557th Maintenance Company deploys

'Renegades' spend time with family, friends before deployment

Families and friends bid farewell to the 557th Maintenance Company as they departed Fort Irwin on April 28 to Afghanistan for a year of duty in support of Operation Enduring Freedom.

The Soldiers of the 'Renegade' company received hugs, kisses and handshakes during the few early morning hours they spent at Freedom Fitness Gym processing and manifesting for a flight to the other side of the world. As Soldiers

waited to receive weapons and be weighed with their gear, they spent time with spouses, children, friends and fellow service members. At last, the time came for the warriors to board buses that took them to Southern California Logistics Airbase in Victorville, Calif. By 5 a.m., a more than 200 Soldiers had departed and would increase the total of deployed service members from this desert installation to approximately 452.

At a casing ceremony two days before the maintenance company deployed, the unit 'cased' its colors at an afternoon, public ceremony. The Renegades sealed their unit guidon, a red-colored flag, for the trip as they stood in formation on a grassy field here. Families and the community had the opportunity to approach the formation and spend time with Soldiers. Fort Irwin leadership attended the ceremony and shook every Renegade's hand.

Spc. Kevin Kliem, training assistant and guidon bearer for the 557th, stood steady at the front of the formation while National Training Center and Fort Irwin Commander Brig. Gen.

Grabbing hold of the reigns

Horse Detachment gets new commander

The Horse Detachment of the 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment welcomed its new commander during a change of command ceremony on Fort Irwin, April 15.

Capt. Jason Phillips took hold of not only the guidon to his new unit, but also the symbolic reigns of a unit that represents the tradition of the cavalry.

According to its Web page, the Horse Detachment functions as a living and historically accurate depiction of the mounted cavalry Soldier and preserves the Regiment's heritage. The Detachment serves as a mounted color guard and performs at official ceremonies, unofficial functions and regional community events. The unit promotes goodwill through community relations, supports Army recruiting, and fulfills community outreach objectives.

Lt. Col. Andrew Cooper, commander of Regimental Support Squadron, 11th ACR, in addition to handing over the guidon to Phillips, spoke about the significance of the Detachment in the last year. The 'Packhorse' has worked through superb execution of parades, ceremonial events, cavalry skill demonstrations, and other activities between California and half-way across the United States, said Cooper. He credited the quality of leaders and Soldiers of the unit.

"Our Horse Detachment has been fortunate in the last few years with the caliber of leaders and troopers we've been able to serve beneath this guidon," Cooper said. "They have continuously raised the bar and proved the level of professionalism, performance and expectations to lofty heights."

Phillips, who is a native of Georgia and no stranger to horse-riding, gave thanks when he addressed the audience. He thanked his wife, Danielle, and his son. He also appreciated the Regiment leadership for the command opportunity.

"I'd like to thank you for giving me this chance to command the Horse Detachment," Phillips said. "I look forward to serving with you in the coming months. To the troopers of the Horse Detachment — you look great. I couldn't have asked for a better group of guys to lead."







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Varying levels of Exchange support

Bring a contractor, family member, Department of Defense (DoD) civilian or other visitor onto Fort Irwin, and the first words out of their mouth typically are, "who can shop the exchange?"

While authorizations governing who can buy merchandise and services at the Post Exchange (PX) often apply to a chosen few, the doors to Army and Air Force Exchange Service' fast food and convenience stores, including Chorley's and Anthony's Pizza at the PX food court, as well as the Taco Bell and Manchu Wok located in Bldg. 21, are open to virtually anyone looking for a quick bite to eat. In fact, DoD policy allows all federal government employees, and even installation visitors, to dine at AAFES restaurants as long as their orders are consumed on the installation. Furthermore, anyone can purchase single-serve consumables from the Shoppette, an option that is especially valuable late

at night considering the Shoppette (in Bldg. 34) is open 24 hours.

The 'Snack Avenue' inside most AAFES Shoppettes offers a robust selection of single-serve consumables," said General Manager Chester Hires. "Candy bars, soft drinks, and soon, hot dogs can be picked up by just about anyone with business on the installation."

Exchange service authorization begins with the House Armed Services Committee and ultimately ends with the NTC, Fort Irwin commander. The guidelines, as prescribed by Army Regulation 215-8/Air Force Instruction 34-211 (I) and the Armed Services Exchange Regulations, Department of Defense Instruction 1330.21, require proper identification of authorized customers, including uniformed personnel and members of the Reserve Components and family members, applicable DoD civilians, exchange associates, retirees and their dependents who possess a basic exchange purchase privilege authorization card.

Anyone who believes they may qualify for exchange benefits, including access to the main PX, can contact AAFES General Manager Chester Hires at (760) 380-1500 or hires@aafes.com for additional guidance as well as information regarding possible exceptions at NTC, Fort Irwin.

It pays to be 'green' at Fort Irwin

The Fort Irwin Post Exchange is rewarding military shoppers who are doing their part for the environment through its new "Use a Bag, Save the Planet" initiative.

Instead of using traditional plastic bags, retail facilities at Fort Irwin are encouraging shoppers to bring their own reusable bags. Beyond helping the environment, shoppers that "Use a Bag, Save the Planet" will get five cents back for every reusable bag used.

"The Army and Air Force Exchange Service desires to be an environmentally responsible retailer and a 'green' place to shop," said the General Manager Chester Hires. "By rewarding the use of environmentally-friendly bags we hope to begin changing behaviors today to put us on a path for a cleaner tomorrow."

The five cent credit applies only to shoppers who bring in and use reusable shopping bags (plastic bags do not apply) at the Exchange and all other retail facilities at Fort Irwin. As such, customers who simply decline a plastic bag, but do not utilize a reusable bag, will not qualify for the five cent credit.



Robert "Abe" Abrams spoke to him. The general told him to "keep his head down and stay safe," and to keep in touch with people back home. Kliem, who got married a few weeks ago, said the general's words were good advice and that he would 'take them to heart.'

Another family man saying goodbye that afternoon was Pfc. Jose Jimenez, an armaments repairer for the Renegades. Jimenez is on his first deployment from his first duty station, having enlisted about a year ago. His confidence level is high, because his platoon has been well trained, Jimenez said.

"I am confident with the training and am prepared to be deployed," Jimenez said. "The morale of my platoon is high and everybody is morivated."

Jimenez feels that the Family Readiness Group is doing a good job and that his family will have a lot of support at Fort Irwin. His wife, Rose, has given him "100 percent support" even though there is some anxiety, Jimenez said.

"Emotionally, I am affected by the year deployment, having to be separated from my husband," Rose said in Spanish. She, her husband, and two daughters are originally from Puerto Rico. The family is relatively new to the Army and Fort Irwin. Rose said the Army has its benefits, but the deployment could be difficult for her.

"However, I am at ease being on Fort Irwin," Rose said. "I will dedicate a lot of time to my daughters and keep studying English as my second language." Pamela, 9, the youngest Jimenez, said she will be sad to see Dad go.

"I love him very much, I will miss him, and I wish him well over there," Pamela said. "He's told me to take care and to behave well with Mom."

Evelyn Troya, wife of Sgt. Ramon Troya, plans to use family as support for herself and the couple's four children while dad is deployed. They have been on Fort Irwin two years, and have been an Army family for seven years. Evelyn said she wants to stay busy during the deployment, perhaps by getting a part-time job or taking college courses. Her caring attitude was demonstrated by the message she had for the unit:

"I want to wish everybody a safe trip and for the unit to come back home safely," Evelyn said. "I hope time goes by really fast."

Troya, a generator mechanic for the 557th, has served nine years, having been a Marine before joining the Army. Troya has suggested to Evelyn that she use the FRG during the deployment. The FRG was instrumental in the recording of a DVD of himself for his children that they will see when he's deployed. His six-year-old daughter has created a shoebox for items from home that the family will mail to him in three months, and then every three months afterwards. Troya said he will be writing and sending emails to stay in touch with his family. He hopes his family stays busy and goes out.

"Hopefully, they'll get to go to Disneyland and do things like that," Troya said. "Hopefully,

the FRG will have things going on as well to keep the families occupied and help pass the time — [so] they're not sitting at the house, counting the days down."

A week before the 557th deployed, the unit held a prayer breakfast, at which families sat down to share a meal with their deploying warriors. Chaplain (Col.) Dennis Newton, installation chaplain, led the group in prayer and read a verse from Psalms 42. His message to Soldiers and family was that of having trust.

"Put your hope in God, for I will yet praise him, my Savior and my God," Newton said. "Sometimes we're taken to places where we're just overwhelmed, and there is only reply, that is, I trust in God. When I'm not sure what's going on — I know one thing — I turn to God. Now that you guys are going off to Afghanistan — it's an interesting place — its developing. We can't tell you what it's like, but I can give you one assurance — God will be there with you."

That April morning, Sgt. John Henderson, a communications sergeant, said the event was a way to create cohesion. He appreciated the FRG for having made the prayer breakfast possible.

"I grew up with religion in my household," Henderson said. "Sometimes when people hear a prayer, it shows that there are a lot of people out there who are [united]. This is an easy opportunity to bring the families together."

Henderson and his wife, Jaclyn, brought their baby girl, Nita, to the breakfast. Henderson carried the precious 10-month-old as he went through the food serving stations. "I'm glad my family was able to be here with me to enjoy this great morning," Henderson said.

Another couple with young children attending the breakfast was Maria Gomez and husband Sgt. Jose Napoles, a quartermaster and equipment repairer with the Renegades. Maria said the occasion allotted good family time and provided an opportunity for families to network.

"It allows Soldiers to feel more comfortable knowing that their family has a support system here and are not left alone, even if their immediate family is not here," Maria said. "This FRG is really good. It's really united. If you need anything, you just call them. They'll give you the information you need and if they can't give it to you, they'll look for it."

Maria also appreciated the prayer aspect of the function. She liked the sermon by Newton and felt it was refreshing and spiritually rewarding.

"It brought everything together," Maria said. "It basically put our Soldiers in God's hands."

An entire battalion will be placing its maintenance requirements in the hands of the 557th. The mission of the 557th in Afghanistan will be to conduct force sustainment operations under the 87th Combat Sustainment Support Battalion from Fort Stewart, Ga.

The 557th Maintenance Company can fix most of what the Army fields in Afghanistan, said the company's first sergeant, 1st Sgt. Jimmy Quemado. They will be repairing track and wheel vehicles, communications equipment, and weapons.


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
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More than third of equipment now out of Iraq

WASHINGTON — The Army is now 35 percent complete in its effort to move equipment and materiel out of Iraq as part of the withdrawal from that country.

Lt. Gen. William G. Webster, commander, Third Army, spoke April 2 during a press briefing at the Pentagon, about the status of the drawdown in Iraq, and the buildup in Afghanistan. The Army began pulling equipment out of the country in May 2009.

"When we started this operation we had about 2.8 million items of equipment in Iraq, along with 88,000 containers containing some of that equipment," the general said.

The Army has also retrograded more than 11,000 pieces of rolling stock — that is tracked vehicles, wheeled vehicles and trailers. Additionally, more than 21,000 troops have redeployed from Operation Iraqi Freedom. In all, more than 1.25 billion dollars worth of materiel and equipment have left Iraq.

"We're about 35 percent through with that now," Webster said.

Nearly half of the equipment coming out of Iraq has been marked to go to Afghanistan for the buildup there, Webster said. Other equipment will go back to the United States to

Not limited to rolling stock, the base receives hundreds of trailer-sized containers a week filled with everything from medical supplies to ammunition. The round-the-clock process of repairing the battle-worn equipment remains a top priority for Third Army as it pushes the repaired and usable equipment into other areas of operation.

be reintegrated into the Army, sold to foreign militaries, or disposed of. But much equipment the Army will keep, including that for buildup in Afghanistan, needs to be modified before going into the new environment, or repaired, due to excessive wear from use in Iraq.

"The equipment we have has been ridden hard," the general said.

Equipment is now being reset and repaired in Kuwait, Webster said. If it can't be reset there, it may go back to the United States to be repaired in depots.

"We have a large team of experts from Army Materiel Command and the Defense Logistics Agency that looks at all of this equipment in Iraq where it currently sits," he said. "If the equipment is not fully mission-capable or it doesn't have enough life in it ... they will pass that equipment back to us."

Webster said if the Army determines the overall cost to repair equipment is more than the operational cost, it might be scrapped.

While equipment needs to be cleaned up and refurbished before going into Afghanistan, other equipment needs to be modified for the different operational environment found there, Webster said.

"Some of the equipment we'll get out of Iraq does not have the latest armor on it," he said. "We may also have to change engines, suspensions, transmissions as well as adding on the latest armor before we push it forward. We're trying to get it to our troops in the best condition possible before they realize they need it."

To move that equipment around in theater, the Army is depending heavily on the Northern Distribution Network set up by the U.S. Transportation Command. About 50 percent of supplies are being moved that way, Webster said.

"Those northern routes have given us a great deal of relief and additional capacity if any of the routes are blocked by weather or enemy action," he said.

The general said through efficiencies he expects the Army can beat its initial time estimates for moving necessary equipment into Afghanistan.

The president told us he wanted to move in there (Afghanistan) as quickly as possible," he said. "Initial estimates were that is was going to take as much as 18 months. Through the efficiencies we found and the hard work of the entire DoD team and our allies too, with all these other networks, we now will be able to move the 5,000-plus vehicles that are needed for the buildup by the end of the summer."

Stryker Brigade helps with footbridge for Iraqi children

ABU GHRAIB, Iraq — In the neighborhood of Abu Ghraib in Baghdad, the journey to school for children means crossing a treacherous road, but the U.S. Army may help change that.

Capt. Talgin Cannon, a member of the joint project management of-fice from 4th Stryker Brigade Combat Team, 2nd Infantry Division, traveled to the area to discuss a project to rebuild a footbridge with a local construction company manager April 6.

The footbridge was destroyed by an improvised explosive device about two years ago, he said, explaining that rebuilding the footbridge would allow safe traveling for the locals in the neighborhood trying to cross the busy road.

"The most important thing is the safety of the children here," said Cannon. "The bridge will help get these kids to school safely without getting hit by a speeding car."

According to several sources, including local Iraqi Police and

District Area Council members, at least five children have been killed while trying to cross the busy road this year alone.

"For these kids it's like playing a game of leap frog with their lives every day to go to school and then return home," said Cannon, an Elkin, N.C., native.

For this very reason, reconstruction of the footbridge was the number one project nominated by the council members for completion in the area, which will be funded through the U.S. Army's Commander's Emergency Response Program, he said.

A local construction company was contracted to build the bridge, which

will span 25 meters across the twoway road. The cost of the footbridge is estimated at \$84,000 and will take several months to complete.

This most recent meeting between Cannon and the contractors was more or less a formality, ensuring that everything was on track in getting the project up and running.

"We didn't stay out there long because the construction company knew what needs to be done," said Cannon, after his meeting with the contractors was complete. "All they really needed was the 'OK' from us."

Many Soldiers that conduct missions in this area say that the need for this bridge is evident.

"I do a lot of traveling on this road, and it really concerns me to see small kids run across this road," said Sgt. Reginald Chretien, a team leader with the Military Police platoon, Headquarters Company, 4th Stryker Brigade Combat Team, 2nd Infantry Division, from Beaumont, Texas. "There are vendors on the sides of the road, and it attracts a lot of people walking across this busy road, and there is a school right there."

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
