## Sierra Army Depot wins Industrial Operations Safety Award at AMC level, to compete at HQDA

HERLONG, Calif. -- U.S. Army Materiel command selected Sierra Army Depot as the winner of the FY22 **Industrial Operations Safety** Award, Jan. 9, 2023.

The award recognizes the Sierra Army Depot employee-led safety program's achievements in job hazard analysis audits, safety stand down events, the depot's safety culture towards lockout tagout, cranes and rigging, as well as the depot's VPP Star status.

During Fiscal Year 2022, Sierra Army Depot achieved major milestones in safety, accomplishing more than 2 million hours of work while making significant improvements to its safety program. The depot increased the analysis of safety program performance, increased the

# Sterra Army Depot supports Presidential Drawdowns

Sierra Army Depot supported several Presidential Drawdown Authority orders throughout 2022, including COVID-19 Personal Protective Equipment, Organizational Clothing and Individual Equipment, parts harvest from Non-Mission Capable vehicles, and nearly 300 M1A1 Abrams tanks. Presidential Drawdown Authority allows for the speedy delivery of defense articles and services from Department of Defense stocks to foreign countries and international organizations to respond to unforeseen emergencies. Such assistance can begin arriving within days—or even hours—of approval.

SIAD received four presidential-directed shipment orders in support of Europe/Ukraine contingency operations, between February and April 2022.

R3 began shipping various armor ballistic items to Dover, Delaware, Feb. 23, 2022. R3 employees took immediate action to pull, inspect, and fully prep and configure the items for shipment by aircraft. They were able to meet the Requested Delivery Date (RDD) to Dover for military air to Kaiserslautern, Germany.

A second presidential directive for ballistics was initiated, March 6, and R3 began shipment preparations to Dover. Flight arrangements were made through TACOM CMO and the assets were successfully delivered before the requested RDD to be flown to Germany.

Another presidential-directed shipment was requested, March 21. R3 completed the shipment with 11 truckloads of material destined for Dover, exceeding the RDD by two

R3 completed another presidential-directed shipment, April 11, in a joint venture with the 402nd, 404th, 406th, and 407th Army Field Support Brigades (AFSBs). This shipment not only contained items that were directly ordered from SIAD, but the depot was also tasked to fill orders for various assets that CONUS military locations were unable to fill. R3 was able to step up, fulfill all requirements from different installations, and meet the requested RDDs to Dover.

Sierra Army Depot's shipment totals for the four OCIE presidential drawdowns included 256,000 items that were packaged on nearly 3,000 pallets that filled 50 commercial semitrailers. Their total value was slightly more than \$101 million.

Sierra Army Depot received an order for multiple Cold Weather Gear, Aug. 22, for ground shipment to Chicago, Illinois. The Sierra Army Depot OCIE Directorate was delegated as the Break Bulk Point for other CONUS CIFs for asset air shipment preparation. As of 1 September, Sierra Army Depot had pulled, packed, and prepped for shipment 30 truckloads of Cold Weather Gear. The shipment was flown from Chicago to Kaiserslautern in order to support the Soldiers involved with European contingency, Pre-Positioned Stock.

The Sierra Army Depot employees' efforts were critical to the US support of contingency operations in Europe/Ukraine. Employees from all areas of the depot (R3, maintenance, storage, logistics, containerization and assembly, shipping) worked as a team and showed dedication and initiative.


