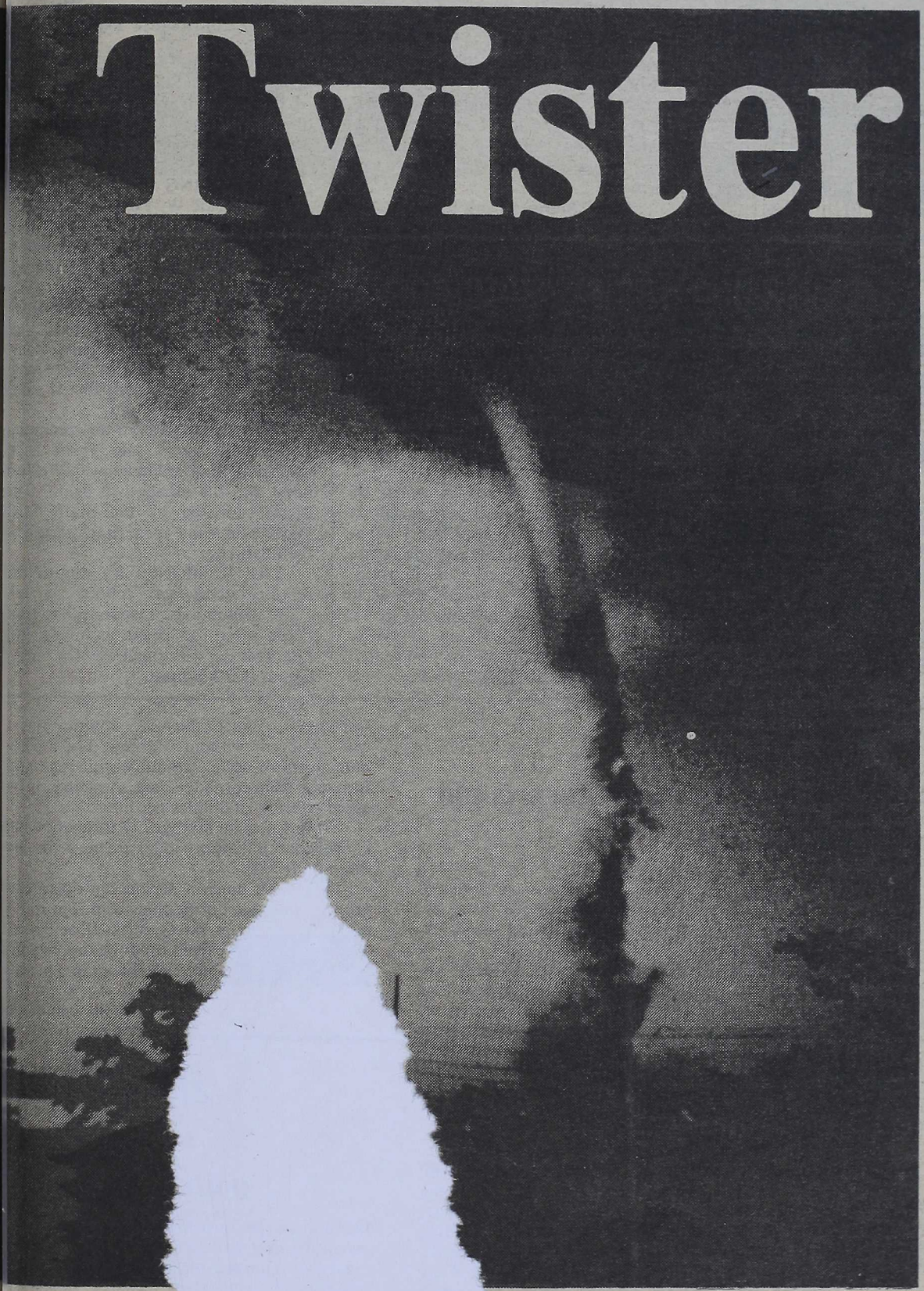

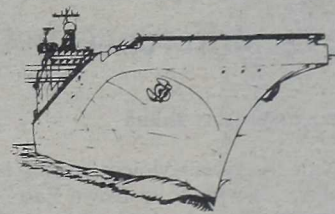

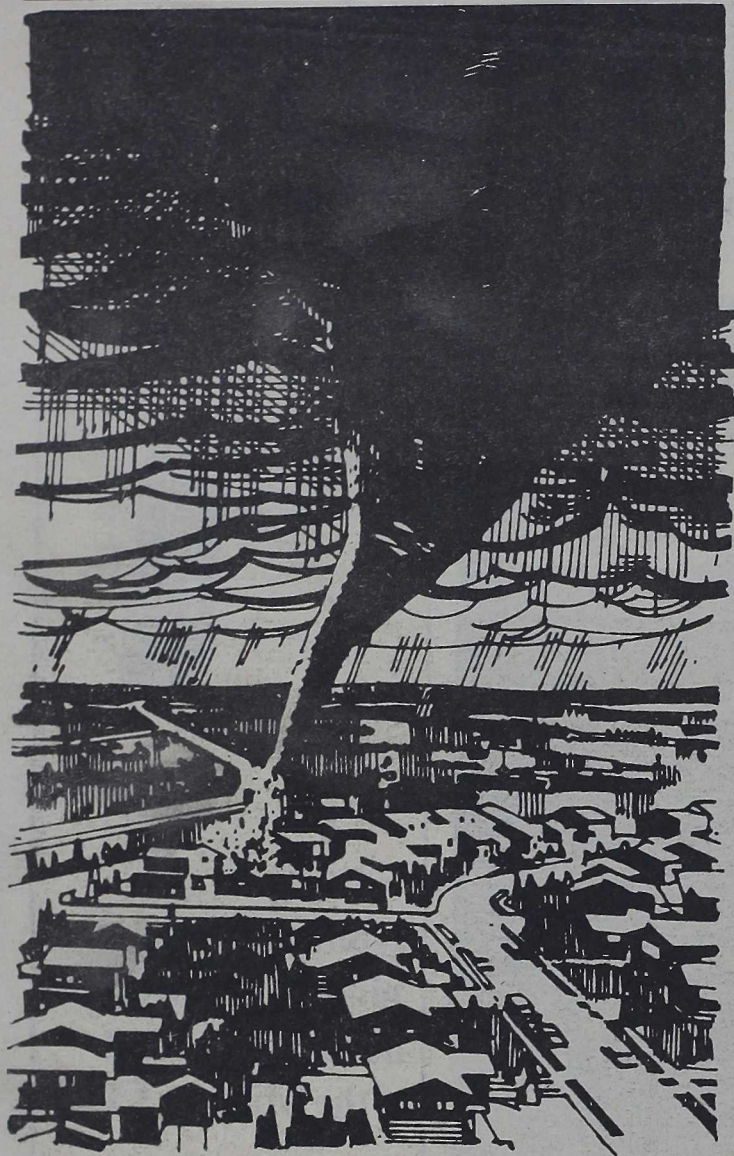

Camp Lejeune Update



Group Marines lend a hand in storm clean-up efforts

When disasters occur communities often rally together to help one another through the hardships. Although Lenoir County is 50 miles away, the community of Camp Lejeune recently sent various canned goods, sundries and manpower to the tornado stricken areas.

Thirty Marines from the 2d Force Service Group traveled to LaGrange, N.C., April 4 to help victims sort through rubble to claim belongings and clean up their community. They also took along four-wheel-drive vehicles to assist farmers in clearing their fields to get ready for spring planting.

Though Major General Donald J. Fulham, Marine Corps Base commanding general asked what help was needed to aid the unfortunate Lenoir County residents, the assistance was voluntary on behalf of the Marines.

Seven hundred dollars worth of canned goods and sundries were sent to Robeson County by the Base Protestant Chapel. Aside from food donated, the Staff NCO Wives' Club and Officers' Wives' Club donated \$1000 each to the Red Cross to help the cause.

Currently, the Family Services Center, Bldg. 14, is a collection center for donations of canned goods.

Red Cross, Wives Clubs, aid tornado victims

Ombudsmen from the Officers' Wives Club and Staff Noncommissioned Officers Wives Club met with the director of Camp Lejeune's Red Cross April 4, to present checks for \$1,000 each.

ACCORDING TO RED CROSS director Jackie W. Powell, the \$2,000 will go towards food, clothing, bedding and other essentials for victims of the tornados that swept the Carolinas March 28.

"After the disaster," explained OWC president, Kitten Grant, "we wanted to do something...help in some way. It didn't take long to decide what to do." The money contributed came from their Welfare Fund.

"We wanted to show the community we truly care," said Thrift Shop chairman, Elaine Finchum. "We just hope that the money will help." The \$1,000 donated by the Staff NCO Wives Club came from funds earned at the thrift shop.

THE RESPONSE BY one of the representatives was echoed by all, "The community responded to our needs after the Beirut bombing last fall. This is a very small way for repaying all that kindness."

Tornado Warning: Following proper procedures during the killer storm could be the difference between life and death

With the recent violent storms hitting North Carolina, "Living it up Down East" has become potentially dangerous. Recently 41 North Carolinians lost their lives during the storms that ripped through South Carolina and parts of the North Carolina Coastal Plains.

ACCORDING TO THE National Weather Service (NWS) in Wilmington, N.C, tornadoes claim an average of 100 lives a year, nationally, and causes hundreds of millions of dollars worth of damage.

A.E. Prosser, of the NWS, said that the tornadoes that recently hit North Carolina were all from the same thunderstorm front; one he termed a supercell storm. "There were several tornadoes coming from the storm lifting up and touching down in various spots to cause the widespread destruction," said Prosser.

Tornadoes are usually spawned by severe thunderstorms. This happens when a violently rotating column of air in the upper atmosphere descends through the thunderstorm cloud system.

According to the NWS, tornadoes travel about 30 miles an hour. However, some move faster exceeding speeds of 60 mph, with wind speeds exceeding 200 mph.

WHEN THREATENING WEATHER approaches the weather service will usually issue one of two types of weather condition warnings. A Tornado Watch is issued when and where severe thunderstorms and/or tornadoes are most likely to occur. This means that conditions are favorable for tornadoes and severe thunderstorms.

Areas effected by a Tornado Watch are usually 140 miles wide and 200 miles long, according to the NWS. During the watch, people in the area should be alert for signs of threatening weather and make plans for action.

A Tornado Warning is issued by the NWS when tornadoes are indicated by radar or reported by trained spotters or other reliable sources according to the NWS. Although the spotter reports and radar are extremely reliable sources, the NWS urges anyone who sees a tornado or funnel cloud to report it to their nearest local government agency and ask them to relay it to the NWS.

ALTHOUGH TORNADO V

warnings are issued, the NWS says that the storm can still occur without warning. The most common storm to occur without warning is the micro-tornado. Mini-tornadoes are tornadoes in which speed is below 100 miles per hour.

North Carolina averages 12 tornadoes annually. The month that tornadoes are most common is May.

There isn't much a person can do to prevent damage during the storm, but the NWS recommends safety rules. If at home, stay away from windows, doors and outside. If in a building, seek shelter in a basement. If no basement go to a first floor interior room at the center of the building under heavy furniture, blankets and pillows.

SHOULD be abandoned during the storm. These homes are the most vulnerable during the violent storms, especially if they are in the path of the storm.

Move away from the storm in a 45 degree angles. If there is no suitable shelter, lie flat on the ground in a ditch or depression. Do not use metal poles and other objects.

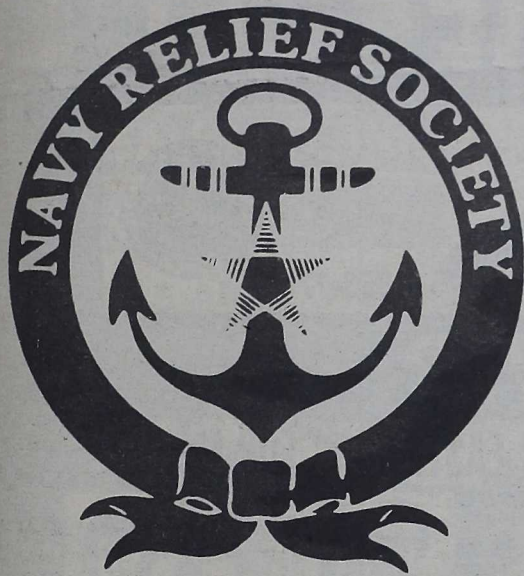
Although damage is done by a tornado, flying debris is the most dangerous and deadly. This is why it is important to stay in a shelter during the storm is

Mobile Photo Lab

Field shelter complex provides controlled environment to produce quality photos

FT. PICKETT, VA (Delayed)--Amidst the scattered communications vans, tents and yards of camouflage netting which adorn the command operational area for the Combined Arms Operation 2-84 sits a curious large green box-like structure.

When an inquisitive onlooker wanders in the vicinity of it, a question often asked is, "What is this thing?"

However, no one takes offense at this and someone is usually quick to answer. A certain sense of pride can be heard in any of the voices which reply, "It's a photo lab."

FOR THE MARINES from 2d Marine Division Photo this large green box is not only their home away from home, but is also the newest piece of field photo equipment they have.

The exact nomenclature of the unit is Mobile Photographic Laboratory, according to Gunnery Sergeant Donald Little, NCOIC of the Division Photo detachment, supporting this operation.

The unit is actually a self contained photo lab, complete with dark room and hot and cold running water. Water for the lab is supplied by a 3,000 gallon water bladder with power coming from a 60 kilowatt generator.

THE LAB IS only one of a four shelter complex, according to GySgt. Little. Three of the shelters are designed to be put together in an H-shaped pattern with the fourth set aside as a storage area.

Together, the complex is capable of processing and printing black and white and color photos as well as color slides.

The mobile laboratory provides a number of advantages over the tent which division photographers used previously in the field to do their processing and printing.

"The van provides a controlled environment with no light leaks," explained Staff Sergeant Robert Kline, a division photographer.

Additionally, water temperature can be precisely controlled in the mobile laboratory. The unit contains a heater and chiller to control the temperature of water subjected to various weather conditions.

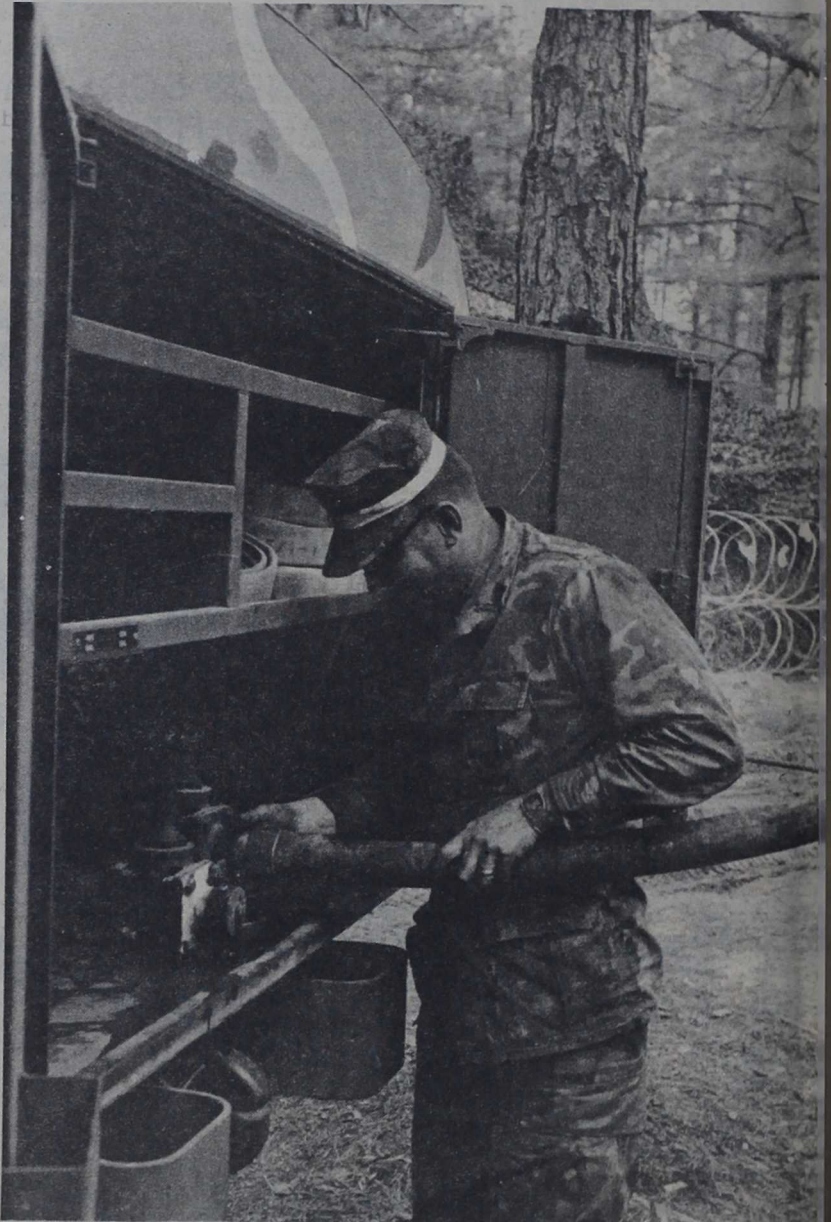
WATER IS PUMPED from the bladder through two screening systems before it is used.

In the past, clean water had to be hauled in from any available source and heated to the proper temperature, according to GySgt. Little.

The mobile laboratory is also easily transportable, according to GySgt. Little. It can be transported by flat-bed trailer or can be helo-lifted if required. For short distance hauling, the units have wheels which can be attached.

Division photographers project that the new facility will allow them to produce better quality work in a short time frame. Work handled by the division photographers in the field includes both documentation-type photography and the photography and production of aerial reconnaissance photos.

FT. PICKETT HAS marked the first actual field-test of the new laboratory and so far, the response has been one of total satisfaction by the division photo detachment supporting the CAO. Asked how they liked the new facility, GySgt. Little and SSgt. Kline answered in unison, "It's fantastic."

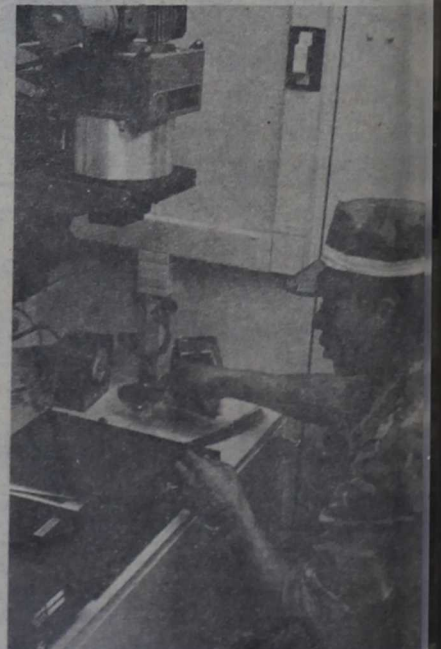


Gunnery Sergeant Donald Little, Division Photo, connects a water hose as he prepares to refill the lab's 3,000 gallon water bladder

Security in 3/4 time

practically any given day, Marines of the 2d Division Band can be found providing musical support to various activities around the Camp Lejeune

HOWEVER, ON MARCH 20, only 40 bandsmen laid down their instruments and took up M-16's and M-60 machineguns as they prepared to play a role as security guards during Combined Arms Operations at Ft. Pickett, Va.

For nearly two weeks, musicians set aside their traditional roles to provide musical support for the 10th MAB command at Ft. Pickett.

"The band has two missions," explained Band Officer First Lieutenant Dolph Myers. "We provide musical support to the 2d Marine Division and we are tasked with providing musical security for command posts." 1stLt. Myers added that the primary mission is the primary one, however, the musical support mission is one which the band devotes the majority of their time to.

IN ORDER TO fulfill their security commitments, the band is structured as a small infantry platoon according to 1stLt. Myers. However, the band actually has a little more firepower than

an infantry platoon. The added boost comes in the form of three M-60 machineguns.

First Lieutenant Myers was unsure of how the band came to play a security role, however, he did note that during the Korean conflict bandsmen were used as stretcher bearers. They were called to action again during the Vietnam conflict where they acted in a security role.

For the bandsmen at Ft. Pickett, a chance to exchange their instruments for weapons gave them a little needed relief from their traditional role.

"**THIS IS REALLY** kind of fun," said Lance Corporal John Jones, who's more accustomed military expertise is exercised from behind a trombone.

Some of the duties handled by the musicians while at Ft. Pickett included not only manning guardposts, but also construction of obstacles to prevent unwanted entry into the command operations area.

Among these obstacles was an elaborate dismount point for vehicles entering their perimeter. The dismount point included a maze of concertina wire and fallen logs, which incoming vehicles had to thread their way through.

"**THIS IS KIND** of new to some of them, but they have responded well

and worked very hard," 1stLt. Myers said.

Bandsmen began preparing for the CAO up to two months before the actual operation, according to 1stLt. Myers.

"Some of the NCOs went through classes before coming here," 1stLt. Myers explained. They in turn were able to help the other Marines who would be called upon to provide security, he added.

FOR MANY IT was their first time in the field however, 1stLt. Myers was quick to add that there were no problems experienced by the bandsmen. "We got a lot of assistance from the battalion (Headquarters Battalion) S-3 and S-4," he said.

The help they received paid off during the CAO and at one point a handful of musicians manning the dismount point ambushed an entire company-sized unit.

Lance Corporal Vincent DeMorrow, who was involved in the ambush explained, "They didn't know what was happening. They walked right into us from over there," he explained

pointing down a long dirt road across from the dismount point.

THE BANDSMEN ACTUALLY held the unit off for a few moments. "They were getting all tangled up in the concertina wire and we were firing on them with the M-60," LCpl. DeMorrow said. To add to the drama, a streetlamp near the dismount point which had been blinking off and on for two days, remained unlit as the unit advanced then flickered on just as the bandsmen began firing. The light then went back out again. "They couldn't find our machinegun nest," LCpl. DeMorrow said.

However, the tables turned after the infantrymen recovered from the surprise of the attack. "We were really just a delaying action until help would have arrived," said LCpl. Jones. "We had them pinned down for a while though,"

Overall, the bandsmen agreed that their trip to the field was worthwhile and even fun at times. As LCpl. Jones said, "This is all right once in a while, but I joined the Marine Corps to be a musician."

CSSD-21

The first to arrive and the last to leave

FT. PICKETT, VA. (Delayed) - A unit in the field is only as good as the support it receives; no unit is completely self-reliant. Combined Arms Operation 2-84, being conducted at this sprawling U.S. Army training center, is no exception.

Combat Service Support Detachment - 21 (CSSD-21) is the unit responsible for supporting this exercise and for the 219 Marines who make up the detachment, life in the field is a continuous cycle of helping others.

"We were the first ones here and will be the last to leave," said Chief Warrant Officer 2 Paul Smithers of the CSSD.

THE CSSD SUPPLIES maintenance, supply and motor transport support, as well as ammunition to the 2d Marine Division units participating in the operation. One of the most used commodities handled by the CSSD is fuel.

The CSSD's fuel farm has already pumped more than 23,000 gallons of gasoline and 24,000 gallons of diesel fuel since their arrival here.

Fuel is stored in large bladders which are set in the ground at the refueling point. "We have the

facilities to store 80,000 gallons of diesel and 40,000 gallons of gas," said CWO2 Smithers.

LARGE DIAMETER HOSES, lie criss-crossed on the hard packed clay soil at the CSSD and lead to three different refueling points manned by Marines from 8th Engineer Support Battalion's Bulk Fuel Company.

Large pumps force the fuel from the bladders through a separator which removes any dirt contamination and then through another filter which removes water contamination.

A steady stream of customers drift into the fuel farm throughout the day in search of more fuel.

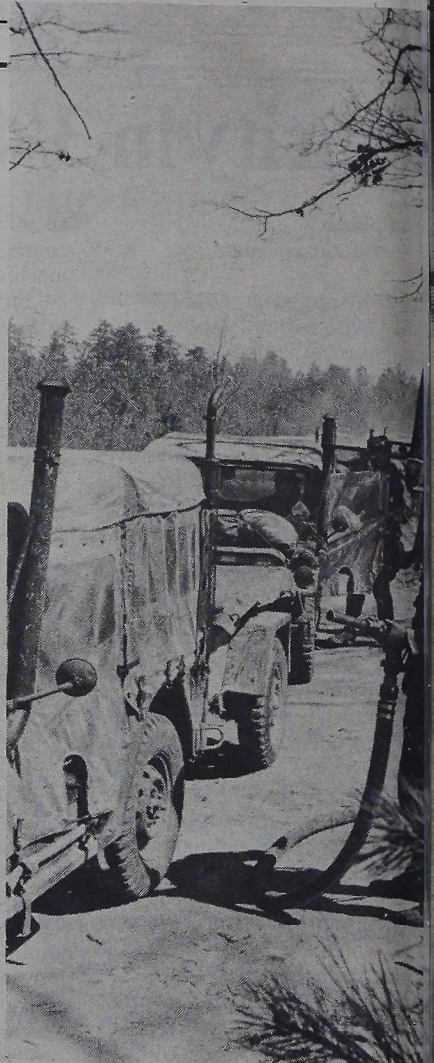
"**WE RECEIVED 17** tanker loads of fuel from civilian tankers to get the farm operational," said CWO2 Smithers.

Since the CSSD must support both forces in the operation, it has been declared a neutral zone for opposing Marine forces. In spite of this, the CSSD is still maintained as a tactical area. In fact, the Marines of the CSSD have even instituted security measures around their perimeter.

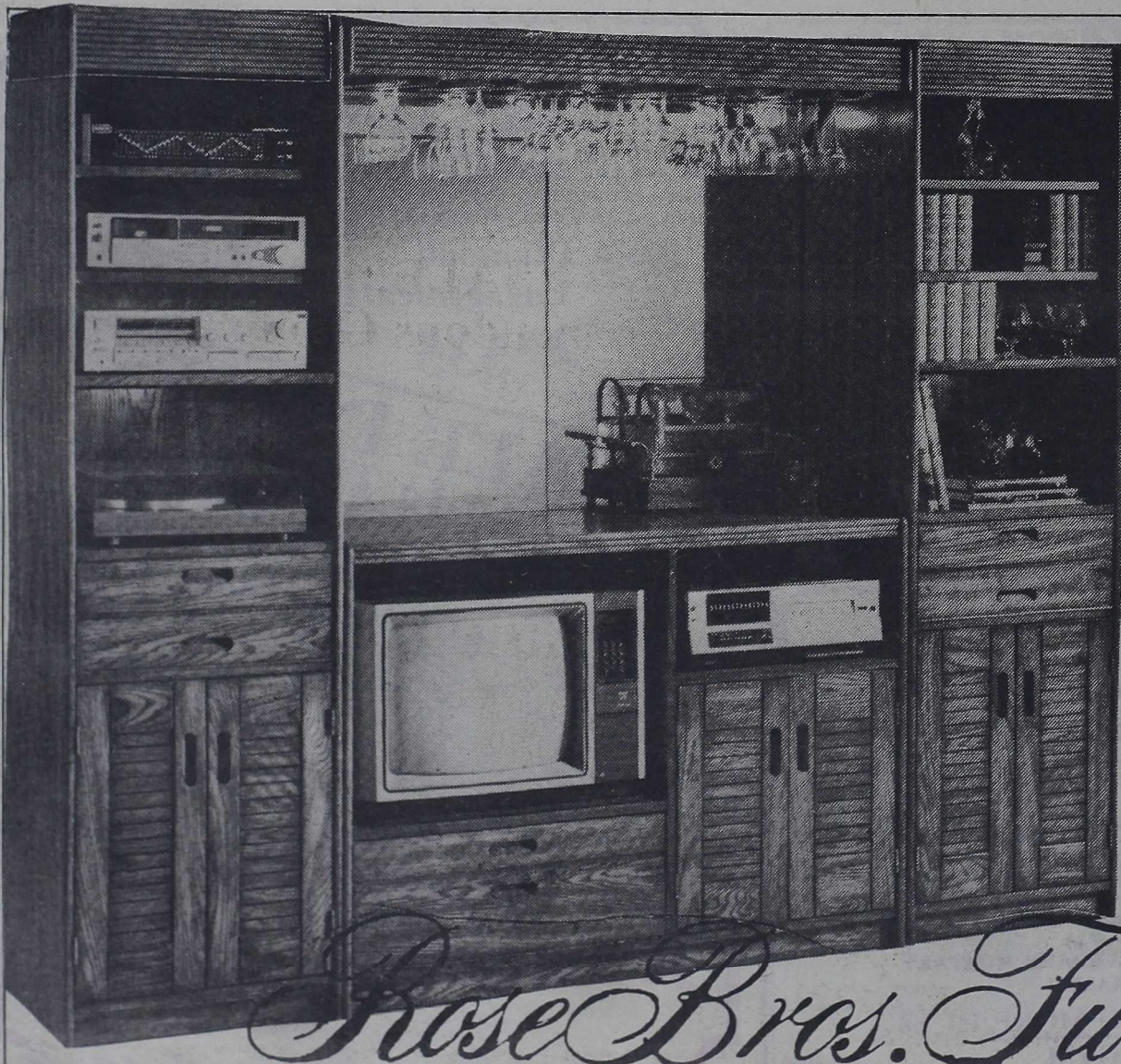
"We maintain listening posts and even run patrols around the perimeter," said CWO2 Smithers. "Captain Knight, the CO, feels that if everyone else has to be in the field, then we should also," he added.

OF ALL THE units at Ft. Pickett, the CSSD has the largest cross section of different occupational specialties. "We're sort of jacks-of-all-trades," said CWO2 Smithers. The CSSD has Marines attached to it from nearly every battalion within the 2d Force Service Support Group, according to CWO2 Smithers.

So far, things have run pretty smoothly at the CSSD, according to CWO2 Smithers. "We've had no major problems," he said. "We've been pretty busy, but overall things have been pretty good."

After what Battalion Commander Lieutenant Colonel James Magee termed the fastest weapons system procurement cycle ever for the Marine Corps, the 2d Light Armored Vehicle Battalion officially became a reality April 4 at an activation ceremony at the Area Four Gymnasium.

MAJOR GENERAL AL GRAY, 2d Marine Division commanding general, was guest speaker at the ceremony which marked the establishment of the Armed Forces only current light armored vehicle battalion.

The light armored vehicle represents a concept of separate and independent maneuver warfare never before employed by the U.S. Armed Forces.

The eight-wheeled vehicle, which weighs approximately 13 tons and can be configured in eight different variants, is expected to provide ground commanders a decided edge in the area of maneuver warfare.

MAJOR GENERAL GRAY addressed the crowd of some 100 spectators at the ceremony saying "Today is indeed a very special occasion as we activate the 2dLAVBn. What it means to our Corps as we press on in the decade of the '80s is a very significant, perhaps vital improvement in our combat capabilities for the future."

The general added, "As we work together in the next several months and years to refine and

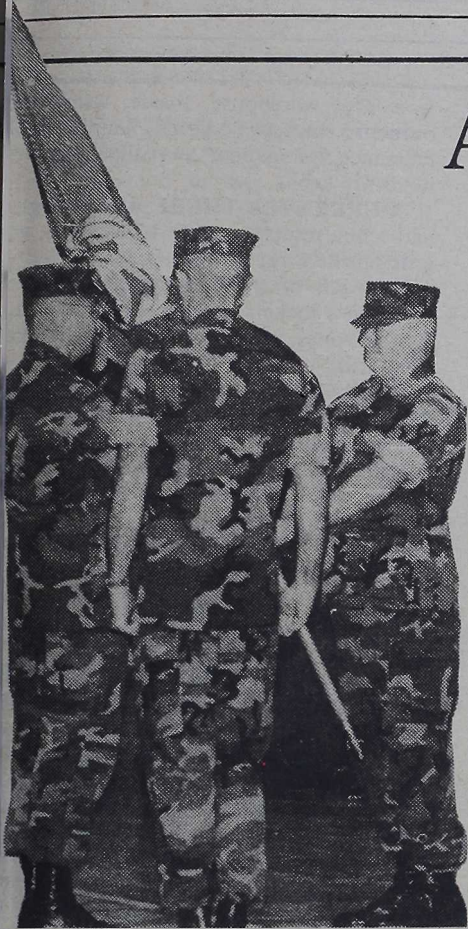
develop our utilization of this very versatile capability we will indeed reap a rich reward. In terms of battlefield tactics and techniques it is going to be a significant increase in our tactical mobility, a significant increase in our firepower, a major step in helping us achieve surprise, deception and all of the other things that are so important to winning."

"And above all," the general said, "It further proves our capability to be at the very forefront of what we have come to term the art of warfare by maneuver, which is not just important but crucial if we intend to win."

MAJOR GENERAL GRAY also addressed the 104 Marines and Sailors who thus far make up the battalion saying, "...For you who make up the vanguard, it is a great honor to be a plank owner in a new organization."

Though currently a small unit, the battalion will eventually contain 145 LAVs and more than 1,000 Marines and Sailors. Plans are in the works to bring letter companies on line throughout the summer.

Other guests attending the ceremony included Major General Donald Fulham, commanding general, Marine Corps Base, Brigadier General Robert Winglass, commanding general 2d Force Service Support Group, Colonel Timothy Geraghty, assistant chief of staff, readiness, 2d MarDiv., and Colonel Robert Johnston, 8th Marines regimental commander.

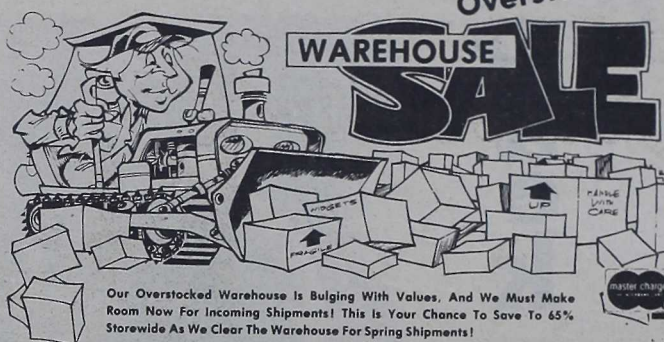

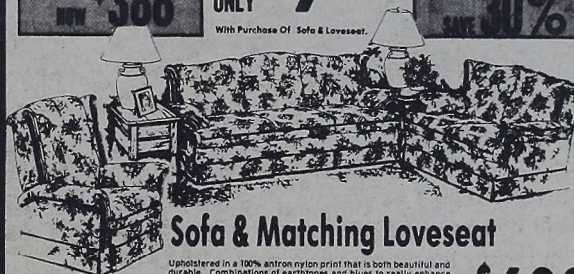

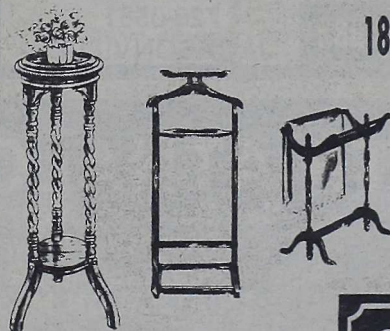

Back to basics

As the sunlight faded and the smell of burnt wood filtered throughout the campsite, 2d FSSG Service Support Group Marines began to break down their shelter halves.

THE 2d FSSG Marines from Headquarters and Service Battalion brushed the pine needles under their sleeping bags and settled in for the third of three nights in the field during a four-day exercise at Fort Bragg, N.C.

The battalion doesn't normally go to the field because it's comprised of 60 different sections; it's difficult to get them all together at one time. However, by breaking the field trip up into two increments, 500 Marines were able to make the exercise. Each increment spent four days in the field.

"The purpose of sending the battalion to the field is so they can brush up on their military and get in the mode of doing Marine things," Lieutenant Colonel W.C. Shaver, battalion commander.

FOR LANCE CORPORAL Russell S. Jackson going to Ft. Bragg was a chance for him to get away from legal work and typewriter and get back to the basics of being a Marine. "A lot of things I learned in boot camp about being a field Marine had forgotten," he said.

Classes on land navigation, day/night movement, camouflage, cover and concealment, basic patrolling techniques filled the schedules. These classes all led up to a night patrol in which everybody participated, including the women.

For the women, who were eager to be a part of the training, the practical application of essential subjects put things in the right perspective. Whereas before, whenever they were tested on these subjects during the EST, it was memorization part of the test.

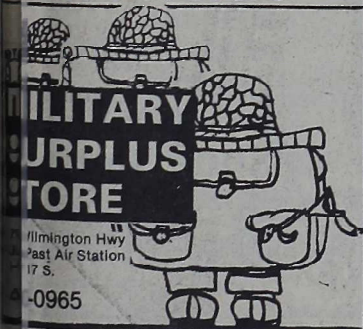

Sniper Team Competition

Two Camp Lejeune Marines take first in the military division of sniper team competition

Confidence and pride can often be determining factors in how well people do in pitting their abilities against others. Sergeant Thomas Glembin and Corporal Mark Whiteaker had the confidence to match their ability when they took part in the 1984 Invitational Counter Sniper Team Competition held at Fort Meade, Md.

THE COMPETITION WAS nothing to scoff at, as sniper teams from the Secret Service, Federal Bureau of Investigation and police departments all along the east coast took part. Military teams from Camp Lejeune, Quantico and other bases also participated.

The two Marines from 2d Force Reconnaissance Company, 2d Force Service Support Group, left for the competition with two strikes against them. "We had just gotten back from the Norway exercises when we found out we were to go to Ft. Meade," Cpl. Whiteaker said. "We had one day to zero in our weapons before we left for Ft. Meade."

The other strike was explained by Sgt. Glembin, "We belong to different sniper teams, so we've never worked together before," he said simply.

THE COMPETITION COVERED two days of firing. The first day consisted of firing from 100 and 300 yards and running an obstacle course

while carrying a rucksack and weapon.

The Force Recon Leathernecks fired at the targets in the supported prone position. The targets were National Rifle Association and FBI targets. The NRA targets were mummy type, according to Cpl. Whiteaker. "The targets had rings ranging from a two to a 10. The two ring had an X in it," he said. The FBI targets had a 3-man target, one being the attacker holding two hostages. The other target was a man with a shotgun.

The obstacle course was like any of the courses here. "It had the same obstacles as the ones here, with ropes, walls and balance beams. Each team member had to get by all the obstacles as fast as they could. Scores were determined by how fast the course was completed," Cpl. Whiteaker said.

THE SECOND DAY of firing consisted of 10 pop-up targets. "Each target stayed up 12 seconds," said Sgt. Glembin. "To start with we had to run a half-mile. Then we had eight minutes of preparation before the first targets came up. Cpl. Whiteaker called to me which targets to shoot at and where they'd be," he added. The firing on this course was done in the prone and off-hand positions. He had two minutes to complete the course.

At the end of the first day results were posted. "We really didn't pay any attention to how well we were doing," Sgt. Glembin said. "We knew we

weren't last, though." As the second day's ended, the results were again posted. "They told us that we had finished first of all the military teams," he said.

"And we finished sixth overall," added Whiteaker.

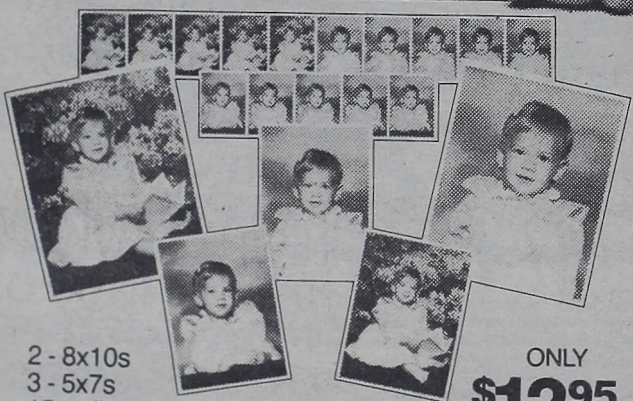
"We had the attitude to win," Sgt. Glembin added. "We went there to do our best. We were trying to come out first."

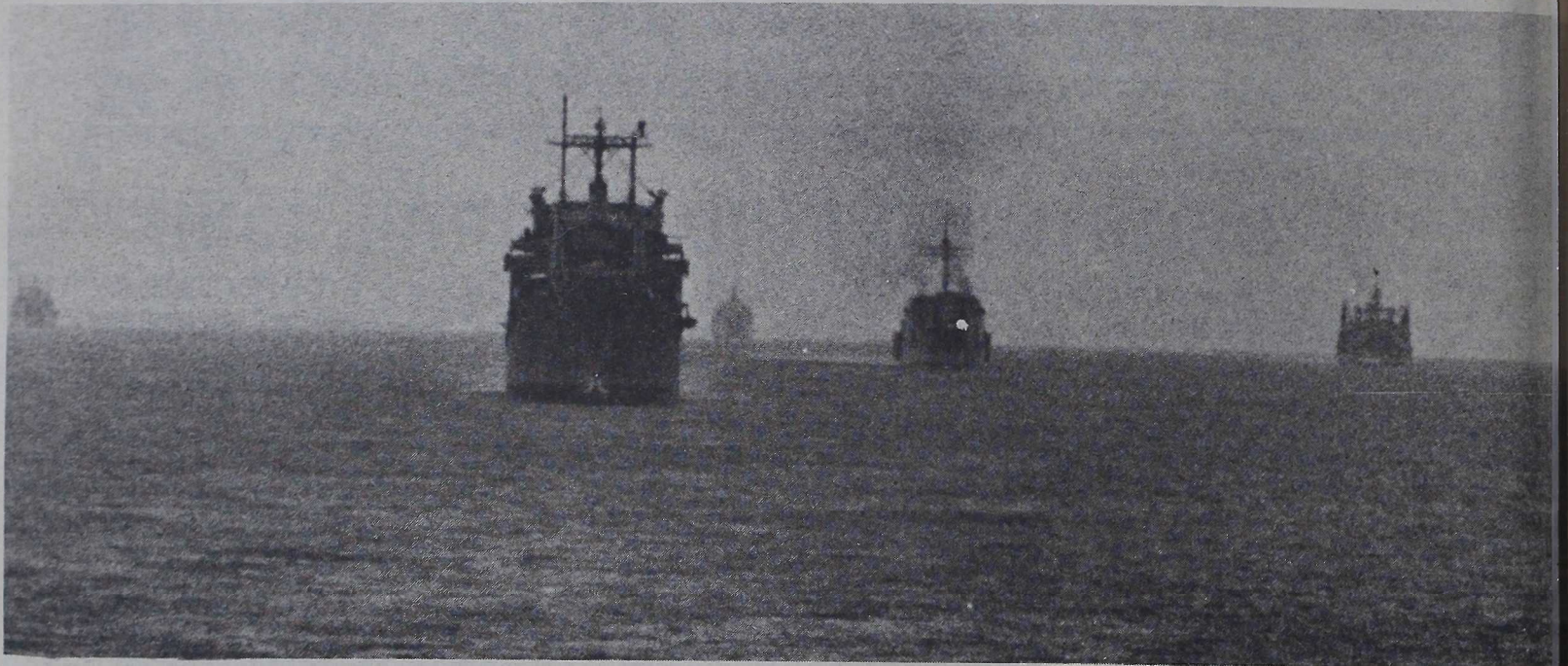

'Land the landing force'

Teamwork - 84 begins

4TH MAB, NORWAY (Delayed) - The moment had come.

"Land the landing force," echoed throughout the *USS Sumter County's* framework. Task Force Geiger, composed of India Company (Rein), 3d Battalion, 8th Marines, was headed towards its long practiced rendezvous with the shores of northern Norway.

The hour was 0100, March 16...the shores were named Red Beach and the operation, Teamwork-84.

IN SUBSEQUENT HOURS across two other beaches, a massive buildup of 8,500 Marines from the 4th Marine Amphibious Brigade would follow from four ships of the amphibious task force.

The 4th MAB, commanded by Brigadier General Norman H. Smith, is a standing main nucleus command whose primary mission is to keep a watchful eye on situations in the Atlantic Command, including the warm waters of the Caribbean shores and the frigid arctic ice fields.

Within hours of an alert, the brigade's command and control, and Brigade Service Support Group-4, supplying beans, bullets, band-aids, nuts and bolts, had gathered from New England, North Carolina, South Carolina and Virginia to reinforce NATO's northern flank.

THE BRIGADE, WHICH consists of the 1st Regimental Landing Team-2, providing the nucleus of the ground combat force, Marine Aircraft Group-14, flying air coverage and providing command and control, and Brigade Service Support Group-4, supplying beans, bullets, band-aids, nuts and bolts, had gathered from New England, North Carolina, South Carolina and Virginia to reinforce NATO's northern flank.

As the Marine units flowed through the fjords, Norwegian Home Guard units awaited to direct their efforts toward an encroaching enemy portrayed by the 6th Norwegian Division composed of two Norwegian Brigades and the Mobile Force; a composite standing NATO force consisting of Canadian, British Army and Italian Army battalions.

Supporting and part of the 4th MAB's effort on the east was a joint Royal Marine/Netherlands Marine Corps force, the 3d Commando Brigade.

AS DAYLIGHT CREPT over the majestic Nordic mountains, rising in heights in excess of 1,000 meters, the battle was joined with United States, British and Norwegian jets streaking to suppress hostile fire.

From three land fingers, carved by time into often turgid North Atlantic waters, the Marine forces moved inland, pausing, digging, camouflaging, displacing and setting up a few kilometers farther on.

Through all the military traffic flow, the hundreds of Norwegian civilians, who inhabit the sparsely populated north country, more than 200 miles above the Arctic Circle, kept their sense of humor greeting the passing Leathernecks with smiles and waves and more often than not, food.

IT SEEMS A contradiction in terms almost that men of war could return such pleasant and if time permitted, carouse a bit with the enthusiastic youngsters who gathered at each stop. Ever mindful of the job at hand, the Marines gladly exchanged whatever treats they possessed

The children of fishermen and lumberjacks, the main regional occupations of local fathers.

Filtering through the narrow thoroughfares, the green and white camouflaged war machine marched for six days closing on the final objective, Bardufoss Airfield, to link up with the 3d Commando Brigade.

Through it all, multi-national umpires - combat commanders and noncommissioned officers in their own right - scurried to keep an eye on opposing force interplay, assigning losses and trying to keep objective outlooks on situations as they developed.

DURING ONE BRIEF firefight between 1st Battalion, 25th Marines and an Italian force, the fighting of the situation and adjudging losses took longer than the firefight exchange. However, a certain amount of diplomatic decorum was expected, especially when the projected losses on one side outweighed those of the other.

March 22, the fires in Yukon stoves were extinguished, tents were struck and the juggernaut idled up for its return to the bowels of AFT's ze-grey ships.

It wasn't a question of who won or lost during

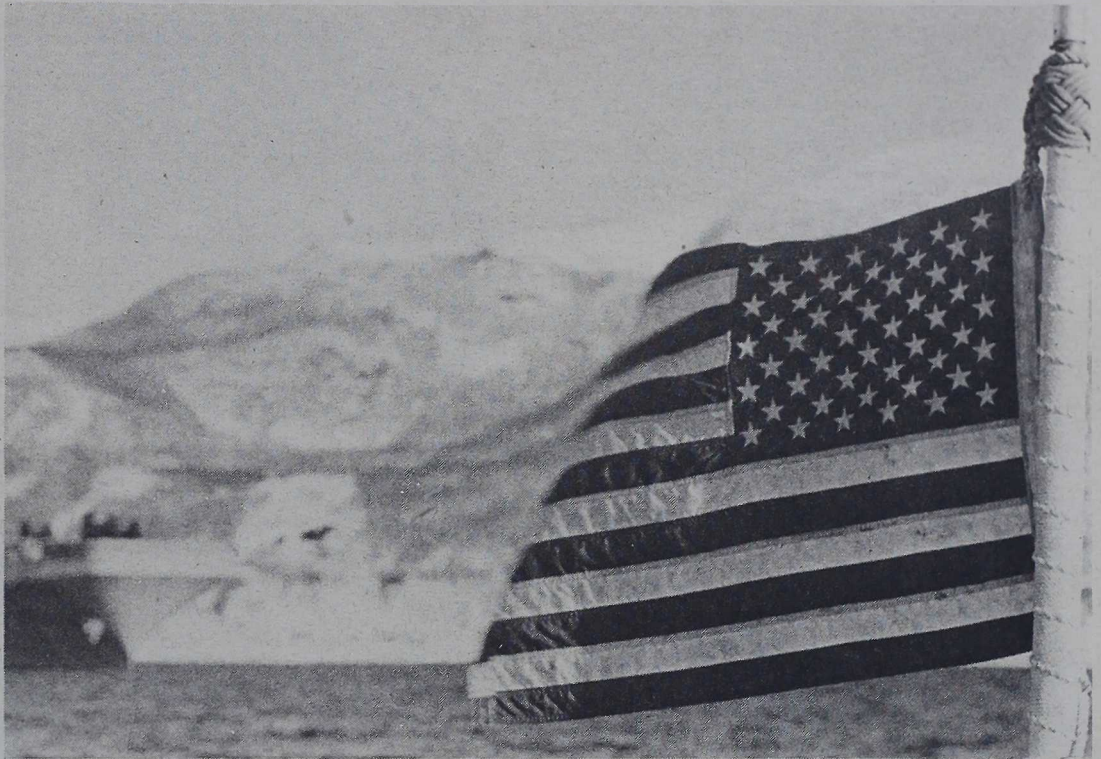

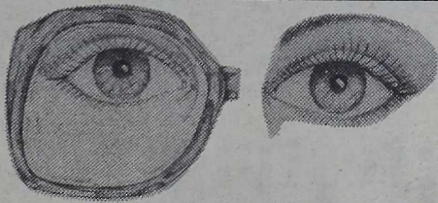
For more than 8,500 Marines and Sailors with the 4th Marine Amphibious Brigade participating in

Those answers will not be readily available. Discussions will have to take place in wardrooms, staff meetings and on

Teamwork-84, the American flag was always readily visible

drawing boards on both sides of the Atlantic before any conclusions can be made.

ONE ANSWER IS clear in most Marines' minds, that while Norway's forbidding, and yet, beautiful facade might hamper their forward progress, it won't stop them...not when they are on a roll.

Naval gunfire; testing NATO ships in Scotland

4TH MAB, NORWAY, (Delayed) - While the 4th Marine Amphibious Brigade, embarked on ships of the Amphibious Task Force, steamed toward Norway for operation Teamwork-84 weaponry training continued. An allied Naval gun exercise was held on the northern shore of Scotland, March 5-7.

Wrath, tested the capabilities of nine NATO ships from the United States, United Kingdom and Canada to hit their targets, as well as, the abilities of the U.S. Marine and British Naval gunfire teams to accurately direct the fire.

For the United States, the shore fire control party (SFCP) led by Navy Lieutenant Willie Boggan, the 4th MAB's Naval gunfire liaison officer, worked with the British teams from a forward observation post called Faraid Head. The post sits atop a 300-foot cliff overlooking the North Sea, approximately four kilometers from the targets. Riding at anchor approximately six to nine miles offshore, the ship's view of the targets was obscured by a hazy overcast. The visual obscurity only served to heighten the challenge to gunners and liaison teams alike to deliver the ordnance on target.

ACCORDING TO THE lieutenant, there is a Naval gunfire officer for the regimental landing team and its three infantry battalions. Each bat-

talion's Naval gunfire officer controls a SFCP divided into two teams. "Those two teams are the spot team," he explained, "and the liaison team. The spot team is commanded by a Marine lieutenant and will normally accompany the infantry company ashore. The liaison team is commanded by a Navy lieutenant and will remain in the battalion command center."

Lieutenant Boggan explained that an SFCP will arrive at the beach with the first infantry wave to establish a position to call for the fire on target of opportunity. While they are enroute to the beach, another shipboard gunfire liaison officer will coordinate Naval gunfire from the Supporting Arms Control Center on orders from the commander amphibious task force.

For the exercise, Marine First Lieutenant Thomas Warfield, 2d Battalion, 2d Marine Brigade directed the American's share of the gunfire from the Scottish outpost.

BRITISH MAJOR HARRY Beaves, 148 Commando Battery, explained the overall purpose of the exercise. "We're not really testing anybody but we are exercising our supporting arm capabilities," he explained in a thick brogue. "We're just brushing away cobwebs and getting all together."

The allied warships' guns sent dust, rock fragments and smoke as high as 200 feet in the air. The ordnance fired ranged from Canadian 3.9-inch rounds to 5-inch U.S. munitions. Th-



tombstones are scarce at Faraid Head, Cape Wrath, and

rounds have a bursting radius of 50 meters. During the exercise, Naval gunfire officials stated that approximately 200 rounds hit the target during the three days of firing. Faraid Head, cradled by a jagged cliff on one side and rolling sheep-inhabited hills on the other, is home to an observation tower, two bunkers and a building containing a barracks, kitchen and living room. The observation tower protrudes from the building's center. According to the soldiers, the post is deserted much of the time unless an exercise makes it necessary for the building to be occupied.

HIDE FROM DISPLAYING savvy in direct-aval gunfire, 1stLt. Warfield and crew coordinated bombing runs by Harrier jets launched from the *USS Inchon* and the British carrier *HMS* *Sheffield*.

Lieutenant Boggan briefly explained the intricacies of Naval gunfire, "The guns on various ships have computerized firing mechanisms. The data and adjustments calculated by the command are relayed to the ships." Then, using momentarily, he continued, "Then the gunners take that data and feed it into a computer which automatically adjusts for other factors such as the target's altitude, location and the ship."

LIEUTENANT STRESSED that notwithstanding, it was still the spot on the ground and their visual adjustments

that would determine whether a target was destroyed or still in the fight.

Night firing, according to Lt. Boggan, is no different than daylight except that the ships must provide spotters with illumination fired from shipboard guns or dropped from aircraft.

Working in conjunction with 4th MAB teams were 26 British soldiers from 148 Commando Battery. According to Maj. Beaves, the unit is divided into three teams. One team manned the observation bunkers while a second team kept the lines of communication open. The third team took care of

the unit's administrative tasks. Maj. Beaves added that four other British teams were already in Norway preparing for Teamwork-84.

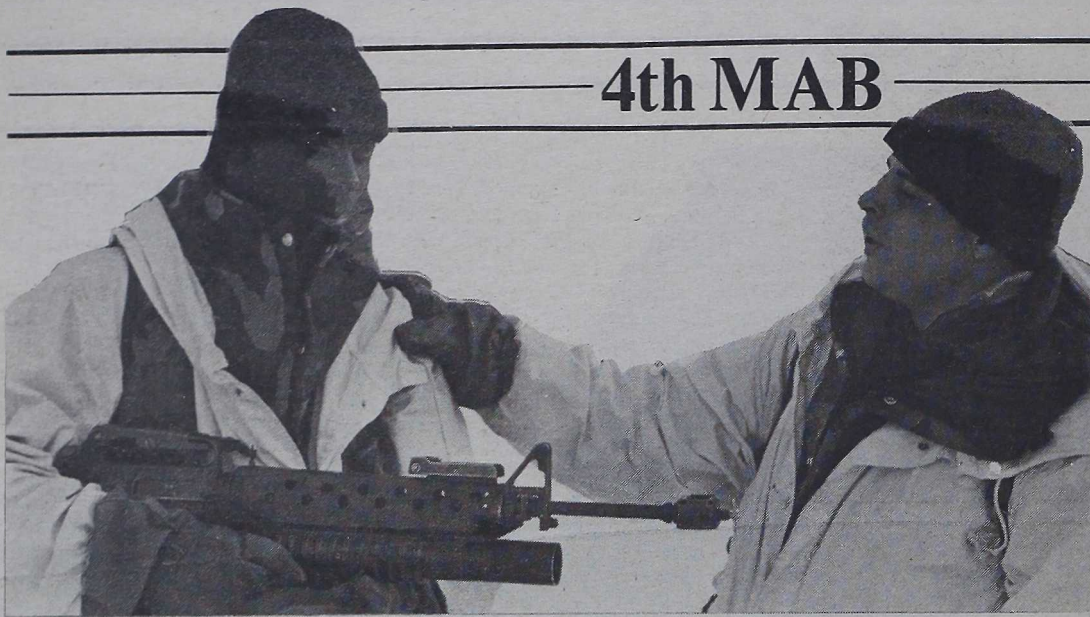
CONFIDENCE IN THE ability of man and machines to get the job done was the feeling expressed by the two American lieutenants after all the smoke had cleared and rock fragments had returned to earth. "There were outstanding efforts (on the parts) of all surface units and shore fire control parties," said a pleased Lt. Boggan.

All in a day's work

4th MAB, Norway (Delayed) - In an extremely cold climate, freezing to death, or hypothermia as it is called in the medical profession, is a possibility that everyone must realize and protect against. To be able to recognize the infant symptoms and be able to provide treatment has been a steady classroom theme to Leathernecks of the 4th Marine Amphibious Brigade in northern Norway for operation Teamwork-84.

Thanks to Corporal Marvin Hernandez from Golf Company, 2d Battalion, 2d Marines, Private First Class Erick Byrd was saved from going into deep hypothermia and possible death.

The company was in its second day of the

operation (March 16-22) traveling south next to Highway 854 when Cpl. Hernandez noticed PFC Byrd's condition. "We were temporarily set in along the road and I was making sure everyone was spread out when I noticed PFC Byrd was shaking like a leaf," described the acting Headquarters platoon sergeant. "I walked up to him and asked him how he was doing and he just stood there and stared into space," Cpl. Hernandez said. Knowing PFC Byrd, that quiet trait was totally uncharacteristic, so he (Cpl. Hernandez) decided to take measures to snap him out of the zombie-like state.

"I PULLED OUT a candy bar and offered it to him, but when he didn't respond I tried to wake

him up by shoving the candy bar in his mouth," Cpl. Hernandez recalled. At that point, theatoon sergeant knew that PFC Byrd needed more attention or he would be in serious trouble.

"I began to yell for a corpsman but even looked at me like I was crazy because they don't think I was serious," he continued. What became apparent to the others that PFC Byrd's condition was serious was the attitude from those standing around changed from nonchalance to concern and seconds later the company corpsman came on the scene.

Recalling cold weather first aid lessons, Hernandez stripped PFC Byrd's gear and set up a sleeping bag in order to raise his body temperature. The corpsman jumped into the sleeping bag to add his own body heat to warm Byrd while a TOW missile jeep driver packed two off to the battalion aid station.

WITHIN MINUTES AFTER his condition was spotted, PFC Byrd was on his way to helicopter recovery. According to bystanding Marines had not been for Cpl. Hernandez's quick response, PFC Byrd's condition could have been much worse. "I wonder if he (Cpl. Hernandez) knows that he probably saved PFC Byrd's life," wondered a Marine aloud.

"It's a shame to see a guy in that condition," said Cpl. Hernandez later. "I really felt sorry for him..."

Approximately four hours after the incident, a warmer and much relieved PFC Byrd returned to his unit. He expressed relief that Cpl. Hernandez recognized the symptoms. "I thought I was dying," PFC Byrd recalled, "but Cpl. Hernandez stopped me from going into deep hypothermia."

CORPORAL HERNANDEZ ATTRIBUTED his possible lifesaving actions in part to training and instinct developed from seeing a buddy in a bad condition.

Traction testing

Teamwork-84, NORWAY (Delayed) - The old weather and icy roads of northern Norway were the testing grounds for Marine Corps vehicles with cleats dur-

ing the recent operation Teamwork-84. The cleats provided exceptional traction for the tanks, self-propelled howitzers, AMTRACs and some retrievers in the harsh climate of NATO's northern flank, according to

Brigadier General Norman H. Smith, commanding general of 4th MAB.

The Marine Corps along with evaluators from the Navy Science Assistant Program monitored the testing of two types of cleats on different vehicles with various drivers at the controls. According to John F. Prescott, science advisor for Fleet Marine Force, Atlantic, the Corps is trying to make gains in technology lost after World War II.

"THE PROBLEM OF poor traction was noted during WW II and some things were done then to correct the problem, but since then, America has had no real need for that technology," Prescott commented.

What the team of evaluators were looking for in Norway was the "perfect spot" and chose a 10-degree incline hill with appropriate slippery footing, so to speak. "It was covered with ice and snow and had an 800-foot climb," Prescott added. By the time the testing started, the weather had changed and the snow and ice started melting. "I'm not sure how this will affect the testing," he said as he looked at the incline, covered with ice, mud and small rivulets flowing to the bottom of the hill.

Different drivers guided each vehicle through a three-track configuration set up for the test. The three configurations consisted of using just pads, then West German-made Diehl cleats and pads, and finally, American bolt-on cleats and pads.

ACCORDING TO PRESCOTT, feedback from the drivers proved that the cleats do add traction to the tracked vehicles.

"The crew members seem to like the Diehl cleats better," said Lieutenant Colonel S.A. Trace, from FMFLant's G-4 operations. "They can be installed in about 20 minutes because they are a slip-on type. The American-made cleats bolt on and require more time...it takes about two hours to put them on like we are using them in the test."

For the testing conditions, the West Germans recommended that their cleats be installed in place of every seventh pad and staggered. "For maximum traction in snow and ice, we would install them in place of every pad," Prescott commented. "But to keep some mobility on the roads, that would not be ideal."

ACCORDING TO ONE of the test tank drivers, there was a noticeable difference in the traction with the cleats on. "Thriller (one of the tanks used in the test) made the run about 20 seconds faster with the Diehl cleats," he opined as he readied the vehicle for a run in another configuration.

Once the times are in and compared, there will be a definite winner in the race to catch up on the technology lost after WW II. The Marine Corps may be in the winner's circle as its tracked vehicles make fast advances in conquering Artic climates and environments.

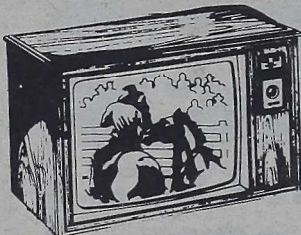

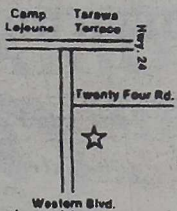

HqBn., MCB Marines enter cloudy world of nuclear, biological, chemical war

Ending years of non-participation, Leathernecks attached to Marine Corps Base are once again going to the gas chamber. The day-long course covers several topics in the nuclear, biological and chemical manuals. A series of these courses, which began in early March, gave Marines in Headquarters Battalion, MCB, the opportunity to venture into the world of NBC.

GUNNERY SERGEANT CHARLES E. Hill, an NBC specialist attached to the MCB Gas Chamber, explained the reason for beginning the training. "Somebody decided that there was a need for NBC training in the base training schedule," said the Atmore, Ala. native. "There was a base order that stopped NBC training years ago. Now it has started again in early March."

2d Marine Division and 2d Force Service Support Group each have a semi-annual 3-day block training program. Bases' day-long course is presently an annual requirement.

"The purpose for NBC training is to learn how to protect against and survive NBC warfare," said GySgt. Hill. That training is achieved by a series of lectures and practical application.

THE CLASSES COVER the effects of chemical, biological and nuclear contamination, how to recognize the agents and how to protect against them. The use of the M17A1 field protective mask and the mission oriented protective posture (MOPP) gear are explained. The opportunity to test the effectiveness of the field protective mask is given to each Leatherneck in the gas chamber.

Approximately 40 Marines entered the chamber, while the instructors ignited the CS or riot control gas. After checking masks for proper

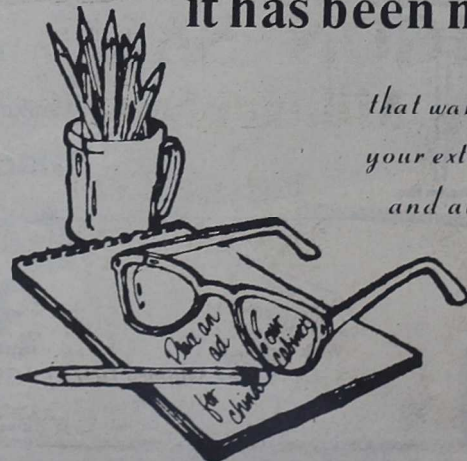

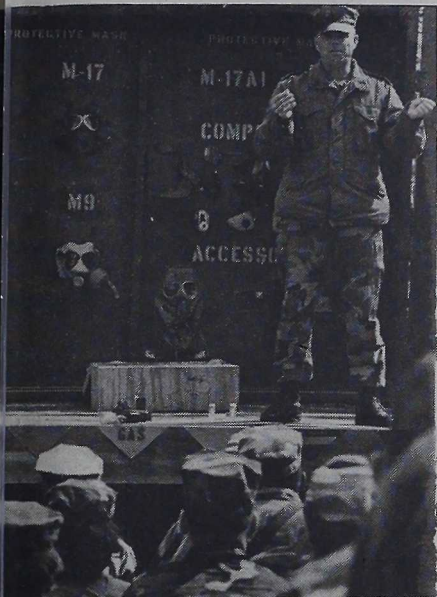

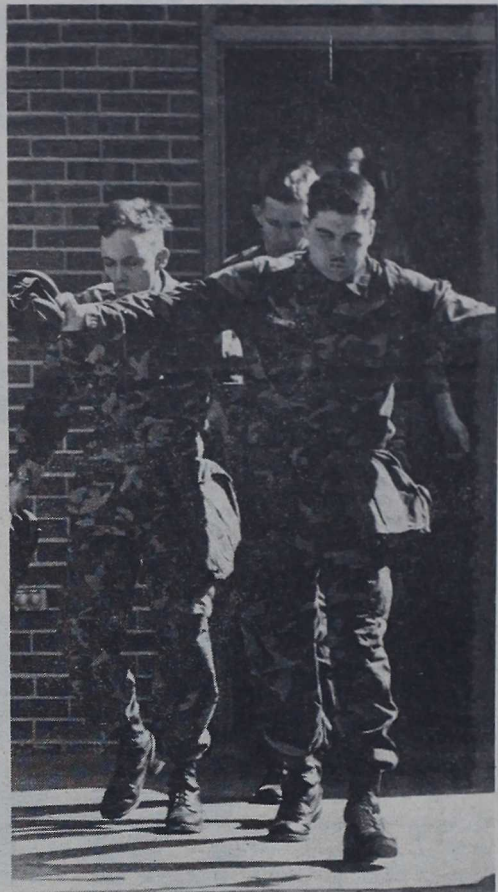
mation passed as to how to protect themselves from nuclear, biological or chemical attacks, the class is given the practical application. "There are four trails here," said GySgt. Hill. "We use three for training purposes and the fourth for the monitor survey teams. Each class has a chance to go down one trail and respond to the different scenarios." The scenarios include a simulated nuclear attack, in which the response is to lie flat on the ground, covering all exposed skin. A chemical spray attack calls for covering the body with the poncho, with the arm extended forward so as not to be completely blind as to enemy movement and masking. Biological attacks require donning the field protective mask and MOPP gear if called for.

THE PRACTICAL APPLICATION is followed by firing the M16A1 rifle with the field protective mask on. Women Marines were given the chance to fire with out wearing the mask as well.

Although HqBn. has only recently started their training at the gas chamber, the NBC course has been taught to various organizations on and off base. "Besides the tri-command area Marines that we teach here, we also instruct civilians, civilian police and ROTC units here," said GySgt. Hill. "Last year we had the Georgia State Police go through our course."

According to GySgt. Hill, NBC training has been stepped up in recent years. "With turmoil in the world and smaller countries gaining NBC capabilities, the need for NBC training is increasing. We have to be prepared to meet the challenge of fighting in an NBC environment," he said.

AS THE YEAR progresses, more Marines from HqBn. will find themselves in the NBC course. Given the chance to apply what they are taught, they will know whether or not they will be one of the survivors.

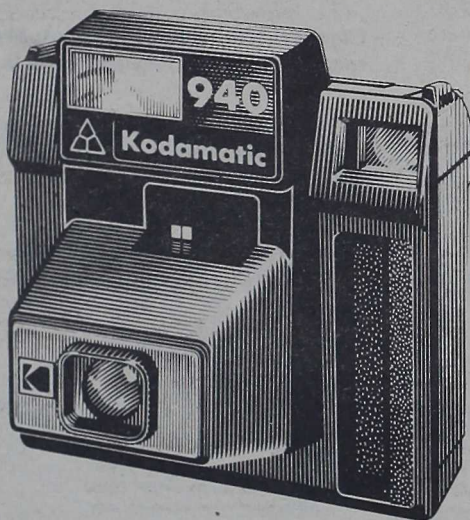

Verona Loop reunion

Fisher and Lewis descendents visit site of ancestor's beginning

Where children once chased puppies and piglets in 1941, Marines now hunker down to munch on field rations or pitch shelterhalves against the seasonal rains.

GENERATIONS OF FISHER and Lewis children grew up on the rich acreage that is now Camp Lejeune's Verona Loop range area. They reunited last weekend to picnic on the old family grounds. Some found remnants of days past: a buried plowshare, bricks from a crumbled hearth, a stone once used in salting pork.

"Life was simple, but exciting nonetheless," recalled Clifton Fisher, born in 1917. "We depended on farming for our summer needs and on fishing to provide winter food and income. We planted our own corn, tobacco and peanuts and raised hogs to support our families before 1941."

As the nation geared for an anticipated war, the Department of Defense laid plans for a Marine Corps training base in coastal North Carolina. The Fisher and Lewis families, like many others, sold huge tracts of land to the Department of Defense short months before the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor.

THE DESCENDENTS OF J.L. Fisher left their homes, barns and crops by June, 1941 and relocated from North Carolina to Florida as military engineers reshaped their fields.

Steve Marshburn, organizer of the family

reunion and impromptu family historian, displayed weathered photographs of the original family estates. More than 60 descendents of J.L. Fisher copied Marshburn's photos with their personal cameras or listened as the family elders recited tales and anecdotes of grandpa's follies and foibles.

"The women and girls in the family had to get up before sunrise," said 58-year-old Blanch Rhodes, "and cook breakfast for the menfolk. When that was done, we'd wake them up, they'd eat, grab a smoke and then head off to the fields or livestock pens for a day's work."

HAVING FUN WAS somewhat different then. There were no video arcades for teenagers, no theaters for entertainment and fun was homespun if had at all.

"Oh, we used to really have a good time," continued Rhodes, anxious to tell yet another family story. "We'd gather the family on the front porch or lawn and have square dances or round dances on the weekend. There were corn shuckin's and barbecues and we all had a good time. It was a nice break from the work of farming."

Younger relatives scoured neighboring forests for artifacts and heirlooms. With metal detectors, they uncovered pieces of farm machinery. A rusted Model-A Ford frame attracted curiosity.

FOLLOWING THEIR VISIT to the family grounds, the caravan of Fisher descendents visited cemetery sites in Jacksonville to pay homage to the roots of their family tree.

To sum it up: Math counts

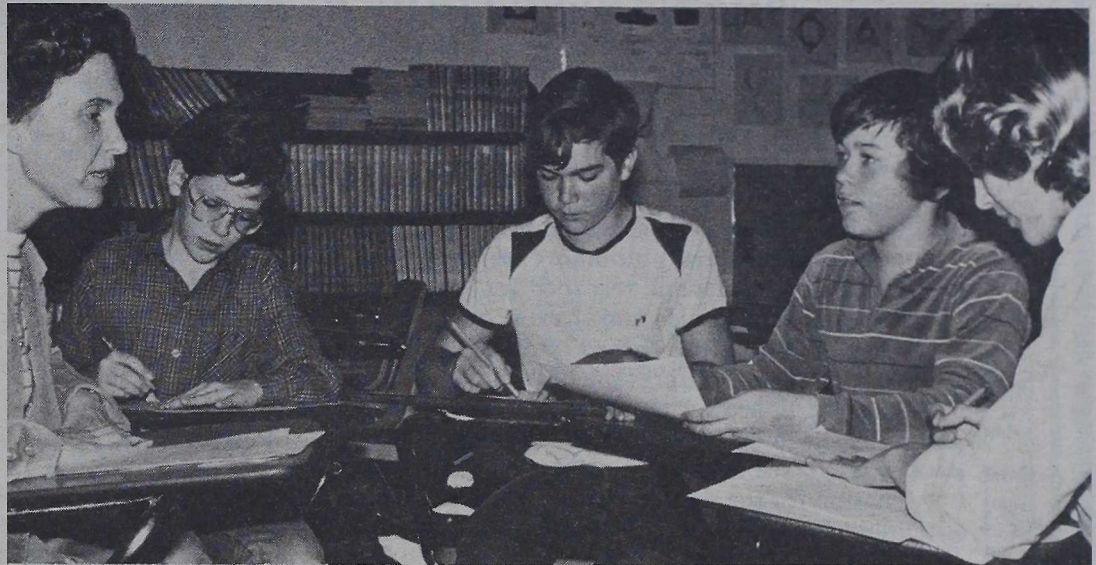

Take five Brewster Junior High School math teams, add one dedicated teacher. The solution: Mathcounts.

MATHCOUNTS IS A national program, endorsed statewide by the Professional Engineers of North Carolina, designed to stimulate more interest in junior high mathematics. The base team of seventh and eighth grade students has spent time recently having their math skills tested. Once the winning started, the young men and women became centers of attention, not only from teachers and school officials, but from their peers. "So many times we celebrate accomplishments in sports, it's a nice change to recognize academic achievements," Snapp said.

THE MATHCOUNTS TEAM traveled to

Raleigh, N.C., April 7 to challenge 20 top teams from throughout the state. Four individuals were chosen to make up the state team to compete at nationals. Although the Camp Lejeune students weren't selected for the team, their team placed eighth.

The successes, travels and experiences the youngsters have had recently have spurred much interest in not only the team but math itself. "The team's accomplishments have stimulated a lot of interest in math," Snapp explained "...and that was the whole idea."

YOU WON'T HAVE to go very far or wait long to experience the scene...Onslow Beach officially reopens May 5. Beach hours are 10 a.m. until sunset, Monday through Friday and 8 a.m. to sunset Saturday and Sunday. Lifeguards are on duty during those hours.

Snack bars, exchanges as well as enlisted, staff noncommissioned officer and officer clubs are there to meet most every need.

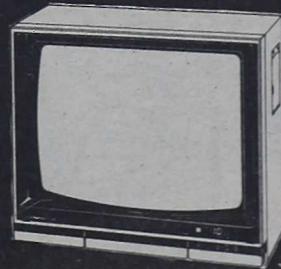

Kimberly Ann Pixton will miss her graduation, won't be able to attend her Senior Prom and you can't pry the smile off of her face. Pixton, daughter of Lieutenant Colonel and Mrs. Marvin Pixton of Jacksonville, was selected North Carolina's Junior Miss at the state pageant in January. While her friends are dancing at the prom, she will be performing at a Junior Miss Pageant in Rocky Mount, N.C. 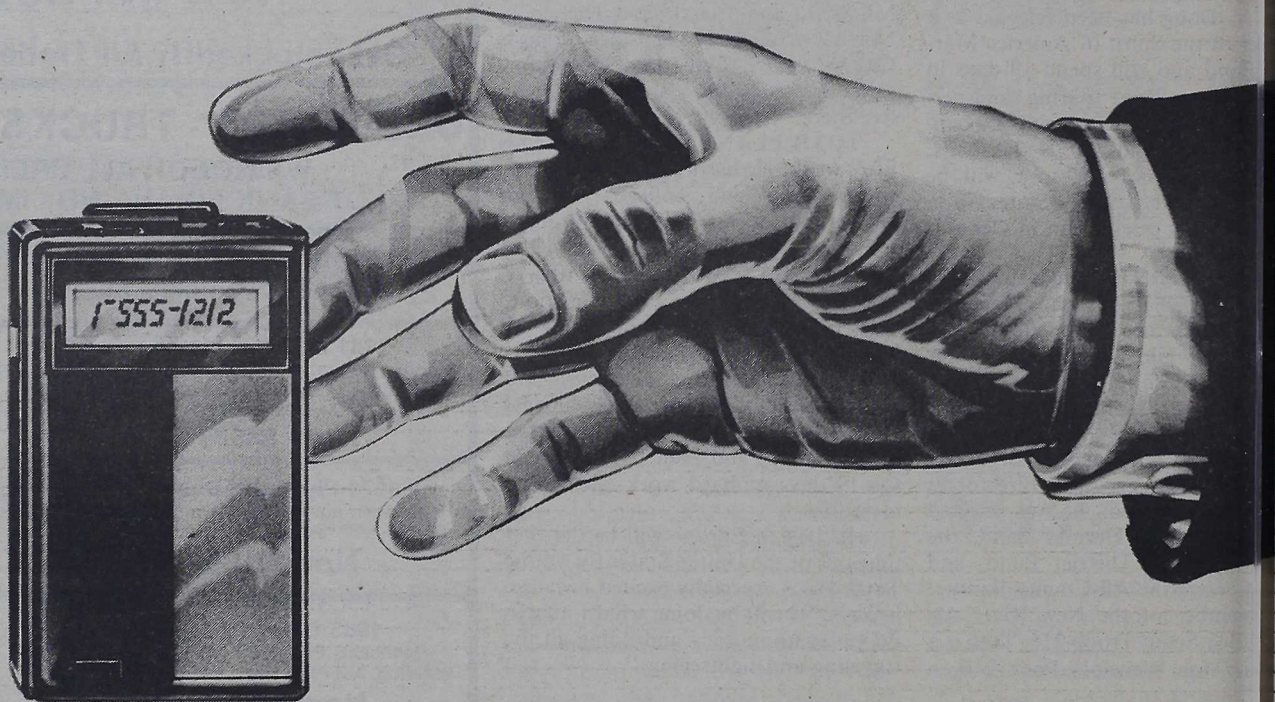

Leathernecks capture medals

The All Marine Wrestling Team hurdled their first obstacle enroute to the Summer Olympic Games in Los Angeles by dominating the Interservice Wrestling Championships.

EIGHTY WRESTLERS FROM the Army, Navy, Air Force and Marine Corps grappled for gold, silver and bronze medals at the West Point Military Academy March 12 - 15 in their bid to qualify for the 1984 Summer Olympics in Los Angeles.

The wrestling win marked the seventh consecutive year that the All Marine team has garnered top honors in the interservice competition. Marines earned 23 medals during the week-long meet, including four double gold medal winners. Sergeant Lou Dorrance, 114 pounds; Corporal Craig Pollard, 149.5 pounds; Sergeant Greg Gibson, 220 pounds; and Sergeant Ron Carlisle, heavyweight; carried home two gold medals each.

As a result of the interservice matches, thirteen Marines qualified for the Olympic Trials in freestyle or Greco-Roman competition. It's the most qualifiers the Corps has attained in wrestling.

THE CORPS' WRESTLING program came to the forefront in 1976 when, then 1stLt. Lloyd Keaser won a silver medal in that year's olympics. Since that time, Marines have continued to improve and exhibited their skills in the interservice matches.

The Marine team walked away with an overall point standing of 181 followed by the Army with 107, Navy with 88 and the Air Force with 39 points.

What makes the victory more impressive is the relative youth of the Marine squad.

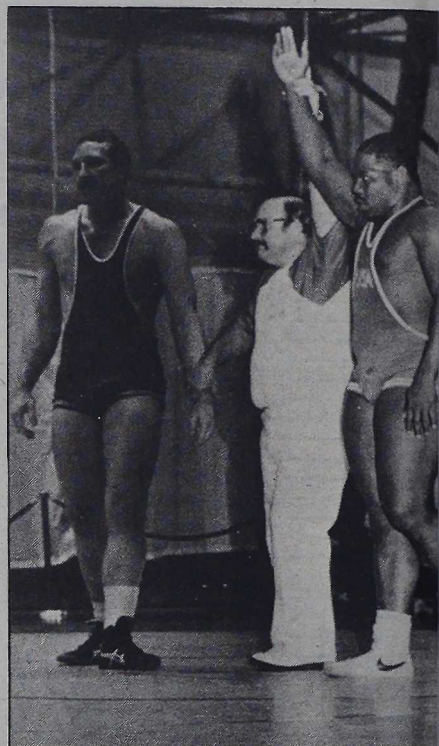
"**WE ARE A** very good team and a young team," said Sgt. Dan Mello, a winner of gold and silver medals at West Point and an interservice champion since 1979. "Unfortunately, the team doesn't stay together for long periods of time and every year is a rebuilding process."

Mello won the Olympic Trials in 1980 in the 136.5 pound weight class and hopes to repeat this summer.

"The road to Los Angeles will be paved with sweat, dedication, stamina, motivation, guts and confidence of those wrestlers who can put it all together learning from losses and benefiting from personal and team successes," said Marine coach GySgt. Art Williams. Williams is a confident but far from cocky coach when he discusses the possibilities of the team. His adjectives aptly describe the team's performance at West Point on the banks of the Hudson River.

THE COMPETITION OPENED with freestyle wrestling where Marines earned six gold, three silver and three bronze medals. The most spirited performance was turned in by Corporal Anthony Lee who is stationed at Headquarters Marine Corps, Washington, D.C. Lee, wrestling in the 136 pound weight class, suffered injuries to his ankle and ribs during an earlier match. When Coach Williams uttered the possibility of leaving the competition, Lee emphatically said, "Just wrap them up." He proceeded to win a gold medal in freestyle and a silver in Greco Roman.

Mello, Dorrance, Carlisle and Gibson are the foundations of the team and provide the younger wrestlers with the experience and motivation

necessary to maintain the winning tradition.

Carlisle exudes confidence on and off the mats. In concert with Coach Williams, he serves as a father figure that was best exemplified by Lance Corporal Eric Seward battled in the 136 pound boat against an undefeated Navy wrestler. Seward fought tough and smart and wrenched

medal from his opponent after a long and exciting match.

FOR THE VICTORY, the trim and wiry Carlisle leaped into heavyweight Carlisle's arms as tears of joy rolled down his cheeks. In the Greco Roman competition, Marines used their domination earning six gold, four and one bronze medal. Dorrance started the gold in Greco with a win in the 114 pound. The 25-year-old Marine stationed at Quantico has been interservice champ since 1980

and has a legitimate shot at making the U.S. Olympic Team. Dorrance also was named Sombo Athlete of the Year during the award ceremony along with his two gold medals.

THE INTERSERVICE MATCHES provide the team with valuable experience that'll get them through the tough months ahead, culminating in the Olympic Trials in Denver this summer.

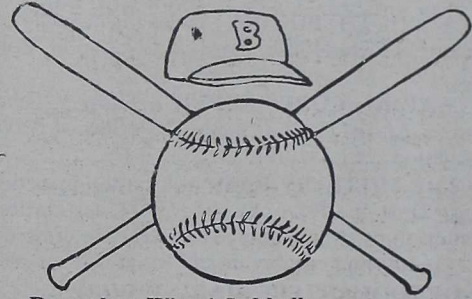

MCAS EL TORO, SANTA ANA, CALIF.--When the Marine aviators took-off on a routine training flight, their instructions were clear.

The launch from the deck of the aircraft carrier *USS Midway* was right on schedule and both men knew what had to be done.

Once the aircraft was catapulted from the deck, the Marines would fly their RF-4B Phantom jet about 100 miles out over the blue waters of the Northern Arabian Sea. Upon their return to ship, they would approach the huge floating sea platform at high speed, simulating the attack of a hostile enemy aircraft. Neither Marine realized at the time, though, just how realistic their approach would be.

"EVERYTHING WAS GOING fine," recalled the pilot, Captain Michael J. Healey. "We were making our final approach to the ship when I attempted to lower the landing gear. The main gear came down but the nose gear malfunctioned. Out attempts to lower the gear by pneumatic air pressure failed."

When Capt. Healey, an Orange, Calif., resident, and El Toro resident, Major John M. Yencha, the aerial reconnaissance officer, encountered a hydraulic failure of their jets' landing

gear, they realized the training mission was over and this was for real.

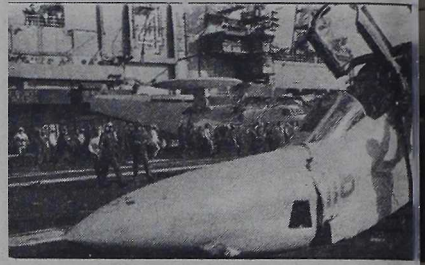
The Marines were part of Detachment "A," a four plane detachment maintained permanently aboard the *Midway* from Marine Tactical Reconnaissance Squadron (VMFP)-3, 3d Marine Aircraft Wing. VMFP-3, the Marine Corps' largest squadron, rotates detachments every six-months aboard the U. S. Navy aircraft carrier.

THE TWO MARINES circled the ship while receiving instructions from the bridge. They were miles from shore and no secondary runway was available. They would have to try a risky landing aboard the carrier, without the use of the nose landing gear.

According to Capt. Healey, their chances of pulling off such a landing were about 50/50. A nylon barricade was positioned across the width of the flight deck. The aviators were instructed to bring the jet in at a precise speed and glide slope, allowing the plane to slide in on its belly and into the nylon barricade.

ONCE THE AIRCRAFT hit the deck and the barricade, which looked like an over-sized tennis net, it would be anyone's guess if it would be enough to stop the jet from sliding into the ocean. Everything would have to be perfect for the seldom-used emergency rescue tactic to be successful.

"The only thing going through my mind when we made our final approach was a perfect landing. I knew this would have to be the best I could make," Capt. Healey said. "With gear up, the angle of the attack index remained inaccurate. I relied on Maj. Yencha as the signal officer to provide precise information. Maj. Yencha called out airspeeds every two to three seconds during the approach to keep us exactly on speed."

As the plane approached, the speed of the slope was perfect. Now, everything depended on the flight crew and the ability of the barricade to catch the jet.

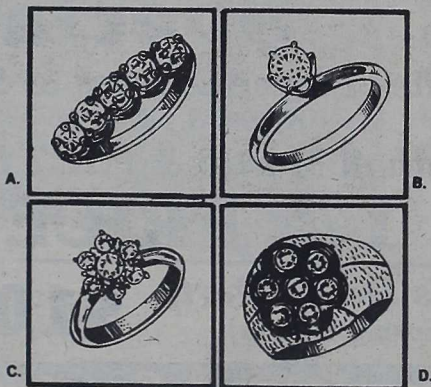
"WE HIT THE deck about 120 feet from the edge. Once we hit, we knew this was it," Capt. Healey said. "The barricade that stood between us and the ocean. The aircraft finally came to rest, we were about 10 feet from the edge of the flight deck."

The two Marines were able to get out of the aircraft when it stopped without having to be rescued. Because of their efforts, no one was hurt and the aircraft suffered only moderate damage. A disaster at sea had been averted.
