Maj. Greene receives Silver Star

Major Bruce A. Greene, Headquarters Company, Force Troops, received the Silver Star Medal August 12 during a ceremony conducted at Force Troops headquarters.

Brigadier General J.C. Fegan, Force Troops commander, presided over the ceremony and presented the decoration.

The citation read:

For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity ... as assistant communications officer with the 1st Battalion, 26th Marines, 3d Marine Division in connection with combat operations against the enemy in the Republic of Vietnam.

On the evening of March 23, during the North Vietnamese Army's siege of Khe Sanh, the combat base was subjected to an intense rocket artillery attack which severed communications between the combat operations center and Company C.

Major Greene unhesitatingly left his covered position and traversed 600 meters across fire-swept terrain to the company command post where he found that the bunker had been demolished and was burning furiously.

He personally assisted in removing sandbags and flaming logs to free those Marines trapped inside the structure until he was overcome by smoke inhalation.

Revived by emergency first aid, he resolutely continued his determined efforts until ordnance exploding under the collapsed bunker made further attempts impossible.

Realizing the danger of an impending ground attack without the restoration of vital communications, Major Greene fearlessly traversed 700 meters of open area and, after gathering the necessary replacement personnel and equipment, valiantly led the Marines across the hazardous air strip to the vicinity of the company command post to reestablish communications.

His heroic and determined actions inspired all who observed him and contributed significantly to the successful defense of the Khe Sanh combat base. By his courage, bold initiative, and unwavering devotion to duty in the face of grave personal danger, Major Greene upheld the highest traditions of the Marine Corps and of the United States Naval Service."

Lightning strikes

A lightning bolt made its bull's-eye at Brewster Junior High School Tuesday evening and a section of wall was blown to bits along with the base portions of a tall chimney hurling stones and

bricks into waiting vehicles below.

The discharge of electricity exploded at approximately 4:35 p.m. in the rear of the junior high school. Cars were struck from the fragments of the explosion. Stones and whole bricks flew out thirty feet and more as the surprised occupants of the parked vehicles witnessed the

large clap and brilliant flash of the lightning.

According to Mr. C.L. Cole, supervisor of planning-estimation, Base Maintenance, the damage is in excess of \$1,700. This does not include the interior of the chimney damage, however; this will be added on to the estimated price when it is examined more thoroughly.

Bronze stars highlight ceremony

 Bronze Star Medals were presented to First Lieutenant R.A. Wood and Francis J. Olin Jr., and Sergeant Major L. O'Neal, during an awards ceremony held at First Infantry Training Regiment last Tuesday morning.



1st Lt. R.A. Wood

Lieutenant Wood received his medal for action in the Republic of Vietnam while serving as

platoon commander with Company C, First Battalion, Fifth Marines, First Marine Division. His citation read in part: "During the early morning hours of 9 June 1969, while occupying a defensive position northwest of the An Hoe Combat Base, Company 'C' came under a vicious ground attack by a North Vietnamese Army battalion. Utilizing a heavy volume of mortar, small arms, recoilless rifles and rocket-propelled grenade fire, five of the enemy succeeded in breaching the perimeter in the vicinity of one of the company's recoilless rifles and were attempting to turn it against the Marines when First Lieutenant Wood fearlessly initiated an aggressive counterattack against the soldiers. Despite the hostile rounds impacting around him, he boldly assumed a dangerously exposed position as he directed the fire of other Marines, resulting in the death of all five of the enemy soldiers and the withdrawal of other hostile soldiers from the defensive perimeter. Quickly seizing the initiative, he then turned the recoilless rifle on the

retreating men and their supporting positions, thereby restoring the security of the company's position."

Second to receive the award was Lieutenant Noonan. While serving with Battery "C," First Battalion, Eleventh Marines, First Marine Division, in the Republic of Vietnam, he was initially assigned as an Artillery Forward Observer with Company "I". His citation read in part: "On 12 May, 1969, Company 'I' came under a heavy volume of fire from two North Viet-

namese Army companies occupying well-fortified positions while the Marines were conducting a search and clear operation in Quang Nam Province. Reacting instantly, First Lieutenant Noonan unhesitatingly maneuvered across the fire-swept terrain to a forward position and, seemingly oblivious to the enemy rounds impacting around him, skillfully adjusted supporting artillery fire on the enemy emplacements which enabled the Marines to seize the initiative."



Sgt. Maj. L.L. O'Neal

From March 1969 to January 1970 Sergeant Major Ernie L. O'Neal served with Marine Aircraft Group Thirteen, First Marine Aircraft Wing in the Republic of Vietnam. His citation read: "Initially assigned with Marine All Weather Attack Squadron 232, Sergeant Major O'Neal initiated and supervised the reconstruction of his unit's defensive positions and organized an effective plan for the utilization of reaction forces which significantly enhanced the defensive posture of the command. Sincerely concerned for the welfare and morale of his men, he rendered assistance to all who sought his help and pioneered numerous improvements in the unit's working and recreational facilities."

Gunnery Sergeant Verl L. Simmons in addition to being promoted to his present rank during the ceremony, received the Navy Commendation Medal.

His citation recognized his "meritorious service in the Republic of Vietnam with the Fifth 175mm Gun Battery, 11th Marines, First Marine Division, from May 1969 to March 1970."

First Lieutenant Christopher W. Mattson received the Navy Commendation Medal and a certificate citing his "meritorious service with Mortar Battery, First Battalion, 11th Marines, First Marine Division from March 1969 to January 1970."

The Navy Commendation Medal was also awarded to Gunnery Sergeant Ray R. Likens, who earned the award while serving with the Fifth 175mm Gun Battery, 11th Marines, First Marine Division from April 1969 to March 1970.

The Navy Achievement Medal was awarded to Captain John J. Pieratt, who also served with the Fifth 175mm Gun Battery, 11th Marines. His citation stated "from 21 May 1969 to 11 March 1970, Captain Pieratt performed his duties in an exemplary manner. As Maintenance and Mortar Transport Officer, he displayed outstanding initiative and perseverance despite the extremely adverse conditions and difficulties associated with a combat environment."

Lieutenant Colonel R.H. Kirkpatrick, 2d FAG commander, conducted the ceremony at the group headquarters and presented the awards.

Olin assumes command

During ceremonies held last Wednesday at 3d Battalion, 2d Marine Regiment, Major J. H. Olin, Jr., relieved Lieutenant Colonel E. F. Pierson as commander of the 2d Infantry Division Unit. Lieutenant Colonel Pierson has assumed duties as executive officer of the regiment. Brigadier General R. D. Bohn, assistant division commander, presided over the ceremony. Major Olin, former commander of the deactivated 2d Antitank Battalion, expressed his "content desire that the high standards of 3-2 will be maintained." Since May of 1969, 3-2 has conducted 17 surface assaults, and major amphibious landings,

three combined operations, three disturbance operations, more than 30 combat post exercises and two actual contingency operations.

Navy Comm.

The Navy Commendation Medal was awarded to Sergeant Michael J. Van Thiel, 2d Interrogation-Translation Team, Force Troops, during a ceremony held recently at the Team Headquarters.

Sgt. Van Thiel was decorated for his services in the Republic of Vietnam. His citation read in part, "Initially assigned as an Interrogator-Translator with the 9th Interrogation-Translation Team, he participated in several

major combat operations, including Operations Linn River and Oklahoma Hills, and repeatedly distinguished himself by his initiative and professional competence in questioning both North Vietnamese Army prisoners and detainees. Demonstrating superior resourcefulness and an in-depth knowledge of enemy order of battle factors, Sgt. Van Thiel skillfully utilized this information to obtain details concerning enemy troops movements, missions, and composition, thereby significantly increasing the ability of his team to meet the intelligence requirements levied on it by higher headquarters."

Captain D. F. Schafer, Force Troops language officer, conducted the ceremony and presented the award.

The Navy Commendation Medal and the Navy Achievement Medal were awarded recently to First Lieutenant Thomas M. Orth and Sergeant Jerry R. Chiles, respective both of 8th Motor Transport Battalion, Force Troops.

Both men received the awards for what their citations termed "outstanding service in the Republic of Vietnam", where Lieutenant Orth served as a platoon commander with Company C, 7th Motor Transport Battalion, Force Logistic Command from February 1969 to January 1970. ECU announces Fall term

The Camp Lejeune Center of East Carolina University announced this week, the beginning of its fall term.

Working as an integral part of the Off-Duty Education Program, classes will begin September 14, and will continue for eight weeks of instruction.

Each scheduled class will meet two nights a week, for three hours each evening.

Registration must be made in person at East Carolina University Center Office, Building 63, from 8 a.m. until noon, and 1 until 5 p.m., September 9, 10, and 11.

Students registering for the first time must report to the office to fill out required forms prior to registration.

Tuition assistance is available. The Marine Corps will pay three-fourths of the costs for eligible military personnel. Proper forms for tuition assistance must be presented at time of registration. These may be obtained through your Company Office.

Military buses will leave the Hadnot Point Bus Station for Camp Lejeune High School, where the classes meet, at 6 p.m. each evening and depart the school at 9:45 p.m.

Some of the courses offered this term include: Economics III, English 30, History 50, Math 45, Math 65, Math 120, Political Science 10, and Spanish 1, Anthropology 10, Business 10, English 30, English 31, History 40, History 51, Math 75, and Psychology 105.

Uniform changes

Headquarters Marine Corps has recently approved the following uniform changes for women marines.

Women officers shall wear the insignia of grade, on the right side of the summer service garrison and utility caps, in the same fashion as indicated for the male officer garrison cap.

The cutoff date of December 31, 1970 has been set for wearing of the black insignia, branch of service, on the utility cap. Women officers shall wear the gold enlisted insignia, branch of service, on the utility cap.

Woman Marines SNCOs may wear the green dress cap as the uniform of the day at the option of

the individual except when other wise prescribed by the commander. The black handbag shall be carried when the green dress cap is worn.

Uniform shirts, with the exception of the french cuff style, and socks as sold in the Marine Corps Exchange are authorized to be used to satisfy minimum requirements for enlisted personnel.

The white, pleated soft bosom shirt, shall be an evening style shirt with turned-down collar, pleated front, two or three buttonholes for studs on the front placket and french cuffs.

All personnel serving less than three years of active service will be required to turn their winter overcoats in upon release from active duty.

Back to School

School opens

Kindergarten classes will begin on August 31. This program has become a part of the Camp Lejeune Dependents' School System and is free to all military families living on base. To attend, the child must be 5 years of age before October 16, 1970. The parent must present a birth certificate at the time of registration.

Registration will be on August 24 and 25 from 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. For those living at Camp Geiger and the Marine Corps Air Station, registration will be at DeLalio Elementary School. For all other areas, registration will be at Brewster Junior High School.

Children from Berkeley Manor, Tarawa Terrace No. 1, Courthouse Bay, Rifle Range, Hospital Point, and Midway Park will attend the morning session which will be from 9:00 a.m. to noon. Children from Paradise Point, Tarawa Terrace No. 2, and Camp Knox will attend the afternoon session which will be from 12:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m. This kindergarten will be located at the Midway Park School.

Those children from Camp Geiger and the Marine Corps Air Station will attend kindergarten classes at DeLalio Elementary School. Pilot study 'Amplification and Application'



Two weeks of "Amplification and Application" today as forty-five officers finish a nine month program with an address by MajGen. Clifford B. Drake, A Chief of Staff, G-3, Headquarters Marine Corps. officers from Camp Lejeune, Cherry Point, Beaufort, New River and Paris Island, have been aboard the base for the past two weeks as part of COPE (Continuing Officer Professional Education) program.

The particular program ending today is a pilot study program of the Marine Corps Amphibious Warfare School Extension Course. Although there has been an extension course of the AWS for sometime, the program has been completely re-evaluated and cut from 435 hours to 189 hours and a group study program initiated. While at Lejeune, officers have participated in classroom discussions, heard lectures and conducted field problems.

Tompkins will introduce the featured speaker and the invocation will be given by Chaplain Vincent J. Mahoney of the Base Chaplains Office.



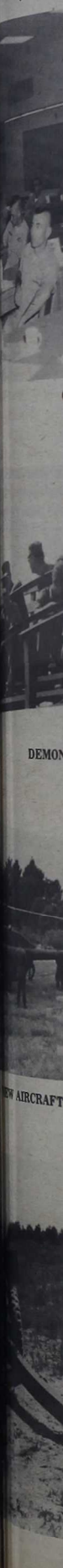
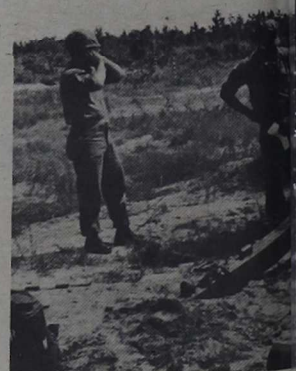

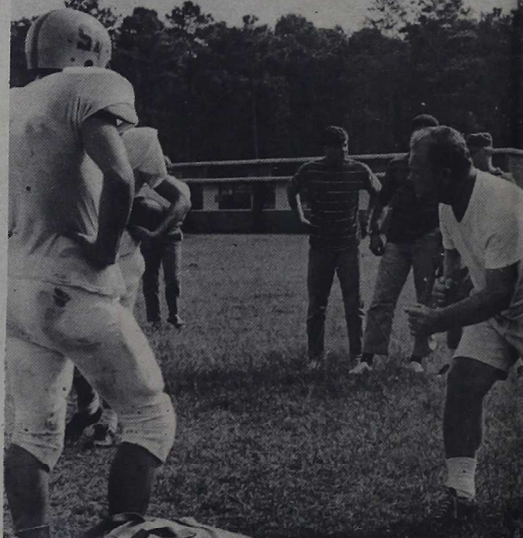

Webster defines Sea Urchins as a class of several sea animals of the echinoderm family, having a flattened globular body of fused plates covered with a spiny skin. However, this definition does not apply to the Sea Urchins aboard Camp Lejeune.

In 1954 a young Marine corporal by the name of Robert F. Marx changed the definition a little by forming a SCUBA (self contained underwater breathing apparatus) club called the Sea

Urchins. Making it one of the oldest diving clubs in the nation.

1/2 conducts water exercises

Riverine tactics are rapidly becoming familiar to the officers and men of 1st Battalion, 2d Marines, 2d Marine Division.

Since its return from Caribbean deployment, the battalion has been conducting intensive small unit waterborne training in preparation for upcoming operation "Escort Lion II."

Squad, platoon, and company sized tactics involving day and night navigation, tactical formations afloat, water survival, and fire team assault boat operations have been the recent subjects of the battalion's training.

The first phase of training consisted of instructing members of the 106mm recoilless rifle platoon in the operation and maintenance of the 33-horsepower outboard motors, and the lightweight assault

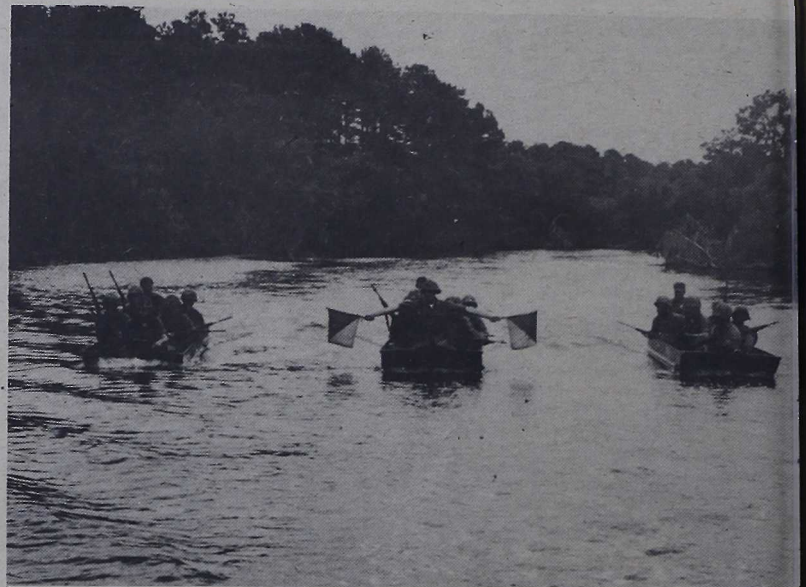
launches to be used in the operation.

Next, rifle companies commenced classroom training in riverine theory and practice followed by more detailed instruction at the boat basin area of Camp Lejeune.

Completing the preparation was practical application exercises held in the Duck Creek area, where everyone got a "real feel" for river operations.

In conjunction with the upcoming operation, other elements of 1st Bn., 2d Marines, are conducting training with the LOH helicopter, logistic support boats, and a reconnaissance swimming device, all of which will play an important role in the operation.

Initial supervision and overall guidance for the battalion's training has been provided by Marine Corps Development and Education Command, Quantico, Virginia.

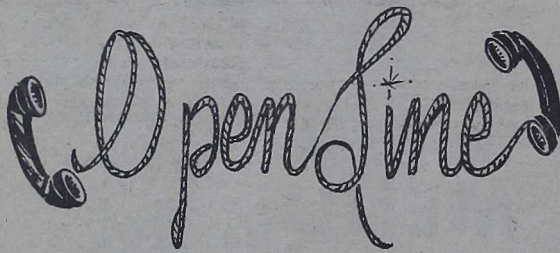
