RAdm J. L. Yon Visits Lejeune Medical Units

Rear Admiral J.L. Yon, Medical Officer, 5th Naval District, has completed a two-day inspection of medical facilities and treatment at Camp Lejeune complex.

Admiral Yon visited the U.S. Naval Hospital, 2d Marine Division Surgeons Office and the Base Medical Office March 6.

The Admiral also made official calls on Major General Joseph O. Butcher, Commanding General, Marine Corps Base, and Major General Ormond R. Simpson, Commanding General, 2d Marine Division.

Tuesday morning he met with Marines Corps Air Facility medical officers at New River, visited the 1st Infantry Training Regiment and toured the Field Medical Service School at Montford Point.

He concluded his tour with an inspection of the Naval Medical Field Research Lab and a meeting with the Base Commander.

Medical Administrative Officer, accompanied Admiral Yon on the tour.

Diver, Parachutist Get New MOS

New MOS's have been assigned for parachutists, scuba divers, and Vietnamese language specialists.

Enlisted men completing approved parachuting courses will be assigned 8652 MOS's. Scuba Divers completing approved courses will get 8653 MOS's. Men qualified for both parachuting and scuba diving will have an 8654 MOS. The MOS's apply to men in Recon. Marines not in Recon who have completed a parachuting course will have an 8662 MOS.

Scuba Diving Officers will be assigned 9953 MOS's. Officers are qualified as both scuba divers and parachutists will have 9954 MOS's.

New additional MOS's will be assigned to both officers and enlisted personnel who have successfully completed a formal Vietnamese language course in excess of 200 hours.

Division, Force Troops Poised For 'Shamrock'

More than 2000 men of the 2d Regiment, 2d Marine Division, are in position at Camp Pickett, Va., making last minute preparations for Exercise "Shamrock," which begins next Monday and ends on Thursday, the eve of St. Patrick's Day.

About 300 more leathernecks will leave Camp Lejeune this weekend to act as aggressors for "Shamrock."

The big movement to the U.S. Army base east of Blackstone began late last month when heavy equipment and tactical vehicles moved out of Camp Lejeune on railroad flat cars. An advance party deployed shortly after to establish liaison with U.S. Army authorities and begin setting up the bivouac area. Main troop bodies left aboard civilian and military buses last weekend.

This week is being devoted to unit training, including tank-infantry tactics, and eleventh-hour planning. Elements of the 2d Tank Battalion, Force Troops, and of the 2d Marine Air Wing, FMF, are in position to provide direct support for both training and for the exercise itself.

Brigadier General John E. Williams, Commanding General, Force Troops, is overall Exercise Director for "Shamrock". Colonel W.R. Burgoyne Jr., is Deputy Exercise Director as well as Commanding Officer, 2d Marine Regiment.

"Shamrock" will reach into every facet of a regiment's operation in a combat situation, probing for areas that need improvement and honing to a finer edge those that are already polished. At least half of all operations and training during the maneuver will be conducted at night.

Just getting the troops and equipment to and from Camp Pickett provides a shakedown of the Regiment's logistic machinery. Resupply and liaison with U.S. Army units also work to this advantage. As in every operation, combat or training, the movement of beans and bullets is a formidable headache, often

overlooked by the individual trooper, who has his own problems.

When the exercise gets underway next Monday, the 1st and 3d Battalions of the 2d Marines will be lined up abreast, with armor support, to begin coordinated offensive operations.

As in all exercises the maneuvering unit is the only real element in a lengthy piece of fiction concocted to give the problem perspective. In "Shamrock" the 2d Marines are supposed to be part of a big U.S. force sent to deny an invader the opportunity to capture Washington, D.C.

For the troops on "Shamrock" there will be plenty of hustling around in the cold, dank bogs that make Camp Pickett memorable.

RMCB-12 Trains Here

Reserve Seabees of U.S. Naval Reserve Mobile Construction Battalion (RMCB) - 12 arrived here Sunday and began two weeks of infantry training on Monday.

The 35 officers and 445 enlisted men of the battalion come from 19 units scattered throughout all the New England states except Connecticut. The battalion will conclude training March 17 with a "pass in review" ceremony.

Training for the Seabees includes use of the compass; troop leading techniques; demolitions instruction; nomenclature and operation of crew-served and individual weapons; qualification with the M-14 rifle, and defensive tactics on the squad, platoon and company level.

The Seabees are hosted here by Headquarters and Service Battalion and are training under a special contingent of Marines commanded by Captain J.J. O'Meara.

Commander Francis J. McCarran is Commanding Officer of the Seabee Battalion.

Speeders Beware!

The largest majority of traffic offenders, for moving violations, who appear at traffic court each week are speeders.

During February, PMO handled more than 200 tickets for speeding.

When we consider that where speed is involved, there is also carelessness and many times recklessness, many of us are in danger because of these speeders.

As a matter of information, the following are speed limits published from Base Traffic Regulations (BO P5560.2C):

--10 MPH while passing a horse and rider.

--10 MPH in any parking area and service lanes in housing and quarters areas.

--15 MPH while passing military formations.

--25 MPH on any secondary (unpaved) road not otherwise posted.

--25 MPH in any industrial, residence or housing area not otherwise posted.

--35 MPH for all school busses transporting one or more children unless posted lower.

--35 MPH on selected arterials through or within industrial, residence or housing areas but only where posted.

--45 MPH while towing a trailer or semi-trailer unless posted lower.

--45 MPH while towing, drawing, or pushing another vehicle unless posted lower.

--55 MPH on all other roads unless posted lower.

In addition to the Base speed limits, we should not forget the limits on Highway 24 which is 45 MPH when travelling toward Jacksonville and 55 MPH when coming toward Camp Lejeune.

Military Police cite all speed violations noticed. Traffic monitors report such violations. Officers and Staff NCO's should report speeders, and everybody has the duty to bring such speeding violations to the attention of the proper authority.



March, April and May are considered to be the most dangerous months for forest fires on the Camp Lejeune reservation.

Most of the fires are caused by carelessness on the part of individuals who discard lighted cigarettes and ashes out of car windows. Some are caused during live-fire exercises.

In 1966 these fires destroyed 185 acres, while in 1965 one fire alone destroyed 604 acres and another burned 530 acres. So far this year fires have destroyed 72 acres.

Such is the case in rich America but inside no matter how white and clean things are, it still hurts to be sick - sometimes so sick that you cannot be cured. The only way to change this situation is through research and rehabilitation, and research costs money. A good portion of this money comes from your donations.

Thank God we don't spend more time in hospitals visiting a friend or loved ones. But when we leave the hospital from such a visit we sometimes leave much of our compassion. It might be beneficial to have the fund drive keymen dress as doctor's and put out a few open bottles of antiseptic to create a more compassionate atmosphere.

If you are a victim you cannot forget. This is your chance to make an investment in a healthier future. It is a good reason to give.

The program is designed to enable military personnel to complete high school in their off-duty hours and obtain and accredited Adult High School Diploma.

Prospective students desiring to enroll for the first time must have taken the United States Armed Forces Institute High School General Educational Development Test or be scheduled to take the test prior to registration.

The third term will officially begin on Monday, March 20, and will continue for 8 weeks, ending on May 16.

Prospective students may register on March 15, 16, 17, and 20 at the Base Education Office, Bldg. 19, from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.

The full cost of tuition is \$24, but the Marine Corps will pay three quarters of the fee for eligible military personnel. Tuition fees must be paid during registration.

The courses offered include English, Algebra, Business Law, American History, and Biology.

The Base Legal Assistance Office provides counseling in all legal matters for Marines and their dependents. The office is located in Building 203, Hadnot Point.



Military Police 7-5151

Military Policemen patrol the Base and Dependent Housing areas to provide security. In these areas they respond to



emergency assistance calls, day or night; investigate complaints; control and assist visitors; handle domestic disturbances, firearm registration, vehicle registration and pet control; and have MPs stationed at Geiger-Knox Trailer Parks, Tarawa Terrace and Midway Park on a 24-hour basis. A call is all that is necessary for assistance from the Military Police.

Staff Duty Officer 7-5635

The Staff Duty Officer is the Commanding General's representative during non-working hours and is prepared to handle

any situation not covered by other agencies. He will provide assistance or put you in touch with the appropriate agency.

Navy Relief— 7-5584

Many Marines at Camp Lejeune have at one time or another needed help for which there seemed no place to turn, simply because they did not know about Navy Relief.

Camp Lejeune's Navy Relief Society provides assistance in financial cases in accordance with basic family needs, pending receipt of government benefits.



It provides for non-recurring emergencies out of the range of normal income, such as hospital and medical bills of dependents, funeral expenses for dependents, emergency transportation, and special medical and dental needs.

The Society provides Registered Nurse service which includes home visits to mothers

of new born infants; followup visits on patients confined to bed under medical direction, and pre-natal courses for expectant mothers. Well Baby Clinics are provided at Camp Geiger and Knox Trailer Parks.

Navy Relief also provides information on local welfare agencies; referrals to other related organizations; budget counselling; home condition reports on dependents and next of kin to alleviate anxiety; consultations; stop-gap emergency aid to dependents of deployed personnel until such time as permission is given by servicemen for a loan; college loan assistance; and distribution of children's toys on basis of need. A phone call is all that is required. Navy Relief is ready to help.

Chaplains

The Chaplains at Camp Lejeune, in addition to leading you in Divine Worship, can help you or your family in many other ways. They arrange for religious instruction through which you may receive individual or group training in all phases of religion. Counsel you to seek solutions to problems of all

kinds having to do with your personal or military life, your marriage, your family, or problems at home. They guide you spiritually toward the development of sound value judgement, a deepened devotional life and high goals. Call on them in your hour of need. 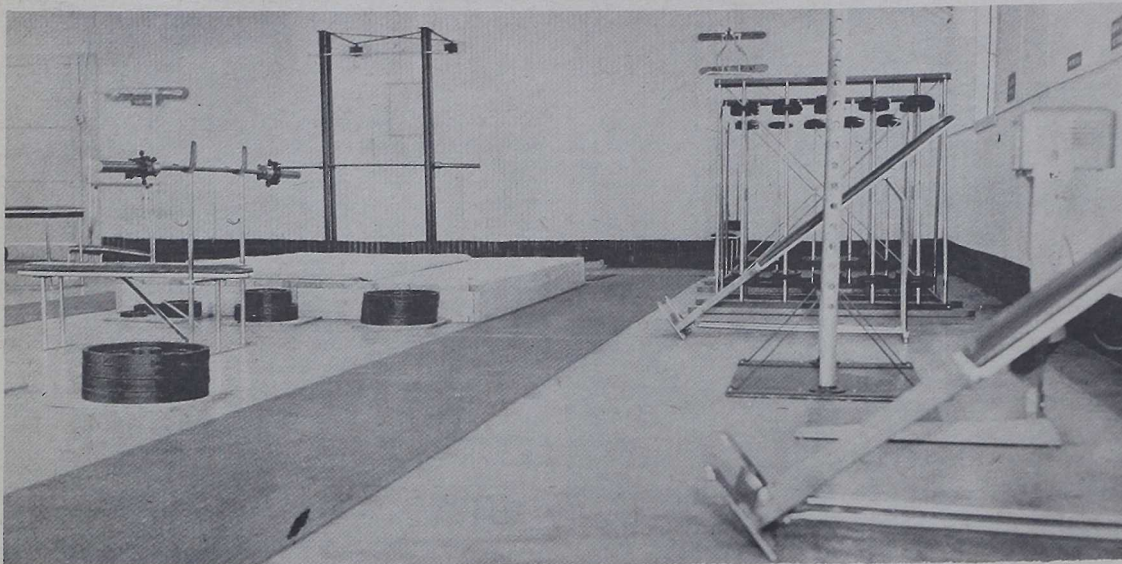
Good Or Best

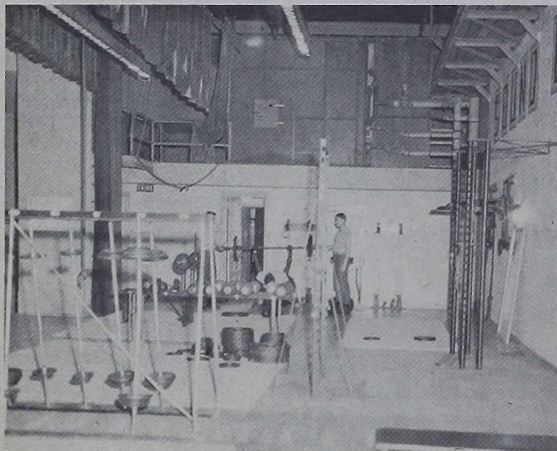

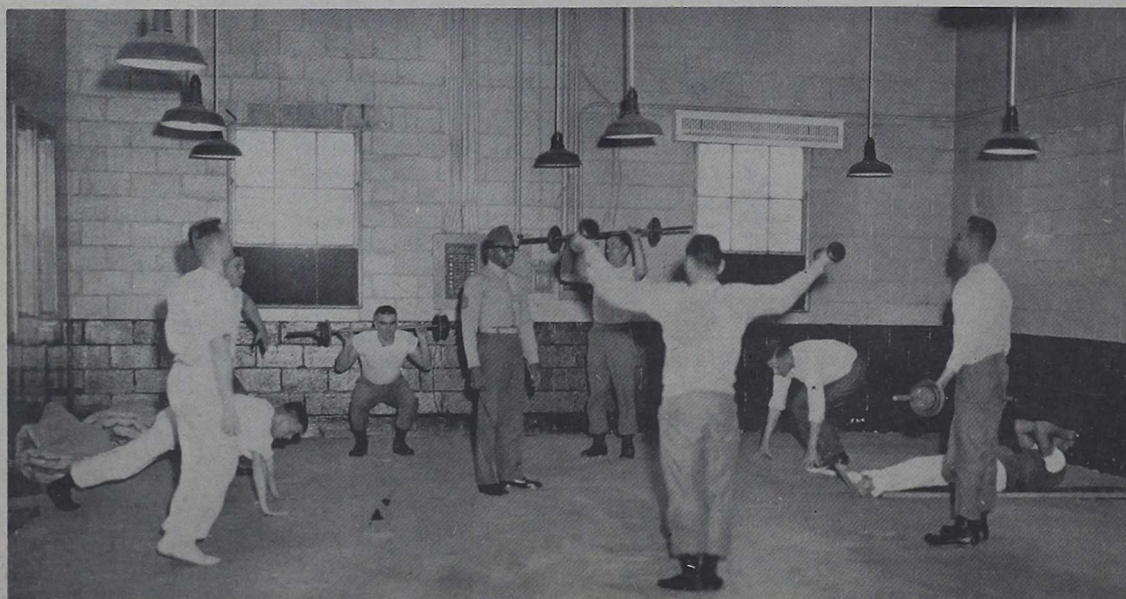

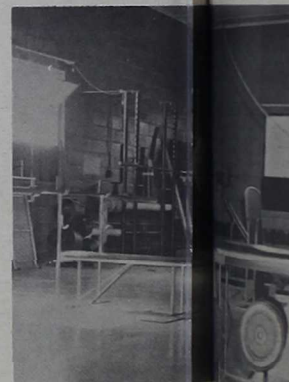
Staff Sergeant Snell, in uniform, supervises resistance type Circuit Interval Training.

Five Physical Fitness Centers are available to Marines, students, and retired personnel at Camp Lejeune. The centers are located in the Area One Area Five Gym; Building in the Industrial Area; Courthouse Bay Gym; and Building 822, Camp Geiger. 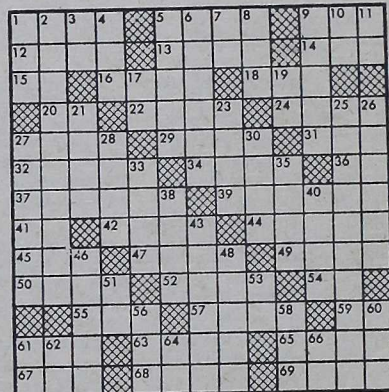

Second Division BLT 3/8 In Italy For Ten Days

WITH THE U.S. SIXTH FLEET IN THE MEDITERRANEAN (DE-LAYED)—Naples, the second largest port and the third largest city of Italy, was the latest port-of-call for Marines of Battalion Landing Team 3-8, commanded by Lieutenant Colonel Robert L. Nichols.

The ten day stay in this locale of scenic beauty and great historical interest was the third visit for most of the Marines and sailors since leaving the States in November, 1966.

Naples, occupying one of the most magnificent sites in all of the Mediterranean was first seen in mid-November when the BLT pulled into the beautiful harbor for minor repairs, then again during the Christmas and New Year holidays and finally from Jan. 18 to 28.

Tours proved to be an effective means of getting to know the Italian people, their language, culture and historical background. Marines and sailors left daily for such places as the city of Pompeii, the islands of Capri and Ischia, Mount Vesuvius and "The Eternal City," Rome.

Rome seemed to be the most popular area for the Marines. The tours consisted of three or four days revealing religious Rome (The Vatican and historic churches), ancient Rome (the ruins and museums) and the tourist's Rome (Shopping, eating and having a generally wonderful time.)

Some of the sights seen while in Rome where the Coliseum, the Pantheon, the Appian Way, the Catacombs and St. Peter's Basilica at Vatican City.

Another tour, which lasted only one day, took the Marines sight-

seeing to Pompeii. Pompeii is the ancient city buried by the volcanic eruption of Mount Vesuvius in 79 A.D. Not only does Pompeii hold cultural value to Italy but historical value as well.

After leaving Pompeii, the tour heads for Mount Vesuvius where steam can still be seen rising from the 600 feet deep crater.

Some Marines visited churches, chapels, the palaces of Kings and the famous San Carlo Opera House. This opera house is where Enrico Caruso made his first public singing engagement.

The would-be photographers found that the Castel Nuovo, or the new castle, which is built on a miniature island in the bay of Naples presented a beautiful shot not only of the castle, but of the surrounding areas of Naples as well.

For the shoppers, the glass-enclosed Galleria, filled with shops was found to have the best bargains in cameos, silks, gloves, bags, ceramics and portrait paintings.

Some Marines decided to take their own tours by purchasing tickets on a ferry to the islands of Capri and Ischia. They found much of the natural and rugged beauty of Italy hidden away on these islands.

Finally, the day came when BLT 3-8 left Naples. Friends had been made, historical sites had been seen and some of the Italian culture had been absorbed. It seemed very strange leaving this time as they had several other times. They knew that this would be the last time most of them would ever return to Naples.

As training officer for 3d Battalion, 6th Marines, Capt. Estlick was deployed with his unit to the Caribbean for three months.

Capt. Estlick has been replaced by another British Royal Marine, Captain David V. Child, Capt. Child will serve as training officer for 2d Battalion, 6th Marines.

Pet Innoculations Slated At Lejeune Housing Areas

The annual animal rabies vaccination program for pets will be in effect March 13 through March 18. Any licensed veterinarian may give the necessary immunization, but for the convenience of pet owners, arrangements have been made for a veterinarian to be at the following locations:

Knox Trailer Park, Bldg. D-38, 1-3 p.m., March 13;
Midway Park Fire Station, 1-3 p.m., March 14;
Geiger Trailer Park, (Community Center), 1-3 p.m., March 15;
Marston Pavilion, 1-3 p.m., March 16;
Tarawa Terrace, Bldg. TT-38, 1-3 p.m., March 17-18.

Dogs do not require immunization against rabies until they have reached the age of six months; cats and other mammalian pets do not require the immunization until they reach the age of four months.

All owners of dogs, cats, and other pets specifically authorized by the Commanding General will register or re-register their

pets during March 13-18 at the Provost Marshal's office or at the established vaccination stations where the Provost Marshal will maintain a registration clerk during the hours each station is in operation.

A certificate of rabies immunization dated after January 1, 1967 or the green tag issued incident thereto must be presented at the time of registration, except for those dogs vaccinated in 1965 or 1966 with chick-embryo vaccine which is good for three years. These tags are blue and red respectively and will be accepted as evidence of immunization. Cats and other mammalian pets must be vaccinated annually.

The quarterly pet quarantine will be in effect March 13-17, inclusive. During this period, all pets must be kept within quarters or on a positive leash between 8 a.m. - 5 p.m. daily.

The cost of inoculations given at the above listed locations will be \$2.00.
