Ceremony held to recognize wing's Outstanding Airmen of the Year

The 167th Airlift Wing recognized four of its top Airmen for their accomplishments during an Outstanding Airmen of the Year (OAY) award ceremony at the 167th base dining facility, Martinsburg, W.Va., April 2.

The annual OAY award program recognizes Airmen who excel at job performance, leadership, and personal achievement.

"Every year the bar gets set higher and higher, make no mistake about it, the 167th truly competes at the highest level," said 167th Airlift Wing Command Chief Master Sergeant Troy Brawner. "We have some amazing folks here and it's a shame we can only pick four."

Chief Brawner emphasized being prompt in the award process for aspiring award seekers.

"If you are an individual out there and you want to compete to be an OAY recipient, let your supervisor know early in the year," said Brawner, "It takes a barrage of different things, from your education, to volunteering, and even the way you work both on and off base."

The following individuals were recognized during the event.

Senior Airman Emma Van Horn, assigned to the 167th Communications Flight, was honored as Outstanding Airman of the Year at the wing and state for the Airman category. She has established herself as a driven technical expert by her peers and supervisors while attending college full-time maintaining a 4.0 GPA.

Tech Sgt. Joshua Webber, assigned to the 167th headquarters staff, was awarded Outstanding Airman of the Year for both wing and state in the non-commissioned officer category. His recruiting efforts helped the wing surpass its manning goals for fiscal year 2021, in spite of COVID-19 restrictions.

Master Sgt. Matthew Wilson, assigned to the 167th Security Forces Squadron, was honored as Outstanding Airman of the Year for the senior non-commissioned officer category. Wilson was lauded for his leadership skills, management of assets and coordination with allied personnel while deployed which improved security operations and directly led to mission success.

Master Sgt. Jacob Heavner, assigned to the 167th Mission Support Group, was awarded Outstanding Airman of the Year for both the wing and state in the First Sergeant category. He served as first sergeant while deployed to Al Dhafra Air Base. He supported four medical evacuations, relayed 13 Red Cross messages, and initiated 10 emergency leaves.

There is no shortage of sexual assualt stories in the Bible

So there I was...in Headquarters' hallway, discussing Sexual Assault Awareness Month, (April, just in case you weren't aware) and a Plane Talk article yet to be written. As a chaplain, I chimed in, there is no shortage of sexual assault stories in the Bible. This led to the following reference about Dinah that you are reading now.

You really don't hear these stories growing up in Sunday School. Age appropriateness is definitely a consideration. The stories are even rare in adult sermons or bible studies. But, the bible doesn't shy away from the gritty truth about how people mistreat each other. There are stories like the unnamed lady in the book of Judges, Bathsheba (a case of true political/military fraternization), Tamar (by the way, there are two ladies named Tamar in the Bible, and both were sexually victimized), and stories of male sexual assault.

You will find Dinah's story in Genesis 34. It is the tragic tale of a lady who was raped following her family's recent move to a new neighborhood. Her sexual assault kicks off a tsunami-sized ripple effect. Dinah's full blood brothers, Simeon and Levi embark on a trail of deceit that brings about the slaughter of an entire village. The rest of her step-brothers join in the raid and plunder of the city. The extent of her brother's actions create a rift, both in the region, and with their father. These dark clouds continue to send storms into future generations of the family.

What a mess! Which, I think is the point. You can either come right out and say something like, sexual assault is wrong...don't do it. Or, you can share a story, which allows people to contemplate how they would respond if they were in that person's shoes. Dinah's story allows us to view all

the ugly consequences that sexual assault has on the people involved, their families, and the whole community for future generations.

Along with the influence of stories like this, our modern laws find historical support in the Bible. Katie McCoy writes about rape, "God is not silent: Biblical law was revolutionary for the dignity of women.[5] Scripture recognized rape as a violent crime. In fact, biblical law considers rape on par with murder. She (the person raped) was the non-consenting victim of premeditated violence.[6] The attacker alone is held guilty. Because she was overpowered and did not consent, the victim is considered blameless.[7] " (Deuteronomy 22)

One of the ways we combat sexual assault is to bring the darkness to light, tell the story. Dinah was sexually assaulted 3700 years ago, God decided to preserve her story, which now you know.

Perhaps, one day in April, you too will be standing in your hallway, discussing Plane Talk and Sexual Assault Awareness month, and you will share Dinah's story. Antiterrorism & Force Protection - Surveillance Operations

These antiterrorism tips are on recognizing surveillance operations and actions to take if you suspect someone is conducting surveillance operations.

DEFINITION

- Continuous or periodic act of observing a person, a place, or a thing for the purpose of gathering information.

TYPES:

- Stationary
- Enroute Or Moving
- Technical Surveillance

INDICATORS:

- Illegally or suspiciously parked vehicles (e.g., along the installation perimeter or by high risk facilities)
- Occupied parked vehicles
- Personnel in unauthorized areas
- Personnel taking photographs, sketches or observing specific operations (air traffic, vehicle traffic, construction, etc.)

ACTIONS:

- Conceal your suspicions
- Do not force a confrontation
- Stop operations being observed
 - -- If possible and would not alert suspects
 - -- If operations are critical or sensitive, immediately stop actions
- Call the authorities (remember all details and make a report)
- Attempt to keep individuals under observation until authorities arrive

These tips, and other important information are located in the CJCS Guide 5260, Service Member's Personal Protection Guide: A Self-Help Handbook to Combating Terrorism, which can be found on the base intranet.

Combating Trafficking in Persons Program Management Office U.S. Department of Defense

What is Trafficking in Persons (TIP)?

The **use of force, fraud, or coercion** to compel a person to provide labor, services, or commercial sex. Any minor (under 18 years of age) involved in commercial sex is a victim of human trafficking (no force, fraud or coercion need be proved). TIP is the recruiting, harboring, transporting, providing, or obtaining a person for the purpose of exploitation. In sex trafficking, it also includes soliciting and patronizing.

Common Types of TIP: Labor Trafficking, Sex Trafficking, Child Soldiering, Domestic Servitude, Debt Bondage/Peonage, Involuntary Servitude

Who is at risk?

Victims can be of any:

- Race
- Gender
- Nationality
- Social status
- Economic status
- Immigration status

Vulnerable populations:

- Undocumented migrants
- Runaway and homeless youth
- Women and children with limited resources
- Oppressed social or cultural groups
- People displaced by natural disaster or civil conflict
- Victims of prior sexual or physical abuse

What are some indicators of TIP?*

Physical/Environmental indicators. Victims may:

- Have signs of physical abuse (bruises, cuts, burns, broken bones)
- Not possess identification papers
- Live at or be confined to their worksite
- Be escorted or closely monitored at all times
- Be in debt bondage to employer
- Suffer medical conditions such as serious communicable diseases, injuries from violence or hazardous work conditions, malnutrition, dehydration

Psychological/Behavioral indicators. Victims may be:

- Fearful
- Submissive
- Anxious
- Nervous
- Depressed
- Dependent on others
- Emotionally abused
- Lacking ability to move freely

*Indicators listed are not absolute signs of TIP, but when presenting with several are a sign of TIP.

How to respond if TIP is suspected:

If you suspect a TIP situation, do not get directly involved. **Report the situation to the appropriate authority immediately:**

Chain of Command


