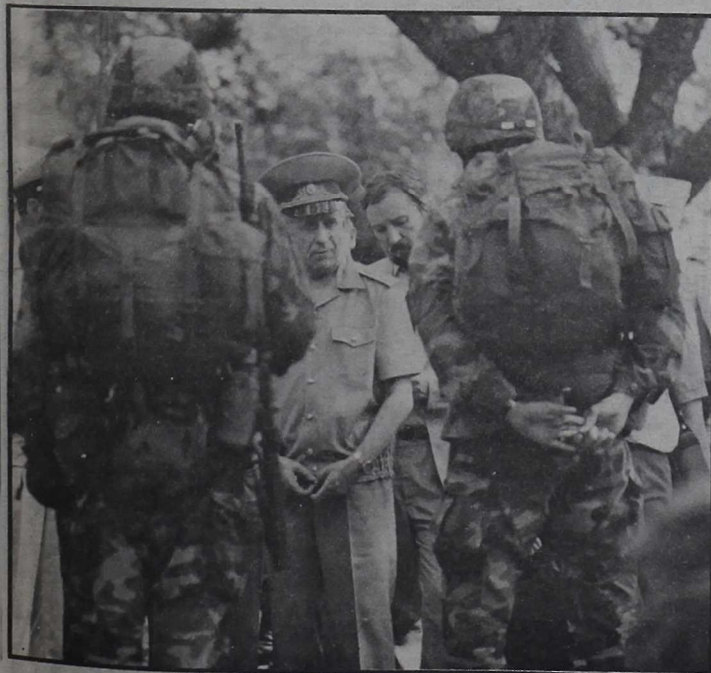

Cook, Jr., commanding general, Fleet Marine Force, Atlantic, Akhromeyev and his party landed in UH-1N Huey helicopters from Marine Light Attack Helicopter Squadron, MCAS, New River, at Tactical Landing Zone Bluebird.

Health Watch . . .

Chicken pox

Chicken pox is a highly communicable disease. The causative agent is the virus varicella. Chicken pox spreads easily because it can be spread through contact with droplets from the respiratory tract for several days prior to developing a rash. The incubation period is about 14 days from exposure until the rash develops.

In children, chicken pox is generally a mild disease. It is characterized by about two days of sore throat, fever and headache before the rash appears. The rash usually begins on the back and face spreading to the rest of the body. The rash develops into vesicles which are spots with clear fluid as well as pustules which will rupture and scab in the healing process. Chicken pox remains contagious until the sores are crusted and dried, about five to seven days after they first appear.

There is no treatment for chicken pox other than treating the symptoms, such as giving Tylenol for the fever, Benedryl to help the itching and cool baths for

itching skin. Do not use aspirin to control fever for a child who has chicken pox, unless your doctor recommends it.

Chicken pox is a normal childhood disease. If your child is healthy and doesn't display any serious symptom that concerns you, keep the child at home until the rash heals. Babysitters and day care centers should be notified, as the other children were exposed during the incubation period before the rash appeared.

If your child develops symptoms that concern you, such as severe vomiting, lesions becoming infected, difficulty breathing or swallowing, seek medical attention. If you are bringing your child to the clinic, you need to keep the child away from others. It is helpful to call ahead. Also, notify someone at the clinic as soon as you arrive so the child can be isolated.

Many adults have not had chicken pox as a child and can catch it from their children. The same instructions apply to adults as to children. Adults, however, may feel worse.



My child has a fever

Fever is one of the most common symptoms seen in pediatric emergency room visits. A fever is defined as a temperature of 101 degrees or higher. Fever is a symptom of illness, but it is not a disease. Some fevers last a few hours and some happen continue off and on for days; this all depends on the cause.

It has not been found that fevers cause brain damage. Children with low fevers (such as 101 degrees) can be very ill; and children with high fevers (104 or 105 degrees) can be happy and playful. To control fever if the child is uncomfortable, he should be given Tylenol, Tempra, Panadol, etc., according to his age and weight. The child should be dressed to prevent chilling but should not be heavily wrapped up.

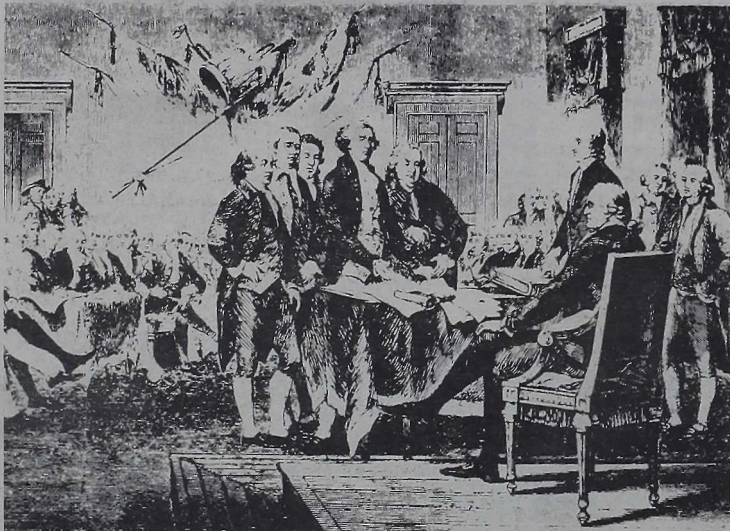
Fluids such as juice, jello and popsicles as well as Pedialyte, Lytren or Resol are often best tolerated while the child is ill. Fluids should be encouraged to prevent dehydration.

If the child needs to be seen by a doctor, you may still give an aspirin-free medicine such as Tylenol at home before the visit. If the doctor places the child on an antibiotic such as Amoxicillin, the child might still run a fever for one or two more days. During this time, you should continue to use fever-controlling medicine to keep the child comfortable. Tylenol, or other such medicines, can be given along with the antibiotics and will not harm the child.

Fever can be frightening. If your child is playful and acting his or her usual self, the chance of serious illness is low. You should seek medical attention if your child has symptoms which worry you, or if your child is less than six-months-old and has a fever of 101 degrees or more. Babies less than three-months-old should not be given Tylenol for a fever until the doctor has examined the baby to make sure there is not a serious illness. Also remember to keep Tylenol as well as all other medicines out of the reach of children.

CONSTITUTION MINUTE



THE CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION: The convention of state delegates that assembled in Philadelphia in May, 1787, was authorized to revise the Articles of Confederation, the predecessor of our present Constitution. Instead, over four hot summer months of intense debate conducted in secret, these men framed a new charter of government, fundamentally different and far more powerful than the Articles. In brief, unlike the old confederation of states, the new national government possessed both an Executive and a Judiciary, had both the power to tax and the power to raise armies and navies, and could act directly on the populace (rather than on the states) through the power to tax and regulate commerce, to draft into the Armed Forces, and to enforce its will generally either by means of law or by physical force.

The incident remains under investigation.

Welcome home India Co., 3/4 . . .

"Mighty" India Company, 3rd Battalion, 4th Marines, 2nd MarDiv., returned from their three-month tour of duty in Panama, Sunday at 6 p.m.

Signs were posted on the building and trees and everyone from relatives to dependents to friends gathered at Building 205, Hq. 3/4, to welcome their leathernecks home.

This was not a typical deployment for India Marines. These Marines lost a fellow Marine. Cpl. Ricardo M. Villahermosa, who was killed by friendly fire while on a midnight patrol April 12. Later the same day, India Co. spotted intruders inside the perimeter wire and engaged in a two-to-three-hour fire-fight.

"I personally saw eight to 10 intruders at 7:30 p.m. through a night observation device and I could tell they were militarily trained," Capt. Joseph P. Valore, India Co. commanding officer, said.

"We exchanged fire until the joint task force commander told us to cease. No Marines were injured during the fire-fight but there's no doubt in my mind they had casualties. Some of my Marines said they

witnessed bodies being dragged out of the area," Valore said.

"They did everything right the night of

Even though Lance Cpl. Feeler participated in the fire-fight, he views his deployment differently than his wife does.

"We saw what we had to do and did it," he said.

When India Co. pulled into the parking lot at 3/4's headquarters, smiles appeared on all the Marines' family members. The children saw their daddies get off the bus and ran forward to greet them.

Jeanette, with the youngest in her arms, took a little longer to reach him, but hugs soon followed.

"I'm very grateful and relieved he came home healthy," Jeanette said.

The Feelers planned a combination birthday/Father's Day/welcome home party for their Marine. It will be time to relax and enjoy each other again.

India Co. spent its last two days in Panama briefing their replacements, Lima Co., 3/4.

"The turnover went smoothly. We told them to tailor their training around everything we knew," Valore said.

The Marines of India Co. proved their readiness in the fire-fight in Panama. They endured high temperatures, humidity and the stress of being always alert for hostile intruders.

As the buses loaded with Marines pulled in, an air of excitement rose. Dependents and friends gathered around the bus doors searching for loved ones. It was a joyous moment, there were lots of hugs, kisses and handshakes.

Food was put on a table for Marines who lived in the barracks. All the Marines from India Co. were given liberty until 1 p.m. on the 11th and on the 12th the Marines will have a special "welcome home" lunch at the messhall. To make the homecoming complete the Marines were granted leave until August 1st.

But, while India enjoys the Carolina coast for three weeks, Lima Co. is digging in. It's their turn to stand watch.

About 200 Marines of Lima Co., 3rd Battalion, 4th Marines boarded two camouflaged C-141 transports at MCAS, Cherry Point, N.C., and headed for Panama July 6. These Marines will relieve India Co., 3/4, who temporarily deployed to Panama in early April as part of a 2,220 security augmentation force.

The Marines looked forward to their deployment to Panama after weeks of intense training that ended with a live-fire exercise recently.

"We shot 250 rounds through our sniper rifles," Cpl. Curtis Simpson, Surveillance Target Acquisition platoon, said. "It's the most firing we've done since I've been here."

In the weeks prior, the Lima Marines also polished their ambush patrolling skills.

"There were plenty of times when we didn't get much sleep," Cpl. Bruce Byrd said.

With their deployment to Panama, training ends and applying their experience begins.

Combat is always on a uniformed Marine's mind. And realizing it could happen is something a Marine accepts as part of the job. But it can bring considerable emotional apprehension for spouses and friends of deployed Marines.

"It's hard to see him go, especially into a situation like Panama," Debra Henry said of a friend in Lima Co.

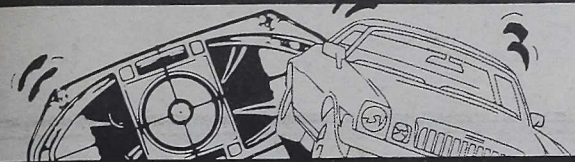
"We realize it comes with the job and it's his job," a wife said.

"It's normal to have feelings of wanting to be with your family; to see and to feel their compassion," Staff Sgt. James Young, platoon sergeant, said. "But after 10 years in the Marine Corps, this is just another deployment for my family."

"My children usually say 'Daddy's going again, but he'll be back,'" Young said.

While the Marines of Lima Co. look forward to their deployment in Panama, their families eagerly wait for them to return home.

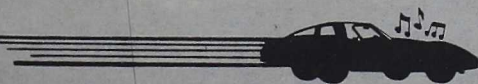

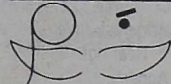

Engineer Maintenance saves a stitch in time

As a rain drop hits your forehead you climb into the shelter half for cover. Looking up as the rain beats on top of the tent, it begins to pour.

To your surprise, there is a 10-inch gash in the side of the tent. Which at this point is letting in more than enough rain to shower with.

Now what do you do?

Get wet! No...ask for some help from the fabric repair specialists with Engineer Maintenance Company, 2nd Maintenance Battalion, 2nd FSSG.

During a combat situation taking

fabricated materials in town for repairs wouldn't be possible. That's why 2nd Maint. Bn has a fabric repair platoon, to provide needed repairs in the field during a contingency.

With a Mobile Fabric Repair Shop and a generator for electricity, Fabric Repair Platoon Marines can repair equipment out in the field.

"We repair all fabricated materials, from tents to sleeping bags to 782 gear," said Sgt. Danny E. Craft, fabric repair supervisor, Eng. Maint. Co.

These Marines use more than a needle and thread to repair torn tents or ripped sleeping bags.

"The sewing machines are Marine

Corps Proof, designed to withstand abuse and sew on heavy canvas materials," said Lance Cpl.

Arthur D. Rogers, repair specialist.

Schooling involves a seven week course at Fort Lee, Va. The school familiarizes Marines with the basics first, then

sewing machine repairs.

"After learning how the machine operates, the Marines learn how to repair different types of canvas. Putting on a zipper might be easier if the sewing was on a pair of pants and not on a general purpose tent," said Rogers.

With this training, Eng. Maint. Co. has the qualifications to set up in a field environment, the same as in their shop on base.

"Out in the field we perform immediate third and fourth echelon repair. A rip

or tear four inches long or less is first and second echelon repair," said Rogers.

"In the shop we repair equipment from Little Creek, Va., to Parris Island, S.C.," said Rogers. "We receive everything from tents to field jackets.

"Any item over 65 percent of costs to repair receives a Code H. This means the item cannot be repaired and must be disposed," Rogers added.

With the support of Engineer Maint. Co., Fabric Repair Platoon, the Marines in the field will remain sewn together.

woods. They arrived at the shore of the New River, where assault amphibious vehicles were waiting to whisk them to safety.

With the passengers loaded, the back hatch was drawn closed and the AAVs churned toward Onslow Beach.

The ride proved to be an interesting experience for the civilians aboard. They found out they had to reach for handholds to steady themselves. However, they all left the AAVs with smiles on their faces — some happy, some relieved.

At the beach the "ambassador" and his entourage were quickly escorted to a tent

for a short briefing on their evacuation. Suddenly, they were told they were going to be taken by helicopter to the USS Guam (LPH-9) until the hostilities in "Carteret" ceased.

Aboard the CH-46 Sea Knight helicopter, the VIPs had a much better view than in the AAVs. From there, it was a short trip to the Guam's flight deck.

Mission completed, the captain of the Guam gave the group a short tour of the ship. Then it was back to the embassy for a closing discussion about the mission and back to business as usual.

Following a short briefing at "Mohammed's Restaurant," it was off to the "Embassy of Carteret." At the mock embassy, all the evacuees, along with their luggage, were swiftly searched for dangerous items. The search was held to uncover possible terrorist devices.

Under the protective cover of M16-A2 rifles and Squad Automatic Weapons, the evacuees weaved rapidly through the

Computer System provides better fire support

10th Marines recently tasted the fruits of fire direction control technology they found it very palatable. During the first week of June the regiment received 27 new Battery Computer Systems. According to Maj. Joe E. Collier, Communications Electronics Command, U.S. Army, the BCSs will enable the regiment to deliver supporting fire more accurately and consistently than ever before.

Collier heads the team of 17 CECOM instructors, that includes three Marine officers from Fort Sill, Okla. "We're running six classrooms and the battalion has three instructors. This is our first opportunity to teach the system to Marines," Collier said.

The artillerymen received two weeks of training on the BCS. The electronic system is a five-piece unit, which is connected directly to the gun line. This eliminates the executive officer's position but the XO will still be monitoring either from the FDC or at the battery's position," he said.

The BCS main terminal at the FDC is mounted on and powered by the M100. At the gun line, the section has an assembly/receiver that is much larger than a hand-held calculator. His receiver displays all

necessary data to accurately fire the howitzer. The gunner and assistant gunner also have a small, olive-drab box mounted next to their sights, which displays the quadrant and deflection. The power unit at the gun end is mounted on the trails of the howitzer. The entire data display group is powered by the 5-ton, prime mover.

"The BCS also has the capability to communicate digitally from the battery to higher headquarters and spread information quickly and accurately to other related computer systems."

Among the benefits of the BCS is its ability to provide data to individual guns, which increases the accuracy of the fire support by interlocking their bursts.

In the days of manual gunnery, all gun data was calculated using a target-center aiming point. They didn't calculate data for each gun. With the BCS, each gun can be corrected, allowing for more effective coverage of the target area.

"This is only our third day of classes on the system," said Staff Sgt. Walter Pylypiw, operations chief, Papa Battery 5/10. "My section is picking it up quickly. It should increase our capabilities substantially."

"The BCS will cut data calculations by nearly two minutes per target correction over the current computer system used by 10th Marines," Collier said.

"The back-up computer system we're

using takes almost two minutes to calculate data," Pylypiw said.

One BCS can run five fire missions simultaneously and calculate gun data for 12 artillery pieces. Its technology allows it to link up with other types of communications systems used by the Marine Corps and Army. This provides batteries and battalions maximum, converging fire on a target.

The innovative computer system provides 10th Marines direct, automated data from FDC to the gun line. This alleviates misinterpreted information common to voice communication.

But even the most advanced electronic FDC equipment needs a dependable back up. That back up is the knowledgeable artillery Marine.

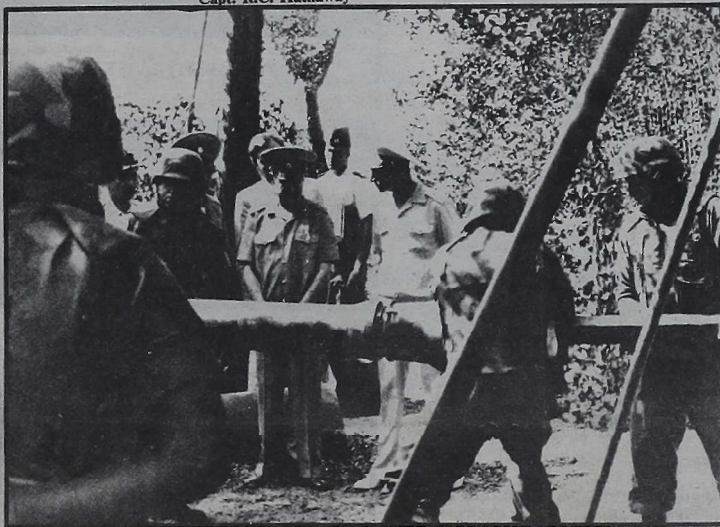

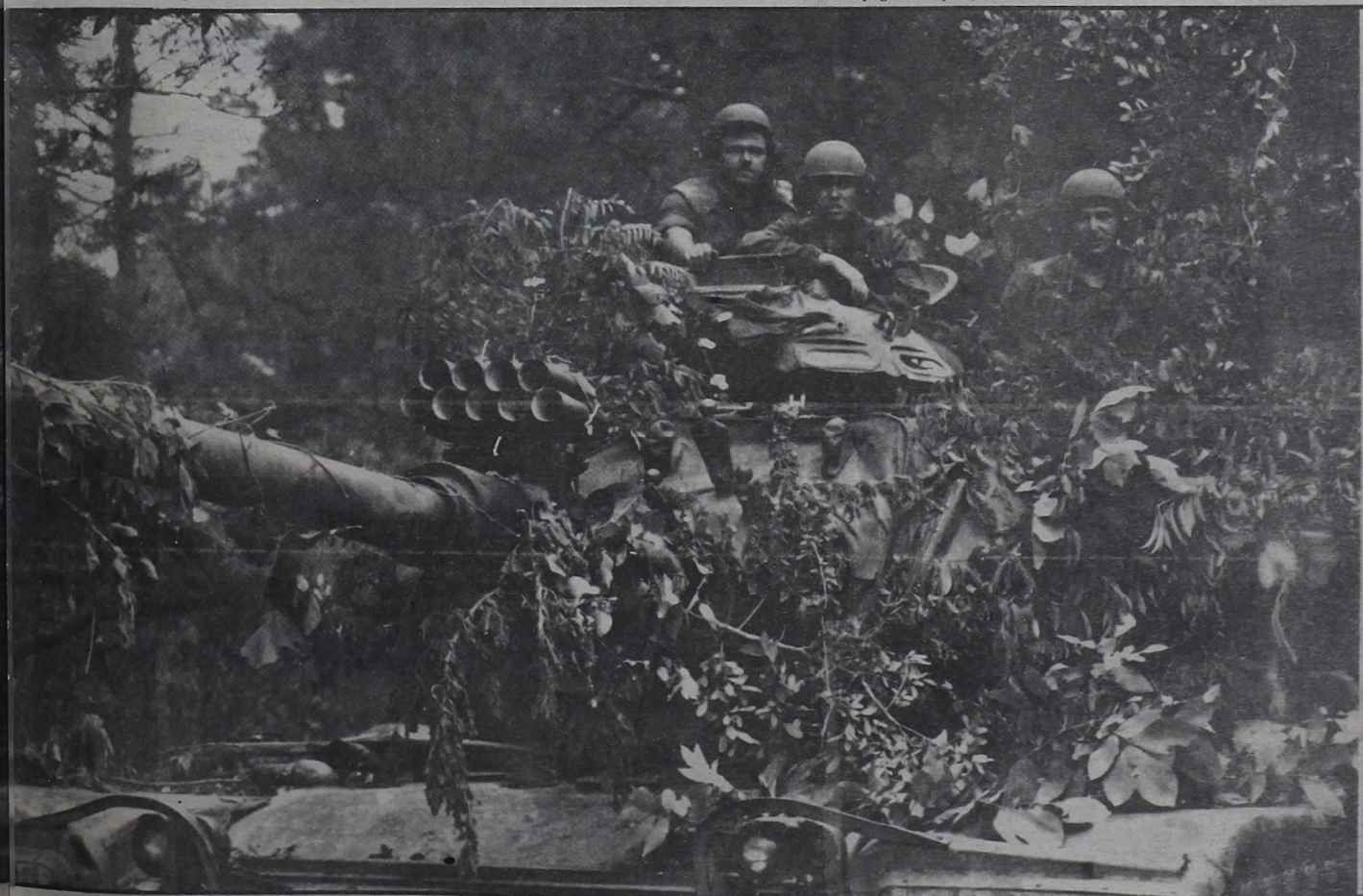

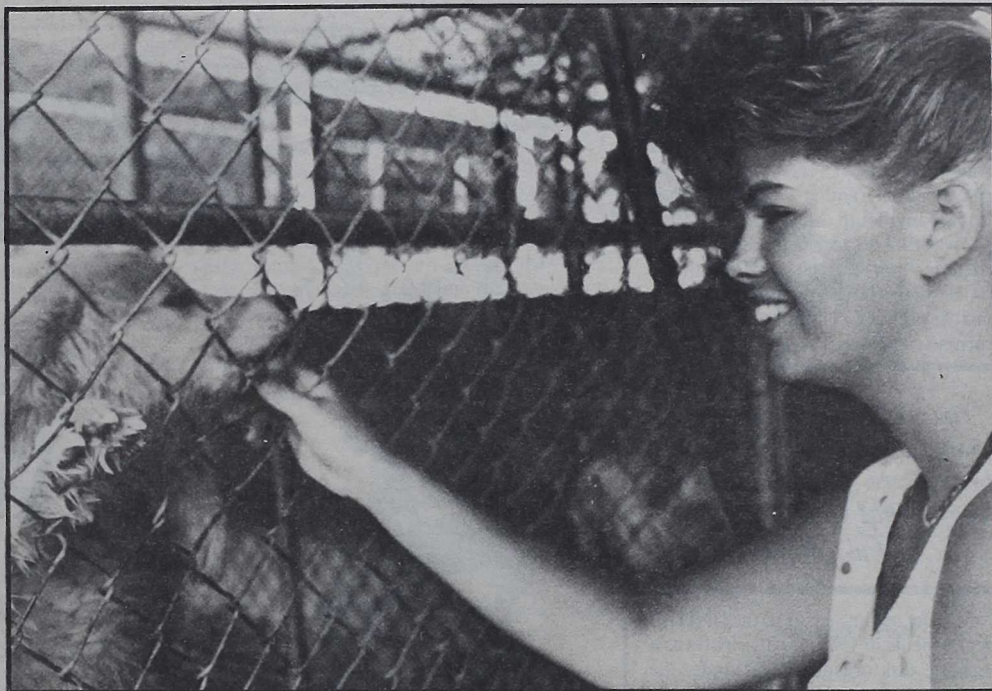
Would you throw away your family members like old socks if you had to PCS to another duty station? It seems like many family members are being treated like old toys, thrown away by their owners because of a move.

When a dog or cat is brought to the shelter, they are immediately put up for adoption.

"The only charge to adopt a pet is a 10-pound bag of pet food, or a 25-pound bag of kitty litter," said Ferrier. "That way, the shelter is self-sustaining."

"We have a good adoption rate here," said Ferrier.

The average time for a dog or puppy is four days at the shelter before adoption. For cats, it's 10 days.

"Weekly, we may take 20-25 dogs in, and about 20 of them will be adopted," Ferrier said. "As for the cats, out of about 15 taken in during a week, we might have seven or eight adopted."

One Marine who worked at the shelter became so attached to a certain kitten that he adopted it himself.

Providing care and shelter for the dogs and cats is the only thing that the animal control Marines do.

They answer the call for loose dogs and cats, animal bite victims, and suspected cases of cruelty to animals.

"It's a pretty important job," said Ferrier. "I really enjoy it."

When a call of a possible rabies carrier is received, the Marines automatically quarantine it back at the shelter.

"We just can't take the chance of contaminating the rest of the animals," said Ferrier.

Most of the dogs and cats brought in are healthy, beautiful animals, but people just can't keep them for some reason," he said.

Daily, between the shelter's working hours of 9 a.m. and 4:30 p.m., and 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. on Saturday, many people visit, looking for a possible pet out of the dozens of dogs and cats of nearly every breed and age. Many leave with a new family member.

Many times, an animal is adopted, leaving the shelter with a new family member.

"It's not easy for some people to give up their pets," said Ferrier. "After all, they're family members too."

In one case, a woman brought in her cat to put

it up for adoption. She left the cat, went out to the parking lot, and started crying. After about 10 minutes, she returned to the shelter, begging the Marines to let her have it back. After getting her friend again, she left happier than ever.

"That's one of the success stories that makes this job rewarding," said Ferrier. "It makes our job worthwhile to see a smile on a new pet owners face, and knowing that the animal will have a good home."

The shelter, on Parachute Tower road adjacent to the Game Warden's office, encourages military and civilians to look for their pets at the shelter.

Shelter Marines encourage new pet owners to bring in their puppies and kittens to veterinarians for shots, and older cats and dogs for yearly vaccinations.

The friendship between people and their pets is forever, and there is a lot of friendship waiting to be adopted at the Base Animal Shelter.

About 200 Marines and Sailors ready for UNITAS deployment to South America

More than 200 Marines and Sailors will say goodbye to Camp Lejeune when they sail south for the 29th United American States (UNITAS) deployment and conduct training with servicemen from many South American countries.

The UNITAS Marine detachment will conduct more amphibious landings, travel farther and visit more countries than any other U.S. Marine organization currently deployed.

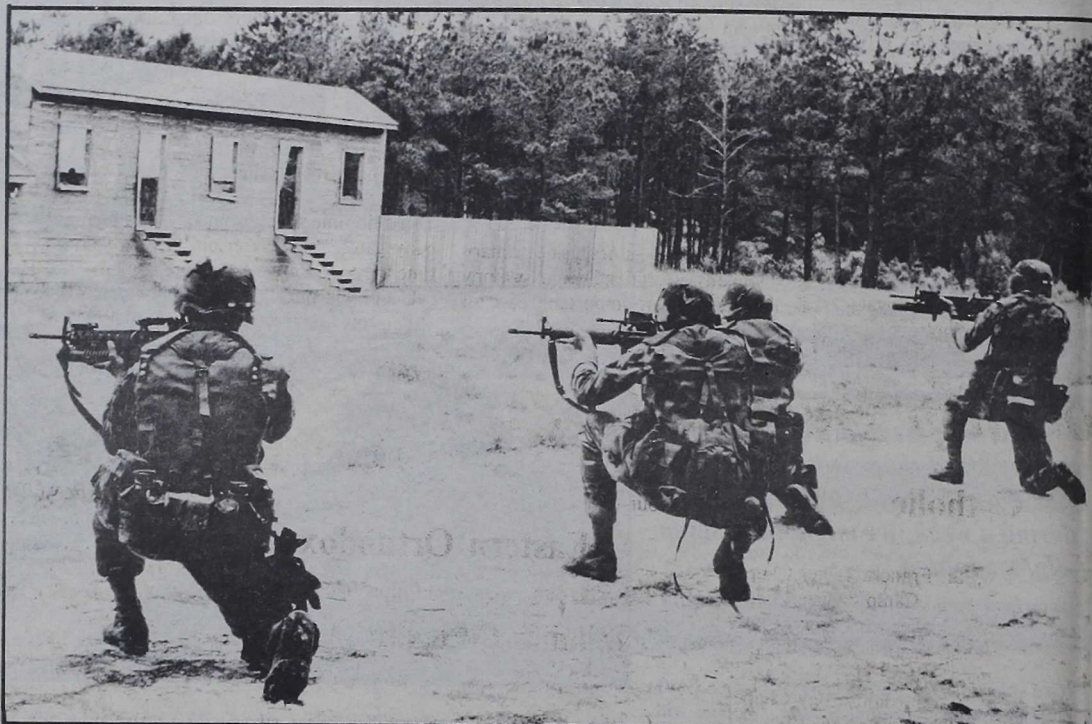

MarDet became a part of the UNITAS deployments in 1981. It participates as a separate task organized unit under the command of the U.S. Commander-in-Chief, South Atlantic. The four-month mission includes acting as a forward deployed unit to conduct training exercises, amphibious operations, demonstrations and ceremonies designed to promote inter-operability and support mutual defense interests with South American and U.S. forces.

The MarDet began its pre-deployment work-up in March, training in all aspects of its mission requirements, including

individual training. This included various weapons training, NBC block training, demolition, patrolling, rappelling, counter-terrorism, noncombatant evacuation operations and escape and evasion.

Ten days of the detachment's training was at the Army's Fort A.P. Hill, Va., and included a helo raid on the Combat City at Fort Pickett.

"The raid at Fort Pickett was realistic since none of us had been there before and didn't know what to expect," said Cpl. Michael J. Daley, squad leader, rifle platoon. "Recon was inserted the day before and had scouted the area for the best approach.

"Our mission was to rescue an ambassador from a U.S. military complex and destroy all classified papers.

"There were 150-200 Army National Guardsman positioned in the city as aggressors," said Cpl. Don L. Henry, another squad leader. "We were using the MILES gear (Multiple Integrated Laser Evaluation System) for the raid to record casualties. Snipers in buildings were an added problem."

The majority of exercises at A.P. Hill were conducted with live fire, as will be the case in most of the South American exercises.

"At A.P. Hill, we were doing what would be done in a combat situation," said Henry. "The rifle squads were given a problem and had an hour or so to figure out the best plan of attack by themselves and then carry out the plan. It wasn't done with specific orders from an officer."

"The training there was the best and most realistic I've had in the Marine Corps in preparation for a float," said

Daley. "It gave us the opportunity to work together in an unknown environment in a stressful situation."

According to Cpl. Stephen B. Bell, who was with rifle platoon on last year's deployment and is this year's training NCO, the deployment is good training and a good experience.

"Training with the Marines from different countries is interesting," he said. "They were curious about us and our weapons. They're friendly and they like trading things, such as rank insignia and covers."

"Communication with the foreign Marines wasn't much of a problem since many of the U.S. Marines in the detachment speak Spanish. This year about 2 percent of the MarDet can speak Spanish," he said.

Bell said an added plus to the deployment is the many portcalls that are made. "Last year, we visited 13 countries, and conducted about 17 landings. The two thought were the best were Rio de Janeiro and the island country of Barbados."

When the final week of preparation ends, MarDet UNITAS will sail forth to put their months of training to the test with their Marine counterparts in South America.

"No conflicts have been reported between people and the alligators, and common sense will keep it that way," said Peterson.

According to Peterson, the alligators, which can grow up to 12 feet long and weigh 350 pounds, are on the North Carolina endangered species list, therefore protected by federal and state laws.

"If you see an alligator, just leave it alone," said Peterson. At no time should you feed or handle alligators, regardless of its size."

Peterson said alligators reside primarily in streams, marshlands, and swampy areas, and are an important part of nature.

"They are a vital link in the food chain, providing an excellent service," said Peterson. "They balance the garfish populations, therefore leaving more bass and other game fish for fishing."

According to Peterson, June through July is alligator mating season, and mothers are very protective of their nests. The nest is a two-three-foot high mound of mud, six-seven-feet in diameter. The nests are usually above the high-water mark, near the treeline, close to small streams.

"At no time should someone handle a baby gator," said Peterson. "From the time they are hatched, they are ready to eat, and will bite."

Peterson said there is no danger to peo-

ple at Lejeune, but extra caution should be taken when in an alligator habitat.

Although the Lejeune alligators are not found on stylish fashion wear, they are an important trademark. Not of Lacoste products, but of Lejeune's wildlife.

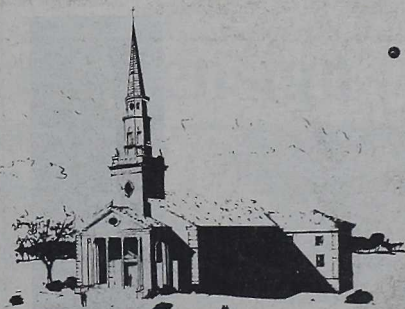

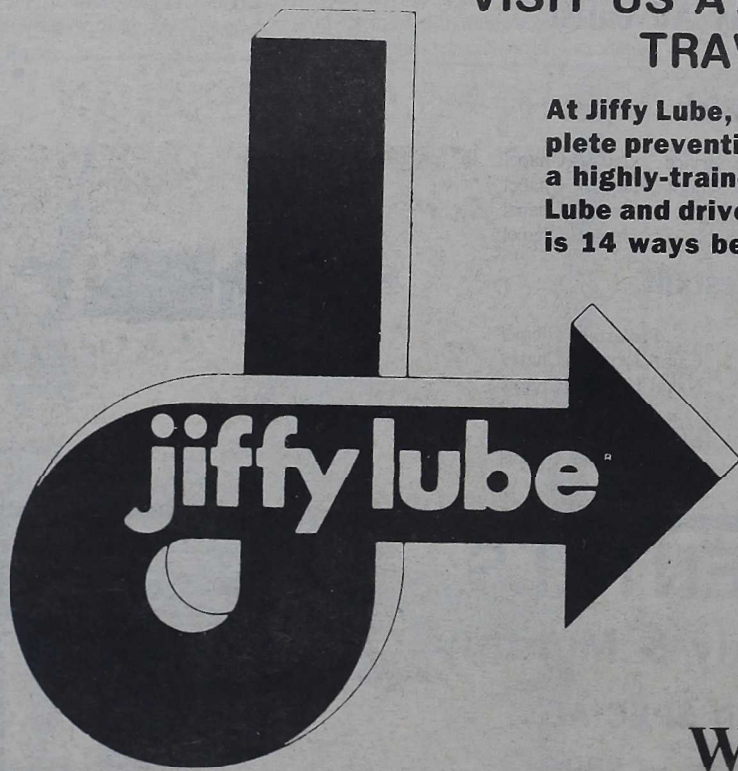

New computer training system helps NIS agents

The Naval Investigative Service here has a new computer training system that may help agents build confidence when they're in a hostile situation where innocent people could be shot.

The computer is the brainchild of inventor Robert Beckman and retired NIS agent Jack Tuckish. The Shoot-No-Shoot computer is on loan from NIS Headquarters, Md.

Shoot-No-Shoot is a training aid for agents who shoot the .357-caliber Magnum. Outfitted with a light beam instead of bullets, the computer enables agents to fire at projected images on a movie screen. Another computer analyzes the agent's reactions to the simulated scenarios.

"Shoot-No-Shoot is designed to test judgement, reaction time and accuracy with a handgun in a many situations," Thomas F. Clark, assistant special agent, NIS, said.

Computer feedback lists statistics.

These statistics include how many other agents choose to draw or shoot on a target. The computer then prints a casualty report.

The computer also analyzes the agent's response while providing alternatives and solutions for improvement.

During a simulated knife attack 280 out of 403 agents drew their weapons; seventeen, for instance, fired. The computer read-out sheet goes on to list when the weapon should have been fired according to a First-Draw Stimulus, that is, the first incident prompting an agent to draw his weapon.

The scenarios can't be second guessed. Several situations are programmed to have alternate endings. One in particular involves a man reaching for a can of soda instead of a weapon. "It takes a properly trained eye to make the right assessment. Shoot No Shoot is the perfect learning tool. Shoot No Shoot is a valuable training aid designed to save lives as well as dollars," Special Agent Patrick M. Thompson, said.

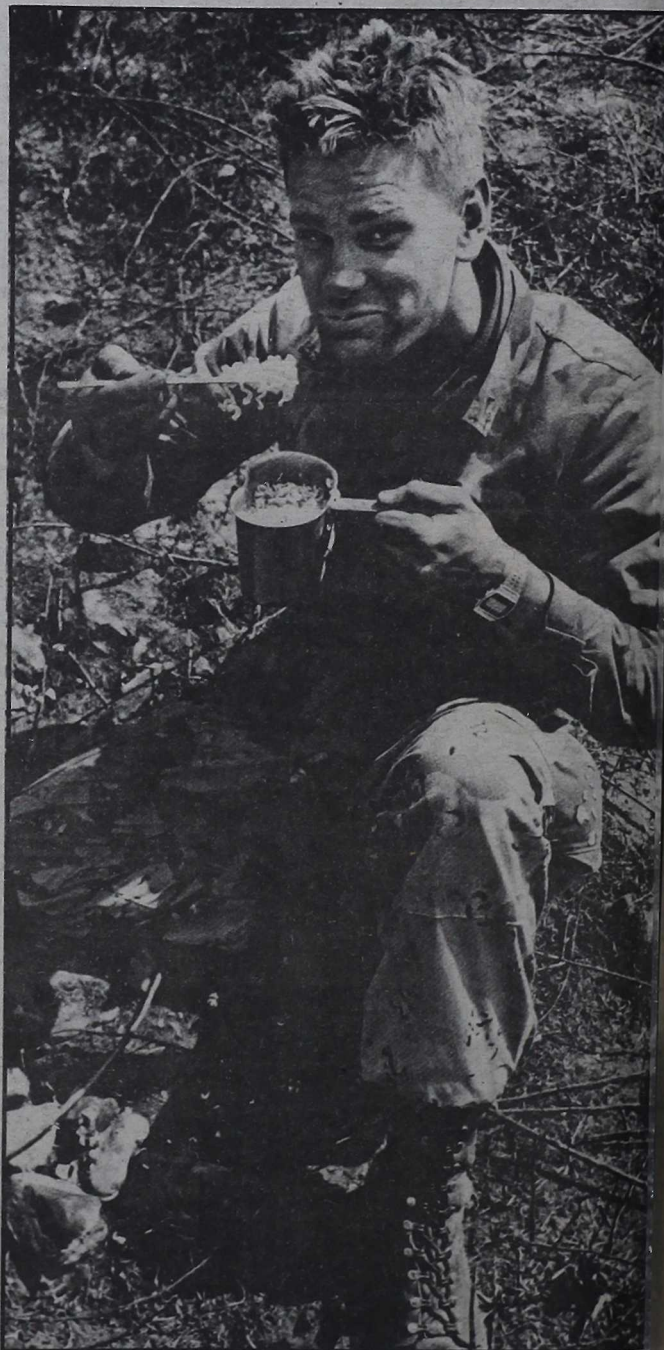

Many of the all-stars attribute their awesome physical condition to their diet of hot dogs, rootbeer and peanut butter sandwiches.

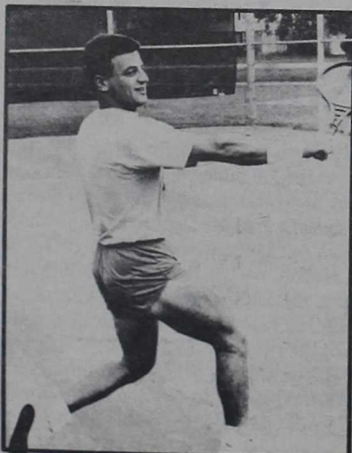
The all-stars will be playing Great Bridge National in the first game of the double-elimination tournament.

The hard work has paid off for him. As a result of the championships, Kelman has the opportunity of a lifetime.

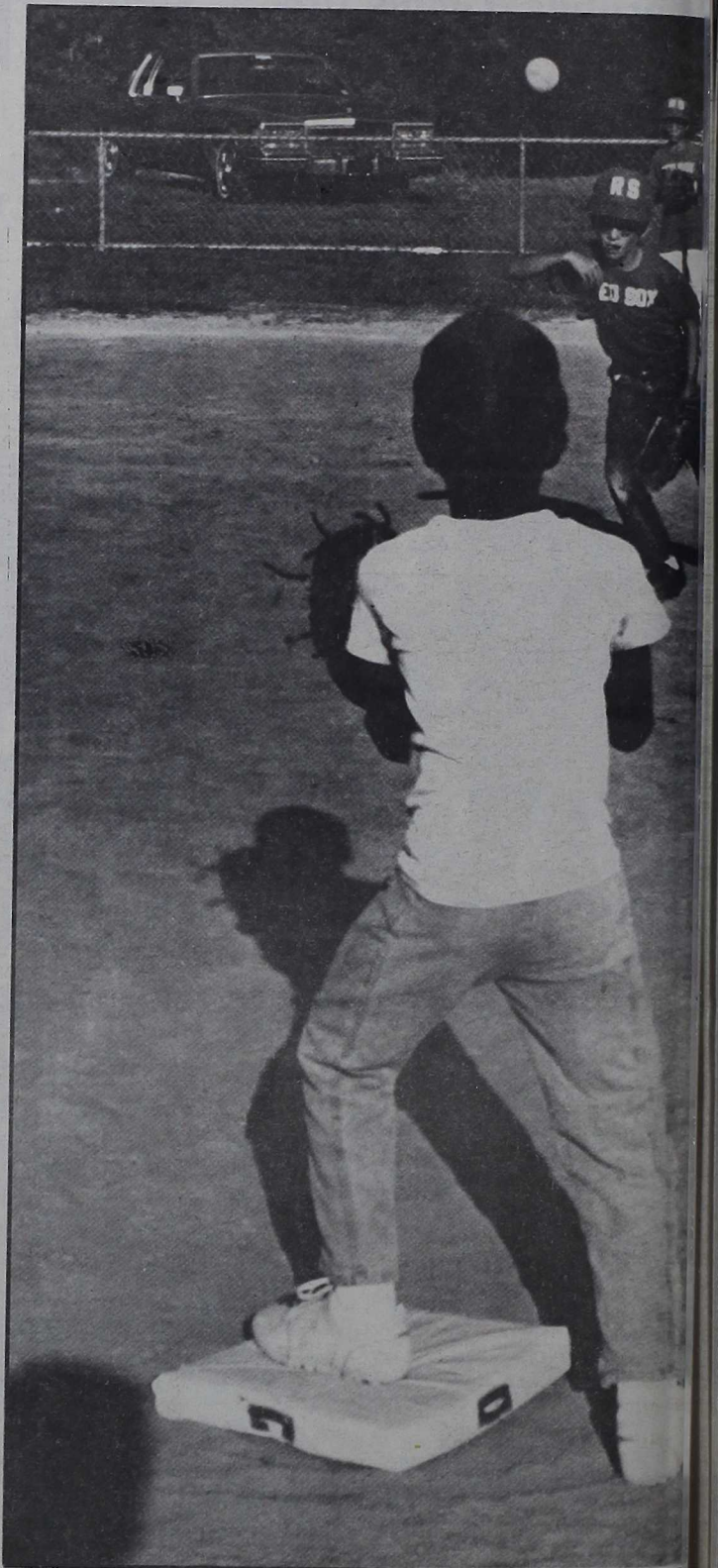
He has the opportunity to play in the 1988 Olympics.
