But they did not interrupt the growth and development of this community, in that we continued to conduct operations, and we continued to nourish the incredible partnership we enjoy with our Spanish hosts. We also continued to build new friendships and have a lot of fun. Whether through fantastic events put on by MWR like our 4th of July Independence Fest or Winter Wonderland, or at the most epic Navy Ball in the El Puerto Bull Ring, or at Feria, or just in someone's backyard, I will cherish the incredible memories and the lifelong friendships we have built.

Given all this community has accomplished, it came as no surprise to hear President Biden state two weeks ago that the United States intends to send two additional Destroyers to be homeported in Rota in the coming years, pending Spanish government approval. I can think of no better way to end this tour than to know that our Commander-in-Chief sees what is happening in Rota, and he wants more of it!

So my family and I wish you all a warm farewell. We lived our best lives here, and we will forever hold a piece of Rota in our hearts, and we intend to return often. In the Navy, we never say goodbye, so instead it is always, "See you later." Thank you for all of your support, and thank you for keeping the faith - for the duration.

Capt. Teague J. Suarez is the proud son of a Navy Senior Chief Petty Officer. He is a 1998 graduate of the Naval Academy, and holds a masters degree from the Air Command and Staff College. He was designated a Naval Aviator in 2000.

His aviation assignments include the HSL-51 Warlords, where he completed two deployments in support of Operations Enduring Freedom and Iraqi Freedom; HSL-40, where he served as an instructor pilot and the CNAL Search and Rescue Evaluator; and HSL-42, where he deployed as an Officer in Charge aboard USS Samuel B. Roberts (FFG 58). Capt. Suarez had the honor of serving as the commanding officer of the HSM-37 Easyriders.

Ashore Capt. Suarez served a year in Iraq as part of the Multi-National Security Corps - Iraq; as an action officer on the Joint Staff, J-35, Reconnaissance Operations Division; and as the Executive Assistant for the Director, Air Warfare (OPNAV N98). Afloat he served aboard USS Nimitz (CVN 68) as the Navigator, completing a 10-month deployment to the Third, Fifth, Sixth, and Seventh Fleet areas of operations.

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NAVSUP Supports BALTOPS22 at STRIKFORNATO HQ

Exercise Baltic Operations 2022 (BALTOPS22), June 6-17, was the premier maritime-focused exercise in the Baltic Region conducted annually with U.S. Naval Forces Europe-Africa in the lead and Naval Striking and Support Forces NATO (STRIKFORNATO) responsible for its execution. This shared responsibility provides unique training opportunities that strengthen the combined maritime response capabilities that are critical to preserving freedom of navigation and security in the Baltic Sea.

The command and control center responsible for planning and executing the exercise was located at STRIKFORNATO's rapidly deployable joint headquarters in Oeiras, Portugal from which it plans. commands, and controls NATO maritime operations throughout the Euro-Atlantic region. During the exercise, Naval Supply Systems Command Fleet Logistics Center Sigonella's Lt. j.g. Adam Thomas was tasked with supporting STRIKFORNATO headquarters' Assistant Chief of Staff (ACOS) J4 (Logistics) Division. The ACOS J4 is responsible for developing, maintaining and providing a clear and concise theater-wide logistics picture to the Multi-National Maritime Force Commander. The ACOS J4 contributed to the success of the exercise by developing a maritime logistics support network that provided various logistics requirements to ships participating in BALTOPS22.

Below are Thomas' responses to our questions about his experience.

Describe your duties and responsibilities while assigned to ACOS J4 during BALTOPS 22?

While assigned to ACOS J4, my responsibilities were to learn the processes and procedures of the STRIKFORNATO J4 team in order to improve how STRIKFORNATO and NAVSUP FLCSI does business in the area of operations. As the sole maritime logistics planner with an understanding of the NAVSUP FLCSI capabilities I was able to bring a unique perspective to the J4 team from anything from fuel to casualty reporting.

HadNAVSUPFLCSIsentarepresentative during previous BALTOP exercises?

This year's BALTOPS exercise was the first time our command sent a representative, reinforcing an established relationship with NAVSUP FLCSI's logistics-focused partners, like NATO.. Sending me to STRIKFORNATO

during BALTOPS 22 provided a seat at the table to foster a closer NAVSUP FLCSI/ NATO relationship. Presence matters.

Why were you sent to represent NAVSUP FLCSI?

There is tremendous talent within both the NAVSUP FLCSI and NATO organizations, and the fact that we possess common objectives made this collaboration during BALTOPS 22 an ideal opportunity to further develop our capabilities. I was the ideal

candidate for this assignment for several reasons. As a subject matter expert on the maritime logistics capabilities that NAVSUP FLCSI possesses, I am familiar with NAVSUP FLCSI

key operationally strategic initiatives, especially those that relate to Europe's High North. Earlier in my career, I served as a ship supply officer with experience operating in Sixth Fleet including multinational exercises. Lastly, I possess the necessary desire to learn the NATO structure and language, as well as pioneer the relationship between STIKFORNATO and NAVSUP FLCSI.

What are the desired results of your efforts supporting BALTOPS 22 at ACOS J4, STRIKFORNATO HQ?

Now that BALTOPS22 has concluded, I hope I've contributed to a productive, Iong-term relationship between STRIKFORNATO and NAVSUP FLCSI, one that both of our organizations can leverage to tackle common challenges that arise in support of warfighters.

Describe your role at NAVSUP FLCSI Site Rota? Prior to supporting BALTOPS22 I was serving as the logistics support officer in

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Health Promotion Corner: Tips to Safely Enjoy Your Summer Holiday

Being informed about the workplace and recreational safety hazards can keep everyone safe. Additionally, the summer months are often a high point of the year as Sailors, Marines, and civilian personnel spend time with family and friends at backyard barbeques and take well-deserved vacations. However, many summer month activities put you at risk for accidents that have potentially serious consequences. Mishaps, primarily related to private motor vehicles and off-duty/ shore recreational activities, can result in loss of life or injuries, putting service members on the sidelines, derailing their productivity, and threatening their readiness for duty.

Spending time outside at the pool or beach, at summer barbeques, and playing sports and games with your friends and family is a lot of fun. Stay safe when you are active to combat heat-related injuries. Listen to your body and take breaks in the shade when necessary. Wear light, loose-fitting clothes and give yourself at least a week of light- to moderate-intensity activity to adapt to the heat.

Hydrate before, during, and after any outdoor activity. You should drink 7-10 ounces of fluid every 10-20 minutes during exercise. Remember, you can become dehydrated whenever you are overheated, even at the pool. Water is the best option for replacing fluids; however, sports drinks can help replenish electrolytes such as sodium and potassium. Only opt for sports drinks before, during, or after high-intensity physical activity exceeding 60 minutes.

You may risk injuring yourself and those around you if workplace safety procedures go lax. Many work environments do not seem inherently risky but can lead to injury or illness from physical, taskrelated, environmental, or design-related hazards.

Sleep is essential to overall health and wellness, and insufficient sleep can zap your energy, mood, and ability to function throughout the day. While it may not always be possible to get the recommended eight hours of sleep every night, there are ways you can increase the amount and quality of your sleep. Start by going to bed at the same time every day, avoiding alcohol and caffeine, and avoid using technology immediately before bed. Driving while sleepy is risky and could lead to falling asleep at the wheel. Long car or motorcycle trips can cause fatigue, increasing your risk of an accident. When you practice these driving safety tips, like stopping to stretch every two hours, you can decrease your risk of getting into an accident.

The attached infographic is from Spain's Director General de Tráfico (DGT) regarding e-scooters, segways, electric unicycles, and hoverboards. U.S. military and dependents are to abide by Spanish and U.S. military regulations, thus helmets are mandatory.

Ready Navy: Tips to Prepare You and Your Family for Extreme Heat

From NAVSTA Rota Emergency changes. Management

While being stationed at Naval Station (NAVSTA) Rota, Spain, you may experience some extreme heat here Rota, around Andalucia, or during your travels. NAVSTA Rota Emergency Management has some tips for preparing yourself and your family for extreme heat.

1) Be informed, and know heat terminology:

•Heat Wave— An extended period of extreme heat, usually combined with excessive humidity.

•Heat Index— A number of degrees in Fahrenheit (F) added to the air temperature that tells how hot it feels with the relative humidity.

•Excessive Heat Watch—Conditions are favorable for an excessive heat event to meet or exceed local excessive heat warning criteria in the next 24 to 72 hours

•Excessive Heat Warning—Heat Index values are forecast to meet or exceed locally defined warning criteria for at least two days (daytime highs=105-110° Fahrenheit).

·Heat Advisory—Heat index values are forecast to meet locally defined advisory criteria for one to two days

(daytime highs=100-105° Fahrenheit). 2) Listen to local weather forecasts and stay aware of upcoming temperature

It's inevitable that at some point, you will be in extreme heat. So what should you do if there is extreme heat?

·Slow down and don't do anything too strenuous.

•Stay inside as much as possible. •Never leave children or pets alone in

closed vehicles. •If air conditioning is not available in

your home, stay on the lowest level or go to a public building with air conditioning

•If you stay in your home without air conditioning, make

sure there is a way to circulate the air around you, such as a fan.

•Drink lots of water, even if you don't feel thirsty.

•Eat well-balanced, light, and regular meals.

•Avoid alcohol, caffeine, and salt. •Wear loosefitting, lightweight, and light-colored clothing.

•Be aware that a power outage or drought can result from a heat wave.

Lastly, it's important to keep a lookout for possible heat emergencies: Heat cramps—Muscle spasms and

aches from heavy exertion in extreme heat. They are usually the first sign of heat-related complications.

Heat exhaustion—A form of mild shock that results from insufficient body fluids due to extreme heat and excessive exercising. The blood flow to the skin increases, decreasing blood flow to vital organs and raising the body temperature, increasing the risk of a heat stroke.

Heat stroke/sun stroke- The body's temperature control system stops working, causing body temperature to rise so high (103°F or more) that there may be brain damage or death.

If you experience or observe any of the above conditions, seek medical attention immediately.

Lt. Cmdr. Nathan Rice is the deputy supervisory chaplain assigned to Naval Station (NAVSTA) Rota Chapel. USS Arleigh Burke Arrives in Riga

The Arleigh Burke-class guided-missile destroyer USS Arleigh Burke (DDG 51) arrived in Riga, Latvia for a scheduled port visit on July 9, 2022.

While in Riga, crew members will visit the NATO Strategic Center of Excellence, learn about the region's history, and experience the city's rich culture. Arleigh Burke will also provide tours to senior officials from the Latvian government, Ministry of Defense, National Armed Forces and U.S. Embassy team.

"Our crew is thrilled to be welcomed in Latvia's beautiful capitol," said Cmdr. Peter Flynn, the ship's commanding officer. "We are excited to further strengthen relationships within our alliance and to visit the NATO Strategic Communications Centre of Excellence. We will thoroughly enjoy experiencing Riga's rich culture."

Arleigh Burke is on its second patrol in U.S. Naval Forces Europe's area of operations, working with NATO allies and partners in the region. Arleigh Burke began its current patrol in June, operating in the Atlantic Ocean and Mediterranean Sea alongside allies and partners. The ship conducted port calls in Ferrol, Spain, and Villefranche-Sur-Mer, France, strengthening ties with Spanish and French navies.

Additionally, Arleigh Burke conducted interoperability exercises with the French and Spanish navies in the Atlantic and Mediterranean, highlighting the capability and capacity Forward Deployed Naval Forces-Europe (FDNF-E) ships bring to the European theater. Now in the Baltic

These mobile, multi-mission capable ships routinely operate throughout the waters of Europe and Africa, from the Cape of Good Hope to the Arctic Circle, demonstrating their mastery of the maritime domain. Arleigh Burke is one of the U.S. Navy destroyers based at Naval Station Rota, Spain, and assigned to Commander Task Force 65 in support of NATO's Integrated Air Missile Defense architecture.

For over 80 years, U.S. Naval Forces

Europe-U.S. Naval Forces Africa (NAVEUR-NAVAF) has forged strategic relationships with our allies and partners, leveraging a foundation of shared values to preserve security and stability.

On June 30, 2022, the law authorizing free school meals for all enrolled students expired. Families will need to complete an application for free and reduced-price meals, beginning as early as July 1st. NEXCOM and school liaison office will publish information on the procedures for applying for free and reduced-price meals. Please note that families must reapply each year for free and reduced-price meal eligibility, can apply anytime during the school year, but must reapply beginning July 1st of every year.

Below are some frequently asked questions (FAQ) regarding the school meal program:

Why isn't the free meal waiver continuing next year?

The Families First Coronavirus Response Act (FFCRA), Public Law 116-127, authorized free school meals for all students and other temporary changes. The law expires on June 30, 2022. This authorization was in response to the sudden widespread and lengthy unemployment of many households and loss of in-school learning that started at the beginning of the pandemic. Without access to the school breakfast and lunch programs that many of our nation's children depend on, the health of our nation's children was at risk. Therefore, Congress authorized waivers to the national school lunch program and school breakfast program that provided free student meals.

What happens now that all students no longer have free meals next school vear?

Beginning as early as July 1 of each school year, families can complete an application for free and reduced-price meals. Families who do not qualify or do not apply will pay the full price amount.

School Meals Program FAQs for SY2022-2023 Eligibility status for free and reducedprice meals is for the entire school year and only one school year. Families must reapply every school year as early as July 1. It is highly encouraged that families apply each school year.

How do I know if I qualify for free and reduced-price meals?

Eligibility for free and reduced-price meals is based on household size and income. When determining household income, each spouse's income is included. However, military pay for the overseas cost of living adjustment, overseas housing allowance, hazardous duty pay and combat pay is excluded from total income. Overseas families, excluding Guam and Puerto Rico, use the Alaska Income Eligibility Rate. The income eligibility rates will not be published by USDA until mid-late June. A foster child who is the legal responsibility of the courts is eligible to receive free meals regardless of your income. Children enrolled in Sure Start automatically qualifies for free school meals.

How do I obtain a web-based lunch account for my child?

For all exchanges, you will need your student ID number, exact spelling of the student name used upon registration and an email address. The student ID number and exact spelling of name used upon registration is available from your school.

For NEXCOM, applications are made through an online application at https://www.mynavyexchange.com/ studentmealprogram. For families participating in the NEXCOM Student Meal Program, your district name is "DoDEA - Navy Exchange (Alexandria,

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Seabees Construct Kindergarten with Tunisian Naval Engineers

U.S. Navy Seabees assigned to Naval Mobile Construction Battalion (NMCB) 133 and Tunisian Navy engineers broke ground on the Phoenix Express 2022 (PE22) Engineer Civic Action Project (ENCAP) in Bizerte, Tunisia on June 3, 2022. The combined PE22 militarv engineer team will construct a new 130 square meter, two-room kindergarten building with a bathroom at the local elementary school in the La Pecherie neighborhood of Bizerte, Tunisia.

The project is part of the annual Phoenix Express exercise hosted in Tunisia that focuses on improving interoperability and increasing regional stability amongst North Africa nations, and is a testament to the strength of U.S.-Tunisia bilateral cooperation. The PE22 ENCAP is a vital training opportunity for naval engineers to gain expeditionary construction skills in an austere environment. The kindergarten building constructed by the combined military engineer team will also vastly benefit the La Pecherie community in an important location for maritime operations and exercises in the central Mediterranean Sea.

"This project is a great chance for the Naval Construction Force to build relationships, strengthen interoperability with Tunisian Navy engineers, and practice our construction skills," Lt. j.g. Ramses Carranza, officer-in-charge and project manager for the Engineer Civic Action Project. "And in the end, it leaves a tangible safe structure for the local children and the community overall, being able to help others and increase the quality of life of the children is the most rewarding aspect of this project.'

The two-room classroom building with two bathrooms will be constructed at the Bizerte elementary school compound. This new building will expand the currently available space for teachers and children, and can accommodate about 30-40 kindergarten students. Adding earlyeducation facilities is a major need and priority for Tunisia. The team is expected to complete the project in mid-July.

"Helping this community, while we build our technical engineering skills is winwin," This community is very close to the port and Navy base here in Bizerte" said Senior Chief Constructionman Enrique Molina, Engineer Exercise Planner, Naval Forces Africa. "Working side-by-side with our partners in Tunisia enhances our ability to work together, we learn from each other while strengthening our relationship with our partners and the community.'

The skills attained by the team of U.S. and Tunisian engineers during this project include construction planning and management, embarkation to an austere location, disaster response, and vertical construction to include over-head concrete pours and small unit tactics and leadership. Although this project is construction of a kindergarten building, the work and skills attained by the team,

are the same as those needed for military engineers in a crisis.

NMCB 133 is an East Coast battalion from Gulfport. Mississippi currently forward deployed across four geographic areas of operation, based in Rota, Spain under Commander, Task Force 68 (CTF-68) Navy Expeditionary Combat Command. The battalion is based there to provide an adaptive and scalable Naval Construction Force ready and capable of executing quality construction in combat or in support of civic action, humanitarian assistance, or disaster recovery.

CTF-68 commands all Naval Expeditionary Forces in U.S. European Command and U.S. Africa Command areas of responsibility in direct support of Commander, U.S. Naval Forces Europe and Africa (NAVEUR-NAVAF), and Commander, U.S. Sixth Fleet Maritime and Theater Security Cooperation Strategies and Maritime Support Plans.

PE22 is one of three NAVEUR-NAVAF-facilitated regional exercises as part of a comprehensive strategy to provide collaborative opportunities amongst African forces and international partners that addresses maritime security concerns

How do I apply for Free and Reduced-Price Meals?

Free and Reduced-Price Meal (FARM) applications are made through an online application. In accordance with USDA regulations, applications are available no earlier than July 1 for the upcoming school year. You must have your child's DoDEA student ID number, the exact spelling of the name used on the school enrollment application and a correct email address. An email is required to receive the status confirmation email.

For NEXCOM, applications are available at https://www.mynavyexchange. com/studentmealprogram.

What is the cost of a meal?

Reduced-price lunch - \$0.40 Full price lunch -Elementary School: \$3.50 Middle/High School: \$3.75

All meals must be paid for in advance or at the time of sale. Households should prepare a budget to ensure they have funds to pay for meals. A best practice is to fund your child's meal account every pay day with enough funds to pay for meals until the next pay day.

My student is currently enrolled in the DoDEA Virtual School (DVS). Are DVS students allowed to participate in the SMP?

Yes, all students enrolled in DoDEA schools participating in the USDA SMP are

eligible to participate. Parents/sponsors should establish a SMP account with NEX and then inquire with their local DoDEA schools regarding specific procedures.

I home school my students. Are we eligible for the Student Meal Program?

If home school students have a DoDEA student ID number and are receiving auxiliary services or enrolled in at least one course, they are eligible to participate in the student meal program.

What do I do if my child forgets lunch or lunch money?

In the spirit of an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure, the best practice is to include the cost of school meals in your budget and then every pay day fund the account through the next pay day. You can set up low balance reminders in the on-line account or set up automatic payments to avoid this issue.

In the rare event that a child has no lunch meal or money to pay for a meal, the school kitchen members will make special arrangements to feed your child; however, this meal must be paid for by the family. Tax dollars and school meals revenue cannot be used to pay this debt owed by the family.
