For Armed Forces

Secretary of Defense Charles E. Wilson, in his first press conference, came out for trimming mili-tay manpower and expenditures and opposed the eight-percent pay increase recommended for the Armed Forces by the Truman Administration.

Secretary Wilson said he had instructed the heads of the three services to report what would be the result of cutting arms spending by some ten per cent, believing cuts could be made without weakening combat effectiveness.

His reference, says the "Navy Times," was probably directed at excess clerical, supply and other administrative jobs. He also said draft calls would be lowered if pos-sible.


Drive Till April 11 For Division, FT

Maj. Barker Ends Commandant | Quarter Century Lejeune's Par Iwo Memorial Of Active Duty

Major Lloyd F. Barker, recent motor transport officer for the 2nd Combat Service Group, retired this week from the Marine Corps after 26 years of "very" active duty. He was retired because of physical disability.

disability. "Back in 1927," says Major Barker, "when I went to Parris Island as a private, I thought I had picked the best outfit in the country. What I thought then, I know for a fact now." In 1937 Maj. Barker was aboard the USS New York when it made its famous coronation cruise. He marched passed Westminister Ab-bey, as a corporal, in honor of King George VI. Commissioned At the old "Tent Camp" located

Commissioned At the old "Tent Camp" located on the New River here, Major Bark-er was commissioned a warrant of-ficer in 1942 days before sailing for Guadalcanal. Attached to the 1st Pioneer Bn., 1st Marine Division Barker was wounded by shrapnel while fighting on Guadalcanal.

Later he fought at Bougain-ville, and returned to the States in 1944 as first lieutenant. Again, in June of 1945, Barker sailed, this time for Okinawa. After the

Rabies Inoculation Deadline April 25; Quarantine Comina

All dogs or cats within Lejeune's geographical limits must be inoc-ulated against rabies by April 25. From April 26 to May 8 there will be a strict leash quarantine of all dogs and cats and during this period owners must keep their pets confined, tied, or on a leash. All dogs and cats plus those not yet registered must be re-register-ed. Registrations will take place at the Pass and Identification Of-fice, Bldg. 50. A written certifi-cates of rabies immunization issue d between January 1 and April 25 is necessary for registration. Yongsters OK Dogs and cats meen to be im-munied against rabies until four months old, but they must be reg-istered. The Camp Provost Marshal

munical against rables until four months old, but they must be reg-istered. The Camp Provost Marshal will impound all dogs and cats not restricted during the speci-fied period. Any inquiries regard-ing impounded or missing dogs can be made at the Provost Mar-shal's office, telephone 2104. Any licensed veterinarian may give the immunization but for the convenience of all personnel a vet-erinarian will be at the Midway Park Fire Station April 21 and 22 from 2 until 4 p. m. and at Bldg. 11 April 23 during the same hours. The cost of the inoculation will be one dollar.

Sand-Sun-Surf-Swim Season Premiere Here April 24th

Bathing and recreational facili-ties at Onslow Beach will open for the summer season April 24. Mil-itary personnel, their families, and accompanying guests will be per-mitted to use the beach and fa-cilities. ID cards will be required by sentries at the Inland Waterway Bridge.

Civilian employees, their fami-Civilian employees, their fami-lies, and accompanying guests will be permitted to use the civi-lian recreational facilities. The Employee's Onslow Beach Pass, together wth some personal iden-tification such as Camp⁻ID card or Operator's Permit will be re-quired.

quired. Children under 12 years of age must be supervised by an adult. Life Guards Life guards will be on duty from 10 a. m. until sunset Tuesday through Friday and 8 a. m. until sunset Saturday, Sunday, and holi-days. Swimming outside of these hours is prohibited. It is permitted only in the beach areas protected by the life guards.

Danger is present in the strong surf and undertow that exists at Onslow and extreme caution is required of all bathers.

Swimmers are forbidden to swim beyond the point where the surf breaks, because of the danger of the presence of sharks, barraeuda, and other aggressive and dangerous fish



One dose of the globulin is produced from one pint of blood, the injection con-taining antibodies that attack the polio virus. It is estimated that about 150 American counties will be struck this coming summer by the polio epidemic, and that two million chil-dren in those areas will be exposed. The task before the public is a challenging one. Can we, with half the weapons already on hand—the Red Cross and the discovery of gam-ma globulin—raise the additional \$7,000,000 and collect the necessary blood to complete the job? It's a bit early to speak of Christmas generosity. But, perhaps, a sift now of money and blood will mean that some child may live to enjoy the electric trains and colored lights of Christmas 1953. Give that extra 10 per cent this year to fight polio the new way.





North Carolina State furnishes first competition for the Camp Le-jeune tracksters in the opening meet of the season here Saturday afternoon at 1:30.

afternoon at 1:30. Last year the Leathernecks swamped the Wolfpack 94½ to 35%, taking 11 of 15 first places and placing at least two men in scoring position in each event. The mile relay team of last year —Bainer, Shaeffer, Rivera, and White—set a new record for their event at 3:31 at the State meet.

Lack Depth

In recent time trials here, the Marines showed that they had plenty of talent in such key events as sprints and field spots, but lacked depth for team scoring. They are good for a share of firsts, but the second and third places re-main weak in most events.

The sprints and relays should provide the best show Saturday, with both teams usually strong in those events, while State will probably have the edge in distance runs.

One of Lejeune's strongest en-tries will be Frank Rivera, San Juan speedster, who copped sec-ond in the 440 and 880 against State last year and has shown im-provement early this season.

Montgomery Returns

Roger Montgomery, Colby Uni-versity trackster, also will be back to harrass Wolfpack sprinters. Montgomery took firsts in the 100 and 220-yard dashes against State last year with times of 10:01 and 22:01, respectively.

2:01, respectively. Other returning pointmakers from last year's team are Frank Womer and Bob Petro in the pole vault. Womer took first with a height of 12 feet, four and three-quarters inches while Petro tied for third place.

The State meet is the first of seven dual attractions for the Lea-ternecks, who also will compete in the Penn Relays at Philadel-phia, the Inter-Service Track and Field Championships at Fort Jack-son, and will be host to the Sixth Annual All-Marine track Cham-pionships in June.



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
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
