## National Personnel Medal For Navy Occupation Medal

WASHINGTON, D. C. (May 27).—The Commandant of the Marine Corps has been notified by the Joint Chiefs of Staff that the National Personnel Medal is being awarded to the winners of the Navy Occupation Medal.

The medal is a three-eighths inch wide, one-half inch high, of white, a one-half inch black, a one-half inch band of black, and a final three-sixteenths inch of white.

## Gen. Riley Named ADC, 2d Division; Gen. Selden New PubInfo Director

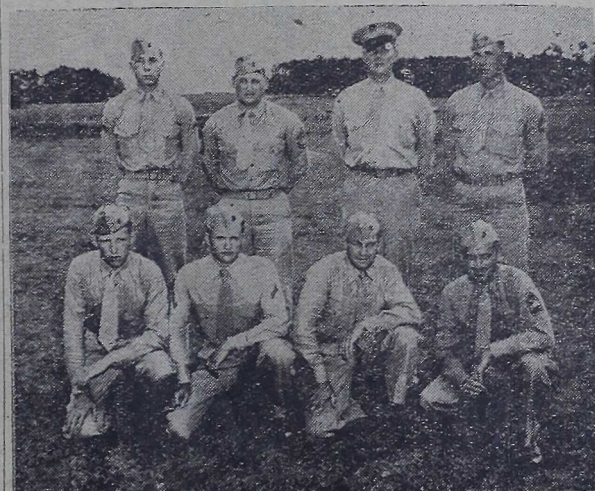
WASHINGTON, D. C. (May 31).—Marine Brigadier General W. E. Riley, Director of Marine Corps Public Information and Recruitment, has been assigned as Assistant Division Commander, 2d Marine Division, Headquarters announced today.

Brigadier General John T. Selden of Richmond, Virginia, will be General Riley's Director of Public Information and Recruitment. General Selden arrived in Camp Lejeune last month from Pearl Harbor where he was a member of the staff of the Commander-in-Chief, Pacific Fleet. He will assume his new duties tomorrow, the 1st of June.

General Riley was three-times decorated during World War II for outstanding services in strategic and tactical planning. The decorations include the Commendation Medal, awarded for services on the staff of Admiral King; the Distinguished Service Medal; and the Legion of Merit, awarded while he was on the staff of Admiral Halsey in the Pacific.

In the first world war, General Riley won two Silver Star Medals for the Aisne-Marne Defensive and the Meuse-Argonne Offensive. He was forced his evacuation. He GEN. RILEY On Page 3

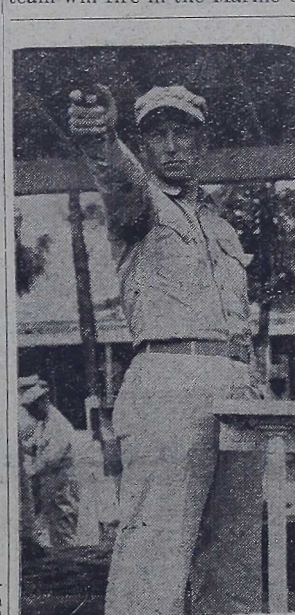

## Air-Conditioning For Camp Theater Near Reality, Final Tests Under Way

Movies at the Camp Theater on hot summer nights will be a distinct pleasure starting either this week or next, according to an announcement from the Public Works Department yesterday. Final tests are being conducted on the long-sought air-conditioning system at the theater and cool, conditioned comfort is practically a reality.

The air conditioning system is composed of three Chrysler Air Temp refrigeration units, 50 tons capacity each, and totaling approximately 150 horsepower. The compressors are located in the basement of the theater and the refrigerant is piped to cooling coils located in the existing ventilating system. Control is provided to meet the needs of any weather condition and permit cool, comfortable conditions in the building at all times.

When the Camp Theater was built, provision for the addition of an air-conditioning system was made. A special sum of money was set aside on the Recreation Fund books for the purchase and installation of the unit. War-time shortages and priorities as well as then-current directives made the acquisition of the system out of the question until last year, however. In April, the green light was received from Washington and the

Over 100 expert rifle and pistol shooters from Balboa, C.Z. to Corpus Christi, Texas participated in the Southeastern Division matches held here Monday through Thursday last week. Medal winners from last week's matches will be given the opportunity to compete in the Marine Corps Matches scheduled for Quantico from June 7th to 11th.

The Commanding General, Major General Franklin A. Hart, presented the medals to the winners in the Southeastern Division Matches in ceremonies at the Rifle Range last Friday.

T/Sgt. Hawes, from MB, Camp Lejeune, in shattering the Marine Corps pistol record with a high score of 562, defeated the former holder of that record, T/Sgt. Walter L. Devine from Parris Island, who placed fourth in the match with a 537. Devine's record, set last year, was a 556. Capt. Thurman E. Barrier from Parris Island won 2d place in the pistol match with a 546, and Lt. Col. George T. Fowler, 2d Marine Division, topped third place with a 540. T/Sgt. Edison C. Davis, MB, Balboa, C.Z., placed 11th and was awarded first Gold Medal in the match.

M/Sgt. A. C. Ivey, MB, Lejeune, won the rifle match fired here last Wednesday when he chalked up a score of 568. He was awarded first Gold Medal. S/Sgt. Jesse A. Daventport, a Marine Reservist, was runner-up with a score of 567. Capt. T. E. Barrier was third with a 567, and CWO Emmett W. Orr, 2d Combat Service Group, placed fourth with a 566. Five members of the Camp Lejeune Rifle team won medals which included: first Gold, Distinguished, 5th, 8th, and 10th Bronze.

Capt. Wendell O. Livesay, who holds two Distinguished Medals and two Silver Medals, was in charge of the Camp Lejeune team. He attributes the success of his aggregation to the tireless effort and expert coaching given the team by T/Sgt. P. W. Hawes.

## Chaplain's Corner

### What Price Man?

A date, making conversation for her naive admirer, said, "Aren't the stars numerous?" whereupon her friend replied, "Yeh and ain't they a lot of 'em?" Yes, there certainly are a lot of them. So vast are the astronomical formations that if our earth and sun should disappear instantly, the effect upon the total system of universes would be but the ceasing of the tiniest star.

Those who claim to know tell us that the sun is 92,700,000 miles from the earth. It would require the greater part of a year to even count the number of miles which the sun is distant from the earth. We think of the earth as being a rather large globe, yet if the sun were to be cut into a million pieces, each part would be larger than the earth.

In consideration of these ennobling to say her recovery would be Psalmist exclaim, "When I consider thy heavens, what is man that thou art mindful of him?" Now, it is this query which the Bible answers. It evaluates the worth of man and it deals with the eternal duration of the soul of man.

Of all the earth's creatures, man is unique in that he can hold himself out away from himself and objectively regard himself. He can appraise the good or evil of his ways. He can intelligently choose right or wrong. These attributes constitute what L. H. Howe terms the "Divine Right of Personality."

Jesus set out in bold relief the value of human kind. Jesus proclaimed that one man is of such value that for him—one person—to eternally perish, the material values of the whole world would not compensate. "For what shall it profit a man if he shall gain the whole world and lose his own soul?"

In days like these we need to think on these things. And in the face of these facts, we must not be vain but rather humbled in considering that we, men, are made in the image of God.

## Need Emphasized

### RC Blood Program

One morning this spring, a speeding car, filled with young people, skidded into a telegraph pole. Two occupants were seriously injured, one a girl of twenty-two.

So feeble was her pulse that ambulance attendants feared she would not live. Diagnosis at the hospital following a blood plasma transfusion showed the victim suffering from multiple fractured ribs, rupture of the spleen, brain concussion, a broken shoulder, and severe concussions. She was in a state of severe shock.

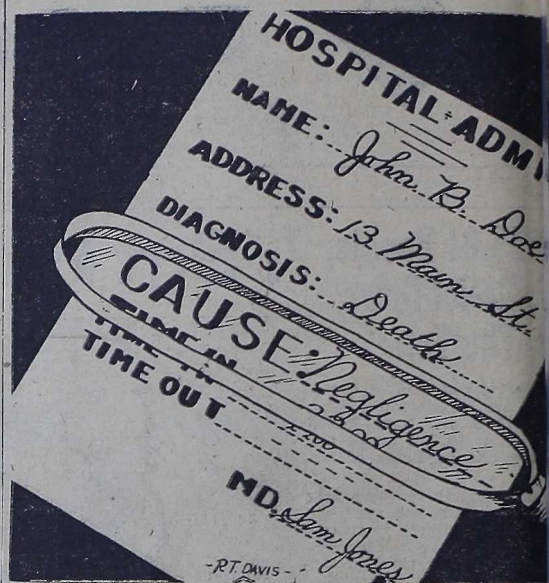
Prompt administration of whole blood was indicated. Fortunately the hospital had an adequate supply. Shock was so serious that the first transfusion had to be given under pressure.

Blood was continuously administered until mid-afternoon when she was able to undergo surgery. During the operation five more pints of blood were used. By the end of the day every drop of blood in her body had once belonged to volunteer donors. She had received a total of 15 pints.

For five days following the operation a pint of blood was administered to her each day. At the end of the two weeks, physicians were able to say her recovery would be complete.

This girl's story had a happy ending mainly because the hospital to which she was taken had an adequate supply of blood. But nearly two-thirds of the nation's hospitals do not have blood banks and must depend on commercial donors or nearby volunteers. This often means loss of time, when time is a most important factor. The case recorded here is only one of thousands each year in which blood or blood derivatives are vital to recovery.

To meet these needs, the American Red Cross this year inaugurated a national blood program. First



The following information is for the guidance of personnel who intend to vote by absentee ballot in this year's elections. Laws governing eligibility to vote in the state to which application is made should be consulted.

**Colorado**—Holds federal, state and local primary and general elections. Ballots for primary will not be mailed earlier than 31 August and must be received by 14 September in order to be counted; Ballots for general election will not be mailed earlier than 16 October and must be received by 2 November. Applications should be mailed to the County Clerk of the county of voter's residence.

**Connecticut**—Holds federal, state and local general elections. Ballots will be mailed upon application and will not be counted if received after 1800, 1 November.

**Michigan**—Holds federal, state and local general elections. No date is set for mailing of ballots but they must be received by 2 November to be counted.

**Nebraska**—Holds federal, state and local primary and general elections. Because of early primary deadline, information could not be printed herein. Ballots for general elections must be received before 11 November and will not be mailed earlier than 18 October.

A former Carlson Raider now stationed at Camp Lejeune, Pfc. Charles Briesch of the 2d Eng. Maint. Co., 2d ComSerGrp, was a special guest of the city of Jacksonville last Saturday and Sunday, Memorial Day weekend. Pfc. Briesch, accompanied by two of his buddies, Cpl. R. Peckham Jr. and Cpl. C. G. Spruth, was presented with the key to the city by the mayor of Jacksonville and enjoyed the generous hospitality of many of the leading businessmen.

Pfc. Briesch joined the Marines in December, 1942, and became a member of the famed 2d Raider Battalion in the summer of 1943. He fought with the battalion at Bougainville; and, when the unit was broken up, went to Iwo Jima where he joined the Marines. He saw further action at Guam and Okinawa and participated in the invasion of Japan.

The three men were picked up by their barracks last Saturday morning by a cab from Jacksonville and were escorted to the Jacksonville WJNC by Mr. Strickland.

At 1600, Cpl. Briesch was presented the key to the city by Mayor Herbert Eastwood as the money was beamed to the radio.

also received the Croix de Guerre with Gold Star.

Born February 2, 1897, in Minneapolis, General Riley attended the College of St. Thomas at St. Paul, Minnesota, before being commissioned into the Marine Corps as a second lieutenant in 1917.

General Selden, whose appointment to his present rank was effected April 2, led the Fifth Marine Regiment as a colonel in the assault on Cape Gloucester, New Britain, December, 1943, and was subsequently awarded the Legion of Merit.

He received a second Legion of Merit for services as Chief of Staff, First Marine Division, during the Peleliu operation. He also holds the Bronze Star Medal for World War II.

The new Director of Public Information and Recruiting was born in Richmond, March 25, 1893, and attended McGuire's University before entering the Marine Corps as an enlisted man in 1915. He was commissioned in 1918.

## Col. H. B. Liversedge, ADC, First Division, Promoted To Brig. Gen.

WASHINGTON, D. C. (May 21).—The Senate has confirmed the promotion to brigadier general of Harry B. Liversedge, Assistant Division Commander, First Marine Division, Camp Pendleton, California, Marine Corps Headquarters announced today.

The appointment from colonel to brigadier general of General Liversedge was made to fill the vacancy created by Major General William T. Clement, who was recently advanced from brigadier, the announcement explained.

Distinguished officer and athlete, General Liversedge twice won the coveted Navy Cross during World War II for extraordinary heroism in action against the Japanese at New Georgia and at Iwo Jima.

His athletic career which began at his alma mater, the University of California, was climaxed in 1920, when, as a First Lieutenant, he went with the American track team to Antwerp for the World Olympic Games and placed second in the shotput event.

The general left the University of California in 1917 at the start of his senior year to enlist in the Marines. In August of the following year, he was commissioned a second lieutenant, and a month later, he was ordered to France.

Between world wars, he saw duty with the Marines in Haiti, in China, and at the various posts and stations of the Marine Corps in the United States.

For more than a decade starting in 1918, he was a prominent figure in sports, playing and coaching Marine Corps football teams and participating in track events. In 1926, General Liversedge's football team beat the Army in the, then, annual President's Cup game.

From 1927 to 1929, while serving with the Third Brigade in China, he participated in International Field and Track Meets at Shanghai and was boxing coach for brigade boxers in Tientsin.

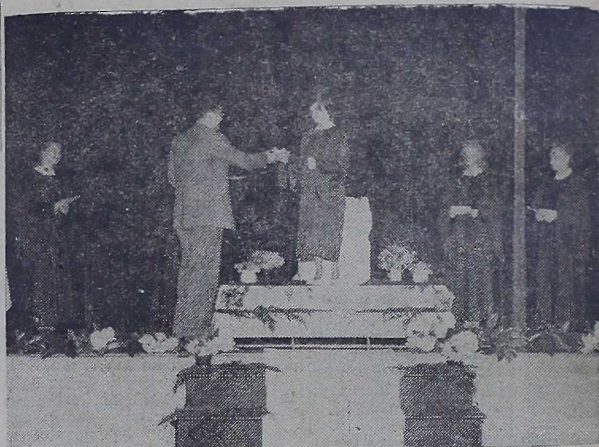
In July, 1942, General Liversedge assumed command of the Third Raider Battalion in American Samoa and after months of rigorous training, he led the battalion in the unopposed occupation of the Russell Islands.

However, at New Georgia, in command of the First Marine Raider Regiment, the general was credited with having achieved "victory in the face of great difficulties," fighting a fanatic and savage enemy well versed in jungle warfare from July 5 to August 29, 1943. For this action, he was awarded the Navy Cross.

A Gold Star in lieu of a second Navy Cross was presented General Liversedge for his "conspicuous gallantry and superb leadership" while commanding a regimental combat team of the Fifth Marine Division during the epic struggle for Iwo Jima.

Six singles and a walk counted for the Camp Lejeune runs in the tenth.

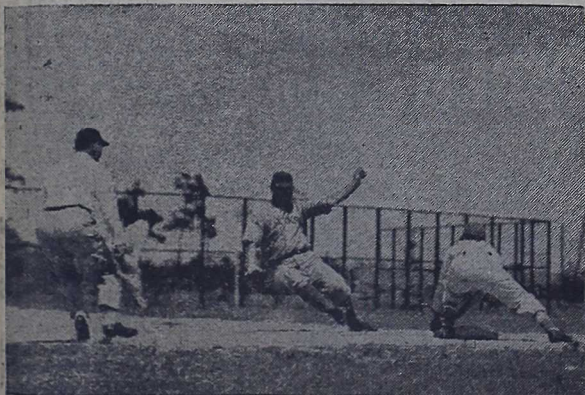

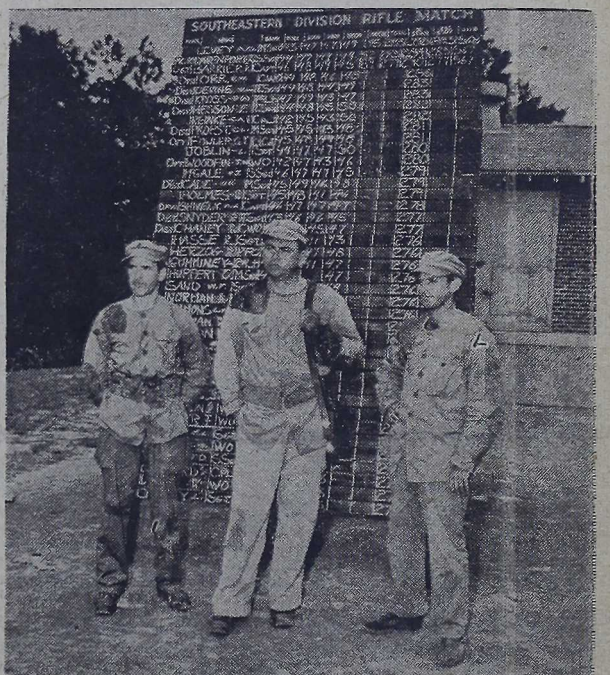

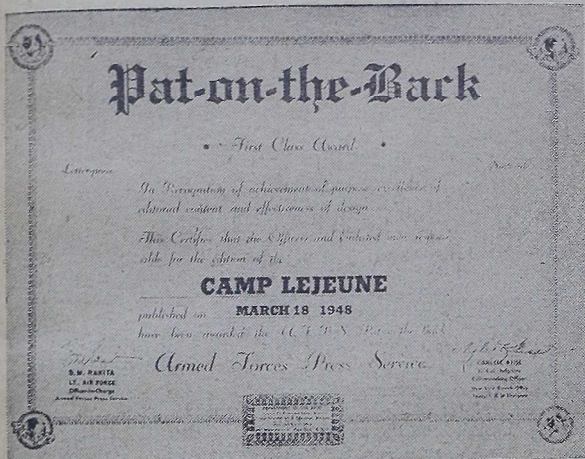

ATTENTION, STOREKEEPERS

The Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners, Camp Lejeune, North Carolina, has announced the examination for the positions of Storekeeper, CAF-2 through CAF-6, effective June 3, 1948 and closing June 24, 1948. The rates of pay for these positions range from \$1954 p.a. to \$3773.40 p.a.

All employees working in any of above-listed categories who have not acquired a competitive status should immediately file with the Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners, Building 33, Main Gate, Camp Lejeune, N. C. for probational appointment under Civil Service Regulations. Those who file and fail to receive an eligible rating and those who fail to file are subject to displacement.

This examination is open to the general public and all interested and qualified persons between the

ages of 18 and 62 are urged to file. ADVANCE CHANGE IN CAMP REGULATIONS

Camp General Order 17 presents a few of the advance changes in Camp Regulations. The changes which directly concern the civilian employees are listed as follows:

(a) No alcoholic liquors will be permitted on the reservation, Midway Park included, except that which is authorized for medical purposes.

(b) Tax paid beer only may be introduced and used in civilian quarters.

(c) Drivers of all privately owned vehicles operating on the reservation, Midway Park included, must secure Camp Motor Vehicle tags, either temporary or permanent.

(d) All permanent camp personnel operating privately owned motor vehicles on the reservation, Midway Park included, shall secure from the Camp Provost Marshal a Camp Operators Permit.

These changes are now in effect and all civilian employees are encouraged to comply with these instructions as soon as possible.

SAFETY NOTES

LADDER MAINTENANCE

Care of ladders is an important safety factor. Here are some good maintenance suggestions:

1. Inspect ladders at frequent and regular intervals; if any ladder is found defective, either repair or discard it.
2. Use shellac, varnish, or two coats of oil as a preservative; paint conceals defects.
3. Keep ladders clean.
4. Do not lay ladders on wet ground, or leave them exposed to the weather. Ladders lying on the floor may cause workers to trip and fall; or they may be run over by trucks and damaged.
5. If ladders with metal parts are exposed to acid fumes, inspect these parts frequently.
6. Roughen metal ladder rungs to prevent slipping.
7. Never leave a ladder where it may fall.
8. Store ladders in a cool dry place, either lying on their sides or hanging by their rails from several wall brackets in a horizontal position. Take care, however, that these suspended ladders do not warp.

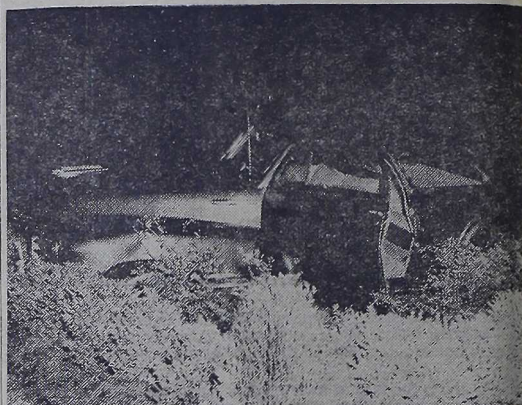

The voter takes part in this system by voting in primaries and elections, thereby choosing men and endorsing policies he considers best for the welfare of the nation. The citizen, through his vote, cooperates with his compatriots in securing and protecting his rights and liberty; he becomes an integral part of the community.

### CITIZENSHIP: AN OBLIGATION

A strong nation demands a responsive and responsible people. Individual citizens must realize their obligation to know and understand the purposes and functions of the government. They must seek to be intelligent and well-informed on government affairs. Moreover, obedience to the law and cooperation with the enforcement agencies is essential for internal peace and order.

Every Marine has at his fingertips the opportunity to learn about his government. For better citizenship he should know the democratic system, attributes and flaws, and understand the problems of foreign policy and domestic affairs which challenge the security of the government.

The Marine Corps Institute offers a course in civics entitled American Government. This high school course of 15 lessons presents in detail the organization and functions of the federal, state and local governments. The subject-matter is treated in a practical manner enabling the student to improve his citizenship and become more interested in governmental affairs.

The text, Government in Action, considers the government from the writing of the Constitution to the perplexing problems facing the nation today. The purposes, functions and processes of the government are discussed—the betterment of the national welfare, the direction of domestic and foreign policies, the laws and their enforcement.

Bruce Lipes, veteran Soap Box Derby driver, last week became the first entry in the annual Kinston Soap Box Derby to be held July 7. Bruce is the 13-year-old son of Navy Warrant Officer Lipes of the 2d Division Surgeon's office.

Young Lipes was honored along with his father by the Kinston Junior Chamber of Commerce at its annual meeting last week.

At the age of 12 last year, the youthful driver placed second in the Upper Darby, Pa., derby. Prior to that he had raced four times, in 1946 before 100,000 persons who witnessed the Philadelphia derby.

He's out to beat that this year, and if he wins in Kinston he will go to Akron, Ohio, later in the summer on an all-expense paid trip to compete in the national Soap Box Derby, which is sponsored by the Chevrolet division of General Motors Corporation.
