

Sacrificial giving, not of talents and not of treasure but a more sentimental gift, the unforgettable gift of time.



Iraqi Army learns carpentry from engineer Soldiers with help from Pfc. Shehata

After two days of a basic carpentry skills course, Soldiers of the 11th Field Engineer Regiment, 11th Iraqi Army Division, finished a practical exercise building dormitory-style rooms, Nov. 14, at Iraq's Old Ministry of Defense, in northeastern Baghdad. Soldiers of the 101st taught a "train the trainer" course so that the IA engineers will be able to continue training each other. The first day of class covered basic safety instruction on the proper use of power tools, personal protective equipment and safety on the job site. The classes included hands-on training for measuring and cutting boards correctly the first time.

"It was great, there was sawdust everywhere, the IA Soldiers were so excited to be working they didn't want to take a break," said Pfc. Raymond Shehata, HSC, of Milford, Mass.

Shehata, originally from Egypt, was assigned to the project because of his fluency in Arabic and helped out with the hands-on portion of the class. Shehata's ability to speak Arabic helped to strengthen the partnership and camaraderie between the IA Soldiers and the 101st. Shehata gained valuable insight into the effectiveness of the training because of his comprehension of

Arabic. He was crucial to earning the IA Soldiers' respect, which contributed greatly to the success of the mission. "Being a part of the partnership training gives me a great feeling of accomplishment; knowing I was teaching them new skills," said Shehata.



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

FSC Welders hard at work

Two U.S. Soldiers of the 101st Engineer Battalion, 16th Engineer Brigade have developed a prototype antenna mount for use on up-armored commercial vehicles. "We were looking for something that kept a low profile so it would not obstruct the driver's field of view," said Beto Salazar, of Chaparra, N.M., a Department of Defense employee. Sgt. Robert Hall, of Groton, Mass., and Spc. Chad Parks, of Steuben, Maine, both welders with Forward Support Company, 101st Eng. Bn., were happy to help Salazar with his request. The Soldiers worked together to come up with a plan that would meet all of the requirements.

"I took the dimensions and ran with it," Hall said. Hall thought it was a great opportunity to work on the up-armored vehicles as a change of pace from the typical equipment seen in the motor pool.

The most difficult part of the project was drilling the holes for the mount in very precise locations. If the locations were not accurate, the mount would not be able to hold the antenna and wires properly. "If our prototype is accepted, we may have to make more of these mounts. It may even go into production next year, which is really exciting," Parks said.



Sincerely appreciating the help from the 101st Soldiers, Salazar said the mount the two welders designed places the antenna exactly where they had hoped, without interfering with the cables or the field of view. "Our design is simple, but it's efficient. It works," Parks said. The prototype, currently in the testing phase, has the possibility to be in a production phase sometime next year, with the potential to create a safer means of transportation throughout the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan.



The design team has really come along way since arriving in theater a few months ago. Our design team is creating designs for structures as big as 10,000 square feet. The design team is also being tasked with electrical plans. Spc. Micah Mahadeo has been a lifesaver designing every electrical layout we have had. The design team has at least 2 projects at a time and sometimes we juggle up to ten projects at once.

Spc. Rachael Pursell has recently made the transition to the design side from the survey team. Pursell has completed her first architectural plan set from scratch.

Spc. Derrick Adams has been a great asset to the design team. He has already completed five plan sets that include a design for a 4,000 square foot building with some very technical details. Adams has done an outstanding job meeting deadlines and getting plans done correctly.

Spc. Ford and Spc. Earle have been in transition on both sides of the house. Ford has recently been tasked to helped the design team play catch up while getting a multitude of plan sets to be done in a short amount of time. Earle has designed the plans for the Battalion Gym creating a complete plan set for that.

For the past month our team has been working on the staging area and the roads of West Liberty. Lighting will be added to the staging area in order to facilitate mission preparations for the Combat Security Teams. Since we arrived in theater both teams have been utilizing portable lighting systems and MRAP lights as a means of illumination. With the light post being added convoy preparations have been improved.

The most recent survey is the West Liberty project. We are in the first of four phases of this project that includes locating all the roads and ditches. Our team has been hard at work with the boundary road of West Liberty. Our team consists of Team leader Sgt. Harris, Spc. Hughes as lead rod-man, Spc. Ford as Instrument Operator and Spc. Mahadeo as Rod-man and Safety coordinator.

Sgt. Harris expresses her gratitude by explaining how Spc. Ford is a great help. "Spc. Ford has been the primary instrument operator and has done a great job for recording points for the line work of the road."

"Spc.Hughes has done a great job with attention to detail that comes with being a good rodmen." Explains Sgt. Harris when asked how her team is doing with the tremendous attention to detail that Survey Chief Ssg. Cornett emphasizes day in and day out. Spc. Hughes must maintain a clear line of sight and keeping proper distances between control points." Spc. Hughes has done a tremendous job with his efficiency in the precise placement of the rod target." Says Sgt. Harris

Since we sometimes survey under chaotic conditions, Spc. Mahdeo has done a great job maintaining a high level of safety for the Rodman by controlling traffic as we locate the roads and ditches on West Liberty.

Our team maintains a high level of motivation at all times. While the days can be long and tedious, mission accomplishment and team work continues to be our utmost priority.

Our day begins with Spc. Wooten and Spc. Killough loading the equipment and checking supplies in the backpack. The gear is loaded in the truck; at the same time Spc. Earle and myself are at the truck doing Preventive Maintenance Checks and Services and are making sure that all essential equipment is in its proper place. We maintain drinks, snacks, and ensure that tri-pods and prism poles are ready to go for the day.

We roll out to our site and it's like running a rat race, we all have first tasks. Spc Wooten sets up the back sight, Spc. Killough and Spc. Earle setup the instrument while I take a tripod and target to the foresight position and the next few control points for rounds.

We stay in close contact with headset radios and now with the fun begins as Spc. Earle and Spc. Killogh run the gun. One taking the shots and the other is recording information manually. Spc Wooten and Sgt. Brawley run the rod with a 360 degree prism; one holds the rod as the other is a safety for traffic control.

At the end of the day we do a quick measure of rounds, take down our instrument load up in the truck and head back to the office. In the office we upload the data that we collected for the day into a high-speed computer program. The program will automatically draw out information that we uploaded to prepare maps, plots, etc.

Once back at the office Spc. Wooten takes charge of preparing the equipment for the next day's work. Wooten ensures all batteries are on charge and all gear is properly secure before his day is over.

That is what a day on the survey team is like, of course there are a few breaks and lunch during the day but you already know what that's like.

"I am proud to lead this team. Their enthusiasm makes my job a very pleasant one. I don't think I could have a better team than the one I have. To me they are the absolute best." Sgt.Brawley

Baghdad—Our potpourri of accomplishments at Mahmudiyah, a Forward Operating Base (FOB) was a victory. With limited resources and equipment, 1192nd Engineer Company, 1st Platoon 2nd squad was able to govern and complete the undertakings. This was due in part to the knowledge and know-how of the Soldiers and leadership, but mostly to the devotion to duty, the individual selfless-service, integrity, and skills of the team. 1st Platoon, 2nd Squad of the 1192nd EN CO was initially tasked to improve the existing ASP to meet Division's safety specifications and requirements.

Project NCOIC and 1st Plt Squad Leader Staff Sgt. Trevor Harlow of Huron, Ohio and site manager, Sgt. JD Sims of Ripley, Ohio, worked closely with Staff Sgt. Harlow on the majority of the site management including his team leaders-Sgt Amanda Adamson of Wooster, Ohio and Sgt John Linville of Bethel, Ohio. They communicated effectively and their instruction and direction were always apparent.

The crew worked long strenuous hours and recognized after a short time, that they could accomplish more by initiating a double shift. Each team leader oversaw their respective teams and accomplished much more than projected. Our squad assumed an additional undertaking of improving and updating their current 25 meter range. The existing range had been closed for some time. This required the 120th CAB Soldiers to leave the confines of their FOB and qualify at another location, creating an unnecessary hazard.



Our crew was eager to participate in such a functional and well-designed project. The back wall is 21 feet high with a 10 foot berm built in front of it. The berm allows the range to support .50 cal rounds without tearing up the HESCOs. The wall will also protect Soldiers and vehicles from ricochets and allow the range to be used for a wider range of training activities. This new range will greatly increase the readiness of the 120th Combined Arms Battalion.

Once completing our first mission, we as a platoon, realized how proud it is to be a part of this historical event. We understand no matter how small the part we might play; it's still a part of the larger picture and gets us closer to our nation's goal.




