



Dhi Qar

The Al-Shatra passenger bridge reconstruction was completed and now connects both sides of the community in Al Gura'an Village which is separated by the Abu-Diwaneej River in the Al Shatra District of Dhi Qar. This new passenger bridge will help the neighborhood expand their buying and selling power, as well as help stimulate the economy in the surrounding areas. The bridge will help farmers tend their crops on both sides of the river.

The 917th Federal Engineer Department confirmed that all corrections had been made safely and that the construction of the bridge was 100% complete. The ceremony was a great success and all participants were satisfied with the bridge.

Maysan

Over 25 community leaders attended a Maysan-wide rule of law conference in Amarah. Attendees include the Provincial Chief of Police, Chief Judge, Prison Director, Property Rights Attorneys, Iraqi Army lawyers, and others. Participants discussed the different roles between Iraqi Police and Iraqi Army for making arrests of outlaws. They also discussed humanitarian needs in the community and important efforts to fight corruption.

The Maysan PRT rule of law advisor and U.S. Forces advisors attended the discussions but had minimal participation.



Muthanna

Leaders from the Muthanna PRT visited three drip irrigation sites near Rumaytha. With the current water shortages it is important for farmers to use the best techniques to irrigate their fields without wasting water or using contaminated water.

During the past week, Tatweer NGO conducted a ten-day Information Technology training course for nine participants from the Ministry of Municipalities and Public Works at the Muthanna Technical Training Center.

The PRT conducted visits to construction projects at Al Safad and Al-Hurryia school.

Land Tenure and Property

Private property ownership was an important concept first introduced by the Sumerians during their control of Mesopotamia, and emerged again in the late nineteenth century. The reintroduction of private property had a major impact on Iraq's social system, as it went from a feudal society where sheikhs provided both spiritual and tribal leadership for the inhabitants, to one separated between landowners and sharecroppers. Before the 2003 Iraq War, many people sold their land to the government to purchase essentials such as food and medicine.

The ability to own private property is essential for strong democracies.
