No — don't stop when you've read this far. WHAT COMES AFTER IS MEANT FOR YOU. Read it—and digest it. If only one sentence sinks home and remains in YOUR mind—and if YOU think of it next time YOU'RE driving—YOU may save one more figure from being added to this total.

ALWAYS be alert! Let nothing distract your attention from your job of driving.

ALWAYS remain a sufficient distance behind the car in front of you to be able to stop safely.

BE on the alert at night for identification lights of trucks and buses. These indicate the presence of a large, slow-moving vehicle.

BE careful when pulling your car away from the curb. It is not always possible to see, even with the aid of your mirror, cars approaching from the rear.

DO not fail to obey Caution and Stop Signs. They are placed there for your protection.

IF your car starts to skid, keep it in gear and turn the front wheels in the direction of the skid.

KEEP your windshield clean. A dirty windshield is especially hazardous at sun-down and at night.

NEVER over drive your headlights at night. A good rule is to drive two-thirds as fast by night as you do by day. A good motto: "Sun-down—slow down."

CKBONE OF THE CORPS—THE RIFLE RANGE
subject in the spotlight for this week will be the Lejeune Rifle Range. Located in the proximity of Perry, the range accommodates thousands of Marines while they attempt to qualify or compete in various rifle and pistol accommodations.

Any of you who have recently reported to Camp Lejeune "boot" camp or other Marine "rest camps," might be in the week's activities at the range for the shooter. Day afternoon . . . Arrive at range and square gear, raw shooting jackets and scorebooks. Usually retire to barracks and play cards or listen to the radio. Sunday morning (5:30 a.m.) reveille and roll call. Chow in the mess hall. Incidentally, the chow here is excellent. You may not agree with this statement, but it's true. The best that can be provided with the facilities and the messhall crew have to work with. From the messhall, you assemble in front of the barracks and back to the range area. You are assigned a relay and back to the barracks. The rest of the day is yours. Commences at 1200.

Monday . . . A majority of the fellows snap in for the position all day Sunday. Comic books are dangerous in the barracks. You can never tell when a "buddy" will conk you. You can read it himself. Lots of literature is a good thing along when you're travelling to the range.

Tuesday . . . reveille (same time as above), roll call, chow, and you're on your way to the first day of firing. . . . Shooting targets. The relays fire in whatever sequence the orders come on, while the other relays pull their targets. The first in is the first order of the day. After all relays have fired, the lines are policed, butts are secured, and back to barracks you go. Usually build targets in the p.m.

Wednesday . . . same as Monday. Thursday . . . same as Monday and Tuesday practically. No changes here and there but I don't want to ruin the whole "vacation" for you.

Friday . . . preliminary day for the M-1 shooters and day for the carbine. Usually have the afternoon off cleaning your rifle, getting scorebook up to date, etc. Get ready early and get ready for big day.

Saturday . . . Record day . . . After firing for record in the morning, you police the lines, butts, and clean your gear. Go to chow, square the barracks away, and prepare to return to the range.

The week spent at the range isn't an easy one. Early reveille, hard work in the butts, squeezing 'em off, and cleaning. But the range is the backbone of the Corps. . . the Marine Corps has always produced the greatest marksmen on the planet and the Camp Lejeune Rifle Range is here to see that it continues to do so.

Lejeune Pistol Team Victorious In Pennsylvania State Matches

Both First And Second Teams Take One First Place; Individuals Win Twenty Awards

The Camp Lejeune Pistol Team continued their string of impressive wins over civilian and service aggregations last week by copping 20 medals and a decisive victory over 50 teams in the recent Pennsylvania State Pistol Matches held at Harrisburg, Pa.

The first team, composed of WO. Robert C. McIntyre; CWO. H. Cleghorne; Sgt. R. Nielson; and TSgt. John A. Fowler, compiled 1,092 points in the Expert Team Match, Center Fire, to win first place honors. The second team aggregated 1,055 in the same match to take fourth place.

The second team, composed of SSgt. C. H. Walker; Cpl. D. N. Berna; SSgt. Floyd Hafer; and SSgt. A. R. Redmond took top honors in the Expert Team Match, 22 caliber, with a combined score of 1,094. The first team collected 1,069 points to take second place honors.

Warrant Officer McIntyre, team captain, fired 1,970 out of a possible 2,100 in two days of firing to lead the field of competitive shooters.

In the individual matches, the eight members of the team won 20 awards consisting of three

panels, four gold medals, four silver medals, and eight bronze medals. Sergeant Fowler, distinguished rifle and pistol expert from the 10th Marines, collected eight of the 20 awards.

The competition at this match consisted of some of the top military, state police, local police, and civilian teams located in the Middle-Eastern portion of the United States.

LtCol. W. A. Lee, Officer in Charge of the Camp Lejeune Rifle Range, was present to congratulate the shooters on their return from Harrisburg.

LEJEUNE BOASTS TOP MILITARY SHOOTERS

Since Camp Lejeune's Pistol Team has been organized for the current year, they have proved a worthy opponent in the various service and civilian competitions held at Camp Lejeune and cities throughout the United States.

CWO. H. Cleghorne, 2d Battalion, 10th Marines, and SSgt. Floyd Hafer, 1stAAAABn., Courthouse Bay, represented the Camp Lejeune Pistol Team in the North Carolina Fall Pistol Matches at Durham, N. C., in September and collected 16 medals for their shooting prowess.

Mr. Cleghorne fired the 22, .38, and the .45 caliber pistols in the Durham matches, to win nine medals with a total score of 2,348 in the Grand Aggregate.

Sergeant Hafer, transferred to Camp Lejeune from Parris Island last month, proved a worthy member of the Lejeune Pistol Team by copping seven medals in the Durham Matches. Like Mr. Cleghorne, he is a distinguished rifle and pistol expert.

Warrant Officer McIntyre, holder of more than 500 shooting medals, while serving as team captain and coach, won the recent Southeastern Division Pistol Matches held at Camp Lejeune. Mr. McIntyre ranks with the best military and civilian shooters in the United States.

TSgt. John A. Fowler, distinguished pistol and rifle expert, is another mainstay on the Lejeune Pistol Squad. He recently won a berth on the International Pistol Team and tied the 1949 National Championship score with an outstanding record of 183 out of 200 in the National Pistol Matches held at Ft. Sheridan, Ill.

The Camp Lejeune Pistol Team is proud to have on its roster individuals such as the ones above. Some remaining men on the squad have records that almost equal these, while some are young but gaining experience so that one day they may take their place with such distinguished marksmen as these. The year's record so far for the Pistol Team is proof positive. . . . over 300 medals and trophies already won and secured.

Camp Lee Here For Contest Sa

Locals Determined To Come Back After Last Week's Loss

Another Hard Battle Expected; Several Changes In Lejeune's Line-Up Anticipated

After playing on the road for the past two week-ends, the Lejeune griders come home this week-end to show their wares against the Travellers from Camp Lee, Va.

Still disappointed over last week's loss, the team will be out to win and get back aboard the victory train.

Headed by player-coach Upshaw "Uppy" Sams, the Camp Lee squad will bring a bevy of fast backs and tough linemen here for the game. Coach Sams applies the platoon system of modern football tactics.

Last year, the Camp Lee aggregation finished second in the race for the Second Army Championship and the Travellers are looking for the first place position when the curtain falls on the 1949 season. Pigskin Pickin's

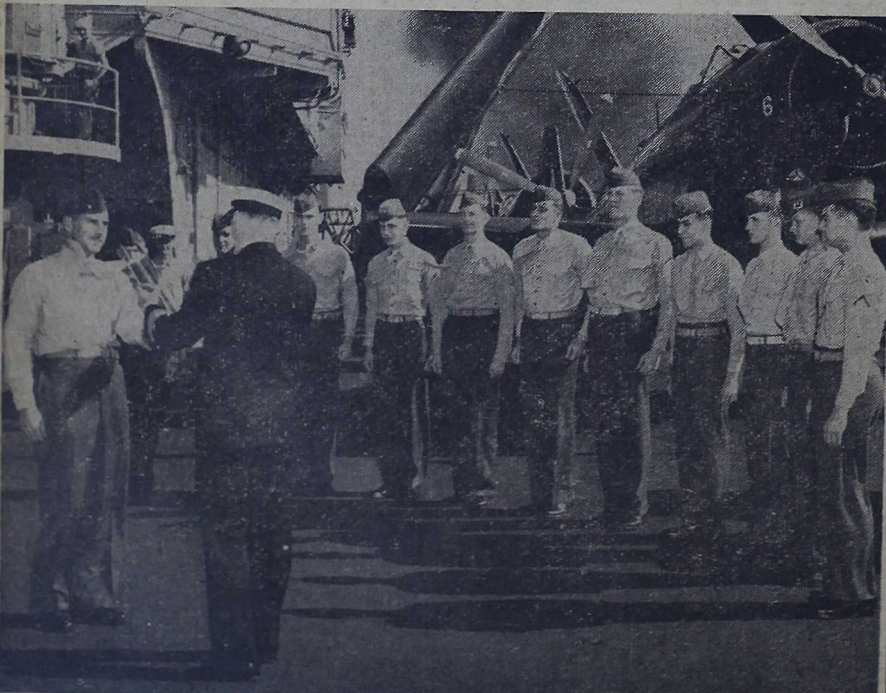

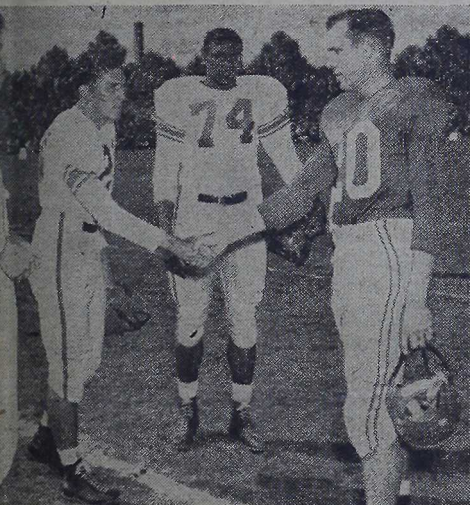
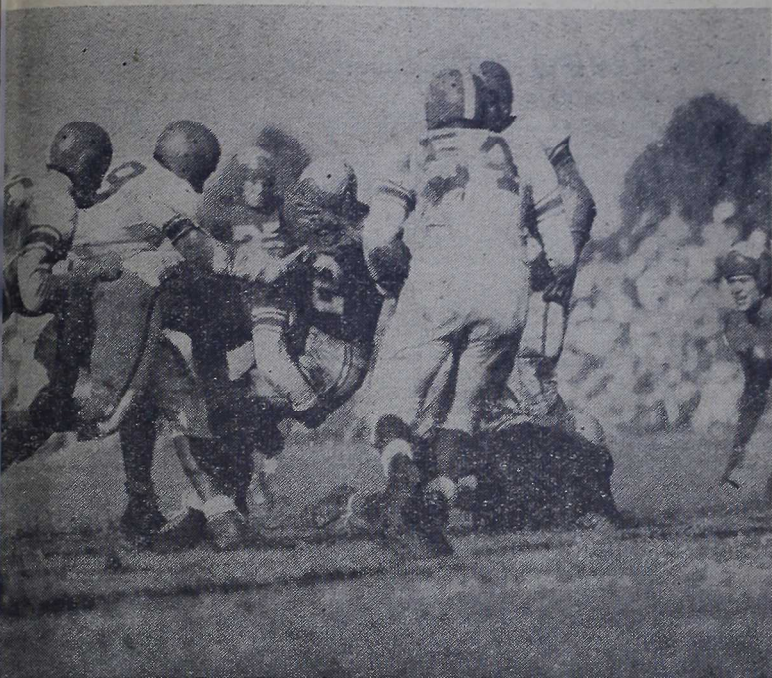

"FLUKE" TOUCHDOWN

Lejeune had its "back" broken by field blocking. Four downs got only eight yards, however, and Lejeune took over on downs. Lejeune also

FURTHER INFORMATION ON POST EXCHANGE ID CARDS

Exchange Identification Cards are now required as one of the stipulations in the recent Armed Service Exchange Regulations which are now in effect. This has constituted a great deal of extra work for your Exchange and your continued cooperation will be appreciated.

The procedure for obtaining identification cards, during this transitional period, is for the husband to obtain an application card from his commanding officer for each of his eligible dependents and, after completion, return the card to the commanding officer for verification, forwarding to the Exchange Office, and preparation of identification cards. The cards are to be picked up by the dependent at the Steward's Office, Central Exchange.

In the event the husband is on temporary duty away from the camp and the commanding officer has no records available, the dependent is requested to make application at the Pass and Identification Office, Building No. 27, where verification of dependency will be made and the application card forwarded to the Exchange office. After preparation, the identification card may be picked up at Central Exchange.

war-service appointees whenever and to the extent that the condition of a register and the administrative situation permits. Camp Lejeune has been affected by a few displacement programs and must expect others in the future until all positions are filled by competitive or probational appointment. Persons employed at this camp are advised that they should compete in all examinations for their position until they acquire competitive or probational status or they may expect eventually to be displaced.

Employees at Camp Lejeune with war-service or temporary appointments may also be displaced by employees who hold probational or competitive status and seek employment at Camp Lejeune by transfer or reinstatement. It has not been the policy of Camp Lejeune to order this type of displacement, but if enough applications are received from this type of employees it may have to be done.

If any employees serving in a war-service or temporary appointment at Camp Lejeune have competed in an examination for their position and received an eligible grade, they should submit that information to the Industrial Relations Office in order that they may request the Civil Service Commission to certify their name to this activity for conversion. The mere fact that an employee has received an eligible rating does not give him his status. His name must be within reach on the register and submitted to the Industrial Relations Office prior to conversion.

If a person is displaced under this program, it would necessitate his termination. However, it will not preclude him from any temporary appointment for which he may be qualified in other classifications, provided appropriate registers have not been established.

Compensation Act Affects On Family Allowance

Procedures Pertaining To Family Allowance Explained; Significant Aspects Which Affect Personnel Now Receiving FA Listed; Certain Examples Cited

SAVED PAY—FAMILY ALLOWANCE PROVISIONS

1. ENTITLEMENT. Under the provisions of the Act, certain enlisted persons whose dependents are receiving Family Allowance are entitled to include the contribution of the Government to FA payments in the computation of total compensation received on September 30, 1949. The enlistment status of the member as indicated on the below chart determines his right to include such contributions when computing total compensation as of September 30, 1949. However, if a member is entitled to saved pay, including the contribution of the Government to FA, and his dependents occupy Government quarters, the total sum saved for him will be reduced by \$67.50 or \$45.00, as appropriate, according to the basic allowance for quarters applicable to a member with dependents in his pay grade. For the purpose of this deduction, members in all paygrades will be considered as members with dependents. If such deduction is applicable, and the total compensation to which the member is then entitled under the provisions of the Act is greater than the total compensation to which the member is entitled under laws in effect prior to October 1, 1949, after deduction of basic quarters allowance, the member will not be entitled to save his pay or Family Allowance.

ance will be stopped.

2. PROVISIONS APPLICABLE IF FAMILY ALLOWANCE IS SAVED. The question of the right of a member whose Family Allowance is saved to receive additional Family Allowance Benefits for dependents acquired after September 30, 1949, has been submitted to the Comptroller General. Pending a decision on this question, application for additional Family Allowance from such members will be processed in the same manner as heretofore. However, no Family Allowance payments will be made for dependents acquired after September 30, 1949, unless and until such payments are authorized by the Comptroller General.

3. TERMINATION OF ENTITLEMENT. Termination of Family Allowance entitlement will be determined in accordance with the below chart. It should be particularly noted that enlisted persons who are discharged prior to October 1, 1949, and who reenlist or extend effective on or after October 1, 1949, are not entitled to Family Allowance benefits for their dependents.

PROCEDURES PERTAINING TO FAMILY ALLOWANCE

1. OUTLINE OF PROCEDURES. In order to compute the total compensation for saved pay purposes to which members in an enlistment status indicated by the chart below are entitled as of September 30, 1949, it will be necessary for disbursing officers to know the amount of the contribution of the Government to Family Allowance payments for each such member. This information will be furnished by Headquarters, Marine Corps, at the earliest possible date.

2. ACTION PRIOR TO RECEIPT OF FA PAYMENT INFORMATION. Prior to receipt of the FA payment information described above, all members whose dependents are receiving FA will be paid on the Saved Pay Basis, except that the notation "SAVED" will not be entered on the pay record. FA in effect will continue. Responsibility for initiating stoppage of FA payments will remain the same as heretofore, except that disbursing officers will initiate stoppage of all FA in the case of a

member whose enlistment expires subsequent to October 1, 1949, regardless of whether such member reenlists or extends.

3. ACTION UPON RECEIPT OF FA PAYMENT INFORMATION.

(a) SAVED PAY COMPUTATION. Upon receipt of the FA payment information described above, the contribution of the Government to FA payments will be determined for each member whose dependents are receiving FA. This contribution will be included in the total compensation to which the member was entitled on September 30, 1949, to determine if the member will be entitled to saved pay from October 1, 1949.

(b) MEMBER NOT ENTITLED TO SAVED PAY. If it is determined that the member is not entitled to saved pay, the disbursing officer will initiate stoppage of FA after payment for the month in which request for stoppage is forwarded, and will adjust the pay record to the rates prescribed in the Act as of October 1, 1949. The total amount of the contribution of the Government to FA payments made for October, 1949, and for each month

thereafter through the month of last FA payment will be checked against the member's pay record.

(c) MEMBER ENTITLED TO SAVED PAY. If it is determined that the member is entitled to saved pay, no adjustments will be required on the pay record as long as such entitlement continues unchanged. Applicable deductions for basic allowance for quarters will be made as prescribed in the first paragraph of this article.

SPECIFIC EXAMPLES OF AFFECT ON FA

1. Persons who enlisted or reenlisted prior to July 1, 1946, will continue to be eligible to draw their present pay and FA until the end of their enlistments.

2. Married men who enlisted or reenlisted prior to the date the Act is enacted, but after July 1, 1946, will continue to be eligible to draw their present pay and FA for their wives and children until July 1, 1952, or the expiration of their enlistment, whichever is earlier.

3. As soon as the total compensation to which an enlisted man may be entitled under the Act exceeds the total compensation he is presently receiving, he will automatically qualify for the higher pay and allowances.

4. Any enlisted man entitled to a reduction in total pay upon the elimination of his FA allowance that which was in effect at the time of application, be discharged or otherwise.

5. Enlisted person having dependent wives but do have parents on them for chief support to be eligible present pay and FA of their enlistment or whichever is earlier.

6. Enlisted person eligible to claim brothers as dependents as of the sixth month of the date the Act was enacted.

3. Dependents of members who enlist, reenlist, or extend, effective on or after 1 October 1949, are not entitled to family allowance benefits except as indicated for members in category 3 of the chart.
