Holiday mailing should be done early, correctly

The key to successful holiday mailing is to mail early and correctly. Persons sending cards and

packages overseas from the continental United States should mail them on or before the dates indicated in the chart.

Similarly, to assure its timely arrival into the continental United States from overseas locations, mail should arrive at U.S. gateway points—New York, Miami, San Francisco and Seattle—by Dec. 11 for priority mail and letters, Dec. 7 for Parcel Airlift mail and Dec. 2 for Surface Airmail.

Parcels will arrive at their intended destination if

you follow a few simple guidelines:

Cushion. Make sure contents are well cushioned and there is no empty space in the box. Use crumpled newspaper around the time—including all sides, and the top and bottom.

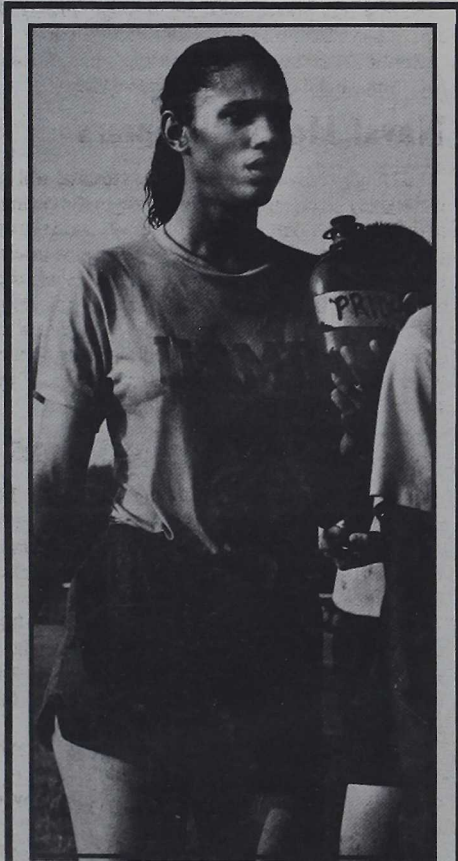
Don't overwrap. Use your carton if possible. Brown paper and twine are not necessary. Paper tape, rip, and twine gets entangled in mail processing equipment.

Avoid smudges. Use smudge-proof ink for return addressing.

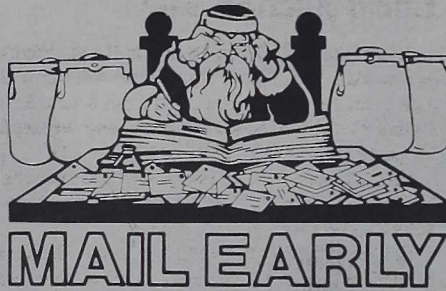
Position addresses properly. Put the recipient's address in the lower right portion of the package and your return address in the upper left corner. Put the return slip on only one side of the package. It's a good idea to put a slip with the address and return address inside the parcel.

Use ZIP codes. Be sure to include the ZIP code in both the recipient's and your address. Wrong ZIP codes can delay the mail.

Time it right. Mail early in the month and early in the day.

Scholarship Foundation

The Marine Corps Scholarship Foundation is a non-profit, tax-exempt corporation of volunteer Marines, former Marines and friends of Marines, dedicated to providing financial assistance in the form of scholarships to sons and daughters of the U.S. Marines and the children of former Marines who have honorably served our country and our Corps. One year scholarships are awarded annually to undergraduate students at accredited educational/technical institutions. About 400 scholarships are awarded annually ranging from \$500-\$1,800. Eligibility criteria include the following:

- Students must be the son/daughter of an active duty or reserve U.S. Marine in good standing, or the son/daughter of a U.S. Marine honorably or medical-discharged or deceased.
- The combined family gross income cannot exceed \$30,000.
- High school seniors and college students must apply to the Foundation requesting an application packet. The submission deadline for completed applications is Feb. 1 of each year. Students should write to: Marine Corps Scholarship Foundation, P.O. Box 3008, Princeton, N.J. 08543.

Vending machine problems

A Marine at Camp Hansen, Okinawa, put his money into a vending machine, pushed the button and nothing happened. After pressing the change return button, nothing happened. He again pushed his selection button and again nothing happened.

Because it wasn't the first time the machine had taken his money, the Marine kicked the machine, then reached up and grabbed a corner to shake the machine. He had heard that by doing this, the machine would release his selection.

When nothing happened, he jumped up and grabbed the machine and yanked. Before he could move out of the way, the vending machine tipped over, trapping him beneath it.

Other Marines heard the crash and when they came to investigate, found the Marine and lifted the machine off.

This Marine was fortunate. He only wound up in the hospital.

Within the past several years, 40 service members have done something similar and were crushed to death by a vending machine, according to a safety publication.

An 850-pound vending machine can hold up to 25 cases of drinks, and when filled, weighs approximately 1,350 pounds.

Because of similar accidents involving vending machines, vending machines on Camp Hansen are being bolted down from the inside to prevent them from being moved, even if pushed.

Marines get behind wheel of trackless vehicles

SALINA, Peru — Under cloudy skies and with a frigid breeze blowing sand across the desert plain, the Marines of AAV platoon had the chance to drive a different vehicle during exercises conducted here recently as part of UNITAS XXIX.

The Peruvian Marine's "Blindado Medio de Ruedas," or medium-armored wheeled vehicle, gave the U. S. Marines a chance to get behind the wheel of something without tracks for a change.

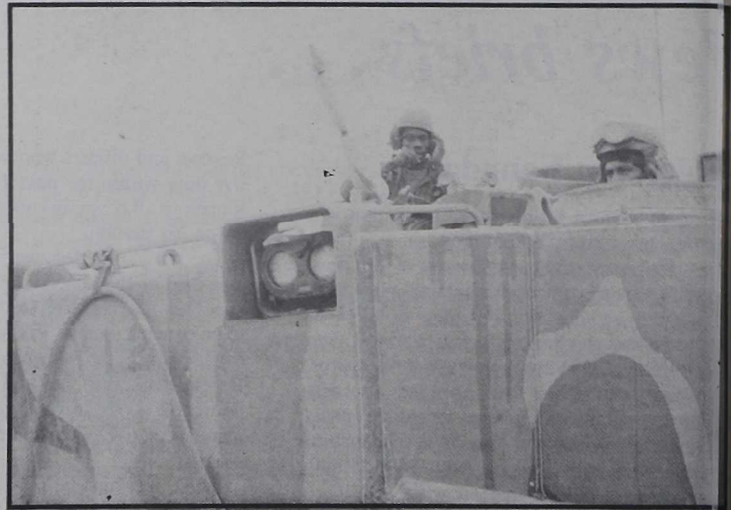
The favor was returned as the Peruvians test-drove the AAV and learned what it was like to move across the desert without the use of rubber wheels.

The U. S. Marine "trackers" first gave a class on the makeup of the AAV bat-

alion, followed by demonstrations of the tactics used by AAVs moving through different terrain and during off-loading of ships. Next came the hands-on learning as the U. S. Marines boarded the Spanish-made BMRs and the Peruvians loaded up on the AAVs.

"I had two enlisted Peruvians with me," said Cpl. Donald W. Bonds, AAV crew chief. "They were equivalent to sergeants. In their vehicles, the senior man is the driver and one is a gunner and the third is the junior man who handles the communications. The driver was the only one willing to drive our tracks."

"They didn't speak English at all," continued Bonds. "I showed them how to start it up. They knew which pedals were the brake and the accelerator because they have the same in their vehicle. I showed

them how to shift gears, the location of the temperature and pressure gauges and signaled that everything was good to go."

"The Peruvians did pretty good in driving," added the crew chief. "At first they didn't want to go through ditches and they had to learn to cross-steer and go in at an angle. They also shifted up pretty good but had a tendency to down-shift into a lower gear at too fast a speed."

As the Peruvian Marines were being instructed on how to drive the AAVs, BMRs were rolling by with devil-dogs at the helm.

"They look like our Light-Armored Vehicles, which I've never driven," said Lance Cpl. Conal S. Kramer, AAV crewman. "It's like driving a lawn mower. The gear unit has the word 'power' on it and that is where the forward, reverse and neutral are located. I started out and

stayed in second gear, and I'd say I got up to a speed of about 45 mph.

"The way it turns is by the back wheels," said Kramer. "It takes turns real good; it's like driving a car."

Although the BMR and the U. S. LAV may look similar, they do have their differences, as noted by one of the AAV section leaders.

"Their vehicle has a bigger interior space and can hold more troops," observed Joseph F. Collins, who was a crewman on a LAV amphibious testing during 1984 at Camp Del Mar, Calif. "It can mount two outer machine guns in addition to a .50-caliber. That's in the turret. There are also six internal firing ports in the turret compartment."

"A few disadvantages I noticed are that the gunners would have to get out of the vehicle to load the weapons or to clear a jam. Also, their internal communication is nonexistent. We have com helmets that have jacks that plug into radios so we can stay in contact with everyone in the crew. Their radioman has a handset and has to yell to the driver, gunner what is being transmitted," said Collins.

Although the Peruvian Marines did not get the chance to maneuver the AAVs on the water, they did experience a demonstration of the tracks amphibious capabilities.

"Our first day in Peru we gave them a class and took them out about 100 meters from shore," said Cpl. Francisco Munoz, crew chief. "We showed them how we form on line when assaulting a beach and how well the AAV handles surf and rough water. The Peruvians were pretty well impressed by the operation of the tracks in water and on land. They were having a blast."

The familiarization of weapons and vehicles between the U. S. and the participating countries of UNITAS XXIX may not only enhance interoperability on a deployment mission, but it could give the individual Marine the hands-on training which he may never again have the chance to do anywhere else in the world.

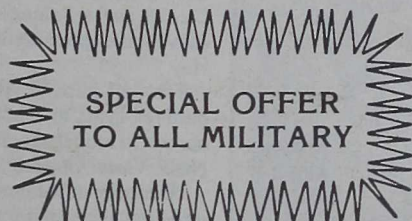

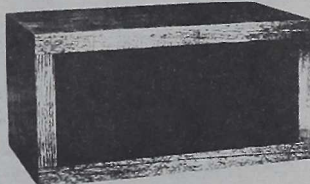

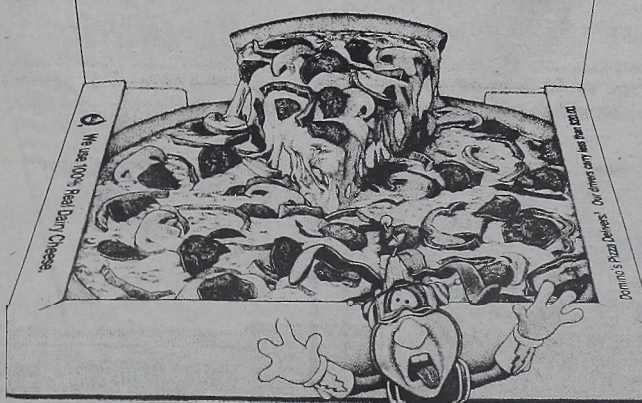

CATs pounce off of new 'superjeeps'

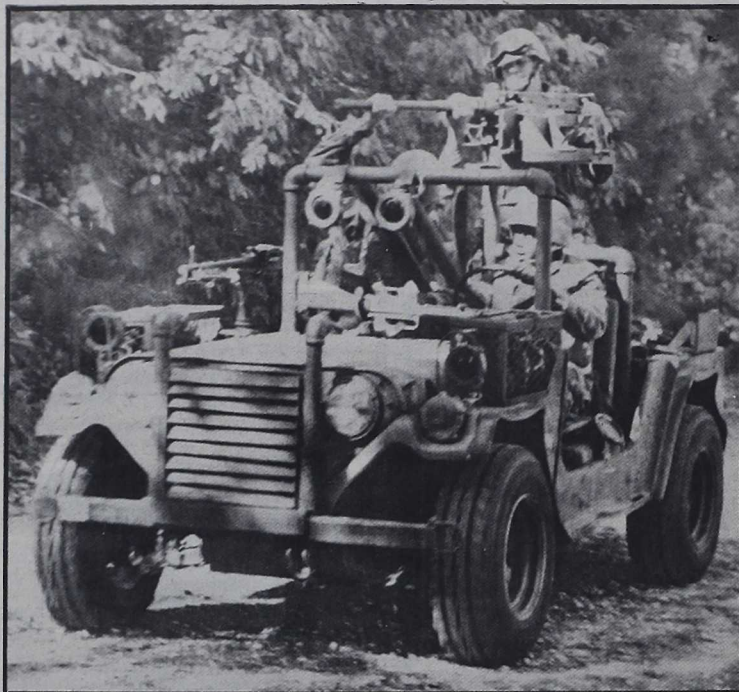
It's probably bad enough for the enemy to see a company of U. S. Marines rush out the back of helicopters, but now they have to contend with "Superjeep" mounted Crises Action Teams.

The CATs utilize the old M151 jeeps that are modified for safety and greater mobility. A rollcage and auto racing type shoulder harnesses protect the occupants in the event of a rollover; larger wheels, tires and heavy-duty shock absorbers allow it greater mobility over rough terrain.

But the CATs "claws" are its weapons systems. Using three jeeps to a team, a M2 .50-caliber machinegun is mounted on one, a MK19 40mm automatic grenade launcher on the second, and to counter any armor threat, a Tube-launched, Optically-tracked, Wire-guided (TOW) missile launcher is mounted on the third.

A complete team can be deployed from a single CH-53 helicopter. The M2 and MK19 "heavy guns" are not mounted while in the helo due to height clearance limitations.

Seconds after the teams disembark the helo, the gun crews mount the "heavy guns," and the CATs are on the prowl. The M2 and MK19 jeeps have sup-

plemental firepower in the form of a M60 machinegun mounted on the vehicles' right front fenders. India Company, 3rd Battalion, 8th

Marines was training with the "Superjeep" CATs recently. India Company is the helicopter assault element of Battalion Landing Team (BLT) 3/8.

The CATs are a powerful tool for the Marine Corps rifle company commander to utilize. Capt. C. A. Tucker, company commander, India Co., 3/4, spoke for the protection the "Superjeeps" provide. "They can put a lot of firepower on the ground, the CATs are a good tool."

Sergeant Larry Hay, a TOW section leader and noncommissioned officer in charge of the CATs, explained how the teams work. "Myself and the other TOW people are from 8th Marines. The M2 and MK19 gunners are with Weapons Co., 3/8, and we're attached to India company for the upcoming deployment," said Hay.

The CAT jeeps are also equipped with infra-red lights to enable the drivers to operate in total darkness with the use of Night Vision Goggles (NVGs).

Hay spoke of the type of missions the jeeps would be used for.

"Quick, in-and-out type raids and Non-combatant Evacuation Operations (NCOs) are what we train for at this time," said Hay.

Team 1 Driver, Lance Cpl. L. Neve is happy with his job on the team. "It's exciting operating out of the helicopter. I'm a 0311 'grunt' (infantryman), since I have a jeep licence, I'm with the CATs," said the Florida native.

The Crises Action Team proves the jeep is still a valuable tool to the Com-

Dentists operate in field

As the Combined Arms Operation-89 continues, so does the work of the dentists of 2nd Dental Battalion, 2nd Force Service Support Group at Tactical Landing Zone Jaybird.

Each day the roster fills with names of Marines and Sailors needing some kind of dental work.

More than willing to serve them are the dentists and technicians from the 2nd, 21st and 22nd Dental companies from ICB Camp Lejeune and MCAS New River and Cherry Point.

"We have four dental chairs in operation from which our patients are treated," said Cmdr. Jeff Turner, executive officer, 2nd Dental Co., 2nd Dental Bn., 2nd SSG.

"Our primary mission is to 'attack' the class-three patients and treat them so they can return to the field," Turner said.

Patients fall into four types of classifications. Class one involves those who are good-to-go, requiring no care. Cleaning teeth and giving a basic checkup are what class-two patients need.

Class-three patients are those who need anything from simple fillings to having their teeth pulled.

The last classification is class-four,

which is status unknown. This means the patients must have a checkup to determine their classification.

Once a health care recipient's classification has been determined, it is time to hop into the chair.

The chair and equipment used in this field-ready dental hospital can be transported in a HMMWV.

Though it has no wheels, the equipment is highly mobile and multipurpose. For example, the chairs and equipment trays fold into a box the size of a field desk.

The unit uses a generator for electricity and requires a steady flow of purified water. After both become available, the dentists are ready for open mouths.

"The equipment we have draws a great deal of power," Turner said. "From the lights to the drills, the electricity is an important asset."

And being able to rinse off teeth, of course, requires water.

Keeping dust and dirt free from the operating room is also a concern, because

both have the potential for causing

infection and disease.

"Whether it be scraping tartar or removing molars, it is surgical by nature," Turner added. "This is why we must constantly keep the area clean."

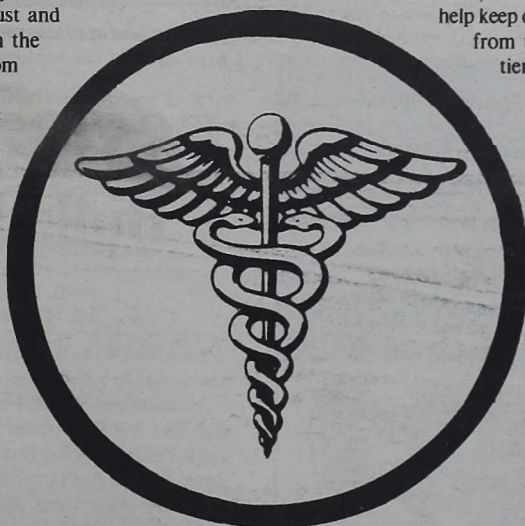
To help combat dust and dirt, the deck is covered with wooden decking. Around the chairs, inner liners help keep dust away from the patients' mouths.

"The Marines were a little

apprehensive at first to come in to get their teeth checked," said Navy Lt. Howell H. Bichfsky, 2nd Dental Co. "After (the patients) sit in the chair, the comfort of it compared to a fighting hole relaxes them enough to be worked on."

However, these dentists don't just clean teeth all day long. They also dig fighting holes and trenches of their own around the General Purpose tents that they helped set up for their shop. Officers and enlisted Sailors of the unit are combat-trained to help fight as part of the rear area security as well as to do dental work in the field.

Dazzling smiles are not a prerequisite for combatants. But good health, which includes dentistry, is an advantage for people engaged in battle.



Medical Bn. field ready in emergency

The 2nd Marine Division was pushing north to Fort Pickett, Va., during the Combined Arms Operation-89.

"Were it an actual wartime operation, the inevitable casualties would need immediate life-sustaining surgery as they are brought off the battlefield.

Second Medical Battalion, 2nd FSSG, provides the "ASH" type medical treatment for the Marines in 2nd MarDiv.

The head "combat doc" is Navy Cmdr. George H. Crittenden, commander of the battalion. While in the field recently for the CAO-89, he described his unit's mission in the Marine Corps' combat doctrine.

"We can field up to five Medical companies to follow the various elements of the division. As the casualties arrive at the companies, we triage them to decide which patient should be treated first," said Crittenden.

Each medical company has two operating rooms, an X-ray lab, blood bank and a pharmacy. Crittenden said, "We do resuscitative, or life-saving surgery—whatever is necessary to stabilize the patient for evacuation to the states."

Medical Co. A, operating technicians HM2 Shelby

Ming and HM3

William

Tucker described the capabilities of their OR.

"We can do up to 25 major trauma cases before needing a resupply," said Ming. "Any type of procedure, including limited heart and brain surgery, is possible here," he added.

"All of our linen is washed, sterilized and reused. It's cheaper in the long run," said Tucker. Tucker also said that the ORs lights and equipment can operate off battery power, should the hospital's generators fail.

In the X-ray lab, technician HM1 Keith Charles demonstrated his battery-powered mobile X-ray unit.

As Charles directed the unit, which is mounted on pneumatic tires to a patient table, he told of his lab's capabilities. "We can handle 100 patients with 10 X-rays per case before resupply. I can recharge the unit's batteries from the generators," said Charles.

Medical Co. Alpha's blood bank has a 100-cubic foot storage freezer. The lab technicians there said that hematology, serology and urinalysis is performed in their lab.

2nd MarDiv's motto is "Follow Me!" In combat, the division's leathernecks can take comfort in knowing 2nd Med. Bn. has done just that.

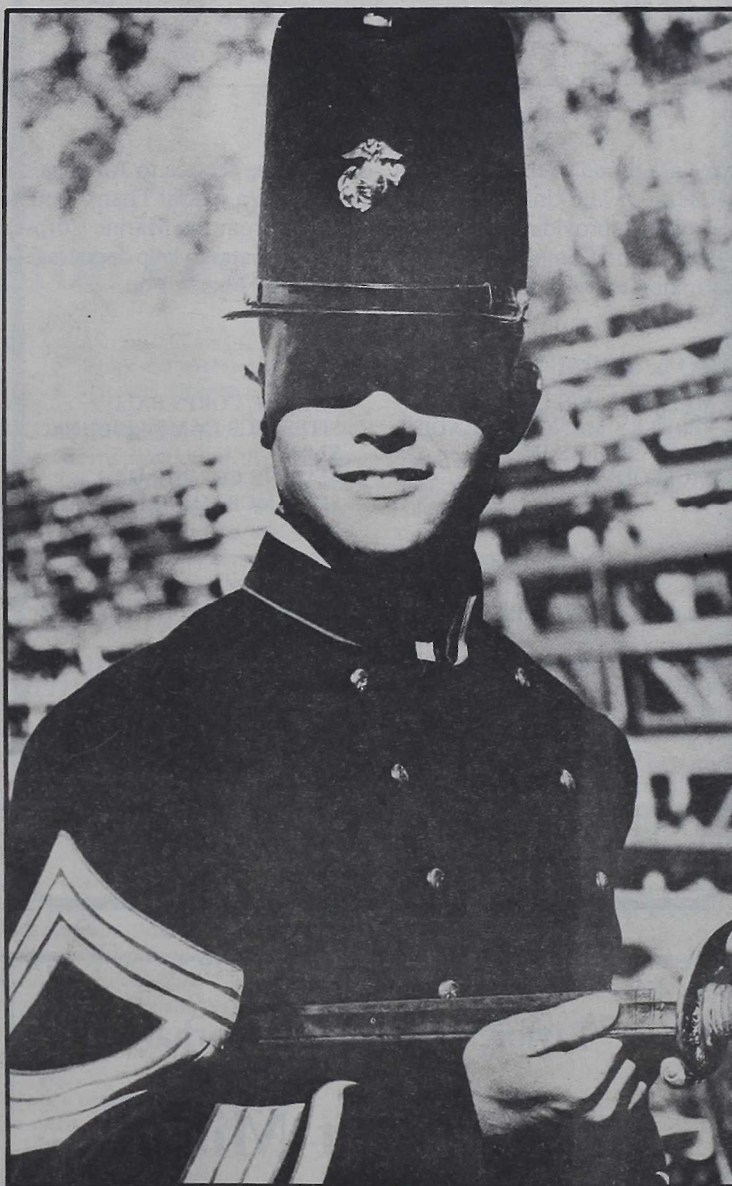

Parking is limited, and will be on the paved area surrounding the Goettge Memorial Fieldhouse.

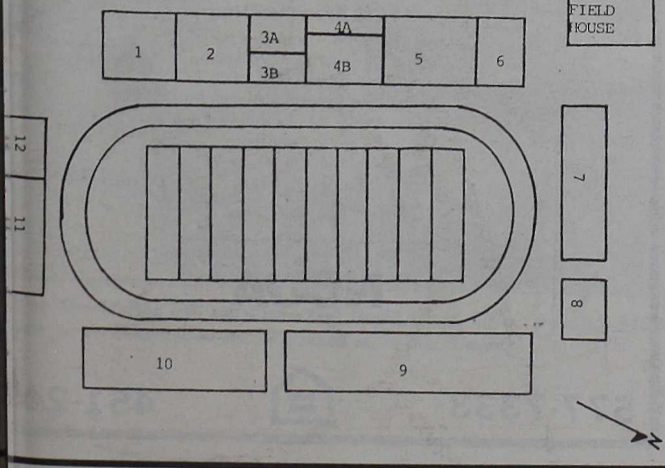

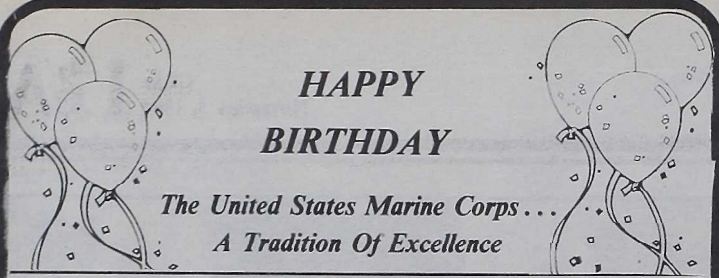

Obstacles don't stop engineers

FORT PICKETT, Va. — A 60-ton behemoth rumbled down the road on Oct. 22. Nearing its destination, the giant roared to a stop. Just out of range of the target a ditch, 10-feet deep, and 25-feet long, spanned the road from one side to the other, positioned to swallow it.

The ditch was just the first obstacle in the armor column's path.

While a team of engineers in a D-7 bulldozer rushed up from the rear to fill in the ditch and allow the column to once again get under way, the lead tank crew did a quick recon of the area.

Just beyond the ditch was a mine field, at least 150 meters long — then, concertina in rows spanning the width of the route.

The chain of obstacles was just the start, because from where they stood, the tank members could see the washed-out bridge they needed to span before they could get on with their mission, not to mention what probably waited for them on the other side.

In terms of time, no one knew how long it would take before the column could resume its drive forward. In terms of assets, it would call on everything their attached engineers could muster. In terms of design, the series of obstacles would serve its purpose.

Complex obstacles, like the ones his engineer crews have been working on all around Fort Pickett, are basically designed to enhance the 2nd Marine Regiment's Operation Force mission, according to Capt. Kevin H. McCabe, commanding officer, Alpha Co., 2nd Combat Engineering Battalion.

"We, as the opposing force, are supposed to defend our homeland of Catawba and delay the advancing enemy forces long enough for the government officials to move from Richland to the Great Smokey Mountains," McCabe said. "The enemy has numerically and materially superior assets, so we have our work cut out for us."

One thing in the engineer's favor is time. The Alpha Co. Marines have been

at Ft. Pickett since Oct. 17 and have a good deal of time to check out the terrain and plan the type and number of obstacles they want to throw at the enemy.

Their basic mission is to throw as much material at the division as we can, and to keep the enemy down for as long as possible," McCabe said. "I believe what we've put up with will make the rest of our mission (who are still assigned to the area) use everything they know." As far as keying on what will help the engineers be successful, the captain said that his Marines feel the best thing they can do is enhance the current terrain.

The area is a real swampy area that has a lot of mature trees on it, so the division engineers will have to keep its main assets on its own roads and trails," the captain said.

"We're trying to mess up those avenues of approach with our complex obstacles. There's not much we can do to stop the dismounted infantry, but we'll try to slow down their armor and big units considerably."

The reason the engineers are using these obstacles is so the advancing

enemy will have to deal with one situation then bring up other materials to

breach the next barrier and other assets for the next, and so on, until it has cleared through the series.

By using numerous barriers, the engineers know they will delay the enemy or possibly cause them to reroute their whole attack.

"By doing that, we either delay them long enough to bring artillery fire down on them or force them to change their route and follow the plan we have set," the company commander said. "The best part of it is even when the enemy realizes we've set up a complex obstacle to stop them, there's nothing they can do about it. They either take the time to handle the barriers or play into other traps we've set up."

According to McCabe, this area has been great for his crews to draw from the assets available in creating their traps.

"There is so much mature lumber that we can perform logging operations to get the materials we need," he said. "That way, we don't have to requisition the stuff and possibly tip off the enemy as to the type of barriers to expect."

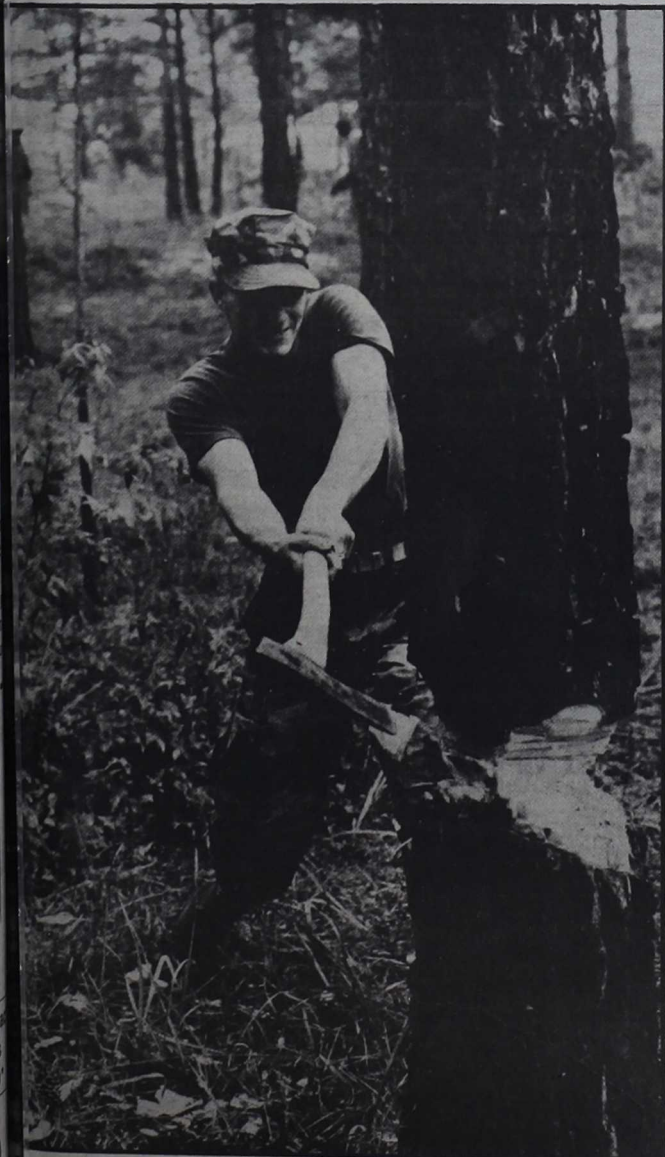

"They have to actually get here and see the sites and handle them as they're found."

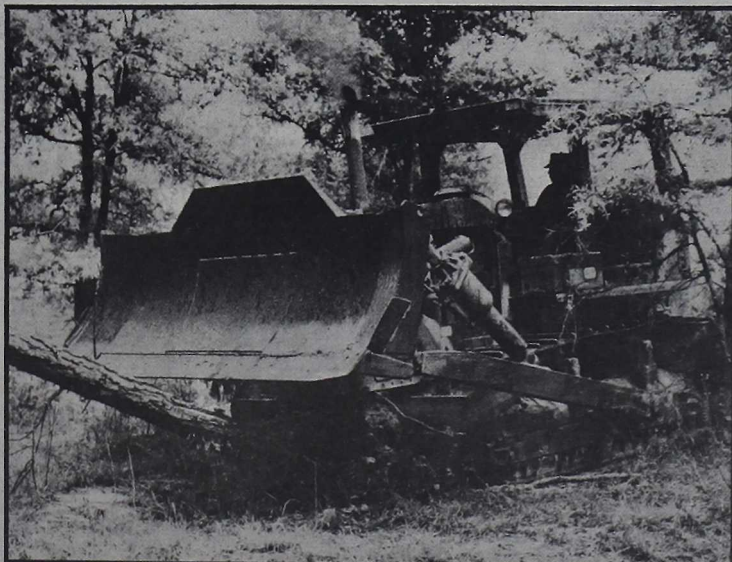
As far as whether or not what the engineers have done will work to stop the division's advance, the captain is pretty sure what his Marines have done will delay the enemy enough to give the opposing forces a fighting chance.

"We won't know for sure until the battle begins," he concluded, "but, if we can just take out their armor assets, we'll have done our jobs."

For McCabe and his Marines, happiness will be looking through binoculars and seeing a column of tanks stopped in its tracks.

Special friendships bud

An 11-year-old girl and a 33-year-old woman may seem an unlikely pair, outside a normal mother and daughter situation. But, Amy and Darlene are not related. They are just good buddies.

The two of them often trek off to the movies, the beach or perhaps to a strawberry field, but to them it's not really where they go, it's more what they do with the time they spend together.

Amy Gerner is one of seven children, five of whom are still at home. Her mother and stepfather do what they can for the children, but with work and a sergeant's income it becomes difficult at times to do much of anything outside the home.

Darlene Frymark is a Marine's spouse and mother of two toddler boys. Growing up, Darlene lived in what she described as an abusive situation. That was one reason she got involved in bug buddies.

"I just want to give back some of the good that I've managed to get since my childhood," Darlene said. "I feel fortunate to have met my husband and have my two sons. I want to share that with Amy."

"We spend a lot of time at the beach collecting shells and sharks teeth," she said. "One time though, we went picking strawberries, then went back to my house and made jelly."

The Big Buddy/Little Buddy program provides a one-on-one relationship between a child, age 5 to 7, and an adult. Although the majority of the children come from single parent households where they are in need of a role model, that's not always the case, according to Sandra Riley, volunteer coordinator.

"When you have a lot, it's better to give than to receive. As big buddies we aren't permitted to provide discipline or to spend a lot of money on the children.

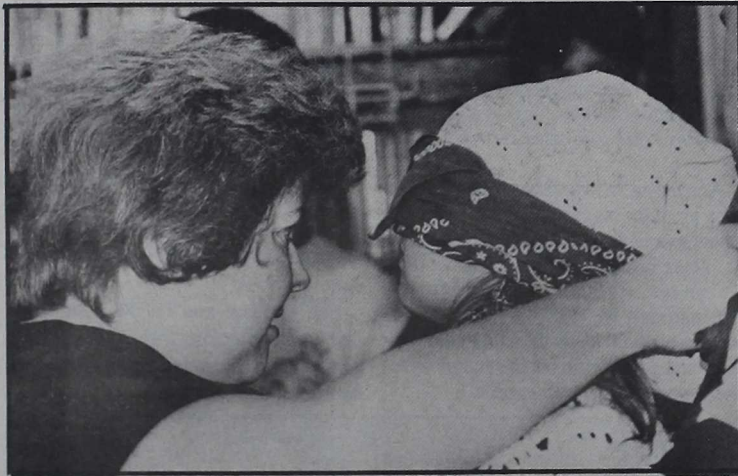
It's the time and caring that counts the most anyway," added Darlene.

Little Buddies come into the program for several reasons. Sometimes concerned parents are, for one reason or another, unable to spend recreational time or money with their child. Other

times, they are referrals from juvenile court counselors, schools, the Department of Social Services, and crisis counselors. The children who are referred are children who are, for one reason or another, not receiving adequate supervision from primary adults or are in some

way neglected or rejected, according to Riley.

"I've been together with Darlene for almost a year now," said Amy. "We've gone through all kinds of adventures together."

Someone who volunteers to be a Big Buddy must be at least 18-years-old, have a mode of transportation to take the child on activities, and commit themselves for a six-month period, at least two hours per week. Each applicant is screened by the volunteer coordinator and three personal references are checked as well as their court history.

Once selected, a volunteer is trained by Riley and is then assigned a buddy. The assignment is based on mutual interests and ability to meet a particular age child and meet needs.

"The buddies don't just spend time with each other, they also attend planned events throughout the year," Riley said, "like our upcoming Halloween party and the recent roller-skating party. These events are organized by volunteers so everyone can get to know one another."

Enroll now at 'Camp Lejeune U'

It's safe to say you probably won't ever see someone wearing a University of Camp Lejeune sweatshirt or hear about their football team. No such school officially exists.

But what does exist is the Consolidated Education Center in Building 202. This is the place for Camp Lejeune Marines and Sailors to further their education.

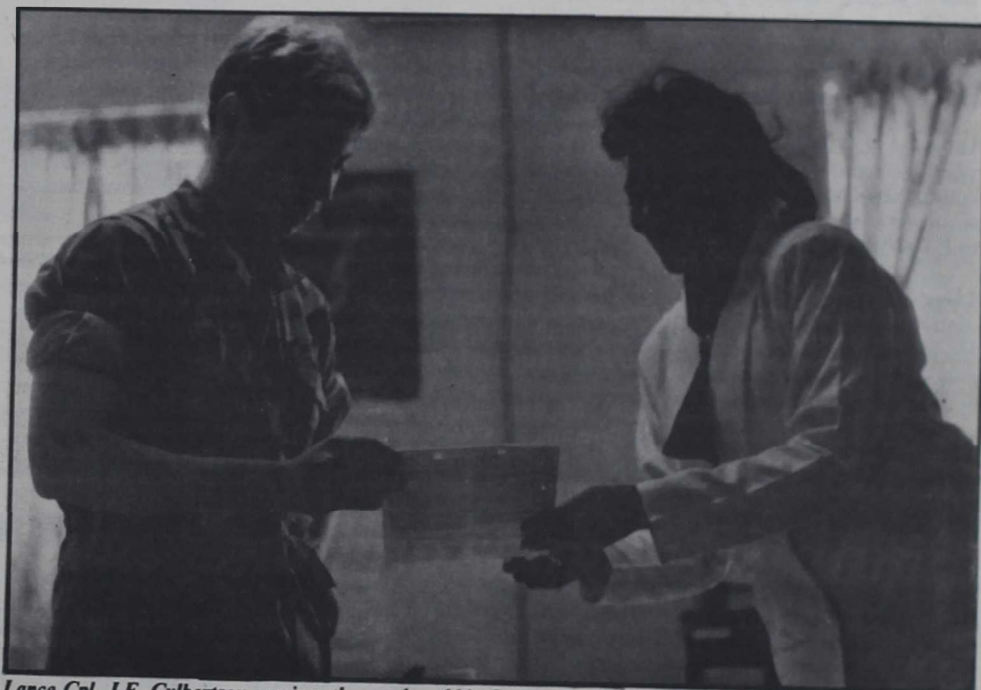
The center's director, John Waters, wants everyone to know that no matter what kind of schedule or unit commitments a Marine may have, he can continue his education. "The center is set up to meet the needs of Camp Lejeune's Marines," said Waters.

Courses are available from Coastal Carolina Community College, Boston, East Carolina, Golden Gate, Northern Illinois, and Campbell Universities.

Whether a Marine wants to prepare to take the General Educational Development (GED) test which earns a high school diploma equivalency test, enroll in adult high school diploma programs, or take courses to build credit hours towards a four-year degree, Building 202 is the place where he or she can do it happen.

For a Marine has initially seen the unit Education Center (EDC), the next step is to come in and see the appropriate counselor for whichever unit the Marine is in; 2nd MarDiv., 2nd FSSG or Marine Corps

Captain D. F. Brown, noncommissioned officer-in-charge of 2nd FSSG's counselors, encourages all Marines to come in and find out about the multitude of programs available for furthering education. "I'm here to answer questions and hopefully steer them in the right direction to further their education,"

Brown said. He also emphasized that servicemembers shouldn't think that being in a deploying unit will keep them from being able to take college courses.

"Even if a Marine is going to be aboard ship for six months, he can earn credits towards a degree through correspondence courses and get 75 percent tuition assistance from the government," said Brown.

The Defense Activity for Non-Traditional Education Support (DANTES), the College Level Examination Program (CLEP), and the American College Testing (ACT) Programs offer servicemembers the opportunity to earn transferable college credits by taking examinations.

"Check with the school that you plan to attend, and find out which CLEP, ACT, or DANTES exams are transferable to the program that interests you," Brown said. "It's a good way to knock out initial course requirements."

Testing center supervisor, Geneva Estelle wants Marines to know about the benefits available. "The CLEP, ACT and DANTES exams cost \$35 to \$200 for dependents and Department of Defense employees but are free of charge to active duty military people," she said.

"With over 100 correspondence courses available, a Marine can go on a deployment, study a subject as he crosses the Atlantic and take the end of course examination in Rota, Spain or at any U. S. military installation around the globe," Estelle said. "We try to instill a 'I can do it!' attitude in this office."

Steve Davis, Coastal Carolina Community College (CCCC) representative at the center, spoke proudly of CCCC's role on the 'University of Camp Lejeune' campus.

"We (the college representatives at the center) are a family. Our only purpose is to help the Marines and Sailors aboard Lejeune. If Coastal can't offer a particular class or program a student wants, I'll refer him to one of the other schools," Davis said.

Two of CCCC's programs that Davis is particularly proud of are the GED/Adult High School Diploma program and the computer learning package.

Of the former, Davis said: "You can see a big difference in the way Marines feel about themselves after they earn their (high school/GED) diploma. For



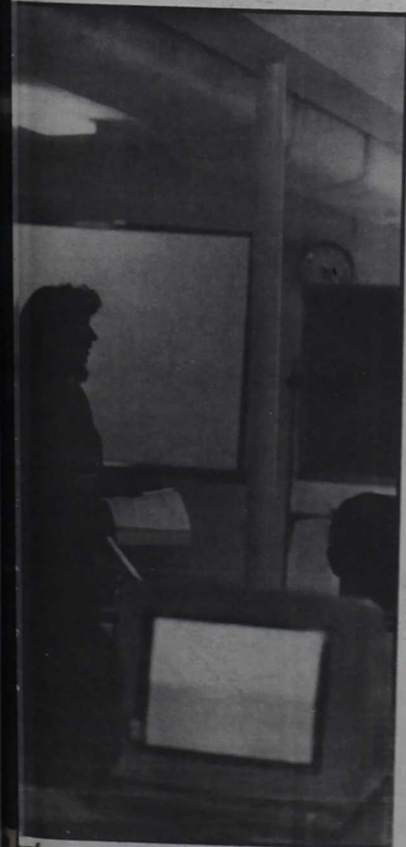

many of them it changes their goals. It's absolutely free to the Marines!"

The computer lab at CCCC, is beneficial not only to the individual Marine, but to units too.

"Organizations can send a minimum of 12 people to our 25 terminal labs and we will teach whatever program is used at their workplace," Davis said.

Both of these programs last about 2 1/2 weeks. Anyone can get a college education. But only those who work for that goal at the Consolidated Education Center can say "My alma mater is the 'University of Camp Lejeune!'"

Movie Mates—Adult World—Video Theater, 316 Wilmington Highway (U.S. 17, South), located on west side of Wilmington Hwy., 8/10 of a mile north of the entrance to Camp Geiger (1.5 miles north of entrance to MCAS New River).

Adult Relaxation, or Relaxation, or Misty Blue, or Mike's Movie Mates, or Mike's Adult Bookstore or Touch of Class or Doll House or Kay's Paradise, located on west side of Richlands Hwy. (U.S. 258).

Adult Book Store and Rat's Book Store, located on the west side of Wilmington Hwy. (U.S. 17 south) near the intersection of Canady Road; .3 of a mile

north of entrance to Camp Geiger and 1 mile north of entrance to MCAS, New River; set back from highway partially behind 430 Wilmington Highway.

Soft Touch or Dottie's Movie Mates or Tiger's Eye, located on the west side of Wilmington Hwy. (U.S. 17 south) near the intersection of Canady Road; .2 of a mile north of the entrance to Camp Geiger and 1 mile north of entrance to MCAS, New River.

Sandy's Paradise, or Golden Nugget Movie Mates or Soft Touch Video Theater or Velvet Touch Movie Mates of Rainbow, located on the west side of Wilmington Hwy. (U.S. 17 south); .2 of a mile north of entrance to MCAS, New River.

Adult Fun House or 17 South Movie Mates, located on the north side of Canady Road at the intersection of Wilmington Hwy. (U.S. 17 south); .3 of a mile north of entrance to Camp Geiger.

The Play Pen, located Maplehurst Road at intersection of Wilmington Hwy. (U.S. 17 south); across from the entrance to MCAS, New River. Car dealer on right side of structure is not off limits.

Private Dancer Adult Relaxation, located .4 of a mile north of the entrance to Camp Geiger.

Many of these businesses frequently change names, owners or the appearance of the buildings. However, the businesses are still considered off limits until such time as removed from the base order by the Armed Forces Disciplinary Control Board.

The contest was scheduled to start at
8 a.m., but the OB Boys and Paul Nilsen,
assistant base athletic director, waited an
hour in order to accommodate late-
arriving competitors.

Staff Sgt. Kelly Rhode, Headquarters
Bn., MCB, and Doug Dougherty, one of
the OB Boys, were announcers and

competitors.

Dougherty, the son of a retired Marine,
said he spent his teenage years surfing at
Onslow Beach. "It's always great to be
able to come back to Onslow Beach. I've
talked to Marines who surf at Topsail and
Emerald Isle, and many of them are not
aware of the fine surfing at Camp Le-
jeune," he said.

Rhode has surfed all over the world in
the last 22 years. "The OB Boys call me
the 'old man,'" he said with a laugh.

The contest had six divisions to com-
pete in. The Juniors division was open to
age groups 15-17, Men's 18-24 and the
Masters 25 and over.

The other three divisions were open to
any age group.

The Active Duty division had seven
competitors from Camp Lejeune and one
from Shaw Air Force Base, S.C.

The Longboard and Boogie Board divi-
sions required the competitors to use
those specific types of surfboards.

Longboards are approximately 10 feet
long, hence the name. Boogie boards are
about half that length, and the surfer lies
on it instead of standing during the ride.

The surfers wore bright-colored vests

to enable the panel of three judges to
distinguish them.

In the preliminaries each surfer had 10
minutes to show their skills. The top-
seeded competitors would proceed on to
the semifinals and then to the finals.

During a 30-minute break in the ac-
tion, the competitors were treated to a
lunch provided by Special Services.

The elimination heats lasted 20
minutes each; the surfers rode as many
waves as possible, while the judges total-
ed the scores of their best three waves.

Dr. Scott Rice, a physician from
Morehead City and a competitor in the
Masters and Longboard divisions, gave
some insight to the close-knit North
Carolina surfing community that has
worldwide ties.

"I first met Kelly (Staff Sgt. Rhode) at
Atlantic Beach, but we used to see each
other surfing at Diamond Head, Hawaii.
"When he told me he and the OB Boys
were having a surfing contest, I had to
come down," Rice said.

As the contest continued, the waves

□ More than 270,000 cups were used along the race course on previous marathons. If set down side by side, they would mark a path from the starting line to the Capitol a distance of over 13 miles.

□ The average runners feet strike the ground 1,600 times per mile. For the marathon, runners can expect their feet to pat, smack, pop or drag along the ground an average of 41,920 times if he/she completes the race.

□ The amount of water and body punch to be distributed along the race course will amount to over 21,095 gallons which could fill a swimming pool, whose dimensions were 10 feet wide, 30 feet long and 10 feet deep.



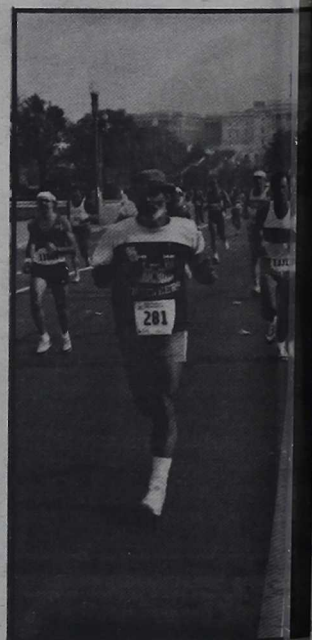
