Air Wing of the Future - a mix of fourth and fifthgeneration aircraft, manned and unmanned platforms, and netted sensors and weapons.

Along with organic tanking, the MQ-25 will pave the way for manned and unmanned teaming (MUM-T) of carrier-based aircraft that will extend the strike range and enhance maneuverability. As unmanned tanking capacity increases, the manned tanker requirement decreases, promoting additional service life and capacity available for manned strike-fighter missions.
