Of Lejeune's 'Founding Fathers,' 'Answer Man' Platoon Of MCI Furnishes Educational Counsel

John Kaluf, Detached This Week

Camp Lejeune loses one of its original "founding fathers" this week with the detachment of Colonel John Kaluf to HQMC Washington, D. C. The colonel was the first Camp Quartermaster here and one of the men directly involved in the building and development of this, the world's most complete amphibious training base.

May 1944, Col. Kaluf left Lejeune for the first time since his arrival in 1941, to spend 22 months overseas with the First Marine Division as Division Quartermaster. He participated in operations on Iwo Jima and Okinawa during that time.

Upon his return here in May 1943, the colonel was again assigned as Camp Quartermaster and has been at Lejeune since that time.

His accomplishments of the past year as Quartermaster Department head add up to what is termed by many as the most remarkable organizational achievements in the history of the Corps.

The metamorphosis of Camp Lejeune from a ramshackle outpost in the "boondocks" into one of the largest and most modern military establishments in the world has been one of the most spectacular of these jobs.

With the exception of the brief period he served with the First Marine Division, Col. Kaluf has been in on every step in the growth of the base from the time it was planned, built, and fathered.

He has worked under and in cooperation with the present Camp Quartermaster General from the planning of Tent City for the building of the 1st Division in

In 1941, when Major General (then Colonel) W. P. T. Hill was attached here as Liaison Officer in charge of all new construction at the base, to the completion of the last unit of barracks.

With somewhat grim amusement, Colonel Kaluf recalls the early trials and tribulations of the Quartermaster crew when it first arrived here in the early part of 1941. Those were rugged days for the Quartermaster and his men up to the time of the 1st Division in

The Marine Corps reached a maximum strength of 75,101 during World War I. World War II peak strength, reached August 31, 1945, was 485,113.

In 1921 and 1926 during a violent outbreak of armed robbery the U. S. Marine Corps provided a force of about 2500 men to guard the U. S. Mail throughout the country.

Lost In The Night

Soon again comes Christmas! What does it all mean? Just an orgy of spending and sending? Of winning and dining? On the surface it would appear that Christmas means little more to us than those things. Yet surely such insignificant and unimportant customs would not and could not perpetuate this sacred season. Only something with the ring of eternity in it could make man come back to it year after year down through the centuries. And that something, of course, was what God did through the manger there at Bethlehem. It is what God did in Christ that makes us keep this Holy Day over and over.

Looking upon this creature fashioned in His own image God saw that man had stumbled into unholiness, impurity, and unrighteousness. All men, like sheep, had gone astray; they had turned every one to his own way. Truly men were "lost in the night" and unless something drastic happened mankind would never see light again. So God sent His only Son to be the Light and the Life of men. In 1938 the late President Roosevelt dedicated a monument on the battlefield at Gettysburg called the Eternal Light Monument. A flame was lighted atop the pillar that day to be kept burning as long as the earth exists. At Bethlehem of Judea with no vast crowd looking on, God dedicated His Son as the Sun of Righteousness that forever mankind might see and not ever again be "lost in the night."

If humanity was to go on groping in the darkness from that hour, it was through no fault of God's. He had done what He could to light the way. We must get hold of that! Down through the centuries we have floundered, wild-eyed, wondering what it is that keeps this world turbulent and astir; trying desperately to discover why it is that we cannot sleep at night and why in our waking moments we cannot attain our full stature; forgetting completely that God did it all for us there in a stable. How utterly stupid of us to continue "lost in the night" with that perpetual Light in our midst! A man doesn't have to grope unless he wants to. And mankind doesn't have to stub its toes in the dark either. God said so one day just outside Bethlehem. And you can count on God's word. The Babe of Bethlehem IS God's word to lighten our path.

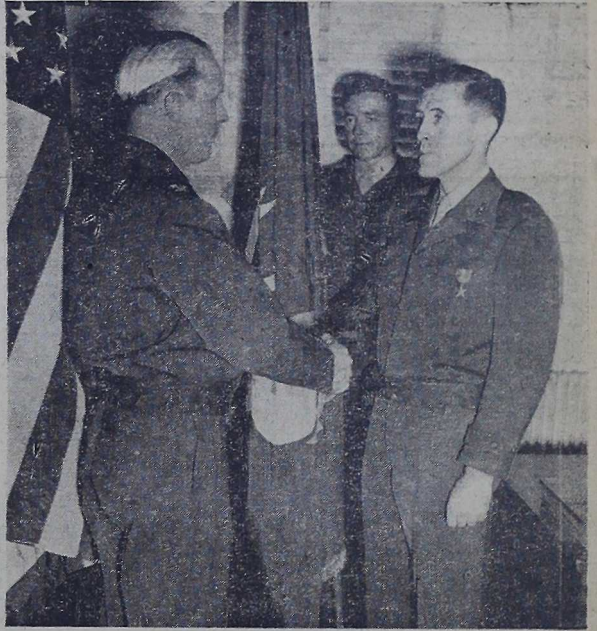

Lt. Powell Awarded Bronze Star For Heroic Achievement On Guam

1st Lt. "J" "B" Powell of the Electronics Supply Division, Marine Corps Supply Depot, received the Bronze Star Medal with combat clasp during ceremonies in Building 1108 last Thursday. The award was made for heroic achievement during operations against enemy Japanese forces on Guam in 1944.

Col. H. D. Hansen, Commanding Officer, MCSD, made the presentation to Lt. Powell. Brig. Gen. Andrew E. Creech from Headquarters Marine Corps attended the ceremonies.

The medal was awarded for service as set forth in the following citation:

"For heroic achievement as Communications Officer of the Second Battalion, 21st Marines, Third Marine Division, during operations against enemy Japanese forces on Guam, Marianas Islands, from 21 July to 10 August 1944. Although greatly handicapped by a shortage of personnel, Warrant

Officer Powell constantly maintained effective communications for his Battalion and frequently laid telephone wires in areas infested with snipers and stragglers and situated within observation of enemy installations. When hostile forces severed his command's telephone wires on 28 July, he proceeded with two of his men through an area honeycombed with caves and covered with foliage, and succeeded in repairing a lateral line vital to an adjacent battalion before three Japanese could launch an ambush attack. Contacting the enemy ambush while overhauling the same line the following day, he aided materially in killing all three of the enemy. By his ability, courage and devotion to duty throughout, Warrant Officer Powell upheld the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service."

In addition to the Bronze Star Medal with Combat "V", Lt. Powell's decorations and medals include the Silver Star Medal, Presidential Unit Citation, American Defense Service Medal, Asiatic Pacific Campaign Medal with three stars, and the World War II Victory Medal.

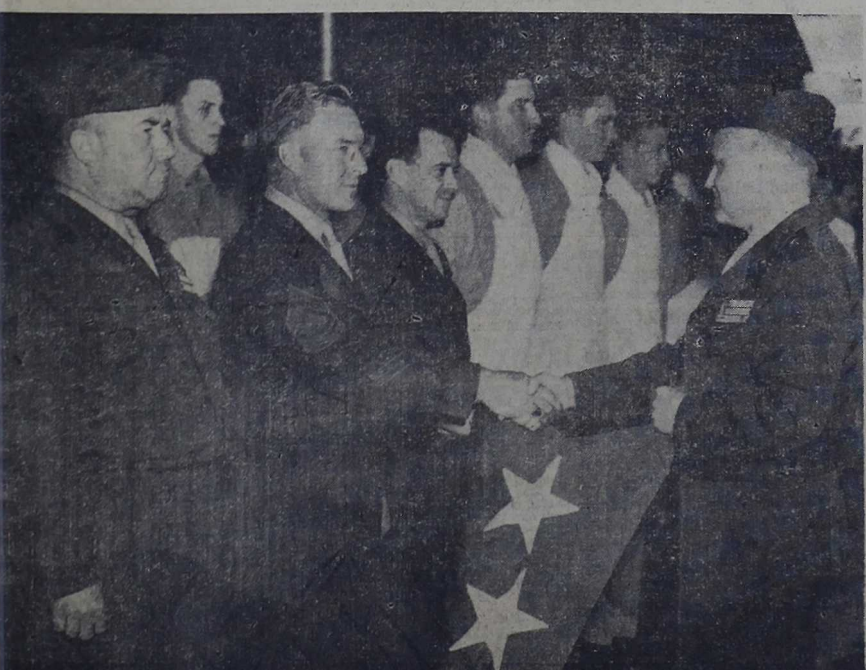

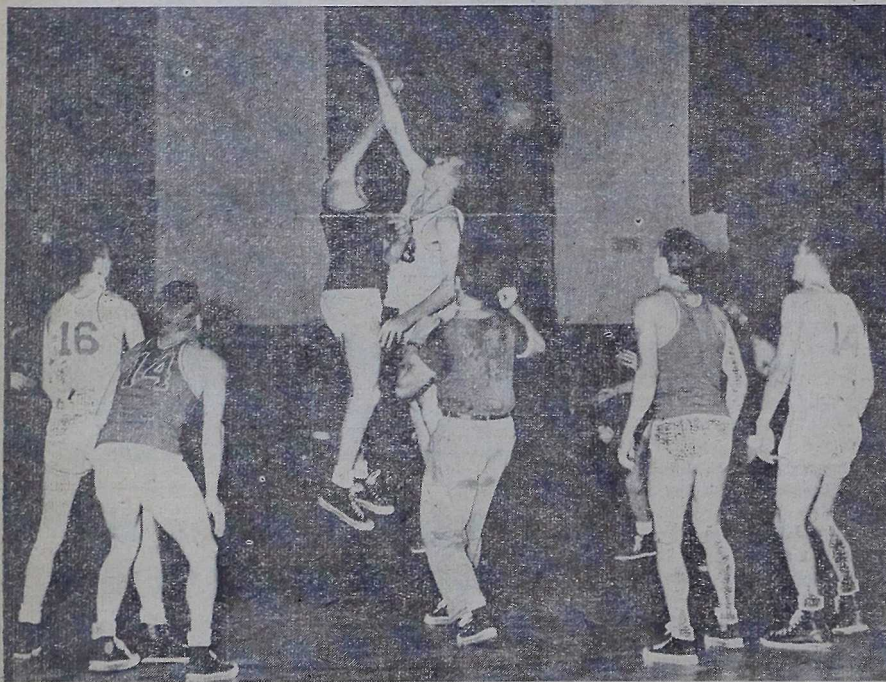
Third Award

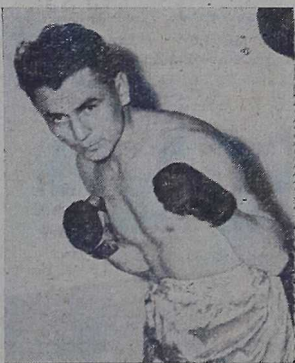

DISQUALIFICATIONS OF APPLICANTS

Applications for Federal employment containing false statements pertaining to their employment record, have been submitted by a few persons to the Industrial Relations Office. This is a serious matter and every person submitting an application for Federal employment should give an accurate record of his periods of employment, the type of work performed and the correct name and address of the place worked during each period of employment.

Printed on the bottom of the U. S. Civil Service Commission's Standard Forms 57 and 60, Application for Federal Employment, are the words, "False statements on this application are punishable by law (U. S. Code Title 18, Section 80)." "I certify that the statements made by me in this application are true, complete, and correct to the best of my knowledge and belief, and are made in good faith." When a person signs an application it becomes an affidavit.

The Industrial Relations Office has received two or more applications from the same person or persons for different positions which contained false statements. These applications showed that the person had worked at different places of employment during the same period in entirely different classifications. That would be impossible, therefore this person is being rated ineligible for employment at this activity in accordance with Civil Service Regulation 2.114 as outlined in the Federal Personnel Manual.

It is recommended that all employees at this activity ascertain the correctness of their application when applying for a promotion, transfer, or seeking Federal employment. It is further requested that this information be passed along to any person whom you know that may have filed an application for Federal employment.

EXCESS LEAVE

The Industrial Relations Office wishes to remind all Civil Service workers at this activity that the maximum amount of annual leave which may be accrued or carried forward into the calendar year of 1949 is 60 days.

This policy is in accordance with Camp Administrative Order No. 32-1947. This Camp Administrative Order also specifies that, if needed for budget purposes, activities may require employees to reduce the amount of annual leave below the maximum of 60 days.

Civil Payroll will not be allowed to pay an employee for any excess annual leave. Excess leave not

taken prior to January 1, 1949 will be a loss to the employee.

Each employee has been notified the amount of leave which he should request prior to January 1, 1949 to prevent loss to him. For some it may be too late to take all of their excess annual leave; for others the activity may not be able to grant the leave requested. This message should be very welcome, so get hot and see your supervisor right away. We are sure that you will find him cooperative and ready to grant you all the leave that the work-load will allow.

at Montford Point where the original detail made camp. They arrived with literally nothing—even for themselves. Supplies were so few and so short that civilian shoes and clothing were often the uniform of the day for the men.

FIRST QM HEADQUARTERS

An old summer cottage was the Camp QM's first headquarters. An abandoned tobacco barn became the first warehouse. The first mess hall was set up in an old bath house. There were only dirt roads and a heavy rain would turn them into almost impassable quagmires. A total of six telephones served the entire camp.

The original quartermaster staff consisted of a detail of twenty maintenance and twenty-five QM personnel. From such humble and hectic beginning the department has expanded into an intricately interlocked organization of ten main departmental divisions, staffed by several hundred Marines and approximately 2,000 civilian personnel. It handles a massive medley of equipment and supplies ranging from common pins to locomotives.

ROSE FROM RANKS

A native of Wadsworth, Illinois, Col. Kaluf rose through the ranks from buck private. He enlisted in the Marine Corps in 1917, went through boot camp at Parris Island, and served through World War I as a 2nd Lt.

Col. Kaluf has also seen service in Cuba, China and the Philippines. Among his decorations and medals he numbers the Yangtze, Expeditionary and Marine Corps Good Conduct medals. He recently received the Special Breast Order of the Cloud and Banner with ribbon and citation from the National Government of the Republic of China for meritorious services. He was attached to Marine Corps Schools and staff at Quantico for five years and has been in the Quartermaster service since March 1939.

Nineteen officers have acted as Commandant of the Marine Corps since 1775.

Called in to see what could be done, the Red Cross field director found it would take a month to get the spectacles through Marine Corps channels. The recruit wouldn't get paid until the end of training, and he was unable to draw an SMR, so he couldn't buy them.

The Red Cross field director advanced the Marine a loan and also located an optometrist who would give a discount.

So the recruit got his spectacles and made for the 500-yard rifle range on the double. And the future of the Marine Corps was safe until the next crisis.

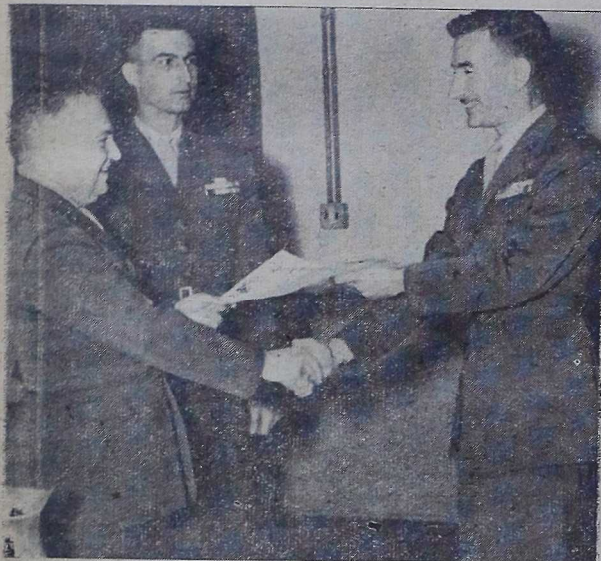
