



THE CONGRESSIONAL MEDAL OF HONOR, this Nation's highest honor for heroism, was presented to GySgt. Jimmie Howard by President Johnson Monday at White House ceremonies. ## Corps Selection Board Picks 812 New Lt. Colonels, Majors

WASHINGTON, August 18 — Marine Corps selection boards during this summer will result in the selection of 462 more lieutenant colonels and about 350 more majors than originally anticipated. This will provide for 802 new lieutenant colonels and approximately 1,040 new majors by the end of this fiscal year, June 30, 1968. Earlier promotion targets would have provided 340 lieutenant colonels and 693 majors. Increased promotions will be based on temporary promotion law, and the officers promoted by this authority will be considered in succeeding years for selection under permanent provisions of the law. Selection standards will be the same under both permanent and temporary provisions. Increases have been authorized by the Secretary of the Navy under

temporary promotion law, because the build-up of the Marine Corps since 1965 has increased the need for officers in the field grades. This build-up in officer strength is scheduled for completion in 1968, barring unforeseen circumstances.

Marine officials pointed out that in some cases, captains now are serving in major's billets, majors are filling lieutenant colonel billets, and lieutenant colonels are occupying colonel's billets.

Junior in the zone for consideration to lieutenant colonel under permanent promotion authority, is Major R. W. Heesch, lineal precedence number 895. The junior man now eligible for consideration to temporary lieutenant colonel is Major Charles H. F. Egger, precedence number 1495.

Captain R. N. Pegler, precedence number 1497, is the junior officer in the promotion zone for consideration to major under permanent promotion authority. The junior man eligible for promotion to temporary major is Captain David A. Quinlan, precedence number 1912.

Use of the temporary promotion authority at this time will result in two benefits, personnel officers pointed out. It allows the Marine Corps to promote sufficient numbers of officers to meet the needs of the Corps, and in addition it provides these officers with the rank, pay and prestige commensurate with the billets they are filling.

The selection board to consider majors for promotion now is in session. The board which will

consider captains for promotion to the rank of major will convene early in September.

## Silver Star Presented In Awards Ceremony

Twenty-five Maines from Marine Corps Base received personal decorations during formal ceremonies this morning for their actions in Vietnam.

The ceremonies were held at the Base Parade Ground with Major General Joseph O. Butcher, Base Commander, making the presentations.

The awards included: one Silver Star Medal, Two Legions of Merit, four Bronze Star Medals, two Air Medals, three Purple Hearts, seven Navy Commendation Medals, eight Certificates of Commendation and two Vietnamese Crosses of Gallantry.

Staff Sergeant Charles Garrett, Headquarters Company, Headquarters and Service Battalion, received a Silver Star Medal for conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity on December 8, 1966, while serving with a Combined Action Platoon, Company "A", First Battalion, Seventh Marines, 1st Marine Division in Vietnam.

Gunnery Sergeant Shelby G. Risner, First Infantry Training Regiment, received a Bronze Star Medal for meritorious service from April 24, 1966 to May 14, 1967, while serving with Company "M" and subsequently Company "K", Third Battalion, Third Marines, 3d Marine Division in Vietnam.

Staff Sergeant George Sidney Person, Rifle Range Detachment, received a Bronze Star Medal for heroic achievement on August 19, 1966, while serving with Company "E", Second Battalion, Fourth Marines, 3d Marine Division in Vietnam.

Sergeant Leslie K. Jones, Sub Unit 2, Headquarters and Ser-

vice Battalion, received a Bronze Star Medal for heroic achievement on April 2, 1967, while serving as a Squad Leader with Company "D", First Battalion, Seventh Marines, 1st Marine Division in Vietnam.

Corporal Marc Allen Carr, Military Police and Guard Company, received a Bronze Star for heroic achievement on March 18, 1967, while serving Company "A", First Reconnaissance Battalion, 1st Marine Division in Vietnam.

Colonel Robley Earl West, Headquarters and Service Battalion, received a Gold Star in lieu of a second Legion of Merit Medal for exceptionally meritorious conduct from April 24 to June 5, 1966, while serving with the III Marine Amphibious Force in Vietnam.

Captain John Joseph McGreevy, USN, Base Dispensary, received a Legion of Merit Medal for exceptionally meritorious conduct from May 14, 1966 to July 2, 1967, while serving with the 1st Marine Division in Vietnam.

Lance Corporal Wallace Nowak, Jr., Motor Transport Company, Headquarters and Service Battalion, received Gold Stars in lieu of second and third Air Medals for meritorious achievement from November 18, 1966 to March 17, 1967 and from March 18, to March 27, 1967, while serving with Marine Observation Squadron 6 in Vietnam.

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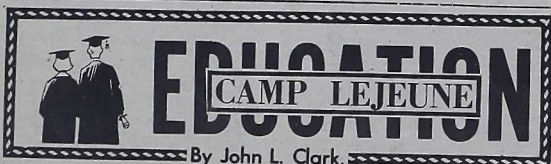

## Heaven's Blue Ridge...

Let it never be said Daniel Boone couldn't hack it.

Hack he did, and the crude footpaths he and his fellow pioneers carved out of mountain wilderness two centuries ago have given way to an asphalt snake that threads its course south Virginia to the heart of Cherokee country. The Blue Ridge way: Daniel Boone started it; Uncle Sam finished it.

For the Lejeune motorist it is a 307-mile trip to the town of Blowing Rock, which straddles the parkway. It's town to visit, but racking there runs into rubles. The town and his family are better off spending the night in motels removed from the parkway, or camping out.

A suggested sightseeing tour begins early Saturday morning using Blowing Rock Cliff as a jumping off point. Here the falls upside down. Scientists say the phenomenon is caused by the Northwest breezes sweeping through the rocky flume of the cliff. Cherokee Indian residents, however, claim the theory is full of hot air. They, in turn, tell a long-winded tale of two braves fighting over an Indian maiden long ago. The maiden's true love finished second and took a nasty fall. The rushed forward, imploring the God of Winds to save him. Her was returned. No matter which version you buy, it remains fact that, to this day, any light object tossed over the cliff turned safely by the winds.

Traveling northwest off the parkway, one encounters the Twain Railroad a few miles outside of Blowing Rock. Once owned by Autry, the 100-year-old steam locomotive is the center of attraction in a colorful amusement park. Combined admission and train is \$2.10 for adults and \$1. for children. Tots under five are ad-free. The train ride is fun, with plenty of opportunities for worthwhile snapshots. Featured in the 20-minute rail trip is a small mountain is an attempted holdup, bungled 20 times by a band of boot outlaws, much to the delight of the passengers. Also included in the trip is a cowboys and Indians clash at a side fort, with the Indians taking it on the chin regularly from through October. The General Store, haberdashery, Wells Fargo office, and saloon are musts for visitors to the park. First, a chair-lift to Magic Mountain and the Castle of the Sleeping Indian is exciting for the kids, though it costs Dad 50 cents per ride. Tonight and tomorrow night are the tourists' last chance this year to see the "Horn in the West," Kermit Hunter's dramatic in the Daniel Boone Amphitheater, Boone, N. C. The



is emotionally stirring, recalling the remarkable faith of Daniel Boone and the hearty frontier families who forged west to escape the tyranny of British rule and the ever-widening nation of the Cherokee. The story is excellent, with a professional cast to match. The time is 8:15; prices range from \$2 to \$3.

Next door to the theater are the Daniel Boone Gardens, six acres of nature well worth the quarter admission. Besides native flora, a natural spring, rustic bridge leading to a woodland path, a well, the Holy Prayer shrine, and the Squire Boone cabin are included in the terraced lot.

The U. S. Naval Medical Field Research Laboratory was established on August 30, 1943 by joint agreement between the Bureau of Medicine and Surgery and the Commandant of the Marine Corps to study appropriate problems peculiar to the Marine Corps. The mission of NMFRL has remained virtually unchanged in the laboratory's twenty-four years existence and is as follows: To conduct research, development and testing in the medical, dental, and allied sciences, with particular emphasis on problems of amphibious medicine. NMFRL is under the direct command of the Bureau of Medicine and Surgery with immediate area coordination exercised by the Commanding General, MCB, Camp Lejeune.

Since its inception, NMFRL has concerned itself with the problems of the individual Marine through various studies in the field of virology, bacteriology, epidemiology, psychology, physiology, chemistry, entomology, microbiology, physics, personnel protection, and engineering. Certain studies underway which hold promise of assisting the Marine Corps to remain the world's best fighting force include evaluation of physical fitness, development of better body armor, artificial acclimatization for combat in hot, wet climates, control of lice and mosquitoes and a study of meningitis with the hope of eventual control.

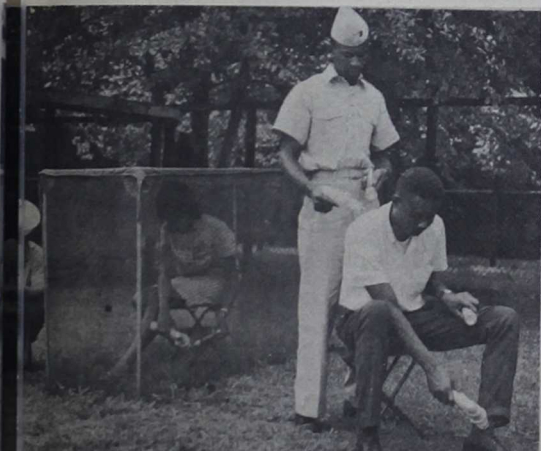

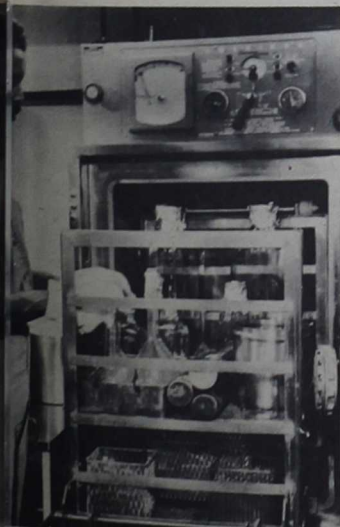

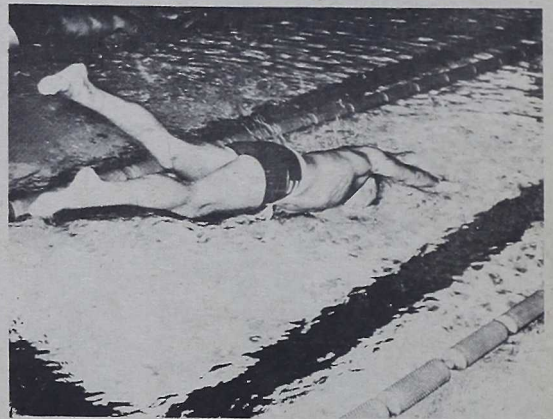

Pro Lines

-CHIPPING-

Stand with your weight on your left foot. This will insure that you hit the ball on the down stroke. If you stand with your weight on both feet the backward swinging weight of the club will cause you to sway to the right, making you hit the ball on the up-stroke

If you want the chip to run, tighten your grip and use a shorter, faster stroke and hit around the ball more.

If you want it to stop, use a softer grip and a slower tempo. Swing back straight on the line of flight and play it with an open face on the club. As you strike the ball, you will cut it and cause it to have back spin and it will give you a higher ball.

When the pin is on the back of the green use a 7 iron and run the ball. When the pin is on the front of the green use a 9 iron and cut the ball.

## Sgt. Bessent, Recon Marine, Given Bronze Star Medal

Sergeant Leonard S. Bessent was presented the Bronze Star Medal with Combat "V" last week by Lieutenant Colonel W. C. Drumright, Commanding Officer, 2d Reconnaissance Battalion, 2d Marine Division during informal ceremonies.

Sergeant Bessent, a member of "B" Company, 2d Reconnaissance Battalion, was awarded the Bronze Star Medal for heroic achievement in connection with operations against the enemy in the Republic of Vietnam while serving as a Radio Operator with 3d Reconnaissance Company, 3d Reconnaissance Battalion, 3d Marine Division.

The citation stated: "On the night of January 17, Sergeant Bessent, as a member of a seven-man reconnaissance patrol, was inserted by helicopter deep into enemy controlled territory fourteen miles north of Khe Sanh near the Demilitarized Zone with the Mission of locating enemy infiltration routes.

After establishing a night defensive position, the Marines heard sounds of enemy activity throughout the night. At dawn on January 18, the patrol moved to an observation point where a numerically superior North Vietnamese Army patrol of approximately forty men was observed

moving toward their position.

"Quickly moving to defensive positions, the Marines delivered a heavy volume of fire at the enemy. Demonstrating exceptional presence of mind and versatility, Sergeant Bessent immediately advised higher headquarters of the patrol's situation while simultaneously delivering effective fire at the enemy.

"During the fire fight, one patrol member was killed and two seriously wounded. With complete disregard for his own safety, Sergeant Bessent exposed himself to enemy automatic weapons

fire in an effort to cover the mortally wounded Marine's body. As he maneuvered through the hostile fire, he was wounded in the right hand and arm by fragments from an enemy hand grenade.

"Demonstrating exceptional courage and despite his wounds, he succeeded in moving the man to the patrol's position and continued to operate his radio until extraction helicopter arrived. His heroic and selfless actions inspired all who observed him and contributed significantly to the unit's mission."

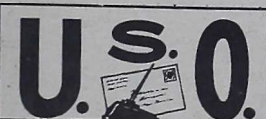

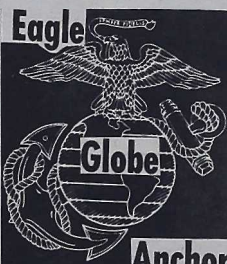

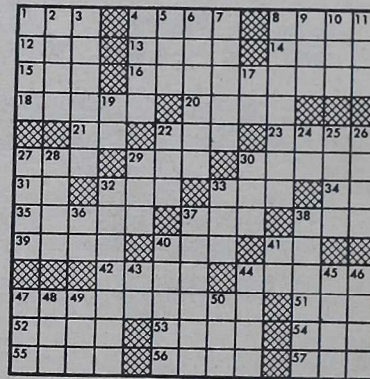
