PRESIDENTIAL GREATNESS: THE IMAGE AND THE MAN FROM GEORGE WASHINGTON TO THE PRESENT by Thomas A. Bailey. While the author, a Stanford historian, has his own measuring rod for ranking, his primary purpose is to examine the various criteria of presiden-tial greatness and to point out their strong and weak points. From a wealth of obscure information about the preside the reader is free to develop his own table of precedence, making this provocative, funny, absorbing book, a challenging one as well.

### Snipers Are Proud Outfit But No Notched Stocks

CHU LAI, Vietnam, April 25--In the days of the Old West, many gun - fighters prided themselves in the number of men they killed and carved notches on the butt or stocks of their weapons to show their prowess.

The sniper platoon of the Fifth
Marine Regiment, Task Force XRay, 1st Marine Division, is proud
of its record too, but doesn't

Since January the 35 - man sniper platoon has accounted for 60 confirmed Viet Cong killed in both the Chu Lai and Da Nang Tactical Area of Responsibility.

"Most of the action has been with the 2nd Bn. at An Hoa," said Sgt. Thomas G. Casey, 23 (Woodruff, S.C.), platoon sergeant of the sniper platoon.

"We have a squad attached to that battalion at all times," he continued, "For the other two battalions, we are on call for anything from a fire team patrol to a major operation."

The sniper platon has three,
11 - man squads, with a squad
broken down into five two - man

"The shooter and a spotter),
"The shooter and spotter are
interchangeable," Casey said,
"and depends on who is the best
shooter. The shooter is always

in charge of the team," he added.
Armed with the Remington Mo-

Armed with the Remington Model 700 rifle, mounted on a Monte Carlo stock with a Redfield 3x-9x power scope and equipped with a range finder up to 600 yards, the snipers have recorded kills up to 1500 meters.

"I think it's the best sniper rifle in Vietnam," Casey said.

"Not all our kills come with the rifle," he explained. "If the VC are out of our range or there is a large group, we can call in artillery or mortar fire on them. We get credit for those too."

Before being assigned to the sniper platoon, the Marines must complete the 1st Marine Divi-sion's Sniper School in Da Nang, Upon completion of the school, the Marine is given the sniper Military Occupational Special-ty (MOS) of 8541. In the field the snipers keep

record of the type of action they encounter and report any VC sightings and activities to the battalion intelligence section. When they return from the field, reports are also made to the platoon sergeant.

"We have a highly motivated platoon," Casey said, "They all want to be snipers, It's just a little bit more of a personal war that way," he concluded,

Included in the physical ex-cellence test are such common physical conditioning exercises as push - ups (80 required), pull-ups (20) and sit - ups (done with a 50 pound weight behind the head).

Weightlifting is utilized in the testing to determine physical strength. The five - foot three-inch, 155 pound Scherbenske

"A" Company, 3rd Reconnaissance Battalion in Vietnam.



### Kathy Craft, USO Songstress, Is Big Favorite With Marines

Every Saturday night in the Jacksonville USO, 200 Marines cut short the sea stories, put away their pool cues and gather round a makeshift stage to hear a little girl size.

a little girl sing. Sixteen-year-old Kathy Craft never disappoints them. Although diminutive in stature - 5 feet, 3 inches when she stretches - the Jacksonville High School sophomore commands a powerful

With a sound similar to Brenda Lee, though not as throaty, brown-haired Kathy entertains the troops with a 1-1/2 hour repertoire of Country-Western mu-sic. Most of her numbers come from Loretta Lynn, Skeeter Davis and Jim Reeves

The guitar pickin' Kathy has toured with the Grand Ole Opry in a career that began as a square dancer at age 10. She was then a member of the Carolina Kloggers, a Jacksonville dancing roup that toured the state in a bus, pulling a flatbed wagon for a

In 1962, while performing in one of the smaller towns on the circuit, the lights went out. The troupe boarded the bus until the power could be restored. When it looked as though it would be a while, the Kloggers' manager, who had heard Kathy could sing carried the microphone to the bus and asked her if she would. She agreed, reluctantly, and thus began her singing career in the dark. Minutes later the lights

came back on, "I pulled the mike away and clammed up," Kathy recalled.

After her debut, Kathy's sing-ing became a regular act in the show. She danced with the Kloggers, and sang between dances.

Voted "Sweetheart of the USO" in 1964, the blue eyed songstress has cut a record, "Once a Day," which enjoyed local popularity in 1965. She also found time this year to play the lead role in "Annie Get Your Gun," presented by the Jacksonville High School stu-

Foremost among her ambitions are a duet with Jimmy Dean and a chance with Nashville's Grand Ole Opry. She's not counting on either, but is keeping her fingers

# Force Troops Reserves At Vieques

In the northern sector of the in the northern sector of the small island a crew of Marines begin to carve out part of a slop-ing knoll which will eventually become a flame-thrower range. To the south was the start of

six new water tanks on a concrete pad located at the top of "water hill" where the sun's rays miss neither man nor beast.

In the middle of the island a kindly padre watches as one of his churches and his rectory take on a new look at the hands of the

United States Marines.

The name of the island is Vie-The name of the island is Vieques and as most any Fleet Marine Force, Atlantic, Marine will tell you, it is located several miles off the eastern tip of the mainland of Puerto Rico and is a major training area for both the Fleet Marine Force and Force

These Marines are a special breed who are of infinite value to the Corps -- they are Reserv-ists. They are part of the Sixth Engineer Battalion, Force Troops, Fleet Marine Force, At-lantic, and they had come from Gary, Ind., and Kalamazoo, Mich., to work and learn.

Using knowledge gained from schools attended while they were serving their six months active duty and experience accumulated on diverse projects which they tackled in their own home towns, the Reservists handled both the routine and difficult projects, which they were assigned, with enthusiasm.

Under the guidance of Padre Pedro T. Otonello, "B" Com-pany made extensive repairs on pany made extensive repairs on a public park located in Isabel Segunda, a small town located several miles from Camp Gar-cia, which had been originally donated by Marines stationed on

They worked long hours on the training ranges forming a flamethrower area and building bunkers on the hand grenade

Pouring a concrete sidewalk running from the Base Headquarters and painting a number of buildings in the compound rounded out a full schedule for "B" Company.

This year's summer camp, termed by many of the reserv-ists as their most enjoyable and informative in recent years, was not all work and no play.

Both companies enjoyed the beautiful beaches of Vieques and the liberty hours spent in the quaint town of Isabel Segunda.

A number of the 130 men of "C" Company and the 212 men of "B" Company travelled to the fun-filled capitol of Puerto Rico, San Juan, and visited the historic
