

Division promotes Belgian officer, celebrates continued partnership

Xavier Deroanne, a Belgian Army capitaine-commandant assigned to the 3rd Infantry Division, was promoted to the rank of major during a ceremony Jan. 4, 2021, on Fort Stewart, Georgia. The event is an example of the continued partnership between the US and Belgian Army.

Deroanne and his family moved from Bastogne, Belgium, in June 2021 to the United States as part of the Army's Military Personnel Exchange Program, or MPEP.

"I am grateful to have the opportunity to work with the most powerful army in the world," Deroanne said. "It is a great honor."

The MPEP program is a two-year long program designed to strengthen the bonds of friendship, understanding and cooperation between countries and their respective military organizations.

The MPEP program allows foreign officers like Deroanne to serve in the US and to experience the US Army's customs and courtesies, missions, and daily operations.

"He's a great infantry leader, trainer, and planner," said French Brig. Gen. Jean-Pierre Fague, 3rd ID Deputy Commanding General for Readiness and Plans, who also serves with the Division as part of the MPEP program. "I encourage all who come across him to just spend five minutes to get to see through his perspective."

This unique promotion ceremony included Fague placing the new rank of major on Deroanne amongst flags of all three nations. The Belgian Army rank of major is the equivalent of a senior, post-key developmental major in the U.S. Army. Fague spoke to the ceremony attendees about Deroanne's numerous contributions to the Marne Division as well as the value of learning from the wide-ranging experiences of others on staff.

As a future operations officer (G3/G35 Planner), Deroanne helps create plans and pathways to strengthen military forces.

"Xavier is a critical part of the G3 Team and the wider division staff," said Col. Alexis "Pancho" Perez-Cruz, the 3rd ID operations officer. "He not only provides unique and valuable insights based on his perspective as a European ally, having already served as an operations officer, he brings another level of experience to the team that enables us all to better serve our brigades and battalions. He is a stellar example of both the Belgian Army and a Dogface Soldier."

Belgium is one of the most active US allies in terms of force contributions to overseas operations. Belgium contributed to the Resolute Support Mission, deployed forces in support of the Defeat-ISIS coalition, enhanced Forward Presence (eFP), Baltic Air Policing, and the UN Mission in Mali.

Belgium is a key provider of humanitarian, reconstruction, and development assistance to Iraq, and Syria,

as well as many countries in Africa. As the host country of the EU and NATO headquarters, Belgium plays an important role in European and Transatlantic diplomacy.

As part of his job within the G3 section, Deroanne helps lead the division's response to COVID-19 and maintains continued readiness safely despite the challenges the pandemic has brought.

Deroanne said that since arriving at Fort Stewart, his most interesting experience has been working with the division during a warfighter exercise.

A warfighter exercise is a major training exercise that provides complex scenarios with combat and battlefield effects, stimulating service members to respond, then work through the consequences of those decisions.

"His contributions to the recent warfighter exercise supporting V Corps helped us enable the newest Army corps headquarters to assume responsibilities in Europe," Perez-Cruz said.

Deroanne said he has truly enjoyed his time within the division so far, and that he and his family have found Coastal Georgia to be a welcoming community.

"It's a great professional and familial opportunity," Deroanne said. "Coming from Bastogne where the American Army is a legend, this has been an amazing learning experience and it's also a great opportunity for my children's future."

After two years with 3rd ID, Deroanne will return to Belgium and continue his service there.

"I feel very happy because the selection for promotion is difficult," Deroanne said. "My files were analyzed by different generals and the Minister of Defense and the final decision for my promotion was made by the Belgian King (Philippe de Belgique)."

Following the promotion ceremony, Maj. Jefferson Kent, a G35 Plans officer who works alongside Deroanne, gave a few comments about his time working with the Belgian officer.

"Deroanne is an inspiration, moving his family across the world, being one of our only Soldiers in a completely different uniform, tackling all those unique challenges while being a critical part of the team at work, and engaged father and husband," Kent said. "The same determination he has for his family trickles down to how he approaches the team and his work. He reminds us who we are fighting for and why we do it, it's his character, he's just a natural born leader."

Dogface Soldier among those inducted into Pentagon's Hall of Heroes

WASHINGTON — Three Soldiers whose acts of bravery spanned over 12 years were inducted into the Pentagon's Hall of Heroes in a ceremony Friday.

The Defense Department and the Army honored Medal of Honor recipients Sgt. 1st Class Christopher Celiz, an Army Ranger, Sgt. 1st Class Alwyn Cashe, an infantry platoon sergeant, and Master Sgt. Earl Plumlee, a Green Beret, at Conmy Hall, Joint Base Myer-Henderson Hall, Virginia.

Secretary of the Army Christine E. Wormuth lauded the recipients for their dedication to their comrades and families. On Thursday, Cashe and Celiz were posthumously awarded the Medal of Honor and Plumlee accepted the award from President Joe Biden at the White House.

"Each of these incredible Soldiers and their families that we honor today, while from different parts of the country, different walks of life, and different religious faiths, represent what is best about our Army," Wormuth said. "The common thread that binds them is the love of their teammates and their love for their families."

"We will strive every day to live up to their legacy," said Army Chief of Staff, Gen. James C. McConville.

Celiz's acts of bravery had spread throughout his unit long before a fateful summer day in July 2018. Celiz had been deployed to Afghanistan as a leader of a special operations unit comprised of American and ally forces.

News of Celiz's exploits had even reached then-Army Vice Chief of Staff McConville, whose son had served as a medical evacuation helicopter pilot in Afghanistan at the same time as Celiz's final deployment there.

"He told me that many times, Chris put his life in jeopardy for his fellow Soldiers," McConville said during the

ceremony. "And for those crews, acts of bravery like this are heroic to us [but] routine for Chris."

On July 12, 2018, insurgents attacked Celiz's unit near Paktia Province, Afghanistan. After enemy gunfire wounded an ally, Celiz repeatedly put himself in harm's way and used his body as a shield against enemy machine gun rounds until his team could carry the ally to safety. Celiz would later die of his injuries.

Celiz's wife, Katie, took the stage to receive the Medal of Honor flag. Katie Celiz expressed her thanks to the Army Ranger community who helped care for Chris's daughter, Shannon.

"In a way Chris thought of his Soldiers as his own children," Katie said. "And he sincerely wanted to see them not only succeed in the Army, but to succeed in life. He pushed them, he encouraged them, he listened to them, and he always did his personal best to lead by example."

Cashe, a former drill sergeant, dedicated his career to caring for and mentoring his Soldiers. His concern for their well-being led to Cashe's heroic acts on Oct. 17, 2005, while deployed to Samarra, Iraq. When the Bradley vehicle Cashe commanded rolled over an improvised explosive device, it ignited into flames.

While suffering burns to 72% of his body, Cashe went into the burning vehicle again and again, until he had rescued six of his Soldiers.

"Sergeant Cashe took care of his Soldiers both on and off the battlefield," McConville said. "He knew their families. And I believe that's why Sergeant Cashe didn't hesitate to act in the face of enemy fire."

The nation's first African-American Secretary of Defense, Lloyd J. Austin, noted the historic moment for Cashe, who became the first African-American recipient of the award since the Vietnam War. Austin also spoke of the respect Cashe's troops had for the Soldier, from his teammates in Iraq, to his recruits at Fort Benning, Georgia.

"Looking back on his career I'm struck by all the times that he put himself last: In the barracks being the last to sleep because he was checking on his men; after the blast demanding that he be the last Soldier to be evacuated; and in the hospital insisting that he be tended to last," Austin said.

"Above all, he took great pride in taking care of his Soldiers," Austin added.

Cashe's wife Tamara, daughter, Alexis, and sister, Kasinal Cashe-White, waited more than 16 years for their loved one to be awarded the medal. Cashe's sister credited the 3rd Infantry Division and Lt. Gen. Gary Brito for leading the push for Cashe's nomination. Tamara and Cashe-White accepted the Medal of Honor flag.

"For a while there it looked like we wouldn't [get the medal awarded]" Cashe-White said. "But we did. I thank all of you who have helped in the journey [and] in the struggle. When you think of my brother ... think of him as a Soldier who loved 'his boys,' who died showing how much he loved his boys. He was a Soldier first."

McConville commanded the 101st Airborne Division at the time that Plumlee risked his life for fellow Soldiers against invading insurgents in August 2013. McConville visited Ghazni Province, Afghanistan, to meet with Plumlee shortly after the attack, where enemy forces broke into a U.S. forward operating base. Plumlee engaged multiple insurgents armed with suicide vests and repeatedly risked his life alongside his Special Forces teammates.

"What I saw there was extraordinary warriors who fought against overwhelming odds," McConville said of Plumlee and Special Forces Soldiers. "They defeated an enemy that could have killed hundreds of Soldiers and would have had strategic consequences for both the United States and our allies and partners."

After insurgents tore open a wall of a U.S. forward operating base in Ghazni, Plumlee and other U.S. Soldiers raced toward the breach. Armed with only a machine gun and pistol, Plumlee attacked the enemy forces several times and eventually led a successful counterattack with U.S. and Polish Soldiers.

Austin lauded Plumlee for deferring credit to his teammates.

"Plumlee is a humble guy," Austin said. "He's never wanted to be singled out for his heroism. And he's quick to remind people that it's not about him, it's about the team."

An experienced Soldier with multiple deployments under his belt, Wormuth also praised Plumlee's family: his wife, Terry, and his children, Lillian and Lincoln, for enduring times of separation.

Plumlee thanked the Cashe and Celiz families for sharing the spotlight with him as well as Austin and the Army's senior leaders.

"You've honored me today," Plumlee said after his induction. "I look forward to honoring you with my continued service."

Face masks required in on-post facilities

Service members are also required to wear a mask inside off-post public buildings/ facilities (i.e. barber shops, religious services, grocery stores, etc.). Vehicle parking safety reminder

Changes to speeding violations issued

The commanding general recently authorized the Fort Stewart Military Police to issue DD Form 1408 for traffic violations when a Soldier is pulled over for speeding 10mph or over above the speed limit. The DD 1408 is effectively a military speeding ticket that allows a Soldier's brigade commander to issue administrative reprimands, non-judicial punishment, suspension of on post driving privileges, corrective training, and/or other appropriate remedial measures. 

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Getting to know Col. Kevin Lambert

Q: What inspired you to join the Army?

Lambert: I'm not sure that I was inspired to join the Army, it was much more of a calling. My dad joined the Army when he was 17 years old. He went to Vietnam, got married, started having kids young, and ended up staying in the Army for 25 years. By the time I graduated high school, he was an Infantry Major stationed at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas. Although joining the Army was a natural fit, I never intended on staying in almost 30 years.

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Maximum mission: Awareness in-transit

CAMP ROBERTS, Calif.— Mounted armored vehicles such as the Bradley have long been used as heavy weapons platforms with long range sensors to hunt targets and provide armored transportation to dismounted Soldiers. However once onboard the vehicle, Soldiers lost visibility of what is happening around them, leaving them ill-prepared to anticipate the changing battlespace upon dismount.

In effort to provide situational awareness while Soldiers are in transport, a cross-enterprise Army team is working to incorporate Integrated Augmentation System (IVAS) technology and sensors into vehicle platforms for optimal battlefield visibility at every stage of the mission. The goggle-based IVAS display integrates digital low-light, thermal night vision, and high-resolution waveguide technology to create a mixed reality interface for the dismounted Soldier. Therefore, optimizing the system for Soldiers at every stage of a mission, including transport, is critical to ensuring success in future multi-domain operations.

To maximize the integration of IVAS to the Bradley platform specifically, the Army Platform Integration team, comprised of Program Executive Office (PEO) Soldier, PEO Ground Combat Systems, and Combat Capabilities Development Command (DEVCOM), executed a third Vehicle Excursion (VE3) test event at Camp Roberts, CA in September 2021.

"The goal of platform integration, like the one demonstrated here on the Bradley Infantry Fighting Vehicle, is to not only ensure that Soldiers equipped with IVAS don't lose their enhanced situational awareness while mounted, but to also take advantage of the on-board platform sensors that enable them to see what the combat vehicle sees," said Maj. Shawn Jones, Platform Integration lead under PEO Soldier Project Manager IVAS.

Soldiers from 1st Armored Brigade Combat Team, 2-7 Infantry Battalion, 3rd Infantry Division, came to test the capability and noticed that feeds from the current sensors were more accessible to each Soldier on the platform as they executed Improvised Explosive Device (IED) searches, reconnaissance, and complex attack missions.

"The IVAS augmented reality system integrates communications, thermals, and night vision to enhance our situational awareness and lethality from within the Bradley," Pfc. Benjamin Franke said. "It allows everyone to see what the driver, commander, and gunner are seeing outside, which gets more eyes-on and increases situational awareness immediately for when we dismount."

While Soldiers can receive mission updates such as emerging intelligence, terrain, and target locations while in transport, they also hope to use the physical advantages of the vehicle platform to maximize their effectiveness upon dismount.

"An individual Solider on ground sometimes has limited visibly of the enemy due to an obstructed line of sight," said Sgt. 1st Class Darrell Borgic. "But the Bradley is taller and has better optic capability, so dismounts are able to leverage that to see targets while on the ground and make an informed tactical decision."

"The system lets us get more eyes on our objective so we don't miss anything, which keeps us all safer," added Franke. "Some of the exercises required us to scan for IEDs, so having our dismounts onboard also be able to look for those has actually shown to make a difference in our mission success."

Tech Development

The development of the integrated technology required teammates to reach across lanes of expertise and facilitate the integration of the new modern IVAS with the Bradley. Don Aldea, PM Mounted Armored Vehicles Mechanical and Systems Engineer, and Lead Engineer for IVAS Integration, ensured Bradley and IVAS requirements were communicated and developed across the diverse teams.

"It all started when leadership came and asked, 'When an IVAS-equipped Soldier hops onto a vehicle platform or a Bradley for transport, how do we maintain the connectivity and situational awareness they had on the ground so that combat advantage doesn't stop just because they are now mounted and moving?", Aldea said.

It was a complex problem set with requirements and kit that was not easily compatible, he said, but the team's VE3 user study event was proof of concept that the capability is feasible and operationally delivers increased lethality and survivability. Aldea highlighted some of the main technical features of the system.

"When a Soldier walks into a Bradley wearing IVAS, they can do three main things: SEE, World View, and power up," he said. "We put in interfaces to power and charge their batteries, for SEE we cloned the feeds from the three existing sensors - front DVE [Drivers Vision Enhancer], driver's CIV [Commander's Independent Viewer], and gunner's IBAS [Improved Bradley Acquisition Subsystem] - so the Soldiers can passively view what the Bradley sees through their IVAS HUD [heads up display]. We also integrated radios so we can use all the features of IVAS for a connected mission execution."

Though Aldea is a systems engineer, he is passionate about the operational capability gap that IVAS mounted on a Bradley will address.

"When Soldiers come up to a position where they are getting ready to deploy outside of the vehicle - as of today they are going in mostly dark and blind," Aldea explained. "With this integrated technology, they can get map, mission, and intel updates enroute. They can see what is around them to strategically position the Bradley and then drop the ramp where they are not in direct fire and execute immediately.

"In World View, they can also know where their brother and sister platforms are, so they can work together, cover more ground, and make informed decisions and ad hoc changes on the move all while buttoned up in the Bradley," Aldea added.

Pieces of an Integrated Solution

The DEVCOM night vision lab was also a critical part of the integrated team's work. Dr. Navin Mathur, IVAS Platform Integration Lead Engineer, explained how the increase in networked and visual accessibility delivers an enhanced solution to the problem set.

"Having a networked End-User Device (EUD), like IVAS on a Soldier in the back of a platform like a Bradley or Stryker becomes invaluable, but it is only part of the solution," said Mathur. "Not only does the SEE feature allow entire crews to clear a large area within the safety of the vehicle instead of dismounting and being physically exposed, but the physical limitations of the Soldier and platform are significantly minimized through the additional integration of the Army Black Hornet UAS [unmanned aerial system]. The drone feeds into the IVAS HUD which allows visibility on areas that the platform and the dismount can't physically cover."

Another notable aspect is the delivery and integration of Soldier power into the vehicle platforms.


"The UBC [universal battery charger] integrated on the platform will reduce the need for Soldiers to carry extra CWBs [conformal wearable batteries] while dismounted on the objective and allow for easy resupply of fresh batteries while mounted," Mathur said. "Even if the mission is extended, our Soldiers are still powered to execute."

IVAS is being developed to efficiently deliver relevant mission information and operationally-relevant tools to Soldiers at every stage of mission execution. The integration of the technology with platforms and drones extends the combat advantage of a single dismount beyond physical limitations.

"Together it gives the entire force better situational awareness and allows Soldiers to make more informed decisions before dismounting," said Mathur. "There are no longer gaps in information between mounting, transit, and dismounting, which will increase the survivability and lethality for both the platform and the Soldiers."

The cross-enterprise Platform Integration team plans to conduct a user study with further IVAS integration to Stryker platforms in August 2022.

"This product has the potential to be a force multiplier," said Franke. "It'll help bring more vehicles, crews, and dismounts home alive and I hope to be able to use it as it continues to develop in the future."

Division presents at Georgia Tech Capstone Design Expo

ATLANTA — Soldiers from the 3rd Infantry Division presented at the Georgia Institute of Technology's Spring 2022 Capstone Design Expo as part of an educational partnership agreement with Georgia Tech. Jan. 10, 2022, in Atlanta.

Maj. Patrick Kerins, the 3rd ID Special Operations Integrator, pitched a real-world problem to the students with the hope that they would sign up to work on developing a solution. The problem set Kerins presented involved developing tools and techniques that would assist Soldiers in self-recovery if their armored vehicle became immobilized by terrain.

The students Kerins presented to are beginning a Capstone Design Course at the school. During the course, students work in teams to solve an industry problem, like an armored vehicle immobilized by terrain, and work to develop innovative tools in order to assist researchers. They can also work on their own entrepreneurial ideas.

"Our goal is to solve today's problems," said Kerins. "We can do that by building a relationship with Georgia Tech and providing potential capstone projects for students each semester."

The problem set Kerins presented was identified by 3rd ID Soldiers at the junior level who work with armored vehicles regularly and who often find themselves needing assistance to recover stuck vehicles.

"Presenting at this Expo adds to the Marne innovation efforts by taking ideas and problems generated at the division level, by Soldiers, and injecting them into academic institutions for further refinement and potential Solutions," said Kerins. "It complements our modernization efforts by providing different perspectives."

Kerins was not the only presenter that day, but his pitch seemed to resonate with students.

"The problem stood out from others because

the scale is huge," said Capt. Troy Batugal, a Georgia Tech graduate student and officer with the 75th Innovation Command. "This is a common problem that can be solved that will save tankers a lot of time and stress."

Since Batugal is a graduate student, he is not eligible to take part in the Capstone Design Course, but said he saw numerous groups of students approach Kerins with the hope of taking part in the project.

Past expos have witnessed projects that have yielded significant results for industry sponsors, saving some of them upwards of millions of dollars in research and development costs. The networking experience for students also gives them the opportunity to make a lasting impression with potential employers.

Throughout the semester, students who sign up to work on this problem will work on developing a solution with the goal of pitching a solution or prototype solution during another expo at the end.

Soldiers gain better understanding of Islam through training

More than 40 soldiers deployed to Camp Arifjan and Camp Buehring, Kuwait, participated in cultural awareness training in Kuwait City recently.

The religious affairs specialists and chaplains began their day of cultural immersion organized by the Area Support Group Kuwait unit ministry team at the Amricani Cultural Centre.

The Amricani Cultural Centre campus got its start in 1912 when it served as the American Mission Hospital. Its facilities now serve as the home of the Dar al Athar al Islamiyyah, a cultural organization that operates several cultural centers in Kuwait and manages a collection of more than 20,000 pieces of rare Islamic art.

Khateeb Mohammed Al-Nagwi, the Islamic preacher for the Islamic Affairs and Moral Guidance Center at the Grand Mosque, presented a basic primer on Islam to the soldiers.

"Many people fail to understand that Islam is based on two things, and on two things only: the Quran and the Hadith," said Al-Nagwi. "The Quran is the word of God, the book of instructions, and from the other side, the Hadith, that is the traditions, the sayings or the actions."

Sgt. Dean L. Wilson, a religious affairs assistant assigned to the 3rd Medical Command, 1st Theater Sustainment Command, said the training moved him.

"This helps give you more of a ... realistic aspect of what goes on in the Islam religion," Wilson said. "It gives you a better understanding that you can also carry back home and say 'Hey, what we thought we knew or perceived in the news and stuff is not true.'

"And now we can better practice pluralism, where we can actually practice being in the setting and place with different religions and respectfully coexist with one another of different cultural backgrounds," the religious affairs specialist continued. "We all respectfully want peace, and we don't want any hatred among anybody, so we should all accept each other individually and love one another."

After the cultural awareness training, the soldiers toured the Grand Mosque.

Construction on Kuwait's official mosque was

completed in 1986. The Grand Mosque features an Islamic library, and its main prayer hall can accommodate up to 10,000 men.

Capt. Philibert D. Meyor, a chaplain assigned to the 3rd Infantry Division Sustainment Brigade, 1st Theatre Sustainment Command, said participating in the cultural awareness event will help him better balance his own Christian faith and minister to his soldiers.

"Just learning about Islam will help me if I engage Muslim soldiers," Meyor said. "I will be able to have a conversation with him or her. I will be very sensitive to their culture and their religion, so it's very meaningful to me, and it's something that I got a whole lot out of."

Maj. Brandon G. Joseph, a chaplain assigned to the 3rd Expeditionary Sustainment Command, 1st TSC, said he hoped the experiences enriched the soldiers who participated.

"It's a good refresher and reminder, not only of cultural awareness and just being aware of who you're around, but I think it's really good for religion and faith and spirituality, itself," Joseph said. "I think it's really special."

Division collaborates with cadets at inaugural Marne Innovation Workshop

ATLANTA —Soldiers from the 3rd Infantry Division participated in the first Marne Innovations Workshop at the Georgia Institute of Technology in Atlanta, Jan. 6-9. The workshop is a collaborative event that included participants from the Georgia Institute of Technology Army ROTC, the United States Military Academy, and the 75th Innovation Command.

"The Marne Innovations Workshop is the first opportunity for 3rd ID to partner with the Georgia Institute of Technology, and its intent is to solve today's problems with today's technology," said Capt. Ben McFarlin, deputy innovations officer for 3rd ID.

Recently, 3rd ID Soldiers generated a list of challenges, which were curated from feedback

and survey results received from across the Division. Georgia Tech students and USMA cadets then selected a set of challenges from this list.

Group of cadets and students worked with Soldiers during the 4-day workshop to begin developing ideas and prototypes to solve the challenges brought forward by 3rd ID. The teams will continue to work together over the next six months to further hone their ideas.

The 3rd ID is currently on a modernization path that includes new equipment, weapons and vehicles across the division. The Marne Innovation program complements this modernization push by focusing on enhancing and broadening its Soldiers intellectually through new industry and academic partnerships, and in new directions for problems.

"The investments that we make in people will pay off in the long run," said Brig. Gen. Jasper Jeffers, the deputy commanding general of maneuver for 3rd ID. "I hope our Soldiers realize that they don't have to accept barriers to their good ideas; if they have a good idea, there is a way and a path to put together a team and work on it."

Innovation fosters a culture of development for Soldiers by giving them technical skills learned through education. It also makes their units more efficient and lethal by giving time back to warfighters to devote to readiness. Those benefits contribute to any mission the Marne Division receives, whether it's deploying, conducting garrison operations, or modernizing the force.

Although the cadets, students and Soldiers who met during the Marne Innovation Project are geographically dispersed, they will remain in contact over the next six months as they collaborate to develop solutions to problems faced by 3rd ID Soldiers.
