MAU returns Saturday

Some 1,500 Marines of the 32nd Marine Amphibious Unit are scheduled to return here on Saturday, Nov. 8, following a five month deployment with the Navy's Sixth Fleet in the Mediterranean.

Commanded by Col. R.T. Roache, the principal ground element of the MAU is Battalion Landing Team, 2nd Battalion, Sixth Marine Regiment. The BLT is supported by helicopters from Marine Medium Helicopter Squadron (HMM)-264 based at Marine Corps Air Station, New River, N.C.

Forming the logistics arm of the MAU was MAU Service Support Group-32 from the 2nd Force Service Support Group here.

During their five month deployment, the 32nd MAU Marines not only operated in the Med, but also in the Atlantic and Indian Oceans, and the Caribbean.

This precedent setting cruise also included a transit of the Suez Canal and a journey through the Red Sea. The Canal transit was the first time a complete Landing Force from Fleet Marine Force, Atlantic had made this trip.

While in the Med, the MAU participated in the annual NATO training exercise "Display Determination," which was held in Sardinia, Italy.

Liberty ports for the Marines included stops in Greece, Turkey, France, Spain and Italy.

Additionally, they were the first Marines embarked aboard amphibious ships to visit Israel and Egypt since the reopening of the Suez Canal.

While conducting its final liberty port visit in Spain, disaster struck in Algeria, when a major earthquake struck the city of Al Asnam, killing thousands and leaving thousands of others homeless. Although they were not needed, 32nd MAU Marines returned to the coast of North Africa and were prepared to render disaster relief if called upon.

The families and friends of returning Marines are reminded that civilian personnel will not be allowed at the Morehead City port when the MAU returns. Additionally, all returning Marines are required to utilize government transportation back here.

However, a reception center for the returning Marines of the 2nd Battalion, Sixth Marines has been set up in the Sixth Marines gym; located next to the Protestant Chapel on the Main Service Road. The center will be open from 1 p.m. until all returning Marines have met with their families.

The families of Marines of the MAU Service Support Group-32 are requested to gather at building TC-726 and 727 at Camp Geiger on the afternoon of Nov. 8 to meet the returning Marines.

Early Outs

Marines scheduled to complete their active duty tour during the time period of Dec. 8, 1980 to Jan. 4, 1981 can request to be released prior to their end of active service date.

Commanding Officer's approval is necessary to receive this early discharge. If there are operational difficulties or training commitments, the request can be denied.

An early release qualifies as a honorable discharge, and you would still rate your Good Conduct Medal.

Marine chow always in good taste

With the celebration of the Marine Corps Birthday this weekend most swoopers will remain in the area. An event such as the Marine Corps Birthday Ball offers the grounded swooper more than colorful ceremonies, however, a lot of good food is in store for the Marines.

In 1775 our fellow Marines were served a daily ration consisting of one pound of bread, one pound of pork, a half pint of peas, four ounces of cheese and a half pint of rum.

Today, Leathernecks utilizing the Dining Facilities are faced with a menu that reads like this: Beef noodle soup with crackers, Knockwurst, grilled Salisbury steak, O'Brian potatoes, brown onion gravy, buttered peas and bread. Also a salad bar and assorted desserts are offered. To help Marines wash

down their meal, an unlimited supply of fresh milk, chilled fruit juices and hot coffee are provided.

As with many things Marines do today, tradition plays a large role. For the Birthday Ball, a cake weighing over 100-pounds will be served.

More than three days of preparation goes into making the super size pastry that will eventually feed about 400 people. This year's cake contains seven pounds of sugar, 30 pounds of butter, 60 pounds of flour and 200 eggs blended together to make a cake large enough to satisfy any sweet tooth.

The cake, as by tradition, is cut with a saber by the oldest and youngest Marine of the command. The cake cutting ceremony is just as much a part of the Marine Corps Birthday as the playing of the Marines Hymn.

Marine nicknames, sayings tell 205 years of colorful history

With the Marine Corps' 205th Birthday at hand, thoughts of Tun Tavern, Chapultepec, Iwo Jima and many other events in our Corps' history come to mind.

With these events came sayings and words that played a part in the history of one of the "finest military organizations in the world."

In the early days of the Corps, many sayings were originated. The first record of Marines in combat was in May 1775, when eight Marines were sent as part of a force to relieve the colonial troops holding Fort Ticonderoga, N.Y. These Marines became known as the "Original Eight."

The Marine Band was formed in July of 1798, and played for many official receptions in Washington, D.C. The band became known as "The President's Own," during Thomas Jefferson's administration.

The fifth Commandant of the Marine Corps picked up the title of "Grand Old Man of the Marine Corps," and rightly so. Brig. Gen. Archibald Henderson served as Commandant for an unprecedented 38 years, 1820-1859.

Four words from the Marine's Hymn have proven true many times in Marine Corps history, but never more often than from 1867 to 1896. Marines were involved in over 20 landings, ranging from Japan, Egypt, Argentina to North China, and the phrase "every clime and place" became a reality.

During those 29 years, one of the landings produced another slogan remembered by Marines today. Correspondent Richard Harding Davis observed a landing in riot torn Panama City in 1885 and wired back to his newspaper: "The Marines have landed and the situation is well in hand."

In 1900 a detachment of Marines fought along side soldiers and Marines from other countries to help quell the Boxer Rebellion in China. These Marines

picked up the two-word Chinese phrase "Gung Ho," meaning "to work together."

After the Boxer Rebellion, Marines were again mobilized during America's involvement in World War I. A large scale recruiting program initiated at the beginning of World War I brought the strength of the Marine Corps from 11,000 to a peak of 75,000. Maj. A. S. McLemore selected the slogan "First to Fight" for recruiting posters.

Early June of 1918, a 20-day battle began that earned Marines one of their most famous nicknames. The term, "Devil Dogs," was the name given by German troops to the Marines who feverishly fought at Belleau Wood.

Marines were again called upon in 1941 when Pearl Harbor was attacked by Japan. This war actually brought the Marine Corps to its peak of prominence while battling a well-trained and determined enemy. The ferocity of war was seen in many island battles, but even more so on Iwo Jima in February of 1945. More than 17,000 Marines were wounded and another 5,000 killed. The Japanese losses were reported close to 21,000.

After the historic flag raising on Mt. Suribachi, Adm. C.W. Nimitz, Commander of Naval Forces during the invasion, said "Among the Marines who served on Iwo island, uncommon valor was a common virtue."

There are many other slogans, sayings, and quotes that are associated with the Marine Corps; "A Force in Readiness," "Semper Fidelis," and Second to None," to name a few.

As the 205th Marine Corps Birthday passes and we Marines look to our 206th year, thoughts will still be on the pride, motivation and "esprit de corps" that have made men and women proud to bear the title—Marine.

Pacific hot spot

Camp Johnson, legend's hallmark

In 1942, Gilbert H. "Hashmark" Johnson entered the Marine Corps as part of an experiment to see if blacks could make Marines. He left the Marine Corps a legend.

Born in rural Mount Hebron, Ala., Johnson attended Stillman College in 1922, aspiring to become a minister.

However, he left college the following year and joined the Army where he served in intelligence before getting out in 1929.

During his tour he was sent to Mexico on a fact-finding mission because of his knowledge of Spanish.

Captured by the Mexican government, he escaped death when he was released on the day of his execution for unexplained reasons.

Johnson joined the Navy in 1933, and served nearly 10 years in the stewards' branch, the only job available to blacks at the time.

As a member of the Pacific Fleet, he was aboard the USS Wyoming during the bombing of Pearl Harbor in 1941.

The following year, President Franklin D. Roosevelt ordered the integration of all the armed forces of the U.S.

When he learned of the order, Johnson requested a transfer

from the Navy to the Marine Corps because, according to a book, "Roots of Two Black Sergeants Major," by retired Army Lt. Col. Jesse J. Johnson, "He sensed the need for strong leadership for the black Marines experiment."

To provide that leadership, Johnson, at the age of 37, sacrificed his naval rank of steward first class and higher pay to become one of the first black Marine privates trained at Montford Point, a snake, mosquito, and bear-infested boot camp built especially for black recruits.

And provide leadership to his younger, and less-experienced comrades is exactly what he did at Montford Point and throughout his Corps career. It was at Montford Point he was given the nickname "Hashmark" because of his age and many years of service.

In 1943, he was among the first blacks to be trained as Marine drill instructors.

He also served as field sergeant in charge of all recruit training at Montford Point.

As a member of the 52 Defense Battalion on Guam during World War II, he asked that black Marines be assigned to combat patrols and personally led 25 such patrols.

Along with his best friend, com-

rade, and brother-in-law, Edgar R. Huff, Johnson became one of the first black Sergeants Major in the Marine Corps.

In 1959, SgtMaj. Johnson retired from the Marine Corps after more than 30 years of service to his country and after blazing a path of achievements for others of his race to follow.

In a speech at a Montford Point Marine Association dinner, in Jacksonville in 1972, he paused, saluted the audience and said, "Ladies and gentlemen, you will have to excuse me, I can't go on." As he stood at attention to a standing ovation, he fell with a fatal heart attack.

In 1974, Montford Point was

renamed Camp Johnson in his honor, the only U.S. military installation to so honor a black American.

Hashmark went a long way from Alabama's Jim Crow segregation to Marine Corps legend, and it all began at Carr Lejeune.

Geiger, hero on every front

Gen. Roy Stanley Geiger achieved many firsts in Marine Corps history. Some of these accomplishments include being the first Marine to command an Army, the Tenth Army on Okinawa as well as attaining the rank of four star General which is normally reserved for the Commandant of the Marine Corps.

Born on January 25, 1885, in Middleburg, Fla., Geiger enlisted in the Corps on Nov. 2, 1907. Commissioned on Feb. 5, 1909, he attended Marine Officer's School in Port Royal, South Carolina.

Duty in Nicaragua and with the 1st Marine Brigade in the Philippines and China started him on his way as a line officer.

On March 31, 1916, Geiger reported to the Naval Aeronautic Station in Pensacola, Fla. for training under then Lts. A.A. Cunningham and F.T. Evans. Upon graduation from the school, Lt. Geiger became the fifth Marine Aviator in history.

Taking command of a squadron with the 1st Marine Aviation Force, based in Dunkirk, England, Geiger was awarded the Navy Cross for his role in leading bombing raids against the Germans during World War I. Stationed in Haiti, Geiger

helped perfect close air support along with members of his squadron, part of the Marine Aviation Force attached to the 1st Provisional Brigade.

Transferred to Marine Flying Field, Marine Barracks, Quantico, Va. as the new Commanding Officer of the 1st Aviation Group, Geiger had little equipment and fewer facilities. Using his ingenuity he extended Quantico's capabilities to include hangars and an airfield.

Graduating in June, 1925 from the Command and General Staff School at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, Geiger returned to Haiti as commander of Observation Squadron Two with the 1st Brigade.

Following tours in Quantico and Headquarters Marine Corps and graduating from the Army War College, the General attended the Senior and the Advanced Course, Naval War College, Newport, R.I.

In 1941 Geiger led the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing at Guadalcanal from September to November, 1942. He was awarded a Gold Star instead of a second Navy Cross. The citation reads in part, "Despite almost continuous bombardment by enemy aircraft,

hostile naval gunfire and shore-based artillery, the combined total of Army, Navy and Marine Corps units stationed at Guadalcanal under (the then) Major General Geiger's efficiently coordinated command, succeeded in shooting down 268 Japanese planes in aerial combat and inflicting damage on a number estimated to be as great as ... Sank six enemy vessels, including one heavy cruiser, possibly sank three destroyers and one heavy cruiser and five light cruisers."

Recalled to Headquarters Marine Corps in May 1943, Geiger became director of Aviation, but took over command of the 1st Marine Amphibious Corps in the Bougainville Operation. For this action he was awarded the Navy Distinguished Service Medal.

The recapture of Guam and the Palau Islands was led by Geiger. His unit also participated in the invasion and capture of Okinawa as part of the 10th Army.

July 1945, saw Geiger as Commanding General, Fleet Marine Force, Pacific. While serving at Marine Corps Headquarters he died on January 23, 1947. He has served forty years as a Marine's Marine.

Semper Fi in N. C. long before Marines

Strange as it may seem to many, the Marine Corps motto, "Semper Fidelis", came to this part of North Carolina long before the Marine Corps did. As a matter of fact, it arrived long before there was a Marine Corps, or for that matter, a United States of America.

For the explanation behind this unusual bit of trivia one must delve into the history of the Commonwealth of Onslow (available at the base library).

The generally agreed upon date for the formation of Onslow into a county is 1734, when North Carolina was still a Crown Colony of the British Empire.

At that time, His Excellency George Burrington Esq., the royal governor of North Carolina, together with the members of His Majesty's Council, established the new county, appointed Justices of the Peace, and named it after Sir Arthur Onslow, Speaker of the House of Commons, in England.

Sir Arthur, unfortunately, never found his way to America to see the countryside that was named after him.

The connection with the Marine Corps motto is that "Semper Fidelis," latin for "Always Faithful," was also the motto for the House of Onslow, and is carried on the family crest. This is one of those coincidences of history that history buffs delight in. In this particular case though, it's a most appropriate coincidence; the motto of the namesake of Onslow County is returned to it by the Marine Corps, by establishing the "world's most complete amphibious training facility" and a landmark of the Corps.

Now back during the War of 1812, this coincidence wouldn't have existed. At that time, the motto of the Marine Corps was "Fortitudine" ... but that's another story.

Marine stands in mighty majesty

Doff your cap, if you will; wave a flag; choke back a sob in your throat; wipe away a tear from your eye, for this is the man who is fighting your war.

He is the Marine up front, the one who is sticking his nose in the mud each day, every day. He is the one who sees the enemy at 25 yards. He is the one who knows what it feels like to be shot at close range by small arms.

He is the one who dies a thousand times when the night is dark and the moon is gone. And he is the one who dies once and forever when an enemy rifle belches flame.

If you have ever slogged through a sticky rice paddy or waded a stream carrying 60 rounds of ammunition, a canteen, a rifle and a pack with enough field rations and spare clothing to last a week, you know why they call him a "grunt." It's fairly obvious.

But look at him well and know him, for he is really something. He wears, in dirty dignity, a helmet and a flak jacket and a faded uniform. His hands are ripped and torn from contact with barbed wire. His wrists are swollen from mosquito bites.

His pockets are full and his boots are mud-caked and his eyes never stand still; they move and squint and twitch.

He is nervous, aware of every sound. For he operates in a never-never world where the difference between death and one more tomorrow often depends upon what he sees or does not see, what he hears or does not hear.

The "grunt" is the man who lives as close to war as it is possible to get. His rank varies, but mostly he is a private, a corporal, or a lance corporal or a sergeant.

He likes the Air Force because planes give him a measure of protection. He likes artillery outfits because they can knock the bejabbers out of an

enemy platoon. He cares about supply outfits only to the extent that they can provide him with something to wear and more ammunition to shoot.

He lives first for the day when his tour will be up and he can get out of this country. He lives next for an in-country R and R (rest and rehabilitation). He'd like to get his hands on a can of cold beer because it would drive the heat from his throat and ease the corroding pain in his gut. He'd like to feel the softness of a woman.

But he is a "grunt" and if he can live through today then there will be tomorrow. And if he can live through enough tomorrows there will be the R and R, the cold beer, the feel of a woman, the end of his tour.

The "grunt," as he stands in dirty, muddy majesty, is as fine a fighting man as the United States has ever produced. He is young, tough, intelligent. And he knows how to kill.

But he is a lot more than that. There is something of the builder in these young men. They speak, sometimes of what must be done to South Vietnam to make it right and workable. They speak, sometimes, of government and how it must work. And, if you are lucky, you may get a "grunt" to speak his mind about the war.

He may tell you many things in language largely unprintable. But it may or may not be surprising to learn that, for the most part, he understands why he is here and he believes in the purpose that put him here. And that is something, because if you take a "grunt" out of his muddy, waterfilled bunker, remove his helmet, his flak jacket, his field uniform, take away his rifle, clean him up and dress him in a sport shirt, slacks and loafers, you've got the kid who was playing on last year's high school football team.

He is a national asset to be cherished.

This is my rifle. There are many like it, but this one is mine. My rifle is my best friend. It is my life. I must master it as I must master my life. My rifle, without me is useless. Without my rifle, I am useless. I must fire my rifle true. I must shoot straighter than my enemy who is trying to kill me. I must shoot him before he shoots me. I will...My rifle and myself know that what counts in war is not the rounds we fire, the noise of our burst, nor the smoke we make. We know that it is the hits that count. We will hit...My rifle is human, even as I, because it is as a brother. I will learn its weakness, its strength, its parts, its accessories, its sights, and its barrel. I will ever guard it against the ravages of weather and damage. I will keep my rifle clean and ready, even as I am clean and ready. We will become part of each other. We will...Before God I swear this creed. My rifle and myself are the defenders of my country. We are the masters of our enemy. We are the saviors of my life. So be it until there is no enemy, but Peace!
