Navy Relief Campaign Begins April 29th

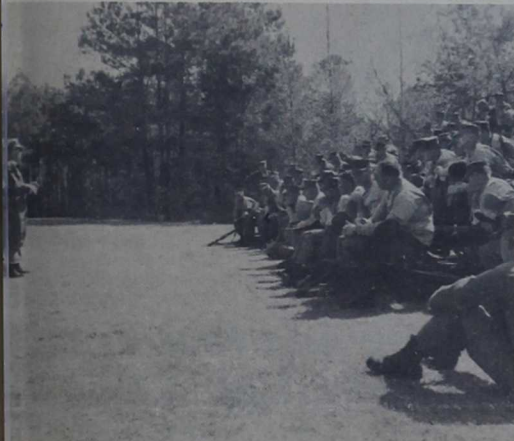
The 21st Anniversary of the Navy Relief Auxiliary on May 1 will highlight the opening of the Camp Lejeune Navy Relief Fund Drive. A goal of \$10,000 has been set for this year's Fund Drive which begins Monday, April 29 and continues through June 17. Proceeds from the Drive will be used by the local Auxiliary to provide funds for the assistance of Camp Lejeune Marine

and Navy personnel and their families in time of need. Last year the Auxiliary assisted some 1,837 in the amount of \$85,647.51. Of this amount \$9,365.44 was given as outright gratuities to assist personnel whose need was such that they could not reasonably be expected to repay a loan. Contributors to this year's fund drive, as in previous years, will receive membership cards

entitling them to receive any one of the awards to be presented at the close of the drive. Five awards will be presented this year plus a boat with motor trailer and accessories. The major awards are a 1963 Buick Riviera, a 1963 Thunderbird, a 1963 Chevy II Convertible, a 1963 Rambler Station Wagon and a 1963 Volkswagen. These awards will be presented at Goettge Memorial

Field House during the week of June 24-28. Recipients do not have to be present at the presentation. Only military personnel, retired, active or reserves, and their dependents, and civilian personnel regularly employed on the Base are eligible for membership cards and the receipt of awards. Military personnel may not conduct active solicitations for

membership from civilians off the Base. If voluntary donations are offered by any civilians, the donations may be accepted but no membership cards can be issued. Command representatives for the drive are Major M. H. Tart, Marine Corps Base; Captain J. Davis, 2d Division, Lt. Col. W. G. Timme, Force Troops, and Capt. J. L. Shanahan, Marine Corps Air Facility.

Division Rifle, Pistol Teams Tryout For Eastern Division Matches May 20-25

Marksmanship, with rifle or pistol, requires many hours of instruction, practice, and attention to details. This must be if competitors aspire to join the company of "top guns" that the Marine Corps has been famous for throughout the years.

With this in mind the 2d Marine Division has instituted a program to produce quality competitors for participation in the forthcoming Eastern Division matches to be held at the Camp Lejeune Rifle Range, May 20-25.

The Eastern Division Matches precede the Marine Corps Rifle and Pistol Team squads are selected to represent the Marine Corps in the National Matches at Camp Perry, Ohio. Marine Corps Base, Camp Lejeune will host the Marine Corps Matches this year, June 3-8.

Marine organizations of 600 or more actual male enlisted strength stationed on the East Coast are required to send at least one team to the Eastern Division Matches to compete

in the Elliott Trophy Team Match. Organizations with 600 or less Marines may enter one team in the Wirgman Trophy

North Carolina Officials Invited To Tour Lejeune

Three hundred and seventy officials, representing the North Carolina Legislature and the government have been invited to visit Camp Lejeune and Marine Corps Air Station, Cherry Point, April 30. The invitation was extended by Maj. Gen. James P. Keely, commanding general, Marine Corps Base; Maj. Gen. Derrick L. Wieseman, commanding general, 2d Marine Division; Maj. Gen. Richard Mangrum, commanding general, 2d Marine Aircraft Wing; Brig. Gen. Wood B. Kyle, commanding general, Force Troops.

The visit will include a tour of the Air Station at Cherry Point and tactical demonstrations at Bogue Field and Mileham Bay. The event of fair weather group, arriving at 10 a. m., travel to Mileham Bay where they will witness a tactical demonstration staged by the 2d Marine Division. Following lunch they will travel to Bogue Field for an aircraft demonstration. The event of inclement weather, activity will be conducted to Camp Lejeune. Coveted 'Peltier Plaque' Awarded Navy's MCB-1

U. S. Naval Mobile Battalion ONE has been awarded the Peltier Plaque for 1962, offered by The Society of American Military Engineers annually for the most outstanding performance as a military construction unit of the U. S. Navy.

The presentation ceremonies will take place in Washington, D. C.

The citation accompanying the award stated:

"The Peltier Plaque is awarded to the U. S. Naval Mobile Construction Battalion ONE for 1962 in recognition of the outstanding professional and military ability of the personnel of Mobile Construction Battalion ONE during the battalion's deployments to Antarctica and the U. S. Naval Station, Rota, Spain.

"The difficult climatic and environmental conditions overcome, ingenuity exhibited, and the standards established, displayed, and maintained by the personnel of this battalion are exemplary and have reflected great credit upon them and their organization.

"This entire effort which has won them this award for 1962

has been in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service."

The Peltier Award is a bronze medallion mounted on a plaque named for the former chief of the Civil Engineer Corps and Bureau of Yards and Docks, Rear Adm. Eugene J. Peltier.

Parade

The Navy's MCB-One will step out smartly before Maj. Gen. James P. Berkeley, commanding general, Marine Corps Base, Camp Lejeune, tomorrow afternoon in a full dress blue parade and review in front of the Camp Geiger NCO Club. Music for the affair will be provided by the Force Troops Drum and Bugle Corps.

Regularly stationed at Davisville, R. I., the battalion arrived at Camp Lejeune March 15 to undergo six weeks of advanced infantry training. The unit will climax their training program with a field exercise in cooperation with a battalion of the 2d Marine Division next week.

High And Low To Perform Weekly Drill

The Marine Barracks, 8th and "I" Streets, S. E. Wash., D. C., will open its 1963 weekly parade season Friday, May 24. In addition, evening ceremonies will be held at the Marine Corps Memorial in Arlington each Tuesday beginning June 11.

A floodlit parade at the Marine Barracks will be held every Friday at 9 p. m., from May 24 to Sept. 27. Participating in the colorful ceremony will be the United States Marine Band, the Drum and Bugle Corps, and precision drill units in full dress uniform. The event normally lasts about one hour. Two companies of Marines, the music provided by the 1st U. S. Marine Band, and the Drum and Bugle Corps will participate in the Marine Corps Memorial ceremonies starting at 30 p. m. each Tuesday through August 27.

A short demonstration of precision drill maneuvers by the 1st Drill Platoon will highlight each ceremony. Both events are open to the public. Reserved seating is available for the Marine Barracks parade. Those desiring reservations should call the office of the Post Adjutant at: 3-1601 or 543-9400 Ext. 239 prior to noon on Fridays. Gates for reserved seating are located at 8th St., S. E. and will open at 8 p. m. each Friday.

Visitors are advised to arrive at the Barracks no later than 8:30 p. m. on parade nights, to allow adequate parking and seating time.

Snakes Make May Debut—Most Active Time Of Year

WATCH OUT—More snakes will appear in and around Camp Lejeune during the month of May than at any other time of the year. This is due to the end of the snakes' hibernation season and the fact that snakes seek shade in the summer months.

Five species of poisonous snakes inhabit this area: Rattlesnakes, copperhead, cottonmouth, water moccasin and coral snake. Last year four Camp Lejeune Marines were bitten by the first two mentioned species. Prompt medical attention saved their lives.

If bitten by one of these species, the victim should be taken at once to the nearest medical facility where antivenom is available. If this is impossible, then the standard incision and suction method

should be used.

Rattlesnakes are known to lie under rocks in preferably dry, open areas, while copperheads lie the shade of logs and rocks in upland areas. Both will strike at anything which disturbs them. Moccasins, on the other hand, prefer swamps and river banks. The coral snake is a secretive burrower but is rarely encountered in this area of the United States.

Personnel are cautioned to be especially careful during the month of May when in field or wooded areas. Don't step over logs or rocks if it can be avoided.

Remember—poisonous snakes in this area will not bother you if you don't bother them—so be careful, especially during the month of May.

BLT Storms Simulated Enemy In Crete Assault

WITH THE U. S. SIXTH FLEET IN THE MEDITERRANEAN, TIMBAKION, CRETE, delayed—Elements of Battalion Landing Team 2/8 BLT 2/8, led by Lieutenant Colonel Norman R. Stanford, stormed ashore here in an operational training exercise.

Coming to the aid of a simulated friendly government whose people were threatened by an "enemy" force, BLT 2/8 was committed over the beaches at Timbakion, Crete.

The landing was preceded by a night reconnaissance of the objective areas and landing beach by elements of the 2d Reconnaissance Battalion.

At H-hour, helicopters of HMM-262 landed a reinforced company on high ground overlooking the landing beach.

Meanwhile, other Leathernecks of BLT 2/8 dashed ashore

from the familiar amtracs and LCVP's. As soon as the Marines landed they began a systematic onslaught of the beach area and their assigned objectives.

At the conclusion of the 36-hour field exercise, the Marines participated in a rigorous training schedule for the remainder of the time they were ashore.

The 2d Battalion, Reinforced, 8th Marines is in the Mediterranean area on a four-month joint operational and "goodwill" tour, as both the amphibious striking force of the U. S. Sixth Fleet and as "goodwill ambassadors" for the President's "people-to-people" program.

BLT 2/8 is embarked aboard ships of Amphibious Squadron TWO, commanded by Captain Thomas F. Howe, USN.

Students Of Staff College To View Division Exercise

More than 350 students of the Canadian Army Staff College, the Armed Forces Staff College and the Naval War College, will visit Camp Lejeune May 1, to witness a series of exercises staged by the 2d Marine Division, 2d Marine Aircraft Wing, Force Troops, FMF Atlantic, and Amphibious Squadron 8.

The exercise will include a water-borne-helicopter borne amphibious assault, squad and battalion landing team static displays and a demonstration of the Corps' SATS/SELF, Small

Airfield for Tactical Support/Short Expeditionary Landing Field.

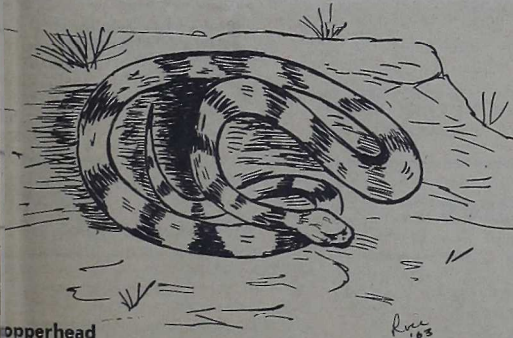
The assault landing will be staged at Onslow Beach, with six ships of the Navy's Amphibious Squadron 8 and elements of Marine aviation supporting the assault by the 2d Battalion, 2d Marines.

They will be supported additionally by heavy weapons and equipment from the 10th Marine Regiment, and from Force Troops, Atlantic.

The 2d Marine Aircraft Wing will provide close air support, and helicopter transports.

Prior to witnessing the landing at Onslow Beach, the visitors will be given a look at a typical Marine rifle squad as well as the weapons and equipment of a battalion landing team. This part of the exercise will be conducted by the 1st Battalion, 8th Marines.

Following their visit to Camp Lejeune, the group will travel to nearby Bogue Field for demonstrations of the Marine Corps' newest equipment for providing close air support. They will see high-speed jet aircraft launched from short landing fields, using equipment similar to catapults used on aircraft carriers.

Lejeune Gives 175 Pints Of Blood

The Tidewater Regional Bloodmobile visited Camp Lejeune on 11 and 12 April and received 153 pints of blood from civilians and 23 pints from military donors. A quota of 250 pints had been established.

All Onslow County residents are eligible under the program and will receive blood regardless of where they may be hospitalized and irrespective of the county in which they reside.

The next visit of the bloodmobile is scheduled for civilian donors in June 1963. Date and place will be announced later.

Officials of the Onslow County Chapter, American Red Cross, state that a quota of 250 pints per visit has been set by the Norfolk Center. After the blood usage of residents is determined, the quota may be changed. However, for the first year the chapter participates, it is on probation, and if quotas are not reached, its approval as a participant may be revoked.

Pledge cards are available in the chapter office in Jacksonville and may also be secured from the Industrial Relations Office, Marine Corps Base, Civilian employees at Camp Lejeune who were unable to donate blood last week are urged to sign up now for the June visit of the bloodmobile.

In the past three years, these categories have listed 96 fatalities, 1,091 disabling injuries, 35,232 days lost and an over-all cost of \$5,354,010. Impressive?

And, remember . . . these figures are just for military and civilian workers aboard the base. They do not represent our dependents—those night runs to the hospital for Junior, Sally or Mom.

With the arrival of summer months, your alertness to safety is of utmost importance. Summer tends to bring with it a care-free attitude, especially in our recreational habits. The water enthusiast—in, out and under the water—must be safety conscious.

The nature lovers must be alert to the dangers of snakebite, and the marksman, to the safety of firearms.

To the parents at this time comes the added responsibility of indoctrinating children to be SAFETY conscious. Although seasons as such do not dictate the need for safety, the summer months present greater danger from a wider variety of accidents.

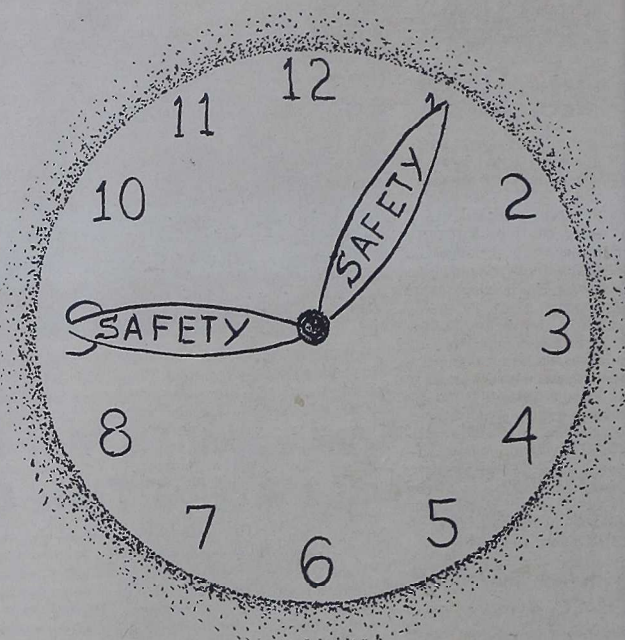

Picking up their seventeenth and eighteenth victories, 4-1 and 10-2, the Marines dropped the third game to the visitors 3-0.

An unearned run in the ninth inning, spoiled a five-hit shutout for righthander Bill Herrington as the Marines skinned the Bears 4-1 in the series opener.

Herrington, going the distance picked up his second win against a pair of losses, allowed five hits, walked one and struck out three.

Taking advantage of an error and a pair of wild pitches, the locals scored two unearned runs, one in the third and another in the sixth, with a two run rally in the fifth.

Herrington drew a base on balls to start the fifth inning, but was forced at second by outfielder Bud Simpson. Righthander Alex Bright hurled his fourth victory of the year against a single loss while teammate Hal Norton led a 10-hit, 10-2 second game win with his fourth home run of the season. The smash was a two-run blast over the left-field wall.

Bright, going five full innings before being lifted for a pinch-hitter, gave up the only Bear runs, on five hits, walked none

and struck out six.

The locals scored two in each the first, seventh and eighth innings, one in the fourth and three in the sixth.

George Howe, Lejeune third baseman, replacing Garrett, who has shifted to second for injured Dick Garcia, led the Marines at the plate with three singles in four trips, and drove in four runs.

During the third game, left-hander Gary Hinkle hurled a five-hit shutout over the locals 3-0.

The visitors touched starter and loser Ralph McIntyre for two runs in the fourth and reliever Dick Hall for a single run in the eighth.

Hinkle issued two walks and fanned seven Lejeune batters in picking up his first victory of the year against two losses.

Falling to come up with the long ball in the clutch, the Marines stranded two men at third, once with one out and again with no outs. With one away in the third inning Simpson walked and moved to third on a two-base error, but failed to score when Garrett bounced out short to first and after a walk to Norton, Hinkle struck out McClellan.

Carolina State Shatters Regular Season Opener

Knuckleballer Buck Johnson hurled a two-hit victory over Camp Lejeune, as the Wolfpack of North Carolina State spoiled the opening of the regular season for the Marines, Monday night, 11-3.

The win was State's fifth of the year against one loss and left Lejeune at 18-9 for the year.

Johnson, who carried a respectful 0.59 earned run average into Monday's game, gave up a single and a double, walked five and struck out seven Lejeune batters.

Putting a damper on the big righthander's bid for a no-hitter was a fourth-inning double by rightfielder Bill Westendick which also drove in two runs to eliminate the threat of a shutout. The final Lejeune hit was a one-out single to leftfield by leftfielder Bud Simpson in the eighth frame.

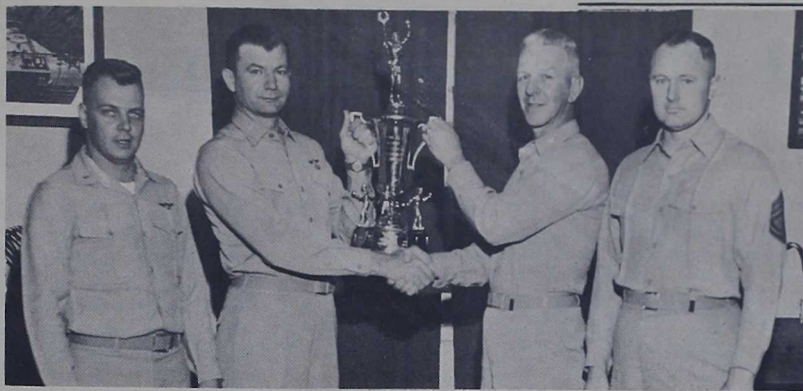

Latest Cage Rules May Extend Play

A new ruling by the National Basketball Rules Committee may prolong basketball games 12 to 15 minutes next season.

Under the new rule the clock will be stopped on every touch of an official's whistle.

Cliff Fagan, secretary of the rules committee, said the rule is designed to prevent intentional stalling to run out the clock, and also to allow for more substitutions.

Also, the committee passed a rule that makes a defensive player guilty of a personal foul for forcing a player with the ball out of bounds.

Under past rules, the offensive player was merely given the ball to throw in from out of bounds.

Other rules put into effect by the committee are: No official's timeout will be taken for correction or adjustment of a player's wearing apparel. Officials will be required to hand the ball for the throw-in after any violation, not just in the forecourt as under the previous rules.

Technical fouls will be called for having more than five players of one team on the court; when a player who has fouled out or has otherwise been ejected is discovered back in the game and if a player has changed his uniform number during the game.

Biggest Ever

A squad of 372 athletes, the largest contingent ever to represent the United States in international competition on foreign soil, will carry the American colors in the Pan-American Games at Sao Paulo, Brazil.

During the Pan-Am competition, scheduled for April 20-May 5, the American team of 279 men and 93 women will participate in 21 sports events.

All-Mar Keg Tournament Draws Near

Camp Lejeune keggers are eligible to participate in the All-Marine Bowling Championships scheduled for May 9, 10 and 11.

All male and female Marines are qualified to compete providing they carry a 165 average, men, or 135, women. Those without current league averages may establish them by rolling three games prior to May 7. The bowler, rolling for an average, must notify the attendant at the lanes, and have him verify the score.

Each player will bowl six games on each of the tourney's three days. The three highest total pinfalls and three highest single games for both men and women will be forwarded to Headquarters Marine Corps. Comparison with scores from other posts and stations will determine winners.

Tournament play will be governed by the rules of the American Bowling Congress.

All keggers are required to turn in their scores and verifications to their parent Special Services Unit.

Scores being forwarded for comparison must be postmarked no later than May 13.

Among the thousands of dollars worth of athletic and recreational gear, available to Marines in the Regiment, is enough equipment to stock 24 softball diamonds. And softball is just one of the sports members of the Regiment have at their disposal through their Special Services Section.

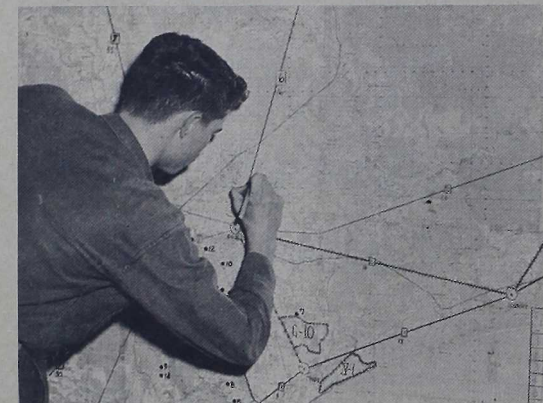

Language School Offers Twenty-Four Languages

Would you like to speak an exotic foreign language, such as Hindustani, Laotian, Malayan, or one of the many "Old-World" languages, for

example, Arabic, Greek, or Serbo-Croatian?

The latest word from Headquarters, Marine Corps is that there will be about 140 quotas open for the Language School at the U. S. Army Presidio, Monterey, Calif., during Fiscal Year 1964. The quotas for Fiscal Year 1963 are filled.

The prerequisites for this school are; a GCT of 110 or higher, four years active duty remaining upon reporting to the school and attain a minimum score of 18 on the Army Language Aptitude Test. Also, be a native born U. S. citizen, including spouse, and have no information in service records which would preclude granting Top Secret Security Clearance.

Schooling will be available in the following languages: Arabic, Burmese, Chinese, Czech, French, German, Greek, Hindustani, Indonesian, Italian, Japanese, Korean, Kurdish, Laotian, Malayan, Persian, Polish, Portuguese, Russian, Serbo-Croatian, Spanish, Thai, Turkish, and Vietnamese. Applicants may list three of the preceding languages in order of preference for consideration for assignment by Headquarters Marine Corps.

No guarantee of assignment to training in a particular language will be made. Applicants will be assigned for training in the language for which they are best qualified in accordance with their GCT and the score obtained on the Army Language Aptitude Test.

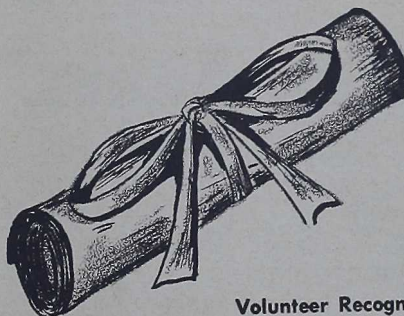

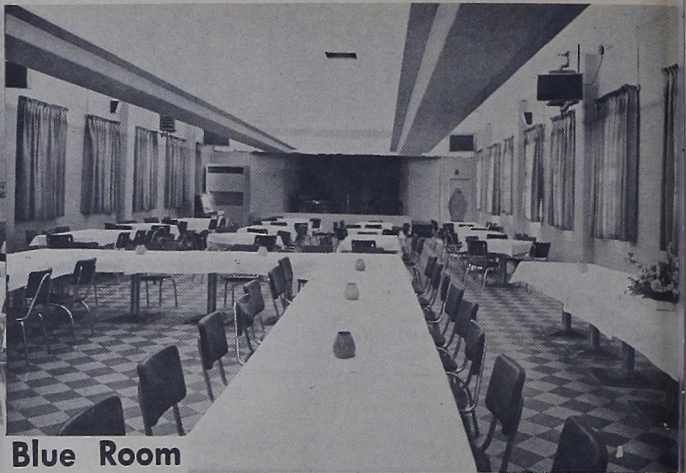

2d AmTracs Hit 96.2% Of Rifle Requalifications

Members of 2d Amphibian Tractor Battalion, Force Troops, have again proven themselves to be exemplary Marines by attaining a 96.2% rifle requalification rate this far this year. Out of 393 men firing, 378 have qualified; leaving 282 AmTrackers yet to fire.

One man from each of the three companies has fired a 238 in vying for top individual honors. The high shooting Marines are 1st Lt. Cliff E. Delano, H&S Co., Sgt. Robert W. Antley, "A" Co., and Gy-Sgt. Robert P. Foster of "B" Co.

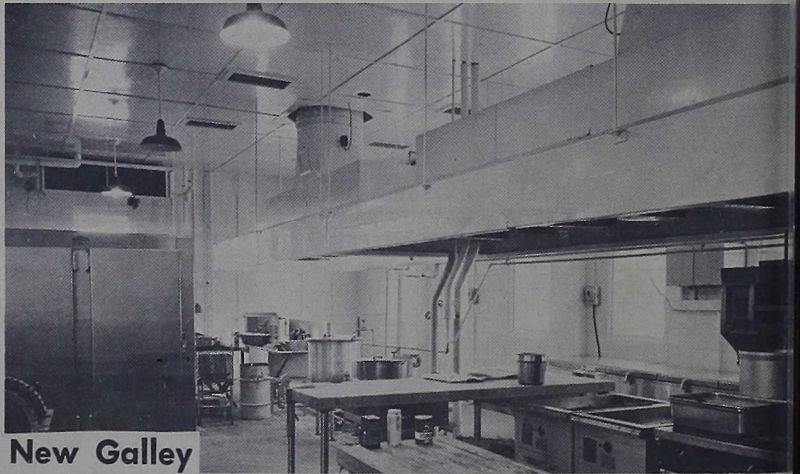
AmTracs who ended up with an 85.68% requalification rate last year is striving not only to better this mark, but to take "top honors" in Force Troops annual requalification competition.

guidance of Captain William H. Baker, aided by the technical assistance and professional knowledge of MGySgt. William B. Aycock, the AmTrackers have been instilled with the "spirit of Marine marksmanship."

The success of their program has been attributed to several means. Among them are the command control and close supervision during the oneweek snapping-in period, coupled with hand-picked coaches, schooling on the weapon's capabilities and limitations, and 15 to 30 minute periods of exercise prior to firing each morning.

Although seven Force Troops units have hit the 100% mark, these figures represent only a part of the overall picture. The only two units, other than AmTracs who have fired over 100 men are 8th Engineer Battalion, who fired 151 with 139 qualifying for a 92.6% and 8th Motor Transport Battalion, who fired 104 persons with 96 qualifying for a 92.3%.

The overall Force Troops average at this time is 777 qualified out of 823 fired for a 94.4%.

Various organizations of the 2d Marine Division sent teams to the Eastern Division tryout, conducted under the guidance of Captain George J. Lattimore, officer in charge, Division Rifle and Pistol Team. Since April 1, when 125 members of the 2d Division reported to the Rifle Range for marksmanship instruction, about 25 have dropped out for lack of necessary qualifications. The final cut of tryouts will be on April 17 when the "squad" will be reduced to 85 competitors.

Captain Lattimore, in a conference with the team captains of the various units, determines who will be entered in the matches. Some of the qualities evaluated in making the final selection of competitors

are attitude, scores attained in the two weeks of firing, the ability to endure the stress of stiff competition and a deep-rooted "will to win".

Producing capable marksmanship is no haphazard affair. A training schedule is drawn up which includes instruction in the fundamentals of marksmanship, sling adjustments, positions, sight alignment, safety, range procedures, care and cleaning, and a period on mental conditioning, and other subjects pertaining to good marksmanship.

All instruction is conducted under the close supervision of experienced competitors of past years, who in most cases are distinguished with both the rifle and the pistol. Their wealth of wisdom in the "shooting game" is available to the new competitor with visions of one day becoming the proud owner of the Distinguished Rifle or Pistol Medal--maybe both.
