

DETAILS OF HOUSING POLICY

The Commandant of the Marine Corps has released what will be a w policy in on and off-station housing. Action upon it has been taken Camp Lejeune and will affect Marines and elvillans living in Midway k and Trailer Park. Below, verbatim, is GEN, C. B. CATES' LET-R on the situation. 1. Reference (a) is quoted herewish for the information of all permel at Camp Lejeune:
"From: Commandant of the Marine Corps
To: Distribution List
Subj: Allocation of rental housing
1. Considerable quantities of rental housing, both on and off-station ave been, or are being built for the benefit of personnel at many Mane Corps stations. Besides controlling the rental list for on-station ousing, Commanders, by agreement with landlords, have succeeded in any instances in obtaining control of off-station rental lists. Station ommanders have allocated available controlled housing according to requirements of local situations.
2. In furtherance of this type of allocation, it is directed as a matter policy, in order to satisfy as much as possible the needs of the ranks, at the lower rental housing be allocated to the groups of military and willing personnel with the lower income, and that each allocation conder the "group ability" to pay prevailing gross rental for each type of ousing.

a. Past allocation have rarely taken into consideration the needs of onnel in the lower four pay-grades. It is considered that as controling neutral "housing (such as Title VIII housing) becomes available, non-commissioned officers, warrant officers, commissioned officers well-paid civilians should be moved out of "low rental" housing is refused, personnel should be denied eligi-y for access to controlled units.
4. The specific allocation should be determined by station Comdets according to the relative supply and "ability to pay", at each ton.

 While it is recognized that many individuals will plead "hard-ship" under the terms of this policy, it must be remembered that many marines not eligible for controlled "low-cost" housing under present allocations are suffering from high rents and sub-standard conditions. C. B. CATES"
 In compliance with the Commandant's above quoted directive, effective immediately the rental housing at Camp Lejeune will be allocated as follows:
 A. Enlisted Personnel—(1) Enlisted personnel of the rank of Sergeant and below tincluding corresponding ranks of other Services attached) will be assigned to units at Pine Grove Trailer Park and Midway Park. (2) Enlisted personnel of Staff rank (including corresponding ranks of other Services attached) will be assigned to units at Tarawa Terrace and to New River apartments within their quota.
 C. Officers- Commissioned officers will be assigned to specifically designated officers' units at Tarawa Terrace and to New River Apartments within their quota.
 C. Officers- Commissioned officers' units at Tarawa Terrace.

 D. Civilians employees of Camp activities will be furnished housing at New River Apartments. Civilians employed in priority positions earning a gross income of \$3,900.00 or more per year will be assigned units at Tarawa Terrace.

Staff Non-Commissioned Officers (corresponding ranks of other services) in occupancy at Trailer Park are informed that they should mmediately file an application for Tarawa Terrace in the event they have not previously done so. Personnel in this category who fail to file in application within 15 days, or who, upon notification that a unit is sivailable, refuse to accept, will be required to vacate Trailer Park with 15 days.

Officers, Warrant Officers, Staff NCOs and civilians no longer slightle for Midway Park will not, at this time, be forced to transfer to ther housing. In keeping with the intent and purpose of the Command-nit's directive and the policy established by this memorandum, those affected are requested to avail themselves of the housing allocated to them, and thus make way for those less able to pay the higher rentals. Only by such cooperation can the policy of "relative supply and ability to pay" be successful at Camp Lejeune. 7. 
