## Second Year's Duty Ends For Force Troops, Atlantic

### Defense Secretary Opposes Pay Raise For Armed Forces

Secretary of Defense Charles E. Wilson, in his first press conference, came out for trimming military manpower and expenditures and opposed the eight-percent pay increase recommended for the Armed Forces by the Truman Administration.

Secretary Wilson said he had instructed the heads of the three services to report what would be the result of cutting arms spending by some ten per cent, believing cuts could be made without weakening combat effectiveness.

His reference, says the "Navy Times," was probably directed at excess clerical, supply and other administrative jobs. He also said draft calls would be lowered if possible.

Yesterday had a more profound meaning to Force Troops than merely the day when folks play pranks on each other. It was their second birthday.

On April 1, 1951, Force Troops, FMF Atlantic, was officially established. Soon after its founding, Brig. Gen. Gregon A. Williams was placed at its head.

Under General Williams, Force Troops matured into a well-organized command consisting of 18 units including Headquarters Co., Force Troops; 2nd Anglico; 2nd 90 mm AAA Gun Bn.; 2nd AAA Automatic Weapons Bn.; 8th Engineer Bn.; 8th Motor Transport Bn.; 2nd Provisional Marine Aggressor Co.; 8th Signal Operations Bn.;

2nd Amphibious Reconnaissance Co.; 2nd Amphibian Truck Bn.; 2nd Amphibian Tractor Bn.; 2nd Armored Amphibian Bn.; 2nd Combat Service Group; 2nd 155 mm Gun Bn.; 2nd 4.5 Rocket Battery; 8th Tank Bn.; 2nd Preventive Medicine; and 1st 75 mm AAA Training Battery.

Recently, General Williams departed from Force Troops to assume the duty of Inspector-General of the Marine Corps, being replaced by Col. C. J. O'Donnell.

Camp Geiger is the home of Force Troops. Within the last two years, the former Tent Camp has undergone many renovations and it is now divided into two areas, each of which has its own movie theater and Post Exchange.

Camp Geiger now is composed of quonset huts and neatly constructed white brick buildings which billet all Force Troops units except 8th Tank Bn., situated at Hadnot Point, and 2nd Amphibian Tractor Bn. and 2nd Armored Amphibian Bn., both at Courthouse Bay.

### OK FOR PROMOTION

Headquarters Marine Corps has announced that the period in which second lieutenants are eligible for promotion commences the first day of the officer's nineteenth month of service. Under Alman 7-52, this date is computed from date of rank.

### Div. Assault Puts Enemy In Retreat

The Caribbean-trained Leathernecks of the 2nd Marine Division were "taking five" this week after battling their way through the largest peacetime amphibious assault ever staged on America's east coast.

All roads led to Hadnot Point Sunday evening as the sun-tanned division Marines trucked and trooped in from the field, leaving a badly mauled aggressor force retreating inland.

The problem was continued after the troops were secured in a command post exercise by staff officers and umpires who traced the "enemy's" demise on a theoretical level.

### Never In Doubt

Though the division was faced by an atomic bomb-wielding aggressor, the issue never was in doubt after the combat-garbed Marines followed up Friday night probing attacks in company strength with a full-scale amphibious assault landing on Onslow Beach at 8:30 Saturday morning.

As wave after wave of Leatherneck-loaded landing craft hit the beaches under clear blue skies, jets and propeller-driven aircraft of the 2nd and 3rd Marine Air Wings roared overhead, tangling with enemy planes and strafing aggressor positions.

Plunging across the Inland Waterway, the 6th Marines drove di-

It has been pointed out that over one-third of all donations collected throughout the United States this year will be used for assisting military personnel.

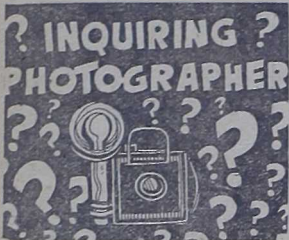

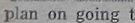




What Significance Does This Easter Have For You?

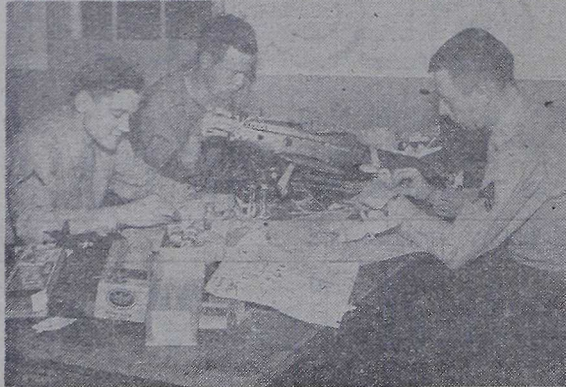


**PFC BERNIE INSCO, HQ., 1ST BN., 10TH MARINES—**

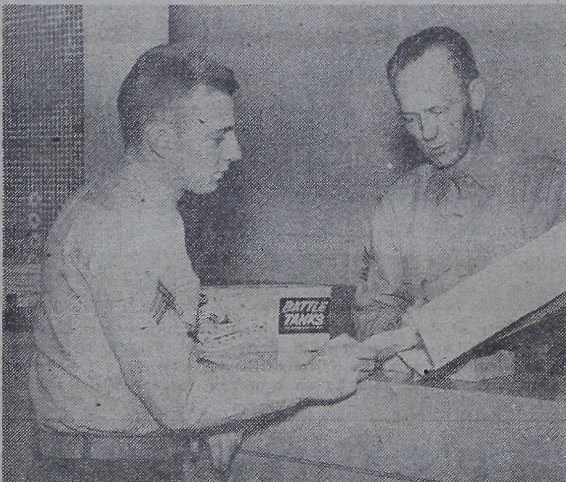

A profit on idle hours and spare time can be had at the recently established Montford Point Hobby Shop, now in operation. Tools and material are there and need only the men to use them.

Located in Bldg. 622 on "D" Street, off Harlem Drive, the shop affords excellent facilities and conditions.

Open hours for the shop are: Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays, from 6 p. m. to 9:30 p. m., and Saturdays from 1 p. m. to 4:30 p. m. The uniform of the day, utility, or civilian clothing may be worn at the shop.

**On Loan Basis**  
Numerous hand and model working tools are available on a day-to-day loan basis for use in the shop. Model kits and a great variety of hobby materials can be obtained at considerable savings.

Here are just a few of the projects for which tools and kits are on hand at the shop.

**Leathercraft:** Designs and patterns, many types of leather and leather kits, a large assortment of tooling and designing tools, and catalogs to choose items for special purposes.

**Brushing Up**  
Arts: Special beginner's kits with which the average person can accomplish acceptable oil paintings. If sufficient interest is shown in the art work, a class in oil or other art media will be started.

**Display Models:** A variety including miniature cars, ships, and model planes may be purchased, plus the necessary paint and brushes to decorate them.

**Powered Model Airplanes:** More than a dozen gasoline-powered model planes now are in construction stages at the shop with the number growing each week. **Maj. Barker Ends Quarter Century Of Active Duty**

Major Lloyd F. Barker, recent motor transport officer for the 2nd Combat Service Group, retired this week from the Marine Corps after 26 years of "very" active duty. He was retired because of physical disability.

"Back in 1927," says Major Barker, "when I went to Parris Island as a private, I thought I had picked the best outfit in the country. What I thought then, I know for a fact now."

In 1937 Maj. Barker was aboard the USS New York when it made its famous coronation cruise. He marched passed Westminster Abbey, as a corporal, in honor of King George VI.

**Commissioned**  
At the old "Tent Camp" located on the New River here, Major Barker was commissioned a warrant officer in 1942 days before sailing for Guadalcanal. Attached to the 1st Pioneer Bn., 1st Marine Division Barker was wounded by shrapnel while fighting on Guadalcanal.

Later he fought at Bougainville, and returned to the States in 1944 as first lieutenant. Again, in June of 1945, Barker sailed, this time for Okinawa. After the



campaign there he went to China and returned to Lejeune in 1946 as a captain.

After serving as post motor transport officer at Quantico, Va., from 1948-1951, he was sent here to assume duties as MT officer for 2nd Combat Service Group.

**Serviceable Family**  
Born in Luray, Mo., Maj. Barker has a brother who is a chief warrant officer in the Navy; another brother who is a Master Sergeant in the Air Force, and still another brother who was a Lieutenant Commander in the Navy during the war.

Major Barker, his wife and two children now plan to take a trip around the country.

Effective yesterday, the services were joined under new Marine Corps Reserve Recruitment District Headquarters, located in Boston, Philadelphia, Washington, Atlanta, Orleans, Chicago, and San Francisco. Formerly, there were Reserve districts and recruiting area headquarters.

District level activities were at New York City consolidated under the new command at Boston, Los Angeles and the Reserve district headquarters are joined at the new San Francisco command.

It is estimated that, in addition to monetary savings, under the new set-up, 75 Marines have been freed for other duties while, a more efficient administration of all activities is possible.

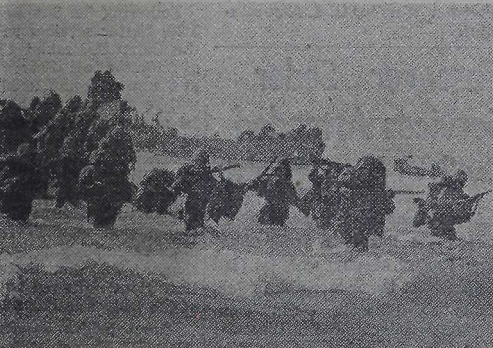

land toward the enemy's line of resistance, approximately five miles ahead of them. Moving off to the south, the 8th division drove to the New River, which they battled their amphibious tractors.

**Take Airfield**  
The 1st arm of the division's "winged amphibious and offensive hit the enemy" Saturday morning when the 1st Airborne Battalion of the 1st Air Division vertically assaulted the New River Air Facility at New River. The vital airstrip was set for defending aggressors and was destroyed.

The division's simulated atomic bombing of fire came at noon when enemy aircraft dropped an A-bomb directly over the beach. Scores of tanks, aircraft, and the bridge crossing the Inland Waterway were destroyed as the beach area was razed.

After the landing of more personnel and equipment was delayed for approximately three hours, division troops already ashore battled on the beach.

**Admiral Hails Troops**  
Praising the good discipline by the troops under a simulated atomic attack, Admiral Lynde D. McCormick, commander in chief of the Atlantic Fleet, declared that the division Leathernecks were dispersed and prepared when they dropped the A-bomb on the beach at the height of the amphibious assault.

After the troops left the field, Maj. Gen. B. Erskine, commanding general, Fleet Marine Force, Atlantic, expressed his high pleasure with the performance of all echelons.

## Sand-Sun-Surf-Swim Season Premiere Here April 24th

Bathing and recreational facilities at Onslow Beach will open for the summer season April 24. Military personnel, their families, and accompanying guests will be permitted to use the beach and facilities. ID cards will be required by sentries at the Inland Waterway Bridge.

Civilian employees, their families, and accompanying guests will be permitted to use the civilian recreational facilities. The Employee's Onslow Beach Pass, together with some personal identification such as Camp ID card or Operator's Permit will be required.

Children under 12 years of age must be supervised by an adult.

### Life Guards

Life guards will be on duty from 10 a. m. until sunset Tuesday through Friday and 8 a. m. until sunset Saturday, Sunday, and holidays. Swimming outside of these hours is prohibited. It is permitted only in the beach areas protected by the life guards.

**Danger is present in the strong surf and undertow that exists at Onslow and extreme caution is required of all bathers.**

Swimmers are forbidden to swim beyond the point where the surf breaks, because of the danger of the presence of sharks, barracuda, and other aggressive and dangerous fish.

### Clear The Beach

All persons except those quartered at the beach and those occupying beach cottages, and their guests, will be required to clear the beach no later than 9 p. m. Fishermen may remain on the beach after that time, provided they make prior arrangements with the Sergeant of the Guard in Bldg. 103 (Onslow Beach).

**Adequate care pertaining to cleanliness, sanitation, and non-interference with the pleasure of others is required of all persons. Animals, private automobiles, and beverages are not allowed on the beaches.**

The Beach Houses will be open from 10 a. m. to 30 minutes after sunset and from 8 a. m. to 30 minutes after sunset on Saturdays.

## British Marine Col. Views Amphibious Landings at Onslow

British Royal Marine Col. M. Archdall, amphibious warfare representative on the British mission to the Joint Chiefs of Staff in Washington, D. C., visited Camp Lejeune last week.

The colonel witnessed the first phase of 2nd Division maneuvers at Vieques, and was on the shore when the troops landed at Onslow Beach during the operation's second phase.

While here he visited numerous Marine Barracks activities.

During World War II, Colonel Archdall served in the Far East, Europe, and the Middle East. His first visit to the United States was in 1945, at which time he visited Camp Pendleton.

## New Officer Promotions Are Released

The Marine Corps last week announced the names of 2,941 Reserve and 468 regular officers selected for promotion.

A promotion board which convened March 2 selected 184 Reserve majors, not on active duty last September 2, for temporary promotion to lieutenant colonel.

Boards which convened February 16 selected 1163 Reserve captains, not on active duty last May 15, for temporary promotion to major, and 238 Reserve and 468 regular officers on active duty for temporary promotion to captain.

A reserve Naval Examining Board, which convened March 2, selected 651 Reserve officers for permanent promotion to first lieutenant, 536 Reserve officers for temporary promotion to first lieutenant, six Reserve officers for promotion to commissioned warrant officer, and 163 Reserve officers for advancement from pay grade W-2 to W-3.

## Rabies Inoculation Deadline April 25; Quarantine Coming

All dogs or cats within Lejeune's geographical limits must be inoculated against rabies by April 25.

From April 26 to May 8 there will be a strict leash quarantine of all dogs and cats and during this period owners must keep their pets confined, tied, or on a leash.

All dogs and cats plus those not yet registered must be re-registered. Registrations will take place at the Pass and Identification Office, Bldg. 50. A written certificate of rabies immunization issued between January 1 and April 25 is necessary for registration.

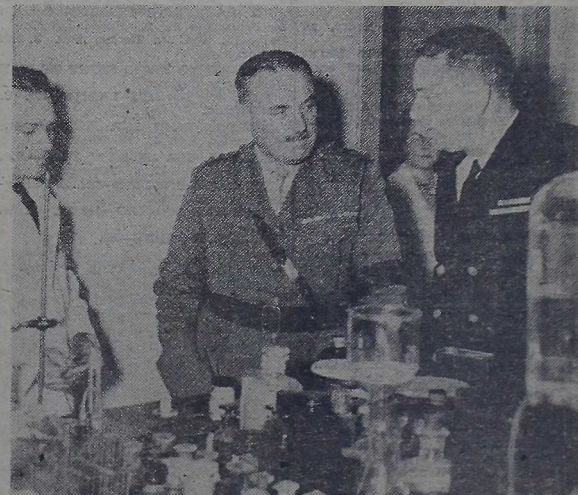
### Youngsters OK

Dogs and cats needn't be immunized against rabies until four months old, but they must be registered.

**The Camp Provost Marshal will impound all dogs and cats not restricted during the specified period. Any inquiries regarding impounded or missing dogs can be made at the Provost Marshal's office, telephone 2104.**

Any licensed veterinarian may give the immunization but for the convenience of all personnel a veterinarian will be at the Midway Park Fire Station April 21 and 22 from 2 until 4 p. m. and at Bldg. 11 April 23 during the same hours. The cost of the inoculation will be one dollar.

### TO FIGHT THE CRIPPLER

This year it will take an additional \$7,000,000 in the Red Cross fund goal to expand its blood collection facilities for providing the maximum amount of gamma globulin to fight poliomyelitis. One dose of the globulin is produced from one pint of blood, the injection containing antibodies that attack the polio virus.

It is estimated that about 150 American counties will be struck this coming summer by the polio epidemic, and that two million children in those areas will be exposed.

The task before the public is a challenging one. Can we, with half the weapons already on hand—the Red Cross and the discovery of gamma globulin—raise the additional \$7,000,000 and collect the necessary blood to complete the job?

It's a bit early to speak of Christmas generosity. But, perhaps, a gift now of money and blood will mean that some child may live to enjoy the electric trains and colored lights of Christmas 1953.

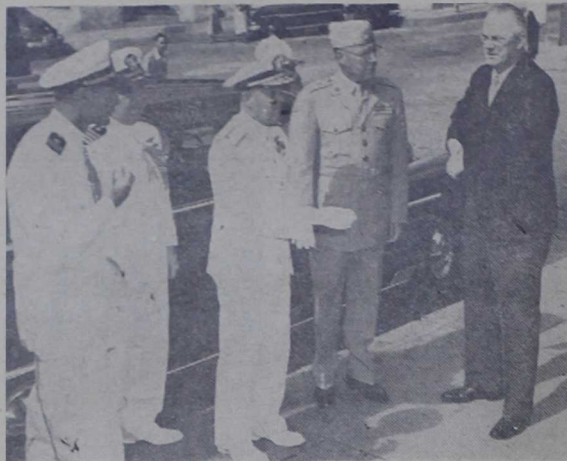

#### THE OPEN TOMB

The gloom and despair that grew out of the tragedy that took place on Calvary when Christ was crucified vanished before the break of day on the first Easter Sunday. But in the hearts and minds of the disciples and the few followers who remained steadfast in their faith, there had been sorrow, despair, and perhaps much doubt.

In the hours that intervened between the crucifixion and the resurrection, Christianity hung in the balance.

With the first rays of light that brightened the world on its first Easter Sunday there came a message of good news. Where there had been fear in the hearts of men there was now courage and strength. Hope replaced doubt. The Master's promise had been fulfilled. Now there was a new message for all who followed after Christ.

#### Had Been Spared

We who today live in the Christian family have been spared the agony of suffering through the seemingly endless hours that followed the crucifixion. We have received the good news of the resurrection of the Lord as the climax to the story of the tragedy of Calvary. Our faith was not forced to undergo the severe test as was that of the first disciples.

To them, it seemed as though the cross on Calvary marked the end, but it was only a momentary pause. Whereas the symbol of Christianity is a cross to tell of the suffering, death, and sacrifice of the Son of God, the most significant symbol of Christianity is the open tomb.

The open tomb carries with it the story of an unconquerable Spirit. It reveals a message of hope. It tells of a new life. It demonstrates the power and majesty of God.—Chaplain Glynn A. Oglesby, Marine Barracks (Midway Park).

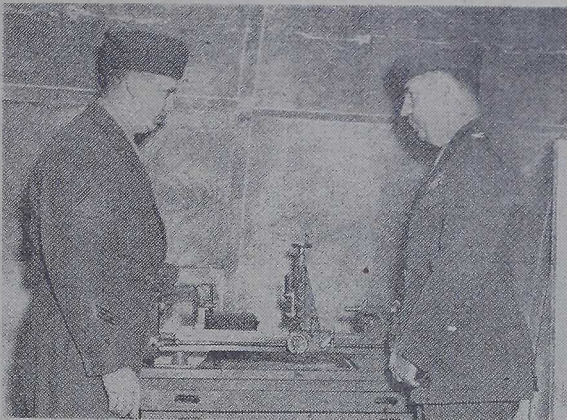

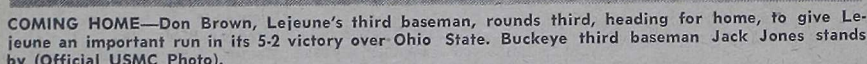

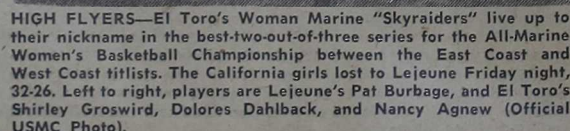

## Schedule Formed For Southeastern Shoots Next Week

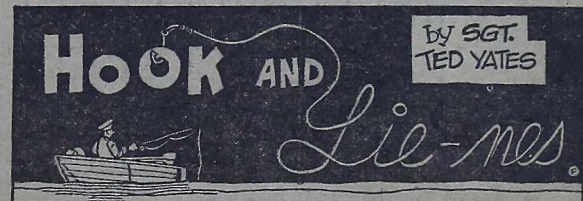

The staff of the institute will include publisher Henry Lyman of the "Salt Water Sportsman," Boston, Mass.; George Fichter, editor of "The Fisherman," Oxford, Ohio; specialists from the U. S. Fish & Wildlife Service, and the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission; and salt-water fishing experts such as Ted Henson, Southeastern casting champion.

There is only one drawback. Enrollment is limited to 48. If you are interested, a prospectus and application form may be obtained from Division of College Extensions, Box 5125, State College Station, Raleigh, N. C.

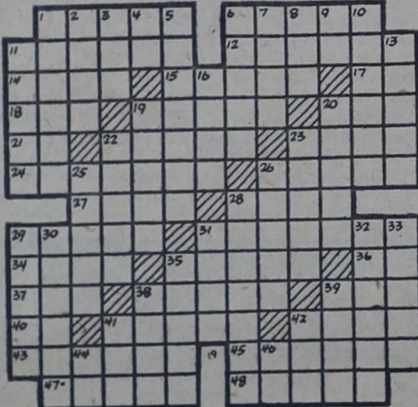

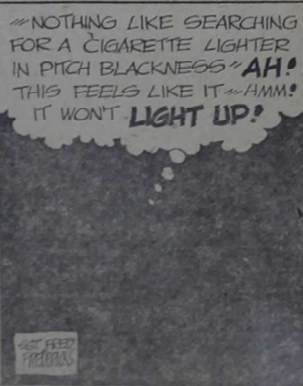
