Officer Powell constantly maintained effective communica-tions for his Battalion and frequently laid telephone wires in areas infested with snipers and stragglers and situated within observation of enemy installations. When hostile forces severed his command's telephone wires on 28 July, he proceeded with two of his men through an area honeycombed with caves and covered with foliage, and succeeded in repairing a lateral line vital to an adjacent battalion before three Japanese could launch an ambush attack. Contacting the enemy ambush while over heading the same line the following day, he aided materially in killing all three of the enemy. 
