The spot on this article cannot be removed by the usual method of cleaning. Application of a stronger solution will probably take the coloring out of the garment and the Manager of the Cleaning & Pressing Shop hesitates in doing this without the customer's approval.

You may have received one of these small chits recently from your Camp Exchange Cleaning & Pressing Shop. It has been a known fact that 80% of spots can be removed from clothing, but that other 20% still remains to be a problem.

You can make it a lot easier for the cleaner to remove clothing spots by telling the counter-clerk or routeman the nature of the stain, thus making it easier to remove, as well as affording a prevention from ruining the fabric. The nature of the spot if known, determines the process of cleaning it, without ruining the fabric. To have the spot removed before cleaning is another method of preventing fabric ruining. If the fabric is cleaned before the removal of the stain, the heat used in drying the fabric, the continuous wearing or from hanging over a long period of time, or certain chemicals such as alkalies, will all contribute considerably to the development that it is very tenacious and often impossible to remove.

Three troublesome stains in the 20% group are the tannin, the nail polish and nail polish remover, and the corrosion of metal cloth. In the tannin group we have all the soft

Holiday Leave Periods Are Announced Act Now

With the resease of Division Memorandum number 180, and Camp Memorandum number 223 a policy regarding leave during the holiday periods has been establish-

ed.

For Commanding Officers of units of the Second Marine Division, the Division Memorandum authorizers them to grant leave to enlisted personnel of their command not in excess of fifty-percent of the actual strength of the unit including those personnel on reenlistment's recruit, or emergency leave

leave.

No. officer or man will be granted leave in excess of leave credits due him nor will excess leave be requested to take this holiday leave.

In view of limitations on public transportation to and from Camp Lejeune the departure of men leave and their return therefrom must be staggered. Accordingly two leave groups are established as follows:

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A DEPLORABLE RECORD WE SHOULD BE ASHAMED

According to Headquarters Marine Corps the Marines have a pretty deplorable motor vehicle accident record. Its a sorry situation when the Marines who have always had an enviable record in peace and in war besmirch their gallant pages with careless killings on the Highways.

During the fiscal year of 1949, 68 Marines were killed as a result of motor vehicle accidents, on and off military reservations. Of those Marines who were killed, 57 were killed in automobiles, 5 were killed on motorcycles, and 6 were pedestrains; 7 of the accidents involved government vehicles, and 61 accidents involved privately owned vehicles.

Since 1947 the Marine Corps Motor Vehicle death rate unknown cases and per 100,000 population has jumped from 49 to 78. In fact compared with civilian figures it is more than three and a seals on Christmas Cards and letters mailed during December is compared. Alarming but true. It is obvious that we need to take corrective action.

Another comparison has been made between the motor vehicle accident rate by state with the rate of the Marine Corps. This comparison, on the basis of 100,000 population, shows the highest rate to be 68.3 for the state of Nevada as compared with the rate of 78 for the Marine Corps.

It can be seen that the death rate of the Marine Corps exceeedingly higher than the national civilian avarage and the highest figure reported for cities, and somewhat higher than the highest figure reported by state.

Approximately 90% of the Marine Corps fatalities resulted from accidents involving non-military vehicles. This certainly indicates that the majority of fatal accidents happen while our Marines are off duty and travelling the high-

ways to distant liberty points.

It's about time for all Marine drivers to to take stock of their driving ability and also the mechanical condition of the car they drive, in an endeavor to eliminate this needless waste

Let's conserve our energies for war on the battlefield not slaughter on the highways.

It seems especially appropriate that in the Chaplain's column this week, we call attention to the sale of Christmas seals at Camp Lejeune for 1949. I know that all hands will be interested in the statement of the County Chairman, which follows, and will make every effort to purchase as many of these seals as possible this season.

"Christmas Seals for 1949, the proceeds from which will go toward the fight against tuberculosis, will be available to enlisted personnel from booths in the Main Post Exchange and Building No. 1 on December 17th and on the 221st and 22nd, according to Rod Jones, Chairman of the 1949 Seal Sale for Onslow Tuberculosis Association."
"Proceeds from the sale of Christmas Seals this year will to defray expenses of a mass X-ray survey which will be conducted in the County during April of next year."

"While military personnel and their dependents will not be eligible for free X-rays during the survey, medical advice is that the survey, will prove of untold benefit to the military since it will be a means of detecting active cases with which servicemen and their families might come in contact in their daily activities."

Foodhandlers for restaurants, drug stores, and groceries and other persons holding health cards are examined for tuberculosis by the Onslow Health Department, but the mass survey will reach into the homes of the county and discover unknown cases to the benefit of all.

The traditional use of Christmas Cards and Christmas Cards and

Seals on Caristmas Cards and letters mailed during December is a popular American custom and gives the purchaser some concrete evidence of his participation in a worthwhile national project to wipe out a common enemy.

"Chairman Jones stated that the Board of Directors of the Onslow Tuberculosis Association appreciated the opportunity to provide servicemen with Seals and appreciated the wonderful cooperation that is always exhibited by the military personnel in similar projects, Letters carrying seals have been mailed out to residents of the county. Chairman Jones stated, and already funds are beginning to come into the office. Every seal bought and used will be a help toward eradicating tuberculosis."

They also, being third class mail, must not contain personal messages, Unsealed cards will not be given directory service, nor will they be returned to the sender. It is advisable to send your cards by first class mail (3c), insuring safe delivery and directory service.

Valuable Art Collection On Display In Lobby Of Camp Lejeune Naval Hospital

One of the finest, and probably largest, art collections in Onslow County is on display in the main lobby of the U. S. Naval Hospital. 



The Budget Bureau today seeks either an end, or drastic curtail-ment, of free or bargain-basement medical care for families of serv-icemen.

Budget Director Frank Pace. Budget Director Frank Pace, writing to Defense Secretary Louis Johnson, said the cheap medical aid should be curtailed because recent military pay raises brought wages to a status comparable with that of Federal employees, who do not get free medical care.

The Defense Department estimates more than 2,000,000 persons are now receiving this care throughout the nation.

At the moment, dependents of servicemen pay \$1.75 a day for hospitalization, but the cost of maintaining a hospital room is said to be \$13 per day.

Mr. Pace estimated his plan not only would save the nation millions, but would help ease the shortage of doctors and dentists in the service.



Under provisions of the Career Compensation Act of 1949 certain enlisted persons whose dependents are receiving family allowances are entitled to include the contribution of the Government to family allowance are entitled to include the contribution of the Government family allowance payments. Any provision of law which, on the date of enactment of this Act, entitled any person to receive pay or other monetary benefit, and which is directly repealed, implied repealed, or amended by the provisions of this Act, shall, if the entitlement of such person to such pay or other monetary benefits is saved by the provisions of this Act, be continued in full force and effect for such entitlement and for such time entitlement may exist. In general, if the total compensation to which a member is entitled on 30 September, 1949, computed at monthly rates exceeds the total compensation Act of 1949 computed at monthly rates, he will continue to receive under the Career Compensation Act of 1949 computed at monthly rates, he will continue to receive the former pay and allowances termed as save pay, under laws in effect occuration restrictions and limitations.

In general, the right of a member to save any item of pay and

In general, the right of a member to save any item of pay and or allowances will cease upon the failure of such member to qualify, for any reason, to receive such item. Further, the right of the meber to receive saved pay will cease whenever he becomes entitled to receive total compensation under the Career Compensation Act of 1949 in excess of the amount of saved pay to which he is entitled.

Enlisted persons who were discharged prior to 1 October and who reenlist or extend effective on or after 1 October are not entitled to family allowance benefits for their dependents.

A change of the members pay status which operates to terminate the right to save pay (as, for example, if the member is absent without leave for 24 hours or more) discontinues saved family allowance after 1 October, 1949.

2. Never attempt to press the garment, as the heat of the iron will develop the stain.

3. Don't let the article hang in the closet too long, as stain develops with age.

4. Your cleaner is unjustly accussed sometimes of staining your clothes, which is untrue. The heat brings out the stain, which then cannot be removed without ruining the fabric. Inform the cleaner of the presence of the stain before it is cleaned, and save headaches for everyone concerned.

The nail polish and nail polish remover group presents a large problem. Most polish removers ruin the fabric and all attempts to remove the stain become futile. Thus do not attempt the removal of nail polish from a fabric with the use of nail polish remover. It may not only remove the nail polish, but will also probably remove the fabric. Use no home remedies with these stains, send them to the cleaners.

It is the business of your cleaner to remove stains, home remedies cause needless trouble. Impatience is also futile, cooperation between the customer and the cleaner is the ultimate desire.
