

Raskauskis Tops EDM Shooters

Elliott, Wirgman, Edson Team Shoot Offs Scheduled For Friday

Gy. Sgt. Joseph M. Raskauskis, a member of MCRD, Parris Island, S. C., won the 1963 Eastern Division Individual Rifle Match, with a record-shattering 595x600, to top the previous Eastern Division Rifle Match record of 586x600.

Runners-up in the individual competition were SSgt. J. A. Titterton, of the Marksmanship Training Unit, Quantico, Va., with 594x600, and Gy. Sgt. T. F. Easley Jr., stationed at MAD, Memphis, Tenn., with a score of 593x600.

After being held up by rain during the second stage of firing, the shooters began firing yesterday morning at 6:30 a.m., finished

shooting one time over the course, took a short break, then started firing the second time over to get back on schedule to complete the match.

The course fired in the individual competition consists of 20 rounds slow fire from 200 yards; 10 rounds sitting rapid fire at 200 yards; 10 rounds rapid fire prone at 300 yards, and 20 rounds slow fire at the 600-yard line. The match winner is the competitor with the highest aggregate score for two times over the course.

A target with a 12" bullseye is shot at during all phases except the 600-yard slow fire. A target with a 20" bull is used then. The targets have a 4" circle in the center of the bull. Tie scores are broken by counting the V's, the man with the most V's winning.

The Individual Rifle Match is the second of six matches to be fired during the Eastern Division Matches.

At 7 a.m., May 24, rifle team competition will begin for the Elliott and Wirgman Trophy Matches.

At 1 p.m., also on May 24, the pistol teams will start shooting for the Edson Trophy.

Awards will be presented to all medal winning individuals, and to winning teams at 9 a.m., May 25.

The shooters who place in the Eastern Division Rifle and Pistol Matches will be eligible to shoot in the '63 Marine Corps Rifle and Pistol Matches, which are also being held here this year. The top shooters from the Eastern, Western, Pacific and Far Eastern Division Matches will be competing in the Marine Corps Matches, beginning June 3.

Vitarbo, Holcombe Cop 2700 Aggregate Match

The Class "A" 2700 aggregate pistol match, a test of the all around shooter, was won by Sgt. Arnold Vitarbo, a member of the Marksmanship Training Unit, Quantico, Va. Class "B" of the match was taken by SSgt. Paul Holcombe, of the 2d Marine Air Wing, Cherry Point, N. C.

Vitarbo won the Class "A" division, which is made up of shooters with one or more "legs" with a pistol, firing a score of 2600X106. Capt. James A. Getchell, also of MTU, Quantico, came in second with 2600X96. CWO Anthony Mucci, from Parris Island, South Carolina, won third place with 2599X87.

SSgt. Holcombe won Class "B" with 2546X72. Gunnery Sgt. George C. Shaw, a member of the Second Marine Air Wing placed second with 2513X62, and Capt. Richard O. Culver, stationed at 8th MCRD, New

Royal Marines Commandant Arrives; Begins Tour Of Quad-Command Area

Lieutenant General M. C. Cartwright-Taylor, C. B., Commandant General of the Royal Marines, arrived at the Marine Corps Air Facility, New River, Tuesday afternoon for a four day tour of Camp Lejeune.

Met by Maj. Gen. James P. Berkeley, commanding general, Marine Corps Base, Camp Lejeune, the commandant general proceeded to the Senior Guest House for billeting, and attended an informal party at Onslow Beach, hosted by General and Mrs. Berkeley, later that evening.

Honors were rendered in the Goettge Memorial Field House early Wednesday morning. General Cartwright-Taylor reviewed the Marine Corps Base Honor Guard, comprised of Marines from H&S Battalion, was serenaded by the 2d Marine Division Band, and given a 19 gun salute.

After the ceremonies, the commandant general visited the rifle range to observe competition firing during the final legs of the Eastern Division Matches before touring the Infantry Training Regiment at Camp Geiger.

Throughout the morning and into the early afternoon, the commandant general observed Companies "S", "P", and "R" of the Infantry Training Regiment, as they went through their paces at training ranges in the

Verona Loop area. Close combat, squad fire and movement, transition firing, grenade throwing, flame thrower firing and combat in towns, subjects of vital importance to Marine training, were put into practice by the three companies of young trainees under the experienced eye of the British commandant.

After a noon meal in an ITR field mess, the commandant returned to Lejeune for a brief aerial tour of the base

and a visit to the 2d Amphibian Tractor Battalion, Force Troops, FMFLant. With the AmTrac battalion were supporting elements of a normal battalion landing team, consisting of elements of a Tank Company, 2d Force Recon, 2d Anglico, and the 2d Field Artillery Group.

Thousands Visit Quad-Command; View Armed Forces Day Activity

Startled squeals and shouts of surprise from hundreds of children among a crowd of more than 2,000 visitors greeted a platoon of camouflaged 1st Infantry Training Regiment Marines who dashed from concealed foxholes to simulate a combat assault in opening Armed Forces Day activities here last Friday night.

The Infantry weapons display and live firing demonstration by the men of Col. W. P. Duker's training command, preceded by a 2d Marine Division Band concert, was staged in the Verona Loop training area. Lejeune's main gate opened to the public 9:30 Saturday morning to welcome crowds of spectators to the static displays and exhibits on the Hadnot Point parade grounds and in the Goettge Memorial Field House.

Static displays of tanks, self propelled howitzers and combat equipment lined up on the base parade grounds attracted the interest of visitors, particularly the younger set, who were allowed to explore the big machines.

Lecture On Religion Is Scheduled

The Christian Science congregation at Camp Lejeune, assisted by the First Church of Christ, Scientist, at Kinston, will present the first lecture on Christian Science ever given in this vicinity next Thursday, May 23rd, at 8 p. m. in the Trinity Methodist Church, Jacksonville.

Entitled "Christian Science: What It Teaches and What It Does", the lecture will be given by James Watt, of Washington, D. C., a member of the Christian Science Board of Lectureship. In it will be presented the basic beliefs of this religion; the lecture is free and open to all.

Mr. Watt served as an Army Chaplain during World War II, and since 1942 has devoted his full time continuously to the practice of Christian Science healing and in various church capacities.

Local Christian Science services are conducted in Brewster School at 11 a. m. each Sunday by Chaplain J. W. Wagensell.

The 2d Marine Division displayed its combat readiness through exhibits of completely equipped combat squads, which were available throughout the day to answer a barrage of questions concerning their mission and operational methods.

Force Troop's heavy firepower capability was represented by huge self-propelled 8 inch, 120mm and 155mm howitzers; artillery support equipment and the Ontos tank-killer.

Marine Aircraft Group-26 was kept busy explaining their exhibits and air-ground support role, and representatives of Marine Corps Base demonstrated their responsibility as "housekeeper" for the Division and Force Troops commands.

The 2d Marine Division Band,

always a crowd pleaser, was on hand to provide music in conjunction with the displays and demonstrations, and guides were present to conduct tours of the base.

An added attraction this year was a huge display from Army commands at Fort Bragg. Forty-five men from Headquarters, 18th Airborne Corps, Fort Bragg, under the command of Army Col. John D. Sapp, had extensive displays and exhibits including a 90 mm self-propelled weapon, a Davy Crockett missile with launcher, a prisoner-of-war exhibit, a parachute mockup, Army uniforms, target acquisition display, an airborne jeep, and a NATO Machinegun and the Little John rocket.

A Small, Black Enemy

The Black Widow Spider

The Black Widow spider is greatly feared in the United States and is definitely of a venomous nature, but its bite is relatively uncommon.

The female Black Widow will tend to make every effort to escape humans. In fact, she has been known to escape individuals who have disturbed her when she had several egg sacs in her web.

Black Widow spiders are probably present in every state in the Union, ranging from Canada to Tierra del Fuego, South America. They thrive on grass, under stones, beneath wood, in burrows of rodents, under and in garages, cellars, furniture, in boxes sheltering water, gas and electric meters and in out-houses (privies).

The female is usually jet black, although some apparently mature females may have the

light streaks on the abdomen which are characteristic of immature spiders. The abdomen has the appearance of a round shoe-button. Almost always, the spider has two reddish triangles on the lower or underside of the abdomen which tend to resemble an hour glass in shape. The overall length of the female spider is approximately one and one-half inches, and the abdomen is about one-fourth inch in diameter.

The male spider usually has light streaks on its abdomen, and can be easily recognized by the knob-like appendages located in front of the head.

POISONS

Black Widow spiders possess two poison sacs, one for each fang, similar to the snake, but as the male spider matures, his poison apparatus becomes inactive and its development stops.

Female spiders, however, are just the opposite. As they mature, the apparatus increases in size and strength, and the amount of poison in the sacs becomes stronger. The amount of poison in the sacs determines the potency of the spider.

Venom of the Black Widow is a neurotoxic, that is, it acts on the nervous system. In fact, the poison is not only carried in the sacs on the fangs, but is also carried in the body fluids. There is some discussion as to whether these poisons are identical.

A captured Black Widow will often play "possum"; and if it

Lejeune's Supply Structure Studied

A Headquarters, Marine Corps committee for the Development of Supply System Organizational Structure, headed by Maj. Gen. William P. Battell, arrived at Camp Lejeune yesterday for a three day stay.

While here, the committee comprised of six Marine officers and two civilian advisers, will study supply organization within Marine Corps Base and the 2d Marine Division, to include a study of two organic units, a service battalion and 2d Force Service Regiment.

The specific goal of the visit is to allow the committee to study Marine Corps Supply structure with particular applicability to the Camp Lejeune complex.

62's Rifle Champ Ready To Defend Title

It takes a lot of sweat to be a good shooter," states 1962 National Service Rifle Champion, Sgt. David A. Luke, 4C, who arrived last week to compete in the 1963 Eastern Division Rifle and Pistol Championships held here.

Sgt. Luke definitely practices what he preaches. A large part of his off duty time is devoted to dry firing, physical exercise and skill sessions with his data. Every evening during shooting season Luke does "holding exercises" which consist of holding the rifle in the hand firing position with the correct sight picture and sight alignment for one minute, and then for one minute. He does this 20 times. After the holding exercises he does 15 slow, deliberate pushups, using his flaps on the ground instead of

his whole hand. The pushups are done slowly to derive full benefit from each one. Luke feels that strength is developed in his hands by using the fingertip pushup. Fifteen chinups usually round out the physical conditioning. After the exercise Luke may spend as much as an hour and a half going over his data book from the days firing.

Now a member of the Marksmanship Training Unit at Quantico, Va., Sgt. Luke started match shooting, with a pistol, here at Camp Lejeune during 1961 when he was attached to 2d FSR.

Luke learned the importance of proper sight alignment and trigger squeeze while firing the pistol. The lesson carried over to the rifle, and when he fired for re-qualification later in 1961, he shot a score of 232,

to beat his previous high mark by 11 points. He then shot the rifle in the '61 Eastern Division Matches and won a bronze medal with a score of 571 out of a possible 600. He took a bronze medal in the Marine Corps Matches, and went on to earn a silver medal and distinguish at the National Matches at Camp Perry, Ohio.

Last year in the Western Division Matches Luke placed fourth with a 590, and placed 10th in the Marine Corps Matches, again with a 590 score. At the 1962 National Matches Luke won the "President's 100" match, dropped a few points during the next few days of firing, then "went clean" the last day of the matches to win

the championship by 2 V's with a 790-69V out of a possible 800.

Luke plans to learn the "free rifle" next. His big shooting ambition is to be on a winning American Olympic Free Rifle Team.

Travel By Rocket Could Be Nearing

Lt. Gen. Wallace M. Greene, Jr., Chief of Staff, Headquarters, U. S. Marine Corps, has announced his belief that rockets will be capable of transporting Marines and equipment to troubled areas within five to seven years.

According to Lt. Gen. Greene, small rockets would be used at the beginning to transport Marines short distances on suborbital flights at speeds up to 4,000 miles per hour.

Later on, he said, big rockets, like the Saturn, could possibly transport battalion size units distances up to 6,000 or 7,000 miles.

Marine fighting units, at Camp Lejeune, N. C., he continued, could board a rocket at their home base, blast off and land in Africa within 80 minutes. He emphasized that rocket flights would be used only for "high priority" troop movements.

General Greene, voicing his own opinions, addressed the 37th annual Military Conference of the Marine Corps Reserve Officers Association (MCROA) during a banquet at Atlanta, Ga. According to a spokesman, it was the largest gathering of Marine Reserve Officers in history.

Summer Term Planned for Adult High School

Entrance examinations for eight-week summer term of Camp Lejeune Adult High School Program, beginning July 1, will be held during the week of June 3 in the Base Education Office, Bldg. 19.

Marines and sailors wishing to enroll in the program, who have not passed their General Educational Development Test (GED) or USAFI Achievement Test, must take the entrance exam prior to registering to be eligible for the program.

The test will be given to members of the 2d Marine Division June 3 and 4; to Force Troops June 5 and 6; to Naval Hospital June 5 and to Marine Corps and Marine Corps Air Station June 6. Tests are at 8 a. m. and 1 p. m. for those who pass the test or who already qualify with GED or USAFI test equivalents. Registration will be held from June 24 to June 28 at the Base Education Office from 10 a. m. to 4 p. m.

The following courses are offered this semester: High School English, Review Arithmetic, Algebra, General Science, American History, General Business, General Mathematics and Biology.

Full cost of tuition is \$24.00 per course. The Marine Corps will pay three quarters of the cost for eligible personnel, the cost per course is \$6. Textbooks are loaned to the students for the duration of the course.

Each scheduled class will meet twice weekly in the Brewster Elementary School, for

three hours during the evening, from 6:30 to 9:30. Military bus service is available to students desiring transportation. The bus will depart from Hadnot Point Bus Depot at 6 p. m. for Brewster School and return at 9:30 p. m.

Lejeune Marines Share In Spreading Med. Good Will

DELAYED—Operating with the U. S. Sixth Fleet in the Mediterranean, Timbakion, Crete, Sub-Unit Two, HMM-262, MCAF, New River, completed a full scale amphibious training exercise with a two day people-to-people tour of Crete.

The landing force aspect of the two week exercise was the tactical support of Battalion Landing Team 2/8. The entire Sub-Unit, commanded by Major T. N. Johnson, moved ashore for operations during this time.

Stress was placed upon the use of helicopters in support of maneuvering Marine Infantry companies. Substantial emphasis was placed on night operations in the mountainous Cretan country side.

The Sub-Unit established itself in tents ashore near the Timbakion airstrip with complete aircraft maintenance facilities for its UH-34D helicopters. Complete messing, office, and recreational facilities, including movies, were set up.

On the two final days of the operation, a helicopter loaded with 1000 pounds of candy, cigarettes, and toilet articles visited several rural Cretan villages. These articles were distributed to the hundreds of curious and friendly villagers who seemed to appear instantaneously every time the helicopter landed.

Speak Up

In August of this year 31 Staff Non-commissioned Officers of the Marine Corps will gather at Camp Lejeune for the 1963 Corps-wide Staff NCO Symposium.

This is not a fun-gathering reunion or idle convention, but a serious meeting of minds dedicated to the cause of the Corps.

Last week, Base Staff NCOs began to prepare for this important event. Plans call for discussion at organization levels; selection of a representative and finally confer-

ences of these selected representatives. The final recommendations of these conferences will be forwarded to Headquarters Marine Corps for consideration as selected agenda items at the Symposium.

Years ago . . . this week

20 MAY 1803—Marines and seamen from ships of the Mediterranean Squadron landed to burn ships in the harbor of Tripoli.

20 MAY 1906—An expeditionary battalion, commanded by Major John A. Lejeune, embarked in the USS COLUMBIA at Philadelphia for service in Panama.

21 MAY 1836—President Jackson directed that all available forces on shore under the command of the Commandant of the Marine Corps report for operations against the Seminole Indians.

21 MAY 1847—The Secretary of the Navy directed the formation of a Marine Regiment for service in the Mexican War.

21 MAY 1908—Brigadier General Commandant George F. Elliott assumed the newly created rank of Major General Commandant.

21 MAY 1927—The 1st Bn., 10th Marines, the 5th Company of Engineers, and a light tank platoon landed at Shanghai, China, to join the 3d Brigade in the protection of American interests during a period of civil war.

22 MAY 1912—The anniversary of Marine Corps Aviation. On that date, Lt. Alfred A. Cunningham became the first Marine officer to be assigned to "duty in connection with aviation."

23 MAY 1962—III Marine Expeditionary Brigade landed in Thailand. The Brigade consists of the 3d Bn., 9th Marines; F-261; MACS-4; VMF-332 and a sub-unit of MABS-12.

25 MAY 1912—the 2d Marines sailed from Philadelphia for Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, to assist in forestalling a revolution.

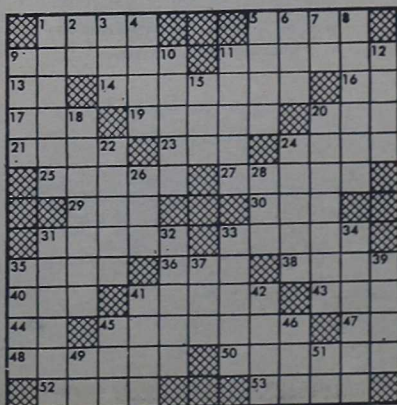

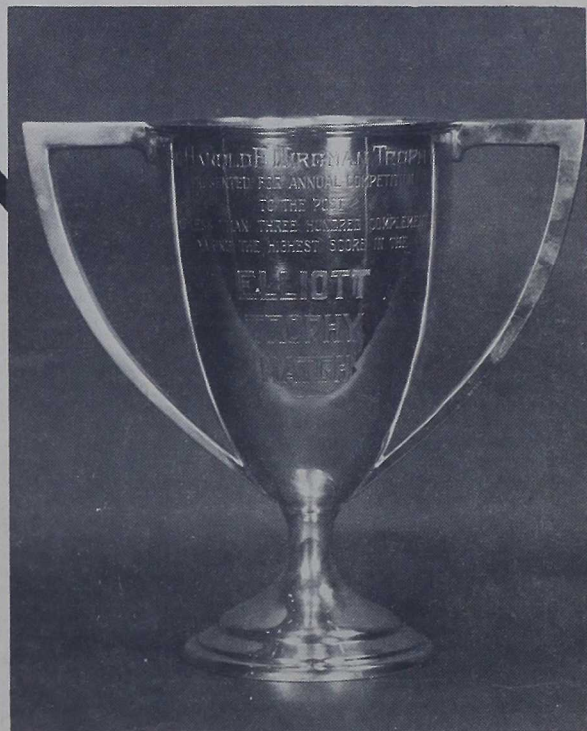

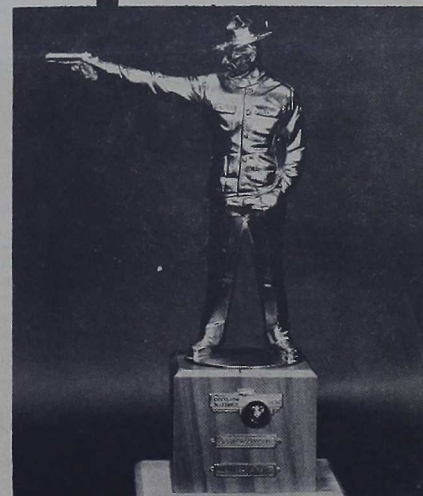

Career Advisory Clues

(Editor's Note: The following is the final portion of the CAREER CLUES article, which began last week.)

Opportunities

Best of all, probably, a Marine Corps career affords excellent opportunities to better oneself to meet the needs of modern technology. A Marine can learn any number of skills in aviation, electronics, engineering, ordnance, photography, music and many others. In the Marine Corps, one can attend full-time college with full pay and allowances without losing his chances for promotions, if he meets the qualifications of the NESEP program. What better way to get a college education? Also, there is the wonderful off-duty education program whereby a Marine can attend an accredited college in his off-duty hours and the Marine Corps will pay up to 75% of the cost. Many are availing themselves of this program here at Camp Lejeune by attending East Carolina College.

Finance

No one ever gets wealthy on Marine Corps pay but it can be pointed out that it will provide a decent living and will permit educating the children. In this regard, the "fringe benefits" cannot be forgotten—such as theater, commissary, Dependency Indemnity Compensation in the case of death, Social Security, Six-Month Death Gratuity and others—all for which the Marine pays nothing.

Retirement

Certainly one of the finer benefits is the liberal retirement system the military has always enjoyed. After a mere

20 years, a person becomes entitled to retire from the service and begin a new "Second Career". A retired serviceman can conceivably draw three retirement checks—military retirement pay, retirement pay from unions, etc., and Social Security.

\$69,300.00 is the amount of retired pay which the average E-7 with 20 years of active service can expect to receive in his life-time.

Quite a sum of money in any man's language. And it must not be forgotten that he paid nothing into this retirement plan. Incidentally, the current life span for the American male is 71 years. So we see the average Marine leaving the Marine Corps at age 38 can expect to live 33 more years. (\$175 X 12 X 33 totals \$69,300).

Type And Temperament

It is general knowledge that all young people can profit from military training, but as we all know, not everyone is suited to a military career any more than everyone is suited for a particular profession. What are those qualities that generally account for a person choosing a service career? In the writer's opinion, they are as follows:

a. Be loyal to country; proud of its history, and feel a duty to it.

b. Possess a high degree of adaptability; be able to adjust to changing circumstances; get along with people; desire to be a leader; be amenable to discipline (one who delights in rebellion against constitutional authority will not prosper in military...or civilian atmosphere).

c. A quick agile mind and liking for adventure. Good health, reasonably so, is a requirement.

Although, a young Marine completing his first enlistment may have considerable doubt to whether or not he is suited for a military career, he should take into careful consideration the fact that he successfully completed a four-year enlistment—20% of a 20 year career. This successful completion of his enlistment is excellent evidence that he possesses the qualities of character and temperament required for a military career. It has many times been said that the "future" belongs to those who prepare it....A military career offers exactly that required "preparation". It prepares one not only for his "Second Career" but his entire lifetime. Think over.

NATO Units Join For Med Exercise

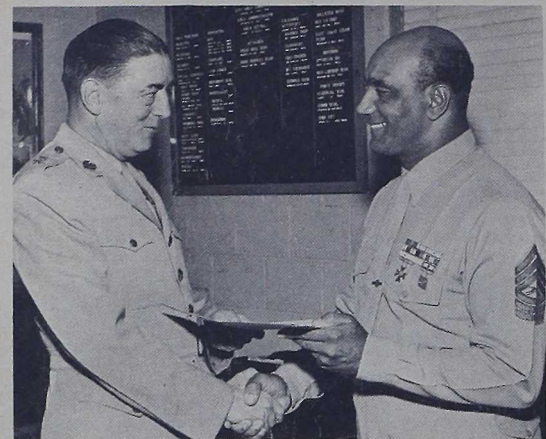

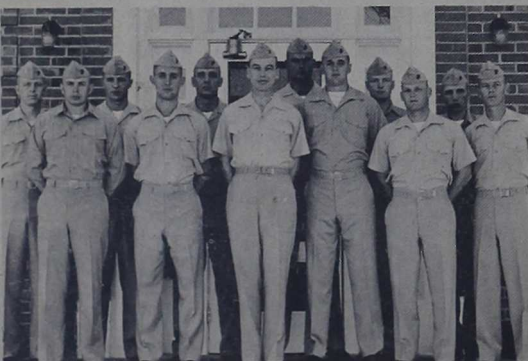

Re-Up Rules Are Tougher For Lower Pay Grades

Headquarters Marine Corps has announced that privates and Pfc's planning to ship over after completing their first enlistment are now faced with tougher reenlistment requirements as a benefit to themselves and to the Corps.

Privates and Pfc's will no longer be granted early discharge for immediate reenlistment or be permitted to reenlist or extend for periods in excess of two years.

Headquarters feels that standards for reenlistment must be compatible with those for promotion. If a Marine does not meet promotion criteria, it is felt that it is unfair to the individual and the Marine Corps to permit him to reenlist. With few exceptions, failure to achieve a grade higher than Private First Class (E-2) during the first four years of service, or Corporal (E-4) during the first 10 years of active duty is unusual.

During the two year maximum reenlistment or extension for privates or Pfc's, their potential will be evaluated and they will have opportunities for promotion. In cases where total active duty will be in excess of six years, requests for extensions or reenlistments will be forwarded to the Commandant of the Marine Corps for consideration.

Naval Enlisted Scientific Education Program candidates who are required to have a six year obligation are exempt from the above mentioned provisions. Commanding officers may request a waiver from Headquarters Marine Corps in any other deserving case.

LCpls. who plan to continue their Marine Corps career by shipping over must demonstrate their potential as noncommissioned officers.

Cpls. and above must, in order to reenlist, have demonstrated the high standards of leadership, professional competence and personal behavior required to maintain the dignity and authority of the Marine Corps NCO.
