Deadline Nears For Disabled Veterans' **Vocational Program**

Veterans of World War II with service-connected disabilities who may need four years to complete vocational rehabilitation training under Public Law 16 will have to start that training before July 25, 1952, according to an announcement by Ernest Elliott of the New Bern VA Office.

The original law for vocational rehabilitation of veterans of World War II stipulates that no training may be given after July 25, 1956.
Veterans with service-connected disability can begin training after July 25, 1952, but courses must be completed before the 1956 dead-line.

Such training is furnished at Government expense when a veteran has received a disability as a result of his active military service requiring special training to overcome his handicap and restore him to employability.

Blood Donors Drop Count To 24-Week

Blood collections sank to a 24-week low in the Armed Forces Blood Donor Program during the week ending June 22, the American Red Cross and the Department of Defense announced today.

During the forty-first week of the campaign, June 16-22, donations totalled 52,456 pints. This represents a drop of 3,298 pints from the previous week's collections. Prenous Jow point in the drive was he week ending January 6, 1952 when 21,884 pints were donated.

8th Quota Failure

The present tabulation marks the eighth consecutive time the Program has failed to meet the weekly quota of 75,000 pints of whole blood, established at the start of he campaign, September 10, 1951.

Of the 52,455 pints collected during the week, the American Red Iross and cooperating blood banks armed Forces Blood Donor Centontributed 41,804 pints and the ers collected 10,651 pints.

Over 215 Million Fints.

Since the start of the drive, 2,355,954 pints of whole blood have been donated to fill current needs of the Armed Forces and to build pullitary stocks of plasma and ther derivatives.

The all-time high in blood collections for the Armed Forces Blood Donor Program was reacted during the week ending December 2,951, when 87,487 pints were donated.

His latest project? Teaching a Highland version of "The Marines Hymn" to a dubious group of fellow bag-squeezers from a near-by Scottish unit.



"FIRE PREVENTION DISCIPLINE"

The Commanding General has been justly proud of the record established by members of this command in fire prevention discipline. During the landings of November 1951 and again in June 1951, the fire discipline of the landing forces was outstanding; it clearly demonstrated that each officer and noncommissioned officer as well as each private had been instructed properly in fire prevention discipline, since not a single serious fire occurred during the movement and maneuvering ashore. He looks to the leadership of the individual for success in field fire prevention.

On 30 June, 1952 a serious field fire occurred which burned out an area of 2500 or more acres of valuable timberland in "L" area. It probably will never be determined whether or not the setting of this fire was malicious or carcless. We do know, however, that failing to properly appreciate the discipline acquired as a member of a fire prevention team, some members of this Camp became thoughtless and simply ignored the training that had been received. The individual, whoever he might be, should feel justly proud of his accomplishment; some 200 brother marines employing bulldozers and special fire fighting equipment worked some 15,600 man hours before their efforts were rewarded with success. It took four to five days to bring this condagnation under control. This ruined an otherwise perfect fire prevention control effort participated in by some 50,000 military and civilian men and their families.

If there is any difference between the several services, we of the Marine Cocps believe it to be in discipline. From the days of our recruit training we have accepted discipline in its basic form and have acquired Personal Discipline as a result of the military discipline taught us at our training camps.

The tossing of lightled cigarettes or matches from moving automo-

The tossing of lighted eigarettes or matches from moving automobiles, trucks, etc., is a thoughtless and undisciplined demonstration of forgetfulness which invites disaster. It bespeaks of very bad and very poor discipline.

The dryness of our shrubbery, bushes, etc., along our roads because of the present drought will, unless we retain our personal discipline, and unless the leadership is present, cause many more such fixes as recently occurred in area "L".

The Commanding General has the right to demand that more positive action be taken, that constant instruction be given, and that an appeal be made to all members of all commands to resort to "Personal Discipline" in an effort to avoid future field or forest fires.

Assistant Secretary of Defense Anna Rosenberg has suggested to a Senate Subcommittee that active duty and Ready Reserve duty be subdivided on an overall basis of

a Senate Subcommittee that active duty and Ready Reserve duty be subdivided on an overall basis of six years.

This means an increase in Ready Reserve time over those limits passed by the House in the Armed Forces Reserve Act.

The House-passed version would require inductees entering the service on or after June 19, 1951 to serve three years in the Ready (active) Reserve before entering the Standby Reserve. If they elected to remain on active duty for four years they could bypass the Ready Reserve and enter the Standbys directly.

Enlistees who were under 26 at the time of enlistment after June 19, 1951 who serve four years on active duty will also go directly into the Standby component. Those who serve less than four years on active duty will have to serve in the Ready Reserve for four years, suggests Mrs. Rosenberg.

Her suggestion would make the entire active duty-Ready Reserve service a six year proposition. Inductees would serve four years in the Ready units after their two years on active duty.

Enlistees would be required to serve two years in the Ready Reserve service are their four year enlistment expires and three-year enlistees would have to serve three years in the Reserves would be those enlistees or inductees who complete five years of active duty.



WAVES (the name originally meant Women Appointed for Voluntary Emergency Service) entered the Navy in 1942 when Congress authorized the commissioning and enlistment of women in the U. S. Naval Reserve. In 1948 they became a permanent part of the Navy by Congressional action. Today 28 of the Navy's 62 enlisted ratings are open to WAVES. During WWII more than 79,000 WAVES performed 450 different jobs in 900 continental shore activities.
