# So long Red

*Almost 400 years of  
history had been enfolded  
in the outstretched arms  
of the oak tree near  
the base stables,  
but the time had come to let go*

She was unbelievably natural with overwhelming influence. Her out-stretched arms welcomed and sheltered all who came to her. Tall and down-to-earth, she lived only for the most simple pleasures: the radiating warmth of the sun, the refreshing wet rain and an occasional passing breeze that caused her long tresses to sway gently back and forth.

CALL IT WHAT you will—a rendezvous with destiny perhaps, but there is no doubt she was created for greatness from the very beginning as an inspiration and asset to humanity.

Her death was not untimely, nor was her life without meaning. On the contrary, her life was full and unselfish, a life whose sole purpose was devoted to making our mundane world a little easier to wake up to, a little more pleasing to see.

Through her and others like her, we have come to know the true beauty of nature. Unfortunately, many of us are in too much of a hurry to stop and appreciate the beauty, and now in this instance it's too late. A Camp Lejeune giant has fallen.

NO, THIS IS not the obituary for a policy-making official, political big-whig or social magnate. This is to eulogize a magnificent Red Oak tree who after nearly 400 years in existence is gone. Four hundred years... imagine if she could communicate what tales she might reveal.

In 1706 when the first white men settled in what is now Onslow County, the tree was already almost



100-years old. Perhaps wandering woodsmen of the early 1600's sought refuge from the sweltering sun during the day and made camp under her cool, umbrella shade. Or maybe she would talk of how children during the years of the American Revolution circled her in song and dance, hands clasped together, oblivious to the political turbulence of the time.

Another factor makes this Red Oak tree very special, there are only two others on Camp Lejeune that are as old.

"TREES ARE SOMETHING just about everyone takes for granted," said Camp Lejeune arborist George Cudwise. "No one notices them or sees to care what happens to them, but believe me they notice if they were suddenly not here. Imagine this world would look like without trees."

According to Cudwise, the Red Oak tree that stands behind the base stables is at least 360-years-old and has been dead for some time. He explained that the age of a tree is determined on a scale from one to seven, with one representing the fastest growing and seven the slowest.

Once the tree has been scaled, this number multiplied by the width of the tree in inches results equate to the age of the tree in years. The Red Oak has a scale rating of 6 and is 60 inches in diameter, making it approximately 360-years-old.

When mature, a Red Oak will reach a height of 60 feet and weigh many tons. Some species of trees that thrive in the Bristle Cone Pine indigenous to desert areas can live for a thousand years.

WHO CARES? WELL, take Cudwise's suggestion and imagine a treeless earth. How boring. There would be no forbidden branches for children to climb. Remember those enticing summer days when the family gathered to pick apples in the orchard? Forget it, no trees, no apples.

If there were no trees where would cats find shelter from aggressive dogs? Without trees George Washington would have had to cut down a tree to get a how undramatic. Birds would have to resort to the tops for sanctuary.

The fate of squirrels and other animals dependent on trees for refuge would be uncertain. Little children would be deprived of the emotional crises of having their kites caught in trees and dog owners might be up walking miles in search of a fire hydrant. The naturally the American concept of the perfect picnic would not exist.

Trees do so much for us. But because we're in such a hurry to get where we're going, it is often too late to appreciate their beauty.

Stop and smell the trees.

## Force Recon Johansen Award winner named

The 1982 Johansen Award for the most outstanding Marine in the Second Force Reconnaissance Company was awarded to Sergeant Scott Nyman at a Recon family day on June 1.

THE ANNUAL AWARD is named in honor of Captain Peter J. Johansen who was killed in a parachute operation at Fountain Drop Zone, Chinquapin, N.C., on January 16, 1963.

"I didn't know anything about being picked for the award until the family day," said Sgt. Nyman, a Minneapolis, Minn. native. "It really came as a surprise, and I'm not that sure that I rate the award. There are a lot of other quality Marines in the company."

The 29-year-old sergeant has attended several military schools—diver, parachutist, free-fall, ranger, jumpmaster and airborne.

"I can't think of a better example in the company," said Maj. Kevin Conry, 2nd Force Recon Company commander. "He has the right rank, the right schools. He is exactly what we are looking for in our Marine NCOs."

Many criteria are involved in selecting the recipient for this annual award. The Marine must be a team

leader, be dependable, successfully complete his unit mission and work well with other military services.

"Sgt. Nyman definitely fits these qualifications," said the Major. "He is a jumpmaster and is responsible for conducting jumpmaster jumps. He really has control of the lives of people in the company straight up to the major and on down to the privates. I don't think there are too many other sergeants that have that kind of responsibility—that have that control and responsibility of life and death."

Sgt. Nyman has spent his entire post recruit Marine Corps career with Force Recon. "He is sort of a Recon product," said Major Conry.

Although Sgt. Nyman was aware the award existed, he didn't aspire to earn it. "I just try to do my job," said Sgt. Nyman. "I really am surprised I was picked for the honor. And I'm just going to continue doing my job."

Sgt. Nyman had just returned in May from a month-long operation in Germany and headed immediately out to 29 Palms, Calif. for a two-week training exercise.

"The award took a little longer than normal to present," said Major Conry. "Normally we like to get the award out in January or February, but our heavy training commitment has not allowed both Sgt. Nyman and myself to be together at the same place at the same time until now."

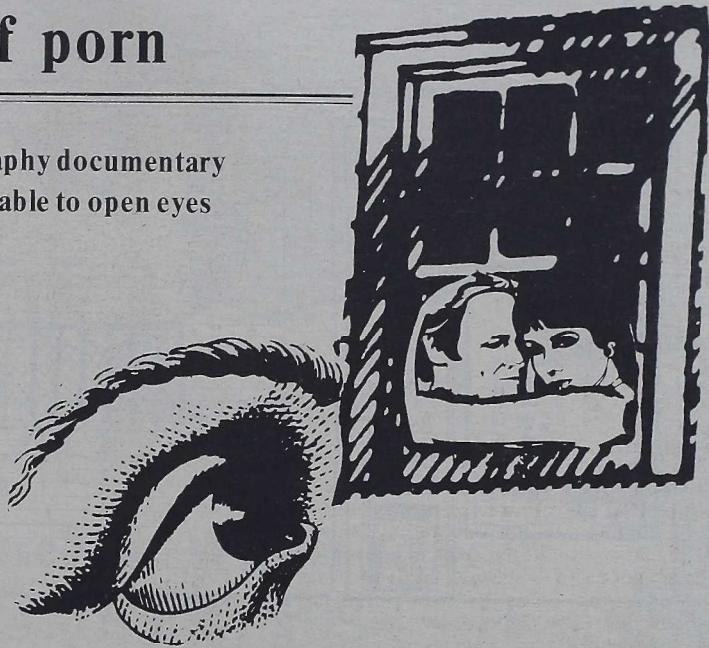

# A peep at the world of porn

A five-part anti-pornography documentary will be aired on the base cable to open eyes to a local problem

A five-part documentary on pornography will be aired on Base cable television June 13-17. The films will be aired each night beginning at 9 p.m.

**RENTED FROM THE** Christian Broadcasting Network of Virginia Beach, Va., the films have been called "X-pose." They uncover five areas of pornography. Each segment will last approximately 45 minutes.

The anti-porno 'X-Pose' presentation is a continuation of the war on crime campaign that General Fulham started a few years ago when he was commander of the base here," said Commander A. Olander, Family Service Center.

General Fulham picked up on the theme and focused on areas where he could reduce behavior problems, and pornography is one of those areas," Olander continued.

**ACCORDING TO THE** chaplain, syndicate crime in Jacksonville and pornography is just one manifestation of itself.

Pornography is not only a crime against a parishioner, said Chaplain Olander, "but also against a community at large. And at Camp Lejeune we are the problem forthright."

The chaplain said one way the base is combatting pornography is through the films rented from CBN. The films cost the base \$2,000 a year to rent," Olander.

**CHAPLAIN FIRST** heard about the films from a captain assigned to the Sixth Marines.

"I put me in contact with someone at CBN who could rent the films," continued Chaplain Olander. "We now have the films, and I intend to make good use of them."

The chaplain elaborated on pornography.

**IS MORE** blatantly open and procureable everywhere today. Pornography has taken its place today which are exceedingly detrimental to the emotional fabric of society. First, there is a lot of extreme violence."

The chaplain cited the pornographic movie "Fanny" as being almost more offensive because of its violence than because of its sexual orientation. Another area of concern to the chaplain was child pornography. "In my generation, such a thing was unthinkable," he said.

**ALTHOUGH THE FIVE** segments touch on different parts of pornography, the chaplain recommended that if a person is unable to view all five segments, that they make an effort to see the last

"Pat Robertson spends half of the show time discussing ways which we as community leaders can fight back against this immoral paralysis," said Cmdr. Olander. Additionally, the chaplain recommended small children not view the shows.

"I would have to say as a chaplain that young children should not see these shows, especially the first one," he said. "But I must encourage all adults, especially parents to view these shows."

**THE SCENES IN** parts of the documentaries will be offensive to some people, according to the chaplain. "To be sure--our intent was never to offend any individual. Yet some people will be offended. I can only hope and encourage these people to go beyond their initial reaction and view the segments and hopefully take the first step to do something about pornography," encouraged the chaplain.

Viewing the films is only one way people here can begin to combat pornography.

"I personally believe many people could come up with many positive things to help us put this literary garbage in a place where it will do the least harm," said Chaplain Olander.

**THE CHAPLAIN ADMITS** that the films won't enable him or the base to rid Jacksonville or Onslow County of pornography. "I'm perfectly realistic that there will always be a certain element that will insist and procure such material," he said. "Yet I'm naive enough, bold enough, to believe that the majority will be heightened in their awareness of pornography."

"Just look at the violent statistics and rape, the unwanted pregnancies and crimes for what we now sometimes call 'follow the leader sex crimes' which

are so prevalent in many of our schools today. We simply had to take action," stressed the commander.

These films attempt to deal realistically with the subject of pornography. "They are documentaries about specifics of the pornography trade: where it comes from, what it does, and what it produces in terms of individuals," explained Chaplain Olander.

**"WITHOUT ATTEMPTING TO** sound moralistic, I believe the films do establish a rationale for community morality," he continued. "My experience as an American is that most of us really want to stand for something."

"Obviously I feel very much in tune with the spiritual motivation, regardless of creed, that prompts much of our American way of life," the chaplain continued. "I find it significant that in all the major religious groups today pornography is not an 'ok' lifestyle."

The chaplain emphasizes that there are legal ways to combat pornography. "Although I don't necessarily support or subscribe to 'the moral majority'; I do believe that there is a moral majority which wants pornography put as far away as possible, as it is legally possible."

**HE ADMITS THAT** many people are complacent about pornography. Although they may not personally indulge in it, they believe that what people do by themselves is their own affair.

"Probably one of the deadliest things in this world is captured in a Portuguese phrase which translates roughly into English--'Let's leave everything just as it is and see what happens,'" said the chaplain. "Obviously if we ran foreign policies, military maneuvers or even our educational system this way, chaos would be sure to follow."

### Accident

Lance Corporal Zachary C. Lennon, 22, and Lance Corporal Ronnie W. Beatty, 21, died from injuries received in a head-on collision, June 2, on Highway 17. Corporal Keith A. Bailey, 22, was listed in guarded condition at Craven County Hospital at press time as a result of the same accident.

LCpls Lennon and Beatty were traveling north on Highway 17 when the southbound Oldsmobile Cutlass, driven by Cpl. Bailey, crossed the center-line and struck their MG sports car head-on, according to a Highway Patrol official.

LCpls Lennon and Beatty were assigned to Headquarters and Service Company, 2nd Battalion, Eighth Marines. Cpl. Bailey is from

The chaplain's office plans to run these films three or four times a year.

**AFTER TAKING A** pause, the blond-haired chaplain thought for a moment and then looked through a folder. He pulled out a typed sheet of paper and read: "Does pornography make a difference in society?"

The question had been posed by Chaplain N. D. Holcomb, Protestant program coordinator here. "Yes, we should be concerned about it. It portrays a

crippled portrait of personhood - an individual who we chaplains at least would like to help heal and make whole in so far as it is possible to do so. We disagree with a Playboy philosophy that arrogantly and unashamedly assumes others are for one's use."

The first segment of the five-part series is entitled "They're Killing Our Children." Hosted by Efrem Zimbalist Jr., it looks at the physical and psychological rape of children. The CBN camera

crews traveled throughout the U.S. and interviewed child abuse experts, police vice-squad office victims of sexual abuse and men who sexploited children.

**THE SECOND SEGMENT**, "Flesh USA," is hosted by Art Linkletter. The show is shown through the New York City "Show World" Street plus adult bookstores and peep shows. Later later examines the growth of pornography magazines and movies. Linda Lovelace, pornography movie star is interviewed.

On Wednesday Carol Lawrence kicks off "Porn Invasion" with a brief overview. Thursday's show, "Porno: The Dead Game," examines the issues of pornography, sex crimes, the abuse of those involved in the industry, and how pornography contributes to the deterioration of the family and society in general.

**THE FINAL SHOW**, "The Porno Finale" summarizes the four other night's presentations and provides the viewers with ways that pornography can be fought.

Marines from the 2nd Radio Battalion donated more than 1,000 pounds of metal to a New York City museum in the form of a bell removed from the USS Intrepid, a World War II aircraft carrier, many years ago.

**WE ARE GIVING** the bell back to its rightful owner," said Lieutenant Colonel William Keller, 2nd Radio Battalion commanding officer. "I felt a lot of nostalgia about losing the bell. I know the men of 2nd Radio Battalion are my feeling that we're actually doing something."

The bell is being donated to the Intrepid Sea-Air-Space Museum located in New York City. Charles J. Toomey, executive director of the museum was scheduled to receive the presentation from the 2nd Radio Battalion staff.

It was nice the Marines had the bell in their care," said the Korean War-era Marine formerly from Weapons Platoon, Echo Company, 2nd Battalion, 4th Marines. "This donation from the Radio Battalion really fills up our museum. It is a nice addition."

**ACCORDING TO TOOMEY**, the museum still needs a few small items to restore completely the ship to its original 1943 condition.

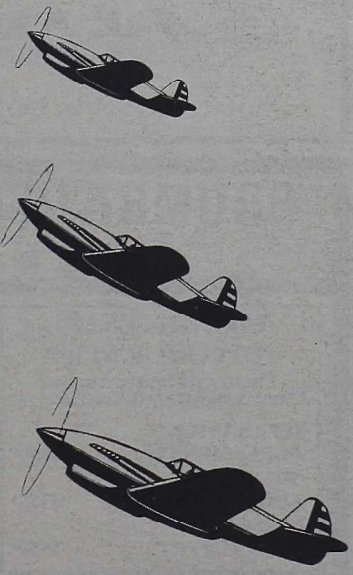
Although we still need some other things, we don't need anything as significant as the bell," said Toomey. "It makes me feel like we have given the ship some character."

"We were contacted by the 2nd Radio Battalion," said the executive director. "I was a little surprised to find that someone still had the bell. I was thrilled that the bell is back where it belongs on the ship."

**NO ONE IS** certain how the bell got into the hands of Marines, but the bell has been with 2nd Radio Battalion for several years.

"Radio Battalion was stationed out at Camp Geiger next to another unit," said LtCol. Keller. "When that unit was transferred mainside they gave 2nd Radio the bell."

The 1943 USS Intrepid was the second American ship to bear this name. In 1804, the United States acquired the original Intrepid, a 64-ton ship formerly a part of the Tripolitan fleet. It was used by the Navy to combat the Barbary pirates.

# New treads tested for 'tired' five tons

The motor transport branch of the Development Center, Quantico, Va., aided by the motor transport section of Tenth Marines, conducted a Tactical Feasibility Test here May 16-27.

**THE TACTICAL PROBLEM** tested the tires presently used on the M813 five ton truck used to tow the M198 howitzer. The evaluators tested the standard 1120 tires currently used on the trucks, the 1400R-20 tires and the 1600R-21 super single radial tires.

"Mobility is the biggest problem with the 1120s," said Captain Ralph Hickman of MCDEC. "They would not get traction in sand or muddy areas. The tires would sheer-off the sand as they went through it and would slide and gradually sink in it."

The evaluators were concerned with the performance of the 1120 when they were deflated. "If you lower the pressure in the old tire, they're not as flexible and don't spread out and get as much ground traction as the super singles can," said Capt. Hickman. "This is important when running the vehicles through cross-country terrain such as sand, mud or clay," he added.

**THE TEST SITES** selected for the evaluation were known problem areas for training around Camp Lejeune. Onslow Beach and TLZ Hawk were included as test sites.

At Onslow Beach the tires were tested on three different sand mounds at varying slopes. At TLZ Hawk the tires were tested in a muddy areas well as a figure-eight course of sand.

After two weeks of testing, Capt. Hickman and his evaluators determined that the 1600R-21 is the best tire for use with the M813 while towing the M198 howitzer.

"**THERE ARE REALLY** no problems with the 1400's either," said Capt. Hickman, "but the 1600's proved to be better suited for the job."

"The 1600's used at three different tire pressures would give the best results," commented Capt. Hickman. "Forty pounds (pressure) per square inch would be ideal for highway travel while towing the M198," he said, "with a deflation to 25 pounds for muddy and clay type terrain and 10 pounds for traveling in sand."

"The mobility of the vehicles was increased by 40 percent with the 1600's," said Capt. Hickman. "We are going to recommend that the Marine Corps go to the super-singles and that current fleets be outfitted with them," he added.

**ACCORDING TO CAPT.** Hickman, the trucks will have to run a 12,000 mile duration test cycle in a

mud and clay environment to determine wheeling wear and other potential maintenance problems associated with changing tires.

"The tires should be ready for use within the four months," said Capt. Hickman. "They should move smoothly into the system with no problems at this time."

A Central Tire Inflation System was proposed on the truck by American Motors representatives. "This system will allow the driver to inflate and deflate the tires to the needed pressure from inside the cab instead of manually," explained Capt. Hickman.

"**WE DON'T WANT** to implement the system until the bugs are worked out of it," he said. "May the truck's eight-year rebuilding cycle we may incorporate the system into the trucks."

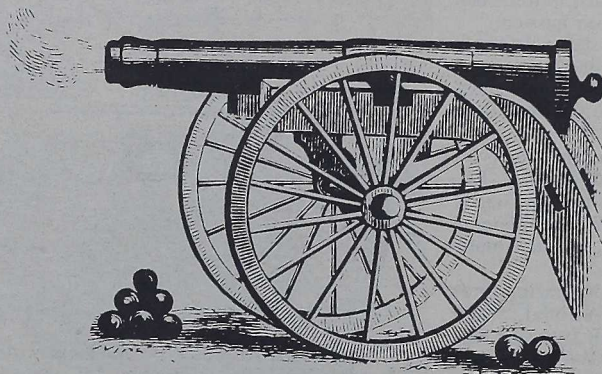
...Tenth Marines is completing plans to reorganize its  
...battalions beginning in September. According to  
...Captain Joseph Hylan, assistant S-4 officer of the  
...regiment, "Every battalion in the regiment will be  
...affected by the change."

**CURRENTLY THE REGIMENT** is organized into  
...three battalions, three of which are direct support  
...battalions and two self-propelled. First, Second  
...and Third battalions maintain three direct support  
...batteries of M198's and one general support bat-

...tally the general support battalions are the  
...Fourth and Fifth battalions, with the weapon for the  
...Fourth battalion being the 155mm self-propelled  
...howitzer. The Fifth battalion cannoners are masters  
...of 8-inch self-propelled howitzer.

Capt. Hylan stated that both direct and general  
...support battalions will be altered significantly  
...during the completion of all changes. "The direct  
...support battalion, which normally supports an infantry  
...battalion, will be reorganized with three batteries  
...of M198's, eight guns per battery," he said.

**THIS STRUCTURAL CHANGE** is known as the  
... "three by eight" concept. The concept currently used  
...is "four by six" or four batteries, with six guns  
...per battery. First and second battalions will be set up in the  
... "three by eight" fashion using the M198 155mm  
...howitzer. Third battalion will also remain a direct



support battalion, but will be realigned under the  
... "three by eight" concept using the M114 (155mm)  
...howitzer.

Commenting on the general support battalions, the  
...captain explained that, "The self-propelled howitzers  
...of the Fourth Battalion will be transferred to the Fifth  
...battalion and Fifth battalion will then control  
...all of the self-propelled howitzers in the regiment." He  
...added that Fourth battalion would contain three  
...batteries of M198's but they would have six guns per  
...battery, not eight.

Under the new organization, the direct support  
...battalions will be the most affected. Each firing bat-  
...tery will have two-four gun platoons with a separate  
...Fire Direction Center (FDC) for each platoon.

**CURRENTLY EACH FIRING** battery in the regi-  
...ment has only one FDC. This change, with the ad-

ditional howitzers, will bring about the need for more  
...Marines in the direct support batteries.

"Billeting is a major concern at the present time,"  
...said Capt. Hylan. "We are working with the G-4  
...Facilities Officer to obtain increased building  
...space," he added. Obtaining proper equipment for  
...all personnel is also being resolved. "This problem is  
...being worked out by supply personnel," assured the  
...Captain.

Although all plans are not complete and problems  
...exist, Capt. Hylan remains optimistic.

**"IT WILL BE** a difficult undertaking, but the  
...reorganization of Tenth Marines will provide better

# Tight crew keeps LVT on 'trac'

An amphibious landing involves many elements working together like clockwork to assure that the Marine infantrymen land on the beach with the best possible chance of accomplishing their mission.

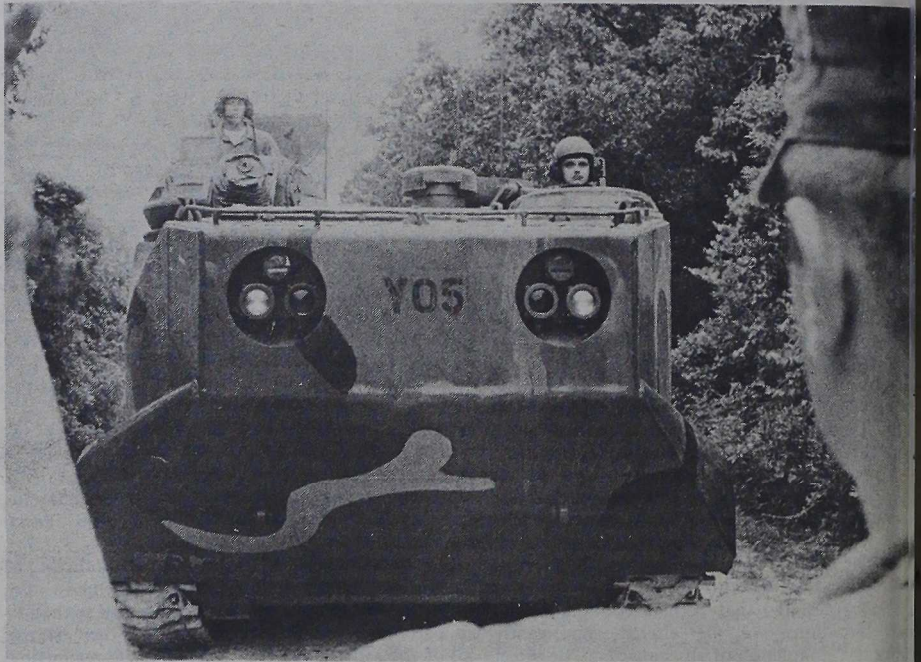
ONE OF THE main elements for such a landing is the Landing Vehicle Tracked (LVT), and according to the dedicated crews who operate this 20-ton vehicle, assuring a safe trip from the ship to the shore is no easy task.

"We have ten minutes of maintenance for every hour we drive the tractors," said Sergeant Ron Stabler, a 22-year-old Moline, Ill. native. Sgt. Stabler is the second section leader for Yankee Platoon, Headquarters and Service Company, Assault Amphibian Battalion.

Sgt. Stabler said that although the tractor crews must keep the vehicles operational, their maintenance capabilities are limited. "We can only do first echelon maintenance," he said. The Marine Corps uses five stages, or echelons in determining the level of maintenance needed. The first level is for work that can be done on the spot or more basic maintenance, and the system works up to fifth echelon for the more detailed or time consuming work.

"WE DO THREE" stages of first echelon maintenance on our tractors," he said. According to Sgt. Stabler, the first phase is a 'before operation' check in which the crew chief thoroughly checks the vehicle looking for leaks and loose bolts. He also checks the gear drives, oil and radiator. "We also have 'during operations' checks," he said, pointing out that his check is usually done by the driver.

"Our driver checks the gauges and listens for foul sounds in the engines and drive trains," said Sgt. Stabler.



Just like an Indy racer, Amtracs need their own form of TLC. A good crew knows it; their tractor knows it.

He said that the last stage of maintenance is the after operation check. "This stage is primarily the same as the before operation check," Sgt. Stabler explained. "We circle the vehicle looking for broken parts and loose bolts and check all of the fluids such as oil and water."

YANKEE PLATOON HAS 18 tractors, 16 LVTs and 2 command vehicles called C-7s. Maintenance techniques are effective according to Sgt. Stabler.

experts, because they have very major breakdowns. Trackers will testify that to at 25 mph on the ground and 8 in the water in the modern P-7 is one of life's pleasures. The contention however is that if a time, trackers would have their crossed.



"The LVT is a lot of fun to drive," 3-year-old tractor driver Lance Curt Hey, Rushville, N.Y. If they would put a little more armor on them, I'd feel a lot safer."

**CORDING TO SGT.** Stabler, in the LVT P-7 replaced the P-5. He said the major difference was the body. The P-5's body was steel. When the model was introduced its shell was of an aluminium alloy which, according to LVT experts, is less able to enemy firepower.

The P-7, which is capable of carrying combat-ready troops, has a turret that houses an M-85 .50 caliber machine gun," described Sgt. Stabler. "I also have tanks at our disposal which add firepower."

Although the LVT is designed for a man crew, one crew chief, one and an assistant driver, the short trackers usually allows only two per tractor, said Sgt. Stabler.

**CREW CHIEF,** it's my job to put for the other guys on the tractor said 23-year-old Corporal Ron Stabler. The crew chief accepts responsibility for the tractor, the crew and all who are aboard.

According to Corporal David Court, a 21-year-old Crossville, Tenn.

native and instructor at the Yankee Platoon's LVT school, the job of driver also has its share of responsibilities. "A lot goes into a driver like LCpl Hey and his job," he said. "Not only does he have to know how to hit each curve and hill, in case of ambush in a combat situation he has to be able to position the tractor just right for the best engagement against the enemy."

Although an ideal working day for the trackers is from 7 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., not every day is an ideal day, according to Cpl. Courtad.

**"WE AVERAGE ABOUT** six major operations a year," he said. On a major deployment, it isn't unusual for trackers to average three hours of sleep a night.

Despite the heavy work schedule that trackers are frequently called on to accept, Cpl. Whelin and LCpl. Hey say that platoon morale is sky high.

"This is the tightest platoon I've been in in my three years in the Corps," said Cpl. Whelin. He said that for the last year and a half Sgt. Stabler, LCpl. Hey and himself have been together through good and bad times. It's that camaraderie that makes a successful, smooth running LVT crew.

# Corpsman finds solitude with surrealistic art

Surrounded by ominous black clouds, a mighty centaur stands meekly before the gods he has offended. The tear-stained face and the outstretched arms of the accused express the fear of an uncertain fate. Candles floating among the clouds illuminate the inquisition, as a bird, the symbol of freedom, glances back before taking flight.

**EMERGING FROM THE** sanctuary of the heavens with faces twisted in scorn, the gods pronounce judgment on the half-man half-horse.

This fantasy world, reminiscent of Homer's Odyssey, is the product of Hospitalman Neal Caron's imagination and pencil. Caron has the enviable talent of turning his deepest thoughts and vivid imagination into dramatic sketchings.

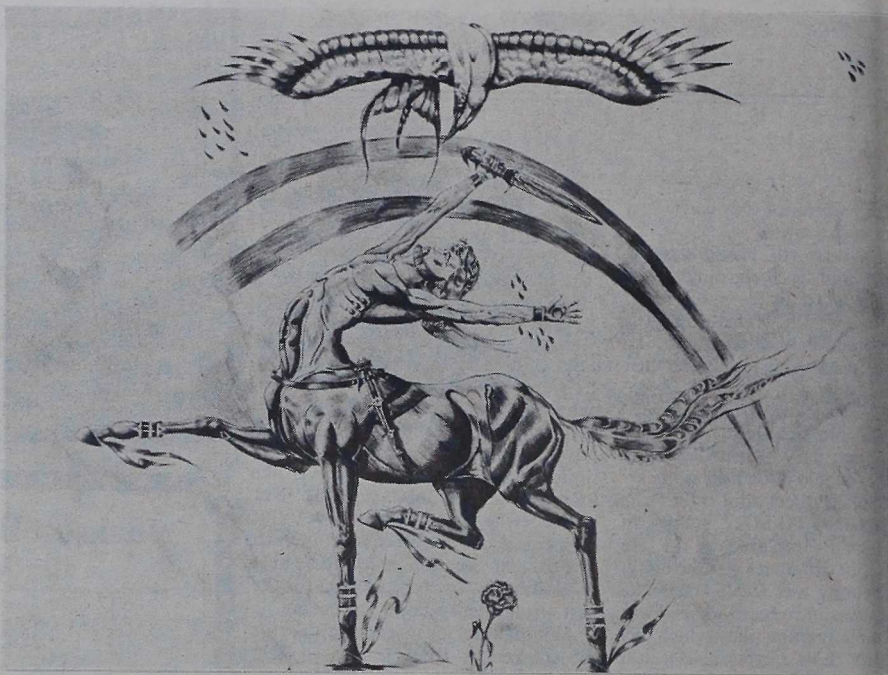
The artistic corpsman from the Battalion Aid Station at 5th Battalion Tenth Marines spends most of his spare time lost in his drawings.

"**FANTASY AND SURREALISM** offer a break from the restrictive boundries of reality," said HM Caron. "The imagination is free to explore and get lost in a whole new world within one's self."

The artist began developing his talent at an early age. "I started drawing when I was six or seven," he said. HM Caron's talent comes naturally. He has never attended any art school. Most of his themes are surrealistic fantasy.

"Reality is good to an extent," the slender Clinton, Maine native explained. "But with reality you can only draw what is normally seen. The guidelines are set and inflexible. And it isn't very symbolic."

**THE LIGHT-HAIRED,** nimble fingered corpsman has several common figures that he uses as symbols. "The bird in each drawing means freedom. It is not restricted to the ground but is free to soar the airways," he said.

"The rose represents love; it always has. Every picture has an eye which symbolizes heaven.

"Also, most of my drawings include a centaur with outstretched arms, or just arms with wide-spread fingers. They represent the reaching out for something. Usually freedom or love," he added.

**HM CARON HAS** no personal favorite drawing. Each is a part of him. The pictures are inspired by events in his life.

"One picture has a tree on a hill growing toward the heart with a woman's face in it that hangs above the tree," described the artist. "A crying rose crosses

the heart, like that of cupid's arrow. The means the withdrawing into one's self after your heart broken."

HM Caron's talents have had some public exposure. "Once while drawing at the library," said the corpsman, "the librarian was watching and asked I'd exhibit them." That was last year, and the plans to do the same this year according to Caron.

**HE PLANS TO** attend the Portland School of Arts in Portland, Maine when he gets out of the Navy. He hopes to do commercial art for an advertising or calendar company.

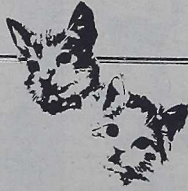

Pendleton (Calif.) and it made money so I thought it would work here too," he explained.

**"WE CLEARED THE** project through the Staff Judge Advocate, and CorrFac bought the supplies through the exchange," Lieutenant Colonel Alexander Smith III, commander of Support Battalion, further explained. "We have been in operation for two and a half weeks and have collected more than \$2,100. We are going to continue for another week and could realize another \$700."

The cost for the wash is \$2 and \$20 for a wash and wax combination. The initial investment has been recovered and new supplies are purchased on a pay-as-you-go basis. The biggest single payoff day has been \$283 after supply expenses.

"I have had my car done several times, and everyone I have talked to was very pleased with the job the volunteers were doing," LtCol. Smith said.

**THE VOLUNTEERS ARE** minimum custody confinees from the Correctional Facility, and according to Sergeant Major Robert E. Thompson, CorrFac, the men are indeed volunteers.

"We never had a shortage of volunteers," he said. "They (confinees) would rather wash cars than (do) some of the other jobs."

An idea of expanding the operation to aid other charities is now coursing through the minds of the originators. "The possibility is being pursued of conducting a car wash two days per week, weather permitting," Maj. Brinkman said. "The monies collected would be put in an account and could be used for other charities."

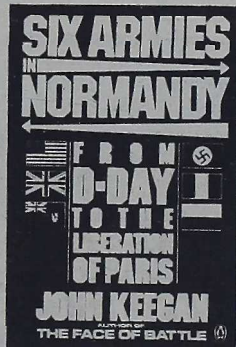

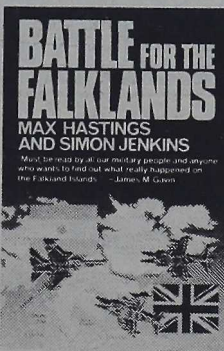

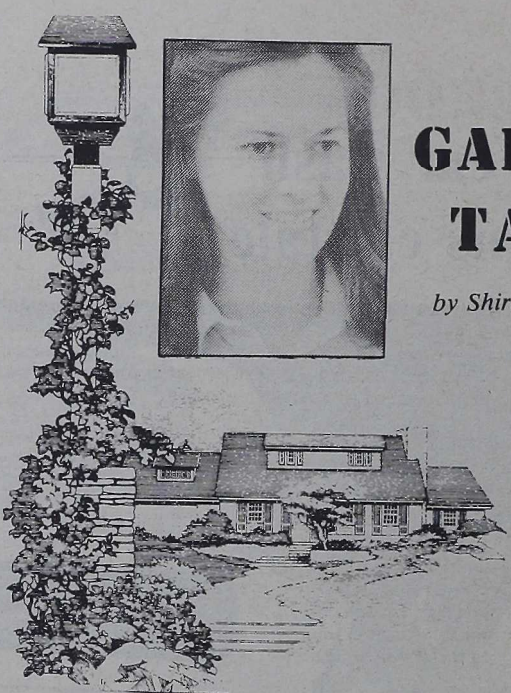

**GARDEN TALK**

**Home landscaping ideas**

*The following article is the first in a summer series on home gardening and landscaping ideas. You don't have to be a landscape architect to have a beautiful yard. All you need is a little foresight. Keep in mind the ultimate size of the plants when planning, selecting, and planting landscape. Get something down on paper; sketch the outline of your house as it looks from above and note the existing plants to give you a better perspective.

**IT IS ESSENTIAL** to consider the size and shape of your house and yard. If a two-story colonial home looks a bit boxy, choose a pyramidal shaped evergreen (such as foster holly) for the corners of the house. The height of the evergreen will tend to visually reduce the height of the house. To make a small house appear longer across the front, plant corner plants beyond the sides of the house. Group lower growing plants (such as compacta holly or andorra juniper) around the corner plants. To make a ranch style house appear slightly shorter across the front, plant corner plants that do not extend past the sides of the house.

Avoid planting hedges or installing fences across the front of a yard. This

visually limits the yard and may appear smaller, closed in and inviting. When landscaping an average sized city lot, save the big shade for the backyard. Don't hide the house, show it off. There are small flowering trees that are suited to a front yard. Planting trees in the backyard will provide a background for a house when viewed from the street.

For entrance planting at the curb, sure to plant low growing plants, vital to be able to see clearly backing out of the driveway. Many of the more popular landscape shrubs have dwarf counter-parts. Foundation and entrance plantings are more desirable than the standard sizes. Their natural compact shape save hours of pruning.

**TO HELP DECIDE** exactly what plants you like, look at other yards. This will provide an idea of what plants do well in your area. Then go to a reputable nursery and see if you spot some of the same plants. Consult a nursery expert about them. Make a list of plants that you like, carefully check out the characteristics of each at the library. This will prevent an unpleasant surprise later.

Select a group of plants that will provide a colorful landscape year-round. Do not think just in terms of flower color. Consider the bark, berries and leaf color for every season. Don't plant a botanical garden or choose one everything in the nursery. The number of different plants selected will depend on the size of the yard. The ultimate goal should be to create something pleasing to you.

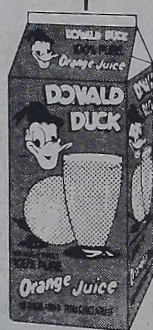

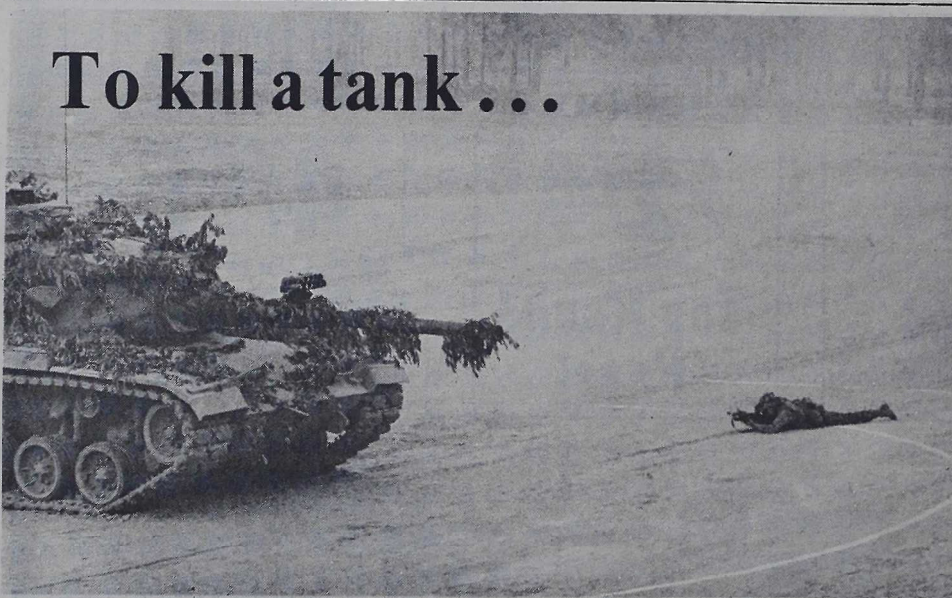

# To kill a tank ...

A combined arms tank-killer demonstration was the talk of the town, or at least the Camp Lejeune F-3 range on May 24, as the 2nd Marine Division weapons review hosted 26 members of the Foreign Service Institute (FSI) and interested civilian guests.

**THE FSI IS** comprised of men and women from all of the armed services and State Department employees trained to work in the Secret Service and at American embassies.

During the afternoon demonstration Marine infantrymen from 2nd Battalion, Second Marines, with supporting equipment such as TOW missiles, attack helicopters and fixed-wing aircraft, displayed for a

captive audience the steps Marines would take to fend against a mechanized attack.

The tank-killer exercise used M-60 tanks to simulate Soviet armor aggressing a 50-foot foxhole infested front.

**DURING THE ARMORED** assault against the entrenched infantry squad, Captain Christopher 2/2 Weapons Company commander, explained the crowd step-by-step actions Marines would take in combat an armored juggernaut.

After the tanks were attacked by helicopters, strafed and AV-8VA Harriers and then ground missile launchers, the killing blow came from a lone Marine carrying a satchel charge.

As the smoke dissipated and the stand-in tanks limped away to lick their wounds, Captain Hoover explained jobs an infantry squad and its weapons perform daily. He described company and division level weaponry such as the TOW, Dragon, the 81mm mortars and the M-60 machinegun.

**"THE SPEED AND** expertise of the Marines is very impressive," said Don Healey, a State Department and FSI member. "It's quite evident that the Marines know what they are doing and they do it well."

Praise for the well-orchestrated Marine combat team also came from the civilian sector. "The bleachers."

Ken Hoover, visiting his son, Captain James Hoover, said he gained new confidence in the Marine Corps after the display.

**"IF MORE PEOPLE** could see a display like this," he said, "it would relieve their minds of the defense budget and why it's so important."

# Who is that girl?

Three time All-American Laurie Taylor

says you have to love it  
to be a runner

When the 428 runners took off from the starting line at Brewster Junior High School to begin the Navy relief 10-kilometer road race June 4, it was more than just another race for Laurie Taylor. She started her running career nine years ago at the very school where she was now sweating out 6.2 miles.

**LAURIE, THE 22-YEAR-OLD** daughter of 2nd Marine Division Staff Judge Advocate Lieutenant Colonel Kenneth Taylor, realized that she had a talent for putting sneakers to the pavement when she did well in a physical training test at Brewster at the age of 13.

Her new found interest in running and her winning form led her to the Junior Olympics that same year before duty called her family to Iwakuni, Japan.

It was in the Far East that Laurie began to shine. Getting her start in a Marine Corps Marathon at Iwakuni, she later sent an application to the Hofu, a prestigious Japanese marathon.

**LAURIE RECALLED THE** difficulty of getting entered in the Japanese run. "It was the first time that a woman, much less a 14-year-old, had run a marathon in Japan," she said. "They said to me, 'but, Miss Taylor, you don't understand, the marathon is a very hard race,' and I said that I knew that because I'd already run one. They just couldn't believe it."

Laurie spent her senior year at Annapolis High School. She has run cross-country most of her high school years, but in her senior year expanded to track. That year was very fruitful.

**DURING THE COURSE** of the year she managed to set three individual state records in indoor track and two state records in outdoor track. The lanky distance runner said the difference between indoor and outdoor running is that the indoor tracks are smaller, making a runner maneuver more curves than the larger outdoor tracks.

Her running expertise landed her a track scholarship to Abilene Christian University in Abilene, Texas.

With her winning senior year in high school still fresh in her mind, Laurie began her freshman year of college with a bang. That first explosive year she wasted no time setting school records in the 800-meter and the 1, 2, and 3-mile runs.

**ACCORDING TO LAURIE,** her Sophomore year was a slow one. Although she made All-American in cross-country, anemia caused her to sit out most of the track season. She was out for nine weeks, but bounced back in time to compete in the state meet. She fell short of making All-American ranking in track.

Building momentum the following year, Laurie made All-American in both cross-country and track. Buzzing in across the finish line in the half mile with a time of 2:09, she once again set a school record.

A milestone, as Laurie remembers, was in her senior year when Abilene was advanced to an NCAA Division II school and upset the Air Force Academy. They went to the national meet ranking third in the country in Division II. "We didn't do so good at the



national cross-country meet because it snowed the bad weather really took its toll on us," she said.

**IN TRACK SHE** gave her last college endeavor she had, qualifying for the Nationals in the 1,500, 3,000 and 5,000-meter runs. She decided to stick with the 800 and 1,500 for the Nationals, finishing fourth in both events.

Coming home from college, Laurie said she wasn't too disappointed in how she did, but the other hand by no means was she satisfied. "I'll never be," she said, bouncing her curly hair.

According to Laurie, she will remain an active member although she has graduated from ACU. She left holding school records in every event she participated in. She said she would like to run in the B Marathons but displayed particular interest in the Fiesta Bowl in Tempe, Ariz.

# Memorial run lightens load on heavy hearts

The Carl T. Fisher memorial run motivated the Marines who knew and respected him

A memorial 10-kilometer run was held June 3 by Marines from 2nd Battalion, Eighth Marines in honor of Second Lieutenant Carl T. Fisher, a 2/8 Marine who was killed in an automobile accident in December 1981.

MORE THAN 450 Marines from the battalion participated in the race which consisted of two laps around Camp Geiger, according to 2/8 Air Liaison Officer Captain Tom Davis.

The eager Marines waited to begin the run, Capt. Davis explained why the enthusiasm of the Marines was so high.

A lot of the Marines of this battalion knew the lieutenant and knew what he was like," he said. "As a matter of fact, I picked up a Marine coming to this morning, and he told me how much Lt. Fisher meant to him, he was really well liked."

FISHER'S FATHER, Mr. Calvin Fisher, flew from his home in Wayland, Mass. to watch the race. He was unable to attend the first memorial run because of a car accident. "It was too painful so soon after the accident," Fisher recalled. Despite his grief, Mr. Fisher expressed greatfulness to the Marines of 2/8 as he addressed them before the race.



The sweating Marines were refreshed at the halfway mark.

"This makes me very proud of my son and the Marine Corps, and I hope it becomes an annual event," he said. "I'd just like to thank Colonel Robert Johnston," he continued, referring to the 8th Marine Regiment commander, "and the Marines of the battalion for carrying on the name of my son with this six mile race."

The idea for this race originated shortly after Lt. Fisher's death, according to Col. Johnston. "A few

of the young lieutenants of the battalion and myself felt it was a good idea to have this race in Lt. Fisher's honor because his personal fitness was consistent with the overall mission of the battalion," he said.

LT. FISHER WAS an avid runner, according to Col. Johnston. "If you look at all of the ideal Marine qualities," the colonel continued, "physical fitness is one of them, and it was one of the important attributes of his character he exemplified."

# Lt. Goehring captures tennis title

Second Lieutenant Harvey Goehring, using a close to the chest forehand and aggressive net play, defeated Captain Stuart Wagner 4-6, 6-4, 6-3, to capture the 2nd Marine Division Tennis Singles Championship May 26.

**LT. GOEHRING BEGAN** moving into mid-court and to the net in the second set to put away shots. However, the bespectacled captain wasn't giving in or up. He broke Lt. Goehring's serve in the 4th game of the set with returns that were just out of reach.

Against the backdrop of threatening clouds and low, rumbling thunder, in the third set, each player began looking heavenward as if asking for the rain to hold off or that their first serves hit in.

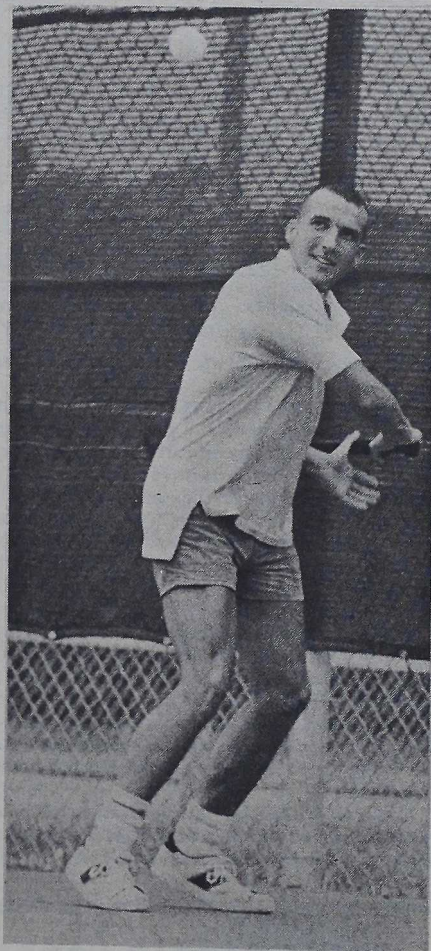
Lt. Goehring gained the first ace of the match in the sixth game of the third set. His shot hit just inside the inbound square low and to his opponent's right.

**AFTER THE GENTLEMENLY** handshakes and murmured 'Good game,' at the end of the match, Lt. Goehring was asked about his unorthodox choppy serve and forehand.

He said the motion didn't add power to his game. "I was always taught to keep it (elbow) in," the dark-haired, tanned, racquetman explained. He added laughingly that, the motion gave him plenty of trouble.

Although unable to capture the singles title, Capt. Wagner will represent the division in the upcoming All-Camp Tennis Tournament June 20 when he and doubles partner, Corporal James Lanier go against the Tri-Command's best.

# The challenge of strength

Marines of Headquarters Battalion, Marine Corps Base found out how many muscles they could use in this test of physical and mental endurance

A 1-mile swim, 10-mile bike ride and finally, a 10-mile race to the finish—those were the day's exercises for the contestants in the Headquarters Battalion, Marine Corps Base triathlon held here June 1.

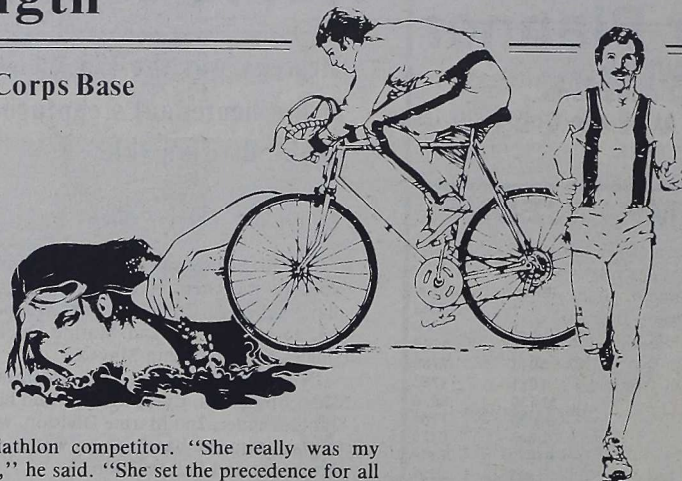
The three-event race was divided into two age categories for men and one for women.

**SERGEANT PAUL PATCHEN**, winner of the 29-and-younger category and overall triathlon winner with a combined time of 2:12 said that the event combined three of his favorite sports.

"I like swimming, bicycling and running so this triathlon was a real challenge," the Onslow Beach lifeguard said. "It requires that you utilize a wide spectrum of abilities and that's why I liked this triathlon."

Coming in first for the 30-years-and-older was 47-year-old Chief Warrant Officer-4 Owen Clark. "I was really surprised with it," he said, referring to the combined 21-mile stamina course. "It was really a lot easier than I thought it would be." He said he hopes to run it again but against more competition. "I think a lot of the younger Marines will do a lot better than to let an old joker like me pass them," he said jokingly.

**CWO-4 CLARK SAID** his motivation for entering was sparked by the winner of the womens category, Staff Sergeant Shanda Elkins, the only



female triathlon competitor. "She really was my motivator," he said. "She set the precedence for all the rest who ran the race. She could really be an inspiration to other women Marines if they should decide to enter something like this."

SSgt. Elkins, a 25-year-old military justice chief of the Staff Judge Advocate's Office, explained her triathlon entrance was not entirely her own choice. "I couldn't talk any other women into entering. Believe me—I tried."

She had a few personal thoughts to pass on to any other woman who might be considering doing something like this. "I think more women should get out there and challenge the men, it's good for them, she said. "In the next triathlon, I'll challenge any woman who would like to come out and try."

**AT THE END** of the first event, the one-mile swim, SSgt. Elkins came out of the pool 6:00 minutes behind Staff Sergeant Jeff Hoover, the triathlon coordinator, and crossed the finish line with a time of 3:43, only 1:30 behind him.

Although all of the contenders agreed that it was physically demanding, of the three categories, Sgt. Patchen said the swim was the most demanding of the three phases while SSgt. Elkins CWO-4 Clark maintained that the run took the most time out of them.

"The hardest thing I came up against was getting it organized and getting the people to sign up for it," said SSgt. Hoover. After contacting the Battalion Supply, Range Company, Motor Transport and medical personnel to provide for corpsmen to supervise events; 10 people entered.

**WHEN ALL WAS SAID AND DONE**, SSgt. Hoover, the triathlon competitor himself, shrugged it off with, "I hope to have a bigger turnout for the next triathlon scheduled for this fall."

# Marathon Just a good warm-up

People 26-miler is not quite enough  
These three Leatherneck captains

When someone thinks of running a marathon, they are thinking of running 26 miles is a long way. For Camp Lejeune Marine Captain Michael E. McCarthy, a 26-mile run is just a good warm-up.

**T. MCCARTHY TRAVELED** to Memphis, Tenn., on May 9 to join two of his fellow comrades, Capt. Donald R. McMann and John D. Self, in a 100-mile run averaging 30-35 miles a day from Memphis to Tupelo, Miss.

Last year when the trio first came up with the idea of running 125 miles, few people believed they would be able to do it. Now the captains have made it possible with Capt. McCarthy traveling from Camp Lejeune to participate in the run.

One might wonder why someone would put themselves through so much pain and agony. Last year the three Marines ran the event for the American Cancer Society and were able to raise \$3,700. This year they ran it to raise donations for the 4,700 children at St. Jude's Children's Hospital in Memphis. Capt. McMann reflected, "When you go to St. Jude's and you see all those kids just waiting for a believer out of you." The trio planned to raise \$2 for each child at St. Jude's for a total of \$9,400.

**WITH THEIR COURSE** mapped out, the three captains hit the pavement at 9:30 a.m. May 9 amid heavy morning business traffic. Battling with passing trucks and tractor trailers that nearly

blew them off the side of the road, the trio continued to run.

Though the three Marines suffered from blisters, sore muscles and fatigue, they finished the run May 12, arriving in Tupelo in the late morning.

The run was not easy. Capt. McMann had twisted his ankle at the 85-mile mark but refused to give up. Capt. McCarthy pointed out that the hardest part of the run was running on the gravel on the side of the road. Capt. Self added that boredom was also a problem.

**THE CAPTAINS SAID** without the aid of their back-up vehicle driver, Gunnery Sergeant Gilbert Flores, they would not have been able to complete the run. When the trio became tired, GySgt. Flores encouraged them to keep going. He also made sure that the three runners had enough Gatorade and oranges on hand to restore their body fluids.

When they arrived in Tupelo, the running was all over, or was it?

After running 15 to 18 miles every day since the beginning of February to prepare for the four-day run, then running 125 miles, Capt. McMann said, "We arrived in Tupelo Thursday, rested Friday, and ran in the Gum Tree 10-Kilometer race through downtown Tupelo, Saturday." The captains pointed out that they participated in the 10-Kilometer race just for the enjoyment.

The Marine Corps Recruiting Office in Tupelo, which was the finish line for the 125-mile run, had ensured that the event would be well-publicized. The trio's feat received good coverage from the local television and radio stations. Capt. Self pointed out that they received a "super reception from the residents of Tupelo."

**CAPT. MCMANN SAID** that they expect to collect over \$10,000 for the children at St. Jude's.

Thanks to people like Captains Self, McCarthy and McMann, 4,700 children will stand a fighting chance against the illness they face.

## Lejeune High grid coach steps down

For more than 25 years, the head coach of Lejeune H.S. has been hollering

"Gentlemen this is a football"

When Camp Lejeune High School resumes its academic year, the days may belong to the classroom but Friday nights belong to Devilpup football. Friday nights bring teachers, students, parents, bands, and leaping cheerleaders together under the bright lights that flood the Devilpup gridiron. They come to witness the final check of shoulder pads and the clash of gridiron gladiators.

**FRIDAY NIGHTS WERE** Coach Thomas Fred McGhee's chance to share the limelight. But those nights will fade into vivid memories.

After more than a quarter of a century, the 54-year old McGhee will be absent from the sidelines when the Scarlet and White open its season at home, Sept. 2, against arch-rival White Oak High. It's a good bet that he will be sorely missed, except perhaps by the Viking coaching staff.

Although there is more to his decision than he will publicly discuss, McGhee said, "Much of the decision has to do with my health," adding that he hoped to continue at Lejeune and head the baseball program.

**COACH MCGHEE IS** a native Tar Heel and the product of both High Point High School and High Point College. Prior to putting his physical education degree into practice, McGhee played professional baseball for four years with the Pittsburg Pirate chain.

After working in South Dakota for two years, a young McGhee came to Lejeune and found a home. Among the athletic programs, McGhee inherited the weekly gridiron confrontation together with all the grunts, sweat and tears that culminate on brisk Friday evenings. That was 26 years ago.

McGhee recalled that over the years Lejeune has been blessed with some fine athletes and some good seasons. "During my tenure we played 250 games, winning 152 with 93 losses and 5 ties," he said.

**MCGHEE, WHO SUFFERED** the same problems and anxieties as other coaches, had additional difficulties. He never knew from week to week when the stroke of a government pen, coupled with the words "permanent change of station," would cost him an important cog in his gridiron machine.

Because of the ever present possibility of rapid turnover, McGhee is a "basics" man. When returning veterans and fresh hopefuls trot onto the sultry summer field, that's where it all begins.

"Gentlemen, this is a football," McGhee would remark and the words of gridiron wisdom would progress from there, mingled with the sweat of lettermen and hopefuls alike.

**OVER THE PAST** years, Lejeune High School, a class 2A school, has taken to beating two 3A schools, White Oak and normally powerful Havelock, at the beginning of each season.

"My thinking in scheduling early was that hopefully our people would learn something by good competition and carry it to conference play," remarked the Viking. The Pups have given the Vikings a run for their money a number of occasions.

Like most athletic departments, walls, offices and desk tops are with photos of past squad Friday's heroes. McGhee finds it reminiscent.

**HE SPOKE OF** Jim Barrett, an early 60's who went on to Duke University (not to mention plus any 2 Major League game cartridges) and John Hartman (a tremendous football player who became captain of Wake Forest's football team).

Joe Cannon, a 1972 Lejeune graduate, became a number one choice for the Houston baseball team and was later traded to the Toronto team.

In more recent history, the Wes Sweetser who won Onslow County Athlete of the Year and last year's tailback speedster, Marcus Johnson who could find holes, yards and paydirt where none seemed to exist.

How do you succeed a man like McGhee? "Not easily," said Gil Lejeune, former Lejeune High School Science Department Head, in a telephone conversation from his Corpus Christi residence.

"**HE'S A TOUGH** nut on the outside, but a cool, caring individual underneath. Quite simply, the professional all the way," said Lejeune.

Coach McGhee doesn't see himself as irreplaceable. "Our football program is going to carry on. We've got some people on the staff who are more than capable of doing the job, probably better than I did in years past."

## Courts-martial (cont)

**PRIVATE FIRST CLASS T. G. OWENS**, Marine Corps Base, was convicted at a May 25 court-martial of using marijuana, having THC in his urine and attempting to bribe two drug and alcohol abuse workers. He was sentenced to three months hard labor, given a choice of paying a \$100 fine or spending three months in jail, and a Bad Conduct Discharge.

**PRIVATE H.J. CURTIS JR.**, Marine Corps Base, was convicted at a special court-martial May 23, of approximately four months unauthorized absence. The illegal days off cost him two months hard labor without confinement and loss of \$1,528.

## Salesmen

High pressure door-to-door salesmen are common in the Camp Lejeune area and many consumers find themselves coerced into buying products they don't want. There is relief, according to the Tri-Command Legal Assistance Office.

The North Carolina Legislature understands the problem and has passed a law which gives the buyer three days from the date of purchase (signing the contract) to back out of the deal without penalty. This three days is not necessarily measured from receipt of merchandise which often is weeks after the actual deal is made. Customers who change their mind within three days from the date of sale must notify the seller in writing. They must send notice certified mail, return receipt requested.

## CofC

## Taxes

Marines buying a home or land, contributing to church or making other large deductible payments may be entitled to claim extra exemptions during the year to decrease the amount of Federal/State Withholding according to Camp Lejeune Legal Assistance Office.

By completing a new W-4 tax form for your employer, you can estimate itemized deductions for the current year and by using the form on the form, convert those estimated deductions into allowable exemptions.

There are penalties for significantly overstating estimated deductions. But for the purpose intended, this can be a very valuable tool in making ends meet during the year.
