COMMAND

Shortly before the beginning of the period covered by this re-1. port, Major Jose Blondet, 14003A, assumed command¹ of the 6971st Communications Security Flight (CIO). Foreseeing the need for reorganization of the COMSEC activities of USAFSS, the Commander adjusted the structure and personnel assignments to readily adapt to the structure authorized for the 32nd Communications Security Squadron by T/O 1-2240. The outstanding feature of this adjustment was the creation of an Operations and a Materiel division within the unit. Captain Cloyd T. Pearce, AO-552972, was designated Operations Officer² with responsibility for control and supervision of the Traffic Analysis, Cryptoprocedures, Cryptorequirements, and Cryptosurvey Branches, Communications Security Improvement Team; and, operational control of all subordinate Detachments. Captain Walter C. Young, A0-581375, was given the responsibility³ of directing the efforts of Distribution and Accounting, Allocations, Vault Storage, Cryptomaintenance, and Crypto-supply.

a. Under the functional division outlined above, a physical move to the fifth floor of Mitsubishi #21 Building by Command, Administration and the Operations division which divorced these activities from Materiel, failed to noticeably effect the over-all unit efficiency.

2. Subsequent to the move, a need for an additional spot for an Executive Officer was recognized in order to coordinate Materiel and Operational functions; to assume administrative and logistical control of subordinate Flights and to alleviate the heavy work load imposed on the Administrative officer who had previously been assigned these duties. Captain Donald H. Ratkie, A0-576003, was assigned the duties of an Executive Officer while retaining the responsibilities for Cryptomaintenance and Supply Branches.⁴

3. The internal reorganization of the 6971st Communications Security Flight (CIO) was concluded in sufficient time for all personnel to become familiar with their responsibilities and to begin the new task of reorganizing as the 32nd Communications Security Squadron. This change in status was effected on 8 December 1953 when the 6971st Communications Security Flight was discontinued⁵ and the 32nd Communications Security Squadron activated⁶ with Major Jose Blondet Commanding. Certain Detachments of the 136th Communications Security Squadron and the 6975th Communications Security Flight (CIO) were discontinued and activated as Flights of the 32nd Communications Security Squadron as follows:

a. Detachment 6, 136th CSS, Moriyama Compound, Nagoya, Japan was activated as Flight A with no changes in operating location. Captain Robert D. Reckner retained Command.

b. Section 1, Detachment 6, 136th CSS, K-55, Osen-Ni, Korea was activated as Flight B at the same location. Captain Jack T. Williams,

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OIC Traffic Analysis, this Headquarters, was transferred PCS on 6 December 1953 to assume command. Personnel to man this Flight were provided by Flight A.

c. Detachment 7, 136th CSS, Naha, Okinawa, was activated as Flight C with Captain Robert C. Fenstermaker retaining command.

d. The 6975th Communications Security Flight (CIO) and Detachment 5, 136th CSS, Hickam AFB, Hawaii, were combined as Flight E with Captain Kresphondis A. Ithomitis assuming command. This Flight is a sub-office of issue for all cryptographic material for the Pacific area in addition to the monitoring and analysis functions performed.

4. The major difficulties encountered during the reorganization were concerned with defining and establishing correct administrative and command procedures, procurement and assignment of essential personnel, responsibilities of each element of the Squadron to the major commands served and the integration of homogeneous activities under a central controlling agency. In July, an initial conference⁷ of all Detachment and Flight commanders was held at the 6971st Communications Security Flight (CIO) to discuss these problems and to determine a course of action toward a sound solution. All through the next four months the concerted efforts of all units were directed toward preparation for the changeover. In November a final commander's conference⁸, in conjunction with key enlisted personnel, was again held at the 6971st Communications Security Flight. At this time, the details of the reorganization were discussed and the solutions to all previous problems presented. The

difficulties foreseen in July were either eliminated or settled in a manner satisfactory to each Commander concerned. One problem which could not be resolved at this level of planning was the inadequacy of the manning document for the 32nd Communications Security Squadron.

5. During the period July through December 1953, Major Jose Blondet, Commander, visited Headquarters, Far East Air Forces; Headquarters, Fifth Air Force; Headquarters, Thirteenth Air Force; Headquarters, Twentieth Air Force; and, Headquarters, Army Security Agency, Pacific. The Commander paid courtesy calls to each Communications Directorate and personnally contacted key communications personnel with whom we maintain an official association in order to discuss COMSEC matters of mutual interest and to further understanding of each major command of the mission and services provided by this organization.

6. Visitors⁹ to this unit included Lt Col Thaddeus L. Woltanski, acting Commander, 6920th Security Group, Major Malcolm E. Wall, Executive Officer, 6920th Security Group, Major W. T. Fleming, Special Security Officer, Thirteenth Air Force, Captain William T. Diver, Cryptosecurity Officer, FEAF, Captain A. D. Henehan, Cryptosecurity Officer, Thirteenth Air Force, Captain R. S. Thomas, Cryptosecurity Officer, 1808th AACS Wing and 1st Lt J. J. Coppinger, Communications Officer, 18th Fighter Bomber Wing. All visitors were given a briefing on the functions of the organization followed by a guided tour of each facility maintained and operated at this Headquarters.

PART II

OPERATIONS

 Conferences attended by Command and Operations personnel of this unit are briefly described below.

a. At Headquarters, 315th Air Division, Fuchu, Japan, representatives of the office of the Director of Communications met with Captain Cloyd T. Pearce to discuss means of improving the security of the Combat Cargo daily Operations Order.

b. A Joint conference was held in the office of the Director of Communications, FEAF, Tokyo, Japan, to resolve the problem of a secure authentication system to be used by the Japan Air Defense Force. Major Jose Blondet and Captain Cloyd T. Pearce represented Security Service.

c. Captain Pearce gave a presentation on the security of the 6920th Security Group's communications at a Commander's conference held at the 29th Radio Squadron, Mobile, Clark AFB, P. I. While there, Captain Pearce visited Headquarters, Thirteenth Air Force to coordinate and familiarize that Headquarters with the functions to be performed by the Communications Security Improvement Team for that Command.

d. Captain Shirley P. Farmer and T/Sgt Christena Ogle of this unit attended a Joint conference at Headquarters, Far East Command, Tokyo, Japan to discuss the installation of a secure communications circuit between Far East Command and Headquarters, FEAF. A follow-up conference was held a week later with representatives of the same commands.

e. Major Blondet and Captain Pearce conducted an informal conference at the 18th Fighter Bomber_Wing, K-55, Osan-Ni, Korea with



Communications personnel of that Headquarters with regard to antenna requirements for Flight B, 32nd Communications Security Squadron and other matters of mutual interest.

f. The Communications Branch of J-3, Headquarters, Far East Command, Tokyo, Japan, held a conference to explore and discuss procedures to be employed in the event of effective jamming of long range radio circuits and to determine the advisability of conducting exercises of these procedures. Captain Pearce and CWO Robert T. Camarca of the Operations division attended.

g. Captain Pearce met with personnel of Headquarters, Twentieth Air Force at Kadena, Okinawa to discuss operational matters of mutual interest. The D/F assistance provided by Flight C, 32nd Communications Security Squadron was discussed in detail. The presentation was well received and was reflected by incorporation of the information provided by Captain Pearce in the Twentieth Air Force COI.

h. Captain Farmer and T/Sgt Ogle discussed the security aspects of the TT-160FG and ASAM 2-1 operation contemplated for employment by the 1956th AACS Squadron with members of the Plans and Projects Branch, 1808th AACS Wing and Squadron representatives. As a result of the discussion a complete room circuit utilizing this equipment was installed by this organization for demonstration and familiarization purposes at the 1956th AACS Communications Center at Fuchu, Japan.

i. Numerous informal meetings between members of this organization, Headquarters, FEAF, and 1808th AACS Wing, were held at frequent intervals due to the proximity of the respective organizations. These meetings were held to discuss or resolve mutual problems and conditions

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which arose during normal operations and are not of particular historical value but were beneficial to all concerned by eliminating minor divergencies of opinion which assisted the organization in carrying out its mission.

2. The mission of the 6971st Communications Security Flight (GIO) defined by the USAFSS SOP for CIO's was retained by the 32nd Communications Security Squadron in addition to assuming the mission previously performed by the Detachments of the 136th Communications Security Squadron. USAFSS Regulation Number 20-12, dated 13 October 1953 describes the mission of this Squadron, as providing COMSEC services for USAF organizations within the Far East and Pacific Areas. Every effort has been expended in furthering this mission and expanding upon individual services to the limit of our capabilities. Special emphasis will be placed on the furtherance of the COMSEC D/F assistance program to Far East activities in addition to normal activities.

3. The Communications Security Improvement Team, a T/D augmentation assigned to Flight A at Nagoya, Japan, was transferred to this Headquarters to form the nucleus of a Communications Control section with supervisory control of subordinate Flight operational activities. In addition to supervision and guidance of the monitoring Flights, the Team has continued to function in its original capacity. In this capacity, the Team has conducted surveys at Headquarters, FEAF, Tokyo, Japan, the 1956th AACS Squadron, Fuchu, Japan, and at the 1st Radio Squadron Mobile, Misawa, Japan during the latter portion of this reporting period.

4. In order to improve the efficiency, quality and timeliness of analysis applied to FEAF communications circuits by the Traffic Analysis

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Branch, the Branch was divided ¹⁰ into two distinct sections. These sections are the Plain Language and Cryptographic Studies Sections. The Plain Language Section is charged with the responsibility of the analysis and evaluation of all Air Force plain text traffic monitored on radio teletype circuits, radio telegraph and radio telephone frequencies within the Far East. In most instances, the Plain Language Section has produced the Special Letter Reports and the periodic ninety day Communications Security Analyses published by this organization. The Cryptographic Studies Section is responsible for the analysis and evaluation of the headings and external features of all encrypted communications monitored on these same circuits. The scope of these studies is not limited to traffic originated within FEAF controlled organizations but will include all encrypted messages introduced onto a FEAF communications circuit. This Section is also responsible for analysis and evaluation of all Security Service communications in the Far East. Special Letter Reports are formulated by the Cryptographic Studies Section whenever warranted by breaches of security or disclosures of classified information. Division of the Traffic Analysis Branch was caused by the high degree of security achieved in FEAF communications, making analysis of plain text traffic an unproductive source of usable intelligence. Emphasis is being placed on encrypted studies of message externals in order to achieve the same degree of security in these vulnerable areas as was experienced with plain text transmissions. A break-down of the Periodic and Special Letter Reports Scheduled and accomplished¹¹ during this reporting period are as follows:

5. Another phase of Operations which revealed security improvement

of such significance that a brief resume is felt justified was produced by the Crypto-Survey and Procedures Branches. All programmed surveys

of cryptocenters were accomplished on schedule and a review of the results showed an improvement of slightly over two hundred percent as compared to the same period in 1952.¹² The FEAF unit average of Survey descrepancies was 9.5 for 1952 and a decline to 3.1 for 1953. Compromises and procedural violations have shown a related decline during the same period. The Survey Team has been commended by many of the Commands we serve for the invaluable aid and technical advice provided on their tours of Far East Air Force crypto-activities.

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PART III

CRYPTO MATERIEL

 The Materiel division of this Squadron was allocated the entire Sub-Basement of the Meiji Building upon acquisition of additional office space for Command, Administration and Operations in Mitsubishi 21 Building.
 With the additional space the storage problem was eliminated to a great

extent by removing several temporary partitions and allowing expansion and greater freedom of movement by Vault Storage personnel. Extremely crowded conditions in the depot Maintenance shop were corrected by removing the SAMSON school from the shop and relocated in the room formerly occupied by the Commander. Distribution and Accounting and Allocations moved into the space vacated by Crypto-Survey, Requirements and Procedures. All like Materiel activities are now performed in a central location which has expedited the handling of incoming and outgoing cryptomaterial.

2. The Maintenance Branch has been reorganized into On-line, Offline and Associated equipment Sections. In addition to regular duties, qualified maintenance personnel conduct refresher and cross-training courses in cryptomaintenance for FEAF crypto-technicians. Student technicians of both Army and Air Force units have attended these courses which have been received with great success by the personnel and parent organizations concerned. FEAF organizations, expecting to be equipped with SAMSON, requested training for their cryptopersonnel on this equipment. A school for this purpose was established and to date, eight cryptomaintenance technicians assigned to this Headquarters and ten cryptomaintenance technicians of FEAF and ASAPAC have attended the SAMSON school.

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PART IV

PERSONNEL AND ADMINISTRATION

1. In anticipation of personnel replacement restrictions created by the signing of the Korean Truce, Section 1, Detachment 6, 136th Communications Security Squadron was brought up to strength by transferring airmen from Detachment 6 and two officers from this Headquarters to the authorized vacancies. Further, the status of Section 1 was changed¹³ from TDY to an Operating Location to insure permanency. With the reorganization of all COMSEC units in the Far East, Section 1 beceme Flight B under the new T/O 1-2240. Captain Jack T. Williams, OIC Traffic Analysis at this Headquarters was transferred PCS to the Flight to assume command. Captain Williams has procured Quonset huts, cement walks, lumber for partitions and many other improvements and has energetically pursued a program of making Flight B operationally and domestically ideal for Korean conditions.

2. The 6920th Security Group delegated the authority¹⁴ to this unit to control and assign all personnel to the Detachments under administrative control of this organization. This procedure is being employed with all personnel reporting to this Headquarters for interview, processing and assignment. The arrival of thirty-seven airmen at this unit occurred simultaneously with the activation of the 32nd Communications Security Squadron and were diverted to the Flights on the basis of AFSC shortages.

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Flight A, having lost all of the personnel on Operating Location 1 to Flight B, was the recipient of the majority of the airmen.

3. A unit promotion board was established¹⁵ at this Headquarters in order to evaluate all recommendations for promotion from this unit and from the subordinate echelons. The results of the board evaluations were consolidated and forwarded to the 6920th Security Group for necessary action. The authority to promote assigned personnel up to and including

the grade of Airman First Class has since been delegated to this Squadron by the 6920th Security Group.

4. Detachment 6, 136th Communications Security Squadron, prior to becoming Flight A, suffered a fire in the building housing the orderly room, supply and airmens' billets. The building was completely destroyed with a loss of all organizational and personnel records. Personal belongings were burned as were all housekeeping supplies. All personnel turned out to fight the fire and to conduct possible salvage operations. The unit operational efficiency was not impaired to any great degree. All personnel were commended for maintaining their effectiveness as a unit and in keeping the morale at a high level throughout the trying period.

Personnel of this unit decorated by the Far East Air Forces for their personal contribution toward a successful completion of the Far East Air Forces mission during the Korean conflict were the former Commender, Major Francis A. Brant, Bronze Star; Captain Robert D. Reckner, Commander, Flight A, Bronze Star; Captain Cloyd T. Pearce, Operations Officer, Bronze Star¹⁶; Captain Walter C. Young, Materiel Officer, Bronze

HISTORY OF 32ND COLMUNICATIONS SECURITY SCHADRON

8 December 1953 - 31 December 1953

1. The 32nd Communications Security Squadron was activated on

8 December 1953 under the authority contained in USAF Security Service General Order 87 dated 17 November 1953. At the time of activation the Squadron consisted of a Headquarters, previously the 6971st Communica-

tions Security Flight, and four subordinate flights designated as Flights A, B, C and E. Flight A, located at Moriyama Compound, Nagoya, Japan, had been previously identified as Detachment 6, 136th Communications Security Squadron; Flight B, previously identified as Section 1, Detachment 6, 136th Communications Security Squadron, was stationed at K-55 (Osen Ni), Korea; Flight C was the redesignation of Detachment 7, 136th Communications Security Squadron at Naha Air Base, Okinawa, while Flight E was formed from two units previously identified as the 6975th Communications Security Flight and Detachment 5, 136th Communications Security Squadron, both at Hickam Air Force Base, Honolulu, T.H.

2. The new Squadron, commanded by Major Jose Blondet, 14003A, was activated as a Table of Organization unit, with an authorized strength of 20 Officers and 261 Airmen². At the time of activation the assigned strength consisted of 16 Officers and 192 Airmen distributed among the five elements of the Squadron³.

3. In support of the activation of the 32nd Communications Security Squadron a series of local actions were initiated during the period from 4 December 1953 to 12 December 1953. An electrical message was sent on 4 December 1953 to Far East Air Forces Headquarters, 1ts subordinate commands at Air Force level, and to all independent organizations in the Far East, informing them of the forthcoming organizational changes and continuity of the USAF Security Service COMSEC mission? On 7 December 1953, letters were sent to the Commanding General - Far East Command, Commander - Far East Air Forces, and other interested Commanders in the Far East end Pacific Areas describing the organization, mission, functions, and deployment of the 32nd Communications Security Squadron and requesting appropriate dissemination of the information? On the same date messages were sent to each of the units scheduled to become flights of this squadron, informing them officially of their reorganization and redesignation, and designating commanders of each flight. Captains Pobert D Reckner. A0671075, Jack T Williams, A0590478, Robert C Fensternaker, A0872432 and Kresphondis A Ithomitis, A01287885 were designated as Commanders of Flights A, B, C and E respectively. 4. In order to allow flexibility of operation within their respective areas of jurisdiction, each flight was authorized to issue temporary duty orders for operational activities.

This was accomplished by a letter from Headquarters, 32nd Communications Security Squadron on 11 December 1953, and was followed by instructions regarding funding symbols on 14 December.

5. Action was initiated during this period to establish Joint Tenancy agreements between the different elements of this squadron and their respective landlord organizations. The agreement pertaining to the Squadron Headquarters was forwarded to Far East Mir Forces Base on

11 December 1953.

6. On 16 December 1953 a conference was held by this squadron with representatives of Headquarters, Far East Air Forces and Headquarters. 1808th AACS Wing to discuss problems related to GLOBECOM circuits and equipment involving those headquarters. Problems discussed included priority of requirements of the headquarters involved, flexibility of circuits with cryptographic and associated equipment installed, physical security, and operating characteristics?

7. Major Blondet and Captain C. T. Pearce, Operations Officer, paid official visits to Headquarters, Thirteenth Air Force - Clark AFB, P. I. and Headquarters, Twentieth Air Force - Kadena Air Base, Okinawa, and adjacent USAF Security Service units, during the period from 13 to 19 December 1953. Subjects discussed during these visits included reorganization and functions of Communications Security units in the Fer East,

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limitations and capabilities of Monitoring and Direction Finding functions, the Communications Security Improvement Team, communications jamming in the Okinawa area, and Command cryptographic problems.

8. On 30 December 1953, as a result of information received from Headquarters USAF Security Service, Communications Security Analysis number 25, published by this Squadron, was upgraded to Top Secret.¹¹ Instructions were sent to all holders requiring upgrading and return of

the document to this Squadron for modification and subsequent reissue,

9. The final activity of 1953 occurred when Staff Sergeant Claude B. Ellians departed for Bangkok, Thailand on 31 December 1953. The purpose of this trip was to perform emergency cryptographic maintenance for

the Air Attache at that post.

1. The 32nd Communications Security Squadron, APO 925 will be activated on 8 December 1953 in accordance with USAF Security Service General Order Number 87, dated 17 November 1953. This squadron is a table of organization unit assigned to the 6920th Security Group, APO 994 and will consist of a headquarters and such flights as may be designated by United States Air Force Security Service. The 32nd Communications Security Squadron is responsible for providing communications security services for United States Air Force organizations within the Far East and Pacific areas, and functionally replaces the 6971st and 6975th Communications Security Flights and certain detachments of the 136th Communications Security Squadron.

2. Units involved in this activation, with their location and new designation, are:

a. 6971st Communications Security Flight (CIO), AFO 925 is redesignated Headquarters, 32nd Communications Security Squadron, AFO 925.

b. Detachment 6, 136th Communications Security Squadron, APO 710 is redesignated Flight A, 32nd Communications Security Squadron, APO 710.

c. Section 1, Detachment 6, 136th Communications Security Squadron, AFO 77 is redesignated Flight B, 32nd Communications Security Squadron, AFO 77.

d. Detachment 7, 136th Communications Security Squadron, APO 235 is redesignated Flight C, 32nd Communications Security Squadron APO 235.

e. 6975th Communications Security Flight and Detachment 5, 136th Communications Security Squadron, both at APO 953, are consolidated and redesignated Flight E, 32nd Communications Security Squadron, APO 953.

f. Flight D, 32nd Communications Security Squadron is a proposed unit and has not been activated.

3. All functions of the 6971st, the 6975th and the Communications Security Detachments remain under the new designation. Headquarters, 32nd Communications Security Squadron is the unit to which all communications security matters of concern to United States Air Force commands in the Far Fast Air Forces area should be directed. Flight E, 32nd Communications Security Squadron at Hickam Air Force Base will represent the 32nd Communications Security Squadron in the Pacific area, and USAF organizations in that area should submit requirements directly to Flight E. The communications security functions for which the 32nd Communications Security Squadron is responsible are:

e. Providing storage, distribution and accounting of cryptographic and associated cryptographic material.

b. Providing depot maintenance of cryptographic and associated cryptographic equipment.

> Providing cryptographic spare parts. C.

d. Surveying cryptographic facilities and preparing survey reports in accordance with Air Force Regulation 205-7.

e. Reviewing investigation reports pertaining to loss or possible compromise of cryptographic information or material.

f. Dissemination of cryptographic information such as compromises and changes in procedures.

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g. Performing encrypted traffic studies and monitoring cryptographic operating procedures.

h. Bonitoring and enalyzing Air Force communications and disseminating such analyses.

i. Recommending appropriate action to improve security of comunications.

j. locating and identifying foreign radio and nonliteral countermeasure and deception activities within the limits of its capabilities.

k. Providing technical assistance and guidance to other Air Force commands in the preparation and implementation of cover and deception plans and other communications security plans.

1. Storing, distributing, and acting as office of record for Communications Electronics Instructions (CEI) publications.

4. Flight E is the senior USAF Security Service unit in the Pacific area, and as such will represent both the 32nd Communications Security Squadron and Headquarters, USAF Security Service on all Air Force communications security matters. Direct communication is authorized between this Flight and all Air Force units within the Pacific area.

a. As a sub-office of issue and monitoring unit, Flight E is directly responsible for:

- (1) Providing storage, issuing and accounting of cryptographic and associated cryptographic material for USAF organizations in the Pacific area.
- (2) Maintaining an emergency stock level of cryptographic and associated cryptographic material.
- (3) Storing, distributing and accounting for USAF Communications Electronics Instructions (CEI) in the Pacific area.
- (4) Monitoring USAF electrical communications within the Pacific area; preparation of security reports bearing directly on communications monitoring and forwarding of monitor logs to Headquarters, 32nd Communications Security Equadron for analysis.
- (5) Dissemination of cryptographic compromise data and procedural instructions to cryptographic accounts in its area.
- (6) Coordination of all other communications security matters with Headquarters, 32nd Communications Security Squadron and Headquarters, USAF Security Service.

b. The following communications security functions will normally be performed by Headquarters, 32nd Communications Security Squadron for Air Force units served by Flight E.

> Survey of cryptographic facilities in the Facific area in accordance with Air Force Regulation 205-7.
