Long time turns to brig time for boxer

Lance Cpl. Joseph A. Pemberton, a three-time all-Marine boxing champion and two-time interservice champion, was found guilty of wrongful use of cocaine in a special court martial proceedings recently.

Cpl. Pemberton, formerly of the 3rd Battalion, was a well-known figure in the 38th Conseil Internationale du Sport Militaire (CISM) Boxing Tournament held here last December.

Pemberton reached the finals in the light division after defeating opponents from Denmark and South Korea. Despite an obvious height disadvantage in the final round of the 201-pound division, he beat West Germany's Stefan Wielmes could not recover from a right uppercut, and Pemberton won by points.

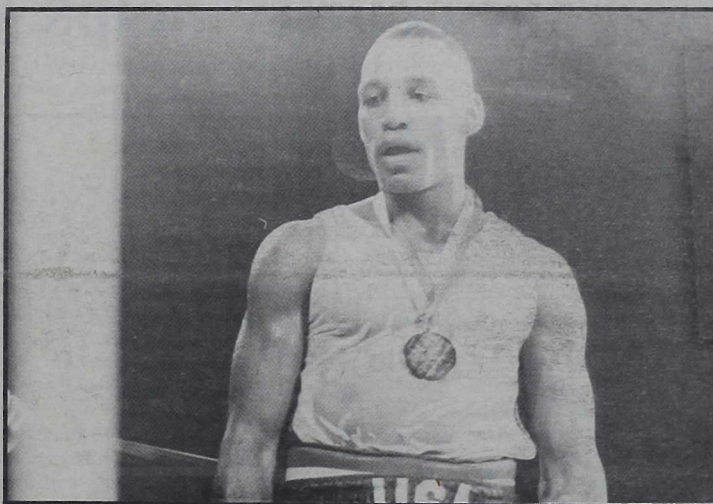
From CISM, Pemberton became eligi-

ble for and went on to the Olympic Boxing Trials. While at the trials, he made a name for himself in another way. A urinalysis test he took while at the trials came up positive for cocaine.

Pemberton was pulled from the Olympic trials and returned here to await a different type of trial. The pending special court martial made him ineligible to compete for a place on the Olympic team.

The court martial was held Aug. 30. Pemberton pleaded not guilty, with the defense that the drug was put in drink or in a cigarette he had had at a party. Despite that, the military judge found him guilty of wrongful use of cocaine.

Now, instead of looking forward to competing in the Olympics in Seoul, South Korea this summer, he is looking forward to 75 days confinement in the base brig, forfeiture of \$300 a month for two months and reduction to private.

Beware— it's still tick season

Anyone who has been in the field lately, or is engaged in outdoor activities such as camping or fishing can tell you—tick season is upon us. These critters seem bent on making life miserable for those of us who work and play in the outdoors.

Ticks are arachnids, meaning they are not insects, but are closely related to spiders, scorpions and mites. They are of significant public health importance because they are second only to mosquitoes in the numbers of diseases they can transmit to humans.

Ticks are very common aboard Camp

Lejeune, especially during the months of April through November. The most common of the tick species here is the Lone Star Tick, which is readily identified by the prominent white spot on its back. All ticks require blood to live and reproduce, and they crawl to the ends of grass blades and branches to climb aboard a prospective host that may happen by. They are also attracted to carbon dioxide, which is exhaled by humans and animals. Once on the host, a tick may remain unattached for several hours while searching for a good site to insert its mouthparts and feed.

Tick larvae and nymphs also feed on

humans, and because of their small size, may be difficult to detect. Ticks must remain attached for several hours before any disease transmission can occur, so they should be removed carefully and promptly.

The best line of defense against tick bites is personal protection:

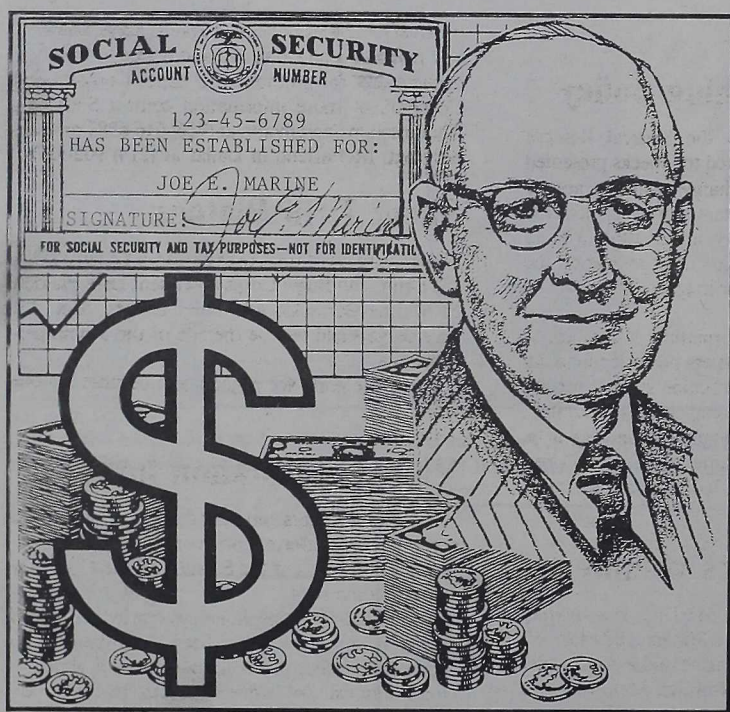
- Avoid tick habitats if possible.
- Wear long pants with cuffs tucked into socks. Tuck shirt into pants.
- Light colored clothing will help you spot any ticks.
- Use repellents.
- Brush off clothing and pets before entering the home.

Undress and check for ticks, especially looking at constricted areas such as beltline and ankles.

Remove any attached ticks by tugging repeatedly with tweezers. Do not place where they mouthparts are in contact with skin. Take care not to let mouthparts in the skin, and apply antiseptic to prevent infection.

Social Security helps with financial planning

Recently, the government introduced a new and invaluable financial planning tool that is available to every U.S. citizen.

The Social Security Administration will now send out, upon request, an application for the new "Personal Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement."

"This statement will ask a few questions concerning net earnings for last year and this year along with an average estimate of future yearly earnings, and the planned retirement age," said agency spokesperson, Phil Gambino. This cost-free service is provided to all workers regardless of age or occupation, with the exception of those already at retirement age, said Gambino.

After being reviewed by the Social Security Administration's data center in California, each applicant will receive an estimate of just how much one will receive in terms of Social Security benefits, according to Gambino.

If no future earnings estimate is made by the applicant, the SSA will show projected benefits and entitlements on the assumption of no future earnings, said

Gambino.

The statement will show marital and retirement survivors' and dependent benefits and will list yearly wages and Social Security taxes for cross-year purposes.

The statement will show retirement survivors' benefits and will list yearly wages and Social Security taxes.

An application form can be obtained by calling 1-800-937-2000, the toll-free number. Just ask for extension number SSA-7004. If the line is busy, take into consideration that the SSA is currently responding to some 500,000 calls per hour. If the line remains busy, call the Consumer Information Center, 55, Social Security Administration, Pueblo, Colo. 81009, or contact the Social Security office at 455-5707.

Each application received by the Social Security Administration will be processed and returned in six weeks, depending on the amount received at that particular time.

Constitution minute

On Sept. 5, 1776, a uniform was prescribed for the Continental Marines which consisted of green coats with white facings, a round hat with the left side of the brim pushed up and a stiff leather stock worn around the neck. From this leather stock came the nickname "leatherneck," a term which has lasted to the present day.

In December 1776, about 300 Marines, who had been organized into a battalion under Samuel

Nicholas, joined General Washington's army prior to the Battle of Trenton. Nicholas by this time had been promoted to major. Although the Marines were kept on the southern side of the Delaware River as a reserve force and did not actually participate in the initial battle of Trenton, their presence was nonetheless significant. This was the first time that regular units of Marines, both infantry and artillery, ever served with the U.S. Army.

G Marine found dead

Marine, Cpl. David M. Fennell, 30, of 2nd Battalion, 2nd FSSG, was found dead in his barracks the morning of Aug. 26 from a heart attack by smoke inhalation.

The accident occurred Aug. 24 while Fennell was participating in combat skills training. During that time, CS gas, or chlorobenzyl-malononitrile, was used.

At this time, officials are determining whether the death from CS gas was a contributing factor.

CS gas is a powderless solid that becomes a gas when released from its container. It is considered non-lethal.

The exact cause of death was determined to be a heart attack brought on by a deterioration of the lungs caused by smoke inhalation.

The investigation is being conducted by the 1st Maintenance Bn. and the Naval Hospital. Fennell was a native of New York, N.Y.

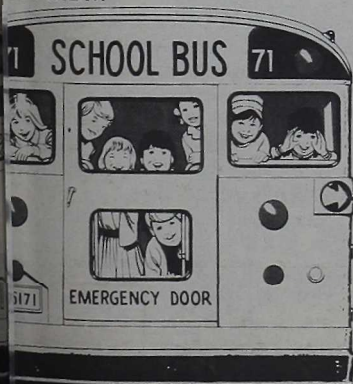

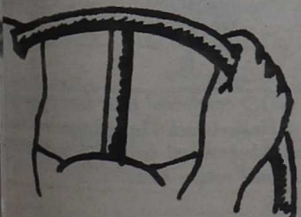

26th MEU comes home as a team

August 28th turned out to be a little brighter for many Camp Lejeune/Jacksonville residents. Five U.S. Navy ships of Amphibious Squadron-8 brought Marines and Sailors of the 26th Marine Expeditionary Unit back from a six-month deployment to the Mediterranean.

Designated Special Operations Capable upon embarkation, the 26th MEU assumed the Landing Force, 6th Fleet, responsibility from the 22nd MEU during March in Rota, Spain, and began a cycle of training highlighted by NATO exercise Dragon Hammer 88.

In all, five amphibious assaults, five rehearsal landings and four amphibious raids were conducted, including Spanish PHIBLEX (Amphibious Landing Exercise) at Sierra Delta Retin. The exercise featured cross-training with the Spanish Marines, and inert TOW missile firings by Marine Medium Helicopter Squadron-365(Rein), AH-1T Cobra helicopter.

It wasn't all work and no play, though. Following the Spanish PHIBLEX, the 26th MEU made its first port calls at the Spanish beach resorts of Benidorm, Port Mahon, Menorca; and neighboring Palma, Mallorca.

Later, in northern Italy, the MEU honed small unit skills, developed Rigid Raiding Craft (RRC) procedures and conducted a night-time combined air/surface backload.

Despite the busy schedule in the first two months, at least partial concentration was set on the first week of May.

Dragon Hammer-88 was a mid-level NATO exercise conducted on the southern tip of Sardinia combining forces from Italy, France, Great Britain, the Netherlands and the United States.

During the Dragon Hammer Exercise an Italian Lagunari platoon joined with

"A" Co., BLT 1/8 to storm the beaches from AAVs (Amphibious Assault Vehicles). French Foreign Legionnaires and "C" Co. hit further inland from helicopters while the British 45 Commando arrowed for another objective against the combined "Orange" forces of "Delta Company" BLT 1/8, and two Italian "Leopard" tank platoons.

From Sardinia, the 26th MEU headed north and tied up at Toulon and Marseille, France. For many, this was their first exposure to the fabled Riviera, and the weather finally lent itself to the picture-perfect tableau found in the travel brochures. The French also opened up the gates of their extensive training complex at Camp De Canjuers. For the first time in memory, the French were treated to the sight of Marine armor in the form of AAVs and M60-A1 tanks. The mountainous terrain and ever-changing

weather also proved a challenge to the squadron who, again, conducted the majority of their operations from shore and continued to log extensive NVG time.

The events in France which mirrored the marches of liberation of 40 years ago also brought out the best in French hospitality. The MEU was invited to join the French citizens on Memorial Day honoring the Americans who had fallen during the invasion of Europe. After providing color and honor guard at the U.S. cemetery in Draguignan, the Marines were then shown continuing French gratitude by being taken into the villagers' hearts and homes for the rest of the day.

"Next to Dragon Hammer," said Col. J.B. Creel, commanding officer of the MEU. "The time we spent with the French was the high point in the cruise. We had the chance to interact a lot with the French people, both professionally and socially."

Considering that threats can come to unarmed or lightly protected U.S. ships at sea, the MEU developed long-range ship reinforcement techniques. Using CH-53E "Super Stallion" helicopters, aerial refueling and fastrope techniques, 26th MEU Marines were able to effectively deploy 60 to 70-man fast-reaction security forces onto a threatened ship within a few hours.

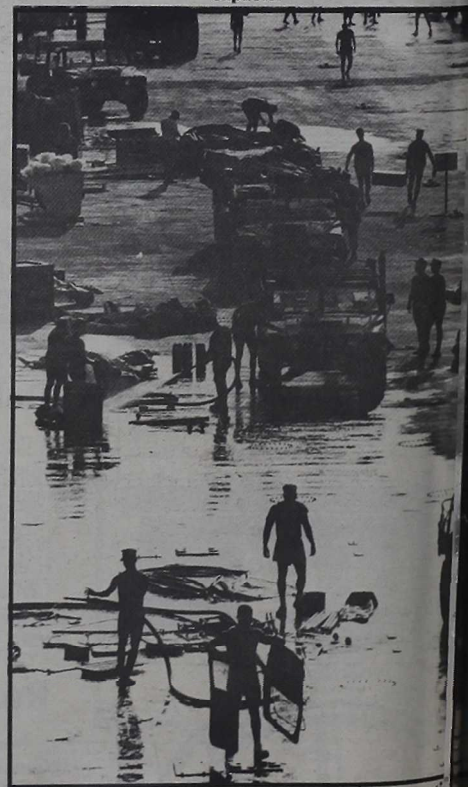
"This was a

real lesson in another way for well," Creel added. "We were given the mission to work out though not that kind of experience. I saw and take the problem, approach in a methodical manner and think it through. I realized that, when you give a Marine the right assignment, with the right training and equipment, he's going to succeed."

To sum up the MEU's deployment, Col. Creel said, "of course, none of these guys took care of each other, but they took care of their responsibilities too. That went a long way toward making everyone keep their mind on the job. As a result, we're coming home a closer team; better trained and more capable."

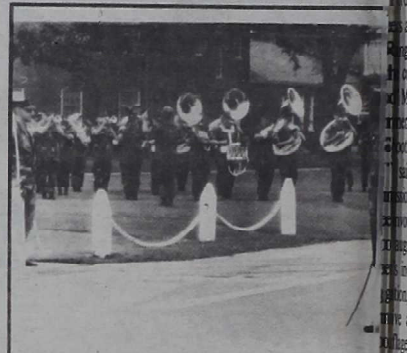
The unit spent two weeks fine-tuning rifle movements and drill for the ceremony.

put under stress, not only physically, but mentally.

"On the first day of class, the students must take a 'keep in mind system' (KIMS) test," said Owens, a sniper for more than seven years. "They view a formation of objects on a piece of material for one minute, then we cover it up. The students must then draw on a piece of paper what the objects were and where they were placed. It's pretty hard to do."

In order to be eligible for instruction at the sniper school, the applicants must be rifle experts, be fully competent in field skills, and have run a first class PFT.

"We don't really have time to teach the students to shoot, so that's why we require the students to be rifle experts," said Owens. "As far as field skills and land navigation are concerned, they couldn't even start the course successfully if they couldn't take care of themselves in the field. We want men who can think for themselves."

For the first two weeks of school, the students are evaluated intensely by the instructors to determine

their level-headedness.

The students study their prospective trade for long hours every day, during which they devote up to six hours to shooting, and the rest to classes.

"If you're not motivated, this school is the wrong place to be," Owens said with pride. "If a Marine has the right motivation and is willing to learn, the instructors can make that Marine a Scout/Sniper. I wish that every Marine could be Scout/Sniper qualified," he said.

The school's instructors agree that their school gives the basics, but that the newly graduated snipers need to expand on their knowledge and skill in a Fleet Marine Force Surveillance Target Acquisition platoon.

Once the students arrive at a STA platoon, they go in depth into their two-fold mission; the reduction of selected key targets and targets of opportunity, as well as operating in a reconnaissance mode in gathering information and reporting it to the battalion commander.

"Marine snipers are used primarily as the eyes and ears of the battalion commander," said Staff Sgt. Kelly Feldmann, STA platoon Sgt. for 3/4.

The sniper school prides itself on its graduates and their skill. "When the students leave here, they should be able to pick up any weapon and hit what they're aiming at," said Owens.

Snipers have gained recognition and respect throughout the years by such men as Carlos Hathcock, the legendary Marine sniper who had 93 confirmed kills during the Vietnam War.

The snipers of today know that they are a unique breed of Marine. They will continue to ensure that their motto of "death from afar" is just as accurate as the sniper rifles they carry.

Scout Platoon: a cut above

The Marine Corps is always looking for a few good men. Regimental Scout Platoon, 2nd Marines, is looking for a few especially good men.

"Our goal is to have our Marines be able to carry a 100-pound pack, ski 20 miles and still be able to accomplish their mission," said 1st Lt. M.A. Mahler, platoon commander. "I'd like to think every Marine is 'elite.' The Marine that makes it in Scout Platoon is someone a cut above that."

The platoon is being formed to serve as both an organic reconnaissance unit for the Regimental Landing Team and to become an arctic warfare instructor cadre for the regiment. The Scouts will be trained initially as mountain warfare leaders, employing the techniques of winter warfare and scout skiing. Additionally, plans call for platoon members to be jump-qualified and sniper-trained.

Qualifying for Scout Platoon, though, is an experience to itself. The first two indoctrination sessions, 24-hour tests of night navigation skills, marching, swimming and running, showed a 60 percent attrition rate.

"The indoctrination basically tests a Marine's military skills, his power of observation, his endurance and his poise," Mahler said.

The indoctrinations pitted the prospective Scouts on an extremely challenging course. Initially, each

Marine carried 50-pound packs from the 2nd Marines Headquarters to OP-5 and then Combat Town. From there, each Marine was tested on his night navigation skills, with checkpoints ranging almost to the Intracoastal Waterway. Each Marine then made his way, still carrying the fully-loaded pack, to Weil's Point on French Creek.

Following a short oral test on weapons to see how alert they were after the nighttime ordeal, the Marines then swam across French Creek. From there, they carried logs in two and three-man teams to the French Creek obstacle course and proceeded to negotiate the course with the logs.

The prospective Scouts then followed up the "O" course with a PFT and wrapped the indoctrination up with another test of observation skills. Those who remained finished the grueling test with personal interviews by the platoon commander.

"We never knew what was coming next," said Cpl. Thomas Houlihan, part of the first group to take the indoctrination. Nine of the 26 Marines who took the test qualified. "It was draining physically and mentally."

"The indoctrination was harder than I expected," said Cpl. H.M. Smith, one of four "survivors" from a nine-man group that took the second test Aug. 23-24. "A lot of situations were up to the individual to solve. I'm still having tank-trail nightmares from the night navigation."

The indoctrination is designed to find Marines that

will be independent thinkers, operating individuals as well as part of a team.

"The scout will have a very good knowledge of the terrain and will know the overall picture," Mahler said. "He will be someone who can take the information and be able to report directly to the regimental commander with information that is vitally determining how the regiment will fight."

Since this is the first scout platoon organized by the Commandant's restructuring plan, the 2nd Marines' scouts will also help define the other regimental scout units.

"There's a challenge to being the first," Houlihan said. "What we do will help other platoons decide what kind of mission they can undertake during the indoctrination."

"I tried out for the challenge," Smith said. "It is something completely different from anything the Marine Corps offers."

"This unit will live up to Marines' standards," Mahler said. "If a Marine doesn't learn something new every day, there's no challenge. He's not a Marine." Several openings remain in the platoon organization. Any Marine, regardless of rank, is corporal or below and has previous experience can obtain information on openings for the unit by contacting Staff Sgt. E. J. Smith at 451-1313 or 1st Lt. 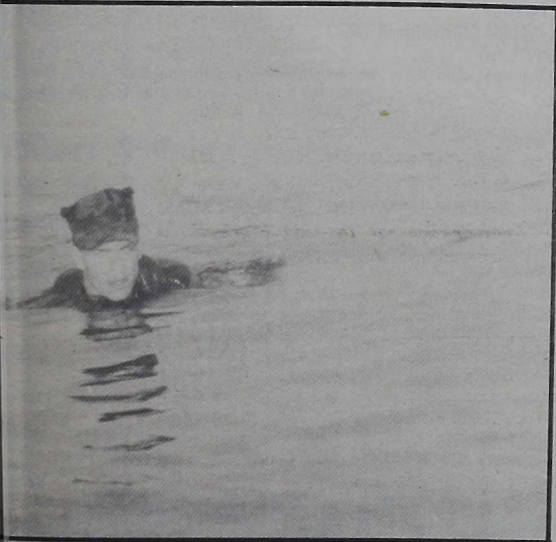

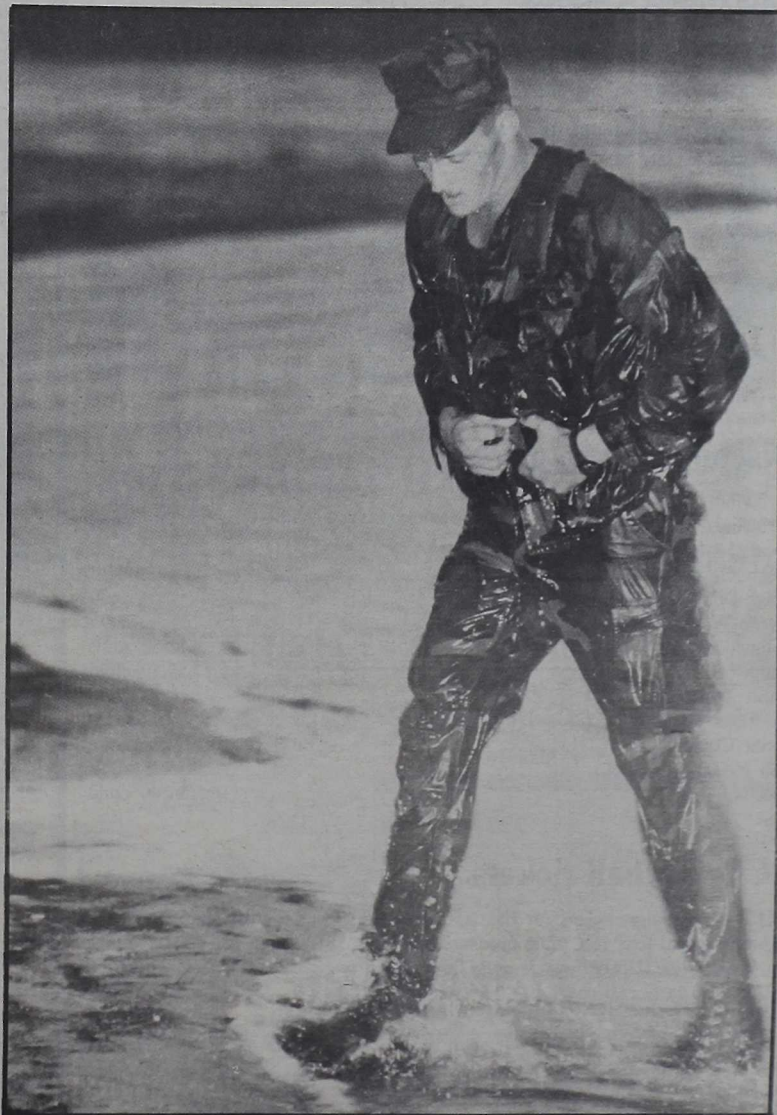

Voting—not only a right, it's everyone's obligation

"You've got people dying to get into the United States," said retired Col. J. W. Marvel, during the voting awareness week kickoff here last week.

"You've got people getting out in the middle of oceans in boats and people coming across the borders in the South. You've got people; refugees, coming in from Central America," said Marvel. "They want to get to this great country of ours—And why? Because of the freedoms we have in this country, and one of those freedoms is the right to vote."

Colonel Marvel, who spent more than five years as a prisoner of war in North Vietnam, currently serves as the training/education director at Marine Corps Air Station, Cherry Point. During his recent speech, he shared a few POW memories and linked them to the importance of getting out to vote.

"This is a right that a lot of people died for," Marvel said. "It's not only a right, it's an obligation. It's something that you should do. So, it's a responsibility on every American."

Probably one of the first times Marvel realized that he would be missing his opportunity to vote was during his first 18 months of solitary confinement. In his 9-foot by 9-foot cell, inscribed on the wall was AUH20 '68, which according to Marvel were the symbols for Goldwater. (Then Sen. Barry Goldwater, was defeated in the 1964 presidential election by Johnson.)

"You don't get too many chuckles when you're in confinement like that, anything you can get lasts pretty long," Marvel said while recalling the eagerness of the North Vietnamese to find out what the inscription meant.

"We didn't know who was running for President, but he (Goldwater) would have made a good choice," he said. "It's wierd when you miss and election and you have no idea who is actually running for President in your country."

After being moved to what Marvel

referred to as the infamous Hanoi Hilton prison camp, communication became more refined between the POWs. "By being organized and getting communication going, we were able to pass a lot of things that were happening," he said.

When Marvel and the other POWs got word about the 1972 presidential elections between Gov. George McGovern and Richard Nixon they held a mock election. Of the 350 prisoners that voted, 348 voted for Nixon and two for McGovern.

"We wanted someone who would bring us home," said Marvel. "Regardless of what you've heard about Nixon as you were growing up and the Watergate scandals and all that, Nixon understood the Communists."

"There's a lot of things going on in this country that we don't like," said Marvel. "I didn't like it when I was sitting in prison watching people demonstrate against the war. I didn't like it, but I accepted it, because that's what it's all about. Being an American, you have that choice. If you want to say something is not right and you don't believe it, then you can say it."

"Just because there's things happening in this country, we've got to stop and think that's our right," he said. "because this is America and we have freedom to do those types of things."

"That's what the Marine Corps is doing right today. They are protecting the freedom we have in this country and I'm proud of each and every one of you."

"Once you're a Marine, you're always going to be a proud Marine," Marvel summed up.

In keeping the voter registration up, commanders are asking for direct involvement by all senior officers. The officers are asked to encourage competition between units to see which can attain the 100 percent goal in voting.

With limited time left to ensure the receipt of absentee ballots for the general election, federal post card applications in the continental United States must be mailed no later than Sept. 15.

Many of these businesses frequently change names, owners or the appearance of the buildings. However, the businesses are still considered off limits until such time as removed from the base order by the Armed Forces Disciplinary Control Board.

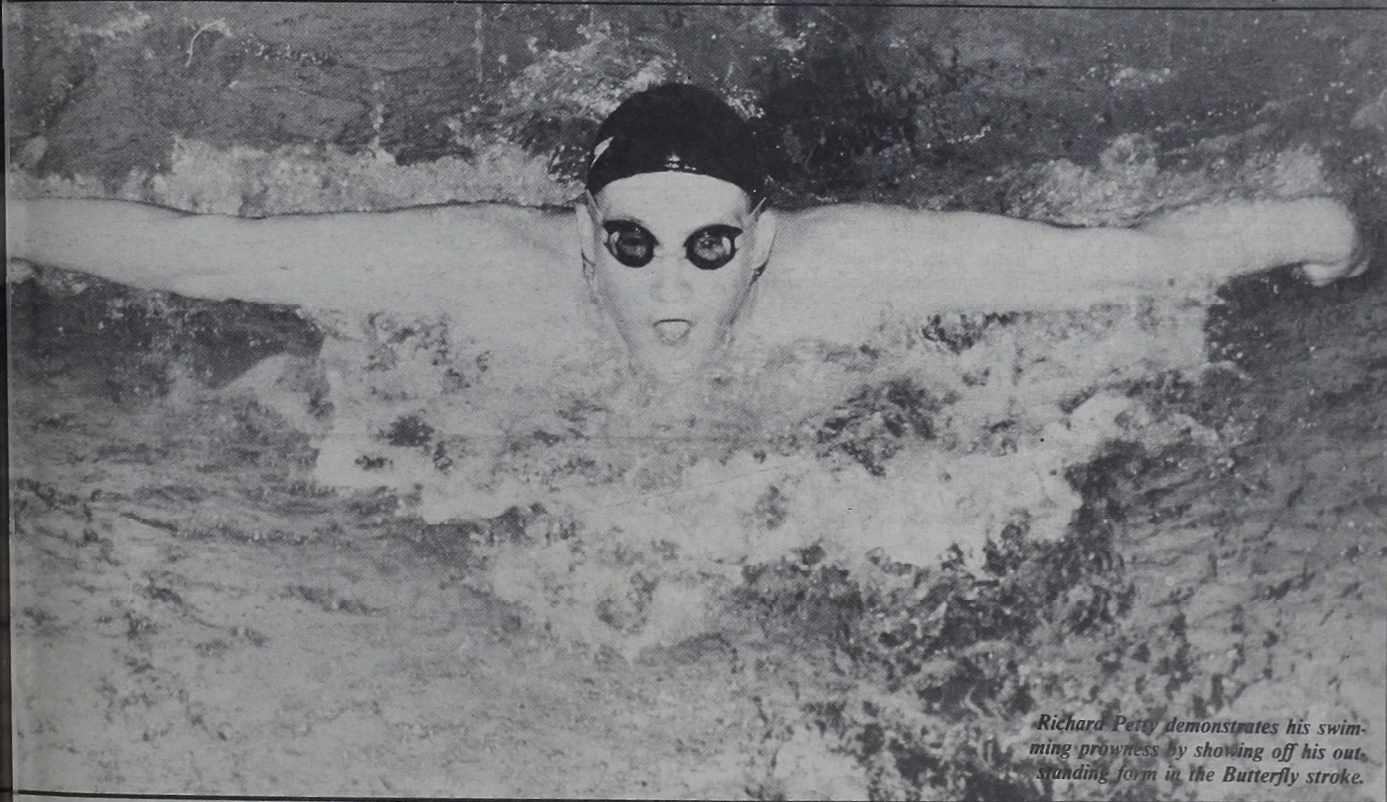

Devilfish hooked on their new coach

The Devilfish Swim Team is beginning its 1989 season and looking forward to a year of fun and fitness under the guidance of a new coach, Cpl. David Ramirez. Spending two hours a night, five days a week, the highly dedicated swimmers prepare to swim into a victorious future.

The Devilfish team is made up of dependents and children of Base personnel between the ages of 6 and 18, with few exceptions. The 28 athletes on the team are split into two groups: one for beginning swimmers and one for the older and more experienced.

With the help of Cpl. Shane Ramirez, the Devilfish team is training to instill strength and endurance. The swimmers' daily workout is a combination of exercises to

strengthen their stomach muscles and increase lung capacity.

"Each individual athlete swims approximately 3,200 meters a day and treads in 11 feet of water for 15 minutes, 10 of which are without using arms. They also swim under water 25-meters as many times as it takes them to get it correct," Ramirez said. "We also spend a good deal of time on technique and form" he added.

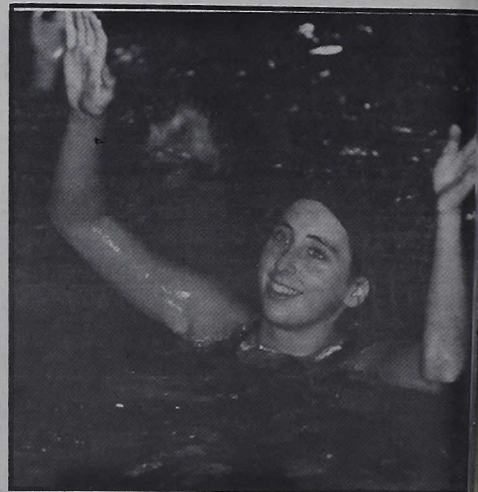
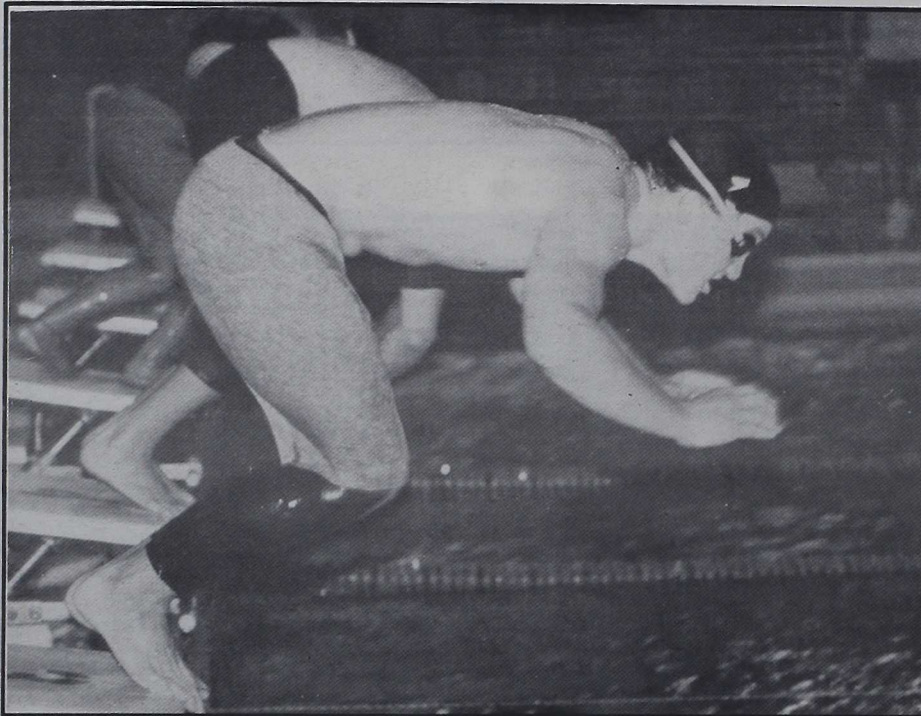
Wearing sweat pants and panty hose also helps the aquatic athletes develop strength in their legs. The sweats and panty hose retain water and add drag to the swimmer. This makes it more difficult to swim and strengthens their muscles.

Coach Ramirez's goal is to put the team in their peak physical condition by the middle of October. "I put a lot of stress on the kids and work them hard. But I also explain to them that it's the price they are going to have to pay to be successful in swim meets," Ramirez said.

"I love swimming. If I didn't, I wouldn't spend so much time in the pool," Devilfish Marlo Creel said.

Creel, a Camp Lejeune High School senior, proved her fish-like talents when she donned her swim cap and headed for the Eastern North Carolina Finals last year.

The Devilfish are completely sponsored by parents and fund raisers. The athletes hold an annual swim-a-thon where they swim laps for cash. The average Devilfish swims about 200 laps in two hours. According to Cathy Vic, team president, the little Devils earned \$1,200 from last year's event.

The money the team earns goes to buy equipment, pay coaches and travel expenses for the team meets.

"The parents of these kids pay me to do a job and I do it to my up-most ability," Ramirez said. "Many of the kids think I'm a hard nose but my job is not to be their buddy, but their coach."

A native of San Juan, Puerto Rico, Ramirez spent a great deal of his youth in the water. In high school, he was on the swim team and later became the assistant swim coach for Antilles High School in San Juan before entering the Marine Corps in 1985. He is also a Water Safety Survival Instructor.

"I love to teach these kids because of their eagerness to learn and their love for the water makes it easy for me," he said. "I try to break the monotony by adding some fun activities in the practices," he also said.

The Devilfish gather into one large group at the end of every day's practice to do a motivating and funny exercise where the swimmers sing the "Oscar Mayer bologna song" and clap their hands while treading in 11 feet of water. "The reason we clap our hands is to make the exercise more strenuous and it helps us to forget that we're actually treading water," Ramirez said.

Corps marathon hauls in pounds of mail daily

MCCDC, Quantico, Va.—Marine Corps Marathon officials here say that as many as 12,000 runners could take to the streets of Washington, D.C., and Arlington, Va., for this year's "People's Race" Nov. 6.

Early reports suggest increased interest from the running community in the annual trek through the monuments. Some 3,500 entries have been processed to date, and according to marathon headquarters, the mail bags are getting heavier every day.

Preparation has been the key to the Corps' success in organizing its marathon each year, and being prepared is how the Marines answer the mail.

Two years ago, Dionisio Mignacca was employed as a construction worker in south Philadelphia, Pa. For the last year, the responsibility for handling the Marine Corps Marathon's mail has been his.

"This is a pretty big responsibility," said the

21-year-old lance corporal. "I'm just glad they have enough confidence in me to handle it."

More than 13,000 pieces, almost 222 pounds, of mail was received by the marathon office last year. The mail consisted mostly of registration forms and entry fees. This year Mignacca's haul has averaged 60 pieces of mail each day. Each Monday through Friday, the cycle is repeated and each week, the mail bag gets fatter.

Even with the Marines' established routine for getting the marathon from the mail bags to the 26.2 mile course, Murphy's Law makes for an ominous cloud. Too often, contents of the marathon mail bag has included currency.

Marathon officials say for both them and the runner, personal check or money order is the recommended method for paying entry fees. "When we received currency, it tends to complicate the process," said Capt. Stephen C. Olmstead. "Since cancelled checks also serve as the applicant's receipt, no additional mailing is required. The process runs much more smoothly."

For Lance Cpl. Mignacca, the cycle is complete when the entry fees are deposited, reports are completed, and all transactions for the day have been verified by the marathon coordinator. The process begins in May and winds down after the registration deadline.

"May through August we only receive four thousand pieces of mail," Mignacca said. "September and October are the heaviest months. People tend to wait until the last minute."

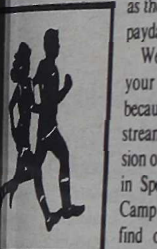
In the final weeks before race day, inbound mail has traditionally increased to 150 pieces a day, totaling almost 9,000 pieces for the two-month period. Last year, the office received 69,000 pieces on Oct. 13, the deadline day for registration.

Although 77 postal workers entered last year's race, most can undoubtedly confirm that a daily load of two or three pounds of mail a day will be a last minute rush by an armful. The Marine Corps Marathon has traditionally been a race for the people, and mailing early is the best way to get a spot.

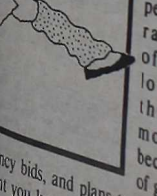

Golf might be the surprise sleeper in this list but Wigglesworth

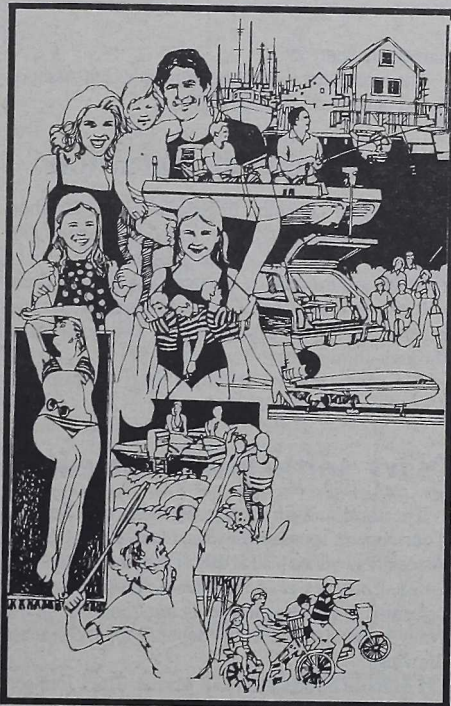
has told us Camp Lejeune has more sergeants using the golf course than you usually see at other bases. That's right, campers, it's not just for the officers anymore.

Cross your fingers for your favorites.

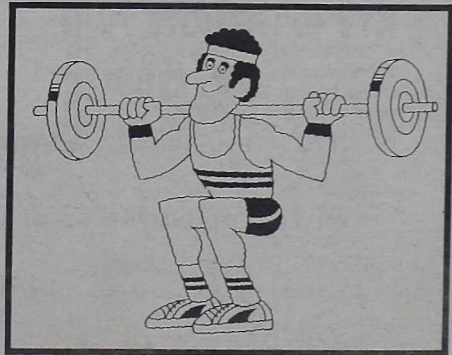
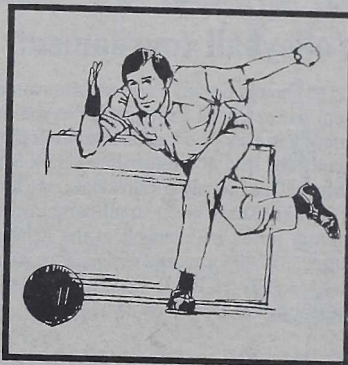
Okay, Special Services can't take care of all your requests, but you'll never get out of any boring routine you have unless you find out for yourself.
