Bartlett Shatters MCM Record

Life Guard's Last Action Saves Life

Mc. George Fazekas, a lifeguard at the Area #2 pool, died a life last Tuesday, May 28, when he dove into the pool's deep end to bring up LCpl. Bert Oshkeshequoam, H&S, 2d Service Bn., who was unconscious on the bottom.

Retrieving the limp figure of Oshkeshequoam from 12 feet of water, Fazekas immediately administered an artificial respiration, for approximately 15 minutes. Oshkeshequoam began breathing again. He was kept in a quiet room until an ambulance arrived.

Oshkeshequoam claims the cause of his near drowning was exhaustion and lack of air. As an underwater swimming enthusiast, he attempted to swim the length of the pool.

Wins McDougal Trophy As Old Rifle Mark Falls

Sergeant Donice R. Bartlett shattered the Marine Corps Individual Rifle Match Record of 593X600 when he posted a blazing score of 594 out of a possible 600 with 45V's to set a new match record and take top honors in the individual rifle competition.

This is Bartlett's second consecutive win during Marine Corps Match competition. Last year he narrowly missed tying the match record when he won the 1962 Individual match with 592X-600.

First Organized Reserve Units Arrive; Face Concentrated Training Schedule

Marine Corps Reserve officers and enlisted men from colleges, high schools and business firms across the nation began arriving at Camp Lejeune this week to fill training assistant billets and staff positions with the Reserve Liaison Unit at Montford Point for the training of more than 8,500 reservists who will serve here during the next three months.

The training assistants who came in this week are mostly school teachers and self-employed businessmen who will spend 90 days on active duty at Camp Lejeune. They fill the billets of Liaison Unit executive officer, administrative officer, transportation officer, training exercise planners, supply coordinators, and other liaison and coordinating posts.

The organized Marine Corps Reserve units will come from 40 cities in 15 eastern, mid-west and southern cities. Each will be here for two weeks of concentrated training in the specialties of their units, di-

rected by the training assistants and regular Marines from Camp Lejeune based 2d Marine Division, Force Troops, and Marine Corps Base organizations.

The reserve units are all a part of the 4th Division, United States Marine Corps Reserve, organized last year to provide

a reserve back-up for the regular Marine Corps force in readiness.

First units to train here this year will come from Connellsville and Columbia, Pennsylvania; Greensboro, North Carolina; and New Orleans, Lafayette, Baton Rouge and Shreveport, Louisiana.

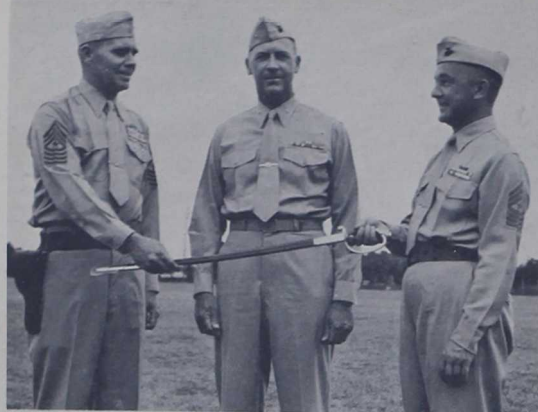

Training, Test Regiment Renamed By MC Schools

The Marine Corps Schools Training and Test Regiment, Quantico, proving ground for men aspiring to become Marine officers, was officially redesignated as the Officer Candidate School on June 1.

The organization's mission, training and screening of Marine officer candidates will remain the same. Redesignation of the course title was made so as to conform to its mission.

Col. Walter H. Cuenin, remains as commanding officer of the regiment.

Three officer training and screening programs are conducted at the Marine Corps Schools Officer Candidate School. Candidates for the programs are drawn from colleges

and universities throughout the nation and from the enlisted ranks of the Marine Corps.

The Platoon Leaders Class consists of two six-week summer sessions for college students. Orientation to military life, individual training and physical conditioning are stressed in the two periods.

The three programs are the Platoon Leaders Class, the Officer Candidate Course, and the Warrant Officer Screening Course.

The Officer Candidate Course is basically the same as the Platoon Leaders Class but it is a continuous 11-week program conducted twice each year for college graduates and Marines selected from the ranks.

The Warrant Officer Screening Course trains and screens selected Marine non-commissioned officers in much the same way as commissioned officer candidates. Students who successfully complete the course are appointed to the rank of warrant officer to serve in various special fields.

Lejeune To Host Judo Tournament

Camp Lejeune will host the Shufu Judo Yudanshakal Spring Promotional Tournament for the South Atlantic area on Saturday, June 15, in Goettge Memorial Field House.

Judo, an art that is practiced as a sport, means the "gentle way." It evolved from the ancient use of the hands as weapons (jiujutsu), which was taught and practiced with scientific

and often deadly skill in Japan.

Judo as practiced today was revived by Jigoro Kano in 1922. Realizing that the art of judo was swiftly disappearing due to the great change which occurred in the types of weapons and methods of fighting, he organized a course of instruction, which through the years has developed into today's sport.

Holders Of NSLI Should Check Status

Married servicemen, whose National Service Life Insurance premiums are still under an in-service waiver, would do well to check what effect these waivers have on survivors benefits, the Veterans Administration warned recently.

Although in-service waivers of premiums have not been granted since Jan. 1, 1957, there are still many servicemen whose waivers are continuing and these men may be losing protection for their dependents by not canceling the waivers. The Veterans Survivors Act, which cut out new waivers in 1957, established a system of compensation for death due to service called dependency and indemnity compensation. These are much more generous than those compensation rates previously in effect. However, the DIC rates are not paid to survivors of a serviceman whose insurance is under an in-service waiver of premiums.

For the most part, servicemen with families can provide better protection for those families by cancelling their waiver and resuming payment of the premiums. However, those without dependents, generally, would not gain by such action.

Certain maneuver areas and ranges have been established within Camp Lejeune for the field training of units and organizations based at this Camp. Training in these areas involves firing of both live and blank ammunition. Additionally, other training items are used which are inherently dangerous to children. On occasion, both blank ammunition and live ammunition is inadvertently left in the maneuver areas and ranges. This ammu-

nition as well as other training items constitute a danger to children who wander into these areas.

Parents will take such action as may be required to prevent their children from unauthorized entrance into areas dangerous for children.

64 Promotion Plans Set For Corps' Staff NCO's

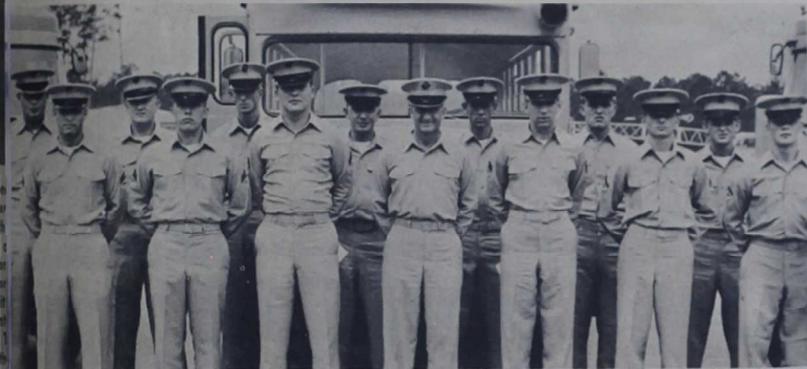
Marine Corps Staff NCO promotion plans for Fiscal Year 1964 were announced by the Commandant of the Marine Corps last week. All Staff NCO grades are now authorized strength. There is a waiting list for promotions made up of selectees from Fiscal Year 1963's selection rounds. In order to stay within man-year averages authorized by the Department

of Defense, the Corps intends to promote these Marines as vacancies occur. Based on normal attrition factors there are enough Marines on the selection list to fill expected vacancies for at least six months.

In order to avoid long waiting lists and to take advantage of any changes in experience factors caused by expected passage of the new pay bill, the

Corps intends to commence the E-8/E-9 selection board in January, 1964, unless a large number of vacancies occur prior to that time.

The boards for selection to E-7 and E-6 will follow in the usual order, and will be convened as soon as the selections to the higher grades have been completed. Exact convening dates have not been determined.

Commandant States View In Change Of Weapons

The Marine Corps is not contemplating changing marksmanship qualification scores for the M-14 rifle, according to Commandant, Gen. David M. Shoup. The General says all figures have seen indicate the M-14's accuracy is the same as the M-1 on the "A" qualification course and no requirement for alteration exists. Reports indicated that some installations are having so many qualified at it was thought that minimums would have to be raised. Corps-wide experience is contrary to this, he said.

Marines are using the M16 AR-15 rifle in some guerrilla actions in Southeast Asia but there are no plans to change to it. General Shoup did not rule out possible use of the AR-15, or any other weapon, saying that all possibilities are being investigated and that in some areas it may be more applicable than the M-14.

"But we won't leave any enemy soldier unskilled no matter what rifle we use,"

the Medal of Honor winner said.

The Corps has temporarily turned thumbs down on armed helicopters, saying that they are too vulnerable to make adequate attack aircraft. But, the Commandant added that the idea is not abandoned and if other units which are using armed helicopters "can show us we are wrong, we will use it."

General Shoup indicated that the Marine Corps likes to go slow in adopting new equipment, saying there have been cases where money was lost because a new system was rushed too fast.

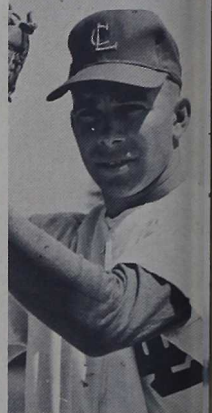

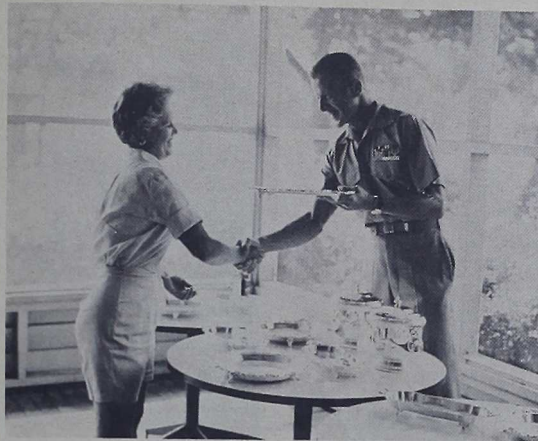

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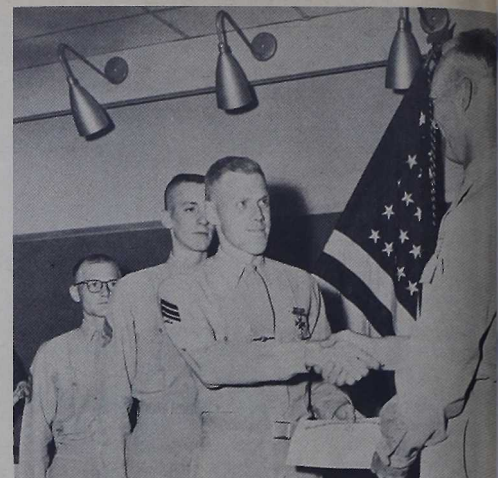

Defense Secretary Calls Military Housing Urgent

Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara has told the House Committee on Armed Forces that 12,100 housing units proposed for funding in 1964 are urgently required.

The committee, studying the Fiscal Year 1964 military family housing program, was told by the Secretary that, for the military family man, as for any family man, decent housing for his wife and children is a major concern.

The Secretary told the committee:

"While a military man, in keeping with his profession, must be willing to accept personal hardships, I do not think the nation has the right to expect the same from his family.

The necessary rigors inherent in the military life are hard enough on a family man without adding the burden of persistent personal hardships for his family.

"There are few indeed in the military service who can expect to complete their careers without long periods of family separation. With so large a portion of our military forces deployed abroad or at sea, family separation for a large number of our people is an inevitable and, indeed, an accepted feature of service life. This is particularly true in the case of Navy personnel assigned to ships; even when the ship is home-ported in the United States, the ship is often at sea and the man must be away from his family a considerable portion of the time.

Secretary McNamara provided the committee with background data stating that the housing problem has increased enormously, especially since the Korean War.

He went on to say that the problem of family housing has been further complicated by the marked changes in the military personnel structure which have been taking place since World War II.

Prior to WWII, single men constituted 70 to 75 percent of the peacetime military establishment. Today 50.2 percent of the active duty male personnel are married and these married men constitute the bulk of career personnel. He said, "these are the men who occupy the key positions and who possess the professional, leadership, and technical skills essential to a modern military establishment."

Throughout his testimony Secretary McNamara referred the committee to attachments which accompanied his text that depicted typical cases of inadequate housing of military families.

The 53-man detachment under the command of Captain J. W. Wilta, left Camp Lejeune February 13 to join "Navy Project Handclasp" at Norfolk, Virginia.

Men selected for the cruise were volunteers chosen from various East Coast Marine Corps posts and stations. Capt. Wilta screened all volunteers and ended up with a 19-man drill team, and baseball, basketball and soccer teams.

All selectees were sent to Norfolk where they boarded the USS Spelgal Grove, LSD 32, loaded with 300 tons of cargo, including toys, clothing, encyclopedias and medical supplies.

The first port of call was

Trinidad, West Indies, where Rear Admiral J. A. Tyree, USN, Commander, South Atlantic Forces, joined the detachment.

The purpose of the cruise was to promote good will in various countries of Africa by honoring the countries' dignitaries, participating in athletic events with the natives, drill demonstrations, and passing out quantities of clothes, toys, books, and medical supplies to underdeveloped countries.

In Pointe Noire the drill team performed twice for the ambassador, who was so impressed he wrote the Commandant of the Marine Corps, commending the detachment on their accomplishments. He noted that these accidents, exclusively human suffering involved, had been estimated at some 11,000, and said, "We cannot tolerate the human and economic waste."

The President added that there was no single cause for the problem but that the deaths and injuries could be reduced instead by "a sustained and coordinated safety program."
