Marines run to save 'The Lady'

A group of Marines from 3d Battalion, 8th Marine Regiment, 2d Marine Division helped raise money for the restoration of the Statue of Liberty during their feet.

The Marines of 3/8 decided to pound the pavement for liberty by running a non-stop, 555 mile marathon to Liberty Park, which is in sight of the Statue of Liberty and collected donations along the way.

The idea for the run came when Corporal Dave English, an assistant section leader in the Dragon anti-tank platoon of 3/8, saw a "Save the Statue" ad on television. English decided that more money should be raised, so he organized the run.

"I have run in two previous marathons," said the primary runners, Sergeant Andre Gonzalez of Weapons Company 3/8. "I ran the 100 mile Marathon in 1983 and 1984. I was out there for another marathon one day when Cpl. English asked me if I would like to run for a good cause. Now I'm running for the 'Lady'."

The group of runners and their support units left Camp Geiger gate at 9 a.m. June 18 and headed north on U.S. Highway 17 to Windsor, from there they followed U.S. Highway 13 to Delaware then headed north on U.S. Highway 9 to Jersey. The Leathernecks arrived at Liberty Park at 2 p.m. June 22.

There were 15 primary runners with three alternates who ran if a primary runner was injured. The

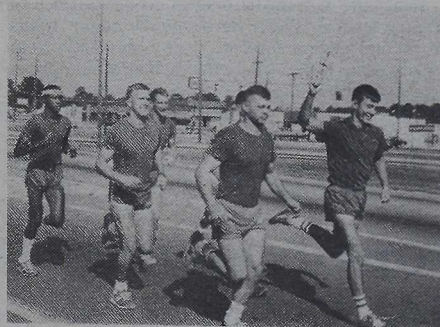
runners were broken down into three groups with each primary runner averaging about 40 miles a day.

Runners took annual leave to participate in the run. "When the runners took annual leave to participate in this event, they were making a big contribution because 3/8 is scheduled for a deployment soon and the men will have fewer days to spend with their families," said Major Darrell Combs, executive officer of 3/8.

However, Marines are used to making sacrifices. To show their good spirit and patriotism, the Marines carried an electric light baton to signify the statue's torch.

A caravan of three vans and four campers accompanied the runners. The caravan included sleeping spaces and food for the runners. In case one of the runners was sick or injured, he could have been treated by one of the three Navy corpsmen who were along on the marathon; HN Conrad Quintyn, "K" 3/8, HN Stephen S. Gray "L" 3/8 and HM3 Mike Morris, "H&HS" 3/8.

The runners from Weapons Company 3/8 who participated in the run were, Cpl. David English, captain of the run, GySgt. Stephen F. Sprague, co-captain, Cpl. Christopher Fleming co-ordinator, Sgt. Andre Gonzalez, Cpl. Robert P. Capelli, Cpl. Joseph M. Montgomery, Cpl. Timothy Wynn, LCpl. Timothy M. Dean, LCpl. Maximiliano Dominguez, LCpl. Jesse Mason, LCpl. Neal E. Pascoe and LCpl. and Service Company 3/8 were Sgt. James Jochems, Cpl. Robert A. Abramson and Sgt. Ronald Burns. From Lima Company was Cpl. Jay Cook, and LCpl. James Staubs. Also, LCpl. Roger Freeman, Kilo Company and LCpl. Howard Smith, India Company, 3/8.

The idea of the run was to save the symbol of freedom for the whole world. Maj. Combs said the runners had already raised \$1,564 with more pledges coming in.

5 NRS fund drive draws to a close

The highly successful, 1985 Navy Relief Drive is drawing to a close.

Every Marine, sailor and civilian throughout the Camp Lejeune community has donated more generously this year than in any other year," said Lieutenant Colonel M. J. Reardon, chairman. "This year's drive netted nearly \$100,000."

Today (June 21), a week before the drive's close, we have attained 100 percent plus contact in all commands. And, I expect that the 2d Force Support Group will have completely wrapped up and achieved their goal by week's end. At Camp Lejeune (Marine Corps Air Station (H), New

River), they have actually contacted everyone and are just waiting for the tickets to come back from one of their deployed squadrons," Col. Reardon added.

As of June 21, 90 percent contact had been made at 2d FSSG while MCAS, New River had achieved 54 percent.

According to Col. Reardon, it usually takes a few weeks for all of the contributions to trickle in. "I hope that all monies will be accounted for by mid-July when we hope to have the drawing," he said.

Between \$3,000 and \$4,000 was collected through the annual Navy Relief Car Wash run by the Camp Lejeune Brig. "The brig's contribution

was greatly appreciated but because of the tremendous operational commitments to Solid Shield 85, I didn't stress command fund raising," Col. Reardon explained.

More than 200 people were involved in the year's fund drive. But as, the colonel pointed out, "Not one man or even 200 can make this drive a success—it is really a community effort."

"The one person who should be given credit for the success of this year's drive is that same person who should be given credit for everything accomplished here at Camp Lejeune and that is the individual Marine sailor, spouse and civilian employee working here," Col. Reardon concluded.

Rifle, platoon commanders to be armed with M16A2

HQMC, WASHINGTON, D.C.—rifle platoon commanders and platoon sergeants will be armed with a carbine version of the M16A2 rifle instead of a pistol. That's the word from HQMC, where officials in the Ground Combat Requirements Branch say rearming Marines in selected billets is necessary to provide a greater degree of personal defense.

Small arms experts prefer an M16A2 carbine for a variety of reasons. Its smaller, more compact design makes it less cumbersome than the service rifle, yet provides the Marine with the same firepower, accuracy and range. It also simplifies maintenance and ammunition requirements in the field. Most of the carbine's parts are the same as those in the M-16A2 and it can fire all current 5.56mm ammunition, as well as the new NATO standard rounds.

Rearming with the carbine won't be confined to infantry leaders. Fleet Marine Force commanders are taking a close look at their organizations to identify other billets where the carbine would prove more beneficial than a pistol. Among those being considered are communicators, logistics personnel, artillerymen, and combat vehicle crewmen.

The rearming initiative resulted from several studies—among them, an analysis of Soviet doc-

trine and tactics. Current Soviet tactics call for punching a hole in the front lines and attempting to destroy the command and control element, or other vulnerable areas such as an airfield or logistics installation. The support personnel who serve in those areas aren't normally involved in a firefight, but if the enemy could break the front lines, Marines must have the capability to fight back. The carbine will give them that capability, without being as hard to carry or maneuver as the service rifle.

Rearming certain billets with the carbine also addresses deficiencies found during a 1981 study on the Marine Infantry Battalion. That study, which led to a dramatic restructuring and "beefing up" of the Corps' primary combat element, called for enhanced personal defense weapons for small unit leaders.

The decision to procure a carbine comes at an ideal time for the Corps. By identifying which billets to rearm with the carbine now, future orders for M16A2s and the new 9mm Beretta can be tailored accordingly.

Current plans call for the first carbine to be ready in late 1987. Until then, rifle platoon commanders and platoon sergeants will be rearmed with the M16A2.

Check cashing policies change

Several changes have been made recently to exchange check cashing policies.

The main exchange will now cash government checks at the outside teller window during regular exchange business hours. The main exchange will also cash private checks for up to \$300 and personal checks for up to \$100 when the First Citizens Bank branch is closed.

The main exchange is open Monday - Friday, 10 a.m. - 6 p.m., Saturday, 9 a.m. - 5 p.m. and Sunday, noon - 5 p.m.

The branch exchanges will cash government checks, private checks for up to \$300 and personal checks for up to \$100 when cash is available. The following branch exchanges follow this policy: Rifle Range, Courthouse Bay, Area 1-2, Industrial Area, Camp Johns MAG-29, Onslow Beach, French Creek, A 4-5, Midway Park and Camp Geiger.

North Carolina National Bank has a teller window at the Marine Corps Air Station Branch Exchange. The exchange there will cash government checks when the NC branch is closed.

At the central and MCAS (H) Automated Parts and Service Departments, checks can be cashed in conjunction with a payment services.

Poisonous plants can mean hidden danger

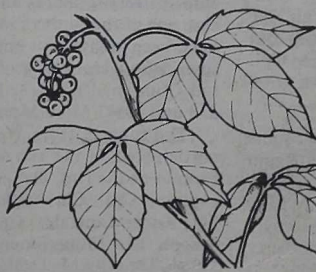
Warm weather is here and many camp Lejeune residents can't wait to get outdoors to enjoy North Carolina's scenic beauty.

But before packing the picnic baskets, everyone should remember there are hidden dangers awaiting the unwary. Avoiding some of the unnecessary grief can be as easy as learn-

ing to recognize some of the local flora.

According to David Guthrie, base horticulturist, being able to recognize poisonous plants is truly the only protection against skin poisoning and only a trained botanist could possibly hope to recognize every type of poisonous plant. Luckily, there are only three varieties that Camp Lejeune residents

need to be aware of: poison ivy, poison oak and poison sumac.



Poison Ivy

Poison ivy is a vine and is commonly found growing up shrubs, trees, fences and wooden posts. Poison oak can best be described as a bushy form of poison ivy. Both plants have waxy, cream-colored berries and are generally found in wooded areas. Poison sumac is found in swampy, wooded areas and is a coarse woody shrub with berries similar to those found on the poison ivy and poison oak plants.

Contact with the plants can produce blistering, severe inflammation and itching," Guthrie said. "Not all people are affected the same way and some do not even need to come in direct contact with the plant. Cats and dogs may spread the poison and, in

some cases, pollen in the air can do the trick."

Reactions will vary from person to person so it is important to get medical attention after coming in contact with these plants.

"Since the risk of getting poison ivy, oak or sumac is the highest during mid-May and June, protective clothing probably not be worn. But if you are going to be working in your yard and you think you might come in contact with one of these plants, be sure to wear jeans, a long-sleeved shirt and most definitely gloves," Guthrie stressed.

"If a person sees what he thinks is a poisonous plant, they should call 451-3446 and a groundskeeper will come out and remove the plant if necessary," Guthrie said.

First Citizens office expands

To better serve the Camp Lejeune community, the First Citizens Bank is expanding its main office at Camp Lejeune.

"This has been a joint effort with the Marine Corps to better serve our customers," said Robert Walters, vice president and Camp Lejeune city executive for First Citizens.

The bank is adding 3,296 square feet to the existing building. The addition will house account services, the loan department and a supply area. The addition will also have a separate entrance facing Holcomb Boulevard.

"The addition will allow us to increase the number of people available to help customers," Walters said. "The addition will also give employees and customers more privacy while conducting bank business." The addition is scheduled to be completed in October 1985.

Also, the bank has received final approval to install an automated teller machine at the Marine Corps Exchange Building in the French Creek sub-area. The new teller machine should be in operation in two months. The bank currently operates teller machines at the main First Citizens Bank and at Tarawa Terrace.

CHAMPUS benefits, policies explained

You've heard about CHAMPUS now and then heard the name mentioned . . . you know it something to do with medical care for service members.

But how much do you really know about CHAMPUS? Do you know exactly what it is? Do you know who can use it? Do you know how to use

First of all, CHAMPUS or the Civilian and Community Care Program of the Uniformed Services of Health Care, is a Department health benefits program for service members and their families, as well as for the civilian family members of deceased active or retired servicemen and women. Also eligible are the dependents of reservists who are ordered to active duty for more than 30 consecutive days.

The Civilian Health and Medical Program of the Uniformed Services of Health Care helps pay for most of the medical care you get from civilian doctors or hospitals, if you aren't able to get the care you need at the nearest military hospital, or if you live too far away from it to go there for treatment. The nearest hospital's Health Benefits Advisor can tell you how close enough that you'll be required to use the service facility first for inpatient care. You aren't allowed to decide that for yourself.

Let's say the nearest service hospital can't provide the care you need, and you've already seen the Health Benefits Advisor. Your next step is to get care from a civilian source. If you don't have a doctor or hospital in mind, look for one that accepts the CHAMPUS allowable charge as full fee for the care provided. The allowable charge is the amount CHAMPUS has decided as a reasonable fee in your state for the care you need. What difference does it make whether the health care provider accepts the allowable charge or not? It matters to your bank account, because the

amount CHAMPUS pays is based on the allowable charge for covered care. If the provider charges anything above that for your treatment, you have to pay all of the extra amount in addition to your normal share of the allowable charge.

How do you find health care providers who accept the allowable charge as their full fee? Ask your military hospital's Health Benefits Advisor, or call the billing offices of local physicians or hospitals.

Once you've settled on a health care provider and received the care, you'll have to pay the medical bills. This is where CHAMPUS comes in. Some providers (generally, the ones who accept the CHAMPUS allowable charge as their full fee) will file a claim with CHAMPUS for you, and CHAMPUS will pay them directly. This leaves you to pay only your share of the cost.

Other providers will expect you to pay their bill, then file the claim with CHAMPUS yourself (CHAMPUS will then send you the money). These are often the ones who charge more than CHAMPUS allows for the care.

Whoever files the claim will send it to one of CHAMPUS' regional claims processors. Which you send it to depends on where you received care. Check with your Health Benefits Advisor for your claims processor's address.

Assuming that you or the health care provider filled out the claim correctly, and included all necessary information, it'll usually be processed within 3-4 weeks.

But, in order to get the claim paid, it's also necessary that you, as a person eligible for CHAMPUS, be listed in the Defense Department's DEERS computerized data banks. This is the government's way of making sure that everyone whose Medical bills are shared by CHAMPUS is eligible to receive that help. Before the CHAMPUS claims processor starts working on a claim, the DEERS computers are checked to see if you're listed. If you aren't, the

claim will be delayed until your eligibility can be verified.

If you've been part of a military family for any length of time, chances are the DEERS computers have you listed. Check on this with the military personnel office at your local service hospital or installation, before receiving civilian health care. It'll help your CHAMPUS claims get processed more quickly. If you aren't on the DEERS lists, ask the military personnel office how to sign up. Be sure that information on new family members or any change in your status (retirement, divorce) is entered in your file.

Remember, CHAMPUS is not free. After the program has paid its share of your covered medical bills, there'll be a portion left for you to pay—no more than 20-25 percent (assuming that the provider accepts CHAMPUS' allowable charge as his/her full fee for the care), depending on whether you're in an active-duty or retired military family. There are insurance policies available to cover the amount that's left to pay. They're called "CHAMPUS supplemental" policies, and can be obtained through many of the military associations, as well as through private firms. If you don't have such a policy, the amount still to be paid will come out of your own pocket.

You probably still have questions about the program. The best place to get CHAMPUS questions answered is at the office of your local Health Benefits Advisor. He or she can also help with the details of the claim form, and may be able to help you identify health care providers who in the past have accepted the CHAMPUS allowable charge and filed the claim form. Pick up a CHAMPUS Handbook while you're there.

2d Tank Battalion hones tank crewman skills

Enemy armor appears over the horizon as clouds of dust rise in the distance. As the battle commences, the thunder of 105mm tank guns sound off. Anti-armor personnel quickly acquire their selected tank targets, aim, hit and destroy the enemy tank threat.

Recently, tankers from Bravo Company, 2d Tank Battalion, 2d Marine Division, rolled onto the G-6 Tank Gunnery Range here during a three-week training evolution in an effort to carry out their combat mission of supporting the 2d Marine Divi-

sion with armor and anti-armor capabilities.

"The purpose behind our training is to ensure that the Marines retain their tank crewman skills so they can interact as a team when firing the three-gun system on the M60A1 Main Battle Tank," said Captain William Norvell, commanding officer of "B" Co.

"This training will enable the Marines to do their job quickly and efficiently, which is very important in combat." According to Capt. Norvell, firing time is vital since it can mean the difference between life and death in combat.

Normally, he who gets the round off first in combat is going to survive, he explained. "For example, if my Marines get their round off first hit, then the enemy's tank is destroyed." Even if the round should miss, but still gets the first round off, the necessary "dope" changes will be made to the second round on target, according to Capt. Norvell.

The M60A1 Main Battle Tank, operated by a crew of four, contains three firing systems: a heavy 105mm main gun, and .50-caliber and machineguns. The tank's stabilizer system enables the tank to shoot on the move.

The commander issues the orders and is in charge of the tank's operation. Second in command, the gunner has one mission: accurate fire with his 105mm gun. The third Marine is the loader for the big gun and in addition he operates the M60 machinegun. The driver is responsible for keeping the tank on course even under intense fire.

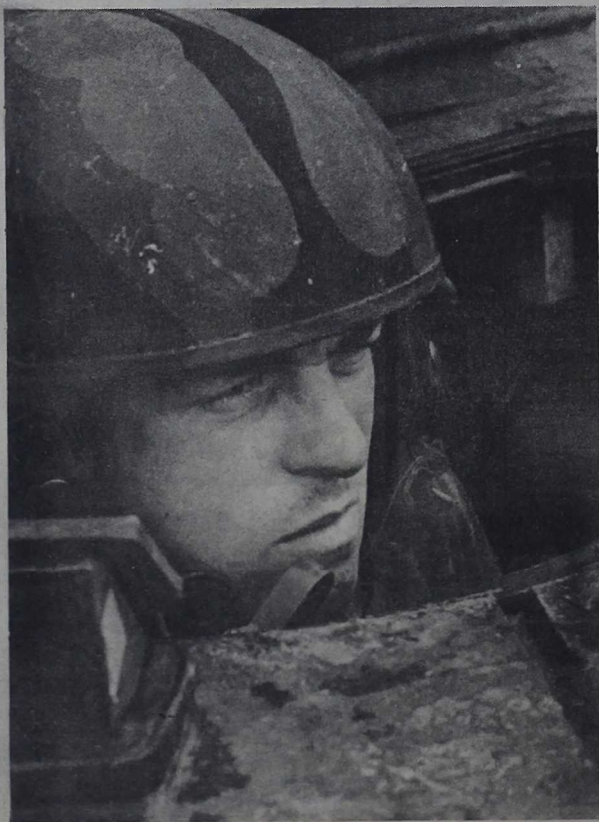
During the training exercise the Marines practice day and night main gun and machinegun fire, along with day and night fire. According to Staff Sergeant Steve DeVault, a tank commander, this type of training prepares his tankers for the different situations they may meet in combat.

The only real difference between day and night fire is that in night fire visibility is reduced. However, accuracy is not sacrificed in night fire. DeVault stressed.

According to Sergeant M. E. Mummy, a platoon tank commander, he considers this training important for one main reason: "The Marines

have the opportunity to cross-train and learn the other tank crew's jobs. This is important, because if something should happen to one Marine, the other tankers are going to have to fill in for him. Even if a Marine gets injured, someone has to fill his 'seat' to get the mission complete," he said.

In regular exercises, simulating fire and running through gun drills are important and necessary. The tank gunner sees his real practice pay-off when he live-fires.

"As a gunner I only have the chance to live-fire the main gun about twice a year and it's really important that we live-fire," said Lance Corporal Douglas G. Hoser. "Everything seems to change when that big gun goes off. Vibrations rock the tank and the tank kicks back. There's nothing like the feeling of live-fire, it's great," he said.

Lance Corporal Hoser and his company commander, Capt. Norvell, share the same view on the

capabilities of "B" Co. "I know that our crew could take our tank into combat and get our missions complete and that's why training is so important—so you can gain the confidence and proficiency to destroy the enemy in combat," said LCpl. Hoser. According to Capt. Norvell, his tankers are ready to uphold their part of the Corps combat missions, making the live-fire training a success.

Simulated 'nuke' blast creates realistic training

The alarm sounded. The gunners evacuated their 155mm howitzers to "reverse slope"—the far side of the hill. They hit the deck with their feet pointed toward the expected blast and waited.

Suddenly, their world was filled with light and sound. Billowing behind them was an ominous gray mushroom cloud.

There is no substitute for reality. But few want to experience a nuclear explosion.

Recently, Marines from 1st Battalion, 10th Marine Regiment, 2d Marine Division, came about as close as they could to a nuclear explosion.

"The regiment's arsenal doesn't include a real nuclear simulator, so we built one," Chief Warrant Officer-2 Roger Hargrove said.

According to the nuclear, biological, chemical

officer the simulator was built from items that would have been disposed of. "We took 100 gallon drums of contaminated fuel, two pounds of TNT and four trip flares to create our simulator."

"Not only did we have realistic training, we've shown other units how to do the same," said the chief warrant officer.

In order to train realistically, Marines must be exposed to the worst the enemy has to offer. They must be trained to survive it and then train to counter it.

The simulated nuclear explosion was only one unusual aspect of 1/10's recent MCCRES test.

Since enemy forces would normally employ chemical attack during night or early morning

urs, a very real danger to sleeping Marines exists.

General guidelines exist in nuclear biological and chemical warfare defense publications concerning such a threat, but they lack detail.

Developing their own procedures, 1/10 weathernecks were able to establish a timetable and rewatch system to counter the chemical attack threat.

Hargrove said the system was formulated on various reaction times. "After an attack, sleeping Marines would be checked every minute for the first

15 minutes for fast acting agents, such as nerve, blood or blister agents. Over the next 45 minutes, they would be checked every 15 minutes for delayed acting agents. After that, they'd be checked every 30 minutes to ensure there were no leaks in their masks and that the Marine hadn't accidentally broken his mask's seal while sleeping," he explained.

"What we are trying to show these Marines is that by following the basic rules and by using common-sense methods to improve the basic, they can stay alive in an NBC environment," Hargrove said.

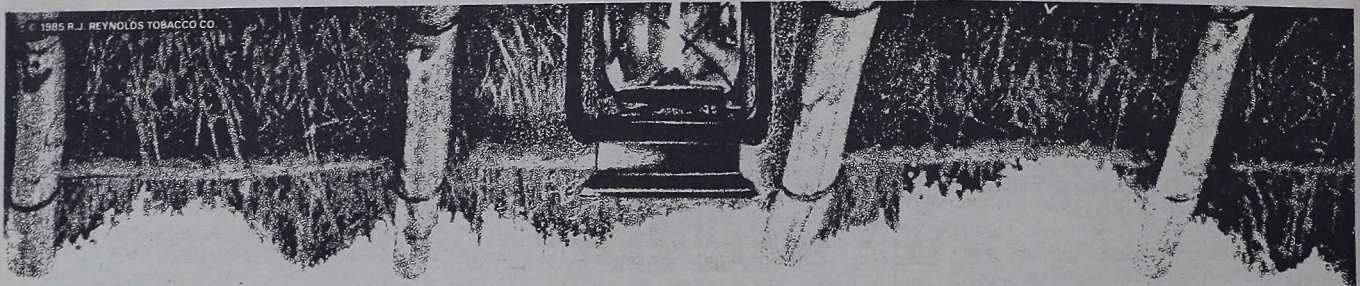

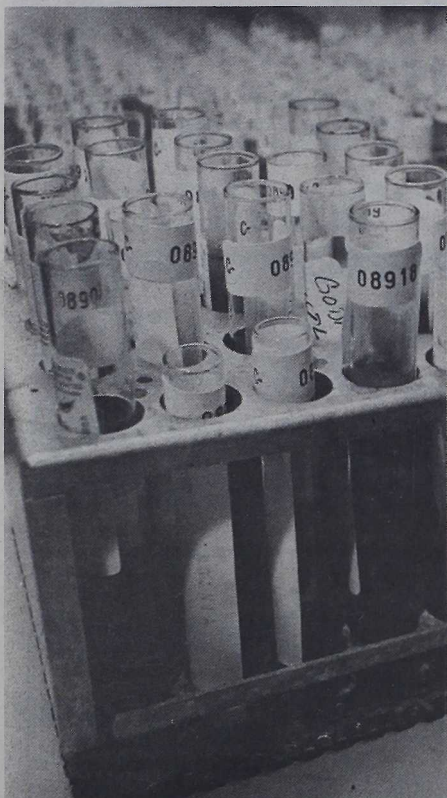

Lab staff works silently, efficiently in the background

Without them, doctors may have a hard time diagnosing your illness. If not for their sophisticated research, doctors may not know what to prescribe to cure your sickness.

They are the 40 sailors and civilians who man the Camp Lejeune Naval Hospital Laboratory. You probably won't see them the next time you visit the Naval Hospital, but they are there working for you.

Each year more than a million tests are run in the laboratory here. These tests run the gamut from blood to pregnancy tests, tissue tests and serum tests. There is very little that has to do with the human body that the lab cannot test.

"We are an integral and indispensable part of the hospital system," said Commander J. L. Almeida, head of the laboratory department. "We are frequently the first to make an accurate diagnosis. We can tell a doctor what his patient has and how to treat him."

The sections within the lab have big names like Histopathology, Serology, Cytology and Bacteriology. But as varied and complex as those sections may sound, the lab technicians are a tight-knit group.

"We have a very professional staff here. They work hard and they work together," said Lieutenant Clarence L. Cullum, lab officer. "Our people

realize that these aren't just little tubes of blood they are working on—these are patients."

Despite the large number of tests, the lab's performance is accurate and precise.

The quality of their services is reflected in their accreditation. The blood bank alone is accredited by five agencies. The list of agencies includes the American Society of Clinical Pathologists, the Joint Commission for Accreditation of Hospitals and the American Association of Blood Banks.

The Food and Drug Administration recently held a surprise inspection of the blood bank and found no discrepancies.

In addition to performing tests at the Naval Hospital here, the lab staffs three branch clinics as well as supporting the Marine Corps Air Station Cherry Point's medical facility.

The "gift of life," blood, is collected, processed and dispensed from the laboratory here. Camp Lejeune's laboratory supports Cherry Point's hospital with blood, as well as the Naval Hospital here and other hospitals around the world.

According to PO1 Jim. C. Wingquist, blood bank supervisor, when blood nears its expiration date for storage, other hospitals are notified to see if they need that type of blood.

So, although you may not see many laboratory technicians when you visit the hospital, they are there 365 days a year, 24 hours a day to help keep you on your feet.

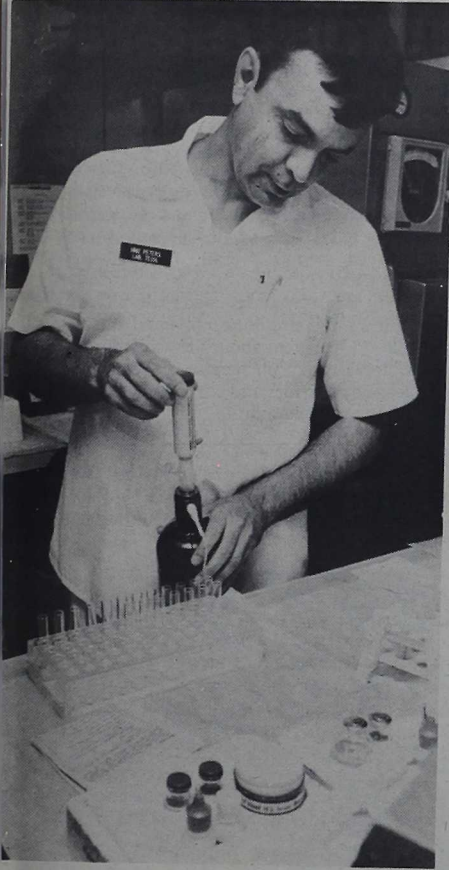

2d FSSG area guard provides alert sentinels for protection of life, property

Guard duty is an essential function within the Marine Corps and its commands. For the sentries of the 2d Force Service Support Group area guard, it is a large responsibility taken on by a handful of men.

For these determined Leathernecks, guard duty isn't considered a punishment or nuisance—it's a moral obligation where life and death decisions may be made.

The guard's primary responsibilities consist of providing a two-man security team for the French Creek armory and supplying a two-man walking post for the common areas (MCX exchange, commissary, club system, etc.) in French Creek, along with a roving patrol in a jeep. On paydays, an additional two-man security watch is established at the MCX. The FSSG guards also have the honor of performing morning and evening colors.

In order to be ready to respond to any emergency, the guard also has a reactionary force, which is ready to respond 24 hours a day.

The reactionary force is a nine-member group which provides security and acts upon any problem, disaster, emergency or contingency which occurs in the French Creek area.

The approximately 43 Marines appointed to the 30 days of guard duty come from the units within the FSSG. Therefore, radiomen, repairmen, drivers from motor transport and various units support the area guard.

According to Gunnery Sergeant Carl Bergener, guard chief, the fact that he receives Marines from different units does not hinder the performance of the guard. He credits the units for sending him good Marines.

"We are really getting good professional men for guard duty," Bergener said. "The units are really very cooperative and the Marines are screened by their parent unit prior to being assigned here. The Marines who spend 30 days on duty are good Marines being rewarded by a small break from their regular duties."

Though it may be a change of scenery for the Leathernecks, the break isn't an easy one. Before the Marines stand duty as the area guard, they must attend and pass the 2d FSSG Formal Guard School. Once this schooling is complete, the newest members of the guard are ready to "take charge of this post and all government property in view."

During the brief, but busy, four-day refresher course, the future sentries learn the procedures for

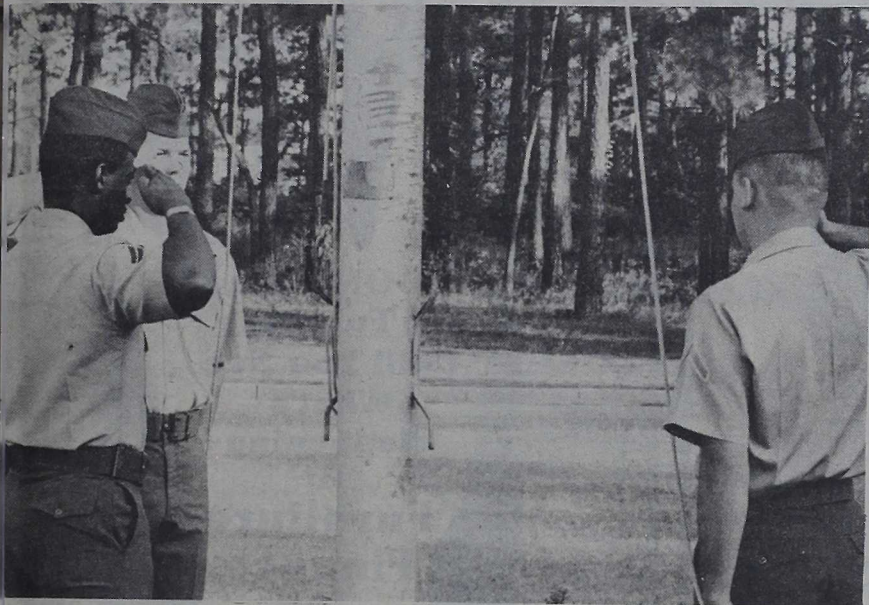



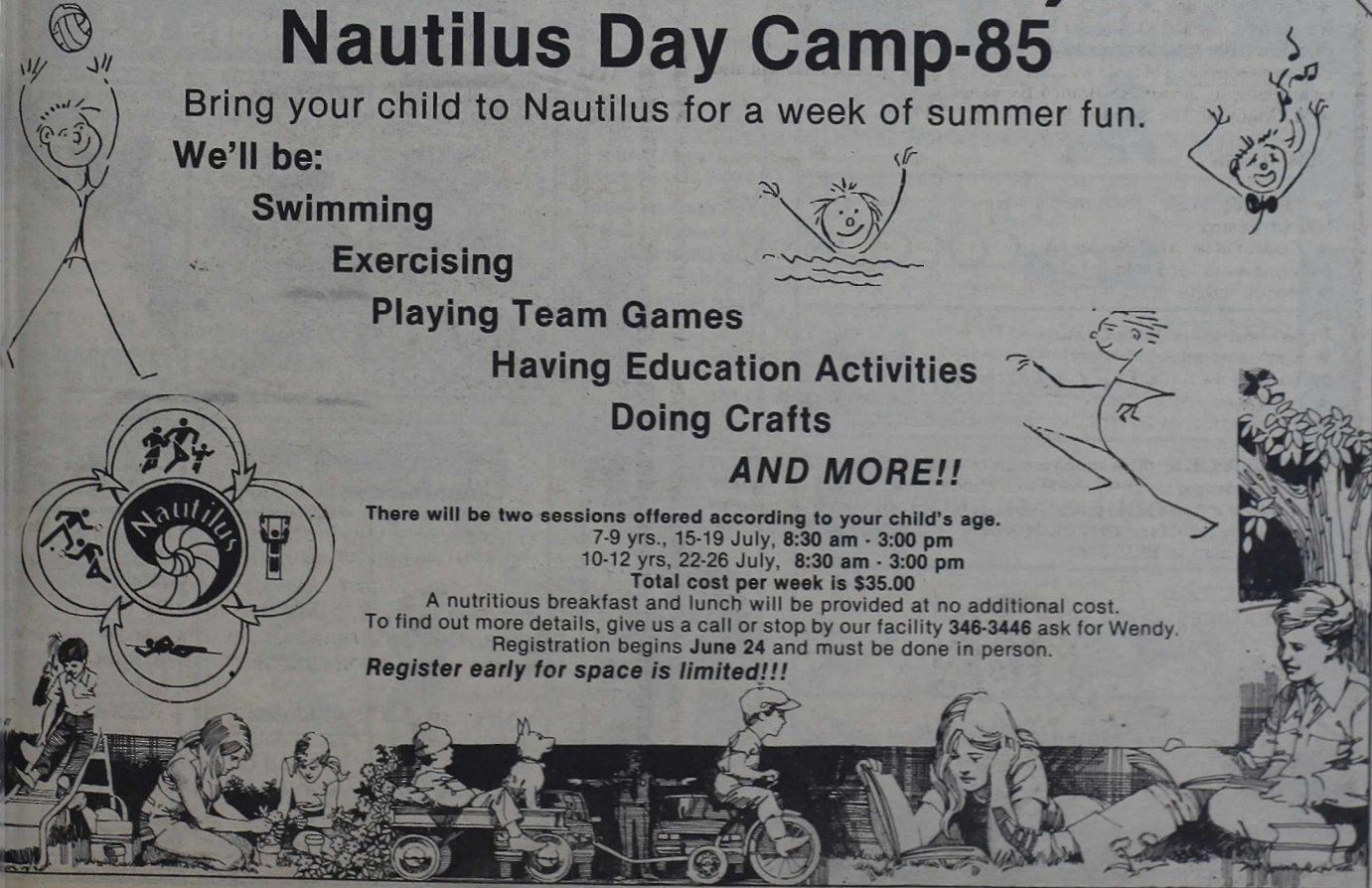

Force motor 'T' driver keeps on trucking

Corporal Tammie Durfey reported to Truck Company, 8th Motor Transport Battalion, 2d Force Service Support Group last July ready to shift gears. "Most of these trucks are automatics," complained Durfey as she looked out of her dispatcher's shack to a row of 900-series five-ton trucks. "I hoped to be driving semi trucks, but these are all right."

Corporal Durfey has been in Truck Company less than a year and it seems she has found overdrive. She reported in as a private first class and has climbed to corporal. She has been Marine of the Month twice for the company, twice for the battalion and once for the group.

The five-foot-four-inch brunette didn't make her rank quickly because she's a female or because she's good at making coffee; it's because she's a dedicated hard working and hard-studying Marine.

"Instead of going out partying I stay home and study about the Marine Corps. I study the essential subjects book, Guide Book for Marines, Non Commissioned Officers book and any other Marine related books I can check out of the library," said Cpl. Durfey.

The 25-year-old truck driver is a supervisor now since she picked up corporal in March. However, beforehand she was akin to kicking tires, checking dip sticks and checking oil fluid reservoirs before driving a 5-ton truck. She still drives the trucks from time to time and may get a little grease on her T-shirt while checking them over. "As a supervisor

I have to make sure that preventative maintenance is done correctly on the trucks and that there are enough trucks ready for the following day," said Cpl. Durfey. "I joined the most elite fighting force in the world and I'm not going to do anything to change it. If I don't give a 100 percent on the job then somewhere down the line I know someone will be hurting from it."

Giving it all didn't start when she joined the Marine Corps. This brown-eyed Leatherneck grew up giving it her all in Logan, Oklahoma. From high school she helped her mother and father work on the family ranch as a cowboy. "We raise beef cattle," stated Cpl. Durfey. As a cowboy, she rode her horse around the ranch checking the cattle, making sure they're healthy and that they have food and water. "In the winter I'd help the first kid heifer have their calves," said Cpl. Durfey. She went a the way as a cowboy. She even broke horses and rode Brahma bulls in the rodeos back home.

"I call myself a cowboy because that's what I am. All a cowgirl does is ride her horse around barrels," said Cpl. Durfey. "I guess my definition of cowboy is my dad. He's been one all his life, but I'm not runs a close second."

Corporal Durfey misses being a cowboy in Oklahoma but she recalls she wanted to be a Marine from the first time she got a recruiting poster in 1976. "I grew up in a naive environment where at least one person out of every family joined some branch of the service. I wanted to join the most elite

group of the service to get more self discipline in addition to having the pride of serving my country."

Corporal Durfey wanted to join after high school but she had to wait a couple years. "About that time my dad got sick and I had to stay and take care of the ranch. He was getting migraine headaches. He found out that he had broken his neck about 30 years ago when he was bounced off a bull. He found a good chiropractor and was better in about three years."

Corporal Durfey draws many parallels between cowboys and Marines but she says the main one is "History has proven that a Marine will take on anyone, anywhere at anytime and I've yet to see a cowboy who wouldn't do the same."

Corporal Durfey considers herself a cowboy Marine and doesn't know whether she'll stay in the Corps or not, depending on how her family is faring. She has three more years to decide and in that time she'll give the Corps her all and strive for the next promotion.

Staff Sergeant Raymond Reynolds, her platoon sergeant, says he doesn't know why she calls herself a cowboy instead of a cowgirl but that he knows she didn't have things easy before she came in. "Her background makes her very competitive around her male counterparts and she always considers herself a Marine first," said SSgt. Reynolds.

A couple of days after she reported into 8th Motor Transport she wrote this poem:

Broke them broncs for many a year
also punched many a steer
The life is hard and the pay is low
But I'll always love it, don't ya know

The trouble is that life is dying

Knew I had to find something for me and mine
Looked around and passed over the rest
Stuck with my worth and went for the best

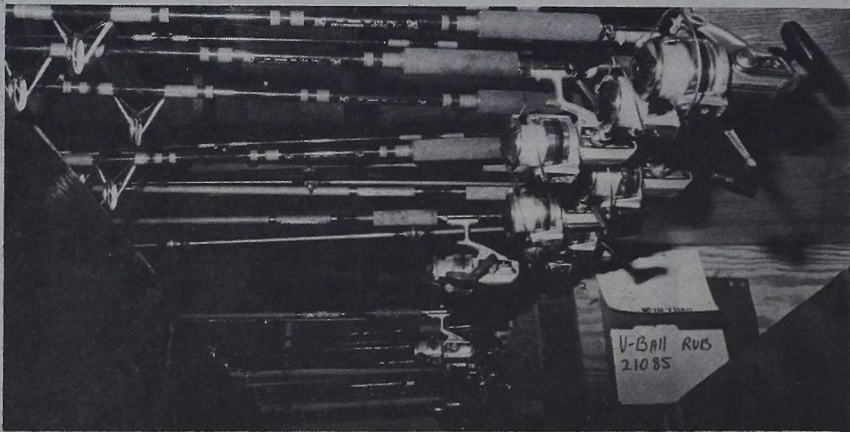

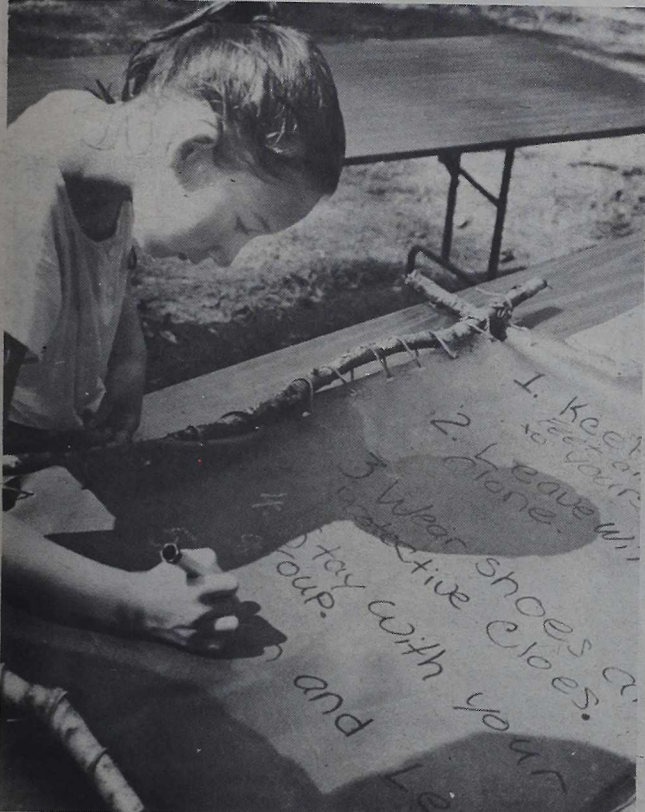

Restoring, refurbishing furniture saves lots of money for Marine Corps

Old furniture for refurbished furniture—it seems too good to be true. But one base office can turn that idea into reality.

The Property Control Division of Logistics Company, Support Battalion, Marine Corps Base, takes care of rehabilitating old furniture. By rehabilitating old rather than buying new furniture, the Property Control Division saves the Marine Corps money.

"In fiscal year 1984, we saved the Marine Corps 60 to 65 percent over what they would have had to spend to buy all new replacement furniture," said Staff Sergeant Carlos Robles, warehouse chief and noncommissioned officer in charge of the furniture rehabilitation program.

"We go out to the units and look at all their furniture," SSgt. Robles said. "We determine what can be salvaged. Then we take that furniture and send it to a firm in Alabama, which repairs and restores it. If the unit needs an immediate replacement for the furniture, we give them one from our warehouse stock. If not, we can usually get their repaired furniture back in two weeks."

Staff Sergeant Robles said the program not only saves money, but keeps the units looking good. "It's demotivating to have to live with broken furniture," he said. "My main objective is to look out for the troops and square away the barracks."

Staff Sergeant Robles added he hopes all Marine Corps bases will get involved in the furniture

rehabilitation program. "I really want to get all the units involved because it's such a tremendous savings to the Marine Corps," he said. "When we tell

the unit commanders what we can do for them and how quickly it can be done, they are really amazed. That really motivates me."

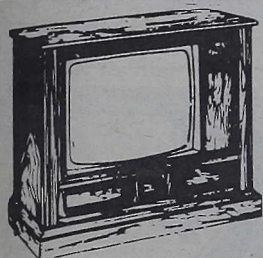

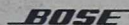

Jacksonville family dedicated to education

If the Beacham family of Jacksonville should design their own coat-of-arms, it might well incorporate a chalkboard eraser on a field of mimeograph ink purple. This family is to education what the Salks are to medicine and the Borgias were to poisonous potions—that is, dedicated professionals.

From a brood of seven children have come five teachers, three of them currently employed by the Camp Lejeune Dependents' Schools System. They are: Judy Beacham Stephenson (6th grade, Tarawa Terrace II), Helen Beacham (8th grade science, Brewster Jr. High), and Joanne Beacham (1st grade, Stone Street School).

(It seems only fair to also mention the in-laws: Nancy Beacham who teaches music at Brewster, and Anne Beacham, who teaches 2nd grade at Delalio, Marine Corps Air Station.)

Growing up in a large family with 20 years separating the eldest and the youngest was itself an experience in team teaching. When Joanne was born, her brother was a sophomore at Wake Forest.

"Everyone would ask us if we were Catholic," she laughed. "Whenever we complained about the size of the family, Dad would threaten to adopt more!"

Instead of an unresponsive doll baby, Joanne had a lively little nephew to push in her toy carriage. The family has always been close, and they at-

tribute their mostly harmonious relationships to their mother, whom they describe as patient, tolerant, and strongly committed to education.

Judy had always intended to be a teacher. "When the neighborhood kids would ask me to come out and play, they knew what I wanted to pretend to be." Today she thrives under the challenges of teaching 6th graders, a notoriously trying bunch.

"I remember how difficult it was to be that age. They resist authority because they are so eager to be independent of adults. They're very honest with you, but they don't always like it when you're honest with them. Often, the novelty of learning wears off in the 6th grade, and they must be stimulated into new ways of thinking. By that grade, a child is expected to write skillfully and be able to reason deductively. Many can't."

Judy's devotion to her vocation is extraordinary. For several of her 18 years as a teacher she taught at a private school where meager paychecks were sometimes late in arriving. She and her husband once tallied salary and expenses and discovered she was barely breaking even. Judy was undaunted because she always knew the major rewards of teaching are not financial. Moments of glory come, for example, when a student experiencing personal problems says, "The next time I run away I'm coming to your house."

Judy was Joanne's 4th grade teacher. "This past Christmas we were reading my old 4th grade folder, and it said I talked too much," Joanne

chuckled. Judy drily added, "Joanne was a reluctant learner."

"Everybody was afraid of Judy, and I was really petrified. I knew she wouldn't want me to call her Judy, but I felt funny calling her Mrs. Stephenson. I don't think I ever told her before but she was the best elementary school teacher I ever had."

Joanne is doted upon by her first graders, whom Helen rather irreverently refers to as "little octopuses." Her inspired teaching ideas are sometimes assisted by Helen. For example, decked out in lab coat and goggles, she put in an appearance as "Dr. Dinosaur."

"While the children were out, we put dinosaur footprints in the hall, and after they returned, Helen backed into the class peering at the tracks through a magnifying glass. The kids loved it."

"Teachers are the resource for other teachers," Helen explained. "We often need to call on the special knowledge of someone else."

Helen's specialty is science, and entomology provides an endless fascination. The family wholeheartedly encourages her interest.

"Judy has a rhinoceros beetle of Helen's in her freezer right now."

Unlike her sisters, Helen never intended to be a teacher. She attended Meredith College in Raleigh, where she majored in science, determined upon a career in field research. Employed as a park naturalist, she organized hikes, gave slide presentations, and instructed nature crafts. Her efforts were warmly received and she was told how valuable her talents would be in the classroom. She returned to school to complete the necessary teachers' courses, and has found teaching to be every bit as rewarding as she anticipated. She plans to pursue a Master's

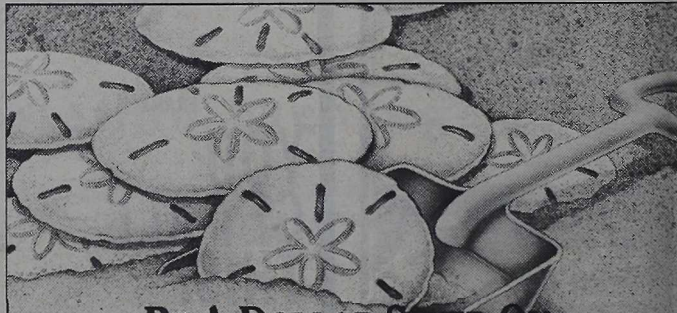

degree in entomology. ("She wants to work with the killer bees when they arrive," Judy quips.)

Helen's determination and sense of duty were tested early. Her first year as a teacher was spent in a high school for students who are unable to adjust to a regular classroom.

"This usually meant a judge had said, 'It's here or jail'. I was threatened, asked out on dates, (her students were 12-23 years of age) and nearly had to deliver a baby. Among my students were schizophrenics and pyromaniacs. Two male teachers escorted me out of the class every day. As a form of therapy, I learned to quilt. There were 21 people in the quilting class, and 20 were teachers! I felt like I'd been through combat training by the time the year was over, but most of those kids just needed somebody to talk to."

She speaks with pride of her Brewster students, and the fact that their scores on the science segment of the California Test of Basic Skills skyrocketed 14 points this past year.

All three of the scholarly sisters are happy to be part of the Dependent's School System. Joanne, who rooms with two other teachers ("Everyone calls us 'the schoolmarms'") has not worked in any other system, but has been told by those who have that she is most fortunate.

Helen agrees. "You do get the monetary reward, of course, but there's more. You're encouraged to belong to professional organizations, and to develop a professional reputation. I've spoken to teachers from different parts of the country, and they recognize the quality of our system."

Judy adds, "You can get anything you really need to improve your teaching, sooner or later."

The real recompense in teaching is the satisfaction of aiding in the development of successful human beings. Judy has followed the careers of

former students who went on to become doctors and lawyers. The other women are yet too young for such anecdotes, but they too have been paid off with a million dollars worth of respect and affection.

"I've had a child call me from Hawaii, and

I've received cablegrams from kids in Okinawa," said Helen.

The Beachams are delighted to be a clan which generates such a legacy of learning. "It's true. We are a family of teachers."

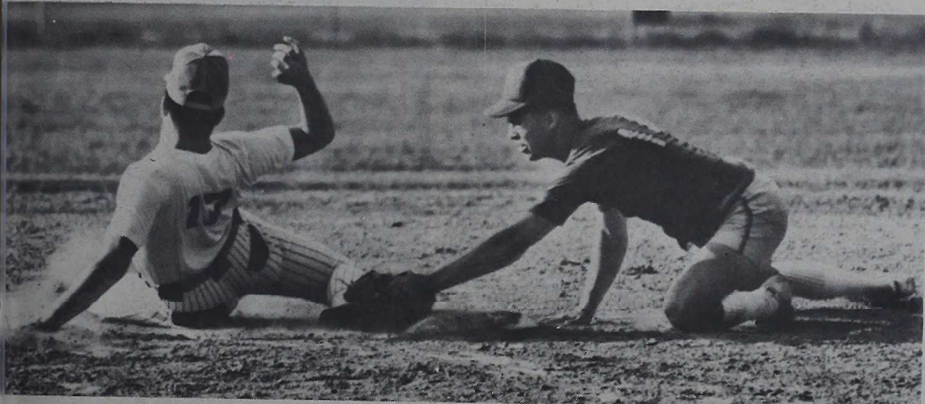
For Supply Bn., defensive standouts seemed to make the difference in the game. Fans and players
