# USAG Presidio of Monterey welcomes Kline as new garrison commander

# California's Army Filipino Regiments played important role in WWII, beyond

In April 1942, the Army activated the 1st Filipino Infantry Battalion at Camp San Luis Obispo, about 150 miles south of the Presidio of Monterey. Filipino soldiers who had escaped the fall of the Philippines reported to the unit as did Filipino Americans who had volunteered after enlisting. The Army saw symbolic value in having combat units of specific nationalities, especially after the nation's humiliating defeats. Joining the 1st Filipino Infantry proved popular. On July 13, 1942, the Army elevated the battalion to regiment status during a ceremony at the California Rodeo Grounds in Salinas.



### Presidio's Strong Beginnings graduation displays kindergarten readiness

Wearing blue graduation caps and gowns, 27 children from the Strong Beginnings PreK program at the Presidio of Monterey received their diplomas during a graduation ceremony at the installation's Child Development Center on June 3. Not only did the graduates demonstrate their readiness for kindergarten with a song and dance that showcased their mastery of the alphabet, they also recited the Pledge of Allegiance flawlessly and displayed exemplary behavior throughout the ceremony.

# Archaeological dig at Presidio of Monterey solves mystery

# Presidio, Camp Roberts fire departments hold prescribed burn

The Presidio of Monterey and Camp Roberts fire departments successfully teamed up with other agencies to hold the first in a series of multi-agency prescribed burns at Camp Roberts, Calif., May 4. The team burned a 77-acre area on the installation to reduce the risk of wildfires, improve the area's ecology and enhance safety, said Fire Prevention Chief Cory Prough of the PoM Fire Department. Camp Roberts is about 100 miles south of the Presidio in San Miguel and part of it falls under the command of U.S. Army Garrison PoM.
