

Marines, was awarded the Navy Cross Medal here recently for extraordinary heroism while serving as a wireman with the 1st Division in Korea in October 1952. Maj. Gen. G. F. Good Jr., 2nd Division commander, made the presentation.

Now a wire team leader, Sergeant Roy is cited as bearing the

brunt of an enemy attack to protect his wounded comrades inside a concrete bunker.

Roy placed himself at the key placed nimself at the bunker's aperture and, though painfully wounded by grenade fragments, killed an estimated dozen attackers before his am-munition ran out. He feigned death during an enemy inspection of the area.

Though the area was still under the bunker and, though twice wounded by direct enemy fire, chanced upon a box of grenades, which he hurled at the foe until the supply was exhausted. Only then did he race to friendly lines to seek aid for the men trapped in hostile territory.

# Brakes Applied On Navy Diverts Cherry Point, CL Funds

The Navy Department last week indefinitely postponed \$3,721,416 worth of construction at Cherry Point and Camp Lejeune in keeping with the current economy drive.

worth of construction at Cherry Point and Camp Lejeune in keeping with the current economy drive. The Camp Lejeune projects deferred included all improvements at Peterfield Point Marine Corps Air Facility, family quarters that were to have been erected at a cost of \$78,375 and a theater and chapel for \$185,000. The Navy Department said the living quarters were essential but the funds were required for more urgent projects. It also announced that the theater-chapel project had been reduced in scope to provide only a post exchange.

Projects totaling \$3,458,041 were held up at Cherry Point, including a transport finishing hanger at \$2,134,000, a turbine engine test cell at \$553,850, and air intercept training facilities at \$770,191.



# Lt. Guy C. Packard Given Bronze Star For Korean Action

First Lt. Guy C. Packard, Camp Geiger's provost marshal, was awarded the Bronze Star Medal for "heroic achievement in connection with operations against the enemy in Korea" during informal cere-monies last week. Col. Earl S. Pi-per, commanding officer of 2nd Combat Service Group, made the presentation.

Lieutenant Packard was in command of a tank company that was operating in front of the main line of resistance last April when one of his tanks became disabled by severe enemy fire. He dismounted from the command tank and moved through heavy enemy fire to attach a towing cable to the disabled tank. The tank was then towed to a place of comparative safety.

The training is similar to that received at Camp Pendleton, Calif., by recruit graduates of the MCRD, San Diego, Calif.



Irom an airplane?

It sounds impossible but it happened in Korea a couple of years ago, according to 1st Lt. R. A. Hudman, commanding officer of Force Troops' 2nd Air Delivery Platoon. He should know, since he was operations chief of the platoon that did it.

The unprecedented air drop occurred when the 1st Division was surrounded by Chinese Communists at the Chosin Reservoir during the first winter of the Korean War.

The only road leading from the reservoir to the sea had been literally blown off the side of a mountain and the problem of getting the wounded out in the 24 degrees-below-zero weather was a serious one. Dropping a bridge was the best solution.

#### 800-Foot Drop

Lieutenant Hudman, a technical sergeant at the time, says that eight sections of M-2 Tredway bridge, each 18 feet in length and weighing about 2500 pounds, were dropped from an altitude of 800 feet to the engineers of the Divi-

sion.

This was the first time a drop of this type was successfully completed, according to the lieutenant, and it later was credited with saving hundreds of Marines.

Lieutenant Hudman has had a lot of parachuting experience but the bridge drop was one of the most satisfying moments of his career.

#### First A DI

After enlisting in the Marines in 1938, he served as a drill instructor at San Diego before being assigned to parachute school. At the beginning of World War II, he went to Guadalcanal with the 1st Provisional Airborne Resupply Unit

# Improved Destroyer Joins Soviet Fleet, Says Swedish Navy

Stockholm, Sweden (AFPS) — A new type of destroyer has been added to the Soviet Baltic fleet, according to a Swedish naval source. Four ships of the so-called Skory type already have been commissioned. Photographs of the new craft have been taken at sea. It is reported to be an improvement over previous models because of its better seagoing qualities and its 36-knot speed.

The new destroyer is reported by equipped with reconnaissance and range-finding radar. Its armament is believed to consist of four 13-centimeter guns in two turrets, two 7.6-centimeter anti-aircraft guns, seven 37-mm automatic guns and eight 53-centimeter torpedo tubes in quadruple sets,

# 'Recon' Men At Underwater **Demolition Training School**

A potent new aid in amphibious operations soon will be added to the repertoire of Force Troops' 2nd Amphibious Reconnaissance Co., as two officers and four men left Saturday for a three-month Underwater Demolition Team training course at St. Thomas Island.

The six, all volunteers, are Second Lieutenants Charles E. Lloyd and William L. Owens, Staff Sergeants Bobby L. Blankenship and Robert L. Stephens, and Pfc's Raymond J. Gorham and Philip R. Adams.

They already have completed two weeks' preliminary training in the use of the aqua-lung at the Navy's huge submarine tank at New London, Conn., as well as participating in a UDT maneuver off the coast of Connecticut.

Before going to New London they had to pass the stiff physical and mental examinations normally re-quired of a deep sea diver.

At St. Thomas the trainees will take part in regularly scheduled

UDT exercises. They will under-go rigorous underwater swim-ming training and receive de-tailed instruction in the use of underwater demolitions. The course also will include actual ascents and decents to and from a submerged submarine.

One of the final tests in UDT training is a one-mile underwater swim over a marked course.

Capt. R. L. Trevin, commanding officer of the company, foresees many potential uses for the training the prospective UDT graduates will bring back with them.

According to the captain, one of the most important will be the enabling of a reconnaissance team to disembark from a submerged submarine, swim to the beach, complete its mission, and return, all without being detected.

Using the present method, the submarine must surface in order to launch the teams in rubber boats.

The helicopter pilot, Capt. John E. Dunphy, had his "chopper's" landing gear torn off when an engine failure forced him to make an emergency landing in a rice paddy.
