

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

The 3rd Bn., 2nd Marines (re-inforced) returned to the United States and Camp Lejeune last week after completing one of the most interesting and colorful six-month fours of duty since the Mediter-ranean cruises were initiated in 1948.

Last fall the battalion, serving aboard ships of th. U. S. Fleet, participated in two of the North Atlantic Treaty or granization's biggest displays of might, "Exercise Mainbrace" and "Exercise Longstep."

The "Mainbrace" operation in September, involving eight NATO nations, was the largest peacetime joint-naval exercise in world history and culminated in the landing of almost 2000 Lejeune Leathernecks on the Jutland peninsula of Denmark.

In Mediterranean "Exercise Longstep," the largest peacetime Allied maneuvers ever held in the Mediterranean, involved 170 ships and 500 planes of six NATO nations. It ended with the amphibious landing of Marines, Greek Raiders, and French and Italian Commandos on the shores of Turkey.

In this exercise the Lejeune Marines had the honor of being the first United States troops to participate in this first joint amphibious maneuvers conducted by NATO.

While in the Mediterranean the reinforced battalion also made a shakedown landing on the island of Sardinia and later returned therefor five days of live-firing problems.






