DOD Studies **Medical Aids** For Retirees

WASHINGTON--A joint study group headed by Rear Adm. Wil-liam N. New has been named by Assistant Secretary of De-fense, Manpower, Norman S. Paul to evaluate health and medical benefits for retired uiltary personnel. Defense Department, Army, Navy, Marine Corps, and Air Force personnel have been named to the study group. In-vited also are members of the Coast Guard, the commissioned corps of the Public Health Ser-vice, and the Coast and Geodetic Survey not under DOD control. The study is being made be-feause of the great importance retired personnel place on se-lecting permanent retirement homes near military medical actilites.

the use of facilities for active duty personnel authorized medical care, The study group will examine current health plan trends, It is charged with the responsi-bility of developing several al-ternate solutions for Secretary of Defense McNamara's final consideration. Men from AmTracs and TOPO scouted New River shores and located likely landing sites. Surveyors led by Sgt. D. C. Long are now making a hydro-graphic survey using a row-boat and a fathometer, sonic depth recorder. They will make recordings that will disclose the type of bot om, i. e., rocky, sandy, etc. and the slope of the approaches leading to shore. Their usual method of making a hydrographic survey is by utilizing a DUKW, amphibious truck. In this case, however, they are using a rowooat be-cause of shallow water. The hydrographic survey is scheduled to take approximately three months.

Wet-Bulb Globe Temperature Stations will be placed into operation May 1 through Sept. 30 to provide information and instructions necessary to regu-

late training so as to lower heat casualties with a minimum loss of training.

The Wet-Bub Globe Tem-perature Index, WBGT, com-blnes shade air temperature, radiation, humidity and wind into a single value to be used as a guide for controlling train-tar.

The reading is obtained by

observing three instruments and multiplying each reading by a known factor. The results are then totaled to obtain the index.

the Index. Training programs at Camp Lejeane are planned pro-visionally on the basis of the WBGT index. Three WBGT stations are located at Lejeune and operate from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. Snakes Make May Debut-**Most Active Time Of Year**

WATCH OUT----More snakes will appear in and around Camp Lejeune during the month of May than at any other time of the year. This is due to the end of the snakes' hibernation season and the fact that snakes seek shade in the summer months. Five species of polsonous snakes inbabit this area: Pattla-

Five species of polsonous snakes inhabit this area: Rattle-snakes, copperhead, cotton-mouth, water moccasin and coral snake. Last year four Camp Lejeune Marines were bitten by the first two men-tioned species. Prompt metical attention saved their lives. If bitten by one of these species, the victim should be taken at once to the nearest medical facility where anti-venom is available. If this is impossible, then the standard incision and suction method

BLT Storms Simulated Enemy In Crete Assault

WITH THE U.S. SIXTH FLEET IN THE MEDITER RANEAN, TIMBAKION, CRETE, delayed,--Elements of Battalion Landing Team 2/8 BLT 2/8, led by Lleutenant Colonel Norman R. Stanford, stormed ashore here in an operational training exercise. Coming to the aid of a simu-tated friendly government whose people were threatened by an "enemy" force, BLT 2/8 was committed over the beaches at Timbakion, Crete. The landling was preceded by a night reconnaissance of the objective areas and landing beach by elements of the 2d reconaissance Battalion.

At H-hour, helicopters of HMM-262 landed a reinforced company on high ground over-looking the landing beach. Meanwhile, other Leather-necks of BT 2/8 dashed ashore

from the familiar amtrac's and LCVP's. As soon as the Ma-rines landed they began a systematic onslaught of the beach area and their assigned objectives. At the conclusion of the 36-hour field exercise, the Ma-rines participated in a rigorous training schedule for the re-mainder of the time they were ashore.

Hazard Awareness Is Key To Safety

Safety, according to Merriam-Webster, is a condition of being safe; freedom from danger or hazard.

When you use this noun, are you merely muttering a word, or you merely ou use this noun, are you merely muttering a word, or do you really use this word as a basic idea for action . . . for your own use, as well as others?

Facts and figures can be tossed at you all day long. Usually they are just a statistic, just a figure ... to you. Only if that figure rep-resents a person near or dear to you do you feel the impact and meaning of the word SAFETY!

Here, these statistics fall into five categories: vehicles, government and private; training, rec-reation; industrial and miscellaneous.

In the past three years, these categories have listed 96 fatalities, 1,091 disabling injuries, 35,232 days lost and an over-all cost of \$5,354,010. Impressive?

And, remember . . . these fig-ures are just for military and ci-vilian workers aboard the base. They do not represent our depend-ents—those night runs to the hos-pital for Junior, Sally or Mom.

With the arrival of summer months, your alertness to safety is of utmost importance. Sum-mer tends to bring with it a care-free attitude, especially in our recreational habits. The water en-thusiast—in, out and under the water—must be safety conscious.

The nature lovers must be alert to the dangers of snakebite, and the marksman, to the safety of firearms

To the parents at this time comes the added responsibility of indoctrinating children to be SAFETY conscious. Although sea-sons as such do not dictate the need for safety, the summer months present greater danger from a wider variety of accidents.

School is out and time is of essence. Getting the most out of the day is the desire of all chil-dren. Tell them of the dangers. Give them instructions. Warn them of snakes, poor bicycling habits, swimming carelessness, and playing in the streets. Don't let them become a statistic them become a statistic.

And don't become a STATIS-TIC yourself.
