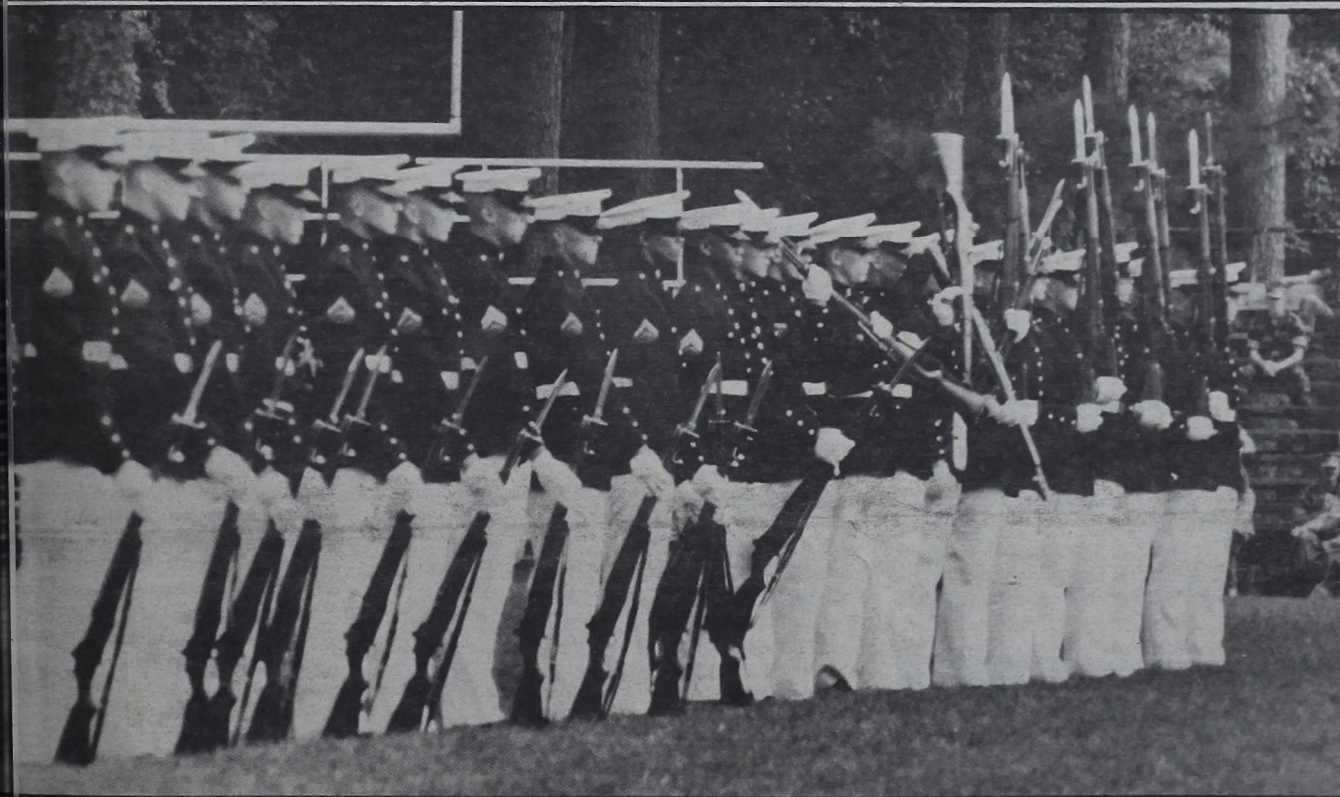

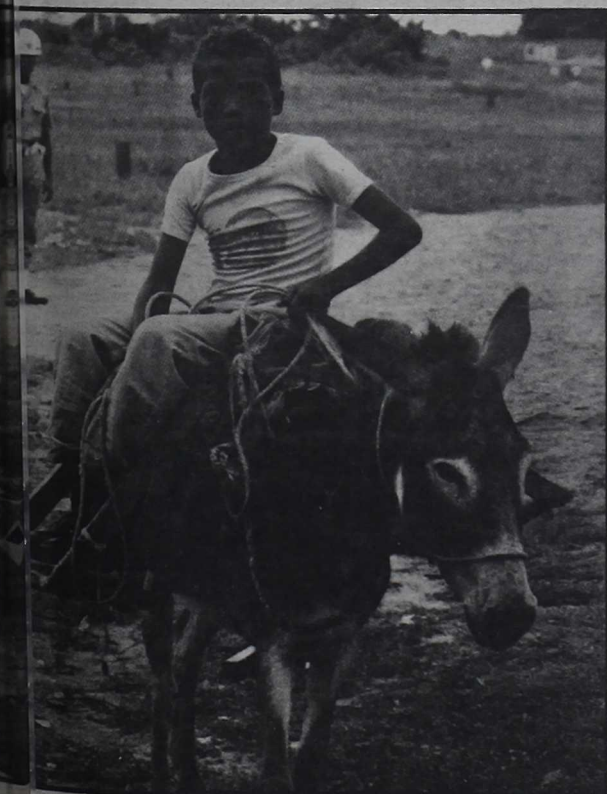

Constitution Week — a time to reflect

The President and Congress have proclaimed Sept. 19-25 as National Constitution Week. It is a time during which we should reflect on what this most fundamental of American political institutions means to us as individuals, and as a nation.

Our Constitution states that Americans, by mutual consent, and through our duly elected representatives, determine the law that governs us. As

parties to this agreement, we naturally promise to obey the law, but when the law outlives its purpose, as a people, we also reserve the right to change it.

We have an incentive to take part in this process because of the individual rights and liberties which the Constitution guarantees to us all. These protections are part of the Bill of Rights of the Constitution. They include our freedoms of speech and press, freedom to associate with whomever we please, and freedom from being forced to testify against

ourselves if we are accused of a crime. Another protection that we enjoy is the right to select our elected representatives. All of these freedoms and protections apply to us equally, regardless of race, color, creed or gender.

Our Constitution has a record of success that far surpasses that of any other country. It has been the keystone of our government for over 200 years, the longest existing political system in the world today. The Constitution has also provided a model for many other

countries in their creation of constitutions.

The Constitution has withstood the test of time so well that some take its protections for granted who must fight and perhaps neglect these freedoms for their country. This week is the time to reflect on what the Constitution offers and to reaffirm our oath to "uphold the Constitution of the United States . . ."

Citizens' military obligation often debated

Military conscription was ended in 1973, and there is no current push to reinstate the draft. However, young men must still register for the draft and conditions may require a return to conscription in the near future. Demographic trends are shrinking the annual pool of men reaching military age, requiring a high percentage to voluntarily enlist to maintain current force levels. And if arms control efforts are successful in reducing the number of nuclear weapons, a larger conventional army will be needed.

Any substantial expansion would require a new draft.

Almost everyone agrees that citizens have an obligation to "provide to for the common defense"

of their country by paying taxes. The debate starts when one begins to ask whether the military obligation of citizens might require more than that. The Founding Fathers certainly thought it did.

"Every Citizen who enjoys the protection of a free government," wrote George Washington in 1783, "owes not only a proportion of his property but even of his personal services to the defense of it." Thus paying taxes to support the armed forces is not the only obligation a citizen can be legitimately asked to fulfill.

Thomas Jefferson went even further in an 1813 letter to Secretary of State James Monroe: "We must train and classify the whole of our male citizens and make military instruction a regular part of collegiate education. We cannot be safe till this is done."

The unpreparedness of the country during the War of 1812 galvanized not only Jefferson, but also Rep. John C. Calhoun who sponsored a bill in 1816 to expand militia training, observing that "All free nations of antiquity entrusted the defense of the country . . . to the body of free citizens."

The concept of citizen-soldiers was rooted in Anglo-American history. As historian D.E. Leach has stated, prior to the Revolution there was an "assumption that the colonists themselves would be ready and able to serve as soldiers, an assumption resting mainly on the English tradition of compulsory military obligation." Ironically, it was rebel control of the colonial militia system (the "Minutemen") that provided the base for an active resistance to British rule.

The colonists were not, however, always able to rely on patriotic fervor. Several colonies — including Massachusetts, Virginia and North Carolina — drafted soldiers into their militia. In 1778 the Continental Congress agreed to General Washington's request to draft soldiers from the local militias into the regular line regiments, thus establishing a national obligation.

Not everyone favored a militia. Alexander Hamilton preferred a professional standing army that would be better trained and led. But he too believed that the government had the power to conscript. In *Federalist Paper* number 23 he argued: "The circumstances that endanger the safety of nations are infinite and for this reason no constitutional shackles can wisely be imposed on the power to which care of it is committed . . . the Union ought to be invested with full power to levy troops."

Some opponents of the draft have argued that the 13th Amendment's prohibition of "involuntary ser-

vitute" renders conscription unconstitutional. However, this claim has never been accepted by the Supreme Court. The definitive ruling on the matter remains that 1918 which sustained the draft in World War I. Speaking for a unanimous court, Chief Justice Edward D. White said "involuntary servitude" argument is not a constitutional sentence. The 13th Amendment was intended to abolish slavery in the South; it has nothing to do with military service.

White followed Hamilton's logic, basing his decision on the power of Congress to support armies under Article I, Section 8 of the Constitution. Congress could not field an army of soldiers, so it must have the power to compel conscription if necessary. White also cited the 14th Amendment which made "citizenship of the United States to be paramount and dominant over any subordinate and derivative." Thus military service was linked explicitly with national citizenship.

In 1979, Congress passed the first new Constitution on military service since the Civil War. Every able-bodied white male citizen 18 to 26 years of age are not permitted to avoid military service. Peacetime drafts were enacted in 1948 when the international situation was dire. The 1948 draft lasted until 1973. Another draft will probably be needed again. Its legitimacy is both firmly established.

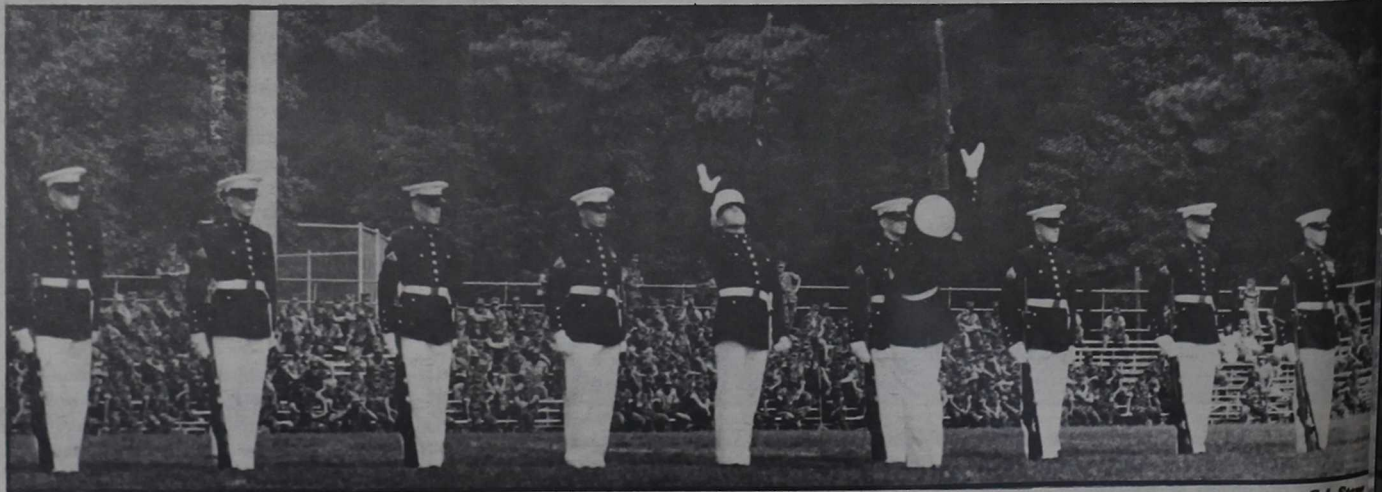

Thanks to engineers

New pilot house guides research vessel

During a dedication at Mile Hammock Bay recently, Marine Corps Engineer School (MCES) presented the North Carolina Marine Fisheries with a new pilot house for their research vessel.

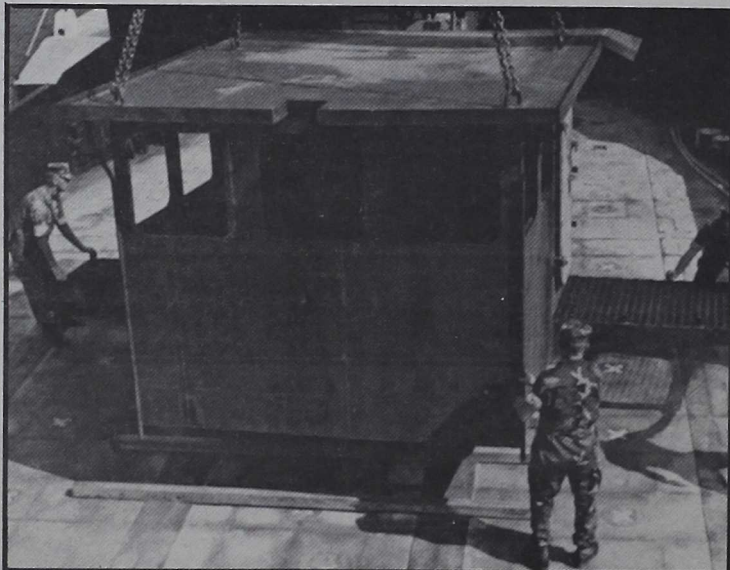
It will replace the old wooden pilot house which rotted through years of wear and tear. The pilot house, which is where the captain steers the boat, needs to be in stable condition to operate the vessel safely.

The captain and his four-man crew use the research vessel to cruise the coast line from Virginia to South Carolina building artificial reefs during the winter months.

Sport and commercial fisherman alike gather oysters from beds around the North Carolina area which are seeded during the summer months.

The new pilot house will better enable the North Carolina Marine Fisheries to seed oyster beds by allowing the captain and the crew to operate the craft from a fully equipped, climate controlled structure.

The vessel, a 115-foot long, 34-foot wide Landing Craft Utility (LCU), is used to conduct research and monitor oyster populations along the North Carolina Coast. The vessel also provides a number of other services for the state.

With the help of the MCES, the Marine Fisheries received two pilot houses this year, the first one was completed in May '88.

Sergeant Darrel D. Smith and Sgt. William S. Keiper Jr., welding instructors at the MCES, provided their expertise, while the North Carolina Marines Fisheries provided the materials to con-

struct the first pilot house.

It is now mounted on the research vessel Long Bay which the fisheries received from the U.S. Army in 1979.

With the help of the Marine Corps Engineer School, the fisheries saved about \$31,000.

To contract the job would have cost the Marine Fisheries about \$40,000 to

construct and mount the pilot house. "They came to us for help," said Smith. "Through proper channels we were able to assist in building the houses."

"With the help of the Basic Construction Workers Class 3-88 we completed the second house in about four months," he added.

Some modifications were made to the area of the old pilot house before the first pilot house was mounted and used.

"The old house was smaller than the new one, so we had to modify the area around old house and put in steel beams," explained Smith.

The second of the two pilot houses was delivered during the dedication ceremony. The new house was placed on the deck of the research vessel Long Bay, the first recipient of a new pilot house and will be transferred and mounted on another LCU later.

"It's like driving a Model 'T' car for a life and then someone gives you a Cadillac," explained James H. Milligan, captain of the research vessel Long Bay. "That's the only way I can describe the difference between the old house and the new," he added.

With the new pilot houses, the North Carolina Marine Fisheries can ensure the coast ensuring that the people of the state have plenty of oysters to gather.

Appointments within reach for active duty Marines, Sailors

The opportunity to receive an appointment to the United States Naval Academy is well within the reach of Marines and Sailors who are interested.

Don Larson, a blue and gold officer for the U.S. Naval Academy and executive director of Navy Relief here, said he became involved in helping youngsters apply for officer's commissioning after a student he knew became interested in the Naval Academy.

"Although I have never attended the Naval Academy, I strongly encourage anyone from the ages of 17 to 20 to apply for appointments to get into the academy," said Larson.

Larson indicated that he doesn't have much of a problem getting high school kids interested in the academy but, it's the 17- to 20-year old active duty personnel he has trouble finding.

There is a program in the local high schools where

students can get in touch with Larson, but military personnel ages 17-20, who are interested in the Naval Academy seem to have a more difficult time.

"I have a problem reaching Marines and sailors who are 17 to 20 years old. Many of those here are not aware that I am here to help them. I can help them apply for the Naval Academy; mine is probably one of the easiest roads to take to become an officer," said Larson.

Active duty personnel, ages 17 to 20 who are interested in the commissioning program can set up an interview with Larson by calling 451-5644. He will talk about things that must be done to be considered by the academy including being under the age of 21, being physically and mentally qualified, being a U.S. citizen and for civilians, obtain an appointment from their U.S. Congressman. Military personnel must follow the chain of command.

"I'm on the side of the students and anyone else who wishes to become an officer candidate. I will do as much as possible to get them into the Academy," said Larson. "Considering the education that the individual will receive, the opportunity is tremendous.

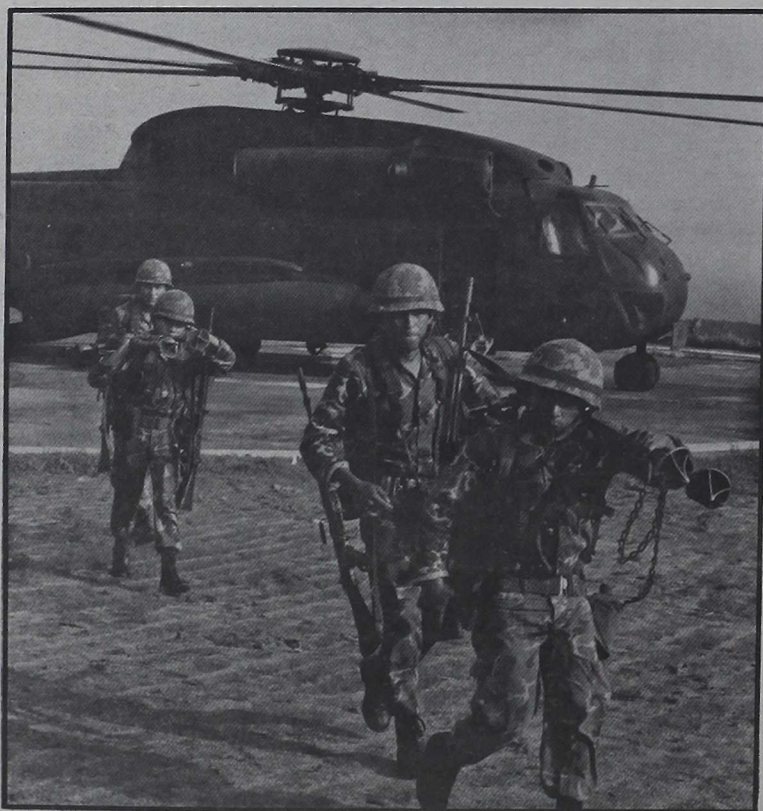

UNITAS XXIX

COVENAS, Colombia—From the thick brush of Puerto Rico to the tropics of Colombia, the Marines and Sailors of UNITAS XXIX have begun their training with the Marine and Naval forces of our South American allies.

The UNITAS Marine detachment departed July 19 from Morehead City and traveled to Roosevelt Roads Naval Base in Puerto Rico. The small Puerto Rican island of Vieques was the proving grounds as both U.S. and Venezuelan Marines combined forces to train in various day and nighttime exercises.

With a tropical breeze and backdrop of the crystal-blue beaches of Vieques, the U.S. Marines cross-trained with Venezuelan counterparts.

"Their basic individual weapon is the M-14, the same one used by U.S. forces before the M-16," said Lance Cpl. Reynaldo Rodriguez, basic rifleman, rifle platoon. "They were impressed with how lightweight the M-16 is.

"The Venezuelans were also impressed by the fact that the M203 grenade launcher and the M-16 can be carried a single weapons system," he added.

"About half the Venezuelans were leary of the Mk-19 grenade launcher and the other half were amazed," said Lance Cpl. Patrick E. Moreno, machine gunner, weapons platoon. "They were particularly impressed by the weapon's rate of fire and the accuracy of our gunners."

The next training phase included day and night patrols formed from both U.S.

and Venezuelan Marines. Some exercises called for foot patrols, while others had AAVs providing cover and transportation.

"Even though we had language barriers between the two groups of Marines, the hand and arm signals the Venezuelans used are the same as ours and the communication was great."

After the training at Vieques, the detachment sailed to Covenas, home of the 1st Colombian Training Battalion, better known to U.S. Marines as boot camp. Cross-training here included weapons firing, patrols and jungle survival.

"The Colombians use mostly American weapons, such as the M-14 and our old M60 machine gun," said Moreno. "Like the Venezuelans, they were impressed by the lightness and

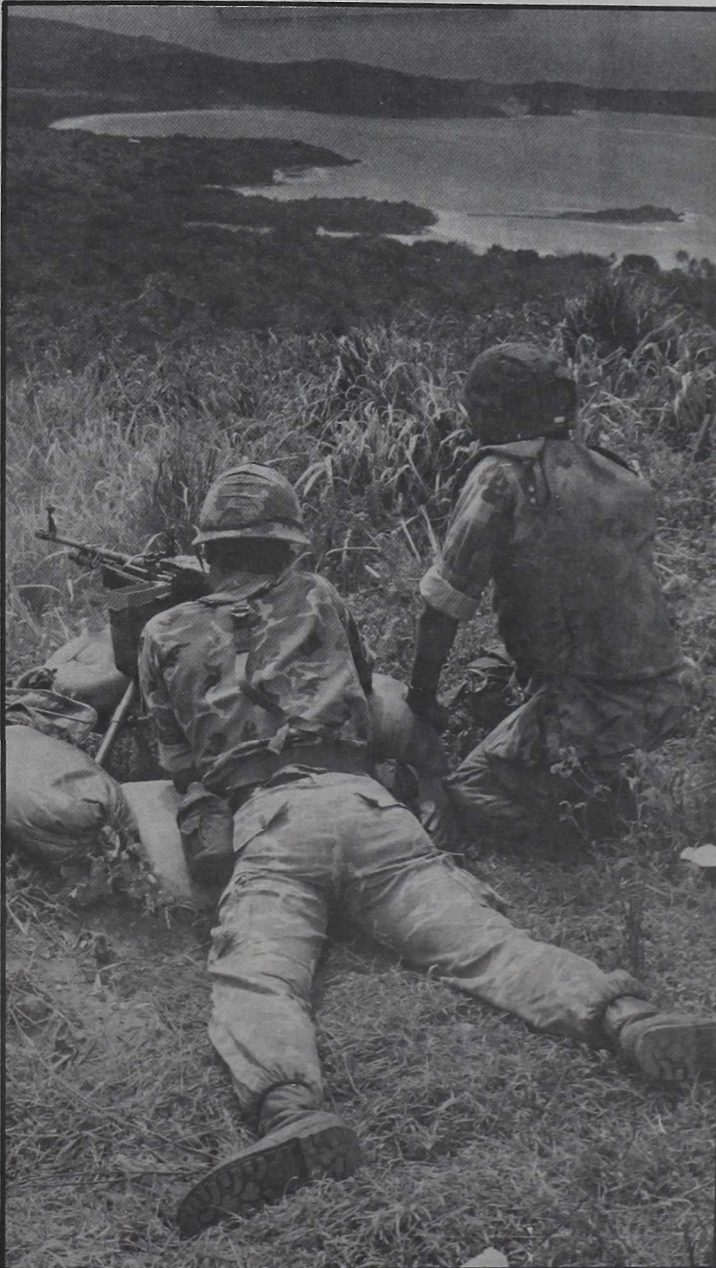
maneuverability of our present weapons, especially since they train in dense jungle.

"The Colombians gave us a class on jungle survival, when they showed us some of the things we could eat, how to make lean-to shelters, water purification by filtering water through the trunk of a banana tree and the quick and humane way to kill animals for food.

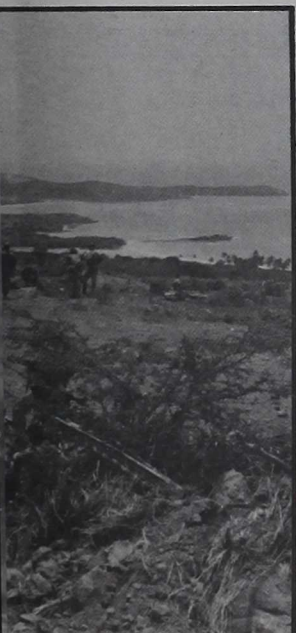
"The South American Marines are friendly and like to trade for USMC covers, insignia and chevrons," said Moreno. "They also want to know things like what our boot camp is like, how much we get paid, and where we live."

The difference between the U.S., Venezuelan and Colombia Marines may or may be greater than the similarities but the men of UNITAS XXIX have proven that together they can form a team and make it work.

New 'video arcade' opens at Stone Bay

Paige said while settling into a sitting position.

MACS flashed a welcome to Paige, and the game began.

Sight alignment... sight picture... controlled breathing... a slow steady trigger squeeze, Paige fired the shot.

The computer replied by showing Paige exactly how his aim moved. A black dot simulated his aiming point as it bounced around the target on the screen. The computer recorded his point of aim from the time he started to pull the trigger to the time the shot was fired.

The computer graded his shot and told Paige exactly where he needed improve.

"All the shooters who've used this, have improved their scores on the range," Paige said. "I've seen a couple of people go from being unqualified to qualifying by applying things MACS has taught them."

In this day and age when computers run most everything and robots are taking over manual tasks, it's nice to know that they can even help Marines improve their marksmanship skills. After all, some of the movies they're coming up with these days seem to signal that the days of shooting aliens may not be far off.

Sergeant Tony E. Paige, marksmanship instructor, Marine Corps Base, Marksmanship Training Unit has a unique job—training Marines to use an arcade-like game.

MACS, as it's called, has nothing to do with shooting aliens, driving a car or rescuing maidens in distress like arcade goes might think.

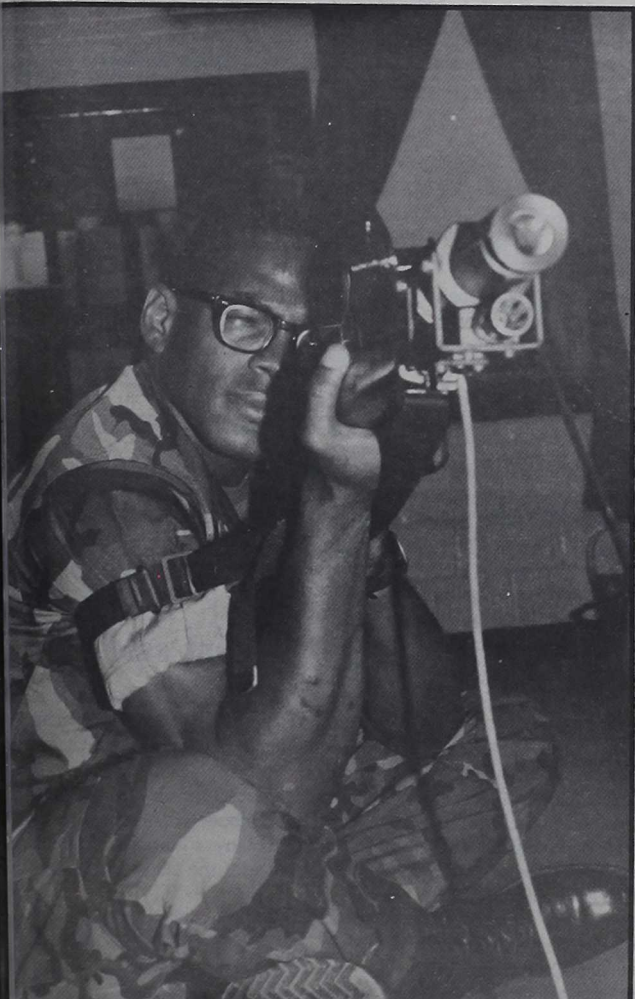
Multi-purpose Arcade Combat Simulators are two computerized "games" located at the Stone Bay Rifle Range Detachment which are designed to help Marines better their actual marksmanship skills with the M16 service rifle.

These computers provide shooters with information about particular faults in their shooting techniques, and help identify errors which they may not be able to pin-point while out on the firing line.

"Anyone can use this computer if they want, but it's not required," Paige said.

A part of the device is attached to the rifle and can report on such faults as trigger squeeze, follow through, shot location and steadiness of body position.

"The only thing this computer doesn't do is simulate the recoil of the weapon,"
