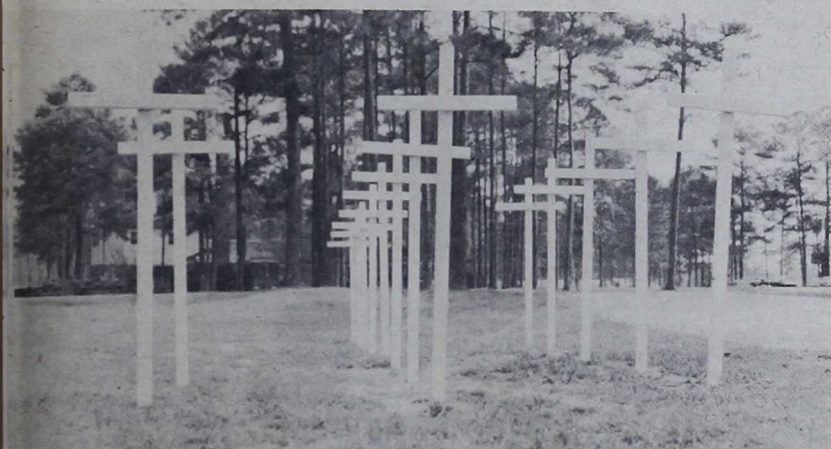

## Promotion Program for Sgt, Cpl, LCpl Revised

A revised promotion program to sergeant, corporal, and lance corporal was announced this month by Headquarters Marine Corps.

Both regular and accelerated programs for advancement to sergeant were outlined in the Commandant's ALMAR 13.

Under the regular program, commanding officers are authorized to promote fully qualified corporals with date of rank from

Sept. 30, 1966, or earlier. Composite scores should be equal to or above the minimum scores listed on page 3.

The accelerated program provides for promotion of qualified corporals with date of rank from Oct. 1, to Nov. 1, 1966. Their composite scores must also meet minimum standards listed below.

This program also applies to personnel in transit or whose service record books are not

currently available.

Pay and allowances for all appointments issued under this program will date from March 20, 1967.

Commanding officers are enjoined not to promote corporals not considered fully qualified or whose advancement is not considered in the best interests of the Corps, the directive said.

## Army, Navy, USAF Will Participate

More than 3,000 Marines from Camp Lejeune and nearby Cherry Point, N.C., comprising the 8th Marine Expeditionary Brigade (MEB), will join forces with Army, Navy and Air Force commands next month in a joint training exercise in the Caribbean area.

The exercise, named CLOVE HITCH III, includes a controller and aggressor organization composed of Atlantic Command air, ground and Naval elements. A portion of the Puerto Rico National Guard will also participate.

CLOVE HITCH III will feature an amphibious and helicopter-borne assault by 8th MEB Marines constituting the Landing Force under the command of Brigadier General E.B. Wheeler.

The 8th MEB, formed earlier this month at Camp Lejeune, will participate in counter-guerilla operations after landing on the beaches at Salinas on the southeastern coast of Puerto Rico. Other Brigade elements will go ashore at Roosevelt Roads, P.R.

The amphibious assault on the morning of April 22 will be supported by airstrikes from U.S. Navy carrier-based aircraft, along with simulated shore bombardment by Atlantic Fleet destroyers and cruisers to "soften" enemy positions.

The 8th MEB, a temporarily activated combat force, will join

Amphibious Group Four to comprise the Navy-Marine Corps team in action during CLOVE HITCH III. Tailored in size and character for this exercise the 8th MEB consists of Battalion Landing Team (BLT) 2/8 with helicopter support from Marine

Medium Helicopter Squadron-162 (HMM-162), and BLT 2/2 helicopter supported by a detachment from HMM-264.

Battalion Landing Team 2/8 is commanded by Lieutenant Colonel Charles G. Cooper and consists of three infantry companies with attached air, tanks, amphibious tractors, motor transport, artillery and logistic support units. It is presently on station as the Caribbean Ready Force.

Commanded by Lieutenant Colonel James T. Breckinridge, BLT 2/2 is similarly organized and will relieve BLT 2/8 as the Caribbean Ready Force upon

## HOPE For Everyone

## If There's Hope - There's Health

In more than half the world, one doctor may care for as many as a quarter of a million people. Per capita income ranges from \$50 to \$300. Hunger, bad diets, and inadequate housing cause disease. LA VIDA by Oscar Lewis - Based upon a study of one hundred Puerto Rican families from four slums of San Juan and of their relatives in New York City. Using the tape recorder approach, the bulk of the work is in the form of first-person biographies, taken from interviews of several generations of the Rios family. The author was popular in 1961 for his book on poverty in Mexico, entitled "The Children of Sanchez".

## ARTS AND LETTER WINNER

MR. CLEMENS AND MARK TWAIN by Justin Kaplan - Working since 1959 with new and unpublished material that has been available only in recent years, the author has broken through the textbook image of Mark Twain. His book reads like a good novel. The conflict is the battle between "Mark Twain ... the exploder of sham -- and the success - hunting Samuel Clemens."

THE MILITARY POLICEMAN  
COURTEOUS FIRM ALERT

From the many comments I have received from military, dependent, and civilian personnel. . . some favorable, some unfavorable. . . I find there are many people who do not really know what to expect from the military police, particularly when in trouble when apprehended for an offense, or when stopped for a traffic violation.

The purpose of the military police is to protect the lives, rights, and property of the 60,000 to 70,000 people who live and work aboard this base as well as the millions of dollars worth of government property. They accomplish this by enforcing the many rules and regulations designed to provide this protection, in a firm and courteous manner. In addition, they are alert to provide assistance to persons in difficulty or trouble, whenever possible. To guide them in performing their duties, we have adopted the following code:

## A CODE FOR MILITARY POLICE

1. Offenses are not committed against me as a military policeman. They are committed against the Armed Forces and society therefore, I have no personal feelings in the handling of offenders.

2. It is my duty at all times to make the arrest without the use of force except when every other means have failed and to report the facts to the Provost Marshal. It is the duty of the offender's commanding officer or the courts to inflict punishment.

3. To strike a person who has used foul language toward me is evidence of weakness and lack of balance; and to mistreat a person who is intoxicated is evidence of a brutal nature.

4. It is my duty at all times, both on and off duty, to set an example for all service personnel as well as the general public. I will be courteous and tactful, but firm at all times. My ability as a military policeman is not measured by the number of arrests I make but by the qualities of alertness and devotion to duty displayed in aiding and protecting all persons who come within my jurisdiction.

5. Through constant study and analysis of all rules and regulations, as well as all orders, laws, and ordinances, I will be able to explain why certain acts are prohibited.

6. I will keep personal views out of military police duty, but will put all my personality into the performance of it. I am proud of my uniform and realize that by presenting a good appearance at all times I will set a good example that will reflect credit upon my organization and the Marine Corps.

7. As representative of the Commanding General, my authority is absolute and my responsibility is great. I must strictly observe and enforce all regulations and orders, but I will never take an action which may constitute an abuse of my authority.

As I'm sure you can see, it takes a well-trained, highly qualified Marine to perform his duties according to the standards of this code. With the rapid turnover of personnel and the youth and inexperience of some of our military policemen, sometimes this fails. Since our operation goes on 24 hours each day, seven days a week, supervision at all times is not possible. For this reason, I greatly appreciate your calls and letters, because they help me to weed out those unsuited for law enforcement duties, provide additional training when appropriate, and properly reward those who deserve it. Please keep calling.

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## Beetle Causes Quarantine at Camp Lejeune

The "White-fringed Beetle" has caused the Camp Lejeune area to be quarantined.

Quarantine regulations have been applied in accordance with the provisions of the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the North Carolina Department of Agriculture Quarantines. Base Order 6210.2C of March 21, 1967 outlines the quarantine procedure.

The following articles cannot be moved to or from Camp Lejeune unless accompanied by a valid inspection certificate issued by an authorized Federal or State inspector:

- Soil, sand, or gravel moved independently or attached to heavy equipment and amphibious vehicles.
- Nursery stock, plants, and sod.

- Any other articles so handled and stored whereby movement might present a hazard of spread of the white-fringed beetle.

Those desiring to move regulated articles to or from the Base, and who do not possess an inspection certificate, should contact the office of the Base Landscape Architect, 7-5158, to schedule an inspection. There is no charge for this service.

Locally purchased nursery items should have an inspection certificate attached by the nursery at the time of purchase at no extra cost to the buyer.

completion of Exercise CLOVE HITCH III.

Marine Medium Helicopter Squadron-162 is commanded by Lieutenant Colonel Daniel M. Wilson; and Major P.R. Worden will function as Officer-in-Charge of Sub Unit 1, HMM-264. Both squadrons utilize the UH-34D "Sea Horse" helicopter.

The Marines' strike at Salinas

will be simultaneous with an airdrop on Vieques Island of 1,800 paratroopers of the 82nd Airborne Division, USA, from Ft. Bragg, N.C. The paratroopers will be airlifted some 1,300 miles in C-141 Starlifter jet transports. This will be the first major exercise in which the C-141 will be used to airdrop paratroopers.

CLOVE HITCH III will be directed by Admiral Thomas H. Moorer, Commander in Chief Atlantic, from his headquarters in Norfolk, Virginia. The "on-scene" commander will be Vice Admiral Bernard A. Clarey, Commander of Joint Task Force 122, aboard his flagship, the heavy cruiser USS Newport News.

Naval forces in the exercise will be drawn from the U.S. Atlantic Fleet, also commanded by Admiral Moorer. The "on scene" Naval Amphibious Task Force will be commanded by Rear Admiral C. Edwin Bell, USN, Commander of Amphibious Group Four.

Designed to provide training in joint operations for all headquarters and commands involved, CLOVE HITCH III will demonstrate the capability of the Atlantic Command to react quickly in response to an emergency situation.

CLOVE HITCH III is expected to last approximately three weeks and will involve some 21,000 armed forces personnel.

## BLT 2/8 Ambassadors On Caribbean Cruise

USS GUAM, AFLOAT, (DE-LAYED) - To fulfill one of many obligations as a Caribbean Landing Force is to fill the role of Ambassadors of Goodwill. For Battalion Landing Team, 2d Battalion, 8th Marines this role reached a pinnacle of friendship during their visit to Curacao, Dutch Antilles Feb. 21-27.

Arriving in the Islands main port aboard the USS Guam (LPH-9), flagship for Amphibious Squadron 8, BLT 2/8 began four days of liberty, during which they held formal guard mounts, parades, participated in athletic events; and in conjunction with the Navy, welcomed aboard more than 20,000 guests for open house and a tour of the ship.

The 2d Marine Division's Drum and Bugle Corps, touring with BLT 2/8, provided ruffles and flourishes as distinguished guests, including the Island's Governor, came aboard to be hosted by Commodore Ebenezer Porter, Commander, Amphibious Squadron 8; Captain S.T.

DeLaMater, Commanding Officer, USS Guam; Lieutenant Colonel C.G. Cooper, Landing Force Commander; and Lieutenant Colonel D.M. Wilson, Commanding Officer, Marine Medium Helicopter Squadron 162.

Athletic events (soccer, basketball and a rifle and pistol match) were held with the Royal Dutch Marines as competitors.

A portion of Marines from BLT 2/8 and Marine detachments from two Navy ships found a warm reception in Aruba, Dutch Antilles.

While in Aruba, Company F's Drill Team, led by Sergeant James L. Liberati, performed for guests visiting the ships. The visitors were awed as the Marines went through their paces, spinning the rifles from one Marine to the next and throwing them in the air to be caught by another Marine.

For Marines and Sailors there was also a shipboard dance. Invitations had been sent out to the island population and a large attendance resulted. The next day there was a beach party, hosted by the Navy, with Dutch Marines as guests.

Promotions to lance corporal and corporal are covered in Marine Corps Bulletin 1418, dated March 12, 1967. Promotion test requirements are waived, one month of the time-in-grade requirement may be waived at the discretion of the Commanding Officer, and command attention is directed to qualifying potential candidates through local schooling and on-the-job training.

In addition, the promotion cycle has been changed from quarterly to monthly. In the future quotas will be filled on the first day of each month and promotions will be effected before the last day of that month.

Quotas will be computed based on the following percentages. Commanding generals of FMF commands are authorized to promote a number equal to 25 per cent of authorized billets for lance corporals and 50 per cent for corporals. Commanding generals of non-FMF units are authorized 25 per cent for lance corporal and 25 per cent for corporal.

Promotions may be effected on any day of the month. Date of rank will be from the first day of the month. Pay and allowances will accrue from the

date promotion is effective.

Personnel with lost or missing record books may, on recovery of the record book and if otherwise eligible and qualified, be promoted without regard to quotas.

Date of rank will be the first day of the month in which the promotion could have been effected had the records been available. Pay and allowances will accrue from the date promotion is effective.

The minimum scores, also by MOS, required for promotion to sergeant under the accelerated program are: 02-124; 04-121; 08-116; 13-130; 21-114; 23-117; 28-116; 34-120; 40-125; 43-114; 46-123; 57-119; 59-118; 67-126; 68-120.

## 2d Tank Battalion Plays Vital Role

Containing the only true all-purpose armor available to Fleet Marine Force, Atlantic is the Force Troops' 2d Tank Battalion under the command of Lieutenant Colonel William T. Unger.

The battalion has the responsibility of providing combat support for the Marine Division in the amphibious assault and during subsequent operations ashore.

Mobility, armor - protected firepower and shock power are used to close with and destroy enemy forces, fortifications and material.

Equipped with the M48A3 medium tank, the M67A2 flame tank and the M103A2 heavy tank, the battalion possesses armored mobile firepower equal to three artillery battalions, sixty-four machine gun sections and a flame

All Marine Corps tanks have been converted to diesel making it possible to transmit transmissions among the tanks within the battalion.

The conversion to diesel greatly increases the range of the vehicle and the maintenance problems.

During the past year, the battalion personnel have been engaged in extensive training exercises toward the Southeast Asia.

Tanks have been utilized throughout the Camp Lejeune area to sharpen the skills, and have been participating in various simulated exercises.

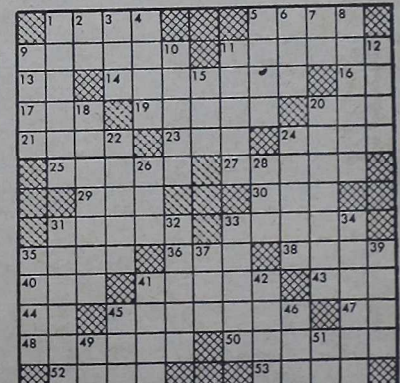

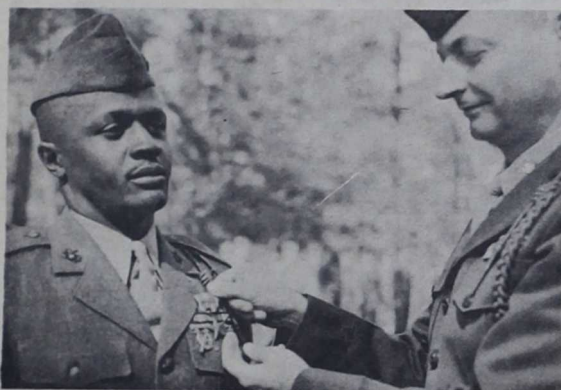
