House Armed Services Sub-Committee Votes In Favor Of Pav Raise

According to published reports, a House armed services According to published reports, a nouse armed services sub-committee voted favorably on a pay boost for personnel of the armed services last week. It approved a bill that would grant raises varying from 3 per cent in the lower ranks to nearly 50 per cent in the upper commissioned ranks. The average raise would be about 14 per cent. The bill would wipe out family allowances for enlisted men.

The committee will attempt to •

secure early consideration of the measure and its passage by the House is expected within two weeks. Consideration has been given to postponing the effective date of the new pay scales to 1 October, which would bring the 1950 expenditures well within the President's budge-

Cummings of Great Lakes was the first to feel McClendon's fury.losing by TKO in one minute of the third round. Cummings, holding an advantage with a longer reach, dropped McClendon in the second round, but the Marine retaliated in the final round with a straight right to the head that sent his op-ponent to the canvas, McClendon was awarded a TKO when Cum-mings arose too groggy to fight.

E. Murphy of Corpus Christi, also had the misfortune of catching Mc-Clendon's sledge-hammer right during the tournament finals, this time in the first round. Murphy answered the bell fighting furiously until the Lejeuner's right found its target. Murphy went down, came back up, and was tagged with the same right. Out on his feet, the sailor had to quit, and Willie Mc-Clendon was crowned light-heavyweight champion.

Lejeune's scrappy Red Davis fought his way to the All-Navy event for the third consecutive year by a unanimous decision over Bill Daniels, of Great Lakes, in the flyweight division. After a few stiff jabs in the face, Daniels got on his bicycle, and stayed there for the greater part of the bout. The sailor finally closed with Davis in the last round, only to eatch a flurry of jabs and hooks for his troubles, and it was Davis all the way.

Red got as far as the semi-finals in the '47 All-Navy contest, and broke into the medal-winning class last year by taking runner-up hon-

More About Accidents

Many of our readers will wonder why we are again bringing up the subject of motor vehicle accidents. The fact is, two editorials we published several weeks ago failed to register in some minds. It is obvious that the warning did NGLO, 21st Marines, 1st PMR, not strike home as numerous accidents continue to happen, and practically all are caused by witless drivers.

Last Monday evening, traffic was snarled-up from the Main gate to Hadnot Point for some thirty odd minutes. This condition was caused by the hairbrained maneuvering of two drivers, and resulted in property damage to four vehicles. That same morning, a car rolled over on the main highway between Holly Ridge and Sneads Ferry; it also bore base tags.

Our military police force is faced with a pretty big problem in trying to police traffic throughout this huge reservation. Since they can't be everywhere at once, they certainly need a little cooperation from the drivers, and from other responsible persons who see traffic regulations being broken. It undoubtedly would make their job a little more agreeable.

signed, unforeseen, or unexpected occurrence,"—this defi-nition is starkly abused when applied to the wreck caused by

Dedicate Memorial Tablet At Quantico

QUANTICO, Va., May 5-A me-morial tablet was dedicated here today to the late Major General George Barnett, former U. S. Marine commandant, commemorating the acquistion of this Marine Corps Reservation in 1917.

Mrs. George Barnett (Washington, D. C.), widow of General Barnett, unveiled the bronze tablet at the original site where General Barnett, accompanied by the late President Franklin Delano Roosevelt, then Asst. Sec. of the Navy, cut the first tree symbolizing official acquisition of the Reservation.




