In her web. Black Widow spiders are pro-bably present in every state in the Union, ranging from Canada to Tierra del Fuego, South America. They thrive on grass, under stones, beneath wood, in burrows of rodents, under and in garages, cellars, furniture, in boxes sheltering water, gas and electric meters and in out-houses (privies). The female is usually jet black, although some apparently mature females may have the men is about one-con-in diameter. The male spider usually has light streaks on its abdomen, and can be easily recognized by the knob-like appendages lo-cated in front of the head. POISONS POISONS Black Widow spiders possess two poison sacs, one for each fang, similar to the snake, but as the male spider matures, his poison apparatus becomes inactive and its development store

his poison apparatus becomes inactive and its development stops. Female spiders, however, are just the opposite, As they mature, the apparatus in-creases in size and strength, and the amount of poison in the sacs becomes stronger. The amount of poison in the sacs determines the potency of the spider. Venom of the Black Widow is a neurotoxic, that is, it acts on the nervous system. In fact, the poison is not only carried in the sacs on the fangs, but is also carried in the body fluids. There is some discus-sions are identical. A captured Black Widow will often play "possum"; and if it

is picked up by its leg, the spider is likely to detach it-self from the leg as a means of escape. Many people are bitten when they pick up some object to which the spider is attached or when putting on old clothing which is hung in a shed.

Susceptibility to the bite of the spider is dependent upon the physical condition of the victim, and where the victim is bitten. There are records which show that California had 13 deaths from the bite of the spider from the bite of the spider which occurred in out door lava-

The stope remembered that some persons are sensitive even to the sting of the bee, and that deaths have been credited to such. The bite of the Black Widow spider is said to resemble a pin prick. Usually, a slight local swelling and two red spots where the bite occurred. Pain is felt almost immediately in the region of the bite, and be-comes intense in one to three hours, and may continue for periods up to 48 hours. The tends to be all pain in all muscles of the body, rigidity of the diaphragm. nausea and low fove. If bitten by the spider, call de in an area where a doctor is not available, the home method of treatment consists of using Jodine on the bite to prevent secondary polsoning, and then taking hot baths at frequent intervals.

# **Could Be Nearing**

Li. Gen. Wallace M. Greene, Jr., Chief of Staff, Head-quarters, U. S. Marine Corps, has announced his belief that rockets will be capable of trans-porting Marines and equipment to troubled areas within five to

porting Marines and equipment to troubled areas within five to seven years. According toLt, Gen, Greene, small rockets would be used at the beginning to transport Ma-rines short distances on suborbital flights at speeds up to 4,000 miles per hour. Later on, he said, big rockets, like the Saturn, could possibly transport battallen size units distances up to 6,000 or 7,000 miles. Marine fighting units, at Camp Lejeune, N. C., he con-tinued, could board a rocket at their home base, blast off and land in Africa within 80 minutes. He emphasized that rocket fights would be used only for "high priority" troop move-ments. ments.

# North Carolina Fishing License Requirements

North Carolina residents over 16 years of age who fish hook and line or rod and reel outside of their county of resi-dence must have in their pos-session a State-wide fishing license or a Dally Permit. A State-wide or county re-sidence license is required be-fore fishing in one's county of residence if artificial balt is used.

residence in artificial used. No license is required to fish in one's county of residence if live bait is used. In the immediate area of Camp Lejeune, neither county nor State-wide fishing licenses are required when fishing in the Atlantic ocean, inland waterway, New River below highway 17 bridge at Jackson-ville, White Oak River below

the highway bridge at Stella, and private waters if you are either the owner or an invited guest, regardless of the type balt being used.

According to the 1963 North Carolina Fishing Rules, non-resident servicemen and depen-dents under age 21, assigned to military facilities in the State are authorized to fish on a Re-sident State-wide fishing license regardless of their length of time in the State.

However, servicemen and their dependents are authorized to fish on a County license in the county stationed, only if they have lived in the county for at least six months immediately preceding the date on which application is made,

So we see the average Marine leaving the Marine Corps at age 38 can expect to live 33 more years. (\$175 X 12 X 33 totals \$69,300).
