Bone Marrow Drive



'City of Angels' cops train post police

MP Company conducts training at LA County Central Jail

Unless you've run the Los Angeles marathon, chances are you haven't had traffic in L.A. temporarily halted so you can get your morning jog in.

But that's just how Fort Irwin Military Police Company noncommissioned officers began their day April 28, when they ran three miles through the streets of downtown Los Angeles. Sheriffs' patrol cars from the L.A. County Central Jail paused vehicular traffic as the formation of Soldiers and a few sheriffs made their way past L.A. City Hall and freeway overpasses.

The run kicked off a day of NCO professional development for the military police officers. They had the opportunity to conduct their training with Los Angeles County Sheriffs at the jail facility they oversee in downtown L.A. The opportunity did not come about by

luck, however. During the past year, the MPs have formed partnerships with Los Angeles area police agencies, which have been able to provide officers as trainers, advisers, role players and evaluators. During several training events, MPs have received guidance that augments their military police expertise with civilian law enforcement skills.

During the training at the jail, MPs focused on four areas that are requirements of NCO

Customer Comment: The gym was placed here for Soldiers and dependents. The civilian contractors are taking up all the weights and space during military lunch period. One of the gyms should be off limits to non-military personel during lunch. as Soldiers, we do not have a lot of time on our hands; lunch time is very valuable. **Agency Response:** I checked with the manager from Freedom Fitness Center regarding your concerns today, and this is his response: If the customer is a Soldier or military, they always have the right to go to the front of the line, and if they talk to me or our staff, we will displace any contractor

for these military customers. The key is we must know about their plight, and we will come to their aid. I pulled the hourly count for the 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. hours and we had a total of 32 people from 11 a.m. to 12 noon, and 21 people from 12 to 1 p.m. We had quite a few of those in the basketball court — at least 16 customers. We are not sure if you are talking about today or another day, but please know that



SUBJECT: Armed Forces Day Message for 15 May 2010



Seven hundred seventy.

That is the number of people on Fort Irwin who were registered on Monday into the Department of Defense Marrow Donor Program.

They all provided a swab sample taken from the inside of the mouth that will be processed into a database. That's all it takes to be part of the National Marrow Donor Registry. Once you're inputted into the registry, you will become part of the 6 million people in the registry, including 400,000 service members. Your information in the registry can be compared to patients who require a bone marrow transplant. There are thousands of people who await transplants each day, and you can potentially help reduce those numbers by joining the registry. If you are determined to be a match, more tests are conducted before you donate — and remember, more than 90 percent of bone marrow donations involved just donating blood.

Service members, spouses, and DoD employees, who are in good health and of ages 18-60, can register today and tomorrow. Register today at the 24-hour Shoppettes and Class Six Stores, from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. You can also See Marrow, page 8

register tomorrow at the Post Exchange and Commissary, from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Bring the kids out tomorrow, so they can check out the fire truck display by the Fort Irwin Fire Department.

Michelle Murphy, a military spouse here, spoke on radio station KNTC from the Public Affairs Office to inform Fort Irwin about the opportunity the community has to be part of the donor program. Murphy also spoke about her personal connection to this cause. Her sisterin-law, Jennifer, had been waiting for a marrow transplant to combat her disease, acute lymphoblastic leukemia. By coincidence, Murphy and her family received a call on the morning of the radio interview that Jennifer had received her transplant.

Murphy was inspired by Jennifer's plight to initiate and coordinate the donor registration drive on Fort Irwin. Because DoD subsidizes the cost of processing, participants are able to register for free.

"There's no cost to anybody military, which is a gift," Murphy said. "For a person to register their marrow, out in the civilian community, it's upwards of \$55 to \$100 per person. This program, this DoD marrow program, its truly a gift for military individuals."

Soldiers and spouses can also register with a number of units on post. Units conducting registrations include 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment, 916th Support Brigade, Operations Group, U.S. Army Medical Department Activity, Dental Activity and U.S. Army Garrison.

Smog Check Station opens for business

For the first time, the community on Fort Irwin will be able to have their vehicles smog inspected on post. Following a ribbon cutting ceremony on April 26, led by Col. James Chevallier, garrison commander, and Command Sgt. Maj. Mark Harvey, garrison command sergeant major, the Firestone tire shop put into operation a Smog Check Station inside one of its service bays. Prior to the new service, Fort Irwin's California vehicle owners had to go exclusively off-post to have their cars inspected. Now with an appointment, drivers can have their vehicles inspected and passed. If a vehicle does not pass, drivers can be referred to off-post locations for repairs.

Army and Air Force Exchange Service on Fort Irwin was instrumental in establishing the service, making it an AAFES concession, said Chester Hires, director of AAFES here.

"For the community, it's going to be an excellent benefit," Hires said. "It's the first ever smog station for AAFES, so this is good, and a learning experience for us as well."





Professional Development (NCOPD) events, said 1st Sgt. Bobby Estrada, first sergeant, MP Company. The NCOs, ranging from corporal to sergeant first class, were required to: conduct physical training together; perform leadership development by identifying key areas for advancement; gain knowledge in the field of taking care of Soldiers; and eat a meal together.

The law enforcement training that day centered on several areas, which were practiced by way of situations with role players. The MPs responded to scenarios involving the following: an active shooter in a public place; a domestic disturbance call; and responding to a drunk in public. They also received instruction on procedures for searching, controlling, and arresting a suspect.

"Today, they will be learning from a leader aspect," Estrada said. "So, when they respond to an incident, they know how to manage that incident. They're thinking like leaders instead of thinking like initial responders. That's the two-inone – they learning how to be a leader at incident management and how to take care of your people at an incident."

Instrumental with coordinating the training event was Sheriff Lt. Edward Godfrey, a watch commander at the Men's Central Jail, with approximately more than 30 years of service with the L.A. County Sheriff's Department. Godfrey also serves in the Army National Guard out of Los Alamitos, Calif., as a sergeant whose duties include providing training to military police units in California. Godfrey said the purpose of the scenarios presented to the MPs that day was geared towards creating a mindset of leadership and success.

"Law enforcement is universal throughout the United States, but we're at the cutting edge here," said Godfrey, who works for the largest Sheriff's department in the free world. "[The MPs] are getting the best training available, that's cutting edge, from the L.A. Sheriff's Department."

One of the scenarios the NCOs practiced included responding to a domestic disturbance call. Two sheriffs portrayed a couple involved in a dispute at home, and as MPs arrived to the scene, the woman became more agitated and confrontational. Sheriff's Sgt. Jennifer Barsh, playing the woman, threw a chair and shouted at her "spouse" before

an MP restrained her and snapped on handcuffs. She was not searched thoroughly, and once the scenario concluded, Barsh revealed she had been hiding a dummy 8-inch knife in her waistband. The handling of the woman during the scenarios became one focus of the After Action Review.

Barsh stressed to the MPs that women have to be approached, restrained, and searched in a manner similar to male suspects.

"The women ... will sometimes be your primary aggressor," Barsh said. "Put the handcuffs on them and separate [the couple]."

Sgt. Stephen Westfall, an MP in the traffic accident investigation section, said the training provided was outstanding and one of the better NCOPD events he's participated in. He commented that typical NCOPD events are not that interactive and can be relegated to prolonged discussions about improvements. He appreciated and understood the feedback from Barsh regarding the approach to women suspects. We can't be hesitant in dealing with female suspects, said Westfall.

"An NCOPD like this one allows us a first-hand look at civilian law enforcement, which we can pass


on to our Soldiers," Westfall said. "If you can pass this level of training to Soldiers ... whether you're a day-one private or a seasoned [sergeant first class], you're going to benefit. This is the practical. This is what's going to happen out in the streets. By learning it now, here, it can benefit not only us, but the community of Fort Irwin as well."

The MP Company on Fort Irwin is the only active duty MP company in California, and having a training relationship with the Sheriffs in L.A. has proven to be a huge benefit, said Capt. Jason Kim, commander of the MP unit. Kim appreciated the group of sheriffs for sharing their expertise and facilities for the training.

"Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department is full of patriots who want to help us out," Kim said. "In the end, the benefit is for the Fort Irwin community. Our Soldiers are that much better in whatever tasks they're doing today, whether it's domestic violence, active shooter — any of those skills. The partnership makes them better, too. We happen to be in Southern California, which is the knowledge bed of law enforcement. This is where the larger departments are located, so we have to tap into that resource."

Battalion Mass Casualty Exercise

Testing unit medical responsiveness, crisis incident ability

On April 8, the General Support Aviation Battalion (GSAB) flexed its aviation muscle by conducting a Battalion Mass Casualty (MAS-CAL) exercise in order to test the battalion's medical responsiveness and ability to handle a crisis incident should one take place in or around the Fort Irwin community.

The MASCAL simulated a traffic accident taking place in the box between a Mine Resistant Ambush Protected (MRAP) vehicle, several Humvee vehicles, and approximately 14 injured Soldiers. Soldiers from the Headquarters and Headquarters Detachment, GSAB and Aviation Company (AVCO) simulated casualties. Two simulated man dummies were used to replicate two pinned passengers inside a vehicle.

Immediately upon receiving notification of the accident, the Air Ambulance Detachment (AAD) launched their 1st UP helicopter, arriving onsite within 15 minutes of the accident. After conducting an initial assessment of the scene, a radio call was sent back to AAD's Operations Center alerting the unit that a MASCAL situation had taken place. With the knowledge that time is vital, and thoughts that "if you lose time, you lose lives," in the back of their minds, the air crew and medics on shift immediately sprang into action, rushing with medical supplies and aid-bags in hand in order to get to the site of the accident, so they could assess and treat the casualties.

After arriving on site, the medics worked to calm shocked Soldiers while creating a casualty collection point in order to begin treating injured Soldiers. At the casualty collection point, medics, along with members of the Fort Irwin Fire Department who had now arrived at the location, worked diligently to stabilize the casualties in order to prepare them for air evacua-

tion to the next level of medical treatment. Fire Department personnel jumped into action with the 'Jaws of Life' and extracted the two simulated casualties trapped in the vehicle.

Based on the number of casualties, helicopters from AVCO at Barstow-Daggett were called to reinforce the effort and arrived within an hour. Eventually, there were seven General Support Aviation Battalion (GSAB) helicopters involved in the exercise and one Eagle Flight Detachment OH-58 A/C replicating a civilian Mercy Air helicopter.

Months of planning had led up to this battalion-level exercise in order to assess the competence and response time of GSAB's Medical Evacuation (MEDEVAC) and Casualty Evacuation (CASEVAC) capabilities. Coordination was made with several of Fort Irwin's tenant organizations to include Weed Army Hospital Staff, NTC Fire Department and Operations Group Eagle Team.

"Hopefully something like this will never happen, but just in case, this exercise allowed us to identify any chokepoints that we may have had allowing us to be better prepared to serve the Fort Irwin community should a real-world MASCAL incident take place." said Lt. Col. Greg Peterson, battalion commander, GSAB.

This exercise served as a tool to bring aviators and emergency responders at Fort Irwin together in order to understand what it would be like to conduct an air evacuation for a real life medical emergency. By providing a stressful sense of realism, it enhanced emergency response preparedness for all participants at the National Training Center.



Riding gear for ATV, dirt bike safety tips

The nature of ATV and dirt bike riding demands that you wear protective clothing. Although complete protection is not possible, knowing what to wear and how to wear it can make you feel more comfortable when you ride and reduce the chance of injury.

Never operate an ATV or dirt bike without an approved helmet, eye protection, boots, gloves, long pants, and a long-sleeved shirt or jacket.

It is important to protect your skin from scratches. A long-sleeved shirt or jersey and long pants are minimum requirements for rider protection. Off-highway riding gear such as off-highway pants with kneepads, jersey, and chest/shoulder protectors provides better protection. You can look stylish and ready for action, and still be well protected.


