DAVE SHARPE The power laden Troopers of Fort Bragg unleashed a lethal ground attack last Sunday and combined it with the deadly passes of Roger Mendivill to beat the Marines of Camp Lejeune, 28-0. An estimated crowd of 8,000 fans, the majority of them Marines, saw Bragg work their way to a score in the initial four minutes of play, and continue to hold the high cards for the rest of the game.

With turf-tearing Bo Schriener battering the center of Lejeune's line and Roger Mendivill keeping the Lejeune secondary on their toes with passes, they capitalized on Le-jeune's case of fumbleilis and took swift advantage of every break.
