# Boards Select 269 Officers

A Warrant Officer Selection Board adjourned following approval of its recommendations by the Commandant of the Marine Corps.

A total of 214 Marines were selected for warrant officer, 201 of which are regulars; one, a Woman Marine (regular); and 12, reservists. More than 2200 Marines, including regulars, Women Marines, and reservists were nominated for consideration.

## Col. McLean Earns Joint Service Medal

Outstanding performance of duty while serving as the Senior Marine Advisor, Navy Section, Military Assistance-Advisory Group (MAAG), Republic of China, has earned a Joint Service Commendation Medal for Col. Bernard W. McLean, Headquarters, 2d Marine Division.

The Medal, and accompanying citation, were presented by Maj. Gen. William J. Van Ryzin, Commanding General, 2d Marine Division, and witnessed by the colonel's wife, Mary Jo, during an informal ceremony Dec. 16 in the general's office here.

Colonel McLean, a veteran of 23 years Marine Corps service, served with the MAAG in China from May 1962 until May 1964.

According to the citation ".... his tireless and ceaseless efforts contributed materially to the professional proficiency of the Chinese Marine Corps .....", and "....his persistent effort and exemplary leadership materially increased the mutual understanding and ef-

fects closer coordination between the Chinese Marine Corps and other elements of the Chinese Armed Forces."

The citation further praised the colonel's leadership, judgment and devotion to duty as being "....of unlimited value to the Chinese Marine Corps...." and added "....his distinguished performance of duty throughout this period represents outstanding achievement and reflects the utmost credit upon himself and the military service."

This was Col. McLean's fourth tour of duty in the Far East since joining the Marine Corps in 1941. He was in China from Jan. 1946 until Jan. 1948, when he served as a staff officer with the 1st Marine Division.

His other trips to the Orient included assignments in Korea, from Aug. 1951 until May 1952, and Japan, from June 1958 until Oct. 1959.

Colonel McLean joined the 2d Marine Division in July 1964.

## Tips For Qtrs. Occupant Going On Holiday Leave

Base Maintenance has submitted some good leave tips to insure that you have a house to return to, and that everything is in good shape when you get back.

All these apply to Marines living in government housing, and many of them are good ideas for Marines living in town.

Occupants of housing at Paradise Point, Capehart or Tarawa Terrace should:

1. Call Base Maintenance and tell them when you are leaving and when you will return.
2. Turn the thermostat on your heater to 60 degrees or lower.
3. Turn off all lights, radios, and unplug your TV, electric heater, irons, etc.
4. Make sure all the water taps are turned off completely.
5. Go through the refrigerator and discard everything that might spoil.
6. Put out the trash and bag it.
7. Have a good neighbor in once in a while and see everything is okay.

Occupants of Midway, Knox or Geiger Trailer should follow the above checklist, with one exception. In these quarters the heater should be turned all the way off. If the weather is extremely cold your water may have to be turned off by Maintenance to prevent freezing. If this should happen, Base Maintenance between a. m. and 11 p. m. and it will be turned back on. Maintenance will also do periodic checks while you are on leave to see that nothing has gone wrong.

# MC 'Circuit Training' Tests Viewed By Top Officials

PARRIS ISLAND, S. C.—“Circuit Training,” a pilot “scientific” physical development program under study by the Marine Corps, has attracted top civilian members of the President’s Council on Physical Fitness.

A group, headed by Mr. Bob Stewart, Administrator for the Council, was on hand December 17-18 to observe the initial testing phase by two platoons of recruits Battalion here.

Accompanying Mr. Stewart were Bob McNamara, representing the Office of the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Public Affairs and Professor Arne Olson of Temple University, Coordinator for development of physical training in Job Corps and Major George E. Ott, Marine Corps Physical Fitness Officer from Headquarters, Marine Corps.

Circuit Training, which aroused interest at Headquarters Marine Corps more than a year ago, has been used extensively for some time in the British and Belgian military forces.

It was originally pioneered at the University of Leeds, England about ten years ago.

It has three major characteristics: It improves both muscular and circulo-respiratory fitness; applies the principle of progressive resistance and enables large numbers of performers to train at the same time, each according to his individual capacity.

Another very important factor is that the system effects a maximum workout in a relatively short period of time.

Platoons 3004 and 2005, Third RTB here are circuit training test units. The other platoons of the series, Platoons 3006 and 3007, will continue the normal physical training syllabus. At the end of the controlled exercise period a valid comparison of the two methods can be made when the whole series of four platoons is evaluated at the conclusion of recruit training.

The series is now in the 9th day of training here.

A Circuit Training area has been constructed in the 3rd Battalion physical conditioning area and includes 12 stations for exercise.

The exercises vary from

weights, isometric racks, pull-up bars, parallel bars, logs, selected apparatus and body resistance devices.

The test platoons are divided into several six-man teams with a team leader. They are first given a three minute warm-up, and are then run through the circuit within 12 minutes. Following this, they execute a 12 minute run, bringing the total exercising time to 27 minutes.

The distance between stations within the circuit is 50 yards. Units exercise for 40 seconds at each station and are allowed 20 seconds to begin the next exercise at the next station.

Each station has three “stress” levels. When a team has reached peak efficiency at the lowest level of body stress, the level is raised.

The overall area for exercising using the Circuit Training method is 280’X445’ with the 12 stations laid out in an “inner and outer circle”.

Half the teams approach the outer circle stations in a clockwise manner, the other half exercise counterclockwise in the inner circle. The process is reversed when the cycle is completed.

This, primarily, is why a great number of performers can exercise at the same time.

Scientific study of the Circuit Training methods has revealed that practically every muscle in the body is exercised when using this method.

While the Circuit Training method of physical conditioning has vast potential in both military and civilian programs, the Marine Corps has confined its interest generally to its potential for improving the combat conditioning of Marines, and of its time-saving aspects to permit more time for other training essentials.


CROSSWORD PUZZLE

# A STORY OF

St. Peter and Paul

As one enters the Catholic and Protestant chapels here at Camp Lejeune, he is caught up in the splendor and beauty of the magnificent stained-glass windows, which rest peacefully in the church walls.

These thousands of pieces of colored glass, fused together by strips of lead, form a picture for us. Whether the windows are Romanesque, Gothic, Renaissance or Modern they tell us of the early days of the church, by depicting certain individuals or by showing us a certain symbolism.

The Saint Francis Xavier Catholic Chapel, was dedicated on Jan. 27, 1943 by the Most Reverent Eugene J. McGuiness, Bishop of Raleigh, to the memory of the first chaplain and the first Catholic chaplain to die in World War II — Father Aloysius Schmitt of Debuque, Iowa.

While Commanding General of Camp Lejeune, Major General John Marston put forth his efforts to idealize forever in the hearts of all future members of the Corps, a memorial true to the cause under which we all serve — "Our God and our Country".

There are twelve windows in the Catholic chap-

el. The first is that of St. Peter and Paul, which is dedicated to all the men of the Fleet Marine Force, Pacific. Next is St. Gabriel and St. Michael, dedicated to the men of the Third Amphibious Corps.

As we gaze farther down the left side of the church we see the windows of Saints Francis Xavier and Ignatius of Loyola, Sts. John of God and Isaac Jogues, St. Patrick and St. Maurice, and St. Louis and St. Martin, dedicated to the men of the Third, Fifth, Fourth and First Marine Divisions respectively.


On the right side of the chapel is housed the windows of St. Joan of Arc and St. John Capistrano; Saints George and Hadrian, St. Longinus and St. Sebastian and St. Christopher and St. Venantius. These windows were dedicated to all personnel of Camp Lejeune, the men of the Second Marine Division, Fifth Amphibious Corps and the Sixth Marine Division.

The remaining two windows, St. Joseph and St. Camillus de Lellis, and that of St. Terese of Lixieux and St. Brendan are dedicated to all Naval Personnel and to Defense and Anti-aircraft artillery.

# WITHIN GLASS

was erected in 1942 and was finally dedicated for divine services on Jan. 27, 1943. The windows located in the front and rear of the church, were designed by the famous William Burnham, whose other works can be seen at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine, New York City, and Saints Peter and Paul, Washington, D. C.

The aisle windows are largely the result of the warm interest shown by Major General John Marston, Base Commander. The general proposed that they be set as memorials to the Marines who had fought and died in World War II. The cost of the windows was contributed by six wartime Marine Divisions, and were designed by Kathrine S. Lamb.

There are 12 windows in all. Ten of the windows depict the 10 archangels, Haniel, Revealer of God's Grace; Japhkiel, Guardian of Virtue; Chamael, Messenger of God's Wrath; Raphael, Guardian of Health; Michael, Conqueror of Evil; Gabriel, Herald of God; Uriel, Revealer of God's Will; Zadkiel, Bringer of Justice; and Jophiel, Revealer of God's Glory and Victory. There are but nine Archangels, so "Victory" was created for the

series as the personification of the victory which overcomes the world.

Pictured under these windows are the different battles in Marine Corps history, beginning with the organization of the Corps and ending with Marine Corps landing in the Pacific Theater.

The two remaining windows house the figure of Christ. Above the altar He is shown with arms outstretched saying "Go ye therefore into all worlds, for I am with you always." The picture in the rear of the church depicts Christ with the 12 apostles.

Besides the six wartime Marine Divisions honored in glass, there is also dedications to the Third and Fifth Amphibious Corps, all personnel of Camp Lejeune who served in World War II, and all officers and men of the Fleet Marine Force, Pacific, not included in the other units here remembered by name.

It is said that the glory of a church window lies in its life and movement in light. Let's all stop for a moment during these joyous holy holidays to remember not only all those who died for freedom's sake, but to remember to open the windows to our hearts and renew our faith in God as well.





# Lejeune To Fight In N. C. AAU's

## Locals Win In Lopsided Ring Verdict At Lorton

Fresh from a victory over the Lorton Youth Center last Sunday, the Camp Lejeune Boxing Team will be traveling to Greensboro, N. C. over the holidays to participate in the 1st Annual American Legion Amateur Athletic Union (AAU) Boxing Tournament. This is the first time in 16 years that boxing has been held in the Greensboro Coliseum.

The matches, set for Jan. 4, 5, and 6, will be the first AAU Boxing meet scheduled for 1965.

There will be approximately forty trophies up for grabs as the Lejeune scrappers will be pitting their skills against some of the best young talent in North Carolina.

The Devildogs unleashed a fierce offensive Sunday as they downed Lorton 6-2 in their initial boxing matches of the season.

All eight pugilists under fire from the rough Youth Center team handled themselves exceptionally well, winning four matches by technical knockouts (TKO's), one by a knockout and one by a split decision.

Doug Norton, Lejeune's novice heavyweight didn't get a chance to put his newly acquired skills on the line, as Lorton didn't have a "big boy" ready.

In the opening event, Don Reid, D'Dog's 132 pound puncher caught Walter Hinton of Lorton early in the second round as referee Norva Lee, 1952 Olympic Light-Heavyweight champion over Ingemar Johannsen, stopped the bout giving Reid a decision by a TKO.

William "Mouse" Mercedos. Our current North Carolina AAU 112 pound champion, fighting at 119, stopped Howard Williams early in the second round for the Marines second TKO of the afternoon. The little powerhouse gnawed his way through Williams' defense, scoring repeatedly with tale-telling combinations to the head and body.

Marshall Fortune, Jr., scored Camp Lejeune's third straight victory, as he registered a TKO over Jerry White. Fortune, a hard-punching 139 pounder, put the match on ice as he landed a beautiful right to the body.


Lorton salvaged the first of their two victories as David Jennifer won a unanimous decision over Lejeune's Charles Perry. The first round was even with each scoring on good combinations, but as the second round started Jennifer caught Perry with a ferocious right to the head, that brought the fans to their feet. Unable to follow up his advantage however, Perry began slipping punches.

In the last round Perry was tagged with three left jabs, as the Youth Center's 156 pounder brought the slate to 1-3. Art Redden, playfully dubbed the "Golden Hog", scored the only knockout of the afternoon, as he dropped Earl Boxley in 1:52 of the first round.

Upon entering the ring Redden, currently All-Marine 165 pound champion and Interservice 178 pound titleholder sized up his opponent who was slightly taller and heavier than he.

It didn't take long to find a weakness, as Redden caught the burly Lorton man with a series of punches to the midsection. Boxley, dropping his guard ever so slightly, was greeted by an Art Redden haymaker, as the 178 lb. kingpin put him away with a straight right to the jaw.

With the gymnasium reaching the point of near pandemonium following the knockout, Box Lozada, All-Marine Featherweight champion entered the "den of destruction". Nine min-

The afternoon's finale pitted Marine Francis Hutchinson against Arondo Veney in the duel of the light middleweights. "Hutch" found the going rough upstairs throughout most of the first round. As the second round got underway he began working on the midsection of Veney.

Hitting with the authority of the big boys, the hard-hitting 156 pounder, knocked the mouthpiece from Veney's now vulnerable mouth. Pinned against the ropes, Hutchinson pounded his adversary senseless.

Late in the third round Veney's mouthpiece was again jarred loose. This time referee Lee stopped the bout.

Mr. Lee, long retired from the ring, is the principal of the Youth Center.

With the seasons opener under their belt the Devildogs coached by GySgt. Ray Rogers and trained by Sgt. Al "Rocky" Santiago, will be looking forward to the upcoming AAU's.



## Hydro Amphib Delivered To Corps

A new turbine-powered hydrofoil amphibian vehicle specifically designed to provide improved performance during amphibious assault operations, has been delivered to the U. S. Marine Corps.

The vehicle, which is capable of operating over land on wheels or through the water on the hull or hydrofoils, has been designated as the LVHX-1 or Landing Force Amphibious Support Vehicle, Hydrofoil.

Designed to operate from a "mother" ship 50 miles off shore to inland logistic support areas, the LVHX-1 can "fly" through rough seas with waves up to five feet at up to 35 knots, boat in conventional fashion at up to 12 knots, or drive over land at speeds up to 40 mph, all with 10,000 pounds of payload.

Two large hydrofoils--one front and one rear--raise the vehicle approximately 30 inches above the water. The struts and foils retract into the hull for boating through the surf zone and for driving on land.

## Dec. AmTrac Graduates Unique At Camp Lejeune

A unique type of amphibious tractor crewman came into existence on the east coast for the first time this month when a 26 man class graduated from the first LVTE-1 (Landing Vehicle Tracked, Engineer) school at Courthouse Bay.

The vehicle is an amphibious assault mine clearance tractor which is designed to shoot a line charge with explosive across an area in which land mines are embedded. When this line charge goes off it detonates the majority of the mines.

To make sure that there are no mines within a certain area the tractor then drops the plow shaped blade attached to the front of the vehicle. The teeth and wings on the blade then clear a path 12 feet wide.


The platoon leader of this group is 1stLt. T. S. Rogers. His assistant is Platoon Sergeant SSgt. Dayton D. Drew.

**FRUIT CAKE COOKIES**

4 cups sifted all-purpose flour  
 1 tsp. soda  
 1 tsp. salt  
 1 cup shortening  
 2 cups brown sugar, firmly packed  
 2 eggs  
 2/3 cup buttermilk  
 1 cup chopped pecans  
 1 cup candied cherries, quartered  
 1 cup candied fruits from package  
 Cherries and nuts for decorations

Sift together flour, soda, salt, Cream shortening and sugar until fluffy and light. Beat in eggs, one at a time. Add buttermilk, flour alternately into batter; stir in nuts, cherries, dates and candied fruits. Chill dough. Drop by teaspoons about 2" apart on lightly greased baking sheet. Top each cookie with cherry or nut. Bake in 375 degree oven 8 to 10 minutes. Makes 8 dozen cookies.


