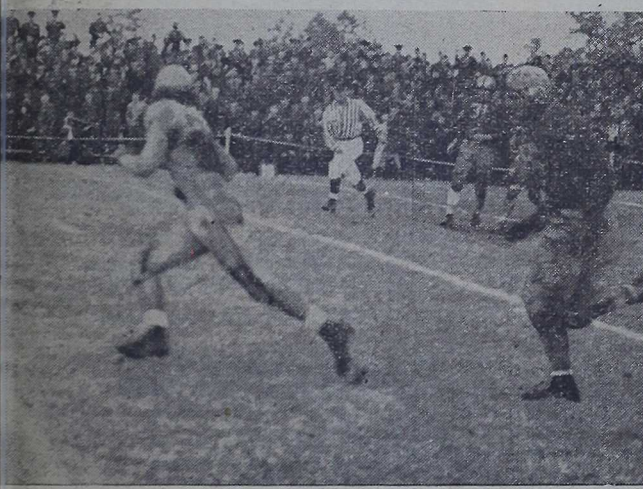

Cleaning, Press Shop  
Request Customer Help

The spot on this article cannot be removed by the usual method of cleaning. Application of a stronger solution will probably take the coloring out of the garment and the Manager of the Cleaning & Pressing Shop hesitates in doing this without the customer's approval.

You may have received one of these small chits recently from your Camp Exchange Cleaning & Pressing Shop. It has been a known fact that 80% of spots can be removed from clothing, but that other 20% still remains to be a problem.

You can make it a lot easier for the cleaner to remove clothing spots by telling the counter-clerk or routeman the nature of the stain, thus making it easier to remove, as well as affording a prevention from ruining the fabric. The nature of the spot if known, determines the process of cleaning it, without ruining the fabric. To have the spot removed before cleaning is another method of preventing fabric ruining. If the fabric is cleaned before the removal of the stain, the heat used in drying the fabric, the continuous wearing or from hanging over a long period of time, or certain chemicals such as alkalis, will all contribute considerably to the development that it is very tenacious and often impossible to remove.

Three troublesome stains in the 20% group are the tannin, the nail polish and nail polish remover, and the corrosion of metal cloth. In the tannin group we have all the soft

How Family Allowances May Be Lost  
Under 1949 Career Compensation Act

Personnel receiving family allowances should read the following explanation of certain provisions of the Career Compensation Act of 1949, which may or may not effect the pay of some personnel:

Holiday Leave Periods  
Are Announced Act Now

With the release of Division Memorandum number 180, and Camp Memorandum number 223 a policy regarding leave during the holiday periods has been established.

For Commanding Officers of units of the Second Marine Division, the Division Memorandum authorizes them to grant leave to enlisted personnel of their command not in excess of fifty-percent of the actual strength of the unit including those personnel on reenlistment's recruit, or emergency leave.

No officer or man will be granted leave in excess of leave credits due him nor will excess leave be requested to take this holiday leave.

In view of limitations on public transportation to and from Camp Lejeune the departure of men leave and their return therefrom must be staggered. Accordingly two leave groups are established as follows:

GROUP ABLE

Sixth Marines; Second Engineer Bn; Headquarters Bn; Second Service Bn; Second Motor Transport Bn; Second Signal Bn; Second Shore Party Bn, and the Second Medical Bn.

GROUP BAKER

Second Marines; Tenth Marines; Second Combat Service Group; Second Weapons Bn; Second Weapons Bn; Second Tank Bn; 1st 90mm Gun Bn; Amphibian Tractor Co, and Anglico.

Group Able: 0800 17Dec49 to

Section 515 (a) of public law 351 is quoted in part as follows:

"No member serving on active duty on the effective date of this Act shall, prior to July 1, 1952, and while serving on continuous active duty, including for the purpose of such continuous active duty service in a reenlistment entered into within three months from the date of last discharge, suffer any reduction by reason of this Act in the total compensation which he is entitled to receive under any provision of law in effect on the day immediately preceding such effective date."

A portion of Section 515 (b) of public law 351 is quoted in part as follows:

"That in the case of any enlisted person on active duty on the effective date of this Act whose total compensation, not including travel and transportation allowances, per diem and station allowances, pay of court stenographers of the Army, and Air Force, enlistment allowance, or reenlistment bonuses, but including the amount of the Government's contribution to such member's dependents under the Servicemen's Dependents Allowance Act of 1942, as amended, on the day immediately preceding the effective date of this Act, (SEE ALLOWANCES PAGE 8)

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## A DEPLORABLE RECORD WE SHOULD BE ASHAMED

According to Headquarters Marine Corps the Marines have a pretty deplorable motor vehicle accident record. Its a sorry situation when the Marines who have always had an enviable record in peace and in war besmirch their gallant pages with careless killings on the Highways.

During the fiscal year of 1949, 68 Marines were killed as a result of motor vehicle accidents, on and off military reservations. Of those Marines who were killed, 57 were killed in automobiles, 5 were killed on motorcycles, and 6 were pedestrians; 7 of the accidents involved government vehicles, and 61 accidents involved privately owned vehicles.

Since 1947 the Marine Corps Motor Vehicle death rate per 100,000 population has jumped from 49 to 78. In fact compared with civilian figures it is more than three and a half times that of the national civilian average. Alarming but true. It is obvious that we need to take corrective action.

Another comparison has been made between the motor vehicle accident rate by state with the rate of the Marine Corps. This comparison, on the basis of 100,000 population, shows the highest rate to be 68.3 for the state of Nevada as compared with the rate of 78 for the Marine Corps.

It can be seen that the death rate of the Marine Corps is exceedingly higher than the national civilian average and the highest figure reported for cities, and somewhat higher than the highest figure reported by state.

Approximately 90% of the Marine Corps fatalities resulted from accidents involving non-military vehicles. This certainly indicates that the majority of fatal accidents happen while our Marines are off duty and travelling the highways to distant liberty points.

It's about time for all Marine drivers to to take stock of their driving ability and also the mechanical condition of the car they drive, in an endeavor to eliminate this needless waste of life.

Let's conserve our energies for war on the battlefield not slaughter on the highways.

## Chaplain's Corner

Perhaps the true spirit of Christmas has never been more truly portrayed than in the Christmas Seal Program whereby in the spirit of the Christ Child and the Great Physician of Galilee a program has been established these many years to bring about the defeat of the dread disease of tuberculosis. It seems especially appropriate that in the Chaplain's column this week, we call attention to the sale of Christmas seals at Camp Lejeune for 1949. I know that all hands will be interested in the statement of the County Chairman, which follows, and will make every effort to purchase as many of these seals as possible this season.

"Christmas Seals for 1949, the proceeds from which will go toward the fight against tuberculosis, will be available to enlisted personnel from booths in the Main Post Exchange and Building No. 1 on December 17th and on the 22nd and 22nd, according to Rod Jones, Chairman of the 1949 Seal Sale for Onslow Tuberculosis Association."

"Proceeds from the sale of Christmas Seals this year will to defray expenses of a mass X-ray survey which will be conducted in the County during April of next year."

"While military personnel and their dependents will not be eligible for free X-rays during the survey, medical advice is that the survey will prove of untold benefit to the military since it will be a means of detecting active cases with which servicemen and their families might come in contact in their daily activities."

Foodhandlers for restaurants, drug stores, and groceries and other persons holding health cards are examined for tuberculosis by the Onslow Health Department, but the mass survey will reach into the homes of the county and discover unknown cases to the benefit of all.

The traditional use of Christmas Seals on Christmas Cards and letters mailed during December is a popular American custom and gives the purchaser some concrete evidence of his participation in a worthwhile national project to wipe out a common enemy.

"Chairman Jones stated that the Board of Directors of the Onslow Tuberculosis Association appreciated the opportunity to provide servicemen with Seals and appreciated the wonderful cooperation that is always exhibited by the military personnel in similar projects. Letters carrying seals have been mailed out to residents of the county. Chairman Jones stated, and already funds are beginning to come into the office. Every seal bought and used will be a help toward eradicating tuberculosis."

Postal Officials Warn Of New Xmas Card Rate

Postage rates have increased from 1½¢ to 2¢ for mailing unsealed Christmas cards. They also, being third class mail, must not contain personal messages. Unsealed cards will not be given directory service, nor will they be returned to the sender. It is advisable to send your cards by first class mail (3¢), insuring safe delivery and directory service.

Address your envelopes plainly and completely. Give the full name, house number, street, name of city, zone number, and State. Also don't forget to write your return address on the envelope. Affix your stamps correctly. The Postmaster said return addresses on Christmas cards has the warm approval of the highest authorities on etiquette, because it helps friends keep their address book up-to-date. It is also insurance against loss.

Mail early. Don't wait until the peak of the Christmas rush to send your greeting cards. For out-of-state delivery, mail by December 15.

Valuable Art Collection On Display In Lobby Of Camp Lejeune Naval Hospital

One of the finest, and probably largest, art collections in Onslow County is on display in the main lobby of the U. S. Naval Hospital. ## Budget Bureau Seek To End Or Cut Medical Aid

The Budget Bureau today seeks either an end, or drastic curtailment, of free or bargain-basement medical care for families of servicemen.

Budget Director Frank Pace, writing to Defense Secretary Louis Johnson, said the cheap medical aid should be curtailed because recent military pay raises brought wages to a status comparable with that of Federal employees, who do not get free medical care.

The Defense Department estimates more than 2,000,000 persons are now receiving this care throughout the nation.

At the moment, dependents of servicemen pay \$1.75 a day for hospitalization, but the cost of maintaining a hospital room is said to be \$13 per day.

Mr. Pace estimated his plan not only would save the nation millions, but would help ease the shortage of doctors and dentists in the service.

Mr. Johnson disclosed he has had a "management committee" working on the question for some time, but that the committee has made no recommendations.

The above is furnished in order that the employees at this Station may be cautioned against making irresponsible charges which they do not have facts to substantiate.

#### PROOF OF CORRECT BIRTHDATE

It has been noted from the records of the Industrial Relations Office that some employees have submitted or claimed more than one date as their birthdate. It is essential that the correct birthdate is desired, and in the State of North Carolina it may be obtained from the Registrar of Deeds of the County in which the employee was born. This is especially true of all employees born since 1913. Those born prior to 1913 may still obtain a delayed certified copy of their birthdate from the Registrar of Deeds by submitting to the Registrar of Deeds the family bible in which the birthdate was recorded. Also such other information as affidavits of persons who actually knew when the employee was born. Other proof is acceptable such as insurance papers, deeds of land, and records which include the birthdates concerned. If you have received a letter from the Industrial Relations Office pertaining to the above a certified copy of your birthdate should be submitted if possible, if not other proof of your correct birthdate as mentioned above will be acceptable.

While a patient here at the hospital, Newsome has made good use of the library, recreation rooms, and Craft Shop. He's been making model reefs for Christmas presents.


The Chief has been in two other hospitals, Bethesda, and St. Albans, and says that though smaller, ours here at Camp Lejeune ranks right on top in comparison.
