CG moves to new NTC headquarters

In a sense, Christmas came early for the National Training Center headquarters staff, led by NTC/Fort Irwin commanding general, Brig. Gen. Robert "Abe" Abrams, on Dec. 17, 2009 as a new headquarters building, Building 988, was unveiled to the public.

Since 1958, the NTC command staff had been headquartered at its original location, near Weed Army Community Hospital and the post helipad, along with the Fort Irwin garrison command staff.

"This is a formal signal that we're trans-

forming in how we think and how we run the National Training Center," Brig. Gen. Abrams told the crowd of about 50 people gathered for the event. "That's what this day is about."

In 1981, when the National Training Center was established and had its first training rotation in 1982, additional capability had to be built to operate it, he said.

Since then, we have continued to build on the great institution of the National Training Center," he said. "Today, it is the world's finest training center, bar none, for units, joint, interagency, multinational, who are training to get ready to go fight in Iraq and Afghanistan. There is none better and all of you should take pride in that."

"But we have not made the commiserate investment in our infrastructure to support our great Army and our great training capability here," he said.


Brig. Gen. Abrams said, when he arrived, he was surprised to find that our headquarters was dispersed across 14 different buildings across the main post.

"We've got great Americans on our great NTC staff, but there's something lost when we're not all working under one roof or at least as few roofs as possible to gain efficiency, effectiveness, synergy and improve our teamwork so that we can pro-

Connelly Cup finals

Blackhorse food service specialists serve up success

Food service specialists from the Field Regimental Dining Facility, 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment, put months of labor to the test as judges from the Philip A. Connelly Awards examined the Blackhorse Troopers preparing and serving meals in a field environment on Dec. 9.

The Soldiers, already awarded the U.S. Army Forces Command Philip A. Connelly award in the field kitchen category in October, were being judged for the same award but at the Department of the Army level.

The Soldiers were not only graded on the quality of food, but also the layout and appearance of the site, ration control, and record keeping.

The Connelly competition was set up to recognize food service excellence as well as shed light on the food service specialist, said Chief Warrant Officer Daniel W. Ormsby, the Army Reserve Food Advisor, Active Guard and Reserve, who is also one of three Department of the Army judges of the competition.

The winners of each of the Connelly's five categories will be awarded the Connelly Cup at a ceremony scheduled for April 17, 2010 in Reno, Nev.

The Blackhorse food service specialists were the last of four units judged in consideration for the 2009 Active Army Field Kitchen Category.

"Our Soldiers are excited. They've done a lot leading up this," said Sgt. Lisa M. Stewart, a squad leader with the 11th ACR FRDF. "We want to win so we can be recognized. It's a pride thing."

The American Red Cross on Fort Irwin presented the Warrior Transition Unit with gifts on Dec. 15 that will help Soldiers in the unit with their physical training.

Stephanie Luce, chairwoman of the Fort Irwin Red Cross chapter, provided the donated items that included: seven bow and arrow sets; volleyball net, hardware and three volleyballs, and; 20 pairs of swimming/flotation gloves. The value of the equipment was \$4,000.

Capt. David Spencer is commander of the WTU, which is a unit comprised of Soldiers who are recuperating from injury or illness. Their mission is to heal while preparing for a successful transition back to the military or to civilian life. Capt. Spencer said the equipment would be used for adaptive physical training. Some of the Soldiers, because of physical limitations, are not able to participate in cardiovascular workouts, said Capt. Spencer. The bow and arrow sets could be used by Soldiers with limited mobility.

"With the arrows...they could actually stand for short periods of time and they're actually getting their arms worked out," Capt. Spencer said. "It works hand-mind coordination. It actually works on the mental and the physical – through the upper body. We have to keep up the physical fitness part of the sound mind, sound body concept."

The early Christmas gifts would provide the unit another option for group activity as they take advantage of an archery range on Fort Irwin on Goldstone Road.

"I think it's important of having everybody doing something constructive together every day," Capt. Spencer said.

The Red Cross provides material and volunteer support through its Military Hospital Outreach Program. In November, the Red Cross on Fort Irwin also donated \$5,000 of electronics, clothing, gift cards, and personal hygiene items to the Traumatic Brain Injury program of the WTU here. Red Cross volunteers and staff in military and VA medical facilities support the recovery and rehabilitation of service members. The outreach initiative is funded as a part of a Department of Defense grant that provides funding for the Red Cross to the Armed Forces to expand its support for service members, veterans and their Families.

Increasing sexual assault awareness at Fort Irwin

Sexual assault is a crime that robs its victims of their basic right to human dignity. Oftentimes, people who are attacked by sexual predators feel violated, lost, or overwhelmed. Here at Fort Irwin, there are many resources available that can help support and inform victims of sexual assault, their loved ones, and others who would like to gain a better understanding of this topic.

Did you know that while sexual assaults do sometimes happen in high-risk situations with strangers, most victims know their attackers? Almost one half of people who are assaulted get attacked in their homes by someone they know. Sometimes, a person is in an intimate relationship with their attacker and can become a victim of sexual assault. No matter what, victims are not to blame for these attacks taking place. An individual's lifestyle, behaviors, or choices (including sexual history) are never justification for rape.


If you have been sexually assaulted, know someone who has, or if you want more information on what services are available to you, there are many places to go for help at Fort Irwin. The Sexual Assault Response services on post are provided largely by Army Community Services (ACS), and Weed Army Community Hospital (WACH). If you are assaulted, the ACS Sexual Assault Response Coordinator, at 447-0293, can help get you to a medical treatment facility. ACS can also put you in contact with a Victim Advocate, who can offer you support during treatment. At WACH, your treatment process will begin, and will likely include a physical exam, medical treatment for any

injuries, exploration of birth control options, and a forensic exam (with your consent) so that evidence can be collected. You are also fully entitled to a consultation with a behavioral health provider and time with Chaplain services. If you ever forget who to call for help after being assaulted, go directly to the WACH Emergency Department, where you can get the care you need.

There have been 20 reported sexual assaults at Fort Irwin in the last fiscal year. A sobering number to be sure, but there are ways that we can all respond positively to the concept of sexual assault. Staying informed and being vigilant are great ways to help improve this statistic. The Army remains fully committed to preventing sexual assaults through the I. A.M. STRONG campaign. Soldiers are asked to Intervene, Act, and Motivate others to stop sexual assaults and the sexually offensive language and gestures that create an environment friendly to this abuse.

In order to help avoid circumstances that may leave you vulnerable to an attacker, remember to always be aware of your surroundings, and try to stay with a buddy. Keep away from isolated, poorly lit areas if you can, and trust your instincts. If you feel uncomfortable in a situation, don't feel embarrassed—get out of it! And remember: "No" always means "No." Being forced into a sexual act against your will (with violence or not) is never okay.

reenlisting was just the next step in his career.

"I am moving to Fort Bliss next year," said Sgt. Guerra. "When I get there, I am going to focus on getting (promoted to

staff sergeant) and going to college. I want to become a personnel warrant officer and eventually retire."

Although cash bonuses are available to

Soldiers under certain circumstances, Sgt. 1st Class Grice said that cash is not usually a Soldier's sole motive for reenlistment.

"Soldiers always come in with something else they want, like a new duty station or training for a new job," said Sgt. 1st Class Grice. "If we can get them a bonus, then that's good too."

No matter the reasons that the Troopers had for reenlisting, the Lakers organization wanted to show their appreciation for the Soldier's commitment.

"The Lakers organization gives back to the community, from elementary schools to the military," said a spokesman for the Lakers organization.

This was the first time the 1/11 ACR retention office has been able to give out tickets to events as gifts for reenlistment. They hope to do it again soon, said Sgt. 1st Class Grice.

"It's not something we are able to do all the time," said Sgt. 1st Class Grice. "It is something that we were able to do now, and we are trying to do other things like it later on. vide better support to all of you as we train the force," he said. "That's what the vision was."

That vision was handed over to a committee of dedicated professionals including NTC Chief of Staff, Col. Joseph Wawro, NTC G-3 Sgt. Maj., Sgt. Maj. Jeff Loper and Mike Nichols, a Department of the Army civilian who works in the NTC G-3 Strategic Plans division, who made it happen, Brig. Gen.

"This is about bringing together a great team from 14 separate buildings across the installation. We're taking the staff from 14 to 7," he said. "Out of that 7, one of the Manning brothers could hit all four buildings from the parking lot. We'll have about 90 percent of the staff under those four roofs."

The opening of the new NTC headquarters building is also a great sign of being good stewards, because the garrison's not just going to expand and take that empty space, he said.

"This is the first major move to set the conditions so when the MCA (Military Construction Appropriation) money starts rolling in 2015, we'll be able to start tearing down 50-year-old buildings, temporary structures, and start building a first-class capability for all of our Family and Soldier support services across the installation," he said.


The No. 1 project is going to be a one-stop in-processing/out-processing center and a Soldier and Family support center, he added.

"Somebody had to move first to be able to start creating the room to do that, and as I've always said we need to lead by personal example," Brig. Gen. Abrams said. "It was the right thing to do for the installation, so this is also part of a long-term view for the National Training Center."

The mission of the National Training Center is not going away anytime soon, he said.

"It's a crown jewel for our defense department, and we're going to be training forces here for many, many years," Brig. Gen. Abrams said before he, NTC command sergeant major, Command Sgt. Maj. Victor Martinez, Col. Wawro and Sgt. Maj. Loper cut the ribbon marking the official grand opening of the new NTC headquarters building.











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

New police station open for business

What once served as a gas station on Fort Irwin in the 1970's, recently became one of the newest improvements to facilities on this military installation.

At a ribbon cutting ceremony Dec. 14, 2009 the recently renovated building 326 was inaugurated as the new police station on Fort Irwin.

"This building was a gas station in the 1970s," said Col. Jim Chevallier, commander, Fort Irwin U.S. Army Garrison. "What's great about this facility today — it's a renovated facility that, not only provides a better place for our valued employees to work, but more importantly, it improves our capability to protect the community."

Col. Chevallier went on to stress that the safety of the community on Fort Irwin is a "crystal ball" that can't be dropped. The new police station consolidates the emergency dispatch service into one and provides a significant improvement of emergency services automation, said Col. Chevallier. A call to 911 or 444 will go to the new dispatch center. The new facility allows for continued, future enhancements.

"It's laid the groundwork for what we hope to achieve in the next fiscal year to improve our information technology association with fire and law enforcement, and allows us better situational awareness at all times, but specifically during ongoing incidents on Fort Irwin," Col. Chevallier said.

National Training Center and Fort Irwin commander, Brig. Gen. Robert "Abe" Abrams, praised the law enforcement staff, who will reap the benefits of the new facility.

"They're absolutely capable and do a fantastic job," Brig. Gen. Abrams said. "To all of them, I say, 'Thanks.' We finally have done something right for you and given you a first-class facility now that you can hang your hat in and get business done."

The general also said the \$1.2 million renovations were well deserved for the community and the military who conduct the very significant mission of training units deploying to war zones.

"If we want to have first class or worldclass training in the training area, we need to have a world-class infrastructure on post, because ... we need to have a quality of life in our workplace commensurate with the importance of our mission," Brig. Gen. Abrams said.

Brig. Gen. Abrams also thanked the audience who were present at the ceremony. Attending the ceremony were representatives from the San Bernardino County District Attorney's office, the San Bernardino County Sheriff in Barstow, the San Bernardino County Probation department, and the San Bernardino County Sheriff's department.

The children who visited WTU that day put a smile on everybody's face, proving that the virtuousness of children is always touching and uplifting.







